"They don't bother to whisper if they feel inspired to conversation," she says. "And every few minutes some of them are impelled to refresh themselves with soft drinks or candy bars even if it does mean crossing and re-crossing rows of people who are trying to concentrate on the screen."

We rather disagree with the delegate from Mt. Kisco. For many years we felt that movie theaters were much too stodgy, what with people whispering, tiptoeing and muttering "excuse me" as they tromped on your feet. There was, too, always that bothersome question of, "Am I entitled to the elbow rest on the right or the one on the left?" and the feeling of frustration that came when the lady in front of you removed her hat and revealed a towering hair-do.

Nowadays, what with everyone munching popcorn, swizzling celery tonic and chatting informally, we have a much better time at the movies. There's a nice, homey feeling about the theater, and, of course, the movies themselves are better than ever.

Television does not deserve all the credit for the transition from formal to informal atmosphere in the theaters. The motion picture producers, with their 3-D, their CinemaScope, their Cinerama, their stereophonic sound and other innovations, are trying constantly to make the audience part of the show. No one can be part of the show if he's stiff and withdrawn. Everyone must enter into the homey spirit of the movie.

Without TV manners, who could feel at home in a theater these days?

Don't look now, but JULIUS LA ROSA may be losing his humility. He arrived an hour-and-a-half late for a recent <u>Toast of the Town</u> rehearsal and had no excuse to offer for his tardiness. Emcee ED SULLIVAN reportedly was more than a little peeved . . . MARGOT FONTEYN, prima ballerina of the famed Sadler's Wells Ballet, heads the guest lineup on <u>Toast</u> Jan. 24, along with SAM LEVENSON, the AMES BROS. and CESARE SIEPI, Metropolitan Opera basso.

Despite ARTHUR GODFREY's personal complaints on the air that he hasn't been feeling too well and persistent rumors that he'll take a six-month leave, he insists that he's taking no time off until his vacation next summer . . . DEAN MARTIN and JERRY LEWIS slated for their next Comedy Hour appearance Feb. 28, filling an open date on the program's schedule.

Sponsor of <u>Dragnet</u> has renewed its contract for a full 52 weeks. But with 100 stanzas of the show already filmed, JACK WEBB can still switch his attention to his projected <u>Pete Kelly's Blues</u> program, if he so desires . . . <u>Dragnet</u>, incidentally, was back in first place in the American Research Bureau ratings for December with a 61.3 rating. It nosed out <u>I Love Lucy</u>, which slipped to second place with an even 60 rating.

Producers of <u>Suspense</u> have been asked by their sponsor to steer clear of costume dramas. Seems that most TV viewers dislike period pieces as much as movie fans do.

Our nomination for the most earth-shattering statistic of the year: CBS has it figured out that its "eye" trademark is seen about 100 million times daily by viewers and has been seen collectively some 75 billion times since it was introduced two years ago . . . GROUCHO MARX guests on EDDIE CANTOR's next Comedy Hour show Jan. 31.

ETHEL MERMAN and JIMMY DURANTE will team for an original musical comedy on MISS MERMAN's first <u>Comedy Hour</u> starrer Jan. 24. For her second show of the season, Feb. 21, she hopes to do a condensed TV version of one of her hit Broadway musicals. The rights are controlled by one of the movie studios, however.

NBC has decided to cancel <u>The Bennetts</u> and the fate of its other morning soap operas appears shaky. As a result, the upcoming <u>Home Show</u> may go from 11 A.M. to Noon, rather from Noon to 1 P.M., as originally scheduled . . . GERTRUDE BERG pencilled in for a starring role in "Morning Star" on U.S. Steel Hour Feb. 2.

HOLLYWOOD

Another network has finally succumbed to the wrestling craze. CBS inaugurating a weekly hour-long wrestling show from the Hollywood Legion Stadium on Feb. 6. Just when we thought the "sport" was on its way out as TV fare . . . LIBERACE is shooting six of his next 13 TV films in color. FRANK WISBAR, producer-director of Fireside Theater, has scrapped plans to shoot color film and will now wait for the commercial advent of color tape.

NBC now has shows on the planning boards for both ALAN YOUNG and PHIL SILVERS. But GEORGE GOBEL has decided to forego a show of his own for the time being, concentrating instead on guest shots and the night club circuit . . . CBS has been having a series of talks with MARGE and GOWER CHAMPION, who want to do a dramatic show with little or no emphasis on dancing.

NBC is converting its Burbank studio to color. BRODERICK CRAWFORD is thinking seriously of making a cops-and-robbers film series . . . And JANE WITHERS and her daughter WENDY are dickering for a TV show of their own .

A network has been talking to ZSA ZSA GABOR about an hour-long variety show . . . Look for BETTY WHITE, of <u>Life With Elizabeth</u>, to add a network daytime show to her schedule. She's been a West Coast day-time favorite for almost six years.

Columnist SHEILAH GRAHAM will do a TV news-gossip show for CBS . . . TONY DEXTER has been signed to headline a new dramatic film series, The Count of Monte Cristo . . . Veteran movie producer HUNT STROMBERG is moving into TV to produce a series based on juvenile delinquency. It will be titled Pitfall . . .

ROBERT YOUNG is about to make a two-ply plunge into TV. He stars in "One In Every Family" for <u>Ford Theater</u>, shooting Jan. 16, and will then go into his own series, <u>Father Knows Best</u>.

DAVID BRIAN, MARTHA VICKERS, MARJORIE LORD and ROSS ELLIOTT head the cast of the newest <u>GE Theater</u> film, "Another Sunlight" . . . Four set manufacturers--RCA, Zenith, Silvertone and Roeschheld private demonstrations of their color sets here Jan. 1, picking up the Rose Parade color-cast via NBC.

ROBERT E. SHERWOOD, pleased with the success of his first hour-long drama for NBC, "The Backbone of America," is unreservedly enthusiastic about TV, believes it to be the perfect training ground for young new playwrights and feels it will also help to revitalize the American stage.

It's Nice To Scoop The World

TELEVISION NEWSMEN WORK, FIGHT AND PLAN TO GET THE STORY FIRST

WHEN the Ile de France rescued the survivors of a sinking freighter during a wild storm, an enterprising passenger offered CBS-TV color films of the rescue. There wasone hitch: the Ile de France, the passenger, survivors and film were still a day and a half out on the high seas.

CBS's foreign news editor, Frank Donghi, a newsman of the old school, tried a long shot. If he could pick up the film by helicopter, bypass customs, scoot the film out for processing, he would scoop the industry by showing it on the *Doug Edwards* show, 7:30 P.M. Friday—one hour

after the ship was due to dock in New York.

On a pre-arranged signal, the film, sealed in tins and attached to a life preserver, was dropped overboard. "From a plane, a life preserver looks like a candy mint, and each time we'd spot it, we'd turn around to come down for a landing and lose our bearings. On about the eighth try, we got it... fortunately," Donghi added. "On this kind of a venture, you're only a hero if you come through. If you don't, you're an out-and-out bum."

There are two major kinds of news stories—the planned and the accidental, and planned events (speeches, new developments) get about as much secrecy as a county fair, with almost as many attendants. When disasters occur, the news is relayed to police and fire departments, which are covered by local newspapers. Within minutes the wire services send flashes out over the teletypes to newsprooms of nearly every newspaper,

radio and television station in the country. A TV assignment editor needs only to pick up the phone, call his contact nearest the scene and tell him to get out on the job.

John Daly, ABC's vice-president in charge of news, says, "With today's thoroughness of coverage, the most practical hope for a scoop is to hope your competitor's luck runs out." Occasionally, though, it's done in full view of the entire press. In the last Presidential campaign, a weary Adlai Stevenson sat on a dais facing a wall of cameras. Stevenson on a dais was a daily event, but a hole in the shoe of the man who might be President was TV, magazine and front page material—and one person saw that.

Nowadays, the only guaranteed scoops are the manufactured ones (the point where press agentry was born) and cameramen go to fantastic lengths to come up with a new angle for an ordinary story. Any news editor will tell you that "cameramen



don't die in bed." Frank McCall, producer of Swayze's Camel News Caravan is convinced that "the crazier the cameraman, the better the results."

One windy day last year, during the filming of "The Thief," Ray Milland climbed the 200-foot antenna tower that rises from the 102nd floor of the Empire State Building. The press and movie crews thought their view from the 102nd floor terrace was

sensational enough. But Tom Priestly, an NBC man, disagreed—and placing the strap of his hand camera between his teeth, started up the ladder ahead of Milland. Priestly then braced himself with one hand and ran his camera with the other, shooting down at

Milland's spectacular upward climb.

A few winters back, mountainous snow drifts stalled a train in California's Donner Pass. A CBS photographer, using a rented plane, landed, took pictures and flew back to Los Angeles before the emergency crews had gotten through. That same night, while the train was still stranded in the mountains, Eastern viewers saw the film on the *Douglas Edwards* show.

While most people witness a riot, an explosion or a plane crash once in a lifetime, cameramen cover them every day. For hazardous assignments, the networks insure their men each for \$25,000. On especially dangerous missions, as when CBS recently sent a man to the North Pole, insurance goes as high as \$50,000.

Dangerous Assignment

In covering New York's waterfront scandal, Chet Burger, CBS's news chief, was knocked down and out before his identity was established.

In the treacherous Eastern zone of Germany an NBC cameraman, working incognito, was almost mobbed when his affiliation became known. And during the filming of Ed Murrow's documentary on Germany, NBC's camera crew caught the CBS crew in a brawl with the Germans who were shouting "Amis (a derogatory word for Americans) go home."

We Beat! We Beat!

So rare are news scoops that when one does occur (NBC beat CBS by 40 ininutes on the Greenlease kidnap murder) the networks shout themselves silly telling the world.

Although viewers will go on being loyal to individual commentators, the substance of a news show is in the hands of the cameramen. As Burger says, "You can take the best commentator, the best news editor, the best script, and no matter what you do with them, your show is no better than your film was in the first place."

HE WANTS TO BE AN ACTOR, TOO

PAUL WINCHELL EYES

THERE WERE raised eyebrows along puppet row when the Winchell-Mahoney show changed its name to the *Paul Winchell Show*. Did this mean that Jerry Mahoney would be out of a job?

It turns out that Paul is doing some long-range thinking. "A ventriloquist usually becomes subordinated to his dummy," Paul explains. "I had to find some way to develop two distinct people—Jerry and me."

Paul decided that the way to establish his own personality apart from his ventriloquism was to become an actor. And not just an ordinary actor. He wants to become a great actor.

But what about Mahoney? Where does he fit in? "What I've done," answers Paul, "is to establish two different entities. Jerry does a sketch with me seemingly nowhere around. We do the commercials alternately. That way it looks like I'm resting while he's working and vice versa."

Paul, of course, has been acting on his show for several years, but this year he went all out on the acting kick. The sketches were longer and written with more care. He did a weekly comedy sketch with Jerry and Knucklehead Smiff, but another part of the program starred Paul and top actors and actresses in dramatic bits. Hence the new title of the show.

Realism Was Needed

How did Paul come to the conclusion that he was an actor? It all started on the *Lights Out* show a few years ago. They had a story about a ventriloquist who had no control over what his dummy was saying. They were going to use a straight actor in the part until the producer decided that a real ventriloquist would give the show added realism.

"As it turned out," reports Paul, "my acting wasn't so hot, but the show was a big success because of the mechanical realism. That was my first

dramatic attempt."

When the What's My Name? gimmick on the old Winchell-Mahoney show called for actors, Paul decided to expand his activities. "For the first year, I was more concerned with what I was going to say. Then I began to realize all the little nuances existing in the drama. I learned how to react to what others were saying."

Holiday From Acting

Apparently at the request of sponsors, Paul is doing some of his shows without the dramatic interlude, but he shows no indication of permanently abandoning the plan.

For those concerned with Mahoney's future, Paul offers these reassuring words, "I know which side my bread is buttered on. Jerry is emphatically not going to become less important. He'll have less to do, but what he does will be more important."

After Paul swung over into the acting dodge, his pal Jerry decided that he's a ham too. "Jerry can be serious now and the audience will go

along with it," Paul says simply.

The larger emphasis on the dramatic end of the show this fall included the importation of big-name guest stars to play opposite Paul. Robert Preston, Viveca Lindfors, Gene Lockhart and Maria Riva have already put in appearances.

"The response was much greater than we had expected," says Paul. "We've even had suggestions that we



make the dramatic skits longer."

A clue to Paul's drive for success can be found in his courageous and winning battle with polio. Crippled by the disease, Paul not only recovered, but is now a substantial physical specimen and an accomplished weight-lifter.

Chances are that if he becomes a great actor, he'll decide he wants to be a politician. Since he already is a singer, dancer, actor, ventriloquist, mimic, stunt man and comedian, it would be no trouble at all.

ARRY ROGUE, an agile 37year-old dancing master, is the man who made Arthur Godfrey dance and who is now busy making expert hoofers of all the little Godfreys.

Harry, who holds special dancing classes for the Godfrey gang each week, hasn't had to flunk a pupil yet.

Rogue says Haleloke had to forget some of her hula rhythms to learn other steps. "Janette Davis is as good as any of the gang," he says. "All she needs is confidence. After watching me go through a routine, Jan says she'll never master it. But she does. Frank Parker and Marion Marlowe are both experienced dancers.

"The best of the lot? Until his operation, I'd say Mr. Godfrey. He has a photographic mind. He used to watch the steps and then do them without a hitch. He'd even do the others' routines to show how easy they were."



WHEN Stuart Brent, a swarthy-complexioned gentleman who runs a bookshop on Boul Mich, began his TV scries of philosophical chats, few experts on Chicago's video scene would have given you a nickel for his chances of survival. Least assured of all was Stuart himself, who was caught several times pinching himself and mumbling, "What the devil am I doing here?"

Housewife's Delight

However, today with several months of telecasting behind him, the same Stuart Brent is threatening to become as vital to TV as are Paul Gibson and Galen Drake to radio. In this short span, his 15-minute show at 1:15 PM, on channel 7, has wooed a goodly portion of housewives away from the traditional afternoon giveaway stanzas. To quote the average housewife and mother: "It's such a relief... to listen to someone who has the ability to make me feel like an important person."

Stuart spins his talks around topics close to every homemaker's heart. He teaches them how to be happy though married and how to take the monotony out of housework. For the core of his lectures, Stuart uses a central formula for personal happiness which, he claims,

is based on love, reason and productive work. By clever manipulations, he weaves parables into each talk, a technique which detracts from the stigma of dullness usually associated with philosophy.

Father, Teacher, Editor

Stuart comes by his gift of gab and insight through a long study of philosophy—and people. He's happily married to a former concert pianist and the father of three children—two boys and a girl, all of pre-school age. He is a former teacher in Chicago schools and colleges, a philosophy lecturer, and presently holds a post as editor in the psychiatric division of Random House publishers. His boss, one Bennett Cerf, is also rather well-known and respected in television.

The prime concern of some viewers is what will happen when Stuart runs out of material. This danger, however, does not appear imminent. Statistics will prove it. As a philosophy teacher, he carried a five-hour-per-day talking schedule in school. This is equivalent to 20 quarter hours, his chatting time on TV. One day's teaching, therefore, equals one month of TV shows. At that rate, Stuart Brent, the man with the parables, still has a long way to go.





Reviews

DOES Red Skelton have a future as a TV comedian? Last year illness and bad shows lost him not only his place among the Top 10 programs but also most of his audience. Red intimated at the start of this year that he knew this was it: he'd win or lose in TV on his record this season. So far, there's been no decision—some weeks he wins, some weeks he loses.

A wise choice this year was abandoning film for live shows. When Red was doing film, he left all the fluffs in the final version for spontaneity. But it never worked out that way. Even his mistakes seemed planned. Live televising lets Red take full advantage of his fluffs and ad libs, kidding a mistake in the show until it's much funnier than the original version.

Foibles Are Funniest

Skelton is still one of the best comics in the business. He's a master of pantomimicry and his caricatures, based on universal foibles, are classics. Never known for subtlety, his acting talent often adds just the right touch of pathos to a comedy characterization. As for slapstick, he's a winner if he doesn't get ridiculous.

The flaw this year has been Red's stock of characters. Even though he revives his Cauliflower McPugg, Clem Kadiddlehopper, etc. with different situations each time, they still have a familiarity that breeds boredom. Skelton characters that were welcome for years on radio no longer have that zing on TV. It's time he started to look around for a new cast.

LIFE WITH FATHER

W HATEVER it was that made Life with Father one of the longest-running hits in Broadway history, the new TV version hasn't got it. The TV show is complete with the pompous, domineering father; the subservient but clever mother, and the four red-headed sons. But where on the stage they teamed to present a nostalgic backward glance at life at the turn of the century, these same characters on TV are lacking in charm and warmth.

The fault lies in both the writing and the direction. Howard Lindsay and Russel Crouse, who wrote the Broadway play, are listed as consultants on the TV script. What they contribute to the TV show is not readily apparent. To date, the program hasn't been able to bring the famous Clarence Day characters to life.

The cast tries hard. Leon Ames blusters his way through the father's role. Lurene Tuttle is believable as the mother. The kids are stymied by the script, but the girls who play the various maids on duty at the Day



Martha Raye is one of the great low comediennes. Her routines are boisterous, rowdy affairs, full of slapstick, wild plot lines and fantastic mugging - with appropriate crossed eves, crooked arm and other contortionist business. But she's one of only a handful of clowns who can pull it off. This season that little band of unwavering skeptics, the TV critics, did everything but sing Hallelujah in

praise of her shows.

A good slice of credit for Martha's metamorphosis goes to director Nat Hiken who, with Billy Friedberg, has written and directed all of Martha's own shows. The team knows its girl. Nat pushed up a few eyebrows last year when he cast Rocky Graziano as her TV boyfriend. But the exmiddleweight champ turned in an amazingly funny performance. Now The Rock is a stock foil for the goil.

Martha is ever playing the patsy. Like Durante teamed with Traubel. Martha is incongruous with the people around her. She's a guest at a veddy, veddy formal dinner which she and The Rock turn into a free-forall food slinging contest; she is Margaret Truman's unwitting roommate in a Brooklyn flat or the fourth Gabor sister, described by Mama Gabor as "the most beautiful of my daughters."

Sofa, So Good

Martha's love-making scenes with a suitable male "pursuer" are old fashioned wrestling matches. Using her favorite prop, a sofa, she contorts herself into a few dozen implausible positions while her date looks on perplexed. With her legs every which way, arms snaked around her own neck, eyes fluttering and expressions running the gamut, Martha woos,

A 90-minute diet of this brand of clowning, plus jazz and ballad singing and comedy dancing is too much for most men. With Martha, who had a rough bout with a kidney ailment last

year, it's a real problem.

The little Irisher, Maggie O'Reedthat's her real name-is the daughter of vaudevillians Pete Reed and Peggy Hooper. She was singing and hoofing at age three. At 14, an accomplished trouper, she played an inebriate in the musical, "Calling All Stars." "Here she was, a young kid playing a drunk," said a close friend, "who had to fall down a flight of stairs every performance. And on opening night she breaks her arm, but doesn't say a word for fear she'll lose the part."

Hollywood beckoned when producer Norman Taurog cast her in "Rhythm on the Range" where she scored with her famous comedy song, "Mr. Paganini." Quickly dubbed "The Mouth." she frolicked through a couple of flickers.

"Then," says Martha rather ruefully, "somebody discovered that I had a pretty good pair of legs. So they made me a glamor girl." For two years running Martha took the gam championship away from such Holly-







wood dolls as Marlene Dietrich and Joan Crawford. Romantic roles started. Her last Hollywood effort, though, was her best—as the spouse of a rascal bigamist-killer in Charlie Chaplin's "Monsieur Verdoux."

She Got The Business

Before TV Martha performed at Miami's Five O'Clock Club, which she still owns with ex-hubby Nick Condos and Norman Schylur. "It was the roughest work of all," says Condos. "When Martha went home, everybody went home. So if we wanted business she had to be on the job."

Martha's life is calmer now. Four times married and divorced, she lives in a Westport, Conn., home with her daughter Melodye, 9, a maid and a secretary. Her one pastime, television, is a passion with her from morning till the Late Late Show signs off.

Her own TV rehearsals find Martha decked out in blue jeans rolled to the knees, a tight fitting sweater, size 40, long woolen stockings and moccasins, size four. The cover-all for this getup is an ankle-length mink coat.

Working with Milton Berle, a martinet during rehearsals, Martha shows Uncle Miltie an irreverence that could only spring from their own reverence for each other. When Berle postures, Martha waddles to the other side of the stage and mimics him.

But Martha, She's Different

"She's the only one who could get away with it on the Berle show," remarked one observer. "The guy is nuts about her. She pulled the same stuff with Charlie Chaplin. And believe me, Chaplin is a lot rougher to handle than Berle. But Martha—well, she's different. It could be that these guys might just feel she's got more talent than they've got. Who knows?"

Before Paying After Paying

BUILT-IN BOX OFFICE

PAY-AS-YOU-SEE television, the system in which viewers will pay a fee to see first-run motion pictures and other outstanding entertainment on their home receivers, is making rapid strides.

One of the systems—Telemeter—was tested recently in Palm Springs, Calif., while other subscription television projects, Zenith's Phonevision and the Skiatron system, also have staged successful public demonstrations.

In many sections, new UHF stations are seeking to become the telecasting outlet for such systems. But all such programs must await Federal Communications Commission approval. The FCC has not approved a payas-you-see system.

At stake is a market that could rival present commercial network television. Sponsors of the Telemeter system have estimated that it could be installed in 50,000,000 homes.

The initial test in Palm Springs included the Notre Dame-Southern California football game, for which subscribers paid \$1, and the world premier of Paramount Pictures "Forever Female," starring Ginger Rogers, William Holden, and Paul Douglas, for which they paid \$1.35.

The Telemeter equipment consists of a coin-box attached to the existing home set. When the set is tuned to the channel carrying the Telemeter program, a distorted picture appears on the screen. The voice of an announcer, or "barker," is heard over the set's loudspeaker, repeating the name of the program to be telecast and the price.

When this amount is deposited in the coin-box, the picture clears, the barker's voice gives way to the audio of the program, and the viewer is ready to see the show.

It's The Telemeter Man, Ma

Among special features of the Telemeter system is a tape-recorder in the coin-box which keeps a record of the features you have seen and the amount of money deposited. A collector comes around at regular intervals to collect the tape and the money.

The box also is fitted with buttons which will register "yes" and "no," eventually to be used in measuring

public response.

Telemeter is the brainchild of Carl Leserman, a motion picture executive. Paramount Pictures holds a 50 percent interest in it, while the New York investment house of Lehman Brothers has a substantial interest.

According to present plans, the Telemeter equipment would be leased to the viewer for \$21.75 and he would agree to buy a minimum of \$3 worth of Telemetered programs monthly.

10,000,000 At \$1.

Some idea of the possibilities of a subscription system is given by Barney Balaban, president of Paramount. He visions the day when 10,000,000 set owners will pay \$1 each to see the promiere of a new motion picture. With this sum divided among the station, the Telemeter company and the motion picture company, the film's producer could recover all costs from this one showing.

The \$1 charge would be for each set, regardless of how many people were watching it. At the Palm Springs test, for instance, one subscriber collected from neighbors who came to see the show, made himself a profit.

boy movies, no matter how ancient, invariably built a regular audience.

A psychiatrist once accounted for the popularity of westerns by saying that the hero represents a "father image," the incorruptible leader with whom all viewers want to identify themselves.

Station WATV in Newark, New Jersey, was probably the first station in the U. S. to operate on the theory that old horse operas never die. It started a series of westerns in May, 1948, seven nights of the week, and it's still going strong.

Bob Pascow, who buys the film for WATV, estimates that horse opera audiences are in the eight-to-15 age bracket, with an astonishingly large number of older people tuned in.

NEVER DIE



The average western is bought from a distributor as part of a packaged series. These series sell for varying amounts, depending on the size of the market. The cost for an individual film can run from \$25 to \$500—for a single showing.

Except for the later cowboy films made especially for TV, such as Roy Rogers, Gene Autry, Kit Carson and Wild Bill Hickok epics, the average TV horse opera is four to 12 years old.

Dawn Of An Era

Then there are some westerns that were made shortly after talkies came in. Such old timers as Hoot Gibson and Ken Maynard are making TV comebacks in the certified Hopalong Cassidy manner. The film quality of the Gibson movies is so bad that, except for TV, they long ago would have been sliced up into mandolin picks.

Bill German, who handles the TV distribution of films for Republic Pictures (Hollywood TV Pictures), claims that all cowboy films have a "residual value." They are aimed at the kids' market; therefore they have an audience turnover every two years.

1000 Horse Operas

Republic has long been the leading producer of westerns. It has made movies with Gene Autry, John Wayne, Roy Rogers, Wild Bill Elliott, Red Ryder, Don Barry, the Three Mesquiteers, Sunset Carson and Bob Livingston. In all, there are about 1000 horse operas available for television.

The old Hopalong Cassidy series is still making runs at stations around the country, though it no longer is shown in the older TV cities like New York, Philadelphia, Chicago and Los Angeles. Made approximately between the years 1935 and 1942, they still bring from \$1000 to \$1250 per showing. And that ain't hay?



R ECOMMENDING a dish that is typically San Franciscan is quite a problem. I can identify no one thing that fits this category. San Francisco is composed of many racial groups

and each has contributed something special to the flavor of the city and its justly famous food.

There is the marvelous fresh fish from the Wharf; the outstanding Italian and Chinese foods; dishes prepared from old Swedish, Dutch, Armenian, Indian and Persian recipes—in fact, food prepared and served in the traditions of every country in the world. In my own KPIX kitchen, I always try to keep in mind the extreme variety of tastes.

Fresh fruit is always a delight and so perhaps the dish to entice jaded appetites would be a real fresh fruit bowl. In San Francisco this delicious fruit is brought to our produce district around three o'clock each morning, reaches the produce stands all over the city dewy fresh, and awaits only to be carried home, arranged attractively and served with pride.

Golden Gate Melon Avocado Plate


Cut cantaloupe into rings, and pare. Divide rings into equal crescents. For each salad, place 4 cantaloupe crescents in ring on crisp salad greens. Fill with avocado balls, watermelon balls, half frosty pineapple chunks and diced cantaloupe from the end pieces. Drench with a dressing of 1/3 each lemon juice, honey and Sherry wine. Sprinkle with finely chopped fresh mint.

Imagination conjures up a delight-


