In their eagerness to make UHF television successful, a number of industry and government officials are advocating steps that ultimately will prove a financial burden to viewers.

The heart of the matter is the twoyear-old FCC ruling allocating UHF and VHF channels in the same cities. The set owner who is satisfied with the shows he gets on VHF channels hardly can be expected to buy a converter so that he can receive UHF, too.

Now a bill has been introduced in the Senate which would give the FCC power to regulate the networks—presumably so the FCC could force them to feed programs to UHF stations.

A proposal that a certain percentage of network-owned outlets should be UHF stations has been made, as has a suggestion that networks be permitted to own more than five stations, providing the additional ones are UHF.

Another proposal would force networks to make affiliates of a certain number of UHF outlets. It has also been recommended that networks withhold certain programs from their regular VHF affiliates in cities where there are also UHF stations and give the programs instead to the UHF broadcasters.

All this adds up to one fact: viewers would have to buy UHF converters.

There is a need for UHF television, and a method must be found to establish the system on a sound financial basis—but not at the expense of the networks or of the viewers.

It would be a unique departure in this constitutional democracy for the Government to force its citizens to buy something they do not need.

Looking Ahead To Summer



Good old summertime: Rosemary Clooney is just one of top stars who'll be on TV.

NEW PROGRAMS ARE ON THE WAY, BUT MOST FAVORITES REMAIN

The TV industry traditionally has referred to the good old summertime as its hiatus period because, according to "Webster," the word hiatus means "an opening, a gap; a break with a part missing."

The industry might have to come up with a new word this year, because most regular programs plan to remain on the air throughout the summer with few "openings" or "gaps" and virtually no "parts missing."

This is not to imply, of course, that TV stars so enjoy their work they're willing to bypass a summer vacation for the benefit of us viewers. Most will take time off, but their shows will ride out the hot weather, either with guest stars and emcees or with reruns and kinescopes of regular season programs. This, in a way, is a windfall for a viewer who missed episodes of his favorite programs during the fall and winter. He'll be able to catch up with them this summer.

Because of the steadily mounting number of telefilm programs, in fact, repeat showings probably will become the order of the summer. It's relatively easy for a network or sponsor to schedule reruns of a film show, as compared to building an entirely new program and gambling on its being as good as the show it replaced. Thus the two top-rated shows, I Love Lucy and Dragnet, will use reruns this summer. By virtue of kinescope, some live programs will also feature reruns, including Mr. Peepers and Ralph Edwards' This Is Your Life.

Watch The New Ones

But don't discount the new shows coming up. Several are completely new ventures, while others have served as replacements in the past and are being revived. Probably the most ambitious of the brand-new formats are Saturday Night Review, (about which there is an article, beginning on page 8) substituting for Your Show of Shows; and Stage Show, replacing Jackie Gleason.

Stage Show will spotlight Tommy and Jimmy Dorsey and feature such guest stars as Rosemary Clooney and

assorted variety acts.

Another promising newcomer is Blue Angel, a variety show based on the famous New York night club of that name and starring Orson Bean as emcee. It's to replace Edward R. Murrow's See It Now. Juvenile Jury will replace The Red Skelton Show, while Red and Vaudeville Show sub for Godfrey and Friends.

A Sub For Jo And Jane

Betty Ann Grove, one of Red Button's TV girl friends, is teaming with Merv Griffen, onetime featured vocalist with the Freddy Martin orchestra, to replace both The Jo Stafford and The Jane Froman Shows. And Paul Whiteman is producing and headlining a new show from Atlantic City's Steel Pier Sunday nights.

Last year's summer shows being revived for the 1954 season include Bob Eberle and Helen O'Connell, subbing for Perry Como, and Masquerade Party, in for the Red Buttons Show. It's News to Me, with Walter Cronkite as probable moderator, resumes to replace You Are There. Truth or Consequences already has started in The Fred Allen Show timespot. Pantomime Quiz will be back in the period now held by Mama.

Notice the comparative dearth this

summer of quiz and audience participation fillers. That again is because telefilm reruns are getting the biggest play, as witness: Groucho Marx Show, Burns and Allen, Make Room for Daddy, Meet Mr. McNutley, Four-Star Playhouse, the Ray Bolger Show, Topper, Playhouse of Stars, Our Miss Brooks, Private Secretary and others. Ford Theater will feature reruns, and a group of Ford films will replace Circle Theater—but under the title of Top Plays of 1954.

Hour-long dramatic programs will remain in full force, but slightly modified for warm-weather viewing. Robert Montgomery is reviving his

stock company idea, and Studio One will give way to Westinghouse Summer Theater. TV Playhouse will continue with new productions each Sunday night, and Kraft TV Theater shows, on both NBC and ABC, will run through the summer unchanged. U.S. Steel Hour plans no changes, and TV Hour will stay, but without the Motorola sponsorship.


Private Eyes

Viewers will have full opportunity to keep track of their favorite private eye shows this summer. Remaining are Man Against Crime, Rocky King, Plainclothesman, Mr. and Mrs. North and Col. Humphreu Flack. Some nightly news programs continue, including the Douglas Edwards and John Daly shows and John Cameron Swayze's News Caravan. Top quiz and panel programs, too, are bypassing their vacations, including Break the Bank, Dollar a Second, Who's the Boss, Who Said That, Dr. I.Q. and What's My Line.

Godfrey & Toast Remain

The morning Arthur Godfrey Time and Talent Scouts ride through the summer, but Godfrey and Friends will take a hiatus during July and August. Toast of the Town remains, with several guest emcees replacing Ed Sullivan when he vacations. Most of the networks' daytime schedules will remain intact, though various guest stars will substitute on many programs.

Promoters of the Wednesday night Blue Ribbon Bouts have scheduled a string of promising fights for the summer months. The Friday night Cavalcade of Sports is abandoning live boxing for sports films. Monday night fights from Eastern Parkway Arena and other boxing and wrestling shows will continue unchanged.



If Ernie Glucksman has anything to say about it—and he has—the summer doldrums will not be in evidence on NBC these coming Saturday nights. At least not in that difficult-to-fill timespot currently occupied by Your Show of Shows.

Starting June 12, the network is reviving the title of last year's Show of Shows summer replacement, Sat-

urday Night Review, but the resemblance will end right there. Replacing Hoagy Carmichael will be Eddie Albert. Replacing everybody else will be Ben Blue and Alan Young, who will appear on an alternate-week basis.

Glucksman, the chief-cook-and-bottle-washer in charge of the show, is a veteran showman whose experience The host: Eddie Albert, who'll preside over Saturday Night Review, at home with his wife, Margo, and son, Eddie, Jr.

reaches back to the days when he produced summer resort shows along the famous borsch circuit of New York's Catskill Mountains. Two of the very young unknowns he worked with in those halcyon days were Imogene Coca and Danny Kaye.

Having conned NBC into giving him Albert, Blue and Young, Glucksman, despite a long TV career, has set about the enterprise with all the vouthful enthusiasm of a neophyte determined to knock 'em dead the first time out. "I've seen too many shows look great on paper," he says cautiously, "and I'm not about to make any predictions. But good, bad or indifferent, this is going to be strictly a regular season show. I don't believe in 'summer shows.' We have a good budget and some very fine talent. If it doesn't pan out, it won't be for lack of trying."

Drama For Eddie

Albert, an easy-going actor whose many talents seem to take on more stature every year, will serve as the show's host and mainstay. He is pencilled in to do a number of dramatic sketches on his own, and may work occasionally with both Blue and Young.

Blue, who looks a good 10 years younger than his admitted 53, is a comic to whom show business has always been meat and drink. With Saturday Night Review, he hopes to develop two or three new characterizations which he can carry over later to a show of his own. "I have enough material," he says, in his own peculiar deadpan way, "to make the first show the greatest thing I have ever done. I haven't the faintest idea

what we'll do on the second. There may not be one. You never can tell."

Young, who has never quite found his niche in TV, also is working on a somewhat stronger characterization than the jelly-spined bumbler he's been playing on and off since 1950. His first skit, already written, has him cast as a wild animal trainer, and there's a suspicion the animals will not dine so royally as in the past.

So far as the rest of the show is concerned, Glucksman plans to use the Sauter-Finegan band every week as an integral part of the proceedings. A variety of well-known singers will be used, perhaps starting off with Carole Richards, and the remaining spots will be filled with well-established variety acts.

"We're not going to try to make this any kind of a 'New Faces' or 'Amateur Night' sort of thing," Glucksman says firmly. "If we run across a really good new talent, we'll use it; but this isn't going to be a show for untried kids to break in with. We're convinced that the summer audience is a lot bigger than many think, and we believe it deserves as fair a shake as we give it during the regular season.

"With Albert, Blue and Young, we don't see how we can miss. If we do—well, that's show business. Today you're great; tomorrow you're a bum."

AND THAT INCLUDES A COCKER SPANIEL IN CLEVELAND

In its few short years of existence. television seems destined to be the Nation's No. 1 whipping boy. It's been blamed by movie moguls for bad attendance; by book publishers for bad sales; by oculists for bad evesight; and by critics for bad entertainment.

Obviously, it cannot be solely to blame for all of these. However, in its own way, television has made some newsworthy contributions to

the American scene.

It has made stars of underworld characters (whatever happened to Virginia Hill?). It has glorified the stupid husband-witness any situation comedy-and it has bloodshot the private eve. It has even made wrestling and the roller derby major sports-well, for a while, anyhow,

But of most concern is the way television has affected the little people, such as the 11-year-old girl in Galesburg, Ill., whose grandmother compelled her to turn off the TV set during a storm. Deprived of TV, the girl went berserk, slapping her grandmother, stabbing her 10-year-old brother with a pair of scissors and slashing her mother with a butcher knife. It will be a long time before the TV set is turned off again in this house.

In Memphis, Tenn., a divorce was granted a woman on the following grounds: when she blocked her husband's view of the TV screen, he threw a chair at her, dragged her to



the bathroom and held her head under water. The court forgot to find out what program she interrupted, but it must have been a dilly.

A New York City judge heard a husband complain about the hours rather than the ardor of his spouse's viewing habits—all she did night and day was watch TV.

The judge suggested that they go home, sit on the same couch and watch TV together until 11. Then, lights out—and no more television. Five days later, the woman reappeared in court sporting a black eye which friend husband had meted out while knocking her down in front of the TV set . . . after eleven.

The use of TV as co-respondent for divorce has really arrived when even the Hollywood folk use it. Lovely actress Dorothy Ford got a divorce by claiming that she was a "television widow"—her husband spent all of his nights looking at TV. Looking at Dorothy, it's difficult to figure out just what show her husband found more interesting.

In Cleveland, a cocker spaniel waxed so enthusiastic watching TV that he would accompany the singers and bark at the actors. The other tenants complained to the police so often that the dog and his owner had to move. The owner knew he was in the doghouse with his neighbors.

The TV screen itself, however, has undergone some rough storms on its own part. In Madison, Wis., for example, a father came home to find his two daughters arguing over what program to watch. He decided for them by calmly kicking in the 21-inch screen.

And a gentleman on Long Island, N.Y., became so emotionally involved watching film clips of wild tigers on Ramar of the Jungle that he ran for his shotgun and blasted the screen into oblivion.

Then there's the power of suggestion. In Cleveland, after watching Superman, a four-year-old calmly walked out the window. As his fractured arm was being set he sighed, "I guess I'm not 'Superman.'"

A doorstep drama occurred in California when a young gentleman called to give his sweetheart an engagement ring. He rang the bell. When the door was opened, he was greeted by a shotgun blast. The girl's father had just seen his prospective son-in-law's picture on a TV crime show which indicated he was wanted for forgery.

Perhaps the greatest case of TV hypnotism occurred in Elizabeth, N.J., when two burglars, busy burgling, paused to flick on the TV set. Soon they sat down to watch. When the family returned home, the fascinated thugs just managed to escape in time, leaving their loot behind. Didn't even get enough to buy their own TV set.

NEW YORK

Bob Stahl reports:

WALLY COX and PAT BENOIT, who were married according to the Mr. Peepers script last month are having a baby written into the show. The writers, taking dramatic license, are planning to have it arrive next fall . . . JACK PAAR, with a new show, replaces My Favorite Husband for the summer, starting July 17. As regular cast members, he'll have BETTY CLOONEY -- ROSEMARY's sister --JOHNNY DESMOND and the PUPI CAMPO orchestra.

BERT PARKS and Two in Love, originally designated as replacement for The Red Skelton Show, now move into a permanent time Saturday nights at 10:30 on CBS . . . Looks like Colonel Humphrey Flack will switch from live to film and from Du Mont to CBS in the fall.

All is not lost for RED BUTTONS, despite his sponsor's canceling the show after this season. According to CBS Program Chief HUBBELL ROBINSON, JR., RED is still under contract to the network. No plans are yet made but CBS will try to keep him on the air with his own show next fall.

DAVE GARROWAY's Today show will be seen on the West Coast for the first time starting Sept. 27 on a regular basis. A "hot kinescope" of the 8 to 9 A.M. hour is to be processed for transmission in California at 8 to 9 Pacific time. NBC figures the new setup will add a potential 3,400,000 homes to the Today audience.

Three sponsors have signed for SID CAESAR's new fall show. meaning it is already sold out . . . Westinghouse is flirting with the idea of sponsoring a series of spectaculars next fall, to be telecast alternate weeks with Blue Ribbon Bouts. Studio One, of course, will continue . . . TV Recital Hall, the much-used telefilm series, is the new Ethel and Albert summer filler . . LARAINE DAY's new telefilm series, White Collar Girl, expected to wind up on ABC in the fall.

OZZIE, HARRIET and the NELSON kids spending their summer vacation in Europe . . . They'll be looking for material to incorporate into their program for next season . . . 20 Questions returns to TV July 6, as a weekly Tuesday night ABC program.

New setup for the MILTON BERLE Tuesday night period next season will see UNCLE MILTIE doing 20 shows, MARTHA RAYE starring in 10 and BOB HOPE in six . . . WILLIAM FAULKNER, evidently convinced that TV can do right with his short stories, making a number of them available. GORE VIDAL will adapt two for early presentation on Suspense.

Dan Jenkins reports:

HOLLYWOOD

The Telethon, TV's fund-raising gimmick, is about to be counted out. The latest one, staged here for Cerebral Palsy, raised very little money and practically no public enthusiasm. Word here is that this was the last . . . CBS will produce its own series of hour-long spectaculars starting in the fall for Chrysler on Thursday nights. Three each month will be dramatic shows starring movie names; the fourth, a musical.

It's just possible that BURNS and ALLEN may do a feature film version of the <u>Solid Gold Cadillac</u> . . . About 63,000 will see the MARCIANO-CHARLES title fight June 17 via Theater TV-- at prices ranging from \$2\$ to \$6.

If somebody can come up with a Baby Snooks, CBS will do the show with FRED CLARK (the former Harry Morton on the BURNS and ALLEN show) and his wife, BENAY VENUTA, as the harassed parents . . . HENRY FONDA makes his TV bow as host of a new anthology dramatic series tagged Henry Fonda Presents The Star and The Story. First film, starring DAVID NIVEN, has already been completed. Series goes on the air June 19 on CBS-TV's 14-station Western network, with distribution soon to be arranged for the rest of the country.

If CLAUDETTE COLBERT's pilot film doesn't sell by midsummer, she is free to go back to pictures. Best betshe will go back to pictures . . . WILLIAM GARGAN has made a pilot for a TV film version of radio's "Barry Craig." And PAT O'BRIEN has done the first of a proposed series called <u>Parole Chief.</u>

HAL ROACH, JR., has latched onto just about the only background not yet glorified by TV--the fire department. He is planning a film series called Alarm . . . VERA VAGUE will emcee a 15-minute film series called A Scene with a Star. GLENN LANGAN toplines the first, followed by VIRGINIA GREY and LUCILLE KNOCH.

There are three-act stage versions of both I <u>Love Lucy</u> and <u>My Little Margie</u> available to amateur and pro Little Theater groups. So who wants to play Lucy? . . . Those two (Lucy and Desi) are still expansion-minded. Now they're thinking seriously of buying Motion Picture Center, the studio where they do their filming.

The new Hollywood freeway has routed all the traffic away from BEN ALEXANDER's gas station and two motels and he is hurting . . . DINAH SHORE and GEORGE MONTGOMERY have adopted a baby boy, JOHN DAVID MONTGOMERY . . . WILL ROGERS, JR., to N. Y. to pinch-hit for vacationing DAVE GARROWAY July 5 . . . MARIE (The Body) McDONALD is resuming her career after a four-year absence and reportedly has her own situation comedy TV series in the works--which means only that she would like to do one and does anyone have any offers?

Jane Pickens: her fortunes have changed.

The Accent's On Dignity In Jane Pickens' New Career

Until fairly recently, the life and hard times of Jane Pickens resembled an obstacle marathon.

She was considered just another lady of songs from the past. She was a widow; her only daughter, Marcy, a semi-invalid; the trio act which had brought her fame had broken up when two of the Pickens girls married; and Jane was playing scattered club dates.

Instead of reaching for the weeping towel, Jane got herself a new manager, Moe Gale, whose sole task

was to change all adjectives about the lady from was to is. This was particularly difficult because she had made the mistake of being a precocious child; she started her career at 14. In the eyes of booking agents, she was through at a time most ladies like to think of as their prime.

· Moe Gale was an opportune choice -he is "independently wealthy." As Jane sees it: "He doesn't have to work, so he can handle my affairs for the fun of it."

Moe's first step was to build her as

a "class" personality, a sort of greatlady-bountiful, which fits right in with Jane's inclinations—born or acquired—as a Southern girl. This immediately placed the night club circuit and one-shot guest appearances beneath her newly found dignity.

Instead, Moe booked her with concert tours, got her a weekly radio show, then a place on the old "Chamber Music Society of Lower Basin Street"—the radio show that started Dinah Shore. In time, she got daily and weekly radio shows; and finally, her current TV spot.

But before that, Moe spearheaded a major coup: the lead in the Broadway hit "Regina," the musical version of "The Little Foxes."

Oueen Of Telethons

With the revival of Jane's career imminent, Moe set out to build his client as a harborer of good will. Because of Marcy, Jane's closest interest was cerebral palsy, and she began to campaign actively. In the field of telethons, she reigns supreme. There must be few people in this country who can claim not to have seen or heard Jane Pickens on some charity program—Cerebral Palsy, The Heart Fund, the Damon Runyon Cancer Fund or the Arthritis and Rheumatism Foundation.

With her new personality, Jane frowns on bookings that don't further her role as a lady. In the rolling tongue of her native Georgia, she says, "I think it's more important to be a human being than a singer. If you do a guest shot for a cause, that's fine. But if it's just to further you as a singer, it seldom comes off. Your lighting and make-up get lost in the shuffle; in fact, you get lost in the

melee that is someone else's show."

Suddenly financially solvent, her daughter Marcy established in a home in the country with her own house-keeper, Jane branched out. Though she wouldn't discuss her age—a most unladylike subject—she credited Marcy with being "still 18. That's old enough for any girl." In widening her scope, Jane remarried. "I didn't need to marry anyone," she asserts. "It was simply love and William C. Langley."

Everyone who knows Mrs. Langley is delighted with her uncrring good taste. Mr. Langley, publicity-shy as investment brokers are prone to be, transported her into what she calls, "the horsy set." They frequently fly (in the Langley plane) or sail (in the Langley yacht) to the Langley Virginia homestead for a weekend.

Thrown momentarily by all the horse-and-hunt talk, Jane says, "One of these days I may tell them there are better things to do than go chasing through the mountains after a poor little who-knows-what." Though

she hasn't yet developed a flair for hunting, she does possess a remarkable formula with getting along with horse lovers: "Just go down to the paddock with everyone else and be silent! At the proper moment, say, with studied concentration, 'Umm.' A few moments later, 'Ah, ha.' Your final comment should be, 'Umm, hmm!' raising your inflection on the 'hmm.' If you're forced to give an appraisal, just say, 'interesting.'"

The social pressures of a social marriage decided Jane to give up her daily radio show, but not TV. Rehearsals take place at the Langley Park Avenue apartment, crowding it to the point where they may have to move. "A duplex would be nice," she thinks, "then people won't be tramping in and out of our living room.

"My husband is a wise man. He knows I wouldn't give up my career and he hasn't suggested that I do."

Mr. Langley, who has some capricious moments, punned the name "Cotton" for his wife. (For "Pickens"—get it?) Well, "Cotton" has been

feeling pretty kittenish lately, and turned down some substantial offers —including the lead in "Rosalinda," at New York's City Center this spring —and she doesn't intend to do any recording for awhile.

"I'm just a bride," she announces exuberantly. "My husband deserves

some attention."

She has no long-range plans, wants only this summer free. "Bill and I have a lovely summer house on Long Island and the most lovely invitations to visit the most charming friends." Since one set of friends break their daily bread in Ireland, the other in a chateau in Southern France, she may absent herself for quite a few months.

"I'm certainly coming back to TV this fall. Nothing elaborate, you understand. I just want to say 'hello,' to sing a little and I hope to entertain."

These modest ambitions have already been fulfilled. "Success is so marvelous," she admits. "Why, I can do anything I want to do!"

Uncle Sam To The Rescue

HOW ARMED SERVICES LEND
TELEVISION A HELPING HAND

Michel Kraike, who produces many of the Ford Theater films and is not a man to hide Hollywood's light under a bushel, admits that "Not even Hollywood could reproduce Pearl Harbor on film."

When scripts pose this and similar budget-bludgeoning problems, Hollywood's TV film producers now turn automatically to the Armed Services, and presto—the handsome leading man is seen coming in for a blind landing on an aircraft carrier in a shot that looks too realistic for comfort.

Such shots are both realistic and comfortable as far as Hollywood is concerned. The Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps film libraries are furnishing TV film producers with thousands of feet of what is known as stock footage—film taken on the spot during both World War II and the Korean conflict. These are expertly integrated into TV dramas.

True (Navy) Blue

Ford Theater's recent war story, "Beneath These Waters," starring Ronald Reagan, concerned itself with a Navy destroyer which dropped out of sight during the battle of Guadalcanal under rather mysterious circumstances. The story, a true one, came direct from the Navy files. Scenes showing the air and sea battles of Guadalcanal are wholly au-

thentic and, as Kraike points out, couldn't begin to be duplicated on a motion picture sound stage or TV studio.

Throughout the filming, a naval officer was on the set at all times, seeing to it that uniforms were worn properly, that props were authentic and that words and phrases in the script rang true to Navy parlance. "Without the Navy," Kraike says, "there simply wouldn't have been any show."

While the Armed Services cooperate wholeheartedly in such matters, there is no actual saving to the film producers. "It's true," Kraike muses, "that we might have reconstructed those battle scenes for \$10,000,000 or \$15,000,000 but I don't think the Ford people would have held still for it. So far as the actual budget is concerned, however, we spend just as much on a war film as any other."



All four branches of the Armed Services have special liaison offices in Hollywood for the purpose of helping the motion picture, television and radio industries and thereby getting in sound public relations licks with audiences. Nor do they wait for the producers to come to them. When an Army nurse popped up as the surprise star of Ralph Edwards' This Is Your Life not long ago, it turned out that this was 100-percent Army promotion, the idea having been broached to Edwards by Lt. Col. Sherman D. Cosgrove, the Army's Deputy Chief of Information in Hollywood.

"It's a selling job as far as we're concerned," Col. Cosgrove says. "We supply stock footage, research, script suggestions, props, wardrobe and even an entire Army post when required."

The Services, however, make it clear they are not in competition with any commercial enterprise. "We supply only those items," Col. Cosgrove em-

phasizes, "which aren't available on the open market. I doubt, for instance, that an M-4 tank can be bought at any Army-Navy store—so we supply the tank."

Film producers, oddly enough, are just now beginning to wake up to the fact that Armed Services files are loaded with "truth-is-stranger-thanfiction" stories no writer could conceivably dream up; and there are in preparation today several TV series based entirely on Service stories.

Recent one-shots involving Service cooperation have included Fireside Theater's "I Send Your Son into Battle," Schlitz Playhouse's "Decision at Sea" and "Edge of Battle" and Ford Theater's "To Any Soldier," the story of an Army chaplain.

Kraike, who has immediate plans to make at least two more Ford Theater films drawn from Navy files, adds admiringly, "It's remarkable how broad-minded these Service people have been. They lean over backward to be fair. They don't object to honest realism—and I think you're going to see some whopping good films coming out of Hollywood, films which can do both Hollywood and the Armed Forces a lot of good."

PROGRAM OF THE WEEK

Rosalind Russell used to wonder musically, in "Wonderful Town," the smash Broadway hit, "Why, oh why, oh why-oh, did I leave Ohio?" This is a question which a lad from that great state, Roy Rogers, could answer with ease.

Roy, his real-life wife, Dale Evans; his horse, Trigger; and his dog, Bullet, have successfully combined forces (and we do mean financially, too) to outride, outshoot and outwit the baddies in the cowboy country. Indeed, some meanies insist the animals, who often appear to be the smartest members of the team, frequently save the day.

The Rogers telefilms are beautifully filmed amid panoramic western vistas. Those in charge back up their

photographic efforts with meticulous care in keeping the inevitable violence to a minimum; in insisting the plots be cleanly written for the juvenile audience; and in making certain there's nothing in the pictures to which parents could object. Let's face it, adults: these films are among the better Westerns for the small ones—and gratifyingly enough, the children eat 'em up.

The comedy is supplied by Pat Brady, Rogers' bumbling sidekick, who rides around in a bucking jeep, bringing delighted squeals from the younger set.

In case you haven't seen the films lately, the only major change from earlier efforts lies in the fact that Rogers has abandoned his occasional songs in favor of straight action. And in case your children haven't seen them, we suggest you tune in.

The Douglas Fairbanks Show

Douglas Fairbanks, Jr., has come as close as any producer to solving the problem of how to present interesting stories week after week in a half-hour dramatic show. He follows the prescribed course in ranging from grim melodrama to family comedy and farce. But his stories are seldom insipid and some are taut enough to rank with the best TV thrillers. The occasional off-beat quality of the scripts makes the show well worth watching.

The series is filmed in Europe, chiefly in England, which makes for interesting sets. If a haunted castle is called for, he has a real one handy. Besides producing, Fairbanks serves as program host and occasional star.

It's no secret that Fairbanks is an

adept actor, and the stories in which he stars are usually good. Working in England as he does, he also has the opportunity of presenting some of the best-known British actors, who put the finishing touch to the show's highly-professional quality.
