## ALUMNI ADDRESS

FRED HARPER, '91, LYNCHBURG, VA.

Mr. Toastmaster, Distinguished Guests, Brother Alumni:

I am so conscious of the honor that has been conferred upon me by the invitation to address you on this occasion, and I frankly confess that I take so much pride and pleasure in the service, that I feel my first words should be an acknowledgment of the debt which the distinction creates and a pledge of the affectionate loyalty for our *Alma Mater* which prompted my acceptance of the invitation rather than the assumption of any special fitness for the performance of the task. And so, in preface to my remarks, I beg to assure you of the very great pleasure it gives me to be here today, and of my keen sense of obligation for the distinguished privilege of this place upon your program.

To be perfectly honest, I feel just a little bit strange and, if I may use the word, "un-at-home." While I admit it to be in large measure my own fault, I feel more like a visitor in a new, although a graciously hospitable, household than I do like a son who has returned after many years to his old homestead. For, little as I relish it, I realize that I belong to the old regime. My college associations were of other days; and my experiences were in another place and with other conditions.

Yet, while this is true, and naturally accounts for my diffidence, I feel that, in a way, I am peculiarly qualified to attend any gathering of Trinity alumni; for, although I was, probably, the youngest graduate upon whom she ever conferred a degree, I was, perhaps, the oldest in length of attendance. I spent six years as a student within her hospitable domain. Beginning with a year in the old preparatory school, I took the full A. B. course and then spent an additional session after graduation in studying law under Ben Nicholson and helping to wallop the University of Virginia at football. Both of them were very commendable enterprises and are mentioned now in the inverse order of their relative importance as they appeared to me then.

It is because of those years of association with the old place that my mind now naturally dwells upon the contrasts which are presented between the Trinity of today and the Trinity of the old days which I knew and loved so well.

When I look at the splendid structures which compose the present establishment, magnificent as they are, majestic and commanding, I think of the single modest old building in the quaint little village of Trinity—over which some of us could kick a football with comparative ease, occasionally taking out a window light with a misguided attempt.

I compare the present fine campus and its wide expanse of well-kept grounds with the old campus of few acres and many weeds, wherein the broom straw grew with a rank luxuriance that ofttimes provided a welcome shelter at night when old Professor Heitman was crowding us a little too closely along the regular "trade routes." I see again the old bell, which was the recognized neighborhood timepiece, and whose tolling curfew was accepted as a signal to retire—*sometimes*, and at others as an invitation to repeated encores by the Ancient and Honorable Volunteer Company of Nocturnal Bell Ringers who were generally mustered in on the campus on the dark of the moon and usually mustered out very shortly thereafter anywhere in the woods to which we had been chased—sometimes more than a mile from home.

When I see the attractive halls and dormitories equipped with all the modern conveniences, I think of "Uncle" Benson Parker's and "Father" Hundley's boarding houses with all the ancient inconveniences. I think of the converted barber shop next to Lineberry's store in which I lodged for a year with

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Tom Daniels for a room mate; and of our little six-inch stove, specially designed to burn the chips from the other boys' woodpiles. It was one of my first lessons in the value of by-products and the conservation of *waste* material. And I see the black and buxom Julie Parker march forth with stately tread and play so perfect a tune on the dinner bell that Byron, had he heard her, would have been ill content with his wholly inadequate expression—"tocsin of the soul."

When I see your splendid athletic field and gymnasium equipment, I think of the old ball field with its outcroppings of solid rock, upon whose unyielding surface we daily flung our young flesh and bones with a youthful abandon that was truly heroic and with a result more sanguinary than soothing. And instead of having our frequent wounds cared for by experts in antiseptic surgery, how we stoically, if unwisely, bathed them in the handy dust in order to insure a thick and "healthy" scab. It is a wonder we didn't all die of blood poison before reaching our Sophomore year. And we probably would have except for the fact that no self-respecting germ dared to bite us.

When I see the beauty and attractiveness of your fair coeds—living right here at hand, I think, with a sense of loss and deprivation that is yet keen and poignant after all these years, of the distinctly masculine old place, with Thomasville Female College a six-mile walk and G. F. C., like Sheridan at the Battle of Cedar Creek, "twenty miles away." It may be true that "distance lends enchantment to the view" of azure mountains, but it has no such effect upon lovely woman's eyes, of whatever color they be. And many of us learned to our dismay that "absence makes the heart grow fonder"—of the other fellow.

And while here you have the thriving and bustling city of Durham in whose varied industries you can study the practical workings of the scientific theories of your text books, there the class in industrial science had to travel all the way to the metropolis of Randleman to see a cotton mill in operation. And after the first trip was spent about "fifty-fifty" between the mill and the hotel parlor, singing "In Old Madrid" with the landlord's daughter, the other visits were indefinitely postponed as being of doubtful educational value.

When I meet your present large and cultured corps of professors and instructors, maintained in dignity and comfort and drawing, I hope, at least compensatory emoluments, I think of the old faculty—real patriots they were—with their heads full of learning, their hearts full of loyalty and their pockets full of emptiness, even on the semi-occasional pay days.

In passing, it is a pleasure to note that at least one of that devoted band has been spared to this day after more than forty years of continuous loyal service. And I was delighted to see in the gracious dedication of this year's *Chanticleer* an evidence that the student body of today, like those of the days gone by, entertain the highest regard and warmest affection for that "noblest Roman of them all"—Professor William H. Pegram. Indeed to the eye and to the outward seeming, the contrasts presented are many and striking, and all to the advantage of the Trinity of today. But I love to believe that the differences relate to the physically material things only; and that in spirit, in splendid aspirations, in devotion to high ideals, in desire for Christian service and public usefulness, the Trinity of old, the Trinity of today, and the Trinity of the days to come, *are one and the same magnificent institution*.

A year or two ago I revisited the old place for the first time since I left in the fall of '91. "Uncle" Benson Parker had heard I was coming and was sitting on his porch in the sunshine waiting to welcome me. I had noted with a thrill of fond recollection every turn in the road as I approached the familiar scenes. I recognized with delight every house and every tree. And as I stopped at the gate and went in to speak to my old friend, whose aged and wrinkled face lighted with pleasure as he grasped my hand, the tears of tender memory sprang to my eyes. We sat there and talked of the old days; we recalled this friend and that whom we had known and loved; and with softened voices we spoke of some we had lost forever. And there was a touching significance in the finality with which he bade me farewell.

And then I went to wander about the grounds and to walk through the old building. It was an experience of mingled emotions. A thousand pleasant memories thronged my brain, for,

> "Still o'er those scenes my memory wakes, And fondly broods with miser care; Time but the impression deeper makes As streams their channels deeper wear."

And as I stood in the old chapel and felt the spirit presence of the classmates and friends who had so often gathered there with me, I read with a fuller understanding than ever before the old Latin inscription on the wall—"Haec olim meminissi juvabit."

But the old place was neglected and falling into decay. The windows were broken; the doors were unhinged; the floors were rotting and giving way. And my footsteps gave out that hollow and haunting sound known only to deserted and neglected places.

I was almost sorry I had gone; and, as I turned away with a heavy heart, I said to myself: "The old Trinity is dead."

But with a moment's thought I realized I was wrong. It was but the husk of the grain upon which I had gazed—the empty seed-pod shriveling on the abandoned stalk. The living grain, the virile seed, had been transplanted in a more fertile soil and had grown and flourished and brought forth richer harvests than could have been possible in the old fields. The old Trinity was not dead. It was rejuvenated and revivified and grown more stalwart. And it was still serving the State and the country with its old devotion but with greater power; with its old faithfulness but with broader opportunities; with the same ideals but with magnified capacity for service. And with this thought in mind my head lifted with pride and I departed, my heart thrilling with gladness.

And so it is that, while my tender recollections persist in picturing our "kind mother" in the modest old home, my affection for her and my pride in her are all the greater because she has moved into a handsomer house and is now enjoying the comforts and advantages of which she has always been worthy but of which she was so long deprived.

To those of you who are younger, who know only the Trinity of today, and who may think I have spent too much time in talking of old days, I can only say:

> "When time has past and seasons fled, Your hearts will feel like mine; And aye the song will maist delight That minds ye o' lang syne."

However, to my mind, occasions such as this are designed not merely for social intercourse; not only for indulgence in pleasant reminiscences and renewal of old friendships; but also that those who have a common bond of interest might take counsel together for the common good; and for the discussion and consideration of those questions that have relation to the welfare, the prestige and the enlarged usefulness of *Alma Mater*.

For this reason, if I may be permitted to do so, I desire to speak briefly upon a subject which appears to be peculiarly appropriate to this occasion. I do not claim that there is any novelty in it and I doubt if I shall be able to say anything new or interesting in discussing it. But there are some things we cannot too frequently call to mind and which we are always a little better for having seriously considered. The subject I now have in my thoughts is one of them—"The Duty of An Alumnus to His *Alma Mater.*" It sounds trite and obvious; and it is. And it is probably because of this that there are many of us who do not give it the consideration it deserves.

When a young man finishes his college course and goes out into the world, he severs his direct official connection with his college, it is true. But he no more severs the indefinable, but very real, bond which unites him with it than he does the tie of blood which binds him to his kinsmen when he reaches maturity and starts in life for himself. The blood which flows

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in his veins and stamps him as a member of a particular family, with all that that implies, is no more real an influence in his life than is the mental and moral training that he has received during his college course. And just as the one carries with it obligations and duties that may not be disregarded without loss of self-respect, so the other places upon him equally definite duties and obligations that should not be neglected nor forgotten.

The payment of matriculation and tuition fees does not square the account between a student and his college. As well might he undertake to pay with money for the nurture and training of his parents. There is something more than mere legal significance in the phrase "*in loco parentis*" as applied to a college. And just as the duty rests upon a son to wear worthily the name he bears, so the duty rests upon an alumnus to be worthy of his *Alma Mater*.

There is but one effective way in which a college can advertise. By her fruits ye shall know her. She may print a whole library of catalogues and distribute them broadcast; she may enroll upon her faculty roster the names of great educators; she may fill her treasury to overflowing with endowment funds; she may erect stately buildings, and "make broad the phylacteries" of her physical equipment. But these are all merely static forces—mere potentialities. The real dynamic influence which spreads her fame abroad and exploits her before the world is the body of men and women whom she sends out into life certified as her approved mental and moral product.

Education—collegiate education—is, fortunately, much more general than it once was. The man with a college diploma is less an exception to the general rule than he used to be. And yet he is still sufficiently so to make him a marked man in almost any community. By virtue of his equipment and training he is advertised as possessing a capacity for usefulness and service above his fellows. And whenever that capacity exists, the duty of its unselfish exercise is imperative. This is, of course, a mere truism as applied to one's general duty in life. But there is a special obligation in this regard upon an alumnus of any educational institution, because that portion of the world with which he comes in contact is not only watching and studying and measuring him, it is also watching and studying and measuring his *Alma Mater* through him. It is only a matter of justice and fairness, therefore, that he should worthily represent her.

The institution itself, for all its physical equipment, is, in a way, something abstract. The world does not come into close contact and association with it. But an alumnus is something concrete. He is a practical example, a physical, understandable and factory-marked product. And he should be ever mindful of the fact that, to a measurable extent, he carries the reputation and fair fame of his college in the hollow of his hand.

And I do not mean by this that the duty of which I speak is to be performed only by conspicuous public service which attracts the eyes of the world at large. I have little sympathy with the collegiate pride which prompts the boast that so many Senators, so many Congressmen, so many bishops and so many judges are among her alumni. Isolated examples of personal prominence may be due to many influences and circumstances wholly dissociated from college training. But I refer to the duty of exemplifying in every-day life all those things for which Alma Mater stands; the duty of taking an active interest in the intellectual and educational life of the community; the duty of honest conduct, clean living, right thinking, kindly actions, human sympathy and ethical culture. These are as potent for good in the world when practiced by a farmer as they are when displayed by a Senator. They are as commendable and community-serving in a lawyer as in a judge; in a deacon as in a bishop; in a merchant as in a Member of Congress. And because of the greater number of alumni in private life the combined influence of their conduct is immeasurably greater and more far-reaching. And the exercise of that influence is, or should be, the ultimate end of all collegiate education.

In the uneducated man, his traits of character are generally

attributed to his family associations and training. Of course this influence is felt in all lives. But in the eyes of the world the character and conduct of a college graduate is attributed in very large measure to the influence of his college training. And this is properly so; for he receives that training during the formative period of his life when his character is actually in the moulding.

So that it is quite true that the alumni are the fruits by which the *Alma Mater* is known. They are her advertisements of her mission and her capacity. It follows, therefore, that each alumnus should so guide his conduct, so live his life, in whatever field he may elect to live it, that the advertisement may not be misleading; that each father who knows him may see in him an example he would have his son to emulate; and, knowing where the training was received which has flowered in that example, may desire the same influences and training for that son; and that the son may desire them for himself.

The French have a phrase for what I mean that is difficult to translate into English, and yet you are all familiar with it and understand it. It is *noblesse oblige*, the obligations of nobility—the duty of proper conduct. It is particularly applicable to the thought I am trying to impress, for, the duty of which I speak is one the performance of which no power on earth can compel except the power of one's inner consciousness of right and true nobility.

I would not be true to this occasion and would leave unspoken my honest convictions, if I did not now declare that in my opinion no institution in this broad land has more just cause for pride in her alumni and in the performance of their filial duty toward her than has our *Alma Mater*—Trinity College. In sturdy manhood, in high character, in mental attainments, in Christian faith, and in moral stamina, they are the peers of any group of men which any institution may call her sons. And in loyalty and affection for their *Alma Mater* I believe they are the superiors of any others, not only because they recognize their duty to cherish those sentiments, but because there is so much about our *Alma Mater* to justify them and keep them ever warm. Now I realize that I have said nothing new. I have brought no new message to you. I know I have, in a way, sermonized —a very dangerous thing for a lawyer to attempt. But, as I said a moment ago, there are some truths that we cannot too often call to mind, however patent and obvious they may be. And this must be my excuse for repeating today what I am sure you all realize to be such a truth, for you have exemplified it in your own lives very much more effectively than I have done.

I can only say for myself that, while I have strayed from the Methodist fold and have turned Episcopalian, I did so with the specific mental reservation that I would retain my Methodist privilege of reconversion when I had fallen from grace and become a backslider. And now that I realize my shortcomings as an alumnus, and am convicted of my sins, I have become revived by the wholesome experiences of this visit, and now profess conversion to the doctrines of my own preaching. And I pledge myself to a better performance in the future of my duty as an alumnus to my cherished and our beloved *Alma Mater*.

## ABRAM WEAVER, GEORGETOWN, TEXAS

Sixty-five intervening years! Revolutions marked the steps of human progress; nations rose and fell; long-established dynasties, seemingly born for immortality, passed away forever; new dynasties arose; thrones crumbled into dust; and a whole generation of men found rest in the grave during these sixty-five momentous years. Changes, mutation, and decay sit enthroned upon all sublunary things.

> "There is no death. The stars go down to rise upon a brighter shore; And in heaven's glorious canopy, They shine forevermore."

The world moves. The trend is onward and upward. The better things succeed. Weakness yields to strength. Ignorance gives way to wisdom. Light succeeds darkness. Each revolution of the wheel of time lifts the world to a higher and a brighter destiny.

We have a manifest illustration of the upward movement of human affairs in the growth and expansion of Trinity College. When the diminutive educational seed was first planted in the woods of Randolph County seventy-eight years ago, the wisest seer might have written, "It doth not yet appear what it shall be," and had he predicted a little of its future greatness and usefulness, he would have been regarded as a lunatic, and sent to the asylum.


> "Mighty rivers from little fountains flow, Giant oaks from little acorns grow."

The foundation of a great city was laid when a young man opened a little store or built a blacksmith shop upon the bank of the river. A few immigrants at the close of the day pitched their tents in the wilderness; it was the birth-place of a mighty empire. A little log school-house is built; it heralds the coming of a great college.

In 1850 Union Institute had attained its full development. More than one hundred students were in attendance, and the time of summer vacation had come. The oratorical display was held under the oak trees a hundred yards west of the Institute. The assembly numbered thousands. It was a gala day. Among the distinguished orators on that interesting occasion was the school clown who made sport for all. He spoke last, his theme was "The Politician," and he was a success. He came on the rostrum loaded down with huge volumes and an enormous manuscript ornamented with a blue ribbon. Dr. Craven introduced him as a "polished shaft," a great statesman, a splendid orator, and a distinguished philosopher. The orator arose, carefully adjusted his books, unrolled his manuscript and said, "Ladies and gentlemen, I am a candidate; please vote for me," and sat down. The vociferous applause of the multitude shook the branches of the trees, and thus closed the greatest and last annual commencement of Union Institute.

Early in February, 1851, as J. W. Alspaugh and myself came to the Institute, we were met by our classmate, J. W. D. L. F. Pearson, of Tennessee, who said, "Boys, we are a college." The little lame mule on which the mail was brought twice a week from High Point had arrived at sundown the previous evening, and had brought the news that the Legislature had incorporated Normal College.

While the bunch of students were congratulating each other on being a college, a man came into sight. He was not clothed in broadcloth then, nor did he wear a silk hat, but was otherwise decently attired. His steps were quick and firm, his head erect, his eyes upon the sky, about forty degrees above the horizon, his legs just long enough to reach the ground. He walked into the schoolhouse, tapped his little bell, and in a minute every student was in his seat, eager to hear what the President had to say about the college. He said nothing. He read a few verses from the Bible about Joseph in Egypt, made a short talk, and the recitations proceeded as if nothing unusual had happened. Thus we passed from the academy to the College, as noiseless as the travel of a star; no one sounded a trumpet, struck the bass drum, unfurled a banner, or cele-

brated a banquet. There was nothing new. Braxton Craven was Normal College. and Normal College was Braxton Craven. They were one and the same.

The Faculty of Normal College, during its first session, consisted of President Craven and Mr. Spears. But Dr. Craven was a host in himself, and Mr. Spears was an advanced student who found time to instruct some of the primary classes.

During the three years while I was a student at the school there was not a case of expulsion, or of public discipline. Dr. Craven was a master of assemblies. He governed without seeming to govern. He had but one rule: Every student must be a gentleman, and he was placed upon his honor.

With perfect ease Dr. Craven gained the respect and admiration of his students. They believed that he was the greatest man in North Carolina and that was about the same thing as to believe that he was the greatest man in all the world.

Dr. Craven was undoubtedly a great man, a great scholar, teacher, preacher, disciplinarian, and president. Shall we ever look upon his like again? His name is written among "the few, the immortal names that were not born to die."

Not long after Normal College was incorporated, Dr. Craven suggested to some of his students that the time had come when another literary society ought to be organized. Not that there was anything wrong with the Columbian, but that it was too large, and had become unwieldly. He also said, "All first-class colleges" had two societies. The movement was unpopular. None of the students wanted to withdraw from the Columbian Society. Dr. Craven was insistent. It seemed necessary to secure some of the most influential students to lead the movement in order to succeed. At length the necessary number of names was secured, and the Society was organized. Among the original members were J. W. Alspaugh, Marquis L. Wood, Simeon D. Peeler, J. W. D. L. F. Pearson, Abram Weaver, Mr. Doub, and Mr. Richardson; and about as many more whose names I cannot now recall.

Sixty-five years ago the Hesperian Literary Society was

launched upon its mission. After a voyage of more than half a century the old ship proudly rides the waves of time, her banner waving on the sky, her noble, loyal crew singing lustily:

> "Onward still we boldly move, Upward tends our every sigh, Onward rings in tones of love, Upward turns the deathless eye."

All the original members of the Hesperian Society, except me, are dead; they "have shot their bolt," and are resting in the stilly shades, "in the land that is fairer than day." Life is short.

> "Time is winging us away to our eternal home, To our eternal home, Life is but a winter's day, A journey to the tomb."

In closing this imperfect reminiscence, I shake hands (figuratively) with every Hesperian in all the world, and I bid each one a long, affectionate, and final adieu!

## A LETTER FROM BISHOP JOHN C. KILGO

## To the Alumni of Trinity College:

First of all I send you hearty greetings and salute you in the good name of your Alma Mater. You are indeed to be congratulated that you may call Trinity College Alma Mater. Among the sons of men there are none loved with such fine and steadfast devotion by their Mother-College as that with which Trinity loves her sons. Always watchful of you, jealous for you, and recording your successes with a holy pride, she has her supreme joy in you. In no period of her history, as you can well testify, did she hesitate to give into your lives all. and sometimes more than she had, being assured that you would make records of honor in every field of noble endeavor which would infinitely more than return to her the sacred rewards of her fidelity and labors. You know the story of her consecrated devotions. Through the strain of poverty she maintained her integrity and wrought ceaselessly for the training of her sons, and for the welfare of every great cause, never fearing to rebuke wrong as she bravely followed the path of truth and righteousness. Now that good fortune has come to her and she has larger resources, her heart is more tenderly sensitive about her sons, and her faith in God and in her country is more firmly fixed.

But with equal sincerity I may rejoice with your Alma Mater that she has such a noble body of sons and daughters. For all her love to them they return a full devotion to her. She and they are bound together by peculiar bonds only describable by what is meant when one speaks of the Trinity College spirit. This is not a momentary enthusiasm aroused to meet some passing event, or awakened interest in some incidental cause, but it is that steady consecration to every divine appointment for mankind and the sovereign claim of the Redeemer upon all men in every aspect and duty of life. To me it is such a distinct mark that I never fail to recognize it, and to find in its force the chief glory of Trinity's life. At the Alumni dinner during the recent commencement the soul of the family flowed deep and full. The secret of the fellowship which inspired the occasion was really known only to those who know the inner spirit of the old College. I do not believe there is in all the other colleges of the world anything like it. To keep this spirit alive and pure and vigorous should be the constant care of every son of Trinity, and I have the good confidence that it will be the concern of each of them.

As I looked upon the distinguished company of men of all ages and callings who crowded the large hall at that dinner, I gave thanks for them, and for the College that had made them, and I greatly rejoiced that their Alma Mater had justly come into the leading place among southern colleges. I felt constrained to ask these men again to make a tangible expression of their devotion to their college, and stirred by the impulse of their presence and the flow of their spirits, I announced to them my purpose to devote my spare time during the coming year to lead them in presenting to the College a new gymnasium, and the response of wild enthusiasm which they gave to the announcement was abundant assurance of their readiness. Nearly eighteen years ago the alumni erected at the College the Craven Memorial Hall, a handsome auditorium designed to commemorate the noble life of the heroic founder of the College. In its architectural form and detail there is nothing light and gaudy, but all is an expression of fine simplicity and strength, a fitting interpretation of the character it is set to celebrate. Now with a larger family again they are asked to present this useful and much needed building, and no true son of Trinity will grudgingly take part in it, but all will do it gladly as their enthusiasm at the mere mention of it amply demonstrated. There is nothing too good for Trinity College, for there is nothing good to which her sons are not committed.

It is well known to all alumni of the College that I am constantly under heavy pressure of work and can give to this joyous task only such periods of time as I may be able to wrench from other engagements. I greatly desire all to enter the work with a heartiness and voluntary generosity, and let this building stand as an expression of a free-will offering.

The next instalment of the interesting history of Trinity College by Professor E. C. Brooks will appear in the October issue. This series of articles has attracted a great deal of attention as it is the first attempt to write a connected history of the foundation and development of the College. The alumni are brought under very great obligation to the author for the labor he has devoted to collecting and preserving the material bearing on the early history of the institution.

It is with great pleasure that we are able to publish the article by Abram Weaver, of Georgetown, Texas. He has the distinction of having been a student in Union Institute, the preparatory school out of which Trinity grew. He was a student in Normal College and is the oldest man alive today who has been identified with the College in its different stages of development. It was a very appropriate and graceful act on the part of the alumni at the annual dinner to direct that a telegram be sent to Mr. Weaver conveying their good will and good wishes.

When Bishop Kilgo announced at the alumni dinner that he expected to undertake the task of raising the money necessary to build a new gymnasium to be erected near the athletic field, he was given a great ovation. Everyone present felt that the proposed gymnasium was already a reality. The alumni are urged to join in this movement to place on Trinity campus another memorial of their loyalty to their college. The attention of the readers is called to the letter from Bishop Kilgo published in this issue.

There were many expressions of appreciation of the attractive appearance of the campus on the part of the visitors at commencement. Alumni and old students who returned for the first time since the beautiful stone wall was built were astonished at the extent to which this wall had added to the appearance of the campus. The alumni of the College are placed under a lasting debt of gratitude to Mr. B. N. Duke for the generous gift which made this wall a possibility. Since commencement a large force of hands has been at work on the hill on the western part of the campus, and already great improvements have been made. The munificent gift of Mr. James B. Duke for the beautifying of the campus will make possible a still more attractive home for future generations of students. When the plans already made are carried out, few more beautiful and attractive places can be found anywhere than the Trinity campus.

The REGISTER congratulates itself and its readers on being able to present in this issue the splendid address delivered by Fred Harper at the meeting of the Alumni Association. It makes interesting reading and will be greatly enjoyed by all who have the opportunity of reading it. Those who were fortunate enough to hear the address will long remember the effectiveness of its delivery. With a rich and melodious voice, with a peculiarly attractive manner, the speaker charmed his auditors as he brought his message of loyalty and affection to his Alma Mater.

There is no alumnus of the College who will not be glad of the testimonials of esteem and affection which were given to Professor William H. Pegram at the recent commencement. At the close of the contest for the Wiley Gray medal Tuesday evening, a beautiful loving cup was presented to him by President Few in behalf of the two literary societies in recognition of the training he had given them, and as a token of the love the students of the College had borne for him for the past forty-three years.

The ovation which was given him at the alumni dinner when Fred Harper paid the beautiful tribute to him was evidence of the warm place he holds in the hearts of Trinity men.

The staff of the ALUMNI REGISTER feels gratified at the expressions of appreciation of the directory number issued in April. For the many letters of commendation the staff is very appreciative. The following letter from a prominent alumnus of the College will serve to show the sentiments of the alumni:

"While examining the last number of 'THE REGISTER,' I could not but be impressed with the value of the work you have done for Trinity men. It is a joy to be re-introduced to old friends heretofore lost in the great world because not located. You have been the cause of a mighty resurrection. I feel that you have won and deserve a high place in the esteem of the Alumni for these biographical notes, which are not only a remarkable contribution to the history of Trinity College, but also a lasting record of your unselfish devotion to its interests."

It will be of interest to the alumni to know the impression Trinity College makes on visitors. At the recent meeting of the North Carolina Medical Society held in Durham Mr. Wade H. Harris, Editor of the Charlotte *Observer*, spoke in Craven Memorial Hall. The following appreciative editorial written by Mr. Harris appeared in the Charlotte Observer, April 22.

"Trinity College may not get everything it asks for, but when there is a failure it may be safely set down that the thing wanted was unnecessary. This is as much as saying that Trinity College comes nearer getting everything it wants than any institution in the South. The people of Durham are inclined to hold up Trinity as the finest exponent of the modern educational plant in the country. There is much in evidence at the college to support this claim. The college has just begun to grow. If the friends of the institution could take a look 10 years into the future they would see an educational community of vast proportions. The decorative stone wall, two miles long, which has just been finished, is there for more than an ornamental purpose. It is to enclose what will be developed into the most attractively arranged college grounds in the State, the landscape plans to fit into the scheme having been completed. The setting of Trinity College becomes the more beautiful with each added touch and it would seem that never a day passes that some new touch is not given buildings or grounds. One catches a glimpse of much of beauty as the train passes by the frontage, but it is merely the stage curtain behind which is the scenery. For instance, one of Duke's latest sculptural gifts, "The Reaper," does not break upon the view of the visitor until almost immediately in front of Craven Memorial Hall, and in this hall, by the way, the architect seems to have solved the problem of acoustics. The hall will seat over a thousand people, but to the timid speaker it looks like it would seat a million. In auditorium construction and finish, it is what is commonly called 'the last word.' The standard of all the Trinity buildings is of the highest type. The college has been provided with the money to secure the best architectural talent and for the progressive development of a harmonizing effect. Some years ago Trinity College got a good deal of advertising by the expressed determination on part of the faculty to have only the legitimate in athletics. The faculty took a stand for clean football or none-and the college has none. Trinity has the distinction among Southern colleges of growing and flourishing without either football or hazing. The faculty has demonstrated that by taking a firm stand and keeping it, a high standard of athletics can be maintained and hazing can be suppressed. In that it is a distinctive college. At the same time it is undoubtedly a type of the more progressive educational institutions of the country."

It is the consensus of opinion that the commencement exercises at Trinity College this year were of unusual interest. From the beginning to the end there was a spirit of enthusiasm manifested on every side. All the invited speakers acquitted themselves with great credit. Indeed the commencement exercises at Trinity College have come to be among the most noted events in the Southern States. It would be hard to find anywhere larger and more appreciative audiences than those at the commencement exercises. It is a subject of frequent comment by the speakers that they seldom find anywhere more cultured and appreciative audiences. The following editorial from the Durham *Sun* will give some idea of the spirit of enthusiasm which the commencement exercises created :

Commencement exercises at Trinity with the prominent speakers, the spirit of college loyalty, and the enthusiasm of students, alumni and faculty, furnish an intellectual inspiration to the whole community.

"Trinity has been the leader in thought and action in North Carolina," said Senator Overman, an alumnus, at the alumni luncheon Tuesday.

Trinity has gained that leadership by the thoroughness of its training and the soundness of its ideals.

Leadership in ideas is the one great function of a college and President Few's splendid report to the board of trustees shows that it is just such leadership that Trinity aims at above everything else.

The coming of Former Governor Folk, of Missouri, as the commencement speaker is the climax to the series of inspirational addresses during the week.

The annual address of Bishop Kilgo, preaching the doctrine of hard toil to the graduates, was a timely and beneficial admonition.

The first duty of the college graduate is to work hard, and then to learn the secret of successful subordination until his own labor qualifies him for the leadership for which he is intended.

The baccalaureate sermon of Rev. John Herman Randall on the "Symmetrical Life," pointed out the needs of every man if he is to live a well-rounded life.

The country, and especially the South, takes note of the high standard that Trinity sets and Durham is proud that it receives much of the reflected credit.

## ON THE CAMPUS

Dr. Harry W. Laidler, of Columbia University, delivered a lecture before the students in Economics the last of April.

Dr. William H. Glasson, of the department of Economics, during the spring, gave a lecture at Princeton University on "The Experience of the United States with Military Pensions."

Mr. O. O. Atto, of the United States Weather Bureau, gave a lecture before the Science Club of the College on the subject, "The Weather Bureau: Its Work and Worth" the last part of May.

Dr. William H. Glasson, of the department of Economics, delivered a lecture before the members of the North Carolina Peace Society, in Durham, April 1, on the plans of the League to Enforce Peace.

Dr. W. S. Rankin, secretary of the State Board of Health, delivered two lectures before the college community during the spring, his subjects being "Personal Morality," and "Some General Health Problems."

Dr. Charles M. Andrews, professor of American History in Yale University, spent several days in the college community in April and delivered a lecture before advanced students in history on "Some Problems of History."

"Some Things Taught Only by Christianity" was the general subject of the Avera Bible Lectures delivered here by Bishop E. R. Hendrix, senior bishop of the Southern Methodist Church, in April. The lectures were largely attended.

Director W. W. Card gave a very interesting gymnasium exhibition at the Angier Duke Gymnasium on the evening of Tuesday, April 18. He was assisted in the exhibition by numerous students who have done extensive gymnasium work. Professor E. C. Brooks, of the department of education, has been appointed supervising editor of "The New Encyclopedia for the Young," a work which is to be produced under the editorship of Dr. M. B. O'Shea, of the University of Wisconsin.

Rev. Stuart L. Roussel, of Paris, France, in April, gave a lecture in the auditorium in East Duke Building on the subject, "The French Huguenots." His daughter, Miss Blanche H. Roussel, in native Alsatian costume, sang Alsatian folksongs.

The freshman class was the winner in the annual interclass track meet held in April, and was awarded the silver loving cup offered by the Tombs. Its score was forty-six points. Other scores were: sophomore class, forty; senior class, thirtytwo; and junior class, eight.

Mr. O. J. Coffin, at that time news editor of The Charlotte *Observer*, addressed the members of the Quill Club on the evening of Monday, April 3. His lecture was heard by numerous correspondents, newspaper men from the city and others. At the conclusion of the address, in which many helpful hints were given to the young journalists, the Campus Club served refreshments.

The fifth annual peace contest, in which all the leading colleges of the state participated, was held in Craven Memorial Hall on Saturday evening, April 1, and W. R. Shelton, Trinity '16, won the first prize, a check for seventy-five dollars, given by the National Peace Society. The second prize, a check for fifty dollars, was won by A. C. Reid, of Wake Forest College.

The college was also successful in winning both the intercollegiate debates this year. The evening of February 26, Messrs. W. R. Shelton, H. C. Greenberg, and W. W. Mathews successfully maintained against Washington and Lee University the affirmative of the query, "Resolved, That the proposed administration policy of armament increase is demanded by the best interests of the United States." On the evening of March 24, Messrs. J. H. Grigg, David Brady, and L. C. Allen won from Swarthmore College, Pennsylvania, the affirmative of the query, "Resolved, That an international police force should be established to enforce international treaties and agreements and maintain international peace."

An elaborate celebration of the tercentenary of the death of William Shakspere was held on the campus the last of April and was participated in by all the literary and social organizations of the city, as well as by the college. The celebration began Friday afternoon, April 28, the program consisting of the singing of some of Shakspere's sonnets, an address by President W. P. Few, the planting of a memorial tree, and an address by Colonel James H. Southgate. On Friday evening "The Lovers' Masque" was presented. The last feature of the celebration was the appearance of the Coburn Players on Monday and Tuesday, May 1 and 2, in "Hamlet," "The Taming of the Shrew," and "The Tempest."

## MR. B. N. DUKE ENDOWS LECTURESHIP AT TRINITY COLLEGE

Announcement was made June 9 of a gift of \$5,000 recently made to the College for the purpose of establishing a lectureship in honor of John McTyeire Flowers of the class of 1900. The foundation, to be called the "John McTyeire Flowers Lectureship in Christian Citizenship," is the gift of Mr. B. N. Duke, and is designed as a valuable agency in promoting sound citizenship. This new gift comes as a fitting climax to one of the most successful commencement occasions ever held at Trinity College.

Mr. Flowers was graduated from Trinity College with high distinction. He was endowed with rare qualities of mind and of character and especially had the gift of drawing to himself a body of strong friends. He entered life with great promise and soon took a leading place in business. The company with which he was connected sent him to China to take charge of their interests in Shanghai, where, on January 5, 1905, he died, and his remains were brought home and buried in Durham near his *Alma Mater*.

He was the son of Colonel and Mrs. George W. Flowers and was born in Alexander County, North Carolina, December 26, 1878. His father was a colonel in the 38th North Carolina Regiment and made a record which does immortal honor to the heroic traditions of his native state. John McTyeire Flowers inherited from his parents noble family traditions and was trained in all those high qualities of southern honor and chivalry. As a student he was especially interested in all civic questions, and the lectureship perpetuates that interest to which his heart was most sincerely devoted. Among the last conversations he had with his college president, Dr. Kilgo, in the enthusiasm of his youth he said: "I hope the day may come when I shall be able to do something worth while for Trinity, my Alma Mater." While this was not known, it is nevertheless one of those strange coincidences by which a purpose is fully realized.

Other similar foundations at the College are the Avera Bible Lectures, founded in 1897 by Mrs. E. B. McCullers, of Clayton, and an endowment given by the class of 1913 to establish a lectureship on civic, economic, and social questions.

## **COMMENCEMENT 1916**

The commencement exercises of 1916 are pre-eminent as probably the most generally enjoyable the College has had in the memory of those who now know it. The good-fellowship among the alumni who returned, and the eagerness of the large audiences who attended all the exercises to make their good will known whenever chance offered, endowed the occasion with the holiday atmosphere of a great family reunion. The visiting speakers caught and encouraged the general goodwill and were in turn stimulated by it. Not a speaker affected the formality of a manuscript; not a one affected the least indifference to his audience: everyone was pleasantly intent on impressing the message he had come to bring.

Bishop John C. Kilgo—"Dr. Jack"—came back to deliver the baccalaureate sermon Sunday evening, June 4. With all the uncompromising earnestness and good humor characteristic of him at his best he faced a packed Memorial Hall. He took as a suggestion of his address the statue of the "Sower" standing in front of Craven Memorial Hall and at Bishop Kilgo's request presented to the College by Mr. J. B. Duke about two years ago. He stressed two calls of this significant piece of sculpture to the students on the eve of leaving College: the call of vigorous struggle and the call to final dignity and glory in brave, steady work. The following excerpt from *The Morning Herald* of June 6 presents a summary of some of the main ideas Bishop Kilgo enforced:

Our whole life, according to the speaker, possesses a militant aspect, and is organized on the scale of warfare. Sometimes it is camp, sometimes march; sometimes it is defensive, sometimes offensive; sometimes it is pushing the enemy back, sometimes the enemy is pushing you back; sometimes it is victory, sometimes defeat.

The highest aspiration in the struggle of life, that of victory, comes only when the fighter accumulates mighty strength in the struggle. Success does not come in a lump, but rather in parts, and when it does come, it represents victories of other generations. The victor must always cultivate great strong virtues and graces. Education nowadays must be made to combine strength and fineness. Just as Athens and Rome both witnessed their final decline while at the height of their culture, so many men fail who are highly cultured. Culture must be taught, but not at the expense of strength and manhood. There must rather be a fusion of the two before success in anything is attained.

There are three prime things which teach us to be strong, brave and steady workers—the disposition to work, the energy to work, and the knowledge of how to work. The world is not full of idlers because of the fact that its people are ignorant of how to do something, but primarily because large parts of them are unwilling to do anything. The world wants workers who have power and strength, and it offers success only to this type of workers. Success is not the fortune which comes to man, but the object which he must go after himself.

In concluding, Bishop Kilgo said there was great joy in the achieving of something, the feeling and the realization of a conquest. And it is this joy that actuates a man to accomplishing something bigger. One victory is usually the foundation of another, and another, and until the victor becomes a veritable master.

For this occasion of Dr. Kilgo's sermon, as well as for the sermon of Tuesday morning, the regular commencement choir under the direction of Mr. T. Edgar Cheek rendered its usual effective service.

The sermon of Tuesday morning, June 6, was delivered by the Reverend John Herman Randall, D. D., of New York City. He proved himself to be a deliberate speaker with a reserve of intellectual and emotional force invariably sufficient to drive his ideas home. His text was from John 10:10: "I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly." A rough summary of the sermon is the following:

The mission of Jesus, we say, is to save men from sin. This is a mere negative statement. In the text Jesus states the idea positively: He came to save men to something, to save them to life, to awaken and to develop the all-round life. The symmetrical life has four dimensions: depth, breadth, length, and height. Life's depth is measured by one's thinking: thinking is the one faculty that distinguishes man from the lower animals. Life's breadth is measured by one's sympathies: it is invariably true that our life is as broad as our sympathy with the people and the things that are around us. Life's length is measured by one's deeds: our institutions fail if they do not train

students to translate their dreams into reality. Life's height is measured by one's aspirations, the wonderful power called aspiration that makes us wish to reach a higher plane than we are now on; makes religion possible and determines what height we shall reach in daily life.

After the sermon the alumni repaired to the gymnasium for their annual dinner and the alumnae to the Country Club. An account of the alumnae dinner is given by Miss Johnson elsewhere in this issue of the REGISTER, and the general tone of the dinner at the gymnasium is probably indicated sufficiently by the address of the leading speaker, Fred Harper, '91, printed in full by the unanimous vote of the association. The dinner was the regular genuine spread both in quantity and quality, and Mr. Harper's speech was the key-note of the banquet. No speaker forgot his time limit, and good fellowship was sounded on all sides. President Joseph G. Brown of the association, acting as toastmaster, called first on the representatives of the classes holding reunions, R. L. Durham, '91, Costen J. Harrell, '06, and N. I. White, '13. Then responded in order Dr. Randall, Senator Overman, Bishop Kilgo, Professor Flowers, and President Few. Bishop Kilgo when called to respond took occasion to notify the alumni that he was out for a new gymnasium for the College and that the alumni might prepare to respond loyally when they saw him on the way. The alumni present responded with hearty cheers. An unusually large number remained to the business meeting that followed the banquet. The first business transacted was the adoption of a telegram of good-will which Prof. Flowers was instructed to send on behalf of the association to Abram Weaver, a retired minister of Georgetown, Texas, ninety-one years old, who entered the College and finished before it ever granted degrees. Union Institute it was in 1848 when he entered, Normal College when he left it three and a half years later in 1851. After the singing of college songs and rapidly dispatching various matters of business the association elected the following members of the Board of Trustees for the College to serve terms of six years each: Albert Anderson, '83, Raleigh, N. C., and Joseph Henry

Separk, '96, Gastonia, N. C., and the following officers of the association were elected for the ensuing year: B. S. Womble, '04, president; Fred Harper, '91, vice-president; M. E. Newsom, Jr., '05, secretary and treasurer; and Prof. Flowers, chairman of the executive committee.

Without taking space to write of the exceptionally successful commencement exercises of the Trinity Park School or to tell of the various class and fraternity reunion dinners or of the Wednesday evening reception in honor of the graduating class, I shall attempt to give some idea of the three remaining programs of general interest to old students of the College.

The Wiley Gray oratorical contest of Tuesday evening brought out the following contestants to represent the graduating class: L. C. Allen, Apex, N. C., with subject, "Pan-Americanism"; J. H. Grigg, Lawndale, N. C., "The New Patriotism"; W. R. Shelton, Durham, N. C., "War and Its Aftermath"; and B. L. Smith, Granite Falls, N. C., "Dualism in Education." Mr. Shelton was the winner, the judges of the contest being, John Spencer Bassett, '88, Fred Harper, '91, and W. A. Lambeth, '01. The Braxton Craven medal, no longer given for highest scholarship average in College, but now awarded as the prize in an essay contest, was won by Miss Lucile M. Bullard, valedictorian of '16. The Columbia orator's medal went to B. L. Smith, '16; the debater's medal to L. C. Allen, '16; the freshman debater's medal to D. H. Peeler, '19, of course. The Hesperian medals were awarded as follows: orator's, R. W. Adams, '16; debater's, H. C. Greenberg, '17; freshman debater's, Harris Newman. Debating emblems awarded by the Tau Kappa Alpha debate club to members of the graduating class who have represented the College in two intercollegiate debates were presented to Messrs. J. H. Grigg and W. R. Shelton. The Athena Literary Society prize is awarded annually to the member of the society submitting the best short-story for publication in The Archive. The prize was awarded to Miss Sadie McCauley. The Fortnightly Club prose-fiction prize was awarded to J. W. Wallace; the non-fiction prose prize to M. G. Ellis.

All the prizes were presented to the winners by President Few in the same happy good-humor that characterized the commencement generally. The most enjoyable feature of the evening, and in some respects the most enjoyable feature of the commencement, was the presentation by the Hesperian and Columbian literary societies of a silver loving-cup to Prof. W. H. Pegram, who has been for forty-three years a teacher in the College and has trained in the mechanics of public speech generation after generation of college representatives. Prof. Pegram's simple overflowing appreciation of the affection represented in the cup and the delight of the audience in his pleasure are wonderful memories to carry with us after the rest of the occasion has lost its freshness. His three-minutes' acceptance of the gift was a piece of genuine eloquence many of us have never heard surpassed.

The last day of commencement, Wednesday, June 7, maintained the high standard of Sunday and Tuesday. The annual commencement address was delivered by ex-Governor Joseph W. Folk, of Missouri, whose subject was "Patriotism in Service." We reprint from *The Morning Herald* of June 8 the following extracts from his remarks:

"There was never a time when the principles of service and of brotherhood were more generally accepted between man and man than now; there never was a time when these principles were more generally disregarded among the nations of the earth than at present; but the morning of another day appears to be near. We are in the beginning of a new epoch—in world co-operation for the advancement of the common good. The public is no longer of one section or of one nation, but all mankind and the principles that interpret the heart-beats of humanity should now be applied between nations as they have long been between individuals.

"Men now living may see the day when the world will be ruled by right instead of might, by justice instead of selfishness. Men now living may see the day when the idea of public right will be controlling throughout the world. Out of the black clouds that now envelop the old world may come the remedy of a greater realization of the necessity for an international court of arbitration, with power to enforce its decrees. Then will dawn that new day foretold of old following the last great battle of the world when there will be peace on earth and good will in the hearts of children of men, and when each man's good will be all men's aim.


"But that time is not now, and as long as other nations are armed for offense, we have no option but to be prepared for defense. The American spirit is as strong today as it was in the days that gave birth to this Republic. There is now but one heart in all, and that the heart of America. If unhappily we should be drawn into the mighty conflict now desolating the old world, we would meet the emergency as one with a common and resolute purpose.

"The patriotism of service is an ideal. But ideals and ideas are the life of a free people. We are made and informed by the things that we cherish, and the public life of a nation is simply the reflection of its private life. Take away the ideals from the hearts of the American people and the strength of the nation would be gone. We may calculate our wealth as the sands of the sea; we may build the domes of our capitals and the spires of our churches until they pierce the clouds and glitter among the stars; all must fall and crumble away unless welded and strengthened by those principles of right, of justice, and of service that constitute the groundwork of an enlightened citizen. True to these principles we shall be the most powerful among all the nations of the earth, but forsaking these, the time will come when the proudest military engines will be as toys in our hands and our strongest naval armaments will be impotent and useless.


"In some other day, when we have struck to the heart that selfishness which is the real foe of our progress, the heights of achievement will be climbed and we shall stand face to face with the ideal and the true."

Parker, former professor of Biblical literature at Trinity and now head of the department of systematic theology in the Candler School of Theology, Emory University, Georgia; Doctor of Laws, Bishop John C. Bassett, of the class of '88, former professor of history at Trinity, now of Smith College, Massachusetts, and the most prolific writer of all the graduates of Trinity. ### HONORARY DEGREES

Honorary degrees were conferred on Dr. Franklin N. Parker, Bishop John C. Kilgo, Senator Lee S. Overman, and Dr. John S. Bassett, at the recent Commencement. A brief characterization by President Few was as follows:

Doctor of Divinity:

Franklin Nutting Parker, four years Professor of Biblical Literature in Trinity College, now Professor of Systematic Theology in the Candler School of Theology; life-long and devoted preacher and teacher with wide knowledge and experience of the truths by which men live and the fine gift to make others sharers with him in this knowledge and experience.

Doctor of Laws:

Bishop John Carlisle Kilgo, chief pastor in a great church, faithful shepherd of his people; preacher, orator, fearless and far-sighted leader of men who has wrought mightily in the foundations of our civilization; for sixteen years President of Trinity College in whose administration the College as we now know it was born, still our inspiration and guide; and henceforth one of the children of the house.

Doctor of Laws:

Senator Lee Slater Overman, member of the class of '74, beginning his career as private secretary to Governor Vance and continuously in the service of his people; United States Senator since 1903 and 2 years ago unanimously nominated and duly elected for another term; a statesman who has thought straight in a time of confusion and in the midst of all the mire and poisons of political life has kept himself singularly devoted to the public good.

Doctor of Laws:

John Spencer Bassett, of the class of '88, native of North Carolina and lover of his native state; student who from the first has shown uncommon diligence and capacity to grow; teacher who has engaged the admiration and affections of many generations of students; scholar, and writer of many books on American history, who for amount and quality of literary production stands first among all our graduates and takes rank with the foremost interpreters of the history of our country.

## THE 1916 ALUMNI DINNER

Commencement time at Trinity is always the most delightful time of year for the College student, and for the alumni because for the former, it means the beginning of a period of rest and relaxation, and for the latter, it affords an opportunity of meeting again friends that hold very sacred places in our memory. It is for this reason that the Alumni Dinner has become one of the most important occasions of commencement, and has developed into a tremendous force for promoting the interests and influence of Trinity.

No man can attend one of these dinners and not be benefited by the enthusiastic, refreshing talks of class representatives, and especially the address of the speaker selected for the occasion. Many of us recall very clearly the forceful address made by Mr. B. S. Womble at the 1915 dinner, and no man who was present this year will ever forget the masterful and heart-touching address of Hon. Fred Harper, of Lynchburg, Mr. Harper was a member of the class of 1891, which Va. graduated from Old Trinity. The magnetic influence of that old spot drew him again to it in after years, and furnished for the men of New Trinity a word-picture that has probably never been surpassed at an Alumni Dinner. Those of us who are only familiar with Trinity as it exists today, can now understand more fully its value to our nation, because we know that it has a birth-right of which it should be eternally proud.

No description of the address of Mr. Harper would be adequate to describe the effect on those present, and even the printed speech itself will fail to convey the forcefulness of his delivery and expression. But in order that we may preserve it, and read it over and over again, and give to those who were not present an opportunity of knowing just what they have missed, we are publishing the address in full. We all hope that he will give us the inspiration of his presence each year in the future.

The talks made by the class representatives were especially good this year. Mr. R. L. Durham represented the class of 1891. Rev. C. J. Harrell spoke in behalf of the class of 1906, while Mr. N. I. White gave briefly an account of the class of 1913. These class talks should become very important parts of the Alumni Dinners in the future, and it is hoped that the Executive Committee can work out a definite plan of class representation for future dinners. This matter was referred to the Executive Committee for consideration, and if fixed periods for reunions can be arranged, it will eliminate a great deal of the confusion which results from lack of systematic order.

Those present at the dinner expressed their appreciation of the excellent work that has been done by the ALUMNI REGISTER Committee, and extended to this committee a rising vote of thanks. The work of publishing the REGISTER has required a great deal of patience and labor, and the committee was rightfully congratulated on the thoroughness with which the work had been executed.

A great many members of the association expressed a desire for the employment of a permanent secretary of the association. There is no action which could be taken by the association that would be productive of more permanent results than the employment of a permanent paid secretary. It should be his duty to secure material for the REGISTER, collect such data regarding alumni that would be of value to the association, and of interest to its members; organize alumni associations in all places where such is possible, and keep up the

interest in these associations after they have been organized. This secretary could be of great help to the College in advertising its advantages, and explaining to prospective students many things that they do not know regarding Trinity. Arrangement for securing such a secretary was referred to a special committee composed of W. G. Matton, Willis Smith, H. E. Spence and C. F. Lambeth. Get busy, committee, and let's show to our old *Alma Mater* that we know how to "do things" for her as well as for ourselves.

Before the conclusion of the business session, the election of Mr. J. H. Separk, of Gastonia, N. C., as trustee was confirmed, and the association also confirmed the election of the following as members of the Athletic Council: Dr. A. Cheatham, Messrs. J. E. Pegram, J. G. Huckabee, and C. B. West.

The following officers of the association were elected for the present year: President, B. S. Womble, of Winston-Salem, N. C.; vice-president, Fred Harper, of Lynchburg, Va.; secretary and treasurer, M. E. Newsom, Jr., of Durham, N. C.; chairman of the Executive Committee, R. L. Flowers, Trinity College.

## REUNION OF THE CLASS OF 1906 M. ETHEL TUTTLE

By Tuesday noon most of us who could get back were on the grounds ready for the alumnae or alumni luncheons. Wednesday morning most of the class met in front of the library to join the elder brothers of 1891 and the younger brothers and sisters of 1916 in their march to the Memorial Hall. It was good to be sitting there with classmates again and to be enjoying together something worthwhile. In spite of our years and responsibilities some of us had a flying-vision trip to 1906 and to our own graduating sermon by Dr. McArthur.

After the service the class went to the Carolina Hotel where the class luncheon was prepared—at least most of the class went, Kate Herring had to go on a search for her speech first. Finally we went into the dining room twenty-three strong—found our places and the first course of a most delightful "treat"—at least to the girls. Again as on April 4, 1906, the Purple and Gold of '06 was very effectively in evidence. But food was only the occasion for the other good things that followed.

Toastmaster Stem began to make us realize that we were only children in spite of our years, by his very interesting and clever remarks. Mr. Barnhardt responded very understandingly and appropriately to the toast "In Memoriam." Mr. Taylor made the hit of the day in his "Lasting Things of My College Career." He proved that teachers do not teach us what we know when we grow up. Miss Tuttle detailed—with variations—the activities of the members of the class in "Where We Are and What We Are Doing." Miss Herring

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in "Contrasts and Fulfillments" made us see—too clearly perhaps—the difference between what in 1906 we hoped to be and what in 1916 we are. Mr. Pugh in his "Recollections" took us back to many almost forgotten incidents and impressions of college days and showed us their significance today. Mr. Underwood refused to have much to say about "The World as He Had Found It." We gathered though that he likes it pretty well, even if he is a pedagogue. Mr. Foard responded to "The Evasive Eleven" in a very evasive poem in which he hoped finally that there would be a "hymn for (every) her."

In the midst of the toasts—and ginger—Dr. Bassett, the guest of honor, arrived. It was good to have him with us again and to hear what "they do in Pennsylvania." He graciously agreed to become an honorary member of '06.

There were few impromptu toasts as we had much business to discuss. It was decided to hold a reunion at least every five years. The old class officers were re-elected and the president, Mr. Markham, instructed to wire Mr. Rexford, the regret of the class at his illness and absence from the reunion —to write the other absent members and to send each a copy of the program. The secretary was instructed to write this account for the REGISTER. A vote of thanks was made the Executive Committee for its very fine work and after the telegrams and notes of the absent members were read the class adjourned to meet at the flag ceremony and in 1921.

The reunion should have closed with the old '06 song but something had happened to our '06 memories. Here it is—the song, not the memory—let's all know it before 1921 and let's all be there to sing it:

### **REUNION OF THE CLASS OF 1913**

The triennial reunion of the class of 1913 was held in the East Duke Building on the morning of June 6, 1916. Despite the bad weather, a good number of the members of the class were present for commencement, and this first reunion was the occasion for the renewal of many old friendships and was felt to be quite a success by all those present.

Mr. Hal Hayes, of Raleigh, N. C., as temporary chairman, called for nominations of officers to serve until the next reunion. As the result of the election, Mr. N. I. White, of Auburn, Alabama, was chosen as president, and Mr. J. A. Rand, of Raleigh, N. C., as secretary-treasurer.

The matter of the class gift was then taken up, and the president and secretary were instructed to communicate with the members of the class who are still in arrears in payments on their subscriptions towards the Lectureship Endowment Fund donated by the class of 1913 and to endeavor to make this lecture fund effective at an early date.

The need of closer co-operation and more loyal support of the College on the part of the alumni was discussed at length. It was suggested that, as a means of attaining this end, a fulltime secretary be employed by the Alumni Association to keep in touch with the alumni, to organize alumni associations, and to arouse more interest in commencement occasions and class reunions. This suggestion was unanimously endorsed by all members of the class who were present.

Resolutions were adopted expressing regret at the inability of the absent members of the class to attend this occasion and extending to them the greeting and hearty good will of the class body.

Since it was understood that a regular schedule of reunions was to be arranged by the Executive Committee of the Alumni Association, the date for the next reunion of the class of 1913 was set for commencement week of 1923, subject to the approval of that body.

### ALUMNI MEETING IN RICHMOND

On April 1, 1916, there was organized at Richmond, Va., the Trinity Alumni Association of Virginia—the first alumni organization of the college in the Old Dominion. The following officers were elected: Rev. T. A. Smoot, D. D., president; Dr. Paul V. Anderson, vice-president; and L. I. Jaffe, secretary-treasurer.

The organization followed a dinner at the Jefferson Hotel, the city's leading hostelry, which was attended by twentyseven former students and two members of the college faculty who came over to join in the festivities. It is planned by the new alumni branch to make the Trinity dinner an annual affair in Richmond.

Immediately responsible for the new organization is a small group of Richmond alumni who had for some time revolved the plan in mind. A tentative canvass of the alumni population showed that the city contains between forty and fifty former students. It was felt that a local alumni organization, if it did nothing more than bring together the former students residing in this section of the State for an annual dinner, would do much towards uniting the Trinity colony and increasing its value as an instrument for advancing the name and fame of the college.

The committee which took the first steps toward bringing the movement to a successful conclusion was composed of G. H. Flowers, local manager for the British-American Tobacco Company; Rev. T. A. Smoot, pastor of the Centenary Methodist Church; Louis I. Jaffe, assistant city editor of the *Times-Dispatch*; and W. G. Suiter and O. B. Darden, at present students at the Medical College of Virginia. This committee sought out the scattered sons, conducted the correspondence, and arranged the first Trinity alumni dinner ever staged in Virginia.

The *Times-Dispatch* of April 2, 1916, carried the following "story" of the occasion:

The navy blue banner of Trinity—North Carolina's big Methodist college at Durham—hung on all sides in the supperroom of the Jefferson Hotel last night in honor of the first gathering of Trinity alumni ever held in Richmond, and, perhaps, the first held anywhere in the State.

The occasion was a dinner given by the alumni living in Richmond and its immediate vicinity. To it came a crew of alienated Tarheels whom fate and business have transplanted in Virginia's capital, in Petersburg to the south, and in the big shops that the Du Ponts have reared at Hopewell.

In charge of the affair was a local committee composed of W. G. Suiter, chairman; Rev. T. A. Smoot, pastor of Centenary Methodist Church; G. H. Flowers, O. B. Darden and L. I. Jaffe. The dinner was served at 8 o'clock, and the festivities continued until late in the evening.

Robert L. Flowers, professor of mathematics, at Trinity, and secretary to the corporation, was guest of honor. Speaking to the toast, "The College and the Alumni," he brought a message of good will and congratulation from *Alma Mater*, expressing the hope that meetings of this kind, now that there has been a beginning, will be frequent in the future and every year attended by a larger contingent of Trinity Virginians. In the same vein spoke Professor W. H. Wannamaker, of the department of German, who came over to take part in the celebration.

Dr. Paul V. Anderson, of this city, spoke on "The Occasion." As one who has followed the career of his old college with much pride, he said he was gratified at this gathering of transplanted sons to pay a tribute to the common tie that binds all students of Trinity. He was followed by W. G. Suiter, who spoke to the toast, "The Hyphenated." Although residence in Virginia, he said, has produced a new class of hyphenated Trinity men, the hyphen, being of Virginia make, is not separative but binding, since through war and peace for countless generations Virginia and North Carolina have marched side by side as brothers.

The speakers were introduced by Mr. Jaffe, who acted as toastmaster. The toastmaster usurped the prerogative of extending an official welcome to the alumni on behalf of the city of Richmond. It was fitting, he said, that the first gathering of Trinity men in Virginia should take place in the historic city which, besides being the capital of the Old Dominion, was in times gone by also the proud capital of the short-lived republic of which North Carolina was from the first a loyal and unselfish member.

The menu booklet, dressed in Trinity's navy blue and white, carried a number of favorite college songs, and exmembers of the glee club came to the front in good voice. Incidentally, it was April 1, and the Jefferson Hotel management heard the yells that shook the supper-room walls with a generous allowance for the good spirit that is supposed to prevail on All Fools' Day.



#### DEATH OF A. S. MONROE

The following account of the death of A. S. Monroe, who entered Trinity in 1898 appeared in the *Morning Star* of Wilmington, of July 4:

"After an illness of only a few hours, Mr. A. S. Monroe, of Laurinburg, died this morning at 5 o'clock. He was stricken about 11 o'clock Sunday night, and while his condition was considered serious, his death, which followed so soon after, was a great surprise and a shock to both his family and friends.

"Mr. Monroe was the only son of Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Monroe, of Laurinburg. The father, L. A. Monroe, is one of the oldest merchants of Laurinburg, and for the past several years the son has been engaged in the grocery business with his father, under the firm name of L. A. Monroe & Son. He was the active manager of the business and has proved himself a successful business man. He was 35 years of age and unmarried at the time of his death.

"His father and mother are the only members of the family surviving. Having lived in Laurinburg all of his life, he was well known to practically everybody in the county and leaves a large number of friends both here and throughout the State."

#### A TRINITY GRADUATE HONORED

Goodwin D. Ellsworth, '80, of Washington, D. C., has been appointed to take charge of the new division of postoffice service. The following notice of the appointment is taken from the Greensboro *Daily News* of July 1:

"Another North Carolinian was given a high position of honor and trust in the postal service today when Postmaster General Albert Burleson created a new division which is to be known as the division of postoffice service and placed Goodwin D. Ellsworth, of Henderson, in charge. The place pays \$4,000 a year and is to be one of the biggest and most important divisions of the postal service. Mr. Ellsworth will have charge of the mail service of 56,000 postoffices and \$150,000,000 a year will be spent under his direction.

"Eighteen years ago Ellsworth came to Washington as a clerk in the supervising architect's office of the treasury department. He was promoted gradually, notwithstanding the Republicans were in power, until he was given charge of the settlement of sites for public buildings throughout the south, one of the most important positions in that branch of the service.

"When the Democrats came into power three years ago, Mr. Ellsworth was made superintendent of the appointment division of the postoffice department, where he supervised the appointment of 7,000 presidential postmasters and over 44,000 fourth-class postmasters. Last April he was again promoted, this time to be superintendent of the division of salaries and allowances and the honor conferred upon him today was a further recognition of his ability to do things."

#### WILLIAM GASTON BRADSHAW

As physician, banker, manufacturer and public official William Gaston Bradshaw served his day and generation. To all of these callings he brought the best of a large intellect, a refined sensibility and a kindly sympathetic spirit. As a physician in his young manhood he kept ceaseless vigil in the humble homes of those who were able to pay him only in the priceless coin of love and gratitude; at the council table of a large and flourishing financial institution, he helped to solve the difficult and delicate problems incident to a prosperous and rapidly growing industrial city; for many years he shaped the destiny of the largest plant for the manufacture of furniture in the Southern States. While thus busily engaged, he yet found time to take great interest in the public affairs of his city and state. As an alumnus of Trinity College he was loyal and energetic in his efforts at all times to advance the best interests of his Alma Mater. For nearly two decades he was one of the ablest and most useful members of the Board of Trustees of Trinity College, and right valiantly did he espouse the cause of the institution which stood first in the deep affection of his heart of hearts. In spite of his innate personal modesty, which almost reached the point of timidity, he exhibited a real talent for leadership, and for more than twenty years he led his home church into larger fields of usefulness, being chairman of the building committee which inaugurated the movement and finally constructed what has been called one of the handsomest churches in North Carolina Methodism. This Board deems it a privilege at this its first meeting since our friend and brother passed from labor to his reward, to spread upon its minutes this final word of sincere appreciation and deep affection, in order that one who has served so faithfully and efficiently may be held in perpetual remembrance by those who, in toil and fellowship, rejoiced with him in all of our triumphs.

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We shall miss his genial presence and wise counsel, in our annual coming-together, but Trinity College will never cease to recall his valued service, and to revere his precious memory.

#### JAMES EDWARD STAGG

For a place in our permanent records and to send to Mrs. Stagg along with our tenderest sympathy, the Board of Trustees of Trinity College wishes to set down some estimate and appreciation of Mr. James Edward Stagg, who has died during the present year. 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

### THE RE-OPENING OF TRINITY COLLEGE AFTER THE WAR

#### EUGENE C. BROOKS, '94

The history of Trinity College has been treated in previous articles, published in the REGISTER, from its foundation to the closing of the institution in April, 1865. It remained closed only nine months, opening again in January, 1866.

In order to appreciate the difficulties that handicapped the institution on its reopening it is necessary to review that part of its history just before the institution was closed. Private letters of Dr. Craven and his reports of that period show that financial difficulties and dissessension within the church were pressing heavily upon him. Letters have been discovered showing that the Deems-Moran hostility to Dr. Craven had its beginning in that period. This unfortunate rupture in the church after the war is still remembered by a host of ministers and laymen. In 1862 Dr. Craven writes to Dr. Moran and requests him to state specifically what complaint Moran has against him or the College. In the following year at Conference, December 2, 1863, Dr. Craven in a full report undertakes to answer what appears to be the criticisms of him and of his management of the College. The report is given in full.

#### THE CONDITION OF TRINITY COLLEGE IN 1863

Notwithstanding the difficulties of the times, Trinity still continues all the regular college exercises. The number of students during the year, ending June 17, was smaller than at any other time since the College was chartered. Still there were some members in all the classes; the whole routine, with a full faculty was continued; all had regular commencement exercises, and had one graduate. The number of students during the present time is eighty-five, and the number of applicants has been over two hundred. We have received as many as could possibly be boarded. So many of our boarding houses have been taken by refugees and so difficult is it to obtain provisions that our boarding was limited. But by January 1 our boarding accommodations will be so much enlarged, that a much larger number can be accommodated.

Order and attention to studies, though not so good as in former years, have been better than was anticipated; and there is no apparent reason why the College should not successfully continue during the war. Arrangements were made, at the commencement of our political difficulties, to make the income of the College meet all the current expenses. Hence we have incurred no new liability, while no moneys from without have been appropriated.

After much consideration, the Trustees at their last annual meeting, were unable to determine whether with the present inflated currency this is the proper time to ask for an agent to complete the \$50,000 proposition or not. That subject was respectfully referred to Conference. Very respectfully submitted,

Following this brief report is a detailed statement, recounting the criticisms together with a full statement of the transactions that seemed to be creating division in the church and dividing the patronage of the College.

#### THE STATEMENT

As the debt to the State has never been paid, it may appear to some that there has been a want of good faith in those who propose to give money, or perhaps deception in me, who, for the Trustees, made the offer of Normal College to the Conference. A frank, full statement may possibly be satisfactory to all parties.

A full, correct statement of the proposition of Normal College to the Conference was published in the *Advocate* of November 28, 1856, which see.

The condition on the part of the Conference was, that Normal College should be authorized to raise \$25,000; the condition on the part of the College was that so soon as the debt was paid a deed of transfer should be made. The College asked the condition from the Conference because many Methodist people would not give money unless it was secured to the Church. The delay in making the deed was founded upon the fact, that the College property was mortgaged to the securities who had signed the bond to the Literary Board of the State. In connection with the proposition were certain inducements, why the Conference should adopt the College. Those of a pecuniary consideration were about as follows: That from ten thousand dollars to fifteen thousand dollars were pledged to be paid as soon as the adoption should be completed, that this would pay the debt, and the deed of transfer could speedily be made. After the lapse of seven years, there must of necessity be some difficulty in substantiating pledges made in various ways at various times. Somes of the parties have died, some removed, and some refused not only to give the money, but even to reassert that they had ever promised to give. The following is offered as proof on the subject.

Honorable John A. Gilmer, \$2,000, confirmed by his letter and by his consent.

Lieutenant R. D. McCotter, \$1,000, confirmed in the same way.

J. W. Thomas, \$1,000, confirmed in the same way.

B. Craven, \$1,000, confirmed by giving it.

Citizens of Trinity, \$2,500, confirmed by giving about \$3,000.

Signers to collateral bonds, \$3,500. Most of the bonds are in the insurance office and enough to amount to the above sum. The signers agreed to pay their bonds when the debt was to be paid.

Mr. Reynolds, of Rockingham, \$1,000, confirmed by giving \$500 and possibly by what he said to Rev. I. D. Martin and others.

Rev. Dr. Heflin, \$1,000. I had his word; I am not certain of the parties who proposed to give the money, but J. H. Speed, of South Lowell, proposed to give \$500 of it.

Turner Lawrence, \$500. I had his written promise, but cannot now find it and I know not where he is. He was at that time a citizen of our village and kept a boarding house.

These sums make \$13,500. There were other considerable sums that I thought fairly pledged, that were afterward denied, and a large number of small sums, that I have not thought necessary to mention. I think it will be evident that I had proper warrant to say that at least \$10,000 might be considered certain and that a much larger amount had really been promised. This I did at the time in faith and verity, and most certainly expected that if the College was adopted the debt would be paid in a short time.

These things being so, why then was the money not collected and the debt paid?

Many reasons conjointly, but misunderstanding and bad management chiefly.

At the same session and on the same day Olin was adopted by the Conference (1856), in terms nearly as strong as those used in the adoption of Trinity. Soon after a communication appeared in the *Advocate* over the signature of Rev. Baxter Clegg, then president and agent of Olin, asserting among other things that Olin was to be "the

Conference college." This communication, never contradicted in print, directly contravened the relations understood to exist toward Trinity, and thus awakened both displeasure and distrust. Some refused pointedly to give at all. Others refused to give until the matter was definitely settled; as bearing on this point, see letters "F" and "D." [These letters have not yet been discovered.] After receiving mature advice as could be had, it was concluded to let matters stand still till the relation could be definitely established. So much interest was felt in this that pieces by different persons, were published in the Advocate on the subject during the year, and at the Goldsboro Conference in 1857 Randolph-Macon was rejected and Trinity re-adopted strongly and emphatically.

On the tenth of October, 1856, the Trustees authorized me to present the proposition which was afterwards accepted by the Conference. On the fifth of December following, the adoption and the new arrangement were formally accepted by the Board at a call meeting. At commencement, July 14, 1857, there was a very full meeting of the Trustees and visitors, the whole matter was explained and was satisfactory (see minutes of that session).

On the twenty-fifth of November following, the Trustees passed resolutions declaring that it was necessary to enlarge the building and endow one professorship, and that \$50,000 would be necessary; and at a meeting held at Conference it was resolved to ask through the committee on education a conference resolution to that effect which was passed by the Conference without difficulty. Hence at that time the idea of presently paying the state debt was abandoned without fault or dissent. At that Conference and every one since, the financial condition of the College has always been minutely stated in the annual report.

At commencement, June 22, 1858, the attendance of the Trustees was very large and much business was done. A committee was appointed to devise the best means of raising the \$50,000. The Committee were Dr. Williamson, W. E. Pell, and I. T. Wyche. Their report was that an agent should be appointed, and notes taken due in one, two and three years and by their recommendation, Rev. Jno. N. Andrews was appointed. A committee was appointed to secure a proper deed of transfer, viz. B. Craven, N. H. D. Wilson, and R. T. Heflin; and accordingly they had a deed prepared by Hon. Jno. A. Gilmer on the third day of December following, which fully rested the property as directed. A committee was appointed to make application to the Legislature for such changes in the character as the new relation of the College made proper. The committee were B. Craven, Dr. Deems, R. T. Heflin, Dr. Williamson, J. W. Thomas, Dr. Beckwith, and J. C. Blocker.

Dr. Deems and B. Craven, assisted by George Green, Esq., wrote the

new charter. It was approved by most of the committee and was enacted by the Legislature at the following session.

At the New Bern Conference in the same year a meeting of the Trustees was held consisting mostly of preachers. At that meeting Rev. D. B. Nicholson called for an explanation of the deed and charter, and Rev. W. E. Pell, J. C. Blocker, and B. Craven were appointed as a committee to subject the deed to proper legal examination and obtain a written report. The committee did as directed and obtained from J. H. Haughton, Esq., the written decision that the deed did properly secure the property to the North Carolina Conference. The following resolution was then adopted:

"Resolved, That no difficulties are now in the way to prevent an active and hearty work in raising the \$50,000, and that we ask the Conference for two agents."

During the year the Trustees had spent \$2,000 on the college grounds. That subject was brought before the Board and the following resolution passed.

"Resolved, That we approve the mode of expenditure, the resolutions and actions of the Trustees, since June last."

At the annual meeting of the Trustees, June 27, 1859, all the Trustees were present except four and the whole College was re-organized, including the election of faculty and so forth. The new charter was thoroughly examined and unanimously adopted. At that meeting it was resolved to appoint a building committee with instructions for them to devise plans and proceed as fast as practicable to the erection of buildings. But at the same time a reserve was made in the expenditure so that the debt to the state might be paid. But, at the annual meeting in 1860 the reservation was repealed and the building committee was ordered to build immediately and apply to the expenses thereof the first money that could be raised.

This is a fair statement of the College operations and in all these times no charge of fault or deception was ever made. The business of the Trustees' meetings ever since the adoption has been devised and controlled by the conference members of the Trustees. Not more than five motions in the whole time have been made by others, and in every meeting since 1856 the whole condition of the College has been fully investigated. Errors have doubtless been committed and unwise policies adopted, but the whole course of action of every Trustee and of the Conference, manifestly exhibits frank, fair, upright intention, with a desire to promote the interest of the College and the cause of Christian culture by all laudable and proper means.

It is very evident from the above statement that Dr. Craven and the College were under attack as early as 1863. The criticism seems to have been directed at two main points: (1) The Conference did not have a complete title to the property since the securities held a mortgage on the property, and it was the agreement when the transfer was made that this mortgage would be paid. (2) The subscriptions that were made for the purpose of paying off the debt had not been paid. But the subscribers claimed that the College was under obligation to erect new buildings, and since new buildings had not been erected they were not morally bound to pay their subscriptions.

This detailed statement was made at the Conference of 1863. Dr. Craven was planning to resign the presidency and enter the pastorate, and this was his explanation of old disputes and misunderstandings.

It was at this Conference also that Dr. Craven resigned and the Bishop appointed him pastor of Edenton Street Church, Raleigh. The war was affecting the patronage of the institution. Students and faculty had gone to war, and there seemed to be nothing to do but close. However, it continued under Professor Gannaway, as chairman of the faculty, until it was finally compelled to close its doors.

Throughout the summer and fall of 1866 the perplexing question was, should Trinity College be reopened? The old debts referred to above were still unpaid and were almost equal to the valuation of the property as it then stood. A large element of the Methodist church was still loyal to Randolph-Macon College. And the institution had no money with which to repair buildings and purchase furniture, etc. Dr. Craven had forged to the front as a preacher of great power and was now free of those trying difficulties that made the president of Trinity College lie awake at nights trying to see some way through the financial troubles and avoid the harsh criticism of those who stood on the outside and really wished to see the College fail.

However, the Board of Trustees met in October, 1866, and again elected Dr. Craven president over his protest. He

preferred to remain in the pastorate. But the Conference of that year was held in Raleigh. The will was strong for the reopening of the College and all eyes turned again to Dr. Craven as the one man who could breathe life into it. Finally, as he says, he yielded to "the cordial unanimity of the Conference" in requesting the Bishop to reappoint him to the presidency of Trinity College. Then he accepted and at once addressed himself to the tremendous task of reopening the institution, knowing full well what the difficulties were to be overcome. The members of the faculty in addition to Dr. Craven were, W. T. Gannaway, and O. W. Carr.

In presenting his first report to the board of trustees after the war (1866) he stated that when he resigned this presidency in 1863 he considered that he was leaving the College forever. But, he said, "Again it becomes my duty to present you an annual report, a duty which I had supposed would never be discharged by me again, but one that I take a great pleasure in performing, especially after your action last October and the cordial unanimity of the Conference, at the last session."

He then gave the board of trustees an account of the difficulties that he had tried to overcome.

"On my return here in December last," he said, "I found the College buildings in bad condition every way, and all means for opening the institution most sadly disarranged. We had no furniture in the College, no persons were prepared to board students, distrust and disability rested upon everything, and I had neither funds nor any available means. With great difficulty I have temporarily repaired the College, collected enough furniture for present necessity, procured sufficient boarding accommodations, and in a small way have reorganized college life again.

We have had fifty matriculations and have carried on the regular routine pleasantly and successfully."

The board of trustees had elected Rev. S. Pool, of the University, Professor of Mathematics, but Professor Pool stated that he was in feeble health and was the only Methodist in the University faculty. He argued furthermore that it was his

opinion if he should accept the professorship at Trinity his position would be filled by a member of another denomination and asked to be released. However, he declared his willingness to begin his duties at once if the board insisted. The board released him.

The report continues:

"Assistance being absolutely necessary I with real difficulty procured the services of Capt. O. W. Carr [Professor Carr had left the institution in 1862 to serve in the war], well known to all of you, and a very popular and efficient man. I made arrangements with Professors Gannaway and Carr to carry on the institution without incurring its liabilities in any way. We were to take the income from tuition, much or little, I to have 3-7 and they 2-7 each, and the incidental expenses were to be defrayed by the income arising from matriculation and janitor fees. 'The faculty has labored diligently and severely, and of course with an income utterly inadequate to their support. We have managed the best we could, willing as long as we could live at all to make any sacrifice for the cause and especially to sustain Trinity."

In this report are given the resources and liabilities of the College.

#### RESOURCES

1. Real estate, the College buildings, ground, apparatus, libraries, etc., estimated before the war at \$30,000.

2. The bonds secured by the agents before the war. No part of these bonds had been used except \$800 paid for apparatus and a small amount to pay insurance on the property. These are the bonds that Dr. Craven refers to in the report of 1863 which he had been unable to collect and which were causing dissatisfaction on the part of some signers who had agreed to pay. "These bonds," said Dr. Craven, "are nominally worth from \$12,000 to \$14,000. What may be realized from them in the future is uncertain."

3. Accounts due for tuition, books, etc., amounting to \$1,200 or \$1,500.

#### LIABILITIES

1. Balance due in Boston for apparatus purchased in 1859-60, \$300.

2. Balance due in New York for books purchased in 1860-61, \$1,200.

3. The sum borrowed from the State in 1853 and with which the first brick building was erected, \$10,000. In regard to this obligation Dr. Craven reported in 1866:

"In 1864, on the 29th day of July, I paid the debt to the Literary Board. I paid it not as president, nor as a trustee, but simply as principal security to the bond, and paid it exclusively with my own money. I now hold the bond against the corporation just as it was held by the State. What I may do with that bond depends upon a variety of events, but for the present it in no way troubles the Trustees as I am not charging any interest."

It may be of interest to the Old Trinity men as well as to men of today to know that the bond referred to above has recently been found and it shows as Dr. Craven says above, that it was paid by him. Some interesting features concerning this old bond are: the seal of the old Normal College, the only copy the writer has ever seen; the signature of four governors, David S. Reid, Thomas Bragg, John W. Ellis, and Jonathan Worth, who receipted for the interests; and the signatures of the securities, B. Craven, Joseph Johnson, John A. Gilmer, Kelly Johnson, J. H. Robins, J. W. Thomas, and L. G. Coffen. The old bond is again in the possession of the College, and the receipt by R. H. Battle, treasurer of the Literary Fund, shows that the total amount paid by Dr. Craven on July 29, 1864, was \$10,986.

It is said that State officials advised Dr. Craven and others who had borrowed money from the Literary Fund for educational purposes to settle in Confederate money while they had the opportunity. He as well as the others accepted the advice. Therefore, Dr. Craven, as the holder of the bonds, held a mortgage against the College for the debt. After Dr. Craven's death the board of trustees in settling with his estate estimated the value in gold of the above amount of Confederate money and in this manner settled the account.

4. "In addition to the above," Dr. Craven said, "the trustees as yet have never paid me anything for the two buildings South of the College, and they owe me something for money advanced to Rev. S. N. Andrews, and a few other small items. . . The debt due me on the State Bond, the remainder due for apparatus, and what is due for other small items, were to be met by the trustees."

In order to settle some of these debts, Dr. Craven said:

"I endeavored to collect some of the college bonds, but failed in every instance, not from refusal to pay in any case, but from alleged inability. To meet the emergency I borrowed \$400 which I intended to repay by collecting the bonds as soon as I could."

Such were the beginnings of the College in 1866 and the condition of the institution at the end of the first term. The difficulties were sufficient to break a less powerful man. The financial embarrassment was such that the faculty worked almost without pay, and the division in the church was growing greater all the time with some of its most powerful leaders lining up against the president and against the institution. This element however, was a very small minority, and when the Conference met in 1866, it rallied strongly to the institution and authorized the Bishop to appoint a Professor of Biblical Literature and provide for his salary. Rev. Peter Doub was appointed.

Dr. Craven's report for 1867 is full of encouragement, and is characteristic of the man who was by nature an empire builder. He wrote:

"We have had 103 matriculates during the year and an average attendance of 82. We have all the regular classes with an unusual number taking the full course. The disposition for professional scholarship is much more general in proportion to the number of students than it was previous to the war."

Speaking of the financial condition he said it was safe "though weak." The ratio of division of the income was satisfactory to the faculty. "This of course produces," he said, "a very small salary to each." He referred again to the indebtedness of the College which was about the same as when he reported before. He said that he had taken no interest from the College "on the claims which I hold against the College and I do hereby make a present of the accrued interests to this date to the trustees of the Institution." He called attention also to the bonds referred to above and asked, "Shall any attempts at collection be made, or shall anything be done any way?"

"One person at least refuses to pay," he said, "because we have not erected the new buildings. He owes some \$30 or \$40 and thinks as we failed to build, he ought not to pay."

He then urged the trustees to act for the sake of "Methodist Education in this Conference." The need of new buildings was clearly set forth. "Our accommodations will, with present prospects, very soon be insufficient for our patronage. We shall need more College buildings and new dormitories. Whether anything can now be done is for you to decide.

In calling attention to the work of the College, he said the Biblical Department was a decided success, but that Dr. Doub "has received very little pay." His salary was to be paid by the Conference but he "now owes the entire board bill for himself and Sister Doub."

There had been only three men in the Literary Department, himself, Professors Gannaway and Carr, and now he asked the Board to elect a Professor of Mathematics and a Professor of Natural Science. "I think such arrangements can be made as will support a faculty of five men."

Notwithstanding the small salary the president and faculty were receiving, "We charge no tuition," he said, "to the sons of the members of our Conference, and none to maimed Confederate soldiers. During the past year we have had six in this way, and one maimed soldier we have boarded and instructed free of charge." Moreover, he declared that "we are willing to board and instruct one preacher's son free of all charges," and he urged the Conference to consider that idea further and educate from "six to ten preachers' sons without charge." His was a great conception—to educate the young disabled Confederate soldiers who had been maimed in the service of this State, and the sons of ministers who were living on small incomes free of all cost.

Moreover, he called the attention of the Board to the proposal of the War Department "to establish a military department in some thirty or more colleges in the Union. . . . . I commend it to your careful consideration. Furthermore," he said, "I would also call your attention to the Peabody Fund and to the Land Scrip donated by the United States to the several State of the Union."

At that time the State was being agitated by the conditions that prevailed as a result of the war. A new constitution was to be adopted, and Dr. Craven suggested that the Board might consider "whether an effort is not desirable to have a different law in reference to State aid for Literary Institutions. Nearly all the States except this, have aided all the colleges to some degree. But in this, a constitutional barrier has been urged on all occasions and with some degree of bitterness. An effort might perhaps make a change in this respect."

These are some of the suggestions resulting from his dream of a great institution that he gave his board at the end of the first year after the reopening of the College.

The history of this first year is the story of the heroic struggle of one man to overcome almost insurmountable financial difficulties and in spite of jealousies, and repudiation of obligations and the hard times that prevailed, he did open the institution in the face of these dangers and like a gladiator fought his way to honor and distinction.

(The next article will be devoted to the feud within the church and the open hostility to the College, Dr. Craven as an administrator, and the reorganization of College life, just after the war.)

#### MEMORIES OF OLD TRINITY

The phrase, "Old Trinity," means just what it says, old Trinity away back in the beginning of the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight. Just at that time and just that long ago my personal acquaintance with Trinity began.

Then there was no railroad to Trinity College, the name of the post office which had derived its name from the name of the College around which the village had grown. The College had been founded by that superb leader of Christian education in North Carolina, a man of heroic soul, brilliant mind and marvelous influence over boys and young men, Rev. Braxton Craven.

High Point was the nearest railroad station and telegraph office and as for telephones there were none in those parts. How strange this may sound to the young men who entered New Trinity last September!

When I entered Trinity, Dr. Craven was not there. He had planted the seed out of which, during the last three quarters of a century, has grown that great institution, said by Col. Roosevelt to be the best college in the south. He had planted the seed, watered it with his tears, and nourished it with his love till he had the joy of seeing it grow into a great tree, the fragrance of whose flowers and fruits were shown forth in the lives of Christian men in every state of the Sunny South. He carried the joys and the burdens of sorrow connected with Trinity so long and so far that his body grew weak and his great loving heart grew fainter and fainter still until he heard the Master calling: "It is enough, lay down thy burden, come unto me and rest." After Dr. Craven had been called to his eternal reward, the dear old college was guided by the faithful hands of Dr. M. L. Wood, Professor Heitman, and other members of the Faculty till Dr. John Franklin Crowell was called to the bridge; and it was his strong hand that held the wheel and guided the course of Old Trinity during the four and a half years which I spent there. At the time I

entered Trinity, Dr. Crowell had been there only a few months. He was a young man, a stranger among us; not only so, but he was a "Yankee from away up North," and we did not know as much about "Yankees" as our fathers did, and some of us did not love them as much as we do now: you know we have had time to grow in grace since away back yonder in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight. Well, whatever we may have thought about "Yankees" in general, and about Dr. John Franklin Crowell in particular, it was not long till most of us fully understood that there was a man at the helm who understood his chart, and whose heart was big enough, his head broad enough, and his hand strong enough, to steer the old ship safely straight forward along the line of highest duty, regardless of the raging storm. And yet withal he was so gentle and kind that no boy nor young man ever passed into and out of his office without feeling that he had been in the presence of a true friend.

But it was not my purpose to write much about these two great college presidents; I wanted to write something about the old College and its surroundings as they were in my college days, January, 1888, to June, 1892. I must tell you about things as they come to me from those far-away days.

When I entered Trinity, I was not one of your self-reliant "fresh." I was a fullfledged "prep," notwithstanding the fact that the old family Bible showed that I had been born at a certain time in the past while Gen. Robert E. Lee was still leading his brave regiments clothed in their uniforms of tattered gray. Never mind just how many summers had come and gone since I began my preparation which enabled me to enter "prep" at Trinity in those good old days. Suffice it to say that I had long since been the happy possesser of a mustache. I entered the same class with Jim and George Wood, Claude and Jim Pepper, Albert Sidney Johnston and his younger brother, the Craven boys, Harvey, Jamie and Bruce, and the Bandy boys; and a host of others, anywhere from seven to twenty-seven, were classmates of mine. We were not there because we were so old or so young. What difference did it make if some of us wore side-burns while others wore knee pants? We were all working in the same good cause and it remains for others to say how well we have succeeded.

I shall long remember my first view of old Trinity. It was a cloudy day in January, and to some it might have been a gloomy outlook, but to me it was inspiring beyond description. We arrived in the hack from High Point in time for dinner. my first dinner in old Trinity; it was at the Pepper House and where is the Trinity boy of those days who does not remember the Pepper House, with the dear old friends, Rev. C. M. Pepper and his wife? It was on that day that I met several young men whom I have been glad to count as my friends from that hour. Among a large number met at that time there were Rev. J. H. M. Giles and his room-mate, known by all the boys as "Parson" Rice: they have both answered the roll call up yonder and are waiting to be joined by many of their old school-mates who have not yet finished the course in the school below. There were W. B. Lee, known by all as "Bony" Lee, John Montgomery, Ed. Rose, R. L. Davis, otherwise known as "Beefy" Davis: I should not be surprised if some of the saloon men in North Carolina have learned that he is something more than "Beefy." There were the Durham brothers, Bob and Stonewall. Most of these, I believe, were boarders in the Pepper House. As I write, many names come to mind: Sam Moyle, L. S. Massey, D. M. Litaker, Allie Ormond, Pinkney Rodgers, "Shakespeare" Willis, Rob Willis, the Plyler brothers, Ray McCrary, Frank Wood, Frank Jones, Troy Adams, Dan Roper, Henry Boggs, Ben Hester, and a host of others too numerous to mention, but there is just one that must not be left out of this list: Billy Cranford; you know him as Dr. Cranford, but to many of us he will always be "Billy."

There were other well known and well patronized boarding houses: the Parker House—whoever went to Trinity in those days and did not know and appreciate as friends "Uncle Ben" Parker and his good wife? "Uncle Ben" was the keeper of the biggest store in town; and many a time when a boy wanted a favor, when cash was scarce, he could count on "Uncle Ben" for help. Just up the road a little farther was the Hundley House, which was the highest price boarding house in the village and only such as could afford to pay \$12.50 a month ever thought of taking board there. The Carr House, the Edwards House, the Bradshaw House, the Means House and others with prices ranging from \$8.00 to \$12.50 per month were there too. But for some of us eight dollars a month seemed high; so we organized the "Club" and with Mrs. Carr to superintend matters we had very good board at the exceedingly low price of \$6.25 per month. I remember well the price for I was the treasurer and Hal Crowell was the business manager.

Who among the boys of those days can ever forget the little post office? This was presided over by a dear generous good soul whom we shall long remember as Miss Neal. At the hour for the daily arrival of the mail from High Point, usually about one o'clock in the afternoon, we gathered by the score and stood around the door while one of the young men, usually a senior—seniors were great men in those days—called out in a loud voice the name on each piece of mail and passed it on to its owner. I remember with what deep interest some of us used to gather about the place on certain days of the week when we expected to hear our names called and receive letters bearing the post mark of Greensboro, for in them might be messages from G. F. C.

Old Trinity was not made up entirely of students, there were professors there also. Among them were men worthy to be leaders of any body of students. Professor Gannaway was at home with his boys in the Latin class. Professor Bandy was wide awake and fully understood "Math" to be the most interesting and profitable study any young man could follow. Professor Pegram was an expert at making the dullest boy in the class see the point in the lesson, no matter what the subject might be. Professor Armstrong was a master of English, and most of us soon learned that he had his own ideas and the sooner we fell in with them the better our English would be and the better for us on examination day. Professor Welsh led us as far as we could follow in the mysteries of Greek roots and verbs. Professor English was head master of the "prep" department and well he filled his place. Professor Heitman and Dr. Crawford were professors of theology and led a number of us along the well-beaten paths of sacred thought as they had been marked out by Dr. Watson, Mr. Wesley, Dr. Broadus, Dr. Fisher and others.

During the last years of my stay some new men were added to the faculty: Professor Hinde, Dr. Akin and Professor Flowers, who has had a part in all the triumphs of new Trinity and is still contributing his part to her success.

The building, that is the correct term, there were no buildings, just one and only; who can estimate the influence for good that has originated in and gone out, from that one building? That old building was never up to the standard required at the present time. It had no hot and cold water: there was plenty of water in the well under the oak tree in the yard, but the boy who wanted it had to draw it in the old fashion way with the chain and the buckets. There were heat and light, but not the modern steam heat, not the electric light: the heat was generated by the consumption of oak and hickory logs in old fashion stoves, and the lights were such as could be produced by the use of ordinary coal oil lamps. There were class rooms such as they were, furnished some with modern school desks, some with old fashion benches, and some with split-bottom chairs. But those benches and chairs were occupied by boys and men most of whom had a purpose in being there; high standards of honor and religious principles prevailed in the minds of the faculty and most of the students. I now remember just a few young men whose ideas of plain old fashion morals and religion were not up to the high standard held by the College. A few of them were too fond of the wine that sparkles in the cup. They are not among those who rejoice when they review the past.

The old chapel. Well, you will go a long way and search a long time before you find a better chapel than the one at old Trinity. And what speeches were delivered from its rostrum! The commencement orations by the seniors were worthwhile, and everybody congratulated the man who carried off the "Wiley Gray." The literary addresses and the baccalaureate sermons were often such as thrilled the souls of men and gave them a wider vision and a stronger grip on the great principles of life, not only life in this world but also of life in that world which lies beyond the mystic river.

The Columbian and the Hesperian literary societies were there occupying their halls, the Columbian in the north and the Hesperian in the south of the west wing of the building. These societies stood for honor and efficiency as they might be developed by the training which was open to all their members on equal terms. The man who received medals and other honors in those societies knew what hard work meant. In those old halls many a boy learned to stand on his feet, collect his thoughts and so express them as to compel his hearers to sit up and take notice. From these halls men have gone out to fill prominent places in church and state. Many of the leading churches, the halls of Congress, and the court rooms of many states are filled by the voices of the men who first learned the art of public speaking in these halls.

Yet it is but reasonable to expect that the sons of new Trinity surpass in service to their fellowmen the sons of old Trinity whose opportunities were never so great as those now enjoyed.

## THE MOCK CONVENTION OF 1912

With the completion of the national nominating conventions, there come to mind fond memories of the first moot convention held at Trinity College. Although the records of that memorable gathering cannot be found in any history of the Presidency and its procedure has not been treated by any student of political science, yet so novel was the convention of 1912 and so interesting an experiment in civics instruction that a brief account of its origin and methods may not be out of place in the ALUMNI REGISTER.

The campus, like any other part of American life, cannot escape the contagion of politics. When political discussion became rife throughout the country in the early months of 1912, Trinity men were soon caught in the whirl of debate and conjecture in regard to the great personalities mentioned for president. Then, when all our problems were merely domestic and no deadlier foes reared their heads than the trusts, writers were fond of classifying men as conservatives or radicals. The arguments advanced in behalf of Woodrow Wilson as the hope of intelligent liberalism found many supporters among Trinity men. Others, styling themselves conservatives, regarded him as well as reform movements, with suspicion. They were anxious to see the leadership of the Democratic party rest in the hands of safe and sane men.

The fears of these pseudo-conservatives received encouragement from the skeptical remarks that were made informally in the delightfully dry course in English constitutional history and elsewhere. As tales should not be told out of school, I shall not be so historically accurate as to record the opinions on presidential possibilities delivered by our worthy professors. Fortunately Trinity College is not dominated from Washington.

The spirit of controversy was further accentuated by the good-natured jibes of Cherry, '12, now magnificently advocating his clients' causes in the courts of law. At that time he

was the arch-politician at Trinity, famous as a leader in Columbia and as the ranking member of the Republican party on the campus, although a Mr. Templeton of Cary,-"Alf", not "Jim"-then in the law department, may have been entitled to that position in point of both years and political experience. All who desired to "gas" frequented Cherry's room in the Inn where one breathed the very atmosphere of a politician's den, amid smoke, R. J. R. juice, and musty volumes of "Labor Reports." Here the eminent denizens of the Inn would congregate. Here they could find the Charlotte Observer at two o'clock-those few sweet moments after the noonday repast and before "Marse Jack's" call to the unfortunates to leaden-eved recitations. The supporters of Wilson, especially the indomitable Patterson of South Carolina, soon became disgusted with the editorials of that journal as the attacks on Wilson grew in virulence. To the Republican this newspaper offered an abundant supply of "gourds." How he enjoyed to goad the South Carolinian to retaliation by reading aloud excerpts from the Major's vigorous tirades against the Princeton schoolmaster, and by summoning up the terrifying name of Blease, at which the name of Butler would be hurled back with similar force.

These tilts over Wilson continued for some weeks until it was suggested—it is not clear by whom—that all the good Democrats of Trinity College should meet in a convention to determine their choice for president. This proposition meeting with favor, those most interested in the plan decided on an election of ten men in whom the power of arranging the details of the convention should be vested.

The announcement of the plan evoked intense interest on the campus. It became the chief topic of conversation during the students' leisure periods. The *Chronicle*, that useful mirror of college life, began to feature news of the great event. Arrangements advanced to the point when this newspaper could report that a primary election would be held in the rooms of Willis Smith and Ratcliff in East Dormitory. The list of candidates for places on the committee as prepared by Secretary Cannon read: S. S. Alderman, A. S.

Brower, A. W. Byrd, Claud Bennett, W. A. Cade, James Cannon, Jr., B. H. Caughran, W. E. Eller, E. J. Harbison, D. L. Hardee, H. A. Dennis, E. L. Jones, D. R. Kirkman, A. T. Knott, E. J. Londow, D. W. Maddox, R. M. Patterson, F. R. Ray, H. M. Ratcliff, J. V. Reed, W. G. Sheppard, M. C. Terrell, H. L. Wilson. Judges and clerks were selected for the proper conduct of the primary. In order to prevent any faction from obtaining control, a bulletin appeared giving every voter the right to ballot for ten persons but prohibiting cumulative voting. This restriction had become imperative in view of the activity of several groups for their favorite candidates. Thus, about a hundred Wilson men held an enthusiastic meeting in the old Y. M. C. A. hall, where there took place a remarkable demonstration for the Jersey governor, whose abilities and achievements were bombastically described. This secret caucus agreed to vote for Wilson men in the primary and to fight to the end for the nomination of their hero.

The first test of Democracy's and Wilson's strength in Trinity College was made the day of the primary. One hundred and ninety-two men, "Democrats in deed or in sympathy," as the Chronicle stated, expressed their choice for a steering committee and their desire to have seats as delegates in the convention. The ten selected for the committee, Cannon, Londow, Ratcliff, Kirkman, Byrd, Patterson, White, Dennis, Maddox, Bennett, were all supporters of Wilson. So partisan was the personnel of the Arrangements Committee that rumors were heard of the possible disaffection of the Harmon men and their fusion with the Republicans, who were becoming party-conscious and, under the able leadership of Cherry and Kluttz of Valparaiso, were organizing their strength. These reports proved baseless; nay more, as subsequent history showed, it was not the Republicans but the Democrats who absorbed the enemy. One of the afore-mentioned leaders of Republicanism changed his political clothes as the light of maturer reason fell upon him and voted for Wilson in the fall of 1912.

It is unnecessary to describe here the work of the committee in arranging the numerous details of the convention. The most difficult task was to assign seats according to states. Byrd and Patterson, the never-weary committeemen, finally decided that each state should be entitled to one third as many delegates as it has in the National Democratic convention.

The first session of the mock convention came to order in Memorial Hall Thursday afternoon, March 12, when R. M. Patterson for the committee took the chair. E. J. Londow, W. E. Eller, D. R. Kirkman were then presented as temporary chairman, secretary, and sergeant-at-arms, respectively. The chairman thereupon addressed the assemblage on the eternal principles of Democracy and its opportunities in the approaching campaign. This speech was followed by the appointment of one member from each state to the committee on permanent organization and one to the committee on resolutions to meet after the adjournment of the first session.

When the evening session came to order, Memorial Hall was filled with spirited delegations and numerous eager spectators from both college and town. A great and historic party was about to name its man for the presidency—one, who, it was admitted, might be elected as the chief magistrate of the nation. What added to the intensity of the situation was the spirit among the groups supporting Wilson, Harmon, and Underwood—a spirit determined to live until the ticket was named. To the permanent chairman, Mr. Claud Bennett, fell the duty of praising all these candidates who had served their party with distinction. From personalities he went to issues, which he discussed with charming eloquence. How the elephant would have snorted had he been present!

A thunder of applause resounded through the hall at the conclusion of the address. Then the chairman of the resolutions committee came on the rostrum and read the platform a lengthy document worthy of such statesmanship. The resolutions condemned the administration of President Taft, lauded the work of the Democratic Congress, advocated the popular election of senators, schedule-by-schedule and downward revision of the tariff, the enforcement of the Sherman Anti-trust Act, the establishment of a Department of Labor, reform in the monetary system and in employers' liability laws, and favored a law prohibiting the shipment of liquors from a wet state into a dry state.

Attempts were made to introduce from the floor planks favoring woman suffrage and liberal pensions. The co-eds in the audience evinced great interest in the heated but brief debate on the former proposition, but the convention refused to incorporate these radical suggestions into its platform.

In accordance with the proceedings in the national conventions, the roll of states was then called for nominations. As chairman of the Alabama delegation, H. A. McKinnon presented the name of Oscar W. Underwood, S. S. Alderman, of Maine, seconded the nomination. When California was reached, that state yielded to New Jersey. E. J. Londow, chairman of New Jersey's delegation, nominated Woodrow Wilson as the constructive and progressive leader of Democracy. James Cannon, of New York, made the seconding speech. Connecticut yielding to Ohio, J. N. Aiken, the leader of the conservatives, spoke eloquently of Judson Harmon, the safe and sane candidate. West Virginia with W. A. Cade as spokesman, seconded Harmon's nomination. Massachusetts' claims to the presidency were urged by R. L. Brown and M. F. Morgan, who presented the qualifications of Governor Foss. Of course very few of the delegates were actually from the states they formally represented, as will be seen from the list just recorded.]

A Democratic convention without Bryan is incomplete. Unlike the meeting in Baltimore, where Bryan was the dominating personality, the mock assembly was not graced by his namesake even. What a sensation, therefore, was caused when R. A. Pope, of Nebraska, placed in nomination William Jennings Bryan, and E. R. Bond, of Maryland, made the seconding speech. Little was it suspected that this was but a ruse in Harmon's behalf, as after the first ballot the Bryan states threw strength to the Ohio political foe of Bryan.

On the conclusion of these impressive speeches the convention proceeded to ballot with following results: Wilson, 128. Harmon, 66. Underwood, 7. Foss, 5. Bryan, 9.

The proceedings to this point were easy sailing. Aside from the spirit of rivalry over the candidates there was no evidence of bitter feelings. Had not some of the delegates yielded to their Morphean habit, the convention might have been saved a stormy debate, but perhaps as many ballots and as powerful a leadership as featured the famous Baltimore convention would have been necessary to obtain the desired result. Many of the sleepy men who had left the hall during the evening had voted in the Kentucky, Michigan, and Pennsylvania delegations for Harmon. Now in the course of the second ballot the question arose: should these states be controlled by the caucus vote on the first ballot, or should the present majority in each state delegation determine its vote? The Harmon men, of course, desired that the delegations be bound by the first caucus. The question was finally referred to the committee on rules, which brought in two reports. The rule adopted threw these debated states for Wilson. The second ballot being declared irregular, the roll was called for the third. The secretary read this result:

> Wilson, 147. Harmon, 68.

As the hour was late, the delegates were not in the mood for much discussion over the vice-presidency. When Thomas Marshall, of Indiana, was nominated for second place, the convention endorsed the suggestion by acclamation.

Little did the country suspect that the party after much expense, half a hundred ballots, and much wailing and gnashing of teeth on the part of Tammany and the defeated candidates, would ratify the work of these youngsters.

Even Governor Wilson himself, when he thanked Trinity men for their support, was not so sure of his success, as were "Pig" Dennis and the happy Wilson coterie the night of their famous victory.

Scoffers, who may be prone to question the political prescience of Trinity men should note, in conclusion, that in a similar convention held at Washington and Lee about the same time Judson Harmon was declared the nominee of the Democratic party, while our present President was given scant, if any, consideration.

## AN EXTRACT FROM A LETTER

[The great bell which sounds the hours on the Trinity College campus was placed in the tower just five years ago. It was through the untiring efforts and personal direction of Dr. J. C. Kilgo that such a magnificent, clear cathedral-toned bell was secured. So it was eminently fitting that the bell should be hung on the natal day of Dr. Kilgo and christened "Marse Jack." The hours are rung and just at sunset "Marse Jack" tells in deep tones that the light of another day is done. At sunset on the last day of the college year the out-going class slowly lowers its flag that all the year has been daily floating to the breezes and while the flag drops slowly to the ground the great bell in the tower rings out its last message for the year. And wherever a Trinity man may be at that hour and that moment he is expected to face toward the flag—his nation's flag—and stand with head uncovered.

Recently on the anniversary of the placing of the bell and on the birthday anniversary of Bishop Kilgo the bell was rung in celebration. Upon being notified of the celebration the Bishop in a private letter to a friend at the College expressed appreciation and spoke so loftily and affectionately that the friend to whom the letter was sent has kindly allowed the REGISTER to use the following excerpt which will be read with interest by Dr. Kilgo's boys who love and revere him.—ED.]

Marse Jack has a big voice, deep in his mighty throat, shaking the air about him with imperial force, sending forth his mandates with unmistakable authority, and yet with it all having a tone of soft, harmonious, and appealing power. He is not all militant. His soul is a big soul in which dwells all manner of graces and noble virtues. Even hanging in silence he is an illustrious example of majestic sweetness. His very bigness of form sends something of reverent awe through one's soul, and when he begins to speak his voice rolls out in the air above and over all the hills around with the mingled forces of moving thunder and the gentle tones of the maiden's evening song. And when his big hammer ceases to beat on his heavy rims, and he stands still in his iron frame, the decreasing melody of his voice-seemingly a half protest against silencebears one's spirit away on the momentum of music into an invisible temple of worship. He is never grander than when he proclaims the moment of the dying day. In the quiet of the setting sun, when its last rays light up with golden flames all the lingering cloud-peaks and cloud-shafts, and make silver lakes out of the rifts through them; when hills and dales hush at the coming eventide, then he, out of his deep soul, proclaims the death of another day, and faithful to his mission rebukes all who have idled through its hours, and sends a heavenly applause into the hearts of all who have done their tasks and done them well.

What a mighty teacher he is! His voice will never die out of the memory of Trinity's sons. Along whatever paths their feet may go, through whatever lands their labors may carry them, even though they may come to the end amid the triumphs of long years, the voice of Marse Jack will go with them. Ten thousand times ten thousand other voices and sounds can never drive from their minds the voice of Marse Jack. Across the years they will be hearing him calling with his big voice, "Son, go to thy task, the hour is come." And perhaps, when the last sunset will come to some of them, when they pause for a moment, on the boundary line out yonder, they will hear him calling in his big, mighty, and kind note, "Son, the day is done, the record is made, turn in out of the night." How well it will be if in such a moment the soul of the traveller can answer back his call, "Yes, it is done, the record is made, and I fear not the night."

Born amid the fires of the furnace and shaped in the dark forms of earth, he has been called and commissioned to minister in truth and fidelity and duty to generation on generation of youths in the time of their chief chance. He speaks no varying words to any of them. His voice is the same, his warnings the same, and his calls the same to all. No one can intimidate him, none can bribe him. He stays at his post. Out there where the winds and the rains beat on him, where the darkness of the storm-driven night hides him, where the howling winter winds and driving snows chill him, where the serene moon pours its light on him, and the bright days of spring time play about him, he is always the one unchanging minister of duty and righteousness. His voice is the same brave, clear, majestic, and melodious voice amid rain and sunshine, storm and calm, day and night.

And he did me the honor to celebrate in his own manner the passing of another birthday. With a sincere gratitude out of the depths of my soul I thank Marse Jack for this undeserved tribute. However, I am not unmindful that it was also his own birthday, and so I send him greetings, and trust he may continue through decades piled on decades to speak to the Sons of Trinity the words of truth and duty given him to speak.

## **BENEFACTOR'S DAY EXERCISES**

Benefactor's Day exercises were held in Craven Memorial Hall Tuesday evening, October 3. The address was delivered by Dr. James H. Dillard, of Charlottesville, Va. This address was a notable one, but since it will be published in full in the *South Atlantic Quarterly* no attempt will be made to give here a synopsis. The subject discussed was "The Liberal Mind." After the address President Few made an announcement of the donations to the College during the year. In making these announcements he said:

"Benefactor's Day has precious associations for everyone who has given his allegiance to Trinity College. It has its permanent place in the College calendar, not only with a view to cultivate the spirit of benevolence and to give recognition to the generosity of all who have made gifts to the College, but in its origin and perpetuity it is associated with two names that will forever be dear to Trinity, to her friends, and to all her servants and her sons. The day we celebrate was established by the Board of Trustees June 4, 1901, in special recognition of generous gifts made by Mr. Washington Duke during that year and the years immediately preceding. The day fixed in the college calendar as a permanent memorial of his and other benefactions to the College was not Mr. Washington Duke's own birthday, but the birthday of a grandson that died in early childhood, a son of Mr. Benjamin N. Duke, who always encouraged his father in giving to Trinity and who himself now for a quarter of a century has striven by his own gifts and every influence at his command to strengthen the College in its financial foundations and in the esteem of all right-thinking people.

"Benefactor's Day is thus intimately associated with names of members of a family that have been the financial founders and builders of Trinity College as we know it today. And members of this same family continue to be the chief supporters of the College. This year Mr. Benjamin N. Duke has given a beautiful stone wall which extends around the entire campus and which is now on the point of completion, adding to the general appearance of the place more, perhaps than any other single thing ever done here.

"Mr. James B. Duke has made a donation to be used in landscape work, by which improvement on the grounds has been going on all summer and by the continued use of which the planting out of large trees on the college grounds will be undertaken this autumn.

Mrs. Jarvis has presented to the College an oil portrait of her lamented husband, Governor Thomas J. Jarvis, who probably did more for the State than any other public man in his generation, and who at the time of his death was widely regarded as the first citizen of the State.

"Mr. Benjamin N. Duke has established this year the John McTyeire Flowers Lectureship on Christian Citizenship, which is to be a memorial to a brilliant and loyal-hearted son of Trinity in the class of 1900, whose name the lectureship bears.

"Mr. Duke has also made further improvements in the roads and walk-ways of the College which are warmly welcomed by the students and by the community. By his assistance and with the hearty co-operation of the city of Durham and the county of Durham a boulevard sixty feet wide and constructed out of the most approved materials is being built all around the campus. I record with peculiar gratitude the growing spirit of co-operation with every undertaking of the College that is more and more manifested by officers of the city and county of Durham. They are becoming more and more genuine benefactors of the College. This closer relationship between the College and the community seems to me to be especially fitting now that the College is preparing to celebrate this year in appropriate ways the completion of twenty-five years of its life in Durham.

"While all this will be done at another time in greater detail, it seems appropriate to suggest briefly a comparison of the College as it was twenty-five years ago and as it is today.

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Twenty-five years ago it had nine teachers and officers and a student body of from 150 to 200; last year there were sixtyone teachers and officers and we taught 847 students. In 1892 there were eight buildings (five of them very small); in 1916 there are twenty-six buildings. Twenty-five years ago there was an endowment of \$20,000 and a floating debt of \$19,-722.33; the College now has an endowment of \$1,600,306.12. The total assets then were \$184,744.81; now the total assets amount to \$2,586,281.32. Then there was an unimproved campus of sixty-two acres; today we have spacious grounds containing 103 acres, highly developed and of constantly increasing beauty. In 1892 the College offered fifty-eight courses of instruction; in 1916 it offered 170 courses. The library, then estimated at 8,000 volumes, was without appropriate housing and was served by student librarians; it contained only 11,000 volumes in 1899 when a permanent librarian was appointed and the books for the first time catalogued. Now the library contains 49,628 bound volumes and employs a most competent librarian and cataloguer, who have four assistant librarians.

"No review, even though it be as brief as this one I am making, of these twenty-five years would be complete without some recognition of the fine loyalty and rising spirit of cooperation with the College on the part of the alumni who are now in the midst of an enthusiastic movement to build a new gymnasium which I have not the slightest doubt will be erected in due time.

"And no record, however brief, of the benefactors to Trinity College during this year would be possible without calling the name of James H. Southgate, who has been chairman of the Board of Trustees for twenty years and whose fine life of service to the College ended in his death last Friday. He was a big man in every way, a servant of mankind, and as truehearted gentleman as ever breathed.

"The names of these benefactors and those of many others who have this year contributed to the library, the Historical Society, the laboratories, and the museum will be borne forever on the rolls of Trinity College; and they all have our lasting gratitude."

# EDITORIAL NOTES

The academic year 1916-17 is the twenty-fifth year of the College's existence in Durham. This quarter-centennial is to be celebrated with appropriate exercises at some date to be selected. This ought to be a great year for the College, and every alumnus and old student ought to do everything possible to make it the most eventful year in the life of the institution. The growth of the College in the last twenty-five years has been one of the most striking examples of educational progress to be found anywhere in the country.

The year has started with the brightest of prospects. The attendance is the largest ever enrolled. The entering class is the largest one in the history of the College. Great improvements have been made on the campus, and others will be made during the year. The alumni are actively at work to advance the interests of their college. On every hand there is a spirit of enthusiasm and loyal co-operation.

All these activities ought to inspire every old student to having a part in making this year one of peculiar significance. There are many ways in which this interest can be manifested. Let every old student and every friend of the College join in making the quarter-centennial year in Durham a memorable one.

One of the movements which the alumni have undertaken is the erection of a new gymnasium. This movement was started last commencement when Bishop Kilgo announced at the alumni dinner that he expected to call on the alumni and friends of the College to undertake this work. The response to the appeal made by Bishop Kilgo has been most gratifying. It is hoped that no old student will fail to have a part in carrying out the work. The subscriptions which have already been sent in and the letters which have accompanied these subscriptions indicate the enthusiasm with which the movement has been received and the increased interest taken in the work of the College. The ALUMNI REGISTER will publish a list of the subscriptions in the January issue. This is done to preserve in permanent form a record of what the alumni have done for the College.

It would be an excellent thing if the alumni associations in the different counties would take up the work of securing subscriptions to the gymnasium building fund. These subscriptions could be recorded as individual subscriptions or as subscriptions from the county organizations. In counties where no formal organization exists a committee of old students could easily secure subscriptions from the Trinity men in the county. A list of the old students in each county will be furnished if application is made for it.

The organization of alumni associations is another evidence of the renewed interest in the work and growth of the College. This quarter-centennial year promises to be the banner year in the establishment of county associations. Several have already been organized and others will be in the near future.

There is every indication that the annual banquet of the North Carolina Conference Alumni Association will be a great success this year. The arrangements for this banquet are being made by Revs. C. B. Culbreth, J. M. Ormond and J. M. Daniel and the meeting will be held on Friday evening, December 8, in the basement of Memorial Church. The local alumni are doing all they can to make the meeting a success and quite a number of invited speakers and guests will be present. The Conference will have its session in Memorial Church, Durham, beginning December 6, and as the banquet is to be held at the College church home it is confidently expected that this banquet will be the largest ever held since the organization of the conference association.

Last year a most pleasant alumni gathering was held at Wilmington, N. C., on Friday evening during the session of

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the conference at that city. The old Trinity men enjoyed the reunion and the regular business of the association was dispatched. This year these same alumni and added members are looking forward to the event and it is confidently expected that Friday evening, December 8, will be one of great profit and unalloyed pleasure.

Interest in the quarter-centennial year in Durham has been widespread, and the wonderful progress made has been the subject of comment in the public press. The following editorial from the pen of Colonel Al Fairbrother in *Everything* will be read with interest:

This year will be the twenty-fifth anniversary of Trinity College in its location at Durham, and naturally the quarter of a century of such wonderful success will be appropriately celebrated. We recall when Trinity College first came to Durham—we were there then, and we remember what a big thing it was. We remember when it was dedicated—the Duke Building, and can today recall seeing the Hon. Thomas Jarvis, ex-Governor of the State, make the principal speech. Durham was a small town then—and the Duke Building was no great thing—but those who look back over the twenty-five years and see what Trinity has accomplished; look at the magnificent buildings on the grounds—many of them given by the sons of Washington Duke, J. B. and B. N.—well, it is an institution of learning as great as any in the South. And it will be greater.

President Few was called upon to succeed the gifted Kilgo, and he too, has made good—exceptionally good. There was J. Franklin Crowell, there was Kilgo, and there is Few. Great men these were and are—and Trinity College will endure.

The *Christian Advocate* of September 29, contained an editorial written by Dr. T. N. Ivey, '79, which will be read with interest by the "old boys" as well as by the later generations of students. It recalls memories of the old days and recounts the work and achievements of the present time. This appreciative editorial appeared under the heading "On Trinity Campus":

A few weeks ago the Editor had a brief time between trains at Durham, N. C. Of course he thought of Trinity College; and while he thought, he felt himself moved campusward. He was not prepared, so far as expectation is concerned, for the stately beauty of that campus, which will soon make one of the most beautiful parks in the whole South. It is a graceful avenue, lined with shrubbery and flowers, that leads up to the twin buildings which have lately taken the place of the Washington Duke building. It is very fitting that, facing this avenue, there should be placed an imposing statue of Washington Duke, who gave to the business world two of America's greatest captains of industry; to North Carolina Methodism, those princely donations to Trinity College which have been largely increased by the loving sons; and to the cause of general righteousness, a Christian character of rugged strength and striking clarity.

The trees have grown wonderfully since I used to see them. The grass grows greener and the sward slopes more gracefully than I had expected when the grounds were first laid out. The magnificent stone wall, which is the gift of Mr. Benjamin Duke, is nearly complete. What an alluring, impressive college inclosure there will be! The handsome buildings have been erected in accordance with a definite scheme. My eyes dwelt longest, of course, on Braxton Craven Memorial Hall, not only because Braxton Craven built old Trinity, but because I offered the resolution from which the building grew and because I had a place on the Building Committee. All the buildings have a value of more than \$500,000.

While I knew that President Few was as busy as he could be preparing for the opening which was almost at hand, I was selfish enough to desire to have a few minutes with him. He was expecting a most successful opening. That expectation has been most fully realized. It was good to talk with this quiet, scholarly statesman in the college world. He is a worthy successor of that great college president who has stamped an ineffaceable impress not only on Trinity College but on the educational life of the South—Bishop John C. Kilgo. It would have been a disappointment to me had I failed to meet that alert, obliging, ubiquitous, indispensable member of the faculty, Prof. R. L. Flowers, who looks as youthful as he did twenty years ago. It was a disappointment to us not to meet our old preceptor of the latter seventies, Prof. W. H. Pegram, who still enriches the institution with his scholarly wisdom and lofty Christian character.

Of course I thought of old Trinity, with its pathetic old building and its plain old campus and especially of our old President, whose ashes have been lying in the village cemetery for so many years. I thought of all the professors, most of whom are now able to have faculty meetings with the President in the better land where no salaries have to be skimped and other financial problems solved. I thought also of the "old boys," many of whom have attested their right to be called "men" in the highest sense of the word.

### Editorial Notes

Yet with this stream of memories running like a racing current under the uplifted sluice gate of the years, I paused at the gateway, looked behind me at the scholastic buildings looming so splendidly against the September sky, and said from my heart: "New Trinity, all hail! Your triumphs have only begun."

It is always gratifying to the alumni to hear from authoritative sources something of the high esteem in which Trinity College is held by leaders of educational thought in different sections of the country. In his opening remarks at Benefactor's Day exercises Dr. James H. Dillard said:

Trinity College is one of the colleges for which people who have at heart the public good have the greatest admiration. Perhaps you do not know as well as outsiders that Trinity is one of the colleges which is recognized as a real force in moulding the public sentiment of the south. Trinity stands among those who look forward rather than backward, as an influence that counts very potently in our southern life.

A trip to old Trinity is always full of interest to the old boys who made their home there for a season. It is remarkable how much interest the inhabitants of that sacred village have in the new Trinity; and how closely they follow every change in it.

All students of old Trinity in the last four years of the College's residence in Randolph County will doubtless recall Magnum Bonum Alford, or "Mag," as he was generally styled. "Mag" was the mascot of the famous football team of 1891 and the *valet de chambre*, by preference, of Fred Harper, Esquire, of the class of '91. Mr. Harper's alumni address of last commencement was published in the July number of the REGISTER and "Mag" read it.


A visitor at old Trinity in August met "Mag" who showed that he was not happy and, on making inquiry, the visitor heard the following complaint:

"That was a big speech Mr. Fred Harper made at our commencement. I read every word of it, and it hurt me, too. But how he could make as good a speech as that and leave me out is more'n I can understand. Why, he actually called Aunt Julie's name in his speech and said narry word about me, and I raised that boy; everybody knows that."

Some time ago a representative of the College delivered an address in the eastern part of the State. At the conclusion of the address a man and his wife, together with a son, daughter-in-law and grandson, came forward to greet the speaker. They all said, "We are a Trinity family." The father said he was a student under Dr. Craven, the son a student under Dr. Kilgo, and the grandson would be a Trinity student as soon as he was old enough. There were three generations represented in this group. It is just such examples as this that inspire all who love the College, and labor to make it more and more efficient for future generations of students.

Few Trinity men know that the proposition was made in 1858 to name the College Caswell College in honor of Governor Richard Caswell who had been such a great friend of Bishop Asbury and the early Methodists.

Arrangements have recently been made to have a meeting of the Trinity alumni at Gastonia, N. C., during the session of the Western North Carolina Conference. A local committee of the alumni are making arrangements for a banquet. Not only are a great many members of the Conference old students of the College, but a great many alumni from the western part of the State will be present. One of the most appreciated gifts the College has received is an oil portrait of Governor Thomas J. Jarvis presented by Mrs. Jarvis. This portrait has been placed in the library where the portraits of other benefactors are to be seen. It is most fitting that this memorial of the distinguished servant of the College should be preserved at Trinity, for in different ways Governor Jarvis was actively identified with the institution. For many years he was a member of the board of trustees; and he it was who delivered the address at the laying of the cornerstone of the first Duke Building. For many years he was a welcome guest at commencement and no one seemed to enjoy the exercises more than he.

One of the last services he rendered was the delivering of the address at the Civic Celebration. So highly was he honored at Trinity that one of the beautiful new dormitories was by action of the Board of Trustees named Jarvis Hall.

## ON THE CAMPUS

The sixty-fourth annual session of Trinity College, and the tweny-fifth year in Durham opened on Wednesday, September 13, at nine o'clock under very favorable circumstances. The usual opening exercises were held in Craven Memorial Hall and were largely attended by students, patrons, numerous townspeople and a host of out-of-town alumni. The devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. J. C. Wooten, of the class of '98, presiding elder of the Durham District, after which President Few introduced the ministers of the various churches of the city who welcomed the new students to the community and extended to all cordial invitations to their places of worship.

President Few's remarks were timely as an appeal to the students to find their places in the community and to recognize the heritages into which they were entering. He spoke appropriately of the cumulative intellectual and spiritual heritages of the college and urged on all a fidelity to the institution's ideals.

Regular class work began on Thursday, September 14, and in spite of the large body of students to be cared for the community early settled down to work. Numerous student activities began work immediately and the outlook for another successful year is very bright. The enrollment is already considerably in advance of any previous year, with the largest freshman class ever admitted here. The attendance at Trinity Park School also shows a very noticeable increase.

At a mass meeting of alumni living in Durham and vicinity, held in the Hesperian Hall Wednesday evening, September 20, an organization was formed and officers elected, and a movement launched to raise funds for the proposed new gymnasium. The sum of \$1,200 was raised immediately.

Bishop Kilgo, president emeritus of the College and the father of the movement for a new gymnasium, addressed the meeting and reviewed the rapid growth of the College during

its twenty-five years in Durham. This rapid growth should be celebrated during this quarter centennial year of the College in Durham, said the Bishop, and the celebration should be marked by the erection on the campus of an adequate and handsome gymnasium.

At the close of his address, which was enthusiastically received, contributions amounting to \$1,200 were immediately made. Officers of the local association were elected as follows: R. M. Gantt, '09, president; W. A. Bryan, '07, vice-president; and Edgar W. Knight, '09, secretary-treasurer.

"If I Had Not Come," or "Things Taught Only by Christ," is the title of a book by Bishop E. R. Hendrix, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, which will be of interest to the alumni because the lectures contained in the volume were given first at Trinity College last spring under the auspices of the Avera Foundation and at that time attracted wide attention. The book is published by a Chicago publishing house. The series of lectures under which these of Bishop Hendrix's were given was established at Trinity in 1897 and are given every two years. Prominent men have always been secured to deliver the lectures but Bishop Hendrix is the second one to publish them in book form later. The first one to publish them was President Thornton Whaling, of Columbia, South Carolina, who delivered the lectures at Trinity in 1913.

The Southern Association of Colleges and Preparatory Schools will meet here November 16 and 17 and will hold its sessions in East Duke Building.

### TRINITY ALUMNUS IN WILSON CAMPAIGN

Daniel Calhoun Roper, '88, has resigned his position as first assistant postmaster-general and is now taking an active part in the Democratic campaign. Commenting on his resignation and the valuable work he has done and is doing the Greensboro Daily News says:

Mr. Roper has had an interesting career. He was graduated from Trinity College, North Carolina, in 1888, with the degree of A. B. He held a high office in the census bureau from 1900 to 1910 and was clerk of the Ways and Means Committee from 1910 to 1913.

and he took up that duty March 14, 1913. As a postal official he developed a plan of collecting cotton statistics by a count during harvesting season at frequent intervals of bales turned out at the ginneries.

He originated the publication of a series of reports on the cotton situation. He also made a systematic study of the textile situation, both at home and in Europe.

The tariff handbook published as a supplement to the Underwood tariff bill, was compiled by Mr. Roper.

### BOOKS BY ALUMNI PROFESSORS AT TRINITY

Woodrow Wilson as President, by Eugene Clyde Brooks, '94, is a book just from the press and is an interesting and instructive treatment of the public life of America's foremost citizen. Some Principles of Teaching, by the same author, appeared last winter and it has been very favorably received by teachers all over the country.

Professor Flowers told of some of the great work that is being done in the interest of education, and it could be seen that its influence is being felt throughout the South. He reminded the company of former students that the future of the College to a large degree depends upon the aid given by the alumni of the College. He presented clearly the duty of former students, urging them to help develop the great work that is being undertaken. He presented the possibilities for the College through the co-operation of the alumni with the College officials and faculty, and with some striking illustrations showed how this spirit of co-operation will give momentum to the progress of development. ### JAMES HAYWOOD SOUTHGATE

The announcement of the death of James Haywood Southgate, president of the board of trustees of Trinity College, public-spirited citizen, and leader in all that tends to inspire and elevate mankind, came as a shock at noon on September 29, 1916. More especially does this loss come to Trinity College and to every one of her alumni scattered over the face of the whole earth. For twenty years Mr. Southgate had been president of the board of trustees and he had been very closely identified with all that concerned the college, had taken front rank in the struggles of the institution and in the hour of prosperity as in the hour of need had given himself to the upbuilding and strengthening of the institution.

James H. Southgate was born in Norfolk, Va., July 12, After the war his parents moved to North Carolina 1859. and finally the family settled at Hillsboro, N. C., in 1871. The only son, now twelve years of age, was given a thorough training in the preparatory schools and then spent two years at the University. He then came to Durham and entered the insurance business with his father, the firm name being J. Southgate and Son. The business has been successful and has grown with the years. Two years ago the father died. On December 5, 1882, Mr. Southgate was married to Miss Kate Shepard Fuller. Four children were born, two of these died in infancy, and another just merging into happy girlhood slipped silently away, leaving a deep sadness in the father's heart. The mother had gone before the daughter, and Mr. Tom Fuller Southgate, in the business with his father, and living with his family in Durham, is the only surviving child.

During the past few years Mr. J. H. Southgate has been spending his evenings and nights at his country home—Southgate's Cabin—near University Station, and about ten miles from Durham. It was here that the sudden messenger came for him as he sat at supper after the day's work on September 28th. He lingered only a few hours after the call came. These are the simple facts of his life. But his great life cannot be told in words. He has gone and it is not often given to men to see his like. He was a great, strong man—great in body—great in vision—great in universal sympathies and great in his unselfish devotion to the right, to his church, to his fellowmen and to his God. With a deep resonant voice he was much sought as a public speaker and that voice ever rang out as a clarion call to men to better and higher things.

On Sunday afternoon they laid him away in Maplewood cemetery to sleep the long silent sleep. The loss to the city of Durham and to Trinity College is great but infinitely rich in the heritage of his noble life.



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
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

### CHARLES FORCE DEEMS vs. BRAXTON CRAVEN

One of the ablest and most popular ministers in North Carolina during the Civil War period was Charles Force Deems. He was born in Baltimore, Maryland, educated at Dickinson College, was a teacher in New York City, and a circuit rider in the state of New Jersey, before he came to North Carolina in 1841 as agent of the American Bible Society. He was just twenty-one years old when he made his home in Raleigh. Although so young, he was a preacher of much force. He attracted the attention at once of Ex-Governor Swain, then president of the University, who offered him a professorship in that institution. He accepted and served the University from January, 1843, to January, 1848. However, he felt, it is said, that "he was not as useful to his church as he might be." Therefore, he resigned to accept the chair of Chemistry in Randolph-Macon College. But he remained in the latter institution only one year, and the reason given for returning to the pastorate in North Carolina was that "he began to feel that he was not exactly where he could best serve the church and Master."

The Annual Conference in 1849 sent him to New Bern. But the next year he was elected president of Greensboro Female College and the Conference of that year sent him as a delegate to the General Conference. It was during his presidency of Greensboro Female College that he became the friend of Dr. Craven. I have published in previous articles the relation of Dr. Deems to Dr. Craven and Normal College and his valuable assistance in persuading the Conference to adopt Trinity College as the Conference institution. Resigning the presidency of Greensboro Female College in 1854, he again entered the pastorate, serving in order the churches of Goldsboro, Wilmington, the Wilmington District and the New Bern District.

In 1857 Robert S. Moran, a local elder of the Genessee Conference, New York, came to North Carolina and was admitted into the traveling connection. It is very evident that Moran formed early a dislike for Dr. Craven, but became an ardent admirer of Dr. Deems, for in the early sixties Moran was hurling his criticism against the president of Trinity College. As a result, Dr. Craven in 1863 gave to the public the detailed report of the institution that was published in the previous number of the REGISTER. In that year, however, Dr. Craven resigned to become pastor of Edenton Street Church, Raleigh.

The same Conference (1865) that returned Dr. Craven to the presidency of Trinity College granted permission to Dr. Deems to go to New York City and establish "The Watchman," a religious newspaper, the purpose of which was "the promotion of the spirit of unity between the North and the South." Moreover, it passed resolutions commending the proposed work and speaking in the warmest praise of Dr. Deems. Another evidence of great confidence in him is seen in the fact that in this same year the Conference elected him a delegate to the General Conference, which met the following spring (1866).

Up to this point, there is no evidence of any hostility between Dr. Craven and Dr. Deems. But this was the last time Dr. Deems was sent to the General Conference from North Carolina although he retained his membership in the North Carolina Conference until 1875.

"The Watchman," edited and published by Dr. Deems, lived one year and in 1866 he organized "The Church of the Strangers," primarily for the benefit of Southerners who might be living or visiting in the city. The new church soon attracted the attention of Cornelius Vanderbilt who became the life long friend of Dr. Deems. This unique church prospered. Mr. Vanderbilt contributed large funds to it, and it became a noted institution during Dr. Deems' life.

Although a resident of New York City, Dr. Deems not only retained his membership in the North Carolina Conference, but attended its sessions regularly, receiving his appointment annually to "The Church of the Strangers," New York City. In 1866 he was spoken of for the bishopric and received several votes, but in that year Dr. Craven was also a delegate to the General Conference, became the favorite son from North Carolina, and thereafter was elected regularly as delegate to the General Conference. Dr. Deems never again represented his Conference in the General Conference. The following letter, without post mark, which was found among Dr. Craven's papers, is interesting:

### "REV. DR. CRAVEN

Dr. Craven received eight votes for the episcopacy, which under the circumstances was much more than a compliment. The Doctor entered the Conference a stranger to most of the members; but the firmness, ability, and success with which he resisted radicalism at all points, made him at once a leader among the conservatives, and a general favorite with the Conference. The North Carolina delegation brought forward a worthy and proper man for Bishop and they certainly advocated their nominee with all proper zeal. Not from any objection to Dr. Craven, but for other reasons, as they said. Some of them, including the Doctor himself, were active in dissuading members from voting for Dr. Craven. Still he received eight votes, and of course not one from his own delegation. Genial, gentlemanly and pleasant; not speaking frequently, nor long; thoroughly informed, yet not dogmatic; highly educated, yet not pedantic; he is a parliamentarian of first ability and a debater of the highest order. (Here a part of the letter is torn off.) Some of the best positions in the Church have been offered him, and I am sure he will find a more genial atmosphere and a better field in the great vigorous West than in quiet old Carolina.

The first evidence of a growing estrangement that appears

in the records is found in 1866. The trustees of Randolph-Macon College were authorized to make overtures to the North Carolina Conference with a view to restoring former relations and securing the patronage of the North Carolina Conference. This was the signal for the outbreak of a strong pro-Randolph-Macon feeling. Its board of trustees still contained members from the North Carolina Conference, and North Carolinians were entitled to participate in the free scholarships. Moreover, a large section of North Carolina was closer geographically to Randolph-Macon College than to Trinity College, and there were many loyal alumni who had always been opposed to the action of the Conference that severed the relations between it and the Virginia college. Furthermore, President Smith, whose attack on Dr. Deems had been influential in causing the separation of the North Carolina Conference from Randolph-Macon College, had been succeeded by Dr. James A. Duncan, a brilliant speaker, a fine conversationalist, a wise and aggressive leader, and an intimate friend of Dr. Deems and of other North Carolina ministers.

The North Carolina Conference in 1867 met in Wilmington, November 27. The minutes do not give any evidence in this year of an attempt to break from Trinity College and readopt Randolph-Macon College as the Conference institution. On the contrary, the Committee of Education presented the following report which was adopted:

### "TRINITY COLLEGE

"This institution has been favored during the year with an encouraging increase of patronage. The health of the students has been good, their deportment exemplary, and their successes in their studies highly satisfactory to the faculty and Trustees. Most of the students have been brought under the influence of a gracious revival, and as members of the Church they show by upright lives that they are sincere and earnest Christians.

"The addition of two professors during the year, Reverend Peter Doub, D. D., and W. C. Doub, A. M., has greatly strengthened the Faculty, and the College is in a most favorable position to meet the wants of our people. We recommend the adoption of the following resolutions: "Resolved 1, That Trinity College is eminently worthy of the patronage of our Church and people.

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"Resolved 2, That we will make a united and earnest effort during the coming year to increase the patronage and influence of this institution.

"Resolved 3, That the continuance of Rev. Dr. Doub in his present position of Professor of Biblical Literature is important to the interest of the College and the Church."

Although the above resolutions show that the majority was supporting Trinity College, they say nothing of a troublesome minority that in succeeding years was a source of open trouble to the Conference and of great damage to the Conference college. It is by no means clear that Dr. Deems and Dr. Moran were ever in favor of reinstating Randolph-Macon College. But it is clear that from about this time the growing feud between Dr. Craven and Drs. Deems and Moran was a source of much trouble and even damage to the Church and all its institutions.

The College continued to grow, nevertheless. The number of matriculates in 1869 was 142, and for 1870, the number was 201. The capacity of the College and of the village was strained to its utmost and new college buildings and new boarding houses were greatly in demand. The trustees resolved to raise money for a new college building and a better equipment, and forwarded to the ensuing Conference a request that an agent for the College be appointed.

At the session of the Conference held in Greensboro, November, 1870, the Report of the Committee on Education as presented to the Conference contained a recommendation that an agent be appointed for Trinity College. The report elicited a warm discussion as to the validity of the Conference title to the property of Trinity College, and on motion of Reverend A. W. Mangum the following resolution was adopted as a substitute for the first resolution in the report of the committee:

"Resolved, That Dr. N. F. Reid and Dr. R. S. Moran be appointed a committee to make a thorough investigation of the question of title to the property of Trinity College at the earliest practicable day, and

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that whenever they are convinced beyond all ground of doubt or suspicion that the title is valid, the Executive Committee of the Trustees of Trinity College shall be authorized to employ an Agent."

The Board of Trustees of the College, at the annual meeting in June, 1871, appointed J. P. Moore, K. P. Battle, and B. Craven a committee to act with the Conference Committee in submitting the title to Trinity College for legal opinion.

Dr. Moran seems not to have acted with the committee appointed by the Conference, and did not sign the report. Dr. Reid acted in obedience to appointment and in conjunction with the committee of the Board of Trustees, and at the session of the Conference held in Charlotte, December, 1871, presented the following:

### "Report of Committee on Title of Trinity College

I herewith submit the opinion of Judges Battle and Merriman as to the results of inquiry into the title of the Conference to the property of Trinity College, in obedience to your appointment at our last session. Respectfully submitted,

N. F. Reid.

We, the undersigned, N. F. Reid, appointed by the North Carolina Conference, J. P. Moore, K. P. Battle, and B. Craven, appointed by the Board of Trustees of Trinity College, having submitted the question of title of Trinity College property, together with all papers in the case, to Judges W. H. Battle and A. S. Merrimon, obtained from them the following opinion, which in our judgment settles the question as to the validity of the title of the Trustees of Trinity College to said property.

> N. F. REID, J. P. MOORE, K. P. BATTLE, B. CRAVEN, Committee.

Raleigh, N. C., September 14, 1871.

### Opinion

1. "Normal College" was incorporated by that name by act of the General Assembly of the State of North Carolina, passed at the session of 1850-51. See chap. 20, page 56 of acts of that Session).

2. The act above named was amended by Act of Assembly passed at the Session of 1852-3. (See chap. 88, page 161, of acts of that

Session). By this act the corporate name was changed to that of "Trustees of Normal College."

3. The last mentioned act was amended by Act of the Assembly, passed at the Session of 1858-9. (See chap. 85, page 81). By this act the corporate name was changed to Trinity College.

4. Joseph Johnson and James Leach conveyed by deed of bargain and sale, 1st March, 1854, to the Trustees of Normal College a tract of land in the same described.

5. James Leach and others, by a like deed, dated 3rd December, 1858, conveyed to the "Trustees of Normal College," a tract of land embracing the tract conveyed by the above named and the land conveyed by the deed of December 3, 1858, is a larger tract than that conveyed by the deed of 1st of March, 1854, and embraces the latter. That the bargainors in the deeds of bargain and sale mentioned above had title and were competent in all respects to convey the land, is not controverted we are informed.

Revs. Dr. Reid, Craven, and Moore and Honorable K. P. Battle, Committee, etc., propounded to us these questions, that is to say,

"1. Have the Trustees of Trinity College a good fee simple title in the property known as "Trinity College' and embraced in the two deeds to you submitted?

"2. Do the Trustees hold for the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South?

"3. Is there any defect in the title, or are there any conditions or circumstances connected therewith whereby the land could return to the original grantors, their heirs or assigns?

"4. By operation of law can the property vest in B. Craven by anything that has been done by him or any other person?"

We have carefully examined the several Acts of Assembly above referred to, and the two deeds of bargain and sale, mentioned above, and declare our

### OPINION TO BE

1. That the title to the land embraced by the deeds is in "Trinity College," and that that corporation has a fee simple title to the same.

2. This corporation, "Trinity College" (and this embraces the Trustees) holds the property for the purposes of education under the superintendence and the direction of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. The Conference controls it through a Board of Trustees whom the Conference appoints from time to time, and the superintendence and direction of the Conference must be within the scope of the charter.

3. In view of Acts of Assembly and deeds referred to, there is no defect of title, and the property cannot revert, unless while Trinity College shall continue to own the land, the corporation shall be dis-

solved and the purposes for which it was created terminated. This is altogether improbable if not practically impossible.

4. In no contingency provided for in the Acts of Assembly and the deeds referred to, can the title to the property embraced by the deeds, by operation of law, vest in B. Craven, The title is in "Trinity College," and can pass from it only in strict accordance with the provision of the trust created by the terms of the charter. It is not required of us to suggest here how or for what purpose the corporation might sell the land embraced in the deeds. There is a provision in the deed of 1st of March, 1854, which creates a lien in favor of B. Craven to secure the payment of a sum of money or any part thereof, therein mentioned, which he may pay or cause to be paid. We are informed by the Committee and himself, that the sum of money due him and so secured is seven hundred dollars (\$700). There is a lien on the land embraced in the last mentioned deed to secure that sum,a mere lien-the legal title is as we have stated. When that sum of money is paid, then the lien will be over, and there will be no incun brance. We have not deemed it necessary to state in terms the grounds and reasons for this opinion-the point of fact of the acts of Assembly and deeds is plain and manifest.

In the Journal of this session of the Conference is recorded this brief item:

"Dr. Deems presented his resignation as Trustee of Trinity College."

No documentary evidence has thus far been discovered to show the cause of this hostility to Dr. Craven. I have talked with many ministers who seem to remember quite well the period from 1870 to 1875 when the great fight was on. However, no two agree as to the cause of the trouble. But it seems to be the general opinion that Drs. Deems and Moran were determined to remove Dr. Craven from the presidency of Trinity College.

In 1870 Dr. Deems' time had expired as pastor of "The Church of the Strangers." But in that year the General Conference made a special charge of "The Church of Strangers" and Dr. Deems became an exception to the four-year rule. The Southern Methodist Church, however, had no legal claims to the church. But this special arrangement continued until 1875 when Dr. Deems was "located" by request. During this time Dr. Deems retained his membership in the North Carolina Conference.

The attempt to pick a flaw in the title of the College property failed in 1871. But the next year the annual conference met at Fayetteville. Again Dr. Deems and Dr. Moran were active. It began to appear at this Conference that their purpose was to destroy Trinity College as the Conference College. However, they were able to accomplish little save to sow distrust and increase dissension and dissatisfaction at Dr. Craven's management of the institution.

During the year of 1873 Reverend B. B. Culbreth was exceedingly active in raising money to complete the new building and to provide an endowment fund for the College. At the same time the country was struggling under one of the worst financial panics in the nation's history. It was in this Conference year that the long standing feud came to a head.

The Annual Conference met in Goldsboro in December. Many people remember that Conference because of Dr. Deems' bitter speech in which he denounced Dr. Craven, personally and his management of the College. But throughout the delivery Dr. Craven it is said, sat by his desk as secretary of the Conference, and made no sign that the remarks had gone through his soul.

Among Dr. Craven's papers, however, is an outline of a speech which appears to be a reply to Dr. Deems, as follows:

### "INCOMPETENCY

- I. It was said of a Lord Chatham, I think, that those who so fiercely assailed his talent and acquirements were composed of two classes.
  - 1. Those who envied what Lord Chatham had.
  - 2. Those who had not ability enough to comprehend what Lord Chatham did have.
- II. Depreciating ability is the slated political trick, and one that North Carolina decides for herself without regard to New Jersey, Ohio, or Virginia.

- III. They know nothing of my scholarship and are fairly open to suspicion of trying to increase their own reputation in that respect by depreciating mine.
- IV. In manner and polish, I boast not; but I do hope I am not worse than these self-appointed models of the Conference.
- V. Early disadvantages. All true who know their record.
- VI. As to effective ability. Built the College, \$25,000. Paid everything. 300 boys without charge. Gave on an average of \$500 to preachers' sons.
- VII. Work to and for the Conference. General Conference.
- VIII. Texas, California, and a dozen other places.
  - IX. Grade of Patronage."

There is nothing in the reports to show what actually took place in the Goldsboro Conference. Many preachers and laymen, however, are still living who remember the speech of Dr. Deems, the activity of Dr. Moran, and how the Conference rallied to the support of Dr. Craven.

There is, however, one short paragraph in the Conference records that connect the acts of the Conference with the history of Trinity College:

"On motion of Dr. Deems, the Committee on Education was instructed to insert in their report how many scholarships their Conference has in Randolph-Macon College and that any preacher desiring to use such scholarship shall have a certificate from the chairman of the Committee on Education, that he is entitled to use the same."

Following the above motion is this significant record :

"On motion of B. Craven, the further consideration of the above interest was postponed for the present."

The above resolution concerning Randolph-Macon College however, was inserted in the report. Moreover, on motion of Dr. Deems, the Committee on Education was instructed to publish in the *Advocate* "what scholarship, if any, this Conference has in Randolph-Macon College and if any member of the Conference desires to have the benefit of such scholarship he man make application through the chairman of the Committee on Education."

### CHARLES FORCE DEEMS VS. BRAXTON CRAVEN 319

The acts of Dr. Deems and Dr. Moran stirred the church more violently perhaps than any thing else since the slavery controversy, because no man in the Conference was held in higher esteem than was Dr. Craven. The following letter written by Dr. Craven to one whose name is unknown is interesting as bearing on the Goldsboro Conference:

### TRINITY COLLEGE, July 23, 1874.

### My Dear Brother:

Yours to hand and carefully considered. If you have studied that problem, you will see that what you propose is precisely what they want. They desire something to fuss about every year. They desire to worry me and the Conference, that all will yield to them for the sake of peace, that is precisely their game, just what they hope to accomplish. This object is to kill both me and Trinity. I thought for some years that their spite was personally against me. But since Conference I have found clearly that their move is against the College. They do not want any College in the Conference. They desire to destroy it. Their hope is to worry us to death. If you and others should require Deems to explain, that will give him an opportunity to make a speech. That was all he hoped last Conference. He knew I was right. If he were required to make a speech or give his reasons, he could give none. But the Conference could do nothing with him. A man can have his likes and dislikes without making himself liable to censure. If the Conference by vote should disapprove his course or his way of talking, he would not care. The Conference has done that indirectly several times. The whole matter would amount to nothing. I hope you will not do what you suggest. Nothing is to be gained by going back. If we do anything, let it be some strong movement to push things on. If anybody at next Conference raises any matter of discord, let us show the man or men that we will endure such no longer.

We can be a great Conference, can develop all our interests, have good colleges, circuits, parsonages, stations, and paper, etc. If every man will faithfully do his work and let others alone. I should like to know if any one suggested the matter to you. If they did, I think it likely that the idea came from Deems.

In the same month Reverend A. D. Betts writes:

"Dear Bro. Craven:

When Bro. Deems said he would rather for his child to die without knowing the alphabet than to be educated under you, the Conference should have compelled him to go before a committee and explain, and if he could give that committee no sufficient reasons for his expression, the Conference should have publicly rebuked him for un-Christian conduct.

After such an expression by so prominent a member in open Conference your Presiding Elder owed it to you to order a committee for investigation. I trust you will ask for a committee. You owe it to yourself, to Trinity, and to the Church to repel such an assault.

I and others are determined that he shall give his reasons for his attack if he has any. If he has no sufficient reasons, he ought to be punished.

Let me hear from you, my dear Brother.

Dr. Craven's reply is as follows:

TRINITY COLLEGE, Aug. 3, 1874.

Dear Bro. Betts:

Your letter gives me pain. I do so despise all fusses and all confusion. You may know that Deems and Moran said at Fayetteville that they had nothing whatever against my moral character. Dr. Burkhead can tell you fully about that matter. If they or any other man have ever had anything against my moral character, I never knew it and never suspected it. I have nothing to fear but a perpetual fuss. That has damaged me seriously already. I have tried to avoid it. There is no such disposition in me. I have tried to do my own work and let everybody alone. Your plan is in my opinion precisely what Deems wants. It will give him opportunity to talk. I hope you will let the matter alone. We must have peace.

The rage spent its force at the Goldsboro Conference. Dr. Craven won his fight partly by the manner in which he received the darts hurled at him and both Drs. Deems and Moran found themselves championing a losing fight. The next year the Conference report contains this significant item:

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Dr. Moran "believing it to be his duty" asked to be located, the reason given is that he expected to travel in Europe and then locate in some other state. Dr. Deems did not attend Conference in 1874, and in the following year, he was "located" at "The Church of the Strangers" at his request. He, then, severed his connection with the North Craolina Conference and his church became independent of all denominations.

Dr. Craven continued as president of Trinity College until his death. But the assaults had been too deadly for him to recover. The shafts of his detractors had penetrated his soul. He could see that the hostility of the minority party that continued to be more or less active during his life time was affecting the Conference and the patronage of the College. All these things caused him to withdraw more and more from society, shut himself away from his friends, and lead almost a solitary life in the midst of a host of devoted friends who believed in him, and students who almost worshipped him. And thus he died.

(The next article will deal with the life of the College and Dr. Craven's method of managing the students.)

# THE LITERARY ACTIVITIES OF THE FACULTY, 1912-1916

The proper significance of the teacher's life and the correct estimate of its value are found not alone in his formal professorial duties but also in those tastes and activities which are really outside the hideous details of his professional routine. His ultimate success depends as much on the number and variety of interests which make appeal to him as upon his purely professional labors. It is in these extra-classroom interests that opportunity is usually afforded for teaching with peculiar sympathy and with a contagious enthusiasm; and these interests, whatever they may be, help to enrich teaching and to save the teacher from sinking to the rank of a mere dominie and from acquiring his charactristic faults of pedantry and donnishness. Moreover, as President Few said in his report to the Board of Trustees in 1913, "There is an intimate connection between moral soundness and intellectual productivity. Scholarship of a high order, art, and literature are but the flowering of the tree of life. To get the product the tree must be sound and growing."

The increase of literary effort in the faculty of Trinity College in recent years has been so marked that a brief account of it may be of interest to the alumni and friends of the College. In addition to many routine duties various members of the faculty have found time for literary work which, in variety and quality, reveals a wide range of interests and a high standard of ability. The present account of this work covers the years from 1912 to 1916; and in the case of the academic faculty the work of each member is noted according to his seniority in the faculty.

For amount and quality of literary production the Law School ranks foremost among all the departments of the college. Since its organization in 1905 this department of the college has attracted wide and favorable attention, from students and practitioners alike, for the scholarly and virile writings of its faculty. The list below gives a partial account of the work of Dean Mordecai and of his colleagues, Professors Lockhart and Hedrick, and of a former associate:

In 1913 Professor Mordecai also prepared and published for the use of the students in the law school, "Ouestions on Law", and in 1916 "Additional Questions", which together total nearly two hundred pages. All of these works were printed by the Trinity College Law School. Last year the Law School reprinted a second edition of McIntosh's Cases on Contracts, a work which first appeared while Professor A. C. McIntosh, now a member of the faculty of the University of North Carolina Law School, was a member of the faculty of the Trinity Law School. After this Professors Mordecai and McIntosh collaborated in the preparation of *Remedies by Selected Cases*. which was also printed by the Trinity Law School.

PROFESSOR WALTER S. LOCKHART'S A Handbook of Evidence for North Carolina, which appeared in 1916, attracted wide attention and favorable comment immediately. It was published by the W. H. Anderson Company, of Cincinnati, and has had an extensive sale. Its wide use in North Carolina attests the esteem in which it is held by the profession as a book of sound law and excellent workmanship. The volume contains 385 pages and besides being splendidly prepared reveals the bookmaker's art in many ways.

PROFESSOR H. G. HEDRICK'S "Notes on the Law of Sales," which came from the press in December, 1916, contains sixtyfive pages, and, like the work of his colleagues, is marked for its technical accuracy and excellent organization.

# **ALUMNI BANQUETS**

#### WESTERN N. C. CONFERENCE BANQUET

For many years it has been a custom among the Trinity College alumni of the North Carolina Methodist Conference to hold a banquet during the Annual Conference session. A committee of the Trinity College Alumni Association for Gaston County, composed of J. H. Separk, S. J. Durham, J. M. Holland and R. G. Cherry, conceived the idea of holding a similar banquet at the session of the Western North Carolina Conference. In fulfillment of that idea a Trinity College Alumni Banquet was held at the Arlington Hotel in Gastonia on Saturday afternoon, November 25th, 1916, beginning at two o'clock and lasting through the afternoon.

The dining room was beautifully decorated with green potted flowers and Trinity banners and pennants of the regulation blue and white colors. The management of the hotel provided a splendid menu, which coming at a late hour and following a long morning session of the Conference was thoroughly enjoyed by all present.

Around the banquet table were gathered more than seventyfive alumni and friends of the college. Among that number were many of the men who have had leading parts in the history which has made Trinity one of the really great southern colleges. Mr. J. H. Separk, '96, our fellow townsman and member of the Board of Trustees of Trinity College, acted as toastmaster for the occasion. The first speaker was Bishop John C. Kilgo, "Dr. Jack," who made a stirring appeal to Trinity men assembled to keep alive their spirit of loyalty to their alma mater. During the course of his remarks, Dr. Kilgo announced that he could see the realization of his efforts to build a modern gymnasium as a fit commemoration of the twenty-fifth anniversary of the removal of Trinity College to Durham. This statement met with hearty applause, and then he announced that with the continued support and united effort of the alumni he would pledge himself to undertake the work

of erecting a modern science building on Trinity campus to replace the old Crowell Science Hall.

Following Bishop Kilgo, the toastmaster called upon President W. P. Few, who was warmly greeted by the alumni assembled. He expressed appreciation for the continued and increasing loyalty which filled the hearts of the alumni everywhere, and told something of the work being done at Trinity College at the present time. Dr. Few said that, "Aggressive fighting for the right" had been his purpose while acting leader for Trinity College; and that, he had never been a so-called progressive for he wanted to be right. He called upon the alumni to gather from the past whatever was good and go on with it!

The next speaker was Dr. Plato T. Durham, an old student and former professor of Trinity College and at the present time head of the department of biblical literature at Emory University in Atlanta, Georgia. Dr. Durham spoke of the liberality of thought which pervaded the policies of those who were leaders at Trinity College, repledged himself to his *alma mater*, and by his stirring testimony of personal and individual loyalty moved all his hearers to greater resolves of loyalty and duty to their College.

Dr. Gilbert T. Rowe closed the regular program. He spoke of the transitional period of the College, and reviewed its history from the early beginnings to its present greatness. He spoke of the accomplishment of the College and by way of illustration, said that he could express the accomplishment at Trinity College by an epigram, which was original and of the Rowe-coinage and no doubt destined to become a classic, towit: "The people who do something are the folks who get something done!"

Following the regular program short impromptu speeches were heard from several, among whom notably were: Rev. W. A. Lambeth, '01, and Mr. J. C. Wilborn, '76. Mr. Wilborn, who is mayor of York, South Carolina, said that it had been nearly forty-one years since he graduated from Trinity College, but that his loyalty to his *alma mater* had never waned in enthusiasm, and that he felt enthused with the same spirit today that had filled his heart when he left "Old Trinity" in the year 1875.

The meeting was in every way a success, and marks the beginning of what all Trinity College alumni hope will be an unbroken series of Trinity banquets and get-together meetings at the annual sessions of the Western North Carolina Conference. A committee composed of Rev. W. A. Lambeth, J. H. Separk, and Rev. Z. E. Barnhardt, were unanimously appointed to make arrangements for a banquet to be held at the place of meeting of the next annual Western North Carolina Conference.

Below are published the Articles of Management under which the TRINITY ALUMNI REGISTER has been managed for the past two years. After more than a year of real constructive service to the magazine Holland Holton, '07, resigned as Managing Editor, on account of pressing duties as Superintendent of the West Durham Graded School. But he will remain on the Managing Board and his invaluable aid will continue to be an asset of the magazine. As Managing Editor C. L. Hornaday, '02, was selected.

The article in this issue dealing with the literary activities of the faculty during the past four years should be of interest to every alumnus. This article was carefully compiled by one of the editors of the REGISTER and there were several difficulties to be surmounted by him. It is hoped that at an early date we may have an article concerning the publications from the alumni.

ARTICLES OF MANAGEMENT FOR TRINITY ALUMNI REGISTER

The committee appointed by the President of the Trinity College Alumni Association pursuant to the motion passed by the Association providing for an alumni publiciation present the following articles of management:

ARTICLE I. The publication shall be known as the TRINITY ALUMNI REGISTER and shall be issued quarterly by the managing board hereinafter provided for.

# ARTICLE II. The managing board shall consist of seven members:

- 1. The chairman of the executive committee of the Association, ex-officio;
- Four other members of the Association elected by the executive committee for a term of two years each beginning the fifteenth day of June;
- One member of the Association appointed each year by the President of the College for a term of one year beginning the first day of September;
- 4. A managing editor elected by the board for a term of one year from election. He shall act as chairman of the board, vote in case of a tie, and call all meetings of the board and of the editorial staff; if he was a member of the board before his election as managing editor, the board shall elect an additional member to fill his unexpired term and again bring the number of members up to seven in all. The board shall in like manner, by a majority of a quorum, fill any other unexpired terms as they may occur, and all members shall serve until their successors are elected or appointed.
- ARTICLE III. An advisory board of five shall be elected at the annual meeting of the Association for a term of one year.
- ARTICLE IV. The actual editing of the REGISTER shall be performed by a staff of seven consisting of the managing editor and five associate editors elected by the managing board, as far as possible from the membership of the board, and one associate editor elected by the Alumnae Association, all associate editors serving for a term of one year beginning June 15 of each year.
- ARTICLE V. These articles shall remain in force until repealed or amended by the Association, but all details of editing and managing the publication shall be left to the managing board.

- ARTICLE VI. Subject to approval by the Alumni Association at its regular annual meeting of 1915, and until that meeting, the managing board shall in accordance with Article II be deemed constituted as follows:
  - 1. R. L. Flowers, ex-officio, as chairman of the executive committee of the Alumni Association;
  - H. M. North and C. L. Hornaday, appointed from the Association, terms to expire June 15, 1915; and M. A. Briggs and W. G. Sheppard, appointed from the Association, terms to expire June 15, 1916;
  - 3. E. W. Knight, appointed by President Few, September 1, 1914.
  - 4. Holland Holton, managing editor, elected January 15, 1915.

# **ON THE CAMPUS**

Several members of the faculty attended the annual sessions of the North Carolina Literary and Historical Association and of the North Carolina Folk-Lore Society, in Raleigh, in December, and Professors W. H. Wannamaker, of the department of German, and William T. Laprade, of the department of History, had places on the programs of these meetings.

The annual inter-society debate was held Wednesday evening, December 20th, and the question, "Resolved, That Congress should enact legislation for compulsory arbitration of disputes between organized labor and corporations engaged in inter-state transportation, (Constitutionality waived)," was discussed by the following men: Columbian, Allan H. Gwyn, of Yanceyville, G. R. Jordan, of Kinston, and John Cline, of Lincolnton, affirmative; Hesperian, R. L. Fisher, of Gatesville, H. P. Newman, of Wilmington, and H. C. West, of Durham, negative. The decision was in favor of the negative.

At a recent meeting of the Trinity College Historical Society, a number of additions to the historical collection of the organization were announced, and Professor William K. Boyd, president of the organization, announced that Series XII of the society's publications was ready for distribution. The publication contains the following titles: "Slavery in Edgecombe County," by J. K. Turner, of Tarboro; "Gates County to 1860," by I. S. Harrell, of Gatesville; and "Methodist Expansion in North Carolina after the American Revolution," by Professor W. K. Boyd.

William Bobbitt, of Charlotte, a senior in the high school of that city, was the winner in the annual inter-scholastic declamation contest, held here December 1st, under the auspices of the 9019. His subject was "The Nomination of Woodrow Wilson." The contest was the most successful ever held here.

Mr. W. Thomas Bost, well known newspaper man of Ra-

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leigh, and staff correspondent of the Greensboro Daily News, was the speaker at a meeting of the Quill Club on Monday evening, November 20th, and a large number of students, members of the faculty, newspaper men and townspeople heard his address. Among other things Mr. Bost said that "news is today more important than views," and that "the finest qualities of work cannot be paid for, they never were and never will be." At the conclusion of Mr. Bost's address, President Few spoke briefly, and referred to "North Carolina's triumvirate of newspaper geniuses, Avery, McNeill, and Bost."

There are several hundred volumes in the collection. The College is glad to have this collection both for its own value and for reasons of sentiment because it belonged to one who was for so long actively identified with the institution. The generosity and kindness of Mr. Finch, an old student of the College, in presenting this library is very highly appreciated.

## **RHODES SCHOLARSHIP FOR TRINITY ALUMNUS**

Charles Rutherford Bagley, of Moyock, A. B. 1914 and A. M. 1915, at present instructor in the department of modern languages here, has received notice from the North Carolina Rhodes Scholarship Committee that he has been appointed the Rhodes Scholar from this State to Oxford University, England, for three years beginning October, 1917. The appointment is a distinction eagerly sought, both for the honor and for the honorarium which the appointment carries with it. Mr. Bagley will receive an annual allowance of three hundred pounds, English money, which is equivalent to about \$1500 a year, a sum sufficient to defray all of his expenses while in residence at Oxford.

A more deserving appointment to this coveted place was probably never made. Mr. Bagley is one of the most promising men whom Trinity has graduated in many years. As a college student he found time not only to be a recognized leader in nearly all phases of college life, but also to earn a large portion of the funds needed for his education. He was graduated second in a class number sixty-eight, was editor-inchief of the college annual, took an active part in athletics, was interested in debating and literary activities, and was a man of great popularity. He is a member of the Kappa Alpha Fraternity, the 9019, the local scholarship and patriotic society, of Sigma Upsilon, the literary fraternity, and of numerous other organizations. As president of the Pan-Hellenic Council of the college he was largely responsible for the present rules regulating local Greek letter societies here. Last year Mr. Bagley was head of the department of Latin and director of athletics in the Spartanburg, South Carolina, High School.

Trinity women have shown much interest in the organization called the Southern Association of College Women and forty-four Trinity alumnae have their membership in the twenty-nine branches of the Southern States. There are representatives of Trinity in all the small branches located in North Carolina.

The objects of this Association as stated in its constitution are: first, to unite college women in the South for the higher education of women; second, to raise the standard of education for women; and third, to develop preparatory schools and define the line of demarcation between preparatory schools and colleges.

The Association is trying to create such public sentiment as will demand through the South college work for college degrees and larger appropriation for rural and city schools with better trained and better paid superintendents and teachers, better buildings, also more effective supervision of the physical welfare of children with a larger enrollment of the school population.

Each branch tries to make a study of local conditions and aid in whatever reforms are most needed in its community.

The membership in this organization is limited to gradu-

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ates of standard colleges. In the South there are only six standard colleges for women, Agnes Scott, in Georgia, Converse in South Carolina, Goncher in Maryland, Randolph-Macon and Northampton in Virginia, and Sophie Newcomb in Louisiana. There are nine standard state Universities in the South as well as Trinity, Vanderbilt, Baylor, Chattanooga, Rice and Southern University, which admit women. Fully half of the number of the Southern Association of College Women are graduates of Northern and Western Colleges.

# A WORD FOR THE ALUMNAE

I have been asked to say a word for the Trinity alumnae. As I am not officially connected with this association I can only speak as an interested member. But this I am glad to do. And I shall speak frankly as among friends, for is not my audience composed of Trinity alumni and alumnae?

The Trinity Alumnae Association, though young, has a creditable record. It is a strong organization with loyal members paying annual dues, working harmoniously, showing splendid spirit in making pledges to the proposed Woman's College, and in raising a debt made by the association. As alumnae we love our college with a true and loyal love, we are interested in all her interests. We have watched with great pleasure the erection of the handsome granite wall which improves so greatly the appearance of the college campus. We rejoice at the prospect of a new gymnasium.

As I recently attended a Trinity alumni dinner, and listened with a thrill of joy to the expressions of loyalty on the part of Trinity men and women, (for after we leave college the men and women are allowed to sit down together at these dinners) the thought came to me, "what is there we cannot do if we will?"

We are proud of our college, proud of the splendid work she is doing for men and women, but especially are we glad, since we are women, for the opportunities which have come to our sex through the opening of Trinity's doors to women.

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We are glad to see that the women of North Carolina appreciate higher education to such an extent that an increasing number is knocking yearly at Trinity's doors. We believe that every alumnus as well as every alumna must realize that there is year by year a greater demand for women of highly trained faculties. They are needed in the home to furnish congenial companionship for men of trained minds and as a spur to urge them on to their highest attainments; they are needed to train intelligently the children in the home as well as school, that they may be sent into life with the best possible equipment; they are needed in public affairs where women are giving of their best yet losing none of their womanliness. So we are glad that in Trinity College a few of our women have been given the privilege of a thorough intellectual training. We regret that so many women of our state are not receiving the necessary training to prepare them for the highest service to their generation. They will realize their deficiency when it is too late.

It is because we realize that without the best training our women cannot be ready to meet the increasing demands made upon their resources, that we endeavored to inaugurate a movement to establish a co-ordinate college for women at Trinity a short time ago. Here we would pause to express our gratitude for our friend, James Southgate. We revere this man who believed in us and did all in his power to encourage our efforts and to further the cause of the higher education of women in our state, we honor him for his great mind and heart, and for his splendid vision of the future. But to return to my theme. While we regret that our efforts did not meet with the response which we hoped for, we still believe, with our friend, that our hopes will be realized,—that North Carolina women will find in Trinity College an opportunity for fulfilling their highest destiny.

In the meantime a considerable number of women are being educated at Trinity. While their opportunities are so much in advance of most women students in our state, there is one thing yet which we covet for them,—a dean of women at

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Trinity. There are about ninety girls at Trinity this year. Their class work ranks high. They are among the best students in the institution. They are receiving the best instruction which a woman can get anywhere in the south. But an education is a many-sided affair. During these formative years of life many forces need development besides those purely intellectual. What of her physical training, her spiritual life, what of her initiative in leadership, the development of the many womanly virtues which her brothers are wont to extol? Trinity women need a social, an intellectual, a spiritual leader of their own sex, one whom they will admire and respect-a real woman whom they can consult in matters of doubt. I believe that any alumna of Trinity will tell you that she feels this need very keenly. Are not the lives of these women who will be leaders in their several communities because of their intellectual training, worthy of safe-guarding and rounding into a more perfect womanhood? We love our college, we are willing to work for it and to give of our little to it, and we earnestly hope to see the conditions surrounding women at Trinity go on improving as they have steadily done during the past twenty vears.

So much for the alumnae. Now may I add a word to the alumnae who read this magazine? Let us not lose an opportunity to work for our college, to show others the splendid work it is doing and the great opportunity it has to influence the lives of the next generation. Perhaps we may open the eyes of some who are blind, and who knows but some purses, too, may be unsealed, when the opportunity is given to endow a chair to be filled by a dean of women at Trinity?

To leave a manlier race.

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
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
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
