as we see it

Radio Moscow recently announced, quite proudly, that Soviet television already has outstripped American television. The broadcast revealed that most Soviet viewers are enjoying TV on large 12 and 14-inch screens and that laboratory tests are being carried out on a gigantic 16-inch screen.

All, however, is not serene in Soviet TV. For example, a letter in The Evening Moscow from a Russian lady, V. Aleinikova, related the difficulties she had in getting her set repaired.

When the thing stopped working she called Shop No. 3 of the Radio Trust and got Specialist Yermolinsky to come over and fix it. He charged her 23 rubles—about \$5.75—but the set still didn't work. On her next call she got Specialist Smirnov. Cost: \$12. Still no go. Her third effort got Specialist Shorin, who nicked her for \$8.25. Shorin was just as successful as the other comrades. So V. Aleinikova wrote the newspaper, which not only printed her letter, but added a cartoon depicting a bumbling repairman tinkering with a TV set.

Our hearts go out to V. Aleinikova, whose huge 12 or 14-inch set is not in working order. Her case is quite possibly a rare one, and we are not by any means gloating because even in America there may have been a set owner who experienced similar frustration. We doubt that three different American repairmen would be licked by one set, but it is at least within the realm of possibility that it could happen here.

The story made no mention of what happened to Specialists Yermolinsky, Smirnov and Shorin, but if they happen to be vacationing in sunny Siberia, let them take comfort in knowing that in the field of television repairwork, things can be rough all over.

She's a One-Man Woman

Here's Why Eve Arden Hasn't Joined The Trek To Television's Husband-and-Wife Comedy Shows

T HAS BEEN said, with considerable truth, that TV's situation comedies are cut pretty much from the same formula cloth. They usually feature a husband-and-wife combination, the husband characterized as something of a barely civilized oaf; the wife portrayed as the tolerant, wise, understanding and beautiful epitome of married womanhood.

The outstanding exception to prove this mournful rule is *Our Miss Brooks*, a two-year-old show lifted bodily from a successful radio show which dates from 1947, and the star of which is Eve Arden. To the casual on-looker, or listener-in, Miss Arden is an uninhibited man-chaser who differs from the Vera Vague—Cass Daley school of man-chasing only in that she is considerably more intelligent. A schoolteacher, in fact.

She is indeed a schoolteacher, but she is quite definitely not a manchaser. She is a Boynton-chaser. There is a vast difference, and it is upon

this difference that the show has been solidly (and successfully) anchored since its inception. "As Connie Brooks," writer-director Al Lewis explains, "Eve's one object in life is to lasso Philip Boynton with the rope of matrimony. She is not a manchaser in any sense of the word. She has a deep and abiding crush on Boynton and Boynton alone. We are very careful never to introduce a possible distraction in the form of another eligible male."

What keeps the show on its even keel is the manner in which Boynton, as played by Bob Rockwell, is allowed to react—or rather, fail to react—to Connie's almost blatant hints.

"If," says Lewis, learnedly, "we were to allow Boynton to catch on, we'd have to let him react. Then he could do only two things: go for the girl or give her the brush. And the format of a very successful show would have to go out the window. If he went for the girl, they'd get married and we'd be off on the kind of family show of which there are already too many. If he gave her the brush, we'd have to drop him and bring in another man—and no other man could possibly be as naive as Boynton."

Lewis has his point. The show has been enormously popular for seven years, so why gamble?

The character of Philip Boynton was shaped with a great deal of thought and experiment. He didn't just happen. As a high school biology teacher, he had to have a good deal of native intelligence—and it's hard to believe that a man so intelligent could possibly be unaware of his colleague's limpid blue eyes and forward ways. Thus he is portrayed as something of a dedicated man—dedicated to biology. As it applies scholastically, however; not in any other sense.

"I teach biology," Mr. Boynton explained to a stranger on the show one evening. "Notice he says 'teach'," remarked Miss Brooks acidly, "not 'learn'." She says such things with a certain bitterness which is never apparent to the un-beleaguered Mr. Boynton. To him, biology is a fascinating proposition of algae, osmosis and self-propagating paramecia.

On another occasion, Miss Brooks and her matrimonial mirage started for the door at the same time. Mr. Boynton waved courteously and said, "After you, Miss Brooks."

"We should both live so long," muttered Miss Brooks. But she might as well have been talking to a stone wall. As a matter of fact, she was.

Boynton's other safeguard against Miss Brooks' onslaughts is a built-in regard for a dollar. Mr. Boynton never picks up a check. When, as a matter of industrial or inter-office relations, he takes Miss Brooks to the movies, he fully expects her to pay her own way. This is not to say that Mr. Boynton is an out-and-out tightwad. He is merely a careful man who has never had money and whose position as a schoolteacher is hardly designed to remedy the situation.


So far as Lewis and producer Larry Berns are concerned, things will go on like this as long as the audience doesn't tire of it. Boynton will not catch on to Miss Brooks' little dilemma, and her eye will never wander to some other man. "She is strictly a one-man woman," Lewis says firmly, "and that's the way it's going to be."

No Mrs. For This Miss

While the letter-writers among the viewers rarely come right out and say they like it this way, there is a between-the-lines indication that they appreciate Miss Brooks' frustration. Viewers often make rather wistful references to a possible marriage, Lewis admits, but he feels they really don't mean it. "They're cheering her on, but they don't have their hearts in it. It would just spoil all the fun."

Miss Brooks' occasional little successes, however, are greeted with enthusiastic applause. When Mr. Boynton, trapped by the unwritten protocol of mistletoe at Christmas time, planted a scholarly kiss on Miss Brooks' pretty mouth, the preview audience which supplies the show's applause broke into a rebel yell of approval. It was so loud and long it had to be cut down considerably.

INNER SANCTUM opens its door to TV

Under the heading of incidental information that practically everyone can do without, we offer the following item: there are only two sounds registered by the U. S. Copyright Office. One is the NBC chime.

The other is that agonized, screeching door hinge that is the signature of the old radio chiller, Inner Sanctum. Now that you've recovered from the shock, we'll tell you how we came by this big news. Inner Sanctum has decided that TV fans are just as easy to scare as the old radio crowd. They've switched to TV, creaking door and all. A lot of the blood and gush is missing. Things that made for finger-nail chewing via radio might be just a little too strong if seen. So the emphasis has been shifted. The

dark doings have a psychological twist, with the cameras probing inner conflicts that build up into terror.

Hi Brown, the fellow who first opened that creaking door back in 1941, is still in charge, and he has found things ain't what they used to be. On radio he needed a technical crew of four—the producer, director, engineer and sound effects man. On TV, his production payroll is now up to around 40. When you tack on the cost of actors, that's pretty—shall we say?—stiff.

Brown is doing something which might be called revolutionary for TV: he's filming his show in New York City, convinced that it is just as practical to do a filmed show there as it is in California. Brown points out that the main argument for California was the year-round sunshine for outdoor shots. But now filmmakers flood even their outdoor sets with lights, just to make sure.

Ghoulishness In Gotham

His reason for staying in New York is his belief that the most desirable actors for TV are stage players, most of whom live in New York. He feels that movie acting can't compare with the stage variety. And he also maintains that all the best writing talent is around New York City. There just might be a touch of chauvinism in his attitude. Brown lives in Manhattan and intends to stay. Because he'd like to prove his radical doctrine about filming there, he has hired the best technicians he could find and boasts that his films are vastly superior in every technical respect to Hollywood TV films.

None of the biggest stars appears, but most of the talent on the show is first—rate. Such fine character actors as Everett Sloane, Paul Stewart, Wallace Ford, Ian Keith and Kevin Mc-Carthy have all worked in one or more of the productions. Brown has long-range plans for building up a

sort of stock company of players.

About that creaking door. Brown thought and thought about that problem. How to have a door that would live up to the eerie effect produced on radio by a sound effects man? Finally Hi hired a sculptor named Maurice Eyengton who had done some pretty gruesome work for J. Arthur Rank, the British film mogul. Eyengton was given carte blanche to let loose all his psychopathic impulses

so as to provide a door that would frighten Charles Addams.

Well, Eyengton has come up with a real horror. When closed, the door gives the distinct impression that the likes of Bela Lugosi is lurking behind it. It opens on an endless series of corridors which are designed to let the viewer's imagination work on whatever terrifying subject he chooses. It's pretty scary.

Oh, yes. Mr. Raymond, the ghoulish gentleman who used to introduce the radio show, is along, too. Paul Mc-Grath, a veteran actor, is still Raymond. You won't ever see him, though. His voice is so sinister that seeing him would be disappointing.

Maryland Crab Imperial

B ALTIMORE is noted for its fine seafood restaurants, and home menus often feature the oyster, clam, fish, and—best of all—the Chesapeake Bay crab.

One of the easiest ways to prepare crabs is to steam the green-brown shellfish until they turn a fiery red and serve in the shell like lobster.

Most of you, however, are not able to buy crabs in your local markets. But genuine Chesapeake Bay crabmeat is available, fresh-packed, from coast to coast. For that reason we have chosen Crab Imperial as our selection for TV Guide readers.

Maryland Crab Imperial

1 lb. Chesapeake Bay crab lumps (backfin); ½ green pepper, chopped & partially caaked in butter; 1 pimiento, chapped; 2 t. Warcestershire sauce; 3 T. mayonnaise; 1 egg white, lightly beaten; salt and freshly ground black pepper; ½ t. dry mustard; dash paprika.

Place crab meat, pimienta, and sauteed green pepper in a bawl. Next cambine ather ingredients and gently fald inta crab meat. Pile an scrubbed, dry crab shells ar individual casseroles, garnish with pimienta strips. Bake at 375 degree F. far abaut 20 minutes or until golden. Serves 3-4.

Serve with hat french fried potataes, tassed green salad, Maryland beaten biscuits, Lady Baltimore cake, beverage.

WBKB's personable and capable newsman is grappling with a strange TV environment. As part of the station's "new look" in programming, Kip has taken over the 2:45-3 PM spot on Channel 7, Monday through Friday, and now has a whole new audience to win over—women.

Fellow commentators have only sympathy. Afternoons have always been considered no man's land by most newscasters who consistently prefer the evening hours when the men folk can be reached. But Kip isn't harvesting any ulcers, in spite of the fact that he's bucking such favorites of the ladies as Bob Crosby and Kate Smith.

Won't "Play Down"

Moreover, Kiplinger progressively considers women fully as intelligent as men. He's made a vow not to "play down" in his approach to the news. "The only concession I'll make," Kip has declared, "is to report more marketing news. Housewives are price conscious." Needless to add, Kip's married.

This same high-level, scholarly and honest approach to reporting has made Kip in the brief span of three and a half years one of the city's prime video newshawks. It's also earned him an enviable niche on ABC's nationwide radio network. And in a newer note of recognition, Kip was named by TV GUIDE best Chicago newscaster of 1953.

Another role in which Kip excels is that of interviewer. Controlling but not monopolizing the conversation, he keeps the talk moving at a lively clip. And whether the interviewee is a pearl expert from Japan or a politician from Chicago, Kip can chat glibly about his guest's particular specialty.

His savvy, as you might surmise, stems from hard work. Kip, for a thorough self-briefing, plows through stacks of books beforehand. Equally exacting about his commentaries, he sifts all the news before writing scripts for his radio show and his evening TV





John Ott: Photo Wizard

HIS TREASURE'S



IN A JAM CLOSET

NO CHICAGO TV star is looking forward to color television more than WNBQ's wizard of time-lapse photog-

raphy, John Ott. The striking films of blossoming plants and flowers that enhance his popular show, How Does Your Garden Grow?, are impressive even in black-and-white. Transmitted in rich color, they'll carry a powerful impact,

The proof is in the can—reels of color film stored in John's suburban home and ready for instant use. Distributed as educational flickers, they've been shown so far only to garden clubs and societies. Ott's color time-lapse films were also used by RCA-NBC in the first exhibit of their color TV system.

The mass TV audience for John's masterpieces is still in the making. But John Ott is remarkably patient.

As evidence, consider the brilliant opening sequence of How Does Your Garden Grow? (1 PM, Sun. Channel 5)—"The Waltz of the Flowers." It took five years to capture on celluloid and lasts a mere two minutes. Despite the flowery praise the Flower Waltz has reaped, Ott detects flaws. "If I ever have five years free, I'll perfect it," he says.

John has trouble finding even a few hours. He makes regular appearances on NBC-TV's *Today*, produces nature films for Walt Disney, and does photographic plant research for fruit growers, manufacturers, doctors and scientists. He's also been tapped for a new NBC-TV network venture, *Out on the Farm*.

To match his activity boom, Ott has expanded the facilities on his Wilmette estate. Plants, cameras and mechanisms, for instance, are housed in a new specially-designed greenhouse which controls light, heat, humidity, etc.

Moreover, John has boldly usurped all "extra" space on the Ott homestead for his needs. A revamped chicken coop serves as his studio and film editing workshop, and his wife's jam closet has been converted to film storage.

A factor in his show's success is Ott himself. Six-foot four, graying and bespectacled, John has an earthy (no pun intended) quality that wins viewers.

For nearly 20 years, John was just a staid banker with a unique hobby. His fame swelled through his lectures, however, and Ott in the late '40's finally graduated to a full-time career as film maker and gardening expert.

Then in 1950, Ott was asked to "fill in" on a WGN-TV show. He came, he was seen, and he conquered. After doing a series for WGN-TV, he moved to WNBQ. Now John is an opulent oneman enterprise—an enterprise that is the outgrowth of work with a simple box camera John was given as a child.

Bob Stahl reports:



JUDY HOLLIDAY received such rave reviews for her recent appearance on TV Playhouse that her agents are now cooking up her own TV series for next fall . . . Juvenile Jury will replace the RED SKELTON show for the summer. No report on what will replace Jury on Sunday afternoons . . . CBS, continuing its Saturday afternoon race-track pickups, moves its cameras to the New York tracks during May and June. It will also televise racing's Triple Crown-the Kentucky Derby, Preakness and Belmont Stakes.

Any ART CARNEY fans wondering why their boy didn't do so well when he starred on the JACKIE GLEASON show recently might be interested in this rumor making the rounds: CARNEY reportedly was brilliant during rehearsals, getting laughs even from the stagehands. At the last minute, they say, JACKIE came into the studio in his wheel-chair and insisted on numerous script changes. CARNEY, not familiar with the new lines, stumbled during the telecast.

An hour-long variety show starring TOMMY DORSEY and his orchestra is the latest entry as a possible summer replacement for the GLEASON show. It was auditioned last week by CBS, but there's been no decision yet on how good it is . . . JANET GAYNOR, who made her TV debut last winter on Medallion Theater, will star on Video Theater May 6 in a play entitled "Two Dozen Roses."

MARTI STEVENS, new night-club singing star, may be handed a TV contract by NBC. She's the daughter of M-G-M movie chief NICHOLAS M. SCHENCK, but wants to make the grade on her own . . . MARK GOODSON and BILL TODMAN talking with NELSON EDDY about a twice-weekly 15-minute telefilm series, a la LIBERACE.

EDDIE FISHER's new hair-do makes him look so much like PERRY COMO that his fans are wondering whether PERRY, a former barber, gave him the haircut. Actually, all EDDIE did was move his part from the left to the right side . . . ABC has extended The Mask to May 2 in hopes of attracting a sponsor for the Sunday night mystery series. That represents an additional \$100,000 investment in the show by the network.

<u>December Bride</u>, a new situation comedy starring SPRING BYINGTON, will probably go in as a summer replacement for some CBS program this year . . . Also a summer replacement possibility is <u>Mr. Dooley</u>, a new telefilm series starring THOMAS MITCHELL . . . The new <u>Ellery Queen</u> show, in which HUGH MARLOWE has replaced JOHN IRELAND in the title role, is already being syndicated to local stations.

HOLLYWOOD

If NBC has its way, the divorce rate is going to double next season. The network is currently planning to put an hour-long SID CAESAR show and <u>Dragnet</u> opposite CBS' BURNS & ALLEN, ARTHUR GODFREY and <u>I Love Lucy</u> on Monday nights. Any family that can stand the strain of making a choice between those two line-ups should be put on public exhibition as a model. <u>Dragnet</u> vs. <u>Lucy</u>--Ouch!

You can't win, girls. After "searching all over the country," Producer RED BARRY has picked JACKIE LAUGHERY, "Miss U.S.A. of 1953," for the title role in his upcoming Calamity Jane film series . . . CBS has signed MAXWELL ANDERSON and BERNARD HERMANN to write and produce an hourlong opera for Christmas.

Most courageous man in the country today is without doubt ED-WARD R. MURROW. He takes on Senator JOE McCARTHY April 6 on See It Now and then faces GROUCHO MARX April 9 on Person To Person. He plans to spend the following weekend doing a quiet interview with SHIRLEY TEMPLE . . . The novel and entertaining SPIKE JONES show has been renewed for another six weeks through May 8.

BING CROSBY Enterprises is planning a detective series starring KEYE LUKE, longtime movie son of Charlie Chan. . . . And CBS has a show in the works for GLORIA GRAHAM, 1953 Oscar winner . . . Come 1956, you may be able to see the first re-run of the <u>I Love Lucy</u> on Sunday afternoons. No re-runs until then, however.

NBC, with an eye on CBS' top-rated JACKIE GLEASON show, has plans to throw a monthly hour-long series of live dramas into the Saturday night spot, with Hollywood names starring and Chrysler paying the \$100,000 production cost on the nine shows . . . JANE RUSSELL set for an upcoming ABBOTT & COSTELLO Comedy Hour.

English movie comedian ALEC GUINNESS is reportedly interested in coming to Hollywood to make a series of TV films...LIBERACE goes to Europe for a month this summer following his May 27 date at New York's Madison Square Garden. The producers of the show, meanwhile, have signed Violinist FLORIAN ZABACH to make a similar half-hour film series in an effort to duplicate the fantastic LIBERACE success.

ROCHELLE HUDSON has been cast opposite EDDIE MAYEHOFF in CBS' new That's My Boy . . . Despite all the talk about color killing off sales of black-and-white sets, more such sets were sold in January than were sold in the same month last year . . . The White Bowhunter, a series based on an actual bow-and-arrow safari, will be filmed in the Belgian Congo.

Gleason Obeys That Impulse

Second of Three Articles

THEN Jackie Gleason moved over from the DuMont network to clown for CBS, where the rewards are lusher, he instituted a minor spoils system by loading the payroll with his old buddies. All of them have pretty imposing titles but very little to do, simply because Genius Jackie manages everything around Studio 50 except the refreshment concession at the back of the theater. All of which is secretly frustrating to his cronies who draw healthy salaries watching their boss play all the positions while they sit on the sidelines.

CBS is aware of the surplus talent around Gleason's Park Sheraton head-quarters, and occasionally some of the brass request a change in the Gleason menage. It's then that Gleason's fierce loyalty to his crew bursts forth. "Jackie really fumes," said one of his press agents. "He'll shout, 'Look at the ratings! We're third, aren't we? Whaddya talking about? Whaddya mean, a change!"—and then he stalks out of the room."

Old Pal-You Jerk

Gleason tends toward the gruff, unsentimental—on the surface, anyway—type of friendship usually associated with ballplayers or bartenders. If he calls you a "crumbum," a "slob" or "a mental case," or if he bellows something about your questionable ancestry, he likes you. Certainly not everybody warms up to the extrovert

called Gleason, but even those genuinely irked by Jackie can't hold a grudge against the guy "you like in spite of his faults." As for Gleason's enemies—he has a number—their biggest complaint is a standard one in this business. They don't like the comic's king-sized ego—a commodity that, in Gleason's case, is almost synonymous with his king-sized talent.

The restless, multi-talented come-

dian has several safety valves for his energies. He composes music. Although he can't read a note, he wrote his show's theme, "Melancholy Serenade," by blowing notes on a trumpet and having a secretary jot them down. He paints, has done a portrait of his two daughters without faces. (Says Gleason, "So I can't do faces. It's novel, anyway, isn't it?")

Gotta Do Something

He is an omnivorous reader, will lock himself in his room and knock off a couple of books in a night. ("I'm an insomniac. I gotta do something.") His library is loaded with books on psychic phenomena—loosely, such things as telepathy and clairvoyance—a reading jag he's been on for 20 years. "This is big stuff now," says Gleason. "They're teaching it as required courses in psychology in colleges." So big is it to Gleason that he's independently producing a TV series on the subject.

If sufficiently restless, the Great Man will yield to a sudden impulse. Producer Jack Hurdle claims he acts entirely from impulse. "A couple of summers ago," relates Hurdle, "Jack felt a goofy urge to spend a day at Rockaway Amusement Park—so away we went. We rode every roller coast-



er, ate hot dogs and that sticky gook at every concession stand, poured coins into the penny arcade, won kewpie dolls and, yes, took a cruise through the "Tunnel of Love." Another time he got a sudden quirk to ride a jet to Florida. That from a fella who won't ride in a passenger plane."

His rehearsal behavior is no less impulsive. A spy from NBC's Saturday night opus, Show of Shows, would flip if he witnessed the disorganized confusion on Saturday afternoon when Jackie begins rehearsing. Gleason regards rehearsal balefully, somewhat like a football player does scrimmage. Except in this case Jackie is both player and coach. Producer Hurdle hires his people accordingly.

Elastic Script

The "written" script is so elastic that only actors who can toss back an answer without any particular cue line need apply. The cast members admit privately that they're "all wrung out" after a show of practically unrehearsed banter. On the other hand, a Gleason Show player never had it softer; he rehearses one day instead of the usual four or five.

The many words of print published about CBS's brightest comic have failed to record one heretofore unrevealed fact about the man. His frequent trips to Doctors Hospital in Manhattan for dieting jags are only partly for that. Actually Jackie has troublesome, perhaps serious stomach trouble—a spastic colon is what the medics tentatively term it. The real cause still has the men in white baffled. The reducing is often a secondary reason, serving mainly as a convincing explanation for alarmists.

Jackie has been compared by his friends to George M. Cohan, the

Life can be serious, too: Gleason and Art Carney rehearsing for one of their excursions into the realm of serious drama. Yankee Doodle Boy. "Genial George was actually a rather lonely man," said a veteran sports writer and Toots Shor habituee. "Jackie strikes me the same way. I've seen him walking alone down E. 57th St. looking in antique show windows on a Sunday afternoon. I understand he's often by himself."

Poor Soul Seeking

A closer friend claims Jackie is still "looking" for something, that most of all he wants a happy marriage. "In many ways," says this close pal, "he's like his own Poor Soul take-off." The recent newspaper coverage of the separation from his wife of 17 years upset Gleason badly. "It was too bad," was one comment, "five years ago it wouldn't have rated two lines on page 40."

. Be that as it may, Gleason certainly did make Page One in many newspapers when his estranged wife Genevieve dropped in to see him at Doctors Hospital while he was bedfast with his broken leg. She found Marilyn Taylor, a dancer and sister of June Taylor whose girls appear on Jackie's show, already present on the premises.

There are conflicting accounts of just what happened in the ensuing ruckus but later both Jackie and Genevieve said they were not going to be divorced and Jackie added that Marilyn was a "nice kid" who "has told me more than once that if my wife and I were reconciled she would step out of the picture."

The Thrill Is Gone

In recent months Jackie has lost some of the old vinegar that made the name Gleason synonymous with wild living and good times. He's still the funniest off-camera comedian in the business, but as one friend put it, "His humor comes in flashes now, instead of buckets." Ten years ago he broke his arm falling down a flight

of stairs in Philadelphia and he had a stock wise-crack about the fracture. In contrast, after his celebrated broken leg. Jackie saw little to laugh about and any references to the busted limb were shrouded in dark phrases. "Funny thing," said an old fellow reveler, "Jackie has even lost his taste for liquor and fiestas lately. At some parties you'll look around and he'll be gone-home. It might be that the thrill has worn off. Why, I remember one morning I was nursing a brutal hangover and, so help me, I could tell by the look on his face that because he wasn't hung over too, he was iealous!"

When told of this rumor that he had taken a detour off the primrose path of carousing, Gleason displayed a look of punctured pride. Explained Jackie, "It's just that I don't have as much time for those things as I did before," and he said it a little sadly, as if his crown as King of the Good Time Charlies were about to topple from his head.


Expert on the Spot

'GREATEST FIGHTS' AIDE

COBO OLSON will beat Kid Gavilan in their middleweight championship fight." This isn't the prediction of one of the country's top sportswriters. It's the prediction of Bill Cayton, an advertising man, and he claims he hasn't been wrong in picking the winner of a big fight in four years.

Cayton happens to be the head of the advertising agency that owns television's chronicle of the boxing business, Greatest Fights of the Century, and he probably has seen more rounds of prize fighting than any man alive

His prediction is detailed: "It will be a decision, no knockout, and there will be a minimum of tie-ups. It won't be a waltz." He thinks Olson will have an easier time if Gavilan lets his weight go up to, say, 155 pounds,

instead of keeping his best fighting weight of 149.

And the thing that sets this prediction apart is that the fight is scheduled for tonight (April 2). The expert is really on the spot. For you'll have this book in your hands when the result is announced. You'll know right off whether Cayton is a good guesser or a bad one.

There isn't any question, however, as to his right to the expert rating. Cayton has supervised the editing, cutting, scripting, etc., for 200 filmed boxing milestones. Figuring 80 hours spent editing each fight, this comes to almost one solid year of eight-hour working days in the projection room. In addition, he sees many live fights.

Cayton's editing is a real job. A 15round fight, for instance, must be cut to the equivalent of something under

four rounds. This poses the problem of boiling down a scrap and still maintaining the true complexion of the

fight. Cayton is as articulate about the fight game as he is about the advertising business. What do the films of the famous long-count Dempsey-Tunney fight indicate, we asked him. Cayton. "Tunney definitely could have got up whenever he wanted to. He wasn't knocked out. We have slowed down the films, and it is evident that his eyes are clear and he is watching the referee count. The question is whether those extra four seconds of rest for Tunney weren't valuable ones. Dempsey might have caught him again in the same round, had it not been for the delay."

Who was the greater champion,

Ray Robinson won over Jake LaMotta.

Louis or Dempsey? "Louis was a better 'book' fighter; he always did things just the way he learned them. And he had a better jab or hook than Dempsey, although Jack was better with the Sunday punch. Dempsey was more of an instinctive fighter; he had imagination and could adapt his style to the kind of fight he had. Dempsey was unpredictable; Louis, methodical." Who would win if they met each other at their respective primes? Says Cayton, "I'd take Louis."

Strong For Marciano

Cayton is especially keen on Rocky Marciano, claims he packs a harder punch than either Louis or Dempsey. "Marciano is destined to be one of the great heavyweight champs. Few realize how hard he can deliver that paralyzer."

With over 200,000 feet of fight films almost committed to memory through continual re-showings, Cayton, announcer Jim Stevenson, director Allan Black, film editor Reggie Smith and script writer Fred Ladd polled themselves to pick the cream of their collection—their choice for the five greatest fights of the century. Here's what they agreed upon:

1. Dempsey-Willard

2. Louis-Schmeling (2nd)

3. Robinson-La Motta (Last).

4. Dempsey-Firpo

5. Zale-Graziano (3rd)

Zale, back to camera, kayoed Graziano.

House Party

PROGRAM OF THE WEEK



Art Linkletter: his show is fun for the housewives.

ART LINKLETTER'S House Party falls into the groove already dug by most daytime TV shows. There's a little comedy, a little audience participation, plenty of Linkletter and an abundance of corn. But, like most other afternoon programs, this one is not meant to be taken seriously. It fulfills its purpose of entertaining the housewife audience.

Art's show is unique in one way. There is no cast of regular performers on hand each day to spell the emcee, such as those who backstop Arthur Godfrey, Robert Q. Lewis, Garry Moore and Jack Paar. Linkletter handles the entire show himself. Except for the commercials and station breaks, he's on camera for the half-hour, either interviewing guest celebrities and members of his studio audience or—his specialty—kibitzing with a group of kids. That he carries off the stint is a tribute to his pleasant personality and warm good humor.

The show is well planned, sporting

a different roundup of features each day. During recent weeks, for example, Linkletter conducted a contest to find the oldest father of the youngest child, paying off each contestant with a handsome gift. He interviewed such personalities as movie columnist Sheilah Graham and one-time movie star Mae Clarke, and asked his studio audience to suggest ideas for inventions we still need. Art permitted his studio audience, incidentally, to guestion Miss Graham about their movie favorites. His obvious amusement at their queries about phony romances proved that he himself doesn't take the thing too seriously.

Linkletter's question - and - answer session each day with a panel of four kids stands out as the best feature of the show. He's not the first to capitalize on that "out of the mouths of babes" dodge, but he probably gets more out of the routine. The father of a large family, he puts the kids at their ease and handles them adroitly.

Rocket Rangers

Rod Brown, Rocket Ranger, is a live effort based in New York. It features two young Rocket Rangers whose beat apparently is the limitless universe, yet whose quarry conveniently stay within suitable distance to be captured in the limited space of a half hour.

Its story hews closely to the line of violence, Good chasing Evil and taking quite a few blows about the head and shoulders before emerging triumphant. It's a cut-and-dried proposition with little or no attempt to be educational, informative or even entertaining. Unless violence per se is considered entertaining in these en-

lightened days of child guidance.

As just one example, two thieving characters hijack some sort of space monster from another planet on commission from an unscrupulous carnival owner. The monster, a Neanderthal type with strong Brooklyn overtones, escapes. He is finally captured by Rod Brown, Rocket Ranger, as are the hijackers, but not until virtually everybody in the cast has been either slapped with an old-fashioned rubber hose or mauled about by the newfashioned monster from the other planet. This is odd entertainment, especially for children.

The First Color Commercial

COLOR television will brighten a lot of living rooms, but it's adding new furrows to the brows of the men who make TV commercials. Color multiplies the problems of costuming, staging, lighting and filming, although experts think it also will increase the sales impact.

Vienna-born Peter Elgar made the commercial shown in the accompanying pictures for the Pall Mall company. He believes it to be the first commercial made in color. It will be shown shortly on the first Pall Mall show to be color-cast, and also was photographed in black-and-white for immediate use.

Filming of the 60-second spot took 15 hours. Additional weeks were required to build the set, select the costumes and props, hire the technicians, choose and rehearse the six actors. When Elgar couldn't find a harlequin outfit of the proper color, he had one hand-printed.


In the film, two masqueraders dance out on the terrace, they are serenaded by troubadours, then light cigarets of the proper brand and speak well of them in the brief sales message.

Elgar, now 49, made many educational and artistic films in Europe, including religious films for the Vatican. He never heard of a spot commercial until March of 1951, when he had just completed a sensitive film of a child learning to read, "The Impressionable Years," for the State Department. He went to an ad agency with an idea for some institutional films. They suggested the spots.

"It is like making any other motion picture," Elgar says, "except that the finished film is 60 seconds long."
