DRAMATIC STARS:

How Nature Boy Struck It Rich

H ERMAN RHODE, alias Dutch Rhode, alias Buddy Rogers, alias Nature Boy, alias Buddy (Nature Boy) Rogers, is a professional wrestler who likes everybody in general and telecaster Wayne Griffin in particular. Television he loves.

Nature Boy's affection for announcer Griffin and TV is understandable. His warmth toward the public needs more explaining. Reason: certain misguided characters (not the same folks Perry Como calls crazy, mixed-up kids) use his torso as a substitute for a tree trunk in testing their new switchblade knives. Others try to drown him.

Why should Nature Boy take abuse? No chains bound him to wrestling. He had a trade. Back in 1940 he drew a pay envelope of \$18.26 as an apprentice sheet metal worker in Camden, N. J. That was the year of his adventure into professional wrestling. Had he made the right move?

With such worries applying a half-Nelson to his brain, Nature Boy rested his thick golden bantam locks upon the sympathetic shoulder of Griffin. He was miserable.

Griffin counseled him wisely. The announcer foresaw television as the stage upon which wrestling would regain popularity and prosperity. Make a hit on TV tonight and tomorrow the barber in Red Clay, N. C., is your self-appointed drum beater.

"I was ready to quit when Wayne showed me what an asset television was for wrestling and for me," declares N. Boy. "Wayne Griffin is the greatest announcer and the nicest person that you would want to meet."

Some Statistics

From a modest beginning of \$8000 in his first mat year, Nature Boy earns between \$75,000 and \$100,000 annually. On him it shows. Snuggled next to the thick pinky of his left hand is a 14-carat diamond, purchase price \$20,000. Located in a similar position on his right hand is a miniature iceberg valued at \$10,800. Equally flashy is a wardrobe that includes 33 custom-tailored sports jackets. For transportation he rides the bumps in a Coupe de Ville Cadillac.

Lest the Nature Boy fan clubs concern themselves over his security in old age, N.B. has put a few bob away. He has a substantial annuity and his real estate holdings in Camden include a 10-unit apartment as well as nine homes.

Nature Boy might be described as All-America in structure. He has Kansas-colored hair. His shoulders are as broad as Texas and his waist as prim as Vermont. His is a handsome, masculine face.

The transition of Dutch Rhode into Nature Boy happened accidentally on the West Coast. After coating his symmetric muscles with an attractive layer of tan and permitting his hair to thicken and spread to within the fringe of his redwood neck's nape, he made his entrance before a Hollywood wrestling audience.

The memorable event occurred when the Nature Boy song was harvesting nickels in the juke boxes. Our man removed his robe, turned his profile in four directions. He both captivated and inspired his audience. "Nature Boy! Nature Boy!" screamed the women. The name stuck.

His appeal is strongest to women. Spread over the country his fan clubs have total membership in excess of 40,000. The more bold members of the opposite sex wait outside his dressing room, hoping to know him better.

"We call them stage door Jennys," said Nature Boy. "Ninety percent of them are nice kids but the other 10 percent are—" Here Nature Boy stops to grope for polite but strong words.

Apparently for everyone who loves

Nature Boy there is a bitter soul who despises him. That adds up to money in the bank and Nature Boy knows this full well.

"It is music to my ears," replies Nature Boy when asked how boos strike his still well-shaped ears.

Moral: if you can't be good, be a baddie . . . it pays off.

Then again, some onlookers are not content to boo. A frenzied knifewielder in Windsor, Ontario, slashed

the Boy's thigh. The brand mark of a Texas bladesman is visible in the vicinity of Nature Boy's knee.

His most terrifying experience came in Kansas City. Unquestionably Nature Boy overplayed his role. The mob that awaited him outside the arena was violently ugly. As he stepped into the street, he was felled by the full blast of a high-pressure hose. The stream of water struck him in the face. Momentarily Nature Boy thought he had been blinded. Every time he arose, the water knocked him down. Just when Nature Boy feared he could not outlast the mob's fury, the police arrived.

Naturally every one who seeks to do him violence does not succeed. During the past outdoor season in Philadelphia, a ringsider at Toppi Stadium took exception to the manner in which Nature Boy was abusing Argentine Rocca. The tamaletempered fan unsheathed his blade and went to Rocca's rescue.

Nature Boy got out of that spot neatly. He pushed Rocca into the path of the assailant and Rocca got cut by one of his own rooters.

Old soldiers never die. Nor do wrestling champions ever lose. Let's face it: wrestling belongs to the realm of the stage rather than the field of competitive sports. The meetings of wrestlers are billed as exhibitions.

A supporting cast performer, now on sabbatical leave, recalls with a touch of nostalgia his tour of duty. Every Monday morning's mail brought the listing of his booking agency gave him five assignments. More often he drew three bouts and was paid a flat fee for each. He longed for the windup spots, for the principals of the featured match work on percentage.

On his circuit were several Canadians. They, upon informing the booking office of the length of time they could remain here, were booked solid up to their departure dates.

Canadian Capers

Regardless of the manner of booking, all made sure to arrive early at a show site. There they would be met by an agent of the booking office. His was a key role. He would check the advance sale, gaze at the early comers and estimate the likely attendance. Then, the agent would determine whether the audience was entitled to a long, medium or short show.

His decision reached, the agent would call the cast together, allot the duration of the windup and the supporting bouts and nominate the winners, often specifying the throw holds.

For most wrestlers, the pattern runs something like this: young eager beaver lifts weights, eats sensibly, gets plenty of sleep. He develops muscles to go with his wavy hair and sun tan. He wins a Mr. Country title and becomes a wrestler. He finds sudden wealth. He enjoys the company of pretty women, thrives on rich food. As he grows fat he becomes less appealing to the dames. This makes him worry, causing him to lose his hair.

Fat and bald and without journeyman ability, there is only one place left for him in wrestling. He can become a referee.

Historic moment: FCC and industry executives see realization of color TV dream.

Color TV's Final Test

Federal Communications Commission Inspects Industry's Effort

IN AN impressive demonstration of color television that may pave the way for TV in full color before the end of the year, the entire TV industry staged a full-dress display of color telecasting in New York recently for the Federal Communications Commission.

Because of the small size of the color TV picture tubes and the anticipated high costs of color receivers, however, the general public will probably hold tight to its black-and-white receivers for some time after color sets

The FCC is the Government ageney that rules on all standards for radio and TV broadcasting. No color telecasts would be possible without the FCC's sanction. Once CBS, long the maverick in color TV development, abandoned its particular system of telecasting in color, the entire industry joined forces to bring color to the public as soon as possible.

The New York demonstration, held in the Starlight Roof of the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, was designed to convince the FCC that this new industrydeveloped color system was good enough to be granted the required goahead immediately. One of the most important considerations was that programs telecast under the all-industry system could be received in

black-and-white on the more than 25,000,000 receivers now in the hands of the public. As a result, with the all-industry color system there is no need to throw out your present set when color telecasts start. It will not be obsolete in any way.

There were probably more top industry executives, engineers and technicians to the square inch at the demonstration than have ever rubbed shoulders before. Thirteen color receivers, each with a 14-inch tube and manufactured by a different firm but unidentified as to brand name, were lined up in a row. A special section was roped off directly in front of the sets, with uniformed guards posted to keep out all but the seven members of the FCC and a single technician to handle the controls on each receiver.

CBS, Du Mont and NBC participated in staging the color show. NBC produced a half-hour variety program.

The show was received on several of the 13 sets in sharp, clearly-defined hues with none of the "break-up" or running-together of colors that marred previous demonstrations. A preponderance of reds, blues and greens, as well as off-tone flesh shades, on some of the other receivers indicated that manufacturers of these still have some kinks to work out.

CBS demonstrated the feasibility of transmitting color via remote pickup, staging a 15-minute show in the out-

For this part of the program, CBS used its single-tube color camera, which it says can be mass-produced at low cost to make color telecasting less expensive. The CBS color tended to subtler tones and pastel shades, with less striking contrast than the NBC part of the program. Closeups were good but the long shots looked hazy and often took on brownish hues.

Du Mont, transmitting on a UHF channel, showed selected color slides to demonstrate the faithfulness of color reproduction in still life. Again, depending on the quality of the individual TV receiver, the pictures were good.

It was also shown that color TV can be telecast from city to city through existing relay channels. The color pictures were sent from New York to Washington and then back to New York, to be received again on the receivers at the Waldorf.

The question of how much the public will be charged for color receivers was not discussed. Industry spokesmen have previously estimated that early sets will range in price from \$750 to \$1000.

MAKE RECORD HISTORY

TELEVISION, which already has brought about a small revolution in the eating, sleeping, reading and movie-going habits of the Nation, would appear now to be invading the music field, long considered the personal property of radio's entrenched legion of disk jockeys.

Unless the straws in the wind are blowing in the wrong direction, TV is showing every indication of taking unto itself the lucrative business of making or, breaking the day's hit tunes, a matter of acute concern to the record companies.

Biggest straw at the moment—a veritable young log, in fact—is the Mary Martin-Ethel Merman album recently released by Decca. Available in all three speeds, it is a direct offthe-tape recording of the smash duet these two stars romped through on the Ford 50th Anniversary Show last spring, 12 minutes of some of the most inspired popular music ever to hit the airwaves. The Decca people are convinced they have something here, and profess to see in the album's popularity a new avenue of business: the recording of on-the-air TV performances as both singles and albums.

Capitol was even faster than Decca in latching onto the TV potential, currently riding high with no less than three versions of TV's own Dragnet theme. And as a further commentary on the potency of the medium, Capitol executives point out that the Dragnet theme was heard on radio for three years without causing excitement.

The record people are now looking for such TV singing stars as Dinah Shore, Jane Froman, Perry Como, Eddie Fisher and the others to ease off on their concentration on already established favorites and veer sharply in the direction of brand new tunes. None of these stars, of course, is adverse to having a personal hit on his hands, and the added visual impact of TV can sell a new song just as effectively as it sells a sponsor's product.

What They Like in

NEW YORK

Ed Herlihy all dressed up to emcee a Children's Hour on a New York station, The show's popularity outstrips local adult programs.

T couldn't possibly be that the local New York TV audience comprises mostly children. Yet the most popular local show is the Horn & Hardart's Children's Hour, telecast Sunday mornings.

This program, similar to old-time amateur shows in your neighborhood movie theater, plays to more people each week than bigger – budgeted shows starring such well-known entertainers as Morey Amsterdam, Steve Allen, Ernie Kovacs and Jinx Falkenburg. The kids sing, dance, do comedy skits and generally strut the stuff they learned at those Friday afternoon dancing school sessions.

The program's appeal to children is obvious. As to the parents—well, maybe those whose kids appear on *Children's Hour* make certain their relatives and friends tune in. The show is emceed by Ed Herlihy, who in his spare time is the dulcet-voiced announcer on Kraft TV Theater.

That there are some higher intellects among New York TV viewers is proved by the fact that the second and third most popular local programs are nightly news roundups. John K. M. McCaffery's 11 o'clock news show draws the second largest audience. Third place goes to Allan Jackson and the News, which is aired opposite the McCaffery show.

In rating the shows New Yorkers like best, such special features as baseball games and the many feature movie programs have been excluded. New Yorkers throughout the summer followed their teams faithfully on TV. As for movie programs, *The Early Show*, *The Late Show* and *The Late Late Show* rank high.



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Chicago Dateline

TV's Week: Chicago's educational TV channel (11) is being plagued by that old debbil—Money! Although the Chicago Educational TV Association has met \$777,000 of its \$1,000,000 goal, progress is stalemated until the \$900,000 mark is reached. Latest reports are that the association has appealed to the Ford Foundation's Fund for Adult Education

for more money. But Ford, which has already allocated \$150,000 for Channel 11, reportedly rejected the plea on the basis of other communities' needs. Question now is will



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Chordettes The

Back in 1934, when a penny would buy more than your thoughts, an immigrant storekeeper with a hankering for show business, set up his own "show" in the display window of his shop on Chicago's South Side. Each Sunday thereafter, throngs of curious passers-by would gather around to watch a flock of amateurs go through their paces and be amused by the little merchant who served as a kind of selfstyled emcee. It was all quite entertaining-until the city curbed the impresario's efforts because the street audiences were snarling traffic in the area.

Today, 19 years and 11,000 acts later, the show has graduated to being simulcast on WENR and WBKB and has even made a clothing magnate out of its onetime "emcee," Morris B. Sachs. This Sunday (Nov. 15), Sachs Amateur Hour celebrates its 1,000th anniversary show, boasting one of the best records in the history of broadcasting.

It was the first amateur show in this country, beating Major Bowes by some eight months. It was also the first program to be simulcast in Chicago. It launched such stars as June Haver, Frankie Laine, Johnny Johnston, Mel Torme, Maureen Cannon, Pamela Britton and the Chordettes. And it also boosted the stock of such once-unknown announcers as Harlow Wilcox, Don Mc-Neill, Norman Barry and, currently, Bob Murphy.

The Amateur Hour, which has held down its noontime Sunday spot on TV for six years now, has been one of the most pleasing station-sponsor relationMaureen Cannon

ships ever initiated. This is probably because Morris B., who bankrolls the program, cares little more than a snap of the fingers for such details as four star ratings. He's more concerned with his desire to promote the welfare of his entertainment stars. This ambition dates back to Morris B.'s youth during which he experienced the frustrations of never getting a decent break.

During its 19 years of broadcasting and six years of telecasting, the Amateur Hour has had its share of unusual contestants. The 103-year-old colored man, for example, who wanted to win a prize so he could buy himself a pair of glasses. Or the youngster who hitchhiked in five-below-zero weather without a coat to appear. Or the old gentleman who played the trumpet and blew so hard he lost his false teeth. (Morris B. bought him a new set of choppers and the oldie came back to cop first prize.)

No slouch when it comes to charity, Morris B. is known around Chicagoland as the essence of generosity. Some wags claim his lack of modesty and an almost-fanatical desire for acclaim are responsible for his benevolence. But, whatever the motivating influence, no one can guibble that charitable organizations and tomorrow's stars are the beneficiaries.

Any network visions? No, says Morris B. He's content to be Chicago's King of the Talent Scouts. And if it's true that the first thousand are the hardest, Morris B. Sachs' second thousand shows should be a snap.

He Has Been More Than A Comic To Two Generations

BACK in 1927 a relief pitcher named Grover Cleveland Alexander was hauled out of the St. Louis Cardinal bull pen during the last game of the World Series to face the Yankees' Tony Lazzeri with the bases full. Lazzeri was young and full of beans and just itching to put the ball out of the park. Alexander was old and gray. He struck Lazzeri out.

It may seem a far cry from baseball to TV comedians, but the parallel is there. Old pitchers and old comics both pitch with their heads. Neither has too much stamina, but while they're in there they're unbeatable.

Jimmy Durante is the classic example of the old comic still in there pitching with his head. A weekly schedule would kill him, but he's still good for the one-a-month route—and when he's in there, he's unbeatable. Durante, at 60-plus, is best described as everybody's favorite old uncle. A shade too much on the pixie side to be the grandfather type, he is the fabled Uncle Jimmy who comes striding into the house maybe once a year and nobody is quite sure just what he does the rest of the time. But he remembers you at Christmas and on your birthday, and his annual visit is the highlight of the year.

Durante himself is childless. But he is a child in many ways, wonderfully wise beyond his years but somehow unable to cope with the everyday annoyances that constitute modern living and therefore prone to ignore them. He lives, actually, pretty much in a world of his own and is loath to venture out into that big, turbulent other world that is constantly swirling about him and occasionally suck-

ing him into its vortex. When this happens he clenches his cigar between his teeth, plants his hat firmly on the back of his balding head and goes forth to do battle as a David against Goliath. He generally wins.

Fortunately for Jimmy's peace of mind, he is as loveable off stage as he is on, a factor which weighs heavily in what might be called the department of industrial relations. People with every right in the world to get mad at him simply can't do it. If Jimmy finds conditions "exasperatin'," it's nothing to what people find Jimmy. He is constitutionally incapable of appearing anywhere on time — yet when he comes plowing in one hour late, a worried frown on his face, he is forgiven.

"That traffic," he'll groan. "Moider. Them red lights. I thought I'd never make it." So did everybody else, but who can get mad at Jimmy Durante? Actually, they're delighted he got there at all, for he often doesn't. A pushover for anything anyone wants him to do, he says yes to 10 different appointments in a single day and it is considered remarkable when he remembers two of them.

Remembering names is equally difficult to this gentle little soul who is so much a part of show business and yet at the same time quite removed from the general conception of a showman's life. He got a phone call one morning from someone who identified himself, Jimmy thought, as Joe McFall. "Just got into town," Joe said, "and would like to see you."

A Soft Touch

"Sure, sure, Joe," Jimmy said, trying to place the name. "Any time. Drop around this afternoon. Anything I can do for you, just let me know." The softest touch in all show business, Durante is constantly doing something for somebody and his old pal McFall, whoever he was, would be no exception. All his old pals are constantly broke and Durante is their walking Personal Loan Corp., the word "loan" being interpreted in its loosest possible sense.

Jimmy, however, was a little puzzled by McFall. He was sure it was a name he'd never heard before. So he checked, something he rarely bothers to do. Turned out he'd been talking to Joe McConnell, who at that time happened to be the president of NBC. Horrified at the thought of what he'd told McConnell on the phone, Durante called him back. "Joe," he said, the pixie in his voice spilling all over itself, "if there is anything you can do for me, I'll let you know."

Jimmy's home in Beverly Hills, an unpretentious one-story affair on one of the older streets, is the closest thing to a Club Durant that exists in real life. He lives alone with his housekeeper, Maggie, who has been with him eight years and who is by now completely impervious to his terrible "temper." Things never go right, in the Durante view, and his inherent capacity for righteous indignation, coupled with a vocabulary at once limited and enriched by a lack of formal education, leads to some truly magnificent outbursts. Maggie, being permanently on hand, is the chief target for these little dissertations. She has long since learned they are wholly meaningless.

While he has a small army of friends, those closest to him are his longtime partner, Eddie Jackson; his accompanist, Julie Buffano, and a writer, Jackie Barnett. His wife, the former Jeanne Olsen, died in 1943. They had been married 27 years and her death was a blow from which Jimmy has never fully recovered.

Paradoxically, it was Jeanne's death which was partially responsible for the boom in his career over the past 10 years. An M-G-M stand-by, he had been slowly fading in popularity to the point where a younger generation had hardly heard of him. Despondent in Hollywood when Jeanne died, he headed for New York and halfheartedly accepted an offer from the Copacabana. The results were quite hectic. Durante was discovered all over again, the New York critics and columnists welcomed him back to the fold with much loud braying.

The boom hit its peak in 1950 when Durante did his first TV show for NBC. Suddenly confident that he had found what he had been looking for, Durante got together with Eddie Cantor and laid down a few new rules of the game. "We're a couple of old guys," they told the network, "and we'd like to do things the easy way



for a change. We want to do our shows from California. And we don't want to do any more than one a month." Thus was born the rotating comic principle, now the backbone of the Colgate Comedy Hour.

With the exception of young Donald O'Connor, Durante is the easiest hunk of talent to get along with the network has yet found. And O'Connor's edge lies only in his facility for learning his lines quickly. No longer a young man, Durante finds it tough to keep an entire show in his head and makes frequent use of a series of offcamera cards on which his lines are printed in large block letters.

The problem is further complicated by the fact that Jimmy's eyes aren't what they used to be, and that wonderfully guizzical expression on-camera is more often than not a case of Durante trying to figure out what has been written on the cards.

Santa's Busy Helper

Temperament is a word Durante doesn't understand and can't pronounce anyway. It simply is not in his make-up. He works earnestly at his trade, his slight build, wispy hair and furrowed brows giving the impression of one of Santa Claus' helpers banging away at the toys in an effort to beat the Christmas deadline.

More often than not, Jimmy has something on his mind when he's working, something that worries him out of all proportion to its worth. On his last show of the 1952-53 season, he was washing up in his dressing room when three NBC executives came in to see him.

They talked at length about their plans for Durante for the next year, but Jimmy seemed to be off in another world somewhere. Finally he strode to the door and hollered for Jackie Barnett, "Jackie!" he commanded, his graveled voice edged with concern. "Them two old guys out on the street. Did ya get the tickets for 'em? Are they gonna get to see the show?" He had and they would, and another weighty United Nations problem, Durante version, had been settled.

E VER wonder why a TV sponsor will keep a certain commercial on his show week after week, even though you and your friends agree that it's probably the most irritating thing you've ever seen?

The answer is fairly simple. TV sponsors have found that whether viewers like or dislike a particular commercial has little to do with whether they will go out to buy the advertised product. In getting across their sales pitches, sponsors are chiefly interested in getting viewers to remember the selling points. And if the best way to get viewers to buy is to irritate them, then irritate them is the answer.

These are the conclusions based on years of pre-testing commercials for both radio and TV, of the Schwerin Research Corp., an outfit that specializes in testing new program ideas and new commercials with special test audiences. According to Horace S. Schwerin, president, "The advertiser's job is to get people to buy his products, not to determine whether they like or dislike his sales message." And as many viewers undoubtedly would attest, plenty of sponsors follow the Schwerin thinking.

Commercials Are Expensive

Because a TV commercial, even of the one-minute type, may cost up to \$5,000 to make, sponsors must be fairly certain, before it is put on the air, that it will sell merchandise. The importance of this is further demonstrated by estimates that some \$6,-000,000 is spent yearly in New York alone for production of filmed TV ads.

A number of big-money advertisers have subscribed to the Schwerin pretesting system. In addition, NBC recently arranged with Schwerin to make his pre-testing service available to sponsors of its shows.

Under that arrangement, an advertiser can have a commercial produced in "rough," inexpensive form at NBC's film studios in New York. These trial plugs have simple settings, a minimum of props and performers and no trick effects. The "roughs" are inserted in regular TV programs being tested at Schwerin's research theater in New York. The test audiences are then asked to recall the brand name of the product advertised and everything they remember having seen or heard about it. From the results obtained, the sponsor can make the necessary changes in his commercial before the expensive process of filming it.

Beauty Distracts Viewer

Have you ever wondered, for example, why you don't see more pretty girls in bathing suits on TV commercials? It's because the Schwerin tests have found that too much beauty may "clutter the results."

A refrigerator manufacturer once

tested a commercial in which a pretty scantily-dressed model stood before his product. Viewers naturally did not object to the commercial, but few of them could remember what the sponsor was trying to get across. According to Schwerin, viewers paid too much attention to the model. The attention-getting device worked so well that the advertiser's message was lost.

Schwerin's tests have proved that politeness can pay off in a TV commercial. Two commercials produced for a headache remedy illustrate this point. In one, the main character bumped into a stranger on the street and was extremely rude to him. In the second, he also ran into a stranger but apologized politely, explaining that his head ached so badly that he hardly knew what he was doing. Because the main character in the second test was a nice guy toward whom the viewer could feel sympathetic, it was found to be 80% more effective than the first commercial.

To date, Schwerin has conducted about 1400 tests, each about two hours in length. And while it's difficult to generalize on the results, a number of points have been observed consistently enough to make them general practice for sponsors.

One point fairly well proved is that repetition helps the viewer remember the product. If you are fed up with the product claims pounded at you again and again don't worry about it. Perhaps your irritation is just what the sponsor wants.

IN THE CAST

CARL REINER, the talented young comedian who throws Sid Caesar most of his straight lines, was, when he started, probably the most underpaid actor in the business.

For his first job, as a 16-year-old juvenile with the old Daly Theater stock company in New York, Carl received exactly nothing. From that point, he progressed rapidly until he was drawing down the fat fee of \$1 per week, with orders from the management not to tell the other actors.

Carl next joined a summer stock group ("they let me play leading man because I had a mustache—in fact, I think I looked older then than I do now and I'm 31").

Then, after a summer in the borscht belt and three weeks singing in the chorus of *The Merry Widow*, Carl entered the Army. He volunteered for special services and turned to comedy with one of the GI units touring the Pacific theater under the supervision of Maurice Evans. He was discharged from the Army in 1945, played in the road company of *Call Me Mister* and then broke into TV on the old 54th Street Revue.

It was there that he caught the eye of Max Liebman, impresario of Your Show of Shows. In 1950, Liebman offered him a job on the Sid Caesar-Imogene Coca program, and he's been one of the cast regulars ever since.

During the past season, Carl branched out into panel shows, joining the lineup on *The Name's* the Same. According to him, this panel show dodge is strictly gravy for actors. "Besides being fun," he said, "there are no lines to learn, no rehearsal and the pay is good."

Although he talks blithely about his work, Carl is deeply serious about his comedy. For example, Caesar's German professor skits. "The jokes are all written and rehearsed," Reiner said, "but the charm of it all lies in Sid's freedom and his ability to expand on the lines. He ad libs as he goes, and it's my job to 'feel him out,' feeding him the right questions at the right time."

Reviews

Where's Raymond ?

R AY BOLGER's writers had probably the most difficult task in television when they set out to create the new Where's Raymond? program (ABC). Bolger is a person apart from the usual TV comedian, possessing an off-beat, elfin type of spirit that is charming to behold on TV but difficult to evoke on the show from week to week. In trying to transmit that warm, quaint quality of Ray's to TV, his writers have succeeded only partially. They've preserved the quality, but forgotten the show.

Bolger made his TV debut last winter as a star on *Comedy Hour* and immediately caught the fancy of millions of viewers with his sprightly dancing and humor. On that show, though, he ran through most of the skits and routines that had sustained him for years in Broadway musical comedies. The TV writers, consequently, were confronted with the age-old problem of show business: "What can we do for an encore?"

Their answer is a situation comedy in which Ray is cast as a Broadway musical comedy star, with a completely winsome personality but one major fault—he continually arrives at the theater at the last possible moment for each performance, driving his agent-brother and the rest of the cast wild. Seems like a thin story line on which to base a 39-week series.

The situations on each show project Ray's off-beat type of humor to the fullest. In capturing the elusive quality of their subject, though, the writers have permitted the show to drag.

But Ray has plenty of chance to give out with his singing, his wonderful dancing and his delightfully warm humor. This should be enough to please most viewers.

PRIDE OF THE FAMILY

PRIDE OF THE FAMILY cannot be marked down as one of the strongest entries in ABC's new allstar program lineup. With Paul Hartman, former nightclub and musical comedy dance satirist in the lead, the program is another in the long string of family comedies now inundating TV. The laughs in this one come from preposterous situations and Hartman's wonderfully mobile face.

The show suffers from the same drawback that has plagued too many other TV situation comedies. The situations are contrived to the point of absurdity. Here's a supposedly average middle-class American family, where the husband and an old crony are found sword-fighting by the wife and kids. They immediately deduce that they are trying to kill each other. Actually, they're just rehearsing for arevival of their high-school play. This is funny?

Hartman, as head of the household, is playing the bumbling, good-hearted character that won him numerous fans in his Broadway reviews. He is a really fine dancer but the script, thus far, has not provided any op-
