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as we see it

The question of whether there should or should not be purely educational television stations has been debated for some time and probably will be a source of controversy for many years to come. On one point, however, there is general agreement—and that is the classroom value of televised lectures, demonstrations and current events.

In most areas, television sets in school auditoriums or individual classrooms are turned on to receive educational programs telecast by commercial stations. In a few cities there is an educational station which regularly beams programs to classrooms.

All this is now taken as a matter of course. Yet, in New Jersey, there seems to be a different attitude. Recently, in a budget message, Gov. Robert B. Meyner declared, "A 20-inch screen should never be allowed to come between teacher and pupil during school hours."

To avoid taking the Governor's statement out of context, it must be pointed out that he was explaining why he opposed spending taxpayers' money on a state-supported educational TV station. His position, to many observers, makes sense. His statement does not.

Television in the classroom, when the programs are selected judiciously, can be an invaluable teaching aid. Rather than coming between the teacher and pupil, the 20-inch screen can bring them together by permitting them to share the experience of watching a President's inauguration, of seeing a Congressional committee in action, of taking part in a queen's coronation or even of visiting a zoo.

Perhaps the Governor should reconsider his sweeping statement.

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Can Sinatra Make Good In TV?

HE WANTS ANOTHER CHANCE, BUT ONLY ON HIS OWN TERMS

ONE of the middling-great mysteries of television has been the failure of Frank Sinatra to (1) achieve success in a show of his own and (2) impress network executives sufficiently to give him another chance with a format fitted to his talents.

TV has been a sour note in the Sinatra symphony of success, which includes juke box, variety stage, night club and, as his recent Oscar attests, movies.

He's no Frankie-come-lately to video, either. As far back as October, 1950 he was launched with considerable fanfare (and no budget) on a show of his own via CBS. Its most successful phase was an after-show party on opening night. The

show folded not long afterward.

A year later CBS tried again, this time throwing Sinatra against the then all-powerful Milton Berle. That show was even more short-lived.

For all his talent, Sinatra simply isn't cut out for the medium on anything approaching a regular basis, except on his own terms. As of this writing, the terms are being worked out and the singer may yet turn up for a third go at a Sinatra Show.

Too Old To Bounce

"I don't want to talk about it right now," he says, "but it's definitely not going to be one of those variety or situation comedy rat races. I learned my little lesson on those things. That stuff's for the kids. I'm getting too old to bounce around a stage."

Sinatra is not exactly what a Siberian salt miner would call a bear for work. He combines a native inclination toward laziness with a tendency to be moody. He doesn't mind working in spurts, but over the long haul he finds it something of a bore, which makes him the first person ever to apply that particular word to the frantic behind-the-scenes operation of a TV show.

'What TV Needs Is . . .'

"What television needs," Sinatra says succinctly, "is a bunch of good film cutters in there pushing the buttons. Film cutters know pace and taste. They know instinctively when to switch from this angle to that one.

"TV is too full of bright young agency and network boys who don't know very much about show business. I don't mean to set myself up as an expert, but at least I've had grease paint on my face and I've worked behind the footlights and I know something about audiences.

"So when the executive producer comes in and changes a few lines around that don't need changing and steals your best cameraman for some

other show and tells you he's sorry but the sets won't be ready until the morning of the show, if then—it's a rat race and who needs it?"

Actually, Sinatra is on something of a dramatic kick these days. His Oscar-winning portrayal of Maggio in "From Here to Eternity" gave his career a tremendous boost, and he now thinks of TV in terms of drama, rather than as a singer and variety emcee. The great men of TV, he thinks, are producers like Alex Segal (*U.S. Steel Hour*), and Fred Coe (*Philco-Goodyear Playhouse*).

Sinatra's moody temperament makes him unsuited for a role that otherwise would be right—the quiet, easy-going emcee who can spin a story, sing a song or chat entertainingly with a visiting fireman. But nothing irri-

tates him more than routine—and nothing can irk network and agency people faster than a star who begins to get bored with what he's doing. If oil and water don't mix, neither do Sinatra and regimentation.

As he's become older, Sinatra has become more and more withdrawn. He's never gotten along particularly well with the press, chiefly because of a native inability to understand what the press is all about or to accept the proposition that as a public figure he must automatically forfeit a certain amount of privacy.

He has no press agent, and his business manager's phone is unlisted. It took three weeks to track him down for answers to specific questions, a patient hunting expedition which finally wound up in a musty rehearsal hall. A TV rehearsal had just broken and Sinatra was engaged in the rather dangerous practice of signing a whole sheaf of blank checks.

"I'd like to help out," he said, "but I just don't have the time to sit down and talk."

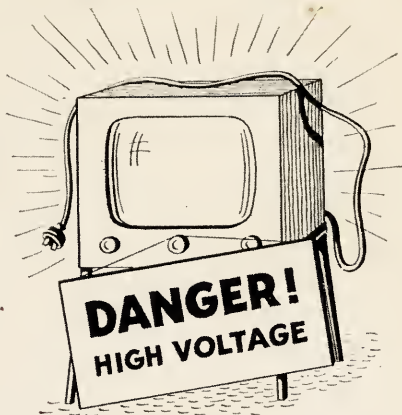
He Wants To Be An Actor

So he talked for 45 minutes, a restlessly unhappy man in his middle thirties who wants very much to re-establish himself and who wants to be an actor, not just Frank Sinatra playing himself. He has discovered, over the years, the importance of writers. "It's the words," he said. "Without those guys with the words—nothing. You gotta start with words."

He's now reading several film scripts. "If I know my luck," he muttered, "they'll all jell at the same time and there I'll be. You can only do one at a time."

Dramatic pictures?

"Yeah, dramatic pictures. Like I said, I'm getting to be an old man. I like the nice, easy pace of pictures. In another month, maybe, I'll know about this new television deal. But I can't talk about it. Not now."

TV HOPEFULS AUDITION FOR NETWORK CHIEFS

A GROUP of young would-be TV stars recently gave their all to amuse just a handful of spectators.

In this case, a small audience meant big opportunities. Assembled for a look-see in CBS-TV's New York Studio 42 were super-talent scouts whose every smile, grin or guffaw could mean a job before the cameras. They included the network's programming "veep," Hubbell Robinson; national program manager Harry Ommerle, casting chief Milo Frank and assorted producers and directors.

This unusual audition—no ultra-swank Amateur Night, but a showcase for trained professionals anxious to add video impetus to their careers—was the second of a from-time-to-time series.

Results of the demonstration of singing, dancing and funnyman skills were so successful—in the opinion of both lookers and lookees—that plans are now in the works to schedule the auditions four times a year.

For A Mimic, A Real Success

Comedian Jonathan Winters hit the jackpot most spectacularly after the once-over session pictured on these pages. Within three weeks he had won a 10-minute solo spot on the highly-lauded *Omnibus*, an unprecedented plum for a relatively unknown performer. Easy does it

OLD PRO PROVIDES
THE PROOF ON
'SHOW OF SHOWS'

WALK into almost any TV studio during a dress rehearsal and you'll find a scene of mad confusion that rivals a bargain basement sale in a department store. Almost any TV studio, that is. One of the major exceptions is NBC's Center Theater in New York when producer-director Max Liebman is putting the final touches to *Your Show of Shows*.

Liebman has his rehearsal schedule down to the point where there are no temperamental outbursts from the stars, no angry screaming from the director in the control booth and not a trace of tension among the crew. What is most important, in light of TV's monumental production costs, is that Liebman's dress rehearsals

seldom run more than five minutes overtime. By contrast, the final run-through on some of the big-name comedy shows may consume up to four or five hours of expensive rehearsal time.

Max has won the respect of the TV industry for his production know-how. It can be revealed now, for example, that when NBC first discovered that Liebman, Sid Caesar and Imogene Coca would split up at the end of this season to go their separate TV ways, it polled all the program's sponsors. The network wanted to learn whether these advertisers would prefer to remain with Liebman, Caesar or Coca for next season. The sponsors voted in favor of Liebman.

What's the Liebman formula? Max himself explains it simply. "The most important thing," he says, "is never to do two things at the same time. Each operation is broken down day by day and each has a single purpose. When we work on the script, our goal is only to achieve a final script. When we conduct a rehearsal to associate our actors with the props and scenery they'll use on the show, we don't try to relate this rehearsal too closely to the text.

"When a scenery rehearsal is called for, there are no actors and musicians sitting around with nothing to do—only the stage hands are present. So when it comes time for dress rehearsal, all these elements are put together and everybody knows exactly what to do."

Few other TV producers can make these statements. On one of the top-rated comedy shows, for example, the star usurps the functions of the producer, director, orchestra leader and others. Like Liebman, he has the respect of the trade for his ability. But he works without the Liebman system. As a result, his dress rehearsals are devoted to screaming at his cast, his cameramen and his director. His final run-throughs go three or four hours overtime, so that it's impossible to time the show, much less get an idea of how it will look when it reaches your living room.

Under the Liebman schedule, the Saturday morning dress rehearsal is

the first time all elements of the show, which had been rehearsing separately, are brought before cameras. A final rehearsal, in which everybody except Caesar is in full costume, is held from 5:30 to 7 o'clock Saturday evening. Liebman and his production assistants watch it on a TV receiver in a basement lounge in the theater. Max's secretary takes notes on any last-minute changes or corrections. He purposely has no microphone connection with either the control booth or the stage, so there is no chance for him to interrupt.

The entire cast and crew then take seats in the theater auditorium. Max and his secretary sit on the stage to give them last-minute comment and revisions. Afterwards everybody takes time out for a sandwich, and Liebman joins his technicians in the control booth. At 9 o'clock, another *Show of Shows* is underway.

TV's Week: And still the awards continue. Latest batch of honors come from the Illinois Federation of Women's Clubs. **WNBQ:** *Ding Dong School*, best TV show for children under six, and *Mr. Wizard*, best TV show for children over six. **WBBM-TV:** John Harrington, best local newscaster.

Despite their shrinking from publicity, WNBQ engineers are quietly proceeding with plans to boost the station's power from 75 to 100 kilowatts. Barring inclement weather, the increase should be completed by May 20, the same deadline set for WBKB's power rise.

WGN-TV's musical combo, The Star-noters, have signed with the Mutual network to do a show titled *Florida Calling* (from Miami). They'll appear there with another former WGN-TV property, Tom Moore. And come June 1, the four boys will bundle up their household goods, wives and a total of 11 children to migrate southward.

DuMont promptly shifted the show to a Wednesday-at-8 spot for the network. But WGN-TV has a commercial commitment at that time, so *Down You Go* is "Out You Went," at least as far as Chicago goes.

Week's Highlights: Uncle Win Stracke and his pets move into WBKB's 2:30-3 PM period this Monday (depending on the Army-McCarthy hearings, of course). Uncle Win's arrival cuts out Austin Kiplinger's news and 15 minutes of *Swingalong*.

Advance Tips on Shows: Kup's fifth annual Cerebral Palsy telethon tees off May 21 at 10 PM on WBKB to meet its lofty \$500,000 goal. Lineup includes Sophie Tucker and Frankie Masters among others.

Watch for WNBQ's replacement for its Tuesday night bowling. It'll be live *Championship Golf* starting June 1 from Tam O'Shanter with two amateurs and two pros playing a five-hole problem course. The fairways will be electrically lighted for night televising purposes.

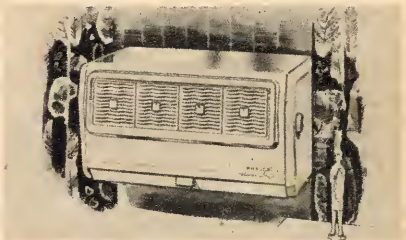

The Injustice Of It All . . .

LAST WEEK, we bantered zealous Ralph Kiner's edict of forcing Chicago sportscasters to pay a minimum fee of \$100 for TV guest appearances to his fellow Cub players. This week, we queried our town's leading sportscasters for their views to be published here in a series of articles.

But, possibly, the injustice of Kiner's edict can best be exemplified by the Gillette Razor Co. For \$100, America's top athletes give glowing commercials about how "sharp" Gillette makes them feel—over a coast-to-coast telecast. And Kiner has the gumption to ask the same fee for a five-minute interview, without endorsing the sponsor's product—on a local show!

By far the most seriously affected is suave Bob Elson. The polished announcer enjoys an intimate relationship with ball players in a career that saw him broadcast over 2,750 baseball games. Stars such as Casey Stengel and Ted Williams appear on his show—exclusively—and often free.

Elson, officially, neither approves nor disapproves of Kiner's edict. Knowing his sponsor cannot absorb the cost of \$100 per guest, Elson says assuringly: "We'll continue to have the best guests in town—despite Ralph Kiner's edict!"

Pitch Girl From Iowa

Georgiann Johnson Climbed
To Fame On Peepers Show

MANY MONTHS AGO, at an A.M. hour usually reserved for bartenders and insomniacs, a blonde, button-nosed bundle of beauty named Georgiann Johnson was whipping up a soufflé in her apartment kitchen. The domestic touch was appropriate; Georgiann had been told repeatedly by New York ad men who hired her for TV commercials that she typified "the perfect average housewife," an



appellation which made this Iowa-born actress squirm.

So, quite suddenly, like the book-keeper who looked up from his row of numbers after 10 years with a firm and said, "What am I doing here?" Georgiann decided to cease and desist from commercial spieling. No one knew it then, but—at 3:00 in the morning—a TV pitch girl had faded away. The boys along Madison Avenue had lost "Miss Johnny Mop" to a soufflé and a sudden impulse. (Anyone who hasn't seen Georgiann, as "Miss Johnny Mop," cheerfully preside over a Johnny Mop advertisement, just isn't paying attention to the commercials.)

Since the demise of "Miss Johnny Mop"—who still pops up on film occasionally—Georgiann Johnson has made her move to the acting dodge pay off handsomely. Check the dossier on this 27-year-old charmer and you'll see she's played, among other roles in TV's top dramas, a floozie, a conniving actress, a terrorized bride, a young Grandma Moses, a share cropper's daughter and, of course, everyman's ideal wife on *Mr. Peepers*.

Meaty Scraps

"I realize I look like the All-American girl," says Georgi, "but I do my best in a meaty role. These parts that fade into the wallpaper aren't for me. Even Marge (her *Peepers* role) is a meaty one. Tony Randall (Marge's hubby) and I have some torrid domestic scraps every once in a while. Marge, you know, isn't all sweetness and light. She's really got quite a bit of character."

Georgiann's show biz career reads like the plot line of the Broadway comedy, "My Sister Eileen." With a suitable number of stars in her eyes, she ventured from Iowa into that scary jungle of success, New York.

Being a budding Bernhardt, of course, meant living in the artists'

colony of Greenwich Village where, again like Eileen, she landed in a basement apartment with, unlike Eileen, two other actresses.

Georgiann drew the couch to sleep on, and that, she says, is really the story of her life. ("I've drawn the living room couch regularly until last December, when I finally got my own apartment.") A Village basement flat at \$30 a month has about as much privacy as Macy's window. Folks like to stoop and peek in, to see what species of beast resides below street level. This is all part of a young actress' New York hazing before hitting the big time.

Supersaleswoman

With nary a stage offer in sight, Georgiann got a job at the Lord and Taylor department store. "They thought I was a whiz. I sold \$600 worth of raincoats my first day. Of course, it was storming outside and I don't think I sold another one after that." She then used her comeliness to better advantage: "I worked as a model for a wholesale house that was going broke. The only thing I did was sit around and do crossword puzzles. I still work them, but I'm awful. Tony (Randall) kids me. He's always saying, 'A Master's degree and you can't even spell a four letter word.'" (Georgiann *does* hold an M.A. degree—in "Oral Interpretation of Literature." Whatever *that* is.)

After modeling, Georgiann, her starry eyes now focused on meal money, methodically contacted every ad agency in town to let them know she'd like a spin at doing commercials. It was a financial coup for the young lady. She did a "bettyfurness" for a slew of satisfied sponsors, including mopping up with Johnny Mop. The money was good, but for a gal who came out of Iowa to electrify

Broadway, the spiritual rewards were pretty shabby. They don't hang a star on your dressing room door for peddling bathroom accessories.

After her impulsive kitchen vow to give up commercials, Georgiann hit her stride. She even headed out to California for a movie about men from outer space, returning with a new, feminine slant on the differences between Hollywood and TV. Says Georgiann, "If you don't look beautiful in the movies, you never will. The way you look is Hollywood's first consideration. On TV no one really cares which is your best profile or what camera angle flatters you."

Kudos From SRL

Georgi is strictly a TV-bred actress. Her most rewarding role was in a drama called "The Storm" as a lonely actress returning from New York who on the fly marries an ostensibly charming, but actually demented young man. The accent was strictly on terror, with the frightened wife gradually learning of her husband's psychotic bent. The Saturday Review of Literature called her performance one acted "with rare sensitivity and range" and went on to throw kudos in the direction of the cast for making a good show out of a pedestrian script.

Her Role Is Expanding

As Marge on *Mr. Peepers*, Georgiann, who's not married, qualifies splendidly as the kind of young, perky wife most husbands would like. Her role is gradually being fattened and the writers, aware of her acting ability, are furnishing lines that won't let Marge "fade into the wallpaper." To keep things rolling on *Peepers*, the scripters have even arranged for Marge to have a baby.

An easy way to kid Georgiann would be to suggest she do a commercial. Then just sit back and watch her fade away into the wallpaper.

One Man's Two Families

The Barbours Turn Clock Back To Grow Up All Over Again

CARLTON E. MORSE, who bears a remarkable resemblance to an earnest rabbit in search of a carrot, has been living off a rather lush carrot these past 22 years. He is the man who single-handedly created an American institution known as *One Man's Family*.

This serial, one of the oldest and best loved of all radio shows, is unique in many ways. It is the accepted dean of soap operas. Father Barbour, the "one man" of the title, has been played by the same radio actor, J. Anthony Smythe, since the show's inception. Mother Barbour has always been Minetta Ellen, who, at 79, would like to retire from the show some day and go back to school. And it is the only show in existence which has calmly turned back the clock on itself and started all over again.

Family Tree Branched Out

The original family of 1932 included Father and Mother Barbour and the five children: Paul, Hazel, Claudia, Clifford and Jack. In the original story, Paul was born in 1897, Jack in 1917. The rest fell in between. Back in 1949 Morse brought the family intact to TV but found, what with marriages and births, it was too cumbersome. The TV audience had difficulty in picking up all the complicated family threads, and Morse himself had difficulty adjusting the family to the new medium. He abandoned the project two years later and contented himself with brooding about it until early this year.

The solution, it suddenly struck

Morse, was to start all over again as though nobody had ever heard of *One Man's Family*. He just moved the whole thing up 22 years, with the original family of seven and the same general storyline used on the radio version. This, as it were, is the second show.

It makes for a few complications, which bother Morse not the slightest. Paul, for instance, is now 57 in the radio version and has a daughter of his own. In the TV version he is

only 30. Hazel, 54 on radio and the mother of three grown children, is 28 on TV. Claudia, the scamp of the family, has had two husbands, three children and a grandchild so far as radio listeners are concerned. To the viewer, however, she is a kid of 19.

Claudia also poses something of a problem for Anne Whitfield, the teenage actress who plays Claudia on TV, then doubles back into radio to play Claudia's daughter Penelope.

Jack, a mere kid of 12 on TV, has an awesome future cut out for him if he is to follow his radio prototype—six children, three of them triplets.

All in all, the radio saga has involved Father Barbour with no less than 32 family members ranging from his wife, who is now 76, to a 19-month-old great-grandson. Of these, seven have died (generally because the actors playing the roles have had to leave the show for one reason or

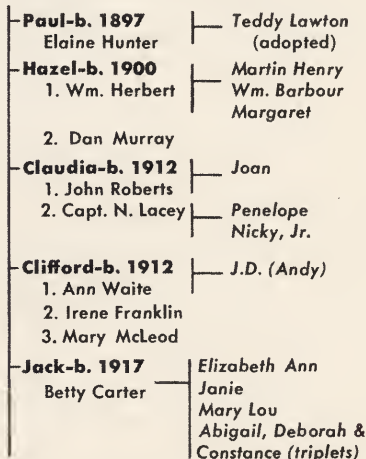
another); one, an in-law, has been separated from his wife (Teddy, Paul's adopted daughter) and pretty much forgotten.

"Trying to weave 25 people into a daily quarter-hour live TV show," Morse comments, "is just too much. Whether or not we can slowly rebuild the family, I just don't know."

It may be that he will have to. There are strong indications that the radio show will lose its sponsor at the end of the current season—and unless someone else picks it up, the Barbour family will be left to the tender mercies of a new generation of television viewers. To the older fans, and there are literally millions of them, it will be like going back to re-read "The Rover Boys" or "The Bobbsey Twins"—a spirit that can never quite be recaptured.

PROGRAM OF THE WEEK

IT MAY or may not have occurred to the other moguls running TV programming these days, but *Toast of the Town* has achieved something not only unique but impossible. In five years on the air it has become a top-ranking variety show—without a top comic. Indeed, it is presided over by one of the great wooden Indians of our times.

The Indian, however—Ed Sullivan by name—has from the very beginning held two powerful weapons. His Broadway column has provided him with an open-sesame to the doors of the great; and his wholly non-professional stance as an emcee apparently has endeared him to an audience weary of the I-Am-The-Greatest school of stand-up impresarios.

Sullivan's entree to the great is based today, of course, almost as much on the success of his show as

it is on the power of his column. Whether it's a comely female juggler from England, the First Piano Quartet or the entire MGM shooting match, Sullivan gets them in front of his cameras. The result continues to be a smooth and seemingly effortless hodgepodge of entertainment, almost always pleasant and sometimes bordering on the great. Many of the personalities and programming ideas he introduced have long since become standard items on other shows. A man whose expressionless face belies an inventive and inquiring mind, Sullivan is never content with the status quo.

It is quite possible, in fact, that this dead-pan individual, whose prior show business experience could be lodged safely in a Ziegfeld's left eye, has been responsible for more fresh ideas than any other single person in television. Five years on the same network with the same sponsor would seem to prove it.

SEARCH FOR TOMORROW

THE ONLY difference between CBS-TV's *Search for Tomorrow* and other soap operas is the fact that it can be seen daily at 12:30-12:45 P.M. (EDT). No other soap opera can make that statement, which is a very good thing.

Frankly, "tomorrow" had better come soon for the characters on this show, before they all lose their minds. If what these poor people go through is supposed to represent the trials and tribulations of the normal, average American family, then "tomorrow" had best be in the nature of an H-bomb and let's get it over with.

The people populating *Search for Tomorrow* are never happy. They

keep searching for happiness, which presumably is a sort of allegorical tomorrow, but they keep winding up in a hospital or a lawyer's office. If they are not in deep trouble themselves, then they are deeply troubled by somebody else's trouble, which they borrow at an extremely high interest rate.

The plot? Well, there's this widow who is in love with this man who either has a wife or hasn't, he isn't sure, and there is this other woman, in a hospital, who keeps saying she is so his wife. Whether she will ever walk again has not yet been disclosed. One thing, though—she can still see. Most times they go blind.—D. J.

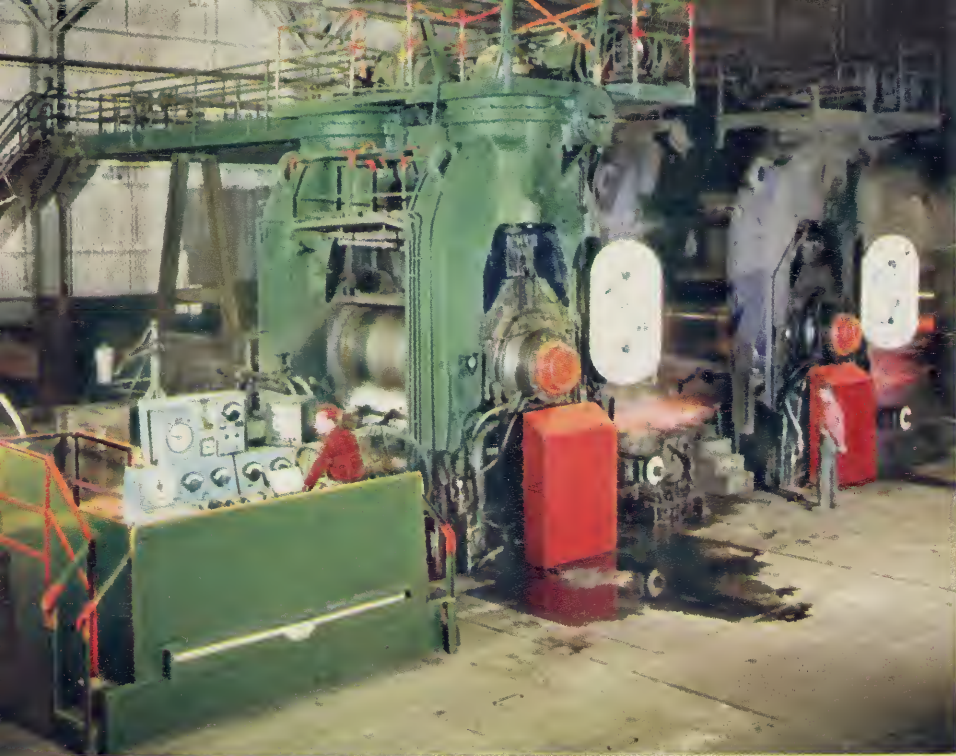
With the TV-telephone system, the

TV GOES TO WORK

CAMERAS ARE NO LONGER JUST FOR FUN



AUTHOR George Orwell, describing an absolute dictatorship in his novel, "1984," told of an all-seeing TV camera that would be focused continuously on all citizens. In that way, the dictator could determine at any time of day or night exactly what each of his subjects was doing.

Such usage, fortunately, is only a fiction writer's imagination, but the basic idea of a steadily-focusing TV camera has been developed and utilized daily by many industries.

Brig. Gen. David Sarnoff, board

chairman of RCA, describes this newest phase of TV thusly: "By industrial television, I mean the use of TV in plants so that you can see what is going on along the production line and keep an eye on other activities. There are places where man cannot go with safety, and there a TV camera can be installed; for example: in factories where deadly fumes would endanger life, near furnaces and in mines. And where it is too dark for the human eye to see, a TV camera can take a look. It can serve also in stores and other places where the public comes en masse."

Mother Is Watching

Applications of industrial TV to the schoolroom and the home sound even more like science fiction. With an industrial TV system, a school can bring programs to the entire student body or to selected classes.

Although the cost of the basic industrial TV unit is prohibitive for most home-owners (the suggested retail price for RCA equipment is about \$995), the uses of such a system are readily apparent. By merely snapping a switch, the housewife will be able to watch her children asleep in the nursery or at play in the yard. Or, without leaving her easy chair, she can focus on the kitchen to see how her cooking is progressing.

All this is made possible by a new private wire TV system. This system comprises a midget camera weighing less than five pounds and a control unit weighing only 18 pounds, with simplified controls for easy operation. One camera contains only four electron tubes, including the Vidicon pickup tube, which is about the size of a cigar. Any home-type TV receiver can be used for viewing purposes, with the system connecting through the set's antenna terminals.

The potential uses of industrial TV have hardly been tapped. The New York Police Department has already experimented with televising its daily "line-up" of suspects from central headquarters in Manhattan to headquarters in Brooklyn. Eventually, the department plans to install receivers in each precinct station.

Other law enforcement uses of industrial TV strike closer to author Orwell's ideas. In the Houston, Tex., city jail, for example, eight industrial TV units are at work. The cameras are posted in the cell corridors and in work and recreation areas. Police officials can keep a steady eye on prisoners on their office receivers.

At the Nat Burr Packing Co. in Memphis foremen watch a mammoth bacon-slicing machine without nearing the dangerous blades. At the Merchandise Mart in Chicago, where elevators start from both the first and second floors, starters can see on their TV sets when cars are filled.

Foremen Keep Cool

The U.S. Steel Corp. has TV units at several blast furnaces to permit foremen to observe operations while standing away from the tremendous heat. Newer units at its Gary, Ind., Sheet and Tin Mill give operators an unobstructed view of the 80-inch fiery steel sheet as it speeds from the finishing stand to the coilers.

TV, of course, has played an important part in the Government's atomic research work. It is known that scientists working with dangerous radium and uranium rays can watch their experiments at close range through TV without fear.

In addition to RCA which devised the Vidicon tube, industrial equipment is manufactured by Dage Electronics Corp., Diamond Power Speciality Corp., Capehart - Farnsworth Corp. and the Allen B. Du Mont Laboratories, and a score of other companies across the Nation.
