




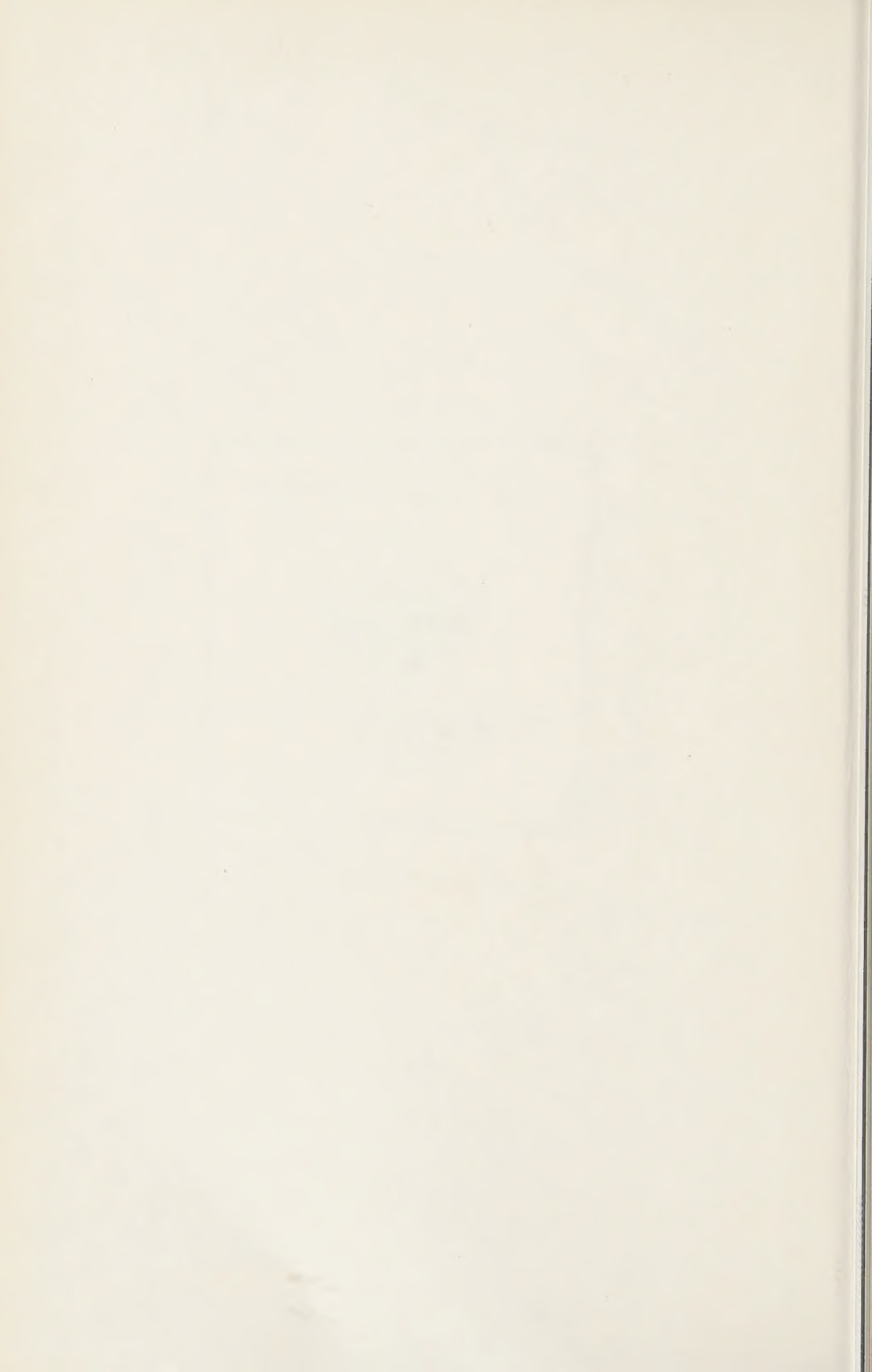

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## P R E F A C E.

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IN a communication from Mr. Milward to the Archæological Journal, December, 1850, the following statement occurs, with reference to the charters, &c. preserved in the Record Office at Malta.

“ There is also a volume of the fifteenth century, containing the accounts of the Commanderies. It is a continuation of an older and still more interesting volume which has, by some means, found its way into the Public Library. The latter gives the accounts of the property belonging to the Order in England and Scotland. Unfortunately these accounts are very difficult to decipher. I remember, however, looking over it, in company with a Scotch gentleman, who had edited various antiquarian works, and with another gentleman from Northumberland. The Scotchman read the MS. with tolerable facility; my friend from the North repeatedly identified certain allusions with property that he knew, and felt much interest in the book. There is also much that is valuable in the statement of the different prices paid for commodities, labour, &c.”

This is the volume whose contents I have here printed.

Compelled by ill-health to pass the winter of 1838-9 in the island of Malta, I took the opportunity to inspect the MSS. in the Public Library at Valetta. At that time no catalogue had yet been made, although one was in a state of progress under the care of Dr. Vassallo,\* the librarian, a man of erudition, of great talent, and

fully competent to his charge. To this gentleman I take this opportunity of tendering my thanks for first bringing the MS. to my notice, and for the great courtesy and attention which, in common with all who frequented the library, I invariably received at his hands.

Besides this "Extent," there were in the library about twenty volumes in manuscript, quarto, entitled "Bulls." They appeared to be a registry of letters-missive from the Grand Masters, relating to the government of the different preceptories in Europe, appointments of priors and other officers, grants and exchanges of lands, settlements of disputes, rebukes for misconduct, &c. They commence with the year 1346, but most of them are merely transcripts in a hand of between two and three centuries later, irregularly made, and written in a most slovenly and illegible character. A very small portion of them relate to England. They were very uninviting, and, having only a very few weeks at my command, after transcribing about a dozen of them, I reserved the rest for the chances of future investigation, and applied myself to the task of transcribing the "Extent."

It is contained in a thin folio volume, bound in parchment, consisting of 160 pages, well and very legibly written upon paper (the water-mark an axe) in a hand of the same date, and in excellent preservation. Several errors of the scribe, in his figures, names of places, omission of words, &c. would indicate that the MS. itself has been only a copy. There is more than one instance of a word which palpably he could not read, and wrote down without any definite idea what it meant. I would specify "expedoż," at page 38; and perhaps "Brex," miswritten for "Brey," i. e. "Bray," in various places, as instances in which we may suppose the scribe to have misread his MS; but, after all, this volume seems to have been a transcript, only so far as it is the work of a clerk registering in a book the returns made to him from the different preceptories.

I give the MS. exactly as I found it, excepting that I have extended the contractions, and more distinctly spaced out the different

items in the accounts, instead of giving them, as they sometimes occur, lumped in one paragraph. I have made the headings, too, more distinct than they appear in the MS.; but have added nothing, unless it be an occasional heading, where such appeared necessary, and when I have done so I have always marked the fact by including the word or words in a parenthesis.

In many instances the counties are decidedly assigned wrongly in the original; but, perhaps, in these cases, the parishes, villes, &c. which are wrongly appropriated, may have been cells, or granges, or preceptories, dependent on the head preceptory in another county, and so, in the Survey, put into the same county as the head house itself. Where no county is named in the original, I have assigned it conjecturally, and then always placed it within parenthesis.

To many of the knights' and brethren's names an "s" is added. It stands probably for "serviens," one of the three classes, "milites," "capellani," "servientes," into which the order was divided. Not feeling sufficient certainty on the subject, I thought it best to leave the contraction unextended; but the above is, I believe, the correct interpretation.

One word as to my attempt at printing the MS. "in extenso." Even skilled and practised antiquaries find the literal copy of a MS. with all its contractions, in printed type, very uninviting to the eye, and very disagreeable to read. By the advice, therefore, of several eminent antiquaries, I determined to give the MS. "in extenso," though I confess that my own opinion leaned strongly to the contracted form, as more accurately correct, and as giving the genuine text. All readers of ancient MSS. know that it is practically impossible to give always with certainty the true extension. Instances constantly occur in which there is nothing in the context to guide the copyist in his choice between the singular and plural. Sometimes, for instance, it is impossible to decide by the word "fit" whether one son or more are meant, or even whether it may not stand for daughter or daughters. Who can decide whether "roþ" stands for "roba" or "robæ" in this Extent? and yet upon a correct

reading of this turns a point of some importance, viz. what the allowance of robes per annum was to the brethren, whether they were to have one or more. It will not be necessary to enumerate more instances of the uncertainty which must ever attach to a MS. printed "in extenso." Now that it is completed I feel some regret that I adopted a plan which never can be perfectly satisfactory; but, having done so, I have endeavoured to obviate the evil by giving the literal original in a note whenever there can be a doubt as to the mode in which a passage should be extended; and I think I can claim the confidence of my readers that the MS. has been faithfully rendered.

One instance of the uncertainty which attaches to copying "in extenso" may be exemplified by the word "Theš" in this Extent. It regularly occurs in the record of the balance to be paid to the treasury, under the accounts of each preceptory. I long hesitated whether I should extend it, "thesauraria" treasury, or "thesaurarius" treasurer. The opinions of antiquaries, and the best authorities whom I consulted, were divided upon the point, so I took a kind of middle course, adopting "thesaurarium" as standing either for treasurer or treasury, though, certainly, not of common usage in the latter sense. To my very great regret, when I was correcting the proofs of the closing pages of the MS., I found two or three instances of "thesauraria" indicated by the gender of the accompanying adjective, and, in one instance, actually written in extenso in the original MS. "thesauraria." I have to apologise, therefore, for this decided error running through the entire Survey, an error which I ought to have avoided, as in my own first transcript I had written it all through "thesaurarium" in a most marked manner, frequently in the form of an actual correction from "thesaurarium." The fact is, I had corrected my transcript, and forgotten my motive for so doing.

Many passages will be found in decidedly bad Latin—these errors the reader will be pleased to ascribe to the original. In those instances in which they have been there written in extenso, nothing

was left for me but to give them as I found them, whether in correct Latin or otherwise. The most marked of these cases are specified in the notes.

The constantly recurring errors in the products and sums of the different items in the accounts have been purposely left unnoticed by me; all antiquaries are familiar with the bad arithmetic of ancient accounts.

I have endeavoured to identify most of the places with their modern names, but have not always been successful. The work has been so long delayed by the transmission of the sheets to Malta for collation, and by my own protracted ill-health, that I have thought it better not to delay the publication any longer merely for the discovery of the places not yet sufficiently identified. They will all, probably, be well known to the topographers of their respective localities. I must here take the opportunity of thanking the Rev. John Webb (to whom our Society is indebted for a most interesting and valuable volume—"The Household Roll of Bishop Swinfield") for his kind assistance in identifying some of the Herefordshire names. To His Grace the Duke of Newcastle the Society is under great obligations for his obliging endeavours to procure the loan of the original MS. from Malta, and, on failing to obtain it, for facilities most kindly rendered in transmitting the sheets to that island for collation. To Dr. Luigi Vella, the Keeper of the Records in Malta, and W. Winthrop, Esq. the United States Consul in that island, I am deeply indebted, for their indefatigable zeal and kind assistance, in collating the sheets, as printed off, with the original MS. I am also indebted to them for the very interesting document printed in the Appendix, which they discovered among the records at Malta, and kindly transcribed for me.\* It would indicate that the property of the Hospitallers

\* When I was there in 1839, neither the governor nor any of the authorities to whom I had access could give me any information as to the Records of the Order. They were all supposed to have been lost. The following extract of a letter which I received from Mr. Winthrop will testify that they still exist,

at that period was ruinously encumbered. How they were relieved does not appear; probably, by further grants of some of the Templars' estates, which had not yet been given to them. Our Extent will show how fearfully burthened they were with payments of fees, pensions, and extortionate charges. Hence, probably, many of the "fieri facias" which they so feelingly deplore. The grants, too, of the Templars' lands must have involved them in much litigation. The former lords of the fee, and the families of the original grantors to the Templars, would not sit down quietly, now that that Order was suppressed, and patiently witness the transfer of their grants to another body. They, doubtless, claimed them in many instances for themselves, and would hardly allow the Hospitallers to take undisputed possession. There are many indications of hostility, and sometimes of a revengeful spirit, on the part of these lords of the fee, both in the Extent itself and in this Appendix. These litigations must have cost the poor Hospitallers dear. Still they seem to have raised their heads again in sufficient opulence.

and that great facilities are afforded to all who wish to inspect them. I cannot forbear inserting it as a tribute of justice to Dr. Vella, and for the benefit of all lovers of ancient Records who may chance to visit the island. "I have always found Dr. Vella most civil, kind, and attentive. He is a learned man, and invaluable in the office which he fills. I have found in my researches that what without his assistance might have been a hard labour, has, with it, been an agreeable pastime. No one is so well acquainted with the manuscript history of the Order of St. John, and the thought has frequently struck me that, when removed from the Record Office, either by illness or age, who is there capable of taking his place? This reflection leads me to remark, that Dr. Vella is as much in want of an able assistant, whom he can instruct in his duties, as those who visit him are in want of a printed catalogue of the two or three thousand manuscripts which are placed under his charge. If the former were given the latter would come." Let us hope that Mr. Winthrop's account of present wants and prospective deficiencies may be no longer real; and that the learned Keeper may, ere this, have been provided with a competent assistant, and that, together, they have been enabled to arrange and catalogue the MSS.

A body of proprietors like these, with large estates in every county, must have been possessed of no ordinary power and influence ; and, owing allegiance to a foreign master, must have been at the best but questionable subjects.

It is hoped that the topographer will find much that is new and interesting in this Extent. It will fix with certainty the exact position of the Hospitallers' estates in each county at the middle of the fourteenth century, and in so far cannot be without its value. Much additional information, too, will be found which was not available to the editors of the *Monasticon*.

Long-continued illness, during which my medical advisers prohibited all unnecessary mental exertion, compelled me to devote what little energies were left to me, to the duties of my higher calling. I could not, and dared not, sacrifice these to mere literary labours. The publication of this work having therefore been too long protracted, and having but little hope of immediate improvement in health, I have gladly and thankfully availed myself of the services of my valued friend Mr. Kemble, who has most kindly relieved me of all further labours, and has written the introductory remarks which are prefixed to this volume. To his hands, far abler than my own, I leave the analysis of the record, and the bearing of its details upon the state of society, &c. forbearing any other remarks myself than such as seemed necessary to a history of the MS. I am sure that the transfer will be most acceptable to the Society ; for his extensive learning and powerful pen will accomplish the work infinitely better than I could have done, and the public will have a dissertation far surpassing in value any thing that I could have presumed to offer.

## INTRODUCTION.

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THE following pages contain a valuable, and in its way, I believe, an unique, document for the illustration of certain social relations in this country during the first half of the fourteenth century. I propose, therefore, to analyse it carefully, bearing well in mind, in all that I say, and all that I derive from its entries, the great economic deductions from which we may reason as to the normal mode of life of our forefathers at that period. It is a very striking chapter in that most interesting of all conceivable histories, the history of culture; and from this certain and positive record of one form of being at a definite period we can, without any very great difficulty, draw some valuable conclusions respecting times both earlier and later than the one whose details are so clearly set before us. It is undoubtedly important for us to know how Englishmen of different grades lived in the year of grace 1338, and we are very fortunate in having an account of undeniable authority, and by a contemporary hand, which enables us to follow, step by step, many of the more interesting and valuable details of the condition of English civilisation at that date. I wish we had similar accounts for other periods, both anterior and subsequent to this one. These would certainly give us a nearer insight into the changes of English life, its progression and its principle, than we can glean from records of public events, which we universally construe by the light of our actual state and knowledge, and consequently, in general, with more or less inaccuracy. But, in the absence of these aids to history, let us still rejoice that we possess in these pages a document by which, with due consideration of circumstances, we can test all other similar documents bearing upon the state of our social life during the mediæval period. The fourteenth century did not stand alone and apart: it was the child of the thirteenth, and it was also the father of the fifteenth—it partakes, therefore, in some degree of both.



I will not waste time or space upon what I presume every educated Englishman to be well acquainted with, the theory and place in history of the order of Hospitallers or Knights of St. John of Jerusalem; as little upon the political significance of this order and that of the Temple (of which the Hospitallers were the unjust and short-sighted heirs). Nor is it needful to speak of the honour and dignity of their gallant companions in the thirteenth and fourteenth centuries; nor of the grandeur of their early wars in Palestine, and, what are better known, their later wars in Rhodes and Malta; where, even in the seventeenth century, they still strove, but in vain, to retain a vitality in their order in spite of its severance from its historic root; nor how, even in this nineteenth century of ours, some poor, straggling, melancholy remembrances still continue to attach themselves to the persons of a few wretched representatives of an old grand ruin. Least of all shall I vouchsafe a word either of ridicule or indignation upon a number of persons whom one meets with in various European courts; and who are Knights of St. John of Jerusalem by virtue of a white cross upon a black coat, and the nomination of some king or other, who claims to be Grand-master of a non-existent order, which once was a great truth, and not a *sham* and matter of ribbons.

Leaving all such questions, our present business is to see how, while the order of the Knights Hospitallers did exist and its brethren were to be found in many parts of Europe, they managed the estates from which they derived their wealth, and with it their power. It is important to know by what means in every land a concentrated, positive, definite influence could exist apart from, if not hostile to, the general national interests. Of this the following pages will help us to judge. The position of all these associations was in itself an exceptional one. Like the clergy of the Roman Catholic Church, the knight belonged, not to a family, but to a corporation, which could have no nationality, and was intended to have none. The world, indeed, was the field to be ploughed, and the ploughmen were to be found in every land, each according to his craft; but the harvest was to be enjoyed in Palestine, or Rhodes, or wheresoever else it might please the head of the order to set up its head-quarters. The principle of all the half-clerical, half-military orders was to have a concentration of government of their own, an *imperium in imperio*, everywhere. The practice was to establish brotherhoods everywhere, dependent upon other brotherhoods;

but the idea to be ultimately realised was unity, not nationality. In some of the associations this unity rested in the pope, but more generally in the masters of the orders, whom the pope detested, because, under favourable circumstances, the master might himself possibly become a pope. The Universal Church did not like improvements upon its system, beginning with asceticism and ending in rival kingship, any more than the clergyman in this or that neighbourhood looks favourably upon a "total abstinence movement" which professes to make men wiser and better than Christianity itself can make them. The pope, in truth, liked the Templar and Hospitaller no better than the vicar likes the Ranter or Baptist, and had much the same feeling towards the preceptory as a good churchman has towards "Ebenezer." But practically the pope could not help himself. With the approbation of several of his own infallible predecessors, a number of ascetics had gone to Palestine, not finding Christianity hard enough at home, and in the hope of winning heaven by the exercise of increased self-sacrifice among difficulties and dangers such as Europe did not supply. It so happened that, being much versed in arms and accustomed to perilous adventure, they took up a career of fighting as the most useful way of devoting themselves to the service of God and their neighbour; but, somehow or other, fighting turned out profitable; men who begun by *renouncing* ended by *acquiring*; and with acquisition very worldly motives developed themselves. The knights took lands, raised rents, and imposed taxes and tolls, always saying, and perhaps sometimes believing, that this was what their vow of poverty and abnegation required. Poverty was exchanged for wealth, weakness for power, humility for arrogance, and lo! the *poor* brethren of the Temple and the Hospital not only succeeded in making themselves autonomous in their half-barrack, half-convent of Syria, but claimed to be so as well, in all the European lands into which, by purchase or any other form of conquest, they could contrive to extend their power.

We might be nearly sure, even if we had not the positive evidence of history, that the arrangements of the order were adapted in every land to the exigencies and accidents of their position. In Syria they encamped; in Rhodes they fortified; in France and England they farmed and amassed money for the general purposes of the ruling body. In Asia there had been the duties of the hospitium to be discharged, and sometimes warlike

attacks of Saracens to be repulsed. In the Mediterranean there were Turkish pirates to sweep from the seas, or pashas to hold at bay in island strongholds. Here there was something else to be done, interesting and important enough in its way, though not so full of romantic adventure as the mode of life under the tent and in the saddle. The brother here had more civilising occupation than *chining* Saracens, and more remunerating pursuits than tending weary pilgrims. He had here to consider practically, and in some obedience to the laws of the land, the relations of landlord and tenant: of cultivator who produced, and steward who accounted: of farmer and corrodary, who were bound to him in certain conditions and contracts; and, above all, there were certain immunities enjoyed under papal bulls, and which were to be maintained against the rights both of king and bishop.

The priory of England, it must be remembered, was only one part of a system which embraced, at different times, not only these islands, but extensive possessions in other quarters of the globe. The Hospital was not here only: it was everywhere. It lived and breathed according to the air and climate: it had its outward form according to the land in which it set its foot, and wherever it came it took pains to introduce as much as it could of its own form, *i. e.* its peculiar organisation. It depended upon a vast variety of circumstances; for wealth, and with wealth power, was the universal condition of its existence.

But, although in these very accounts the balance-sheet of the English priory does not afford a complete view of the arrangements of the order in all the countries where its possessions lay, it still gives a clear general view of the nature of those arrangements, in as far as they were not modified by particular accidents or circumstances. And as the method of the Hospitallers did probably not differ very widely from that of other landowners, we may, I think, infer from these pages a good deal of what was the characteristic state of this country in the beginning of the fourteenth century. We are not entirely without such information from other sources; but I do not think that we possess any account which enters so much into detail as this does. Some monastic terriers of the time of Edward III. and Richard II. well deserve to be compared with it: but this is not the place for such a comparison.

I have endeavoured to extract from the various scattered entries a

sufficient system of account to guide the reader who wishes to enter into the details of the following balance-sheets. It seemed to me that it would facilitate the use of the book if I gave a summary of its most important contents, and explained the points which were most worthy of attention. Any one who reads the few pages of this Introduction will have no difficulty in seeing the bearing of every entry which he may meet with in the tables themselves.

The work is a balance-sheet for every manor, containing a strict account of profit and loss, and so arranged as to show at a glance what sum was available after all charges were deducted, for the general purposes of the priory and the order. It is consequently a record of income and outlay, and it is under these two heads that I shall group the most of what I have to say.

I. INCOME. In the account of every *bajulia*, bailiwick or manor, the sources of revenue are duly entered under the following heads :

The mansion, with the yearly produce of its garden and curtilage.

The dovecote, or columbarium, which appears to be of steady and considerable profit.

The arable and meadow land at so much per acre.

Rents of mills (water, wind, and fulling), of messuages, cottages, and fisheries.

Market and toll, or *stallage*.

Grants or pensions from benefactors.

Profits of stock—*staurum*.

Appropriate churches and chapels.

Services of the villains or copyholders, in labour or kind.

Assessed rents of tenants in socage.

Perquisites of the courts, in which minor pleas were tried.

A *collect* or subscription, raised by contributions of the free land-owners, and called *confraria* or *fraria*.

Against these, the accountant has to set off the following items of expenditure.

II. OUTLAY. The cost of maintenance and hospitality.

Pensions and rent-charges.

Visitation expenses.

Law charges.

## Charges of collection.

Chaplaincies, small tithes, and other incidental charges upon ecclesiastical property.

The information which these several items supply of the value of property in the first half of the fourteenth century, is of the most important character: and, from the accounts comprehending entries from nearly every part of England, they set before us in a most lively manner the condition of the land and its owners in the normal state of peace. I hope, therefore, that a few observations upon the several heads will not be thought out of place here, and that I shall be excused for entering even at some length upon the important details which are thus laid before us.

The mansion or dwelling is of course no positive source of income, although it excludes the necessity of rent payment for a dwelling. In the return, therefore, no account is taken of this. But there is, nevertheless, always a small sum carried to the credit side, which must be considered as the profit derived from the garden attached. And, as this is included in the items of disposable income, it is equally clear that it is something over and above the usual consumption of the household. Probably the garden produce, when superabundant, was disposed of by sale at the market, or among the neighbours. It is obvious that such a petty source of income must be very variable, and that one year could be but little guide for the produce of another. Accordingly it appears to me that a sort of average value is assumed. We frequently find this item returned as worth six shillings and eight pence (or half a mark), or thirteen shillings and four pence (a mark), though sometimes it rises higher, where we may suppose better garden ground to have been in hand. But it is probable that each separate estate was rated at a fixed assessment, and that it accounted for that without respect to the more or less profit of the several years. The following entry from the bailey of Mayne in Dorsetshire, will, I think, shew that the mode of explanation given above, is the correct one (p. 10.)

Est ibidem una curia debiliter edificata, cujus domus ruinosæ, et quædam combustæ per infortunium, ita quod responsio bajuliæ unius anni non sufficeret ad illas domos reparandas; cujus gardinum cum herbagio valet . . . . . x sol.

Here we see the buildings were destroyed by fire, and in so ruinous a

state that it would have swallowed up the whole year's return to put them into habitable condition. Nevertheless the garden produce and herbage were worth the large sum of ten shillings. Other similar entries occur here and there, especially on the Scottish border, where the devastating warfare of the borderers laid the manorhouses only too often in ruins.

Attached to the manorhouse is the dovecote, which seems to have been a very steady source of profit. In some manors indeed the return is so high that we can hardly believe the entries accurate, unless we suppose pigeons to have been a very favourite food of our forefathers. In the bailey of Melcheburn, co. Bedford, we find the columbarium rated at x sol. (p. 70). At Chippenham, in Cambridgeshire, there were two, rated to produce xxx s. (p. 78). Their profit, however, is more generally found to range from about five shillings to half a mark,—a very considerable sum when compared with the price of corn, as I shall shortly show.

The return from arable land and meadow must, I imagine, be considered as rent or farm: inasmuch as in the disbursements the price of wheat, oats, and the like is always accounted for as positive outlay, and never balanced as *staurum*, or account of stock. Now if this be the case we have a singularly valuable entry under this head, and can see with a glance what the comparative rent of land per acre was in different counties and for various qualities, which I give under three distinct heads.

Thus the highest priced arable land (with the exception of Chiryton, in Wilts, which is probably an error) is twenty-four pence or two shillings an acre. This is found at Skirbeck, in Lincolnshire, and Bolyngton, in Kent. Even eighteen pence is rare, and the great majority of cases range under twelve pence. On the other hand the meadow land is seldom of less value than two shillings an acre, and sometimes rises to two shillings and six pence and even three shillings. And this prevails in all the different counties, while the value of the arable varies extremely in each—a sufficient proof that the higher processes of agriculture were but little understood. Indeed in some places the arable was of so little value—one penny per acre—that one finds a difficulty in understanding how it remained under the plough at all. If we exclude all the values above and below twelve pence, which is a reasonable mode of proceeding, we shall find the general average range between five pence three farthings and six pence per acre.

Where the value of the pasture has been computed at so much per acre, I have given it in a separate column. It is presumable that this was leased at the sums stated, which rarely exceed twelve pence the acre. There is a great distinction, however, between *pastura separalis*, or several pasture, and *pastura in communi*. While the first often reaches twelve pence per acre, and once or twice even double that value, the pasture in common rarely exceeds four pence per acre. But the more usual method is to

calculate the pasture of beasts at per head; and here, as might be supposed, the local custom introduced great variations in value. As a general rule sheep paid one penny per head, an ox rather more than a horse, the calf about half, the cow twice as much as the ox.

The following table of values per head, in different manors, will be read with interest:—

The high price fetched by pasture tends to explain the low value of arable land. In the fourteenth century grazing evidently held a disproportionate position. The value of wool we know was very high in Edward III.'s reign, and this readily accounts for the quantity of sheep kept. The real number fed by the Knights themselves on their several manors is not specified, because the profit appears only under the head of stock generally; but we may gain some idea from the number of sheep not belonging to themselves, and for which they received head-money. We may be pretty sure that in every case their own flock exceeded in numbers that of the strangers.

In Hampton, Middlesex, they had a flock of 2,000 sheep of their own, whose usual produce was six sacks of wool, each valued at six marks (four pounds), in all twenty-four pounds, and in Dalby they had been accustomed to keep 1,100.

The rents of messuages, mills, and fisheries are necessarily dependent upon so many local circumstances, that no very accurate general conclusion can be drawn from the values returned in these accounts. According to circumstances we find wind or water-power used, and for the service of the wool-comber we have abundance of fulling-mills. These mills appear to have been mostly let out to farm. The actual value of mills for grinding corn depends upon two circumstances: first, the amount of business required to be done; second, the capability of doing it—in other words, the nature of the power. Now well-arranged water-mills, where water can be got, are certainly preferable to imperfect wind-mills, and this will to a certain extent account for the higher relative value which they bear in the following table:—

The fisheries called *piscariæ* and *gurgites* are not very numerous, nor do they appear to have been very profitable. In every case the words imply a *weir*, with a *trap*, not the mere right of fishing in a stream. As the rents here are carried to the account of income, we must not suppose the demesne stews or fish-ponds to be intended, from which the preceptor might be supplied on fast-days. See pp. 34, 73, 78, 127. There are only one or two cases of markets and stallage, these rights being for the most part in the hands of the corporations of towns; nor are they at all profitable sources of income. Nor was much derived from the rent-charges, pensions, or fixed eleemosynary contributions of a few families, although here and there such an item appears in the account.

The next item to which I come, the *proficuum stauri*, is, however, of greater moment. I have rendered this *profits of stock*, because it appears to be the return from the cattle on the demesne-lands or home-farm. This

seems to follow from these passages: under the account of Grenham there is a memorandum—

These are necessarily very varying items in the account, and we consequently find more than one entry that, through the devastations of enemies, or inundations, or the like, the stock has returned no profit. In one case it is noted that the land would bear more than is put upon it; as at Anesty (p. 7) it is said that there is keep for 900 sheep, though only 400 are kept.

chapels.

A very considerable amount of income is accounted for as arising from the appropriated churches and chapels, whose funds the Order took to itself, paying vicars or chaplains at the reduced rate usual in such cases.

There is nothing particular to call for remark with regard to this proceeding. The balance-sheet generally will shew what they got and what they disbursed in respect of these churches, manor for manor; at the same time, the profits upon these transactions were certainly very considerable, as a few instances will shew:—

It is unnecessary here to shew that during the middle ages in England, France, Germany, and, indeed, almost all over Europe, the villani, or un-free tenants, were liable to very heavy labour-rents or services, such as mowing, sowing, reaping, carrying out dung, ploughing, and the like. It was the rent or part of the rent which they paid for their holdings, and it was no doubt then very nearly what the *Robot* now is in all Slavonic countries. Its distinctive character and its oppressiveness lay in its indefinite nature and amount, and, as this subjection to the *caprice* of another is the essence of servitude, this very indefiniteness was the badge of villain tenure. Nevertheless it is not to be imagined that certain reasonable compositions had not been agreed upon, by which the relations of lord and tenant were regulated; and the copy of court-roll became by degrees for the un-free tenant quite as good a guarantee as the certain, fixed assessment which we call free and common socage. Uncertainty is, in point of

fact, just as bad for him who claims as for him who renders services,\* and we consequently find everywhere an attempt to regulate and fix what in its nature was variable. We have seen in our own days the Hungarian and Gallician lords taking the initiative in this course, and proposing compositions which their peasants have not always been willing to accept. And from various entries in these accounts I should think that the Hospitallers had adopted some such humane and profitable principle. The services in question are generally *reditus* or *operatio*, *i. e.* payments in kind, as of wax, hens, capons, eggs, or the giving a certain amount of labour, with or without horses, at certain seasons. The payments in kind had of course a positive value, and so they are entered in the account. But I do not see how the labour-rents could have been carried to available income unless they had been commuted into money-payments. But we do find several such entries as these:—

In Grenham (p. 3).—Item. Ibidem diversa opera que tenentes facere tenentur, ut in messione bladorum, falcatione pratorum: solebant valere per annum xxij s.; que nunc valent nisi xvj s. viij d.

Unless these were money-payments, how could they possibly have fallen off in this manner? But in Shaldeforde, a member of the same bailiwick, for which a separate account is rendered, there occurs a notice which is invaluable as evidence for what I have asserted. We have there the exact terms of the composition for the autumnal services:

Item xlvij. opera autumpnalia, pretium operis ij d., et valent viij s. (p. 4).

I believe I shall not be wrong in assuming this two pence to be the day wages, or nearly so, of the single labourer. Generally, if he used his horse, the day was counted for *two*.

In Anesty (p. 7).—“De operibus tenentium 1 s.”

\* It is the interest of the lord that his tenant should be well to do in the world, at least as long as the impassable gulf between class and class continues to yawn. When the lower begins to tread upon the heel of the upper, this may be weak and vicious enough to use its privilege and right as a means of oppression. But, if it does, it brings the guillotine and the Jacquerie. In some places the lord, or the parson, might and may, *and do*, call upon the peasant to save their hay, or cut and carry their corn, when he ought to be employed on the same work for himself; will he be the better neighbour or dependent? This is a point which I recommend some of the *Junker* and *Pastors* of North Germany to take into their serious consideration.



In Mayne (p. 10), the “Opera et consuetudines *nativorum*,” that is, of the *neifs* or *villani*, amounted to one hundred and nine shillings and eight pence.

In Waye, the “opera et consuetudines *nativorum*” were worth eleven shillings and four pence per year.

As this is an important item in the account of income, I have taken the pains to sum up its whole amount in all the bailiwicks, and I find that it brings in the gross sum of one hundred and eighty-four pounds sixteen shillings and eight pence farthing.

There is, perhaps, a very slight deduction to be made here, because in four or five cases the hens, and other rents, are reckoned with the *opera et consuetudines*, but I still presume that the *redditus* in question are always those of the unfree. It deserves also to be noticed that in a very great number of bailiwicks there is no return under this head. This can only be explained in one of two ways: either there were no *neifs* upon the estate, or their personal labour had not been commuted into a money-rent.

From the payments of the un-free tenants, I pass over to those of the socagers, or freeholders by fixed or *assessed rent*, for this is the meaning of the *redditus assisus* of this document; (*assisus*, *Gall.* *assis*, *set* or *settled*.) It is the income derived from those certain rents which the free tenant paid his landlord;\* and it will be seen that it makes up a very large part of the annual income. There is only one entry, I believe, which throws any special light upon its nature, though this is unmistakeable; I refer to the case of rent for houses in two towns, Portsmouth and Southampton (p. 21).

Among the assets returned from nearly every manor are the profits of the manor courts and leet, commonly called *placita et perquisita curiarum*. These amount occasionally to a good sum, as for instance in Grafton to sixty shillings, in Chippenham to six pounds thirteen shillings and four pence, in Kerbrook to four pounds. It will be seen, hereafter, that to collect these there was a regular officer, the seneschal or steward of the manor, whose expenses are borne upon nearly every roll.

Confraria, or  
fraria, or  
collecta.

The sources of income which we have now gone through may be considered tolerably certain and invariable, necessary and permanent. But one still remains to be mentioned which in its very nature is fluctuating and precarious, although it forms a large part of the annual gross sum carried to credit. It is a *collecta* or voluntary contribution from the neighbourhood, and is usually entered under the name of *confraria* or *fraria*, Gallic. *confrèrie*. I presume that this was originally levied by virtue of some papal bull for a particular purpose, but that it afterwards became a regular and settled thing to send round the begging-box by means of clerks kept for that special purpose. I have taken the trouble to sum up the amount thus collected in 1338, and find it to make more or less the sum of eight hundred and eighty-eight pounds four shillings and three pence.

The nature of this imposition is well explained in the following entry under the head of Grenham (p. 4).

Item ibidem collecta, que semel fit per annum, in diversis ecclesiis, que vocatur Confraria, et ad voluntatem hominum si velint aliquid contribuere nec ne, quia non possunt compelli ad contribuendum, et solebat valere per annum xxvij marcas, et aliquando plus et aliquando minus, et nunc in presenti, propter paupertatem communitatis regni, et propter diversas oppressiones ut in tallas, contributionibus domino Regi pro defensione maris, et lanis quas dominus Rex capit per totam terram, non possunt levari nunc nisi  
vix . . . . . x.li.

Let us now cast our eyes upon the expenses which were generally and regularly to be charged against these receipts, and see if we cannot here also find some valuable information as to the social condition of England in the early half of the fourteenth century.

Maintenance.

The first and principal charge upon the income is, that of main-

tenance and hospitality. It appears that in every bailiwick or manor there was one preceptor or *receiver*,—a knight, or esquire, or chaplain of the order, with one or more brethren, who are called *confratres*. To them were committed the management of the estates, the services of the chapels and chantries, and the administration of justice, especially the dispensation of that hospitality which was one of the duties of the order. Subordinated to the brothers were the various persons requisite to maintain the establishment, as chaplains, chamberlains, squires, foresters, and servants in the house or stable. The number of these depended upon the amount of work to be done: but from the various accounts we can form a general notion of what persons a complete establishment comprised. We may suppose it to be of the following pattern:

A preceptor, miles, *serviens armorum*, or *capellanus*.

A confrater, miles, *serviens armorum*, or *capellanus*.

One or more salaried chaplains.

A *camerarius*.

A *claviger* or steward.

A janitor.

A cook.

A baker.

A woodreeve.

Squires, valets, and horseboys; sometimes

A head stableman.

A brewer.

A cellarer.

A washerwoman, *lotrix*.

A swineherd, oxherd, shepherd, and carter.

Pages, and boys in attendance.

The keep of all these persons was provided for out of the stock, and certain sums appropriated to the table or *mensa fratrum*, commonly entered under the head of *coquina*, or kitchen. In large establishments this item, which comprises flesh and fish over and above the *staurum*, amounts to a considerable weekly sum. Many of them had their commons at the several tables, of which there appear to have been three: the first, for the preceptor and confrater, some of the chaplains, the distinguished

guests, and the corrodaries, of whom anon: the second table for the camerarius and free servants, *liberi servientes*: the third for the *garciones* or servants. Besides these commons, each man received yearly wages in money, and some of them had regular allowances for the habit of the order suitable to their condition. From various entries respecting the chaplains we may infer that the *mensa fratrum* was considered equivalent to forty shillings by the year: that being the sum allowed when the chaplain does not take his commons with the brethren. But we shall be able by and by to examine into the amount and nature of these allowances in greater detail.

Corn and malt.

The largest item of expense is the price of cereals, of which great amounts had to be provided for the use of the baker and brewer, and for consumption in the stables. Three kinds of bread were supplied, the *panis albus*, *panis carpentariorum* (*Gall.* pain de munition; *Teut.* commisbrot,) and *panis niger*. And there were two classes of beer, the *cerevisia melior* and *secunda*. I will adduce two entries as an example from preceptories of the larger class. The first is the manor of Maltby, in Lincolnshire (p. 57.)

In expensis domus, pro preceptore, ij. fratribus suis, iij. corrodariis, et aliis de familia domus et preceptoris, et aliis supervenientibus, causa hospitalitatis,—

In pane furnito per annum lxx. quarteria frumenti, pretium quarterii ij s. viij d. Summa ix li. vj s. viij d.

Et in cerevisia bracianda iiiij<sup>xx</sup>. quarteria brasei ordeï, pretium quarterii ij s. Summa viij li.

Et in carne, pisce, et aliis necessariis pro coquina per annum, preter staurum . . . . . viij li.

Item in prebenda equorum preceptoris, et aliorum supervenientium xl. quarteria avenarum, et valent . . . . . liij s. iiiij d.

The second is the manor of Dalby, in Leicestershire (p. 64.)

In expensis domus; videlicet, pro preceptore, fratre suo, capellano, aliis de familia domus, et aliorum supervenientium, ratione hospitalitatis,—

Item in cerevisia bracianda per annum ciiij. quarteria brasei, pretium quarterii ij s. Summa x li. viij s.

Item pro coquina, ut in pisce, carne, et aliis, per septimanam v s.

Summa xiiij li.

Et in avenis pro equis preceptoris et supervenientium per annum clx. quarteria avenarum, pretium quarterii xij d. ut nunc Summa viij li.

In ferris et ferramentis equorum, carectarum, et molendinorum xl s.

To these entries I shall return, when I deduce from them some of the values of produce in the fourteenth century. For the present it may be sufficient to note that the varying price assigned to the quarter of flour in various entries probably arises from the different qualities purchased, and the preponderance of one sort over the other in quantity. In some of the entries the distinction is very clearly marked, and is, I imagine, dependent upon the proportions between the three sorts of bread and the two of beer to which I have alluded.

In the manor of Dynemore (p. 32) for instance:—

In pane furnito per annum iiij<sup>xx</sup>. quarteria frumenti, pretium quarterii iij s., et x. quarteria siliginis, pretium quarterii ij s. et valent . . . . . xiiij li.

Et in cerevisia bracianda per annum xx. quarteria brasei frumenti, pretium quarterii iij s., et de avenis cxx. quarteria, pretium quarterii xx d., et valent . . . . . xij li. iij s. iiij d.

The preceptor and the brethren had also a yearly allowance for their dress, and this appears invariable throughout the preceptories. It consisted of—

In the *cameræ*, however, which I will explain hereafter, the allowance is a few pence less. The other officers had similar allowances according to their grades, which are so often quoted together with their wages that it is not always easy to see how much belongs to one head and how much to the other. Nor are the stipends and allowances alike in the several manors, as will be seen by the following table:—

It seems to me that this tabular form enables us to see with great clearness the general arrangement of one of these preceptories. The stipends of the various officers vary probably with the value of the estate, as the number and character of the officers themselves vary with its nature; but still some of the difference here arises from only the stipendia being entered in some lists, while others contain the allowance for robes as well.

Corrody.

In some manors there is a heavy charge in the nature of a corrody or 'commons' to one or more persons. These are no doubt frequently repayments for money lent, or reservations upon estates granted, or even stipulated returns for favours conferred. The corrodary, if gentle, is accommodated at the preceptor's table, and has the same allowances as a *confrater*, except, I think, in the robe, mantle, and necessaria. Other corrodaries have their commons, according to their rank, with the *liberi servientes* or the *garciones*. And in Clerkenwell there were corrodaries who were more amply and liberally treated than the brethren themselves. Some of these corrodies are indeed so instructive that it is worth while to call particular attention to them. In Clerkenwell it is stipulated that William de Langeford is to have his commons with the convent or brotherhood whenever it is his pleasure to dine in hall, and commons for one chamberlain at the table of the free servants, and for two *garciones* (lads) and one *pajettus* at the table of the *garciones*. And if the said William shall please to dine out of hall, he shall receive a fixed allowance of four white loaves, two loaves of ration bread (*panis carpentariorum*), two loaves of black bread, three flagons of the better sort of beer, two flagons of the second sort, and from each service of the kitchen one whole dish, on the same footing as a brother; and for his chamberlain, one whole dish of the sort supplied to the free servants; and for his aforesaid *garciones*, one whole dish of the sort served to the *garciones*: and every night, for his chamber, one flagon of the best beer, and, at the season of the year, every night four candles and one faggot of small-wood; hay, litter, a shoe and nails, and half a bushel of oats for his two horses: and all these things he is to have, at his own will, from day to day for the term of his life, by virtue of the charter of the chapter granted him in the time of brother Thomas Larcher and brother Leonard de Tybertis. (p. 97.)

Item, brother William Brex takes daily two white loaves, one ration-



loaf, one black loaf, two flaggons of the best beer, and his kitchen,\* as two brothers. (p. 98.)

Item, Alan Gille takes daily three white loaves, three loaves of ration bread, two black loaves, two flaggons of the best beer, and one of the second quality, allowance from the kitchen as for two brothers, *or two pence a day for the kitchen*; † and if there should happen to be pittance, ‡ he is to be served at the rate of two brothers, or to have one penny in the name of pittance; and every year, four wain-loads of bush, and seven quarters of charcoal, one wain-load of litter, and four wain-loads of hay; and every night, half a bushel of oats, and candle as much as two brothers have; and when the convent happens to drink wine, he is to have the allowance of two brothers. (p. 99.)

And all this Alan Gille had by virtue of a charter of brother Thomas Larcher, who, I fear, was an extravagant manager, and had got into the hands of the usurers, Lombards and others, not to say Jews; for even this may be suspected, since I find one Thomas Isaac a corrodary at the brethren's table in Clerkenwell.

The repairs of buildings is the next point to which I shall advert, as falling under the head of maintenance; but I have only to observe in this respect that, with the exception of one or two manors which are stated to be waste by reason of war, or by accident of fire, the entries are usually very moderate; from this we have a right to infer that the dwelling-houses, barns, and other buildings were generally and systematically kept in good condition. This, however, does not apply to the lands which the Hospitallers acquired upon the downfall of the Templars, in all of which the *Domini feodorum* are represented as having committed entire and total waste. The money payments for repairs do not, however, represent the whole cost, any more than the *coquina* represents the whole charge of subsistence. As the *staurum* or stock supplied the most part of this, so, no doubt, the timber (*boscus maremium*) was used for the necessary purposes on the spot. In some manors it is reported that the *bosc* and

sub-bose produce no return in money, being only sufficient for the repairs and consumption of fuel.

Pensions and  
rent-charges.

Pensions and rent-charges, in as far as they are not corrodies, that is *commons*, are occasionally recorded as expenses to be borne by the manors. They may be looked upon as annuities, secured upon estates granted to the brotherhood, or interest for sums lent, or in a few cases as benefactions on the part of the order, or *gratifications* for services rendered or expected. They are, however, comparatively rare, inasmuch as their equivalent was mostly rendered in another form, viz. that of estates given for life, *nil inde reddendo*.

Visitation  
expenses.

The visitation expenses are extremely heavy, although they fall under few heads. The first is that of the archdeacon's visitation and *cænagium*, in respect of the impropriate churches. Of course this is an item which varies with the circumstances of each particular case: and in some parishes it is probable that, by virtue of papal bulls of privilege, the order claimed exemption from all episcopal interference whatever. Accordingly the archdeacon's visitation charges are rare, exceptional, and variable in amount. A heavier and certain charge, however, remains to be noticed: this is the visitation of the prior of England, who was supposed to go his rounds yearly and spend one, two, or three days, as the case might be, in the supervision of the several manors. So entirely is this a part of his duty, that a great diminution of his yearly allowances at Clerkenwell is made, on the ground that it is covered by his absence on visitation:

Item in expensis domus Prioris per totum annum, preter centum et viginti unum diem, in quibus habet visitationes, ut patet in reprints bajuliarum et camerarum predictarum, per diem xx sol. vid. j. marca dimidia . . . . . cclxx marce dimid.

In a few bailiwicks named below, I find no visitation charge at all: these are—

In revising this list, I observe, first; that in the great majority of the *cameræ* or smaller possessions, which were in the hands of the central authority, and administered by their bailiff or ballivus, and not by a preceptor and confrater, there is no visitation noted, at any rate no charge credited to account. In all the estates granted to farm there is also no such visitation; and in the majority of the manors formerly possessed by the Templars, and which had not yet entirely recovered from the usurpations and waste of the lords of the fiefs, there is also no visitation, the estates not being committed to the charge of preceptors, but merely of bailiffs or factors. The absence of visitation in the remaining manors whose names I have given may be accounted for in part by their remoteness, and their situation in territories exposed to sudden devastations by the hands of the Scotch and Welsh. As the prior and his suite would be duly entertained on all their road, either at their own manors or by friends, out of the *staurum*, the payment quoted in these accounts must I think be looked upon as a money payment; we see that it was taxed at a third of the prior's whole income, which amounted to the enormous sum of three hundred and sixty-four pounds per annum: and this was of course carried to account in the great ledger of the order, one only of whose pages was occupied with the affairs of the Prior of England. And I may mention here, *en passant*, that the only entry in these books relating to France must not be taken to imply that the English Priory had any extensive possessions or jurisdiction there; it probably refers to one sole estate which by some accident held of an English one; certainly it does not imply any general headship of an English brother over any extensive estates in the neighbour country. Both in the Order of the Temple, while it existed, and in the Hospital, a careful distinction was made by the Grand Masters—mostly Frenchmen—between the English and French tongues, as they were called.

The next item of expense which I have noted comprises the law-charges, which, taken simply, sounds innocent enough; but, I regret to say, is not so, when a little closer investigated. On the face of it, it means no more than the payment of a seneschal or steward of the manor, who held the manor court, and was also the natural attorney to make suit and service on behalf of the Order in such courts as they held land of. This officer has in general a fixed stipend, and an allowance for his robes, in

nearly every manor: but at the same time the commuted services or *secta* to manors of other lords, are entered at their money value (pp. 51, 88, 92). I need hardly add that the seneschal generally had the *mensa fratrum*, or, as we call it at Cambridge, was a fellow-commoner. A few entries from the accounts will explain the nature of his office better than any detail of my own:—

In roba senescalli pro placitis et querelis defendendis per annum, xx s. (p. 23.)

Item in feodo unius senescalli pro negotiis domus prosequendis, xl s. (p. 27.)

Et senescallo tenenti curias et prosequenti negotia domus, xl s. (p. 64.)

Item senescallo, pro roba et feodo suo, ad prosequenda negotia domus et pro curiis tenendis, xxxiij s. iiij d. (p. 71.)

A permanent officer, or general proctor, as well as an attorney, was maintained to watch the interests of the Order in the royal courts; this is noted under the expenses of Clerkenwell, in the following words (p. 100):

Preterea idem preceptor inveniet unum fratrem servientem, generalem procuratorem hospitalis, et unum clericum in curia scaccarii domini Regis nuncupata, existentem ibidem cotidie coram barones domini Regis in eadem curia, ad omnia placita et querelas in eadem contingentia, ac etiam ad omnes libertates et quietancias domui hospitalis per cartas progenitorum Regis Angliæ concessas, prosequenda, defendenda, calumpnianda, regenda et terminanda.

Et etiam unum attornatum cum eodem fratre procuratore in aliis curiis ipsius domini Regis, coram justiciariis suis de banco communi, ubi omnia placita terrarum et tenementorum totius regni Anglie placitantur et terminantur, continue existentem in eadem curia, pro placitis Prioratus Anglie motis, vel movendis, prosequendis et defendendis.

I do not find the proctor's fee noted, although that of the attorney in the King's Bench, Thomas de Thorp, is charged at forty shillings; and in the Common Pleas, the attorney, Hugo de Loughteburgh, received twenty shillings. But his allowances were considerable: he was to receive at the charge of the prior and the house, hay, half a bushel of oats every night, shoes for two horses, and commons for two servants in hall, at the servants' table; and for the service of his chamber, nightly, a *lagena* of the better

beer, and at the usual season a faggot of bush for his fire, and four candles. (p. 101.)

But these are reasonable and justifiable charges for agency with which it is impossible to find fault. Those which I have now to notice are of a different character, and one far less agreeable to have to record. It is very probable that the Hospitallers were quite as well able to take care of themselves as any class of men in England, and infinitely more so than most others. It is, therefore, not without a feeling of indignation that we find this powerful community compelled to bestow large sums, and even estates, upon the judicial authorities and administrative officers of the Crown, in the counties where their tenements lay. If their demands were just, and they were yet obliged to buy their right at such a price, what must have been the condition of poorer and weaker men! If their demands were *unjust*, what must the condition of the courts and the administration of the law have been! I beg particular attention to the following entries:

Et in donis datis ibidem diversis dominis, et eorum senescallis, et eorum secretariis, pro libertate hospitalis habenda et manutenenda, et eorum auxiliis, et favore, et amicitia habenda et expedienda, per annum, c s. (p. 39.)

Item in donis datis ministris domini Regis, et aliorum dominorum, pro favore et amicitia eorum habendis, in illis partibus, c s. (ibid.)

Et in expensis forincecis preceptoris pro negotiis domus defendendis, et in donis dandis vicecomiti, clericis, ballivis suis, et ministris domini Regis, et aliorum diversorum dominorum, xl sol. (Malteby, p. 58; Skirbeck, p. 62.)

Et in robis, mantellis, et aliis necessariis, preceptoris, et donis dandis ballivis et aliis ministris domini regis et aliorum dominorum, lx s. (Dyngelee, p. 67.)

Item in donis dandis vicecomiti, clericis suis, et aliis, xls. (Mapel-trestede, p. 88.)

But what is much worse is to find a regular payment allowed to the principal judges of the Royal Courts for general services, and, as we are

told (p. 203), particularly for the quiet possession of the lands which had been the Templars'. The persons who received these bribes are named to us: in the Exchequer, at xl sol. a-head per year, Chief Baron Sir Robert de Sadyngton, Baron William de Everden, and Robert de Scarborough, William de Stoneve the engrosser, Gervase de Willesford one of the remembrancers, William de Broklesby the other remembrancer; while Roger de Gildesburgh, the opponitor of the aforesaid Exchequer, received one hundred shillings.

In the "Common Bench" the fees or bribes were as follows: Sir William de Herle, chief justice, ten pounds yearly; William de Shareshull, justice, one hundred shillings; Richard de Aldeburgh and John de Shardelowe, justices, Thomas de Malghun and John de Assheley, clerks, each forty shillings; and to the clerks further a present of a robe furred with *boget*, &c.

In the King's Bench, Chief Justice Geoffrey de Scrope received forty shillings, and Richard de Willoughby, a justice, five marks, or three pounds six shillings and eight pence. But Scrope had also two estates, *nil inde reddendo*, at Huntingdon and Penhull.

In the Chancery, John de St. Paul, Henry de Ednestowe, Michael de Wath, and Thomas de Bamburgh, clerks, each forty shillings; and Ednestowe had also a pension of ten pounds a-year upon the lands of Oseyngton.

The expenses of their *narratores*, or counsel, that is, I presume, their retaining fees, are forty shillings a-year and robes.

The camera of Huntingdon, in the same county, was given to Geoffrey de Scrope, for the term of his life, *nihil inde reddendo*. Its value was ten marks, or six pounds thirteen shillings and four pence: the value of Penhull is not noted.

Besides these persons I find John de Stonor, a justiciary of the King, gratified with an estate worth eighteen pounds a-year. (p. 193.) Also Roger Hillary with a lease in lieu of a pension. (p. 194.) Besides this, robes were distributed to the officers of the Exchequer, one hundred and forty in number:

centum et quadraginta personarum, bis in anno, videlicet—tempore hiemali, pilliola furrata pellura minuti varii et bogeti, et quedam non furrata; et tempore estivali, totidem pilliola lineata de sindone, et quedam non lineata,—unicuique de curia scaccarii predicta, tam minoribus quam majoribus, secundum gradus, statum, et officium personarum predictarum;—que expense se extendunt annuatim ad x li.

The pensions paid for various appropriated churches need not be particularly specified, nor the cost of collecting the confraria or fraria: for this purpose one or two clerks were maintained in each manor, and they received fees apparently according to the amount of labour which they had to give, mostly however one pound each.

Of all the items entered under the head of expenses, those of maintenance are naturally the most interesting, inasmuch as they give us detailed information as to the prices of the first necessities of life, especially corn and malt. But there are other entries which are also of great value. Perhaps the most useful mode of proceeding will be to arrange these in a table.

The value of corn is generally given at per quarter of eight bushels, and various kinds are mentioned: as wheat, *frumentum*, secale or seigle, *siligo*, oats, peas, beans: malt of wheat, barley, oats, and draget. (*Vide note*, p. 230.)

and as at the usual price of malt the gallon cost three-eighths of a penny, and we know that according to the *Assisa Cerevisiæ* at least three gallons of beer could be sold for a penny, leaving a fair profit for the brewer, we may judge from these figures what an immense quantity of liquor the Hospitallers alone produced and consumed in a year. Supposing, which is perhaps overmuch, that each preceptory had six persons to provide for besides the preceptor and his confrater, we shall find that a total of five hundred and sixty-two persons is to be set against the above-named quantity of malt, which gives a quotient of nearly eight and a quarter quarters per head per year. I do not know exactly how much malt is reckoned now to each person, but it is something less than two bushels; and at that rate we see what enormous quantities must have been expended upon hospitality in this one article alone. It is very evident that the preceptories were looked upon much as houses of public entertainment. Hospitality was the general rule of the Order, and from the charters of the brotherhood it is evident that this virtue was continually impressed upon them by the donors of estates. In the table of expenses it is continually stated that they gave a reception to all “supervenientes,” both horse and man. Now when we consider the dispersion of the monasteries throughout the counties, and this extraordinary expenditure for the benefit of strangers, I think we have something of a key to the influence of the body, and a tolerably clear perception of the reasons why they never could be very popular with the sovereigns and the native nobility. It was an immense power, continually on the increase, and continually wielded by a foreign authority for its ends, not for national purposes.

Nevertheless, there are several considerations yet which do not allow us to dismiss this question of hospitality too cursorily. It will not add much

to our knowledge if we lose ourselves in vague generalities, and rest content with the two assertions, that the Hospitallers were bound by the rules of the Order, and the wills of the founders, to be hospitable, and that their hospitality was a heavy charge upon the revenue. I remember that when I had the honour to be one of the governing body of one of the largest metropolitan parishes, I was forcibly struck by the difficulty of defining what was really the right to hospitality enjoyed by the poor: we call it now-a-days *relief*, and have more or less successfully regulated it. But it existed in the fourteenth century, though under another form, and I suspect that occasionally my difficulty must have presented itself in great force to more than one preceptor. In both cases, we may be sure, there was an equal anxiety on one side not to burthen the funds, and an equal anxiety on the other to get as much as possible out of them. The fourteenth century had its compromise as well as the nineteenth, though, grounded as they were upon somewhat different views of society, they took different forms. It is clear enough that the Hospitallers and their guests must have acted reciprocally upon an understanding that there was a limit, somewhere or other, to what the house had to supply and the guest had a right to receive. There must have been a distinction between guest and guest; and, above all, there must have been a settled rule as to the time during which a stranger could claim a share in the abundance of the house. In this respect it is to be presumed that the rule of all monastic houses applied to the Hospitallers, who were in part at least a monastic order. Now I believe that, almost universally (except, indeed, where sickness gave a claim to tendance in the infirmary, where such existed for strangers, *supervenientes*), the limit of claim in monasteries was *three* days. This is strictly consonant to the ancient universal Teutonic law, which looks upon a man for three days as a *guest* in a house, but after that time as a member of the family, for whom the householder had to account. "Three days *gast*," says the Anglo-Saxon law; "after that, *agen hine*," your own domestic. And so the German proverb said, "A three nights' guest stinks," *i. e.* approaches the time when it is necessary to turn him out, unless you mean to assume all the responsibility of providing for and representing him. The three days seem also to have been the rule upon the continent, and it may be therefore presumed to have been universally adopted from the earliest periods in all Christian communities. Accord-

ingly it is to be imagined that a single person might in strict law claim food and lodging for three days in a preceptory, which would be supplied as befitted his condition; but that strict law was not likely to be very closely followed. It is more likely that the "family" would do pretty much as they liked about guests of a certain sort; not perhaps refusing relief, but taking care that it should not be so given as to render a second application very probable. They may possibly have had their equivalents for the crank and the stone heap. At the open table of the *liberi servientes* or *garciones* a good fellow might, and perhaps often did, make himself welcome, and no one would ask him how long he had stayed or meant to stay. On the other hand the knight or esquire, who had something to tell or something to give, might extend his visit to the great satisfaction of the preceptor and confrater. Who should count the hours of his sojourn? Is a guest not worth his salt? Or have not we seen, in the long vacation, how gladly a stray Captain R.N., or a regimental hero from the peaceful side of Niagara, or a yachter who had left Trondjém to comfort his brother, justly expecting to be plucked at his next coming examination, has been received as a godsend by the two or three resident Fellows of Trinity? I doubt whether, under daily circumstances, the preceptory was much more lively than my dear old college hall at that very unlively season, or whether it rejoiced less at its unexpected contact with the living and breathing world. After all, the extra charge was borne upon the debtor and creditor account as legal hospitality to a *superveniens*, and if it was too costly, why there was always some poor devil or other who might be kicked out without ceremony in order to redress the balance. But I doubt whether it ever came so far as that. And then let us remember what this hospitality *brought in*. How great a thing it was to gather round one man from all parts of the country, or from foreign countries; to collect information which in those days no daily newspaper detailed over the breakfast table; to hear news, learn prices, *compare* information, and instruct the heads of the order. Was not hospitality,—regulated if one found it troublesome, unlimited if one liked it—a noble, charitable, Christian, and—profitable virtue? How many valuable hints, may we imagine, were not sent up from Chippenham, or Dynmore, or Trebigh to Clerkenwell, there to be carefully compared with other information from Greenham, and Southampton, and Sutton at Hone? How many reports thereupon despatched

to Rhodes? How many instructions thence issued to the four quarters of the globe? The newspaper tells us what is doing, but it tells our neighbours as soon, and in as much detail. Here information was gathered which none else could gather, and a perfect network spread all over Europe, of which the main thread was in one hand. It was worth the expenditure in bread, and beeves, and beer, we may be sure.

No doubt, here and there, there were drawbacks to all this perfect arrangement. Although no brother of the order could have any private property of his own, and although up to a certain point the commons were regulated by general rules (totally inapplicable in practice to particular countries), still it was of course a main object with every preceptor to live well himself, and, at the same time, send in a handsome surplus to headquarters. Even useful reports might have been looked upon askance if coupled with a very small balance; and as we see in most times, the solid gold crowns were likely to be a better recommendation than the assurance that such and so many costly *spreads* had drawn forth information of a vague or indefinite character—perhaps only of secondary importance compared with what has been obtained through some luckier and less expensive channel—but even at the best hardly so attractive as the “bird in the hand.” But if the order and its preceptors were noble, rich and influential—moved in good society in short, and meant to be looked upon as belonging to the highest class of society—it was obliged to pay the price which that inexorable Tauric Diana of “fashion” exacts from all who land on her shores. If a great man visited some one of his many estates, or went over his hunting grounds in many counties, or left home in a hurry—or intentionally—without putting as much money in his pouch as he ought to have done, and now-a-days must do, what more natural than that he should visit his friend the preceptor, and quarter his stud, grooms and all, on the magnificent stable whose fame was in all the county? For the “bailiff of the English tongue,” or head of the Order of English Knights, was the Turkopolier, the general of cavalry of the whole brotherhood; and celebrated all over the East and the West had been the proud lances, whose steeds were stabled in our rich pastures. The near neighbourhood of a great lord, especially if of royal blood, might be found vexatious at times; a large expense at Hampton is explained, “quia dux Cornubie juxta moratur.” (p. 127.) And on the marches a constantly moving and restless popula-

tion were not less troublesome: great are the complaints of the Welsh *trampers* in the preceptories of Dynemore (Herefordshire) and Slebech (Pemb.); in this last case the preceptor is hardly civil; he says, "alii supervenientes de Wallia, qui multum confluunt de die in diem, et sunt magni devastatores, et sunt inponderosi." (p. 35.)

The proximity of Clerkenwell to London and Westminster particularly exposed it to this sort of inconvenience. As a matter of course every brother from the country who had business in London took up his quarters with the prior; but all the royal ministers, and the king himself—in the legal exercise of that right which is called *corrody*\*—either honoured the brethren in person, or sent the members of the royal courts and households to enjoy the hospitality of the house. I should think that Chief-Justice Scrope dined there very often, especially while the litigation about the Temple estates was going on. It must have been good and grave fun in its way when the King's Bench and Common Pleas, the Exchequer and Chancery, and Privy Council met together over the hospitable board of Clerkenwell, and speculated whether the noble keep of Temple Bruere, or the rich manor of Temple Cowley, would help to mend the next feast-day; or whether it was very likely that Ralph Nevill would be squeezed into giving up Faxfleet; or Stroud would get out of the hands of the Countess of Pembroke; or Earl Warenne would be content to relinquish Saddlecomb, with its comfortable little revenue of sixty-six pounds eight shillings per annum. But it was all mighty good company; and the Prior of Clerkenwell sighs out his complaint in a gentle tone (p. 99):—

Et omnia ista onera predicta, et multa alia de quibus certa mentio fieri non potest, in supervenientibus causa hospitalitatis, et aliis de familia domini Regis, et aliorum magnatum regni Anglie, ac etiam preceptorum, fratrum, et eorum familie illuc venientibus pro negotiis in curia domini Regis, ibidem continue existentibus, et aliis rationibus in civitate London faciendis, moraturis apud Clerkene-

well, ad custagium preceptoris et domus, quousque de negotiis suis fuerint expediti.

For which burthens four hundred and thirty quarters of corn, &c. were needed. Poor Hospitallers of Clerkenwell, and poor Grand Master in Rhodes! It was truly hard that that milch-cow of the continent, England, should not give every drop that could be got by squeezing, even though her own calves might die in the midst of plenty.

Having noticed the prices of the most important articles of consumption, we may proceed to a few other details which are incidentally mentioned. Here and there the services in kind are stated at their money value, and from them and other entries we may deduce the following prices:—

We possess one or two documents of about this period, or a few years earlier, in which the prices settled by the King in Council for various articles of food are recorded. It may be interesting to the reader to have these placed before him as a means of comparison. I believe the two first lists which I shall quote to be of the 8th Ed. II. They both refer to the city of London, in which the prices may be taken to be somewhat higher than without the walls, and are especially directed against the forestallers who bought cheap without, and sold dear within, the market.

But this assessment was formed under circumstances of so exceptional a character that it cannot be taken as a rule. The truth is, that in consequence of the Scotch and French wars money had become so scarce, or in other words so dear, that the comparative value of all other exchangeable produce had sunk far below its normal standard. The assize of poultry in 1302 is, I suspect, somewhat nearer the natural condition of the markets. At that time the following tariff was settled for the best articles of every kind:

We smile now at these silly attempts to settle prices by any artificial means, but we must not forget that in the days of which I write society was in a far more artificial state than in our own—that privileges and protections were the rule—that industry of every kind was shackled at

every step—that any progress made is a marvel and a matter of astonishment. We were then what many continental nations—more especially Germany and France—yet are. I wish them a steady, progressive, and therefore hopeful riddance of the trammels we ourselves have forgotten—they are *so* obsolete! I may perhaps find occasion one day to describe what I have seen and studied of the country and town-life of North Germany as it now is. I believe I possess a rare advantage in so doing, for I am tolerably familiar with the agriculture and the economic development of England in the *tenth* century, and the one condition is in all scientific respects very nearly the measure of the other. But we must now return to the peculiar and exceptional relations of our Hospitallers.

It is not necessary to enter into the question of what pensions the Priory of England paid beyond what has been noticed of their bribes and gratifications. Many yearly sums, no doubt, were annuities implying a foregone consideration. It is not at all unusual to find charges upon estates in the form of yearly pensions accounted for in this way, *pro denario præ manibus soluto*; and similarly the corrodies, which differ from pensions in being a right to eat and drink at the table of the house, were often only a return for money advanced. Thomas Isaac, who had a handsome corrody at Clerkenwell, and was in short a fellow-commoner of the prior, has a name which sounds oddly enough in the roll of a knightly and Christian sodality. It will be seen, however, that the order got itself into sad scrapes with usurers of all denominations.

Occasionally we meet with entries which serve to shew that the King *recommended* persons to pensions and corrodies which the order could hardly well refuse to grant. This was probably in the exercise of a right which the Crown possessed over all religious houses. Instances occur at Sutton-at-Hone in Kent (p. 93), and Hampton in Middlesex (p. 127).

We have noticed already the allowance made for vestments to every preceptor and confrater throughout the land. It was the same everywhere, because the dress of the Order was a fixed and settled thing. The prior of Clerkenwell may possibly have worn in public some special badge of his dignity, but his robes in strictness were to be no other, and cost no more, than those of his poorest knightly brothers. We can deduce from the corrodies some notion of what the actual allowance of a knight was, apart from those regulations in respect to fasts and feasts, and the exceptions,

which were settled, as far as general rules can go, by various solemn chapters of the Order, holden mostly abroad. All these arrangements are necessarily variable; and in the economy of an Order, existing in many lands, each of which has its own peculiar habits, but still able to support itself only by keeping on good terms with public opinion in each land, there could be no rule which had not an infinity of exceptions. The regulations which in the twelfth century might have suited Briset, were certainly not such as Leonard de Tybertis cared for, however well backed they may have been by papal rescripts. Whatever special details may have been adopted by the first Hospitallers in Jerusalem, the Knights of St. John in the fourteenth century in England had learned to construe them by the light of general principles. The process is not an unusual one. I should imagine that while the Order was very young and poor, humility of spirit and oatmeal porridge were considered to have a sort of necessary connection; but that as it grew old and rich, venison and claret were not found incompatible with the fundamental virtue. At all events, it seems to me that the *pensum* of the knights was not altogether a shabby one in practice; nor ought it to have been so, due regard being had to the principles of true hospitality. If the preceptor, bound as he was to keep open house and a good table, received guests of his own rank *ad mensam fratrum*—for those of another rank he relegated to the *mensa servientum* or *garcionum*, and may possibly have fed the majority of the “*canaille chrétienne*” in his kennel,—was he not bound also to perform the most charming function of hospitality,—the thorough participation in the bond of good fellowship? Could Geoffry de Scrope have enjoyed his venison, if his entertainer, the prior, had been confined to the mastication of parched peas?

Besides the dinners served in hall, which varied according to the general rules of the Order, the rank of the diners, and the state of the stock, there were issued to the brethren, according to their grades, what are called allowances *ad cameram*: they are evidently provision for the evening meal, and at the winter season comprise firing and candle, hay, oats, and litter for the horses, and an allowance for horse-shoes and nails. They consist of a certain number of loaves, of three qualities, *panis albus*, *panis carpentariorum*, and *panis niger*, and one or more *lagenæ* (gallons) of the first and second beer. It is probable that the inferior sorts were for the use of

the pagettus, or garcio, if the brothers had one. From several scattered entries I am disposed to think that the mensa fratrum, or regular commons, were computed at forty shillings a-year, this being the difference between the sum paid to a chaplain who had and one who had not his commons in hall. It is hardly probable that the chaplain should not have had his seat at the board of the preceptor and confrater, and it therefore seems that this sum is the measure of their supposed annual cost in food from the kitchen. The *unum ferculum integrum* de quolibet servicio coquinae, sicut unus frater, seems to show what the mode of apportioning the messes was; and we know from other sources how very strictly the portions were weighed and measured in the housekeeping of monastic confraternities.

The very important document printed in the Appendix to this volume gives a clear insight into the state of confusion which pervaded the affairs of the Order during the priorate of Thomas L'Archer in England. This country, however, formed no exception to the general rule. Everywhere the hospital was going to ruin, and in the distracted condition of its brotherhood, first during their settlement in Rhodes, next during the schism and disputed election of a grand master under Fulk de Villaret, all regularity and strict supervision seem to have been lost sight of. The election of Elyan de Villeneuve put an end to this condition of disorder; a nearly contemporary record thus describes his mastership:—*Postea fuit Magister Elionus de Villanova. Hic fuit per Papam creatus, cum consilio procerum domus. Fuit etiam multa probitate et multa virtute dotatus, et plurima bona in religione sua tempore suo fecit. Exoneravit enim illam sua discretionis industria multis sarcinis debitorum: prosperavit enim nimium statum suum amplius quam fuerat unquam visum. Non recolit memoria hominum, nec reperitur in scriptis, quod tam quietam tamque omnibus bonis plena esset religio, prout ipse illam reliquit tempore mortis suae.\** His death took place in 1346: now the letter of the English preceptors, written in 1328, one year before the death of Thomas L'Archer, (deceased Aug. 28, 1329,) appears to have reference to this state of the Order in England. And as in it L'Archer is spoken of as *nuper* prior, it should seem that he had been deposed, or had resigned a station to which he felt himself unequal. The transfer of the lands of the Templars only took place about 1333, in the priorate of Leonard de Tybertis, so that

this could not have been the cause of the somewhat better order in the affairs of the Temple which we witness in 1338; inasmuch as the *waste* committed by the Lords of the Fee could not possibly have been recovered in the space of five years; and it is moreover evident that very few of the recovered preceptories of the Temple were in a condition to receive preceptors of the Hospital: the most of them were administered by bailiffs, who received a stipend for their services, and by chaplains put in to keep up the decent services of the chapels and chantries. The upshot of the matter seems to me to be this: Elyan de Villeneuve having made up his mind to put the affairs of the whole Order upon a proper footing, despatched the Prior of Venice, Leonard de Tybertis, to England as his lieutenant or vicar. On his arrival he found the ruin of the brotherhood nearly complete; the creditors who had lent money on usurious interest had set the law in motion against their debtors, whose affairs all over the world seemed in a very unsatisfactory condition; who had been driven out of Palestine altogether, who had been compelled to leave Cyprus for Rhodes, where they were hard pressed by the Turks, and who ran a great risk of suffering the same fate as the Templars had just suffered. Writs of "fieri facias" had been issued, and under the legal distrains all the moveables of the preceptories had been taken possession of. The Lombards and Perugians had been worse than the Turks themselves. The first thing Leonard de Tybertis did was to meet the most urgent and pressing demands of the creditors by part payments, and by undertakings, on the faith of which the writs were withdrawn for the present. Thomas L'Archer was suspended or deposed, and Leonard de Tybertis elected *ad interim*. By his influence and judicious outlay, partly also it should seem by the mortgage of his costly jewels, he succeeded in raising no less a sum than two thousand three hundred and thirty-seven pounds eleven shillings and four pence on loan, which, with the regular income of the priory, sufficed to pay off the most pressing burthens, and to give the Order some breathing time; and the English brethren, grateful for his aid, and perhaps desirous of the continuance of his beneficial intervention, solicited from the Grand Master his confirmation as Prior of England. It is said in general that the estates of the Templars only came into the hands of the Priory during the priorate of Leonard; but even from this letter, in which the confirmation of his

election is desired, it is clear that the brotherhood already held Temple lands, which produced in the year 1328 four hundred and fifty-eight pounds one shilling and ten pence. Still we may infer from the universal tradition that he was very active in the affair of the transfer; and in all probability it was not more his skill in reducing the debts than his success in obtaining seisin of the Temple estates which were yet withheld, that induced the English preceptors to make him their prior. But it is certain that even ten years later some of the most valuable of the Temple manors had not been surrendered to the Hospital; and it is well known that some never were. The litigation consequent upon these various complications explains, though it does not excuse, the sums paid to the judges and other influential members of the King's Council of State.

It is very significant that, among the sums raised to meet the immediate difficulty, we find as much as two hundred and two pounds ten shillings reckoned as well or profitably gained by *Corrodies*.

In looking over the list of pensions granted previously to and accounted for in 1338, we find sums cited to the following amounts under various priors:—

This list, with every possible deduction for the falling in of pensions by deaths, seems to show that brother Thomas L'Archer burthened the Order to a very remarkable degree; at the same time we must acquit him of what, at first sight, appears to be a reckless extravagance. Most of his pensions are annuities granted for sums received in full, at a moment when ready money might have been a vital necessity. Both *corrodies* and estates are given, in the terms of the account, *pro denario præ manibus soluto*, for money advanced,—no doubt, under pressure. The real value of the consideration was not obtained, and it is very possible that Thomas L'Archer was rather an unfortunate than an incapable administrator. It

is certain that Leonard de Tybertis raised money in the same way; receiving capital in hand, and giving estates at low rents, or settling, as above said, corrodies and rent-charges upon particular manors. Leases for life,\* or terms of years,† were granted in this manner; and, although the interest was usurious, and, according to the doctrine then prevalent, utterly illegal, it was impossible for the English priory to save itself on any other terms. The skill with which a prior could raise money under such circumstances—in other words, the cheaper he could get it in the long run—was the real measure of his capacity, and I think it likely that if Thomas L'Archer were deposed it was quite right that he should be so. He was an unlucky Chancellor of the Exchequer, for whom there is no mercy. Leonard de Tybertis acted upon the same principle, but applied it with more discretion; and he lived a respected man and died Prior of England. *Fiat jus, ruat cælum!*

One particular class of estates has been alluded to under the name of cameræ or chambers. From the accounts it may be inferred that these were usually of smaller amount than the manors under the charge of preceptors, and that they were under a different system of management altogether. I presume they were something of the same kind as what in Germany are called kammer-güter, and what used in England to be called the king's woods and forests; in short, they were considered in some respects as demesne lands. They were mostly administered by bailiffs for the advantage of the general account, and had not to keep a preceptor and confrater, or to supply hospitality. They are often set out to farm, and in some cases, if not in all, seem to be appropriated to the general purposes of the central authority. By what means they were thus appropriated we cannot tell; perhaps a careful investigation of all the separate charters of donation might serve to explain some of the peculiarity; some may have been granted with the express proviso that they should be employed in this way, others may have been obtained by purchase, and settled to particular purposes by arrangement of the Chapter. But taking them altogether, it seems to me that their characteristic features are those above mentioned, and that they were in fact intended to support the expenses of

the chief seat of the Order in England; they were the demesne estates of Clerkenwell. It is possible that their name may have been derived from the chambers in which their accounts were recorded, these being rendered direct to London, and dispatched by the ballivus, or the custos where there was one, the latter being an officer of higher station and mostly a brother of the Order; but I do not think that a preceptor or confrater is ever found in a camera.

There remain a few words to say respecting the brothers of the Order whose names are recorded in these pages. Of these, according to the account itself (p. 214), there were one hundred and nineteen, besides three *donati* and fourscore *corrodaries*. What the latter were I have explained, and I will hereafter shew what was meant by the *donati* also. Of these one hundred and nineteen brethren the names of one hundred and sixteen can be given, and a list of them will be of some service to the reader. He will be pleased to observe that I have prefixed an asterisk to the names of those who at this time filled the office of preceptors in the preceptories or commanderies of the Order. Of thirty-four milites, fourteen were preceptors; of forty-eight esquires or serjeants-at-arms, sixteen were preceptors; and of thirty-four capellani, seven held the same rank: but in general the custody of lands in which there was no preceptor was entrusted to a capellanus, with the title of *custos*.

Some of the noblest names of England, it will be seen, are found in the two military classes:

And here let me take occasion to say a few words respecting the extension of the signature *s*, already alluded to by Mr. Larking. A certain difference of opinion arose respecting it. It has been suggested that it denotes *signavit* or *sigillum*; and, as this explanation is favoured by the adoption of one or two estimable and kind friends, it is right that we should give it a respectful consideration. Both these extensions are in my opinion entirely out of the question. For, in the first place, throughout this document, no brother qualified to sign as Miles or Capellanus ever has an *s* affixed to his name: but there could be no reason why a knight or chaplain should not have signed the record, or appended his seal to it, if indeed any knight having become a brother of the Order retained a private seal at all. Moreover both *signavit* and *sigillum* are incompatible with the construction of the Latin in the following sentence (p. 19):

Frater Henricus de Whaddon *s.* (*signavit* or *sigillum*) *et* senescallus sororum (de Bokelonde).

This, and the obvious distinction of the brethren into milites, capellani, and *s*, evidently shew that this letter is the sign of an addition or title, designating the rank of the brother. Moreover, a closer examination of the MS. proves that it is not *s*, but a very common contraction for *ser*: and thus my valued friend, to whom we owe this book, has suggested that we

must read *serviens*, upon the ground that the Order comprehended three grades of brothers, of which the *serviens* was one.

Reasoning upon the manner in which the *liberi servientes* are always mentioned in this record, I was at first disposed to question the correctness of this rendering, and had proposed *scutifer*, or *esquire*, as the required extension. In the historical relation of this class I was right, and my conclusion is not shaken by what I am about to say. But, since *s* is really *ser*, it is very clear that my suggestion as to the form and word was an idle one. There cannot be a shadow of a doubt that we must read *serviens*. The truth of the matter is this:—

Apparently from its very first foundation, and at all events from the date of its earliest records, the Order consisted of three classes of professed brethren, having taken the oaths and assumed the habit of a Hospitaller. These were the *milites*, *capellani*, and *servientes armorum*, or *ad arma*, in strict parlance *serjeants-at-arms*. But the chaplains were of two classes: the conventual or professed chaplains, and those *ex obedientia*, who were not professed, but who performed ecclesiastical functions for the Order, and received stipends for their services. In like manner the *servientes* were two-fold: the noble class of professed, or *servientes armorum*, whom we may believe to have been called sometimes *generosi*;\* and the *servientes officii*, who are throughout this book recorded as *liberi servientes*, and of whom I have already given a sufficient description. A manuscript rule of the Order, written towards the middle of the sixteenth century,† presents the following account of the arrangement, which it calls *consuetudo*—the ancient custom:—

“Fratrum nostrorum triplex est differentia. Alii enim sunt milites, alii sacerdotes, alii servientes. Sacerdotum autem et servientium status rursus in duo dividitur: Sacerdotum, in sacerdotes conventuales, et sacerdotes obedientia. Servientium, in servientes armorum, videlicet in conventu receptos,—et servientes officii vel stagii. Qui vero sub gradu militiae ad hoc idoneus et aptus, pro forma statutorum et consuetudinum,

ad professionem nostri ordinis admitti postulabit, priusquam habitum suscipiat, et professionem faciat, cingulo militiæ decoretur necesse est. Si autem ab aliquo principe Catholico, aut altero, facultatem militiam præstandi habente, militiæ insignia non fuerit adeptus, a fratre milite ordinis nostri suam professionem recipiente, aut altero fratre milite militiæ hujusmodi insignia, secundum consuetudinem militiam præstandi, recipiat: et demum ordine præfato ineat professionem. Capellanos autem et servientes armorum, et officii, insignibus militiæ decorare non oportet, nec consuetum, nec ordinatum est; sed sub eorum gradu ad professionem admittantur.”

The knight therefore was a knight, not by reason of his entering the Order, but because he was a knight before he made his profession, and entered it as such. The squire who entered it remained a squire, or *serviens armorum*, till the knights or the Grand Master chose to take him up into their class by the regular mode, *i. e. præstandi militiam*, of creating a knight. There is here, therefore, the greatest and clearest distinction between the serjeants-at-arms, or squires, and the *servientes officii*, *liberi servientes*, or superior *servants* of the body.

Paoli, in his valuable History of the Hospitallers,\* has some just remarks upon this subject. He says,—

“Noi ben sappiamo che i Fra Serventi Ospitalari non furono di loro origine o impiegati in ministeri meccanici, o adetti a’ bassi servizi della comunità, quando per tali incumbenze troviamo che la religione manteneva altri, e dava loro il nome di *servitori*; ma erano boni persone di guerra, che servivano combattendo al principal fine dell’ istituto: e se il loro grado era inferiore e soggetto a’ militè, l’esercizio militare era lo stesso . . . . Avevano inoltre i Fra serventi di loro istituzione non solo comuni i voti col rimanente de’ fratelli Ospitalari, ma anche una qualche parte di dritto a partecipazione nel governo di tutto il corpo.”

Accordingly we find more particularly that they had a vote in the election of Grand Master. Paoli is inclined to believe, and I think with justice, that the *servientes armorum* arose as a class originally out of the

esquires who waited upon every knight in the field: and this is rendered the more probable, because they were all men of birth, and because in several documents we find them spoken of under the names of Scutiferi and Armigeri; it was, in fact, only *in the Order* that they went by their Order-name of servientes; for every one else they were esquires; as is evident enough when we read among them the names of Basset, and Neville, and Ewyas, and Macey, and Braybroc, and Caunvill, and Wauchope. That such a serviens could be a preceptor is therefore not at all surprising where a capellanus or another serviens was his confrater. But it certainly seems strange that this should have been allowed, as it often was, in England, where the confrater was a miles: for, as Paoli rightly observes, the class was inferior and subject to that of the knights, and we know that one punishment of the Order was degradation from the higher to the lower rank.\* There probably was some good reason in every case, which we cannot now detect. Perhaps the knight was in disgrace, or over-old to exercise the active superintendence of a preceptor. And in truth in some Orders the younger members are those to whom the laborious duties are regularly deputed: in the senate of the University of Cambridge it is the young Masters of Arts who are the regents. It may be as well here to notice that although the esquires were properly a military class, *serjeants-at-arms*, one entry in this book shews that the Order had at least one serviens ad legem, or *serjeant-at-law*. This was their proctor, whom I have mentioned at p. xl. of this Introduction, and who is distinctly called *Frater serviens*; and who, because he was frater serviens, received no fee. I should like to know where and when arose the time-honoured privilege of barristers of being esquires of the law. The title must lie deep enough in our history, and connect itself with very important questions as to the old historical place of the barrister, serjeant-at-law, and student in our social scheme; at all events I find it very strange that a frater serviens of the Hospital should have been a lawyer in 1338.

A word of explanation about the *donati* may be added here. In ecclesiastical language a *donatus* is one who, though not belonging to the Order, monastic or otherwise, is *aggregated* to it and its religious services.

I suppose that many a wicked man, believing in the efficacy of prayer, though he himself would not or dared not pray, *gave* himself to an Order, in the hope of getting some profit in the next world from their merits. And here I ought to apologise for not having laid more stress upon the fact that the real foundation of the Order was a religious one; that they were bound by their vow to keep up a religious service, and bound by their vow to be present at it. In the advantages of this service the *donatus* shared.

It may not be without interest, before I close these observations, to give a list, such as it is, of the great officers to whom the management of the *Lingua Angliæ* was committed in this country. Like the Templars, the Hospitallers were not an English Order; they were founded, and for the most part subsequently recruited, by and from foreigners. But England was always one of their most important *bailies*; in spite of the national character of the English knights, their contributions to the finances were of high value, and the courage and conduct of the English contingent stood second to those of none in the world. Our list commences, as the Order itself ended, with an Italian; but by degrees names honoured in the annals of the English nobility appear, and show that, if there was anything great and good in the institution, England had sons capable of placing themselves at the head of it, and carrying its principles into action.

I do not know that there is anything further in this account which calls for particular notice. Any one who will carefully read it, bearing in mind the principal points to which I have tried to call attention, will perceive what a mass of valuable information it contains. We are greatly indebted to Mr. Larking for the pains which he has taken to disinter it from its *oubliette* at Malta. May we not hope that it was not a solitary document, and that more active search will reveal the existence of similar balance-sheets for other years? From the foregoing pages it is evident how useful such a discovery would be, and how desirable that those who have access to the papers of the Order should make diligent inquiry into their nature. There is one point of the highest importance which must be noticed. On the ruin of the Templars it is scarcely possible that a great quantity of their documents should not have come into the hands of the Hospitallers. Some, it is said, were destroyed in Wat Tyler's riots; but there must surely have been a vast number in other parts of the world which found their way to Cyprus, Rhodes, and Malta, and were preserved among the title-deeds of the Hospital. It is needless to say how important any single roll giving an account of their internal and domestic management would be. It is not even necessary that it should be the roll of their Manors in England, much as we should of course prefer this. All these associations—and especially those of the stricter Order, as the Temple was—had a detailed and imperative rule, by which the lives of the brethren were to be guided in every land, and to this they did in the main conform; so that one land is to a great extent evidence of what was the custom in all.

The world has outgrown the necessity of having such institutions as the Temple and the Hospital; but there was a time when it could not have done very well without them, and it therefore had them till the work they had to do was done. It is because this work was an important one, and



that the influence of these great bodies was felt for centuries in every part of the world, that it behoves the student of history to keep his eye steadily fixed upon their fortunes. The book now placed in his hands enables him to form a very clear picture of what such an Order was in its internal economy, and without this it may be safely said that any conclusions we might draw respecting it would be extremely imperfect and fallacious. In every sense this balance-sheet of the Manors of the Knights of St. John is one of the most important contributions which have yet been made to the history of the fourteenth century.

POSTSCRIPT.

[Vide page lvii.]

I HAVE traced the recovery of the Order to Elyan de Villeneuve and his lieutenant Leonard de Tybertis. We have seen that, in spite of its losses in Syria, its expulsion from Cyprus, its difficulties in Rhodes, and its embarrassments with its creditors in England and elsewhere, it still possessed vitality enough to spring up again into more than its former splendour. In 1328 it could hardly keep its head above water; in 1338 it could account for a surplus of income over expenditure in England alone of nearly 6,840*l.* The downfall of the Temple had saved it. But it does not seem to have taken warning from the past; and in 1343 Elyan, who had done so much to restore its prosperity, was obliged to put up with the following most instructive rebuke from the Pope, Clement VI. :—

“Clemens, &c &c. dilecto filio Heliono de Villanova, &c.

“Habet namque cleri et populi quasi communis et vulgaris opinio . . . . quod de bonis innumeris ipsius Hospitalis in transmarinis et cismarinis partibus bonificiatis quasi nichil; nisi quod personæ Hospitalis ejusdem . . . . equos magnos et pulchros equitant; cibis vacant delectabilibus; pomposis vestibus, vasis aureis et argenteis, et pretiosis aliis ornamentis utantur; aves et canes tenent et nutriunt venaticos;

pecunias congregant et conservant innumeras, et raras vel modicas elemosynas largiuntur . . . . propter quod, quandoque tactum est, fore non parum utile . . . . quod alia militaris religio crearetur per sedem Apostolicam, et dotaretur de parte bonorum Hospitalis Sancti Joannis Jherosolymitani . . . . quod virtuosius et utilius duæ religiones militares . . . . mutuo zelo, quam una, sicut olim Hospitalarii et Templarii faciebant: et etiam quod ad hoc abunde sufficerent bona Hospitalis prædicti . . . .

After stating what number of ships ought to be set on foot, at the charges of the King of Cyprus, the Republic of Venice, the Apostolical See itself, &c. he continues:—

“Quin potius totalis armata posset commode ipsius Hospitalis expensis teneri: cum a pluribus asseratur, Te plus de thesauro quam alia tota Dei ecclesia possidere; et præter hoc, multi priores ipsius Hospitalis et fratres habent, ut fertur, pecunias infinitas. Datum apud Villam Novam, Avenion Diocesis, sexto Idus Augusti, pontificatus nostri anno secundo.”\*

I can easily believe that the Pope was terrified at the wealth and power of a Grand Master who was pretty much independent of himself. He would probably have liked very well to establish, in place of the Templars (whom he could not re-establish), a new military chivalry to keep the Hospitallers in check; which should be endowed with a part of the riches that made them dangerous, and should take its orders immediately and directly from Rome. Whatever objects he might have in view, it is clear, from his letter, that the Order had attained to a condition of great wealth and splendour, and that the words which I have quoted respecting Elyan were true: “Non recolit memoria hominum, nec reperitur in scriptis, quod tam quietam tamque *omnibus bonis plena* esset religio, prout ipse illam reliquit tempore mortis suæ.” During the schism, and while they were poor, the Pope had stepped in with the consummate ability which never deserted the “curia,” and had established a kind of “magistrate” very different from his earlier “protectorate.” They were now united and rich, and the Pope thought it necessary to threaten them with division and poverty again. There is something sublimely impudent in his hint,

that it was a pity the Templars should have been dissolved, as their zeal kept that of the Hospitallers on the alert! But he was saved from steps which might have embarrassed him. The subsequent difficulties of the Hospitallers played them again into his hands, and thus rendered the plan of a new military order unnecessary. Moreover, the Jesuits arose, clearly seeing that heavy-handed fighting was not the *militia* that the head of the Church wanted, and gifted with a sort of prophetic insight into the value of gunpowder as a leveller. But these are questions which belong to the history of Europe, not to that of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem—at least at present.

I have suggested also that Thomas Larcher may have been deposed, or have resigned a post to which he felt himself unequal. The following letter from the King of England to the Pope (Rymer, vol. iv. p. 378), shows that the supposition was a just one, and is on other grounds of interest. It is the companion-piece to the letter of the preceptors printed in Mr. Larking's Appendix:—

## NOTES.

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P. 1. *Bastard title.* On the cover, in a modern hand, is this title—

“Lingua Angliæ—Liber in quo per minutum exprimuntur reditus Prioratus Hospitalis sancti Johannis Hierosolymitani in Anglia; et omnium ipsius Comendarum, secundum valorem currentem, anno 1338, eodemque modo exprimuntur aliqua bona ordinis Templariorum, quæ ordini sancti Johannis Hierosolymitani, post extinctionem dicti ordinis Templariorum, fuerunt adjudicata. Qui liber confectus ex ordinatione fratris Philippi Thame, tunc temporis ipsius Prioratus Angliæ Prioris.”

P. 3. *Grenham.* *i.e.* Greenham in Berkshire; it is a hamlet in the parish of Thatcham.

According to Lysons, Maud, Countess of Clare, t. H. II., gave this manor of Greenham to the Hospitallers; and, at the same time, Gervas Paynell gave them the village.

The editors of the *Monasticon* state that, though Greenham is cited by Lysons as one of the Preceptories of the Hospitallers, they have no evidences of it.

In Testa de Nevill is this entry—

“Idem magister (*i.e.* hospitalis sancti Johannis Jerusalem) in dominico suo Grenham, quod fuit de feodo comitis de Ferrariis, et datum in maritagium Radulpho Paynel, et filius ejus manerium illud dedit fratribus sancti Johannis, nec facit scutagium.”

In a Confirmation Charter of John to the Hospitallers, of estates, &c., granted to them by different benefactors, Rot. Cart. 1 Joh., we have “ex dono Gervasii Paganell villam de Grenham, cum omnibus pertinentiis suis.”

In a catalogue of Berkshire Gentry, as cited by Lysons, t. H. VI., John Prendegast is named as Preceptor of the hospital of St. John of Jerusalem in Grenham.

Last line but 3. *Spene, Hildeslee, Wollauynnton, Ofton, Wawesyng, et Catmere.* *i.e.* probably Spene, Ilsley, Woolhampton, Ufton, Wasing, and Catmer.

In the Confirmation Charter of John, Rot. Cart. 1 Joh., we have “ex dono Roberti Comitis de Ferrariis Wllaumton cum pertinenciis suis.”

P. 4. l. 9. The wool tax, and its oppressive exaction, are historical facts too well known to need a more specific note here.

l. 11. *Shaldeford.* Usually written Scaldeford in the Records, as in Rot. Hund. 4 E. I., vol. i. p. 9.

“Item Brimpton, Donile, Grenham, et tres homines tenentes de Guserigg Prioris solebant facere scutum ad hundredum Regis de Bella Cruce que subtracta per hospitalares de Scaldeford a quo tempore, nec quo waranto nesciunt.”

P. 4. *Brompton*. Probably for Brimpton. In "Testa de Nevill" is this entry—  
 "Magister hospitalis sancti Johannis Jerusalem in Brimton tres hidas terre et dimidium  
 quas habet de dono Simonis de Oville, et fuerunt de feodo Willelmi de Roumare et tentas  
 aliquo tempore per dimidium feodi, et nunc reddunt ad scaccarium decem marcas."

P. 4 et passim. *Thome Larch'*. *i.e.* Thomas Larcher, alias L'Archer, who was Prior  
 of England, t. E. II. and t. E. III. He is mentioned 1323, and died 1329, August 28.

P. 5. l. 6. *Brayboef*. ? Brayboof.

l. 12. *Leonardum*. *i.e.* Leonardus de Tybertis, who succeeded Thomas Larcher as  
 Prior of England in 1329; his name occurs also, as Prior, in 1332.

l. 13. *Blebury*. Probably Blewbury in Berkshire.

Last line but 4. "*Pretium quarterii ijs.*" On a third collation, it appears that  
 there is uncertainty whether the reading in the MS. be not ijs. which it certainly ought to  
 be. In many of the sums in the MS. an upstroke at the commencement has the appear-  
 ance of an additional minim.

P. 7. *Anesty*. *i.e.* Ansty, Wilts. Walter de Turbervill, 12 Jo. gave this manor to  
 the Hospitallers, and thereupon it became one of their preceptories, which was endowed,  
 26 H. VIII., with yearly revenues amounting to 8*l.* 8*s.* 5*d.* It was granted 38 H. VIII.  
 to John Zouch——." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Wilts. ii.)

In "Testa de Nevill" we have, "Hospitalis sancti Johannis tenet in Anestig feodum  
 unius militis de Roberto de Stanton, et ipse de Albreda de Boterels, et ipsa de Rege."

l. 11. *Fraeria*. It is in the MS. "ffraer," but occurs in extenso in other parts of the  
 Survey, both as "fraeria" and "fraria."

At end. *Swalclive*. Probably Swallowcliff.

P. 10. *Mayne*. *i.e.* Frier Maine, Dorsetshire. Here was "a Preceptory belonging  
 to the Knights Hospitallers," and, as such, cited among the lands restored to them, upon the  
 new foundation of the priory of that order, 4 and 5 P. and M. but granted 6 Eliz. to  
 William Pole and Edward Downing. (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Dorsetsh. xvi.)

Last line but 1. *Kyngestone*. In the return of the Inquisition in the Hundred Rolls,  
 we have, "Dicunt quod Thomas del Boys dedit hospitali sancti Johannis Jerusalem,  
 quandam terram in Kyngestane, de qua dominus Rex solebat habere sectam ad hundredum  
 predictum, et subtrahitur secta illa per Priorem et fratres hospitalis predicti, et valuit  
 per annum ijs." (Rot. Hund. 3 E. I. n. l. m. l. p. 100 of print.)

P. 11. l. 15. The "Nomina Fratrum" closes the 6th page of the MS. The 7th is  
 headed "Adhuc de Mayne," but it can hardly be intended to take us back to Mayne  
 itself, because the next entries after "Adhuc de Mayne" are, "Item ibidem x acre prati,  
 pretium acre iis....xss.—and "Item ibidem opera et consuetudines Nativorum, &c. &c."—  
 whereas the items of meadow and "opera Nativorum" belonging to Mayne have been  
 already entered at their proper place. These entries therefore belong to Waye, the limb  
 of Mayne. The confusion has arisen by the scribe entering the "Nomina Fratrum"

at the bottom of his 6th page, instead of the bottom of his 7th page, after "Summa Valoris."

P. 13. *Bothemescomb.* "Hundred de Colrig. Item, Isabella de Bodeton elemosinavit terram de Bodeton in manerio de Hurberton hospitali de Bothemescoume que feoffata fuit de eodem manerio per concessum Rogeri de Valle Torta capitalis domini illius manerii, et valet per annum centum solidos tempore ejusdem Henrici Regis patris domini Regis nunc quinquagesimo tercio." (Rot. Hund. 4 E. I. No. 2. m. 29.)

P. 14. *Brasii Avenarum et Brasii Frumenti.* Clearly proving "Brasium" to be malt. Oat malt and wheat malt.

Last line. The MS. has "M'ston;" it may be Marston or Merston or Muirstun.

P. 15. *Trebyghen.* *i.e.* Trebigh, alias Turbigh, in Cornwall.

"A preceptory of Knights Hospitallers of St. John of Jerusalem, to which Henry de Pomerai and Reginald Marsh were considerable benefactors. It was valued at 60*l.* per ann., but this, with Anstey, Wilts, was valued 26 H. VIII., at 90*l.* 1*s.* 9*d.*, in toto 81*l.* 8*s.* 5*d.* *clare.* This, among oher possessions of the old Knights, then undisposed of, was re-granted to the Hospitallers upon their restoration, 4 and 5 Ph. and Mary; and, after their dissolution, 16 Eliz., to Henry Wilby and George Blyth. (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Cornwall, xxxi.)

P. 17. *Bokeland.* *i.e.* Buckland Minchin, or Sororum. "In the reign of King H. II. William de Erlegh founded here a house of Regular Canons, who, having killed his steward, and done other unjustifiable acts, were suppressed, and removed to other houses. But that King granted all their lands to the Knights Hospitallers, A.D. 1180, upon condition that they should place here all the Sisters of their Order, which before lived in several of their preceptories. This seems to have been complied with, and the nuns here had, at first, great dependence upon the Knights; but, afterward, they disengaged themselves, and became a distinct priory or hospital of nuns of the Order of St. Augustine. This was dedicated to St. John the Baptist, and endowed, at the suppression, with 223*l.* 7*s.* 4*d.* per ann., and the site of it was granted 36 H. VIII. to William Earl of Essex, James Rockby, &c. There was also at this place a preceptory of Knights of St. John of Jerusalem, whose house was granted, 36 H. VIII., to Alexander Popham and William Halley." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Somersetsh. x.)

Last line. "xvijs. viijd." (*sic*).

P. 18, line 12. "*Pane furniundo.*" It is "Pane furniend'"; though, in most of the other instances, it is "Pane furnit'."

P. 20, l. 4. *Kynemersdon.* Probably for Kilmersdon, in Somersetshire.

l. 7. *Pederton.* No doubt for Petherton, Somersetshire.

l. 11. *Bromfeld.* No doubt for Broomfield, in Somersetshire.

P. 21. *Godsfeld.* *i.e.* Godsfield, in Hampshire. Henry de Blois, Bishop of Winchester, gave this place to the Knights of St. John of Jerusalem, whereupon it became a hospital or preceptory of that Order. (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Hampsh. xiv.)

l. 9. "*Combustionem de Portesmueth et de Hampton.*" "The 4th of October, 1338, fifty gallies, well manned and furnished, came to Southampton about 9 of the clock, and sacked the town; the townesmen running away for feare. By the breake of the next day, they which fled, by helpe of the countrey thereabout, came against the pyrats and fought with them: in the which skirmish were slaine to the number of 300 pyrats, together with their captaine, a young souldiour, the King of Sicils sonne. To this young man the French King had given whatsoever he got in the Kingdome of England, but he, being beaten downe by a certaine man of the country, cryed, '*Rancon!*' Notwithstanding the husbandman laid him on with his clubbe till he had slaine him, speaking these worde, —'Yea,' quoth he, 'I know well enough thou art a *Francon*, and therefore shalt thou die!' — for hee understood not his speech, neither had he any skill to take gentlemen prysoners, and to keepe them for their raunsome: wherefore, the residue of those Gennowayes, after they had set the towne on fire, and burnt it by quite, fled to their gallies, and in their flying certaine of them were drowned." (Stowe, ed. Howes, 1615, p. 235.)

l. 11. *Swarweton.* Probably for Swarwotton.

l. 23. *Badeslee.* Probably for "Baddesley."

P. 24. *Offham.* A hamlet in South Stoke, in Sussex.

*Upmerdon.* *i.e.* Upmarden, in Sussex.

*Palyng.* *i.e.* Poling or Pooling. "A preceptory of the Knights of St. John of Jerusalem, granted to the College of Arundel 33 Hen. VIII." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Sussex, xxv.)

Last line but 9. "Item ibidem iiij. acre prati." This should be "iiij. acre;" and a third collation with the original confirms this. The reading seems to have been originally "iiij. acre," afterwards corrected to "iiij. acre."

P. 25. *Rumbaldeswyck.* ? *Rimbaldeswyck.* It is now Rumbalds Wyke, a parish about half a mile from Chichester.

P. 26. *Hensyngton.* *i.e.* Hensington, in the parish of Bladon, Oxfordshire.

*Goseford.* *i.e.* Gosford, in the parish of Kidlington, Oxon. "Here seems to have been a house of Sisters of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem, who were removed, about A.D. 1180, to Buckland in Somersetshire. This estate was given to them by Robert D'Oily and Henry his son, and continued in the hands of the Hospitallers (who built an oratory or chapel here about A.D. 1234) till the Dissolution. It was granted, 34 H. VIII., to Anth. Stringer and John Williams." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Oxfordsh. xvi.)

P. 27, l. 14. "*Responsionibus.*" The "Responsiones" were fixed sums to be paid annually, by each knight or preceptory, to the funds of the Order, "ad utilitatem Terre Sancte."

In payment of these Responsions, it here appears that deductions were allowed for pensions paid by particular preceptories—for this must be the meaning of “allowed in the Responsions.”

P. 28. *Quenyngton. i.e.* Quenington, near Fairford, Gloucestershire. “A preceptory of Knights Hospitallers of St. John of Jerusalem, to whom this manor was given by Agnes de Lasceo, or Lacy, and her daughter Sybilla, before 1 John. It was valued, 26 H. VIII. at 209*l.* 16*s.* MS. Le Neve; at 137*l.* 7*s.* 1*d.* ob. per ann., Dugd. Speed; but in my MS. Valor, at 25*l.* 16*s.* 6*d.* only; and granted, 37 H. VIII., first to Sir Richard Morisine, and then to Sir Ant. Kingston.” (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Gloucestersh. xxvii.)

P. 28, and p. 30. I think it should be extended “Molendino fullonico,” and “Molendini fullonici.” The MS. has “fullonu,” the last minim being not very distinct, and probably for “c.”

P. 28. *Nethergutyng. i.e.* Lower Guyting, about six miles from Winchcomb.

*Suthorp. i.e.* Southrop, near Lechlade.

*Dounamaneye. i.e.* Down Amney, near Fairford.

*Sothinton. i.e.* Siddington, near Cirencester.

*Calemonden. i.e.* Calmsden in North Cerney, near Cirencester.

P. 29, l. 22. “*Soluto.*” I write “soluto,” because at page 32 *infra* the same word is actually so written in extenso in the MS.

l. 24. *John de Warenn.* Perhaps Sir John de Warren, illegitimate son of John Earl of Warren, by Maud de Nereford.

P. 30. *Dynemor. i.e.* Dinmore, nine miles from Hereford. “There standeth,” saith Leland, Itin. vol. iv. p. 90, “a little by west of the very toppe of Dinmore hill, on the left hand as I rode, a commandry, with a fayre place, that belonged to the Order of the Knights of St. John of Hierusalem in London,” to whom it was given by one Sir Thomas . . . a brother of the Order, temp. H. II. After the Dissolution, this house was granted, 2 E. VI., to Sir Tho. Palmer, and, upon his attainer, to Jane Russel, 1 Mar. (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Herefordsh. ix.)

*Leomhales.* Probably Leonhales, alias Lyons-hall, near Weobly, Herefordshire.

*Caluwe. i.e.* Callow, a little south of Hereford.

*Lodelawe. i.e.* Ludlow, Salop.

*Roynton.* Probably for Rorrington, Salop—about 6 miles from Montgomery.

*Overwent.* A district in Monmouthshire, extending across the upper part of it from the Wye to Abergavenny.

*Monemuth. i.e.* Monmouth.

*Worthyn. i.e.* Worthen, Salop, twelve miles W.S.W. from Shrewsbury.

*Clya.* Clee in Salop. The “Taxatio P. Nicholai” has this entry at p. 166, col. b. “Ecclesia de Cleye S’ce Milburge est Hospital’ de Dunemor.”

P. 30. *Oxinkale. i.e.* Oxenhall, near Newent, Gloucestershire.  
*Porkirie. i.e.* Porth Kerry, at the southern extremity of Glamorganshire.  
*Pennark. i.e.* Penmark, below Cardiff, Glamorganshire.

P. 31. *Rolston. i.e.* Rowlston, about 12 miles S. W. of Hereford.  
*Wormebrigge. i.e.* Wormbridge, between Devereux and Rowlston, Herefordshire.  
*Nomina Fratrum.* In the original MS. the "Nomina Fratrum" is inserted between the "Expensis Coquine" and "Item in Robis," page 32; assuredly out of place, and inserted there by the scribe probably because it was a convenient vacant space at the foot of his 24th page, which he preferred to having a break in the middle of his page. I have transferred the entry to the place where it should naturally have been inserted.

P. 32, l. 9. "De avenis cxx quarteria" (*sic.*) It is probably a mistake of the scribe for cx.

P. 33. *Cenagio. Cenagium; i.q.* "refectio" or "pastus," for the Archdeacon.

P. 34. *Slebech.* "Wi3o, and Walter his son, having given lands here to the Knights of St. John of Jerusalem, for the recovery of the Holy Land, a preceptory of their Order was settled here, before A.D. 1301, which was endowed, at the Dissolution, with 211*l.* 9*s.* 11*d.* ob. per ann. in the whole, and 184*l.* 10*s.* 11*d.* ob. clear; and granted, with several other things in these parts, to Roger and Thomas Barlow." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Pembroke. x.)

*Minwer. i.e.* Minwear.  
*Marteltwy. i.e.* Martletwy.  
*Rosmarket. i.e.* Rhôs Market.  
*Lanthlo.* For Llan Deilo?  
*Kermerdyn. i.e.* Caermarthen.  
*Wiston.* in Welsh, Castell Gwys.

P. 35. *Clarebaston. i.e.* Clarbeston.

*Waleton; i.e.* East Walton; the parish having been given to the preceptory by Walter de Wala.

*Amelaston. i.e.* Ambleston, alias Tref Amlod.  
*Amerath. i.e.* Amroth.  
*Lanelau. i.e.* Llan Lawen, or perhaps Llanelly; but?  
*Breconie.* Mr. Winthrop, in his collation, reads Bretonie: if it be so, it is surely an error of the scribe for Breconie.  
*Lanstephan. i.e.* Llan Stephan, in Caermarthenshire.  
*Swenesch.* For Swansea?  
*Afirmata. i.e.* Let to farm.

P. 36, l. 2. "*Precium quarteri.*" It is "p'c' q'rt furn," and no price given per quarter.

P. 38. *Halstan in Nort Wallia*. Halston is in Shropshire, near Oswestry, but very near the Welsh border. "A preceptory, which belonged first to the Knights Templars, and afterwards to the Hospitallers. It was dedicated to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and valued, 26 Hen. VIII., at 160*l.* 14*s.* 10*d.* per ann. This house, among other old estates, was regranted to the Prior and Brethren of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem 4 et 5 Phil. et Mar., and 5 Eliz. to one William Horne." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Shropsh. xiv.)

l. 11. *Escaeta expedorum*. The word here is most distinctly "expedor," for "expedorum." I cannot discover its meaning—perhaps it was originally written "expat'or," for "expatriatorum," and misread by the scribe.

l. 22. *Wytyn*. Is this Whittington?

l. 24. *Kynardeslee*. I believe it is for Kinnerley, Salop, not Kinnersley, in Herefordshire.

P. 39. *Wytington*. *i.e.* Whittington Castle, between Ellesmere and Oswestry.

P. 41. *Grafton*. "I have not yet seen by any record, till 26 H. VIII., that it had the name of Temple Grafton; for anciently it was called *Grafton superior*: by that name I find it 20 E. III., and that which is now called *Ardens Grafton*, *Grafton inferior*. By which name of Temple Grafton it might be supposed that the Knights Templars were sometime seized of all, or a great part, of this town; howbeit, I do not discern that they had any thing to do here either by that survey taken of their lands 1185, 31 Hen. II.; but, in truth, it was the Knights Hospitallers, upon whom the Templars' lands were bestowed, who were possessed of it; some whereof they had by grant of Henry, son to Bernard de Grafton, 1189, 1 R. I. . . . In 31 H. III., they obtained 2 messuages, 10 acres of land, and 1 acre of meadow, from one Thomas de Salopesbiri and Idonea his wife; so that, in 9 E. II. they were certified to be sole Lords of this Grafton, and to hold it of the Earl of Warwick by the service of one knight's fee." (Dugdale's Warwickshire.)

*Berstanton*. Probably Barston, in the hundred of Hemlingford, twelve miles from Warwick, in the parish of Berkswell. It was anciently given partly to the Templars and partly to the Hospitallers. The yearly value of what the Templars had was 4*l.* 0*s.* 7*d.*, 31 H. II., and said to be "de feodo Roberti Marmionis;" no donor mentioned. The Hospitallers had half the village bestowed upon them by Alan de Faleis, and confirmed 1 John. (Dugdale's Warwickshire.)

P. 43. *Yievele*. *i.e.* Yeveley, or Yeaveley, Derbyshire.

"Ralph le Fun, temp. R. I., gave the hermitage here, with the lands, &c. thereunto belonging, to the Knights Hospitallers of St. John of Jerusalem, whereupon it became a preceptory to that Order, to which Sir Will. Meynill, lord of the town, was a great benefactor A.D. 1268. It was dedicated to St. Mary and St. John Baptist; and the estates belonging to this house and to Barow in Cheshire were worth 93*l.* 3*s.* 4*d.* per ann., Dugd.; 107*l.* 3*s.* 8*d.* ob. total. This preceptory was granted, 35 Hen. VIII., to Charles Lord Montjoy." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Derbysh. xv.)

Last line but 6. "*Ut nunc*." This is in same hand and ink as the rest of the MS.

P. 44. *Donatus*. "Donati," dicti Laici, qui sese et bona sua monasteriis donabant et offerebant. (Du Cange.)

*Brex*. ? Brey, and so in all the other instances where the name Brex occurs in this extent.

P. 45. *Neuland*. *i.e.* Newland, Yorkshire.

"This manor being given to the Knights Hospitallers of St. John of Jerusalem by King John, they established here a preceptory of their Order, to which, in the next reign, Roger le Peytevin, Lord of Altofts, was a great benefactor. It was valued, 26 H. VIII., at 129*l.* 1*s.* 11*d.* ob. per ann. as Dugdale; at 223*l.* 19*s.* 7*d.* ob., as Le Neve's MS.; and at 202*l.* 3*s.* 8*d.* as another MS. Valor; and granted, 36 H. VIII., to Francis Jobson, Andrew Dudley, &c." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Yorksh. lxxxvii.)

P. 47. *Montis Sancti Johannis*. *i.e.* Mount St. John, in the parish of Felix Kirk, in the North Riding.

"In the beginning of the reign of K. Henry I., William Percy, the first called Algernon, gave the Knights Hospitallers of St. John of Jerusalem lands hereabout to the amount of five knights' fees, and thereupon a preceptory of that Order was established here, dedicated to St. Mary, and endowed, 26 H. VIII., with 137*l.* 2*s.* 0*d.* per ann. in toto, 102*l.* 13*s.* 9*d.* clare. It was granted, in exchange, to the Archbishop of York 34 H. VIII." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Yorksh. lxxxv.)

P. 48. *In distributione pauperum, &c.* (*sic.*) No sum assigned in the original MS.

l. 12. *Bella Luda*. Byland Abbey.

P. 49. *Beuerlee*. *i.e.* Beverley. Here was a preceptory of Knights Hospitallers of St. John of Jerusalem.

P. 52. *Quarteria, pretium quarterii*. Sic in MS.; no "frumenti."

P. 57. *Malteby*. *i.e.* Maltby. "A preceptory of the Templars, and after of the Hospitallers. Randal, Earl of Chester, was the first donor. It was granted, 33 H. VIII., to Charles Duke of Suffolk." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Lincolnsh. li.)

P. 60. *Skirbeck*. "Here was an old hospital for ten poor people dedicated to St. Leonard, which being given, with the manor, A. D. 1230, to the Knights Hospitallers of St. John of Jerusalem, by Sir Thomas Multon, Knt. some of that Order shortly after settled here. The hospital was thereupon called St. John Baptist's, and, temp. E. II., was returned to be endowed with lands sufficient to maintain three priests here, and one at Flete, and to sustain twenty poor people in the infirmary of the house, and to relieve forty more every day at the gate. It was granted, as parcel of the preceptory of Maltby, to Charles Duke of Suffolk, 33 Hen. VIII." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Lincolnsh. lxvii.)

P. 61, near end. *Pauperum infirmaria*. Written "infirmaria;" probably a clerical error for "in infirmaria;" or "firmaria" is used in the sense of "infirmaria."

*Caneuas*. *i. e.* Canvas, hempen cloth.



P. 63. *Dalby. i. e.* Dalby on the Wolds, or Old Dalby, in Leicestershire.

"A preceptory of the Knights Hospitallers founded probably by Robert Bossu, Earl of Leicester, in the former part of the reign of King Henry II. The revenues belonging to it amounted to 91*l.* 2*s.* 8*d.* per ann. MS. Val. ; to 103*l.* 16*s.* 7*d.* ob. Burton. It was granted to Sir Andrew Nowell, or Noel, 35 H. VIII." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Leicestersh. vii.)

*Hethre. i. e.* Heather, which was accounted part of the preceptory of Dalby.

P. 65. *Thurgeston. i. e.* Thurcaston.

P. 66. *Dyngelee. i. e.* Dingley, Northamptonshire.

"A preceptory belonging to the Knights of St. John of Jerusalem temp. R. Stephani, had lands belonging to it valued, 26 H. VIII. at 108*l.* 13*s.* 5*d.* ob. per ann., and was granted 35 H. VIII. to Edward Griffith." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Northamptonsh. xiii.)

P. 68. *Hoggesshawwe. i. e.* Hogshaw, in Buckinghamshire.

"A preceptory, commandry, or hospital, belonging to the Knights of St. John of Jerusalem, as ancient as the reign of K. Henry II., A.D. 1180. It was granted 35 H. VIII. to Matilda Lane." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Buckinghamsh. xii.)

l. 6. *Pastura separalis.* The term "pastura separalis" seems, in this extent, to be used for their own pasture land specially, in contradistinction to "pastura in communi," right of commonage pasture.

l. 13. "*Et ibidem et redditu forinceco.*" It is *sic*.

P. 69. *Tothal.* By an error of the press this is printed Tothal instead of Tot'hal. Dugdale names William de Tothale as Prior 1297-1318, but the mark of abbreviation over the "h," in this extent, would imply that the name was Totheral, or Tocheral.

P. 70. *Melcheburn. i. e.* Melchbourn, Bedfordshire.

"The Lady Alice or Adelize de Claremonte, Countess of Pembroke, (and, as in one place, Roger Earl of Clare,) gave, temp. H. I., the manor and church here to the Knights Hospitallers of St. John of Jerusalem, and so here was settled a preceptory, which had lands belonging to it valued at 241*l.* 9*s.* 10*d.* ob. This house was, upon the refounding of this Order, 4 et 5 Phil. et Mar., again made part of the endowment of it, and 3 E. VI. was granted to John Earl of Bedford. (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Bedfordsh. xiii.)

l. 1. "*Et ibidem unum cum giardino.*" It is *sic*.

*Coterellorum.* Kennet (in Glossario ad calcem Antiquit. Ambrosden) distinguishes them from "Cotagii," who, he says, "liberos fuisse bonorum suorum possessores ea conditione ut certam pecuniæ summam, vel frumenti quantitatem, 'corvatas' quasdam dominis suis præstarent. 'Coterellos' vero, neque juris sui fuisse, neque liberos bonorum quæ tenebant possessores, sed, ut bona, ita et personas ad Dominos absoluta jure pertinuisse."

Du Cange, however, doubts this opinion, and calls for proofs.

P. 72. "*P'kr.*" It is written *sic* here in the list of brethren, and in the text, p. 71, it is written "*Parcarius.*"

P. 75. *Shenegeye. i. e.* Shingay, or Shengey, Cambridgeshire.

"A preceptory of Knights Hospitallers of St. John of Jerusalem, given to that Order by Sibilla de Raynes, daughter of Roger Earl of Montgomery, A.D. 1140. It was worth, at the Suppression, 171*l.* 4*s.* 6*d.* per ann. Dugdale; 175*l.* 4*s.* 6*d.* Speed; and was granted, 32 H. VIII., to Richard Longe." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Cambridgesh. xviii.)

P. 78. *Chippenham.* "William de Mandevil, Earl of Essex, gave, A.D. 1184, the manor of Chippenham to the Knights Hospitallers, and so it became a preceptory subordinate to their great house in London, and was used for their sick brethren, often removed hither for country air. In the valuation of Carbrook, the Jerusalem estate here and in the neighbouring towns is reckoned at 33*l.* 6*s.* 8*d.*, which was granted 32 H. VIII. to Sir Edward North. (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Cambridgesh. vi.)

P. 79. *Dragetum.* "Dragge, menglyd corne (Drage or mestlyon, P.)"—*Promptorium Parvulorum*: where Mr. Way notes,—"In the 13th century, the grains chiefly cultivated in England, as appears by the accounts of the Bailiff of the Royal Manor of Marlborough, Rot. Pip. 1 E. I. were wheat, berecorn, dragg, or a mixture of vetches and oats, beans, and pease. The regulations for the brewers of Paris, in 1254, prescribe that they shall brew only 'de grains, c'est à savoir, d'orge, de mestuel, et de dragée.' *Reglement sur les Arts*, ed. by Depping. Tusser speaks of Dredge as commonly grown in the eastern counties:

Sow barley and dredge with a plentiful hand.

Thy dredge and thy barlie goe thresh out to malt.

Bishop Kennett, in his *Glossarial Collections*, Lansd. MS. 1033, mentions 'dredge mault, malt made of oats mixed with barley malt, of which they make an excellent fresh, quick sort of drink, used in Staffordshire.'

I have frequently seen peas, oats, and beans growing together in France. The word *Drage*, *Dragetum*, &c., is of constant occurrence in early accounts.

P. 81. *Kerbrok. i. e.* Great Carbrook, in Norfolk.

"Maud, Countess of Clare, having given the churches of St. Peter and St. John Baptist here to the Knights of St. John of Jerusalem, temp. H. II., some Sisters of their Order were placed in a hospital near the lesser church, but afterwards they were removed to Buckland, and a preceptory of a master and several brethren continued here till the Dissolution, when the estate belonging to it was valued at 65*l.* 2*s.* 11*d.* per ann., as Dugd., Speed; and 69*l.* 4*s.* 9*d.* MS. Valor. It was granted, 35 Hen. VIII., to Sir Richard Gresham and Sir Richard Southwell." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Norfolk, xiii.)

l. 20. *Letis.* It is in the original, "Et p'quis Cur' et Letis."

P. 82. "*Ponderis lx s.*" It is *sic*, probably for "*lx strelingorum.*"

Du Cange, voce "Estrelingus," "Parvum pondus," "minuta pars uncie," et citat Obituarium MS. Eccl. Morinensis, fol. 8, ubi, "Duo panes celarii ponderis, quilibet duarum unciarum et quinque estrelingorum."

P. 82, l. 14. "Le Messenger." In the MS. it is "Messag'."

P. 84. *Batesford. i.e.* Battisford, Suffolk.

"An hospital or preceptory of Knights of St. John of Jerusalem, as ancient as the reign of K. Henry II., valued 26 H. VIII., at 53*l.* 10*s.* per ann., Dugd., Speed; and granted 35 H. VIII. to Sir Richard Gresham." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Suffolk, ii.)

P. 85, l. 14. "*Pauner.*" ? Paumer.

P. 87. *Mapeltrestede. i.e.* Little Maplested, Essex.

"Juliana, daughter and heiress of Robert Dorsnell, and wife of William Fitz-Aldelm de Burgo, circa temp. H. I., gave this whole parish to the Knights Hospitallers, and so it became a preceptory of that Order; and at the Dissolution was granted to George Harper, Esq." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Essex, xxvii.)

P. 89. *Staundon, Essex.* This surely must be Standon, Hertfordshire. "Gilbert de Clare having given the church of Standon, with one hundred and forty acres of land and his vineyard, to the Knights Hospitallers, temp. R. Steph. here was a preceptory or place of residence for some of the Sisters of that Order, till they were all put together at Buckland in Somersetshire, A.D. 1180. The manor, rectory, and advowson of the vicarage of Standon, as parcel of the possessions of St. John of Jerusalem, were granted, 36 H. VIII., to Sir Ralph Sadler." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Hertfordsh. xxiii.)

P. 91. *Swenefeld. i.e.* Swingfield, Kent.

"At Swinfield was a house of the Sisters of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem, before they were all placed together at Buckland A.D. 1180. Whether this was that Swinfield is uncertain, but here was certainly a preceptory of Knights Templars before A.D. 1190, to which Sir Waresius de Valoniis, Sir Robert de Clotingham, Arnulf Kade, and others, were great benefactors. It became, afterwards, part of the possessions of the Knights of St. John of Jerusalem, and, as such, was valued, 26 H. VIII., at 111*l.* 12*s.* 8*d.*, as a MS. Valor of Mr. Le Neve's; but at 87*l.* 3*s.* 3*d.* ob. as Dugdale and Speed. It was granted 33 H. VIII. to Sir Anth. Aucher. (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Kent, lviii.)

Last line but 1. "*Preceptoris, et domus et.*" It is *sic*.

P. 93. *Sutton atte Hone.* Circiter t. R. I. vel Joannis, "or a little before, Robert Basinge gave the manor here to the Knights Hospitallers of St. John of Jerusalem, who had a commandry here: the house being yet called St. John's." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Kent, lvi.)

*Reservatam.* It is *sic*; "res'vatam."

P. 94. *Clerkenewell.* "In the north suburbs of the city of London, near West Smithfield, Jordan Briset, by some called a Knight, by others a Baron, erected A.D. 1100, or

some few years after, a house or hospital for a new religious Order, then famous in Christendom, viz. the Knights Hospitallers of St. John of Jerusalem, who, by the liberality of the kings and the nobility of England, and the accession which was made to them upon the Suppression of the Templars, temp. E. II., were endowed, at the Suppression, with lands to the yearly value of 3,040 marks, according to Mr. Leland; 2,385*l.* 12*s.* 8*d.* Dugd. and Speed; 3,385*l.* 19*s.* 8*d.* Stow. The Lord Prior had here precedence of all the lay barons in Parliament, and chief power over all the preceptories and lesser houses of this Order throughout England. The site of this priory was granted, 38 H. VIII., to John Viscount Lisle, and great part of the church, with the fine bell-tower, was blown up, 3 E. VI. But K. Philip and Q. Mary, 4 and 5 regni, re-established a lord prior, and some brethren of the Order here repaired the house, and restored many of the old estates in divers counties to the same, who were again suppressed in the first year of Queen Elizabeth." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Middx. viii. xi.)

P. 94. *Brokesbourn*. V. p. 123, *infra*.

P. 96, &c. *Serviētes*. "In ordinibus militaribus Hospitalariorum, Templariorum, et Teutonicorum militum, dicti, qui, non ex genere militari vel nobili, in eo ordine militabant." (Du Cange.)

*Serviēns Liber*. "Ab omni munere immunis." (Du Cange.)

*Panes carpentariorum*. Probably mechanic's or workman's bread.

P. 98. *Dispensa*. The Dispensatory; the room from which the house stores were dispensed: like the buttery of colleges.

*Liberationibus*. "Liberatio—merces." (Du Cange.)

P. 99, last clause but two. The sentence is *sic*.

In superueientibꝫ ca' hospitalitatis et aliis de familia d'ni Regis et alior' magnatu' regni Anglie, ac etiam Preceptor' fr'm et eor' familie illuc venient p' negociis in Cur' d'ni Reg' ibid'm cōtinere existent' et aliis rac'oibꝫ in ciuitate London faciend' moratur' apud Clerkenwell."

P. 100. "*Que distat*." In original it is "que distat de distat de Clerkenewell."  
"*Liberationibus et conventus*." It is *sic* in original.

P. 105. *Camere*. *i.e.* Cells.

*Tolre*. *i.e.* Toller Fratrum.

"This ville is called Toller Fratrum, because it anciently belonged to the brethren of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem." (Hutchinson's Dorsetshire.)

P. 108. *Swyneford*. *i.e.* Swinford, Leicestershire.

"The church and other lands in this town being given to the Hospitallers before the first of K. John, by Robert Rivell, here was settled a small house or preceptory of that Order." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Leicestersh. xxv.)

P. 108, 6th item. It is *sic*.

l. 15. 3rd entry of Reprise. It is in original "It'm in stip'nd' sen' tentis Cur' et pl'ita defendend'."

l. 13. "*De Wouer.*" "De Bouer?"

P. 109. *Baruwe.* *i.e.* Barrow, Derbyshire.

I can find no account of any property of the Hospitallers at Barrow, Derbyshire; but at Great Barrow, in Cheshire, Tanner says "Robert de Bachepez having given, temp. H. II., the church of this place to the Knights Hospitallers of St. John of Jerusalem, here was settled a preceptory of that Order, which, with Yeveley in Derbyshire, was valued 26 H. VIII., at 93*l.* 3*s.* 4*d.* ob. per ann. Dugd.; 107*l.* 3*s.* 8*d.* Speed." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Cheshire, ii.)

*Ecclesie de Swerkestone . . . . . Episcopo Karleonensi.* These two entries prove that Tanner is wrong, and that it is Barrow in Derbyshire where the Camera of the Hospitallers was, and not in Cheshire; for we have here a pension paid them from Swarkstone church, which is decidedly in Derbyshire; and here is an entry of annual rent paid to the Bishop of Carlisle, and, by the pleadings in "Quo Warranto," and by the "Hundred Rolls," it appears that the Bishops of Carlisle were lords of the manor of Barrow in Derbyshire, by grant of Henry II.

P. 113, 1st line. *Ultra reprisas.* (*sic*.) No value named.

P. 114. *Et cum j. columbario.* Added after the line of direction was drawn to the figure, and looks like an erasure, but is not.

*Wynkebourne.* *i.e.* Winkbourne, Nottinghamshire.

In the "Placita de Quo Warranto" for the county of Nottingham, the Prior of the Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem pleads his right to free warren, &c., in his manor of Winkebourn, as of the grant of H. III., and in Deynilthorp, as possessed of it "a tempore quo non extat memoria," and his pleas are allowed. In this plea are also enumerated many vills, manors, &c. in the county, included in the same plea as belonging to the Hospitallers.

P. 115. *Dicta ecclesia et capella.* It is *sic* in the original.

"*Stauri nutrimentum.*" This expression, with the frequently repeated one of "de profieuo Stauri," proves that Staurum, store, included live stock. *Vide* "proficuum stauri, xx vaccarum," p. 118.

"*Nomina Fratris.* (*Sic*.)

P. 118. *Proficuum stauri xx vaccarum.* Confirmatory of the suggestion in note to page 115, that staurum included live stock.

*j daye.* A Dairy-maid, *v.* Chaucer.

P. 121. *Roba* is here written in extenso, proving that, where the entry concerns one individual, it should be "*roba*," implying one robe a year for each.

P. 123. *Stilbyng et Chauree*. Probably for Stebbing and Chawreth.

*Brokesbourn*. Probably for Broxbourn, Herts.

*Converso*. "Conversi in monasteriis dicuntur laici monachi laicis exercitiis, et monachorum obsequiis addicti, vulgo 'Freres Convers;' sic autem appellati quod primitus viri laici pietatis, seu etiam quærendi victus gratis, monasteriis totos se darent, offerrent, et addicerent, operam suam locantes ad vitam suam, unde et 'Laici,' 'et Oblati,' et 'Donati' sæpe dicti leguntur." (Du Cange.)

Last line but one. *ut patet supra. i.e. p. 94, q. v.*

P. 124. *Stallesfed, Ore, Tonebrigg, Haudloo, Burgham. i.e. Stalisfield, Ore, Tunbridge, Hadlow, and Burham, in Kent.*

P. 125. *Herefeld. i.e. Harefield.*

*Nomina fratris. sic in original.*

*Wydende. Weedon, or perhaps Whaddon?*

*Ruton super Donnesmor. i.e. Ryton or Rieton upon Dunsmoor.* "The Hospitallers, 7 Ed. I. had two freeholders here, holding one yard of land and a water-mill; but, 10 Ed. I., there was a sute between Thomas de Arderne and the Hospitallers, by which the Prior of St. John's recovered of the said Thomas 1 mill, 200 acres of land, 12 of meadow, and 10 of wood. . . . In 14 Ed. I., this Thomas granted all his right to the Hospitallers . . . . against whom, 9 H. VIII., it was certified, that he had enclosed here 300 acres of land, and that, by the decay of husbandry, if remedy were not provided, the church there would fall to ruin." (Dugdale's Warwicksh.)

P. 127. *Hampton.* "The Lady Joan, relict of Sir Robert Gray, Kt. gave this manor to the Knights Hospitallers; and here seems to have been a house of some sisters of that Order, before they were all removed to Buckland, A.D. 1180." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Middlesex, ii.)

*Quia Dux Cornubie juxta moratur.* Probably the Black Prince resided at Shene.

P. 128. *Roba, mantello, &c.* It is "Rob., mantell, et aliis patris custodis." Probably "necessariis" omitted by clerical error.

*Nomina fratris. sic.*

*Meriton.* It is "M'iton."

P. 136. *Rybstayn. i.e. Ribston, in Yorkshire.*

"This manor was given to the Knights Templars by Robert Lord Ross, the Second, or Furfan, in the latter end of the reign of King Richard I., or the beginning of that of King John, whereupon it became a commandery of that Order; and, after their suppression, it became part of the possessions of the Knights of St. John of Jerusalem, who had estates hereabouts, under the inspection of their preceptor, to the yearly value of 207*l.* 9*s.* 7*d.* as Dugdale, and 265*l.* 9*s.* 6*d.* ob., as MS. Le Neve. It was granted, 33 H. VIII., to Charles Duke of Suffolk." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Yorksh. xcvi.)

P. 137. *Robis armigeri preceptoris*. In original it is "robis" in extenso, "Robis armig'i p'ceptor'."

P. 138. *Cero. sic, cero.*

P. 139. *Wythelee*. Probably Whitley, Yorkshire.

*Valet pastura in communi*. It is "et val pastur' in coi," without any price named. The sentence may mean either that the pasturage of the 54 acres is ordinarily, "communibus annis," worth 50*s.*, or we must extend it "pasturam," as signifying that the 54 acres are only worth commonage pasture.

P. 144. *Wilughton. i.e.* Willoughton, Lincolnshire.

"Roger de Buslei and Simon de Canci, temp. R. Steph. gave the moiety of the Church here, and the greatest part of the town, to the Knights Templars, from whom it came afterwards to the Hospitallers; and here was a preceptory of that Order, valued 26 H. VIII. at 174*l.* 11*s.* 1*d.* ob. per ann. as Dugd. and Speed, and at 209*l.* 19*s.* 8*d.* as Le Neve's MS. Valor, which was granted 37 H. VIII. to John Cock and John Thurgood." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Lincolnsh. lxxxvii.)

P. 145. *Golkesby*. Probably Goldsby, Lincolnshire.

*Calkewell. i.e.* Cawkwell, Lincolnshire.

*Thorp in Warectis. i.e.* Thorpe in the Fallows, Lincolnshire.

P. 147. *Saxeby. i.e.* Saxby, in Lincolnshire.

*Mere*. In the County and City of Lincoln.

"Here seems to have been an house of Templars, and afterwards of Hospitallers, to which Swane le Rich, and Sir William Vileyn, were great benefactors in the reigns of K. H. II. and K. John." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Lincolnsh. liiii.)

*Wadyngton. i.e.* Waddington, in Lincolnshire.

P. 148. *Esterkele. i.e.* East Keal, Lincolnshire.

*Temlby. i.e.* Dembleby, Lincolnshire.

P. 150. *Soluto vicario de Thorp*. So I extend "Solut vicar de Thorp," because of the instances of "soluto" in extenso in the MS.: viz. p. 27, "soluto Jacobo de Wodestok," and p. 32, "soluto Gilberto Pauely."

*Soluto pro visitationibus*. In original "Solut p' vis."

P. 152. *Keteby*. Probably Kettleby, Lincolnshire.

P. 153. *Bellewode. i.e.* Bellwood, Lincolnshire.

P. 154. *Bruere. i.e.* Temple Bruern, Lincolnshire.

"Here was, before A.D. 1185, a preceptory first of the Knights Templars, and after of the Hospitallers, who had annexed such possessions to it as were valued 26 H. VIII. at

184*l.* 6*s.* 8*d.* per ann., as Dugdale and Speed; and 195*l.* 2*s.* 2*d.* ob. q. as in another valuation. It was granted 33 H. VIII. to Charles Duke of Suffolk." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Lincolnsh. xii.)

P. 154. *Welingor.* *i.e.* Wellingore, Lincolnshire.

*Assheby.* *i.e.* Ashby, Lincolnshire.

*Brauncewell.* *i.e.* Branswell, Lincolnshire.

*Rouston.* *i.e.* Rowston, Lincolnshire.

*Cranevell.* *i.e.* Cranwell, Lincolnshire.

P. 155. *North Kirkeby.* There are several Kirkbys in Lincolnshire. This is, doubtless, Kirkby la Thorpe, alias St. Dennis, in the Wapentake of Aswardburn, Parts of Kesteven, two and a half miles from Sleaford.

l. 6. "*Reditu gallinarum.*" In the original "de redd gall." It may be "gallorum," but most probably as I have extended it, "gallinarum."

*Botilbrigg.* Probably "Botolph's Bridge," vulgo "Bottle Bridge," in Huntingdonshire, near Peterborough, and not more than ten or twelve miles from Market Deeping in Lincolnshire.

*Normanton.* Seven miles from Grantham.

*Rouceby.* *i.e.* Rauceby, four miles from Sleaford.

Last line. No price assigned to the quarter.

P. 156, l. 3. "*Roba.*" It is "rob" in original.

P. 157. *Caldecot.* Probably not Lincolnshire but Rutlandshire.

*Eycle.* *i.e.* Eagle, seven miles from Lincoln.

"A commandry of Knights Templars, who had the manor here by the gift of K. Stephen. It afterwards came to the Hospitallers, and, upon their dissolution, 33 H. VIII., it was granted to Thomas Earl of Rutland, and Robert Tirwhit. It was valued at 124*l.* 2*s.* 0*d.* per ann., Dugd., Speed, or, as in a MS. Valor, 144*l.* 18*s.* 10*d.* (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Lincolnsh. xxii.)

*Wisseyby.* *i.e.* Whisby, five miles from Lincoln.

P. 158. *Swynderby.* *i.e.* Swinderby, eight and a half miles from Lincoln.

*Sybbethorp.* *i.e.* Sibthorp; probably not Lincolnshire, but Sibthorp six miles from Newark, Notts., where, according to the Hundred Rolls, the Hospitallers had view of frankpledge, t. E. III.

P. 159. "Philippus de Beverlaco, pro, allocantur, &c." (*sic.*)

P. 160. *Aslakeby.* Two and a half miles from Folkingham, Lincolnshire.

"There seems to have been a preceptory or commandry of the Templars at the manor here, founded by John le Mareschal, about the time of K. Richard I., which was afterwards given to the Hospitallers, and, as part of their possessions, was granted, 33 H. VIII.,



to Edward Lord Clinton, and Ursula his wife." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Lincolnsh. ii.)

P. 160. In the original, it is "p'mo t'miō solucōis."

*Suth Wyme ? Suth Wytme. i.e.* South Wytham, Lincolnshire, three miles from Colsterworth.

"Here was a preceptory of Knights Templars as ancient as A.D. 1164, to which Margaret de Perci, and Hubert de Ria, were great benefactors, if not founders. It came afterwards to the Hospitallers, and, as part of their possessions, the lands called Great Temple in South Witham, Lincolnshire, were granted, 5 Eliz. to Stephen Holford." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Lincolnsh. lxxxviii.)

P. 161. *Donyngton. i.e.* Donington, nine miles from Folkingham, Lincolnshire.

"*Ad firmam annorum.*" *sic.* No number of years given.

P. 162. *Ffauf flour.* Probably for Flawford, Nottinghamshire.

*Silbeston.* Probably for Sibson, seven and a half miles from Stilton.

*Radenach.* Probably Radnage in Buckinghamshire, six miles and a quarter from High Wycombe.

P. 163. *Wilbergham. i.e.* Great Wilbraham, alias Wilburgham, Cambridgeshire.

"The church here, like that of Wendy, in this county, was originally given to the monks of Ely, residing at Denny Cell, but they, upon some considerations, made it over to the Knights Templars, who having here 2 messages, 120 acres of land, and other lands and rents, of the gift of Will. Loveday, Peter de Malo Alueto, and others, fixed a habitation here for some of their Order. But this, with their other estates, came into the possession of the Knights of St. John of Jerusalem." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Cambridgesh. xxviii.)

P. 164. *Prebenda equi. sic* in original.

P. 167. *Donewych.* Probably Dunwich in Suffolk, where was "a house of Knights Templars." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Suffolk. xviii.)

*Gyselingham. i.e.* Gissingham, Suffolk.

"Several lands in this town having been given to the Knights Templars by Sir Robert de Burgate, Knt. temp. . . . here was an house or preceptory of that Order, 34 E. I., afterward it came to the Hospitallers. Temple Close, and other lands and tenements in Gissingham, late belonging to St. John of Jerusalem, were granted, 7 E. VI. to John Grene and Robert Hall." (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Suffolk. xxii.)

"*Wendeye.*" *i.e.* Wendy, Cambridgeshire, six and a half miles from Royston.

P. 168. "*Cressing et Wytham.*" *i.e.* Cressing Temple and Witham, Essex, near Chelmsford.

"A preceptory of Knights Templars, to whom this manor was given by King Stephen, about 1150. It came afterwards to the Hospitallers, and, as part of their possessions, this

manor of Cressing and the half hundred of Witham were granted, 33 H. VIII., to Sir William Huse, Kt."

P. 168. *Ruenhal*. *i.e.* Rivenhall, Essex.

P. 169. *Mixtilis*. *i.e.* maslin or mestle; "Meslin bread, made with a mixture of equal parts of wheat and rye, was, according to Forby, formerly considered a delicacy in the Eastern counties; the household loaf being composed of rye alone," &c. (See Mr. Way's note, p. 334, *Promptorium Parvulorum*, vol. ii.)

*Molendinorum qui*. In original *sic*.

P. 170. "*Parve marisce*." I write "marisce," because it is "parve" in original.

*Swonton*. *i.e.* Swanton manor, in Bedfordshire. 15 E. I. the Master of the Temple is summoned to show by what warrant he claims to have view of frankpledge, &c. in Swanton, Scharnebrok, Melbrok, Stokton, Langeford, &c. He pleads the grant of H. III. (Pl. Qu. War. p. 5)—and 4 E. III., Simon Croyser and Elen his wife are called to show by what warrant they claim frankpledge in their manor of Swounton, Beds, as tenants of the Hospitallers. They plead the lease of Thos. Larcher. (Pl. Qu. War. p. 52.)

*Sharnebrock*. *i.e.* Sharnebrook, Beds. See preceding note, "Swonton."

P. 172. *Wylie*. Probably for Willien.

*Blounwill*. It is in original Blouūll.

*Dyneslee*. *i.e.* Temple Dynnesley, Herts.

"Bernard de Balliol, temp. K. Steph. gave several lands in Wedele, Preston, and other hamlets belonging to Hitchin, to the Knights Templars, whereupon this place became a preceptory of that Order, and afterwards of the Hospitallers, who enjoyed it till the Dissolution by K. Henry VIII., from whom, anno regni 33, Sir Ralph Sadler obtained a grant of this house and manor." (Tanner, *Not. Monast.* ed. Nasmith, Hertfordsh. x.)

P. 173. *Lylleston*. *i.e.* probably Littleton, Middlesex.

*Waltham, Kent*. Given to the Templars by Archbishop Theobald t. St. Afterwards it came to the Hospitallers. In 34 H. VIII. the King exchanged it with the Archbishop: he afterwards re-exchanged it with the Crown, who, 8 Eliz., conveyed it to Thomas Manwaring. (Hasted.)

*Ewell, Kent*. Granted by William Peverell to the Templars, as appears by an Inquisition taken 1185; afterwards it came to the Hospitallers, and, 5 E. VI., the King gave it to Lord Clinton and Saye, who in a few months reconveyed it to the Crown, and the King then granted it to Sir William Cavendish. (Hasted.)

P. 174. *Sutwerck*. Probably for Southwark; it is "valet" in the original.

*Compton*. Probably Compton Berwick, or Compton St. John's, in Sussex, for in "Placita de Quo Warranto" Sussex, the Templars at "Compton" are mentioned. The next grange or commandery described in this extent is Shipley, Sussex, and in it is the church of Suntyng, probably Sompting.

P. 175. *Shepelee. i.e.* Shipley, Sussex.

*Suntyngh. i.e.* Sompting, Sussex.

“*Deservientis ecclesie.*” In original it is “uni’ Capellī des’uient’ ecclīe.”

P. 176. *Rothelee. i.e.* Rothley, Leicestershire.

“K. Henry III. gave the manor and church of this place to the Knights Templars, who settled a commandry of their Order here, which, with other their lands, came afterwards to the Knights Hospitallers, who enjoyed the same till the general Dissolution, about which time this preceptory was valued at 87*l.* 13*s.* 4*d.* per ann. MS. Valor; but in Dugd. this is jointly valued with Dalby and Hether, at 231*l.* 7*s.* 10*d.* per ann.: Rotheley was granted 35 H. VIII. to Henry Cartwright.” (Tanner’s, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Leicestersh. xxi.)

*De perquisitis Curiarium et finium. sic* in original.

Last line but 3. “*Roba.*” *sic* in extenso in the original.

P. 177. *Gadesby, Grimston, Warnoteby, Caldewell, et Wycham. i.e.* Gaddesby, Grimston, Wartnaby, Caldwell, and Wykeham, all still Chapelries in Rothley, Leicestershire.

*Pro curacia et senagio.* In the original it is “p’curacia et senag.”

P. 179. *Ballessall. i.e.* Balshall, in Warwickshire.

“This manor was given to the Knights Templars temp. R. Steph. by Roger de Moubray, and became a commandry or preceptory of that Order. It belonged afterward to the Knights Hospitallers, though it doth not yet appear that any of them resided here; and, as parcel of their possessions, was granted, 7 E. VI., to John Earl of Warwick, and, 1 Eliz., to Sir Robert Dudley, Earl of Leicester.” (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Warwicksh. v.) V. etiam Dugdale’s Warwickshire, 703 b.

*Shirbourn. i.e.* Sherborne, Warwickshire.

“Roger, Earl of Warwick, gave half a hide and two parts of the tithe to the collegiate church of Warwick, 23 H. I. The residue of his lordship he bestowed upon the Templars, which t. H. II. was valued at 3*l.* 8*s.* 5*d.*” (Dugdale’s Warwickshire, 507 b.)

*Flethamstede.* V. Dugdale’s Warwickshire, p. 176, for a full account of the lands held by the Templars here.

P. 180. *d’n’s Edmundus. Sic* in original.

P. 181. *Warrewyck.* “Roger Earl of Warwick is said to have founded here the house of the Templars beyond the bridge, temp. H. I. or K. Steph., which was certified, 9 Ed. II., to be of the yearly value of 14*l.* 6*s.* 8*d.*; and, after the dissolution of that Order, became part of the preceptory of Balshall in this county, belonging to the Knights Hospitallers.” (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Warwicksh. xxxi.)

P. 183. *Templecoumbe. i.e.* Temple Combe, in Somersetshire.

“Before the year 1185, Serlo fil Odonis gave this whole village to the Knights Hospitallers of St. John of Jerusalem, and thereupon it became a preceptory of that Order, which had lands annexed to it, valued, 26 H. VIII., at 107*l.* 16*s.* 11*d.* per ann. as Dugdale and Speed; and 128*l.* 7*s.* 9*d.* as MS. Le Neve. The site was granted, 34 H. VIII., to Richard Andrews and Leonard Chamberleyn.” (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Somersetsh. xv.) Surely it was originally granted to the Templars, not Hospitallers, as our extent proves.—Ed.

*Wilton.* I have been unable to determine which of the Wiltons this is.

P. 184, l. 7. *Sic* “decen’.” Probably a clerical error for “decimo.”

P. 185. *Hidon.* Probably Hydon Grange, alias Charterhouse Grange, in the parish of Witham Friary.

*Cleyhangre. i.e.* Clayhanger, in the parish of Comb St. Nicholas, near Chard.  
Last line but 3. “*Robis armigeri.*” “Robis” in extenso, *sic*.

P. 186. *Pagettis.* In original “pagett,” and it may be extended “pagetorum”—subaudito “in stipendiis.”

*Senescalli tenentis, &c.* In original “sen’ tenent’ cur’ et ps’ negocia dom.”

P. 187. *Roucle. i.e.* Temple Rockley, in the parish of Ogbourn St. Andrew, near Marlborough, Wilts.

“John Marescall gave a hide of land here to the Knights Templars, 2 H. II., who sent some of their fraternity hither and made it a preceptory. It came afterward to the Knights of St. John of Jerusalem, and was assigned toward the maintenance of their house at Saunford in Oxfordshire. This manor was granted, 32 H. VIII., to Sir Edward Bainton and Isabel his wife.” (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Wiltsh. xxx.)

P. 188. “*Que val.*” Implying that “val” must be extended “valent” not “valet.”  
*Chiryton.* Probably Cheriton, near Wincanton, on the borders of Wiltshire, not far from Temple Combe, Somersetshire.

P. 189. *Saunford. i.e.* Sandford, Oxon.

“The good Queen Maud, wife to King Stephen, gave the manor of Temple Covele or Cowley, in this county, to the Knights Templars, who made it a house of their Order, and placed a preceptor there, who was afterwards removed to Saunford; which manor these Knights got possessed of by the bounty of Sir Thomas de Saunford, Knt. (temp. Ric. I. vel Jo.), and soon after fixed here, as, upon their Dissolution, did the Knights Hospitallers, this being the chief residence of a preceptor and brethren, that had under their management most of the estates in Oxfordshire, Berkshire, Wiltshire, &c. belonging to that Order. This house was granted, 33 H. VIII., to Edward Powell.” (Tanner, Not. Monast. ed. Nasmith, Oxfordsh. xxv.)

“In Sandford sunt ix. hide et dimidia, quarum preceptor Templi de Covell tenet iij.

hidas et dimidiam per servicium dimidii feodi militis ad Wardam Castri de Windlesor per xvij. septimanas, xl d." (Rot. Hund. 39 H. III., vol. ii. p. 39.)

P. 189. *Templecoulee. i.e.* Cowley, or Temple Cowley.

"In Covet sunt vij hide, quarum preceptor Templi tenet iij de feodo Comitibus de Buloyne, et j hidam et dimidiam de honore Walingford, et solvit annuatim pro dicta hida et dimidia Reginaldo de Chissebech xv s., non sequitur hundredum." (Rot. Hund. 39 H. III., vol. ii. p. 39.)

"Preceptor de Couele et Fratres Milicie Templi habent de dono Regine domine Matildis, et confirmatione Regum Anglie, in villa de Couele, in puram et perpetuam elemosinam, tres hydas terre, cum pertinentiis, quarum ipsi Fratres tenent unam in dominico, et eorum nativi tenent alias duas, scilicet, octo virgatas terre, et solvunt redditus et opera ad voluntatem dictorum Fratrum." (Rot. Hund. 7 E. I., vol. ii. p. 723.)

*Garsyngdon. i.e.* Garsington, Oxon.

"In Garsindon Fratres Hospitalis Sancti Johannis extra Portam Orientalem Oxonie tenent unam hidam terre de dono domini Regis, quam emit ad opus eorum de Alicia de Colevill, reddendo per annum xx s. Priori de Walingford, et est de honore de Walingford, et non sequitur hundredum." (Rot. Hund. 39 H. III., vol. ii. p. 39.)

Last line but 5. It is vij acre prati, pretium acre ijs. . . . xvij s.

P. 190. *Meriton.* "Magister Milicie Templi in Anglia tenet in manerio de M'iton duas carucatas terre, que tenentur in capite de domino Rege, per confirmationem predecessorum suorum Regum Anglie, qui dederunt eas fratribus Militie Templi in Anglia in liberam, puram, et perpetuam elemosinam, et fuit antiquitus pertinens ad manerium de Hedindon," &c. &c. &c. (Rot. Hund. 7 E. I., vol. ii. p. 715.)

In M'iton sunt ix hide, quarum Templarii tenent v. hidas in puram elemosinam, ex dono domini Symonis Comitibus Bulonie, et Robertus Dikel tenet ij hidas de feodo de Pidenton, perservicium tercię partis unius (*sic*) domino Regi faciendum. Et predicti Templarii tenent unam hidam de eodem feodo in quam habuerunt ingressum per Guidonem le Batiller avum dicti Roberti; et nullum faciunt inde servicium, nec faciunt aliquam sectam." (Rot. Hund. 39 H. III., vol. ii. p. 39.)

This is the same place as Merton in the hundred of Bullington, though locally situated in the hundred of Ploughley, three and a half miles from Bicester.

*Horspath.* "In Horspathe sunt vij. hide et dimidia, quarum preceptor Templi de Covet tenet v. hidas, ad feodi firmam, de domino R. Comite Cornubie, per servicium xij marcarum et dimidie, et est de feodo Sancti Walerici; non sequitur hundredum. Item idem preceptor tenet unam hidam et unam virgatam terre quam habuit de dono Ricardi filii Johannis." (Rot. Hund. 39 H. III., vol. ii. p. 39.)

P. 191. *Overhorspath.* "Eadmundus Comes Cornubie tenet in villa de Overhorspath vij. virgatas terre, cum pertinentiis, que sunt de honore predicto, de domino Rege in capite, quas Magister Milicie Templi in Anglia tenet de eodem Comite per iij. libras argenti et

x s. eidem Comiti anuatim solvendis, faciendo etiam sectam Curie de North Osene, de tribus septimanis in tres septimanas, et servitium regale quantum pertinet ad dimidium feodum militis; assunt etiam tenentes in eodem feodo, qui tenent viij. predictas virgatas terre de magistro in villenagio, faciendo eidem servitium inde pro voluntate sua." (Rot. Hund. 7 E. I., vol. ii. p. 716.)

P. 191. *Littlemore.* "In Littlemor sunt iiij. hide, quas Templarii de Couel tenent de Comite de Leycestrie, in quas habuit ingressum per Rogerum de Sancto Andrea, in tempore cujus debuit servitium feodi unius militis: non sequitur hundredum." (Rot. Hund. 39 H. III., vol. ii. p. 39.)

"Fratres milicie Templi tenent villam de Littlemor de dono Rogeri de Sancti Andrea. Et idem Rogerus feoffavit domum de Gerewedon de terra et dominico cum pertinenciis, quam modo Templarii tenent et habent per feoffamentum abbatis et conventus de Gerewedon, et tenent pro j. feodo militis, et debent scutagium, quando currit. Et ad illam villam pertinet piscaria in aqua Tamisie inter Sandford et Iftele, et dictus Rogerus legavit Priorisse et Conventui de Littlemor viij. solidos quos percipiunt annuatim ad capitale feodum de Littlemor pro anima dicti Rogeri." (Rot. Hund. 7 E. I., vol. ii. p. 723.)

P. 192. *Pro curias tenendo.* It is "p' Cur' tenend' et alia negoc' dom' p's." The word "alia" left no alternative in the mode of extending the passage.

"*Prebendor equorum.*" *Sic.* An error of the scribe for "prebendis."

*Priorisse de Littlemore.* V. previous note on Littlemore, *supra.*

*Cheselbeche.* V. a previous note on Cowley to p. 189.

P. 193. *Bradewell.* *i.e.* Broadwell, Oxon.

"Templarii tenent in eadem Bradewell ij. carucatas terre, ut in dominico, in puram et perpetuam elemosinam, de dono Alani de Limeseye, preterea predicti Templarii tenent in eadem j. hydram terre de Priore de Brumesfeud, et debent eidem Priori de redditu per annum iiij. marcas. (Rot. Hund. 7 E. I. vol. ii. p. 695.)

*Werpgrave cum Esyndon.* *i.e.* Warpsgrove, Oxon.

"Magister et Fratres Milicie Templi in Anglia tenent et habent villam de Werpgrave, cum pertinenciis, set per quod warantum nesciunt, tam de dono quondam Ricardi Foliot militis, quam de dono heredum ipsius Ricardi. Et est dominus Thomas de Parco medius inter dictos Magistrum et Fratres et Willelmum de Scalebroc, et dictus Willelmus de Scalebroc medius est inter predictum dominum Thomam et Comitem Lincolnie: et jacet tota villa de Werpgrave, cum pertinentiis, pro una hida terre, et tenetur eadem villa de predicto domino Thoma de Parco per feodum unius militis, et debet sectam curie eidem domino Thome et ad hundredum de Ewelme," &c. &c.

"Magistri et Fratres milicie Templi tenent et habent villam de Esindon, cum omnibus suis pertinenciis, ut inquiri pot', de dono quondam domini Radulphi de Sunelieworthe militis, et tenent in capite de domino Ada Dispensario, faciendo inde eidem servitium feodi unius dimidii militis et sectam curie ad hundredum de Ewelme, de tribus septimanis in

tres septimanas, et habent ibidem in dominico unam virgatam terre cum pertinentiis, &c. &c. (Rot. Hund. 7 E. I., vol. ii. pp. 755, 756.)

P. 194. *Wolveye*. Probable Wolvey, Warwickshire.

“The Templars, 1 E. II., had here the rent of assize, and 40s. rent from a watermill and a windmill, which possessions were anciently held by them of Alan la Zouch.” (Dugdale’s Warwickshire, 46 a.)

*Herberbury*. *i.e.* Harbury, alias Herberbury, Warwickshire.

“Of these possessions here in Herberbury that were of Clinton’s fee, in 31 H. II., it was certified that the Templars held five yards of land, part of which were given by Geoffrey de Clinton, and part by Henry his son, against whom, 2 Jo., the Templars required warrantry, which land, 7 E. I., was certified to be j. carucate, two yards, and eight acres, all held by six freeholders, besides two cottages. It was then also certified that the said Templars held five yards in demesne of Robert FitzOdo.” (Dugdale’s Warwickshire, 265 b.)

Last clause. *Que allocantur*. This probably refers to Wolvey as well as Herberbury, and perhaps also to Stodleye.

“Ralph de Hastings gave this manor, A.D. 1152, to the Knights Templars, who established here a preceptory of their Order. After their dissolution, this estate seems to have gone to the Lord Darcy, not to the Hospitallers.” (Tanner, *Not. Monast.* ed. Nasmith, Yorksh. lviii.)

## SEDELESCOMB.

There has been much difficulty in identifying this manor, owing to the confusion caused by the Hospitallers possessing property, under the same name, in two different parts of the county, *viz.*, the above manor in one part, and the advowson of the church of Sadelescombe in another.

It was only after all the sheets had been worked off, that my friend Mr. Blaauw kindly pointed out to me the errors into which Tanner and others had thus fallen, by confounding the two Sadelescombes together. I am indebted to his kindness for permission to insert the following note of explanation:—

**SADLESCOMBE.**—The Preceptory of the Templars was situated in the parish of Newtimber, about five miles N.W. from Brighton, and after the dissolution of that Order, the manor, given them by Jeffrey de Say, was seized into the King's hands, and ultimately given to the Hospitallers. In Cotton MS. Nero E. vi. ff. 269, 270, are deeds by which Philip de Thame, Prior of the Hospitallers, granted, A.D. 1342, a lease of this manor to Thomas de Nerford and his wife for their lives, and after their deaths the manor reverted to the Hospitallers. There are some errors in Tanner and the Monasticon, confusing this manor with the advowson of the church of Saddlescombe (now called Selsecombe, a parish near Battle), respecting which the MS. Placita de Banco, 9 Hen. III. rot. 18 (not 28, as in Tanner), records that the Prior of the Hospitallers recovered it by a lawsuit on the death of the incumbent. The parish church where the preceptory was situated never belonged to it.

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL

THE CAMDEN SOCIETY,  
ELECTED 2nd MAY, 1855.

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THE Council of the Camden Society, elected on the 2nd May, 1855, regret to have to announce that their year of office has been marked by the deaths of several colleagues. They have especially to lament the loss of the Lord Viscount STRANGFORD,—a nobleman distinguished by literary attainments as much as by courteous and kindly bearing, and the warm interest he took in archæological and historical literature. The Society will remember that Lord Strangford was not only a member of the Council for several years, but that he edited for the Society *The Household Expenses of the Princess Elizabeth during her Residence at Hatfield, from Oct. 1551 to Sept. 1552*, which is printed in the second volume of the Miscellany.

By the death of JOHN ADAMSON, Esq., a gentleman distinguished, like Lord Strangford, by intimate acquaintance with the literature of Portugal, the Society also lost a most accomplished Member. Since its formation, he added to his duties as Secretary of the Society of Antiquaries of Newcastle-upon-Tyne that of Local Secretary to the Camden Society.

Passing from their obituary record, which must yearly be a subject of regret, to the other branches of the Society's affairs, the Council have nothing to report but what is favourable. The Report of the Auditors gives evidence to the continued financial prosperity of the Society. The balance in favour of the Society at the end of the financial year was £327 14s. 3d.

But for the Camden Society, aided by the friendly assistance of NOTES and QUERIES, the MS. of these letters might have remained unpublished in the possession of the gentleman to whom it belongs, and to whose liberality in permitting its publication the Society is greatly indebted.

An English Chronicle of the reigns of Richard II., Henry IV., Henry V., and Henry VI., written before the year 1471. Edited by the Rev. JOHN SILVESTER DAVIES, M.A., of Pembroke College, Oxford.

This addition to our national Chronicles will no doubt be received with great satisfaction by the members. In this instance, also, the Society is indebted to the liberality of the owner of the MS. for its publication; and that gentleman has an additional claim to their thanks, in having superintended the work through the press.

The third publication for the year will be—

Extent of the Estates of the Hospitalers in England. Taken under the direction of Prior Philip de Thame, A.D. 1338; from the Original in the Public Library at Malta. Edited by the Rev. LAMBERT B. LARKING, M.A.

This has been delayed by the receipt of some fresh documents from Malta, discovered there by the research and industry of Dr. Vella and Mr. Winthrop, and kindly communicated by them to the Editor.

A list of the Members of the Society, which the Council have lately thought it right to publish, offers several subjects for comment with reference to the present state and prospects of the Society. Among these subjects is the pleasing circumstance of the number of permanent Libraries now subscribers to the Society. There are at this time on the list of the Society no fewer than 54 such bodies, scattered over the three kingdoms and the continent of Europe, and reaching to America, and even to Australia. Such Subscribers offer an evidence of the wide diffusion of the labours of the Society, and constitute an important guarantee for its stability.

The Council has, during the past year, added the following works to the list of suggested publications.

1. A Catalogue of the Library of St. Augustine, York ; from the Original MS. in the Library of Trinity College, Dublin. To be Edited by the Rev. JAMES HENTHORN TODD, D.D. &c.

2. Compositions for not receiving the Honour of Knighthood, tempore Henry VIII., Elizabeth, James I., and Charles I.

3. A Collection of Papers connected with the Proceedings of the Two Parliaments in 1640. From the Surrenden MSS. To be Edited by the Rev. LAMBERT B. LARKING, M.A.

The Council have also had under consideration several other proposals of considerable interest ; amongst them one the circumstances of which it is right to record in their report. Immediately on the publication of the third and fourth volumes of Mr. Macaulay's History of England the Council communicated with the Warden and Fellows of All Souls' College, Oxford, on the subject of printing *The Diary of Narcissus Luttrell*, the curiosity and value of which had been so clearly pointed out by Mr. Macaulay. The Council have little doubt, from the manner in which their communication was received, that the College would have accorded them permission to print the work, had not the Delegates of the Clarendon Press notified to the authorities of All Souls, very shortly afterwards, their anxiety to undertake its publication. Pleased as the Council would have been to have given to the world a Diary of so much promise, they felt that it was in accordance with the principles of this Society not to interfere with any of the ordinary channels of publication, and they therefore yielded to the claims of the Clarendon Press. In this and every other matter submitted to their attention the Council have endeavoured to promote in every way the well-being of the Camden Society, and the object for which that Society was established—the interests of English Historical Literature.

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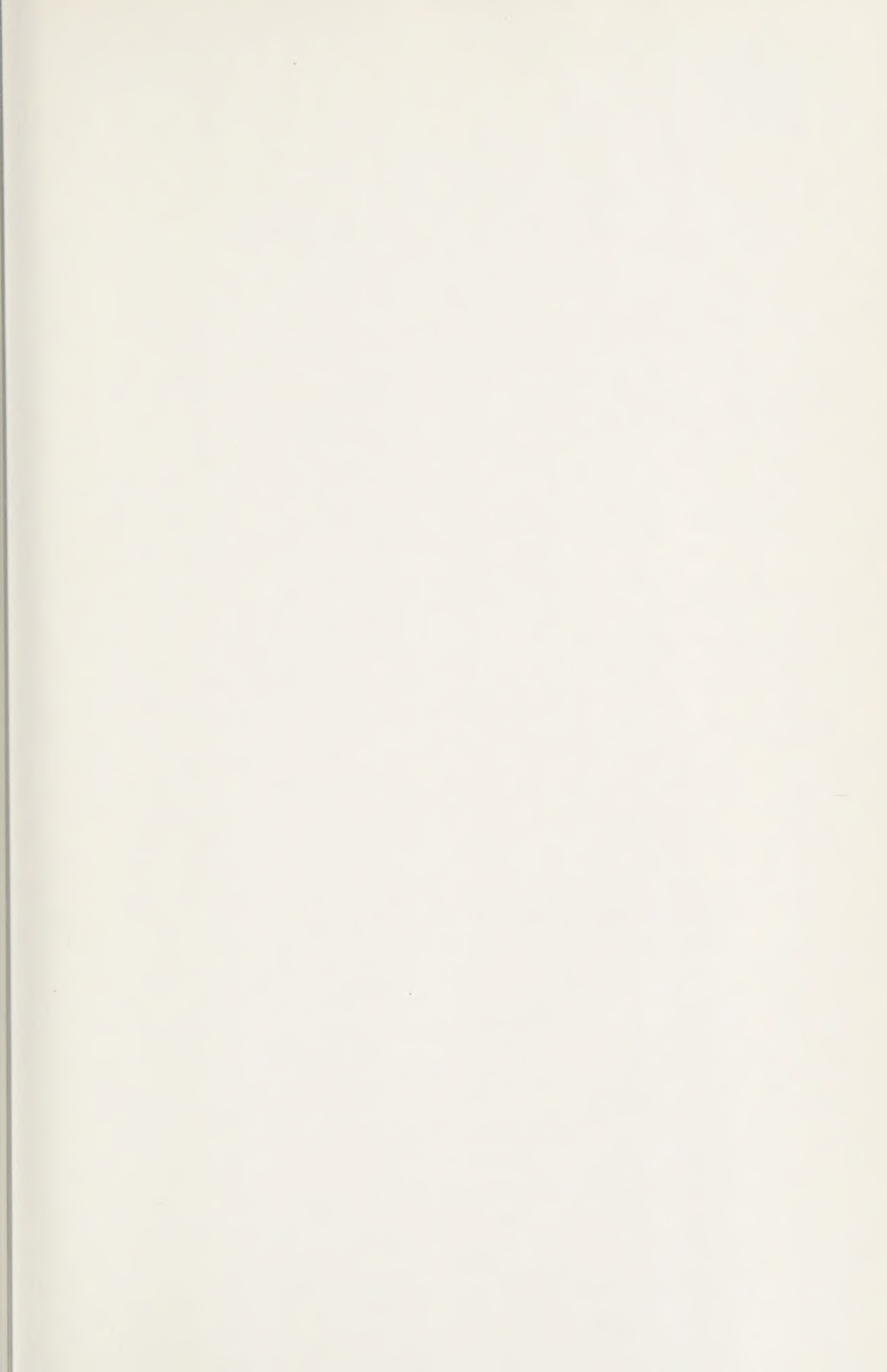
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
