#### as we see it

We do hope the gentlemen of the National Collegiate Athletic Association have noted with interest—and red faces—the report that professional football attendance jumped five per cent last season. And the jump came despite the fact that so many progames were telecast.

For several years now the NCAA's deep thinkers have contended that television kills football box-office receipts. That contention has been their basis for restricting college football to one game a week, one appearance of a team per season, and to heck with what the viewers want.

As usual, during the coming season, NCAA will present its game-a-week on a national network. No college eleven will be seen on the air more than once, no matter how much viewer interest there may be in top teams in various sections of the country.

The pros, on the other hand, will televise a total of from four to seven games a week in different parts of the Nation, plus a "top game of the week" that will go coast to coast.

All the gobbledygook about statistics and research projects that NCAA has been dishing out for years goes right down the drain in the face of the incontravertible fact that professional football—freely telecast—is attracting more customers while college football attendance is declining steadily.

It would seem to be about time that the big colleges, which can get offers to televise their football games, declared their independence from NCAA, an organization run by small colleges determined to keep the big boys off television.

## TV Teletype

#### NEW YORK

**Bob Stahl reports:** 

RED BUTTONS is following the relaxing pattern set by many other TV comedians by appearing only three weeks of every four when he starts his new Friday night show on NBC this fall. What program will fill that fourth Friday each month hasn't been decided.

Enterprising mothers, irked about buying those special Winky Dink tracing kits so small fry can participate in JACK BARRY's show, have the answer: a new plastic food-covering will adhere to the set, and kids can trace on it with an eyebrow pencil, chalk or crayon.

<u>Hall of Fame</u> resumes Sunday, Sept. 5, with a full-hour drama based on the life of ALFRED NOBEL, of Peace Prize fame. SARAH CHURCHILL will not return until January, but her voice will be used via tape recording through the fall.

It now turns out that J. FRED MUGGS was listed as excess baggage on his 'round-the-world flight. NBC actually received a bill from the airline for \$96.60 for the chimp.

DON McNEILL and his <u>Breakfast Club</u>, now seen only as far West as Omaha, go <u>Coast-to-Coast</u> starting in the fall. Expansion means the show will pick up 21 new stations in the Rockies and Pacific zones . . . ABC has chosen Saturday, Sept. 11, as the starting date for the new <u>Stork Club</u> show, so that the opener will precede the Miss America pageant to be telecast from Atlantic City.

Comment, NBC's public affairs program, which moves into a new Sunday afternoon period this week, is expected to continue there through the regular fall and winter season . . . TED MACK and his Original Amateur Hour, being canceled again, may return as a daily daytime feature on NBC.

JERRY LEWIS, who receives about \$20,000 as his share of each Comedy Hour appearance, staged a five-hour impromptu show for free when he returned to Brown's Hotel in the Catskills, the resort where he started as a busboy . . . Launching this week of Dr. Eve, new NBC soap opera, set off a full-scale reshuffling of daytime programs that saw Bride and Groom canceled. Whether it will return to TV is not known at this time.

MILTON BERLE says next year will be the last season for guest stars. The practice has been overdone, according to the comic, and the guests are getting much too expensive . . . Still want to come to Hollywood? According to AFTRA, the radio-TV actors' union, 80 per cent of its members clear less than \$2000 a year from their radio-TV work.

ED SULLIVAN'S <u>Toast of the Town</u> will do "The Darryl F. Zanuck Story" from Hollywood Sunday, Sept. 12 and 19, which puts the first half smack opposite BETTY HUTTON'S TV debut on NBC.

Odds are that LUCILLE BALL and DESI ARNAZ will open in Las Vegas Jan. 1 with a musical version of I Love Lucy. VIVIAN VANCE and BILL FRAWLEY will appear with them. . It had to happen: there's a private eye film series in the works titled Lady Sleuth.

MARY SHIPP, waiting for the new My Friend Irma show to jell, goes to New York for two Kraft
Theater appearances . . . Believe it or not, there's a Hollywood TV film writer named RIP VON RONKLE.

VAUGHN MONROE has signed a five-week deal with NBC to fill the 7:30-7:45 Tuesday-Thursday spot, replacing CHARLIE RUGGLES, who replaced DINAH SHORE, who returns Oct. 5. . . . MONROE starts Aug. 31 . . . LASSIE makes a network guest appearance early in September, probably on Toast of the Town, to plug the start of his own CBS show Sunday, Sept. 12.

KEEFE BRASSELLE'S pilot film for NBC has earned him a contract. He'll do his own half-hour daytime variety show . . . The RIN TIN TIN series has been sold to a national sponsor . . . The word is getting around: look out for MERRY ANDERS on the new and improved STU ERWIN films.

DENNIS O'KEEFE joins ETHEL BARRYMORE in Chrysler's second dramatic show, "The 13th Chair" . . . Columbia Pictures has a department which does nothing but watch the top TV shows in search of new talent . . . ELSA LANCHESTER makes her TV film bow as co-star with JUDITH ANDERSON in "The Creative Impulse" for Four-Star Theater. That's creative . . .

Dancers from the Flamingo Hotel in Las Vegas appeared in a recent RED SKELTON show in Hollywood, went off the air at 6 PM, got on a plane at 7:05, changed costumes in mid-flight and went on at the Flamingo at 8:30. Remember the quiet old days when it took six weeks just to grow a head of lettuce?

## 'Spectaculars' Promise

## **New Horizons For Television**

A "spectacular" season for television. That's what's in store for millions as NBC and CBS slate at least five series of super-duper, high-budgeted extravaganzas like the Ford Anniversary show and the recent Rodgers and Hammerstein salute, commonly called "spectaculars." Each of these programs will have a top-name star or a group of high-ranking performers and a special format, and most

will be produced in compatible color that you can see on your present black-and-white receivers.

The launching of these "spectaculars" on such a spectacular scale reflects the thinking of the network executives responsible for your TV viewing. Unlike movie chieftains, who waited until their box-office receipts started to nose-dive before attempting to plug the dike with 3-D, CinemaScope and other gimmicks, TV executives aren't confronted now with a slump in audience. But to forestall the possibility of current viewers growing tired of standard TV fare, and to spur the growth of new audiences, they feel that now is the time to create more ambitious shows.

As explained by Sylvester L. (Pat) Weaver, Jr., NBC president, there are cycles in every entertainment medium. "First there is a period of freshness and growth, followed by a plateau," he said. "After that, you reach a crisis where your audience starts to slide. The time for innovations is not during the crisis period but when you're on that plateau." Actually, Weaver thinks that TV hasn't even reached the plateau of viewing yet.

Max Liebman, erstwhile producer of Your Show of Shows, who will produce 20 spectaculars for NBC next season, isn't certain that TV needs a boost right now. "It seems strange that a medium as young as TV would need a stimulus," he said. "I don't think that's so. TV works in trends or waves. First, there's a wave of interest, followed by one of disinterest. The recent Army-McCarthy hearings, for example, created such a wave of interest. Many people bought sets for the first time just to watch them."

Liebman is to produce a 90-minute "spectacular" each fourth Sunday night, starting Sept. 12 with the Betty Hutton show. He'll produce another series of 10 programs every fourth Saturday night. Leland Hayward, for NBC, is to stage a 90-minute show each fourth Monday night. NBC is planning still a fourth series of supershows every fourth Saturday at an earlier hour than Liebman's, these to be produced by Worthington (Tony) Miner.

On the CBS front, an hour-long series, titled *The Best of Broadway*, will usurp the *Blue Ribbon Bouts* time period each fourth Wednesday night. These will feature adaptations

of some of the best Broadway shows of the last 20 years, and each will have an all-star cast. Also on CBS, Chrysler will sponsor an hour-long "spectacular" each Thursday night, spotlighting melodrama three weeks, with the fourth Thursday a musical. According to CBS program chief Hubbell Robinson, Jr., this series will use adaptations of works of some of the greatest American and British authors, both living and dead.

Also on the "spectacular" agenda are such one-shot extravaganzas as that being planned by the electric light industry for Oct. 24, to celebrate

the 75th anniversary of Edison's invention. This is to be a two-hour affair, on probably two or three networks, similar to the Ford and the Rodgers and Hammerstein shows. It's to be produced by the movies' David O. Selznick and will have an all-star cast. Each of these programs will preempt—that is, replace—the regularly scheduled shows in their respective time periods.

As for the sponsors, Weaver said that TV executives have been trying to bring into TV all advertisers, each with his unique range of problems. The new programs, he said, "will add the X element to marketing plans that is not now present." The publicity that each show is to receive will be almost priceless to advertisers, Weaver averred, predicting that the entire business of some sponsors of "spectaculars" will revolve around the programs.

That advertisers evidently agree with him is proved by the fact that both NBC and CBS have signed sponsors for all their extravaganzas. Some of these sponsors will be paying more than \$300,000 per show, which is

something pretty spectacular, in itself. From an entertainment standpoint, the "spectaculars" will provide for the first time a form in which TV can present as many different expressions of entertainment as possible, Weaver said. "By eliminating the need for a weekly series," he explained, "we'll be able to finance just a single good show idea whenever we find one. The writers will be paid enough to afford the time to write a special show for a specific star. There is nothing you cannot do in this format because you're doing a one-shot each time, not a series."

Producers of the "spectaculars" are busy lining up the biggest names in show business, many of whom have never before appeared on television. Most of the details of these shows and the people who will make them newsworthy will be revealed in TV GUIDE's second annual Fall Preview Issue, which will be dated September 25.

The Wednesday night "spectaculars" on CBS, to be sponsored by Westinghouse, plus all those on NBC, will be televised in color. The networks visualize the super-shows as a spur to the sale of color receivers, since for the first time owners of color sets will be able to see big shows on a regularly scheduled basis.

That word spectacular, incidentally, is causing a certain amount of confusion and trepidation around the networks. It's strictly an NBC term, generally attributed to Weaver. But Weaver said, "We've always meant the word to be used as a noun, not an adjective. I very much hope viewers won't watch these shows and then tell each other, 'That one wasn't so spectacular!'

The producers of Beat the Clock might just as well have used the tag of another show, Chance of a Lifetime, because that's what they give the ladies when it comes to throwing things. Alas for the men who play target; the better the woman's aim (with whipped-cream pies), the better the prizes.

Glamor girl Roxanne, decorative aid to emcee Bud Collyer, is sure of this: there's nothing a woman likes better than throwing things at her husband—unless it's watching another woman throwing things at another husband. Roxanne remembers one woman who shouted gleefully, just as she hurled a custard pie at her spouse: "I've been waiting 10 years to do this!"

The show's stunts are suggested by two professional pranksters, who furnish 20 ideas a week. Seven of these must prove workable. Before a stunt is used, it is tested four times by four sets of stand-in contestants. During the tryouts, two cases of canned

to put two toupees, suspended by strings just a little too far apart, into an open-crowned stovepipe hat worn by the contestant, without using hands.

How was it done? Just as Roxanne and Bud demonstrated. You merely had to set one toupee in motion by blowing at it, after getting the first toupee in the hat.

whipped cream are used regularly. As the funniest stunt, Jean Hollander, co-producer of the show, nominates this gem: "Mother and children bandaged Daddy right up to his eyes, leaving him just room to breathe. Then everyone squirted Daddy with cream."

Five years and 1900-plus gags ago, the show used "intellectual-type stunts," which required "some thinking." But no more.

Toughest stunt, which defied solution for 32 weeks while the jackpot increased \$100 per week: trying

# Liberace - Virtuoso or Ham?

PRESS VIEWS DIFFER, TO SAY THE LEAST

Is Liberace virtuoso or ham? Master showman or buncombe peddler?

Newspaper writers are in startling disagreement about the wavy-haired TV entertainer with the built-in smile, the candelabra trademark and the huge sorority of fans. Some are as enthusiastically pro-Liberace as teenagers who implore him to autograph their foreheads; others make him a target for gibes. Examples:

On his piano-playing: Editorial in the *Phoenix Sunnyslope Journal*: "He is an artist and if one dare go so far—he could be called a genius."

Howard Taubman, New York Times: "There is a fellow named Liberace, and you could call him, among other things, a pianist . . . What kind of a pianist? . . . Don't ask a square with Horowitz or Rubinstein on the brain. He'll say that Liberace is not much more than a parlor pianist who ought to be kept in someone else's parlor."

Ray Foley, Milwaukee Sentinel: "Let's face it: Liberace is no Rubinstein. But then, Rubinstein is no Liberace."

Rose Nicolosi, Gloucester (Mass.) Times: "If Paderewski said Liberace was a talented pianist, then we believe he is . . . 'the Chopin of television.'"

Irving Sablosky, Chicago News:



"There were moments . . . when this critic wanted to 'Help!' But the junior pianist from Wisconsin went on playing anyhow—playing very badly but with stupendous guts."

Editorial, Alton (Ill.) Telegraph: "Some lay critics have gone so far as to contend Liberace can't play the piano. Anyone who takes this view must be blind and deaf."

Art Cullinson, Akron Beacon Journal: "He's a pretty good piano player. Oh, there are better ones in any fairsized town in America. But most of them aren't on TV. Liberace is." On his showmanship: Ethel Daccardo, Chicago News: "(He) is a great showman, and that nobody can deny."

Editorial, San Francisco Chronicle: "Liberace is a superb huckster, and his merchandise is not Beethoven, Brahms or Bach, but Liberace."

Louis R. Guzzo, Seattle Times: "The key to Liberace's success is his showmanship. He draws a bow toward the sentimental - in - heart, takes careful aim and seldom misses."

Twyford, in Norfolk Virginian-Pilot: "In the ascendancy of Liberace's star to its current zenith we are witnessing another triumph of mediocrity."

On his appearance and mannerisms: Aneke Jahn in Elyria (Ohio) Chronicle Telegram: "I simply ADORE Liberace. I think he is a beautiful jewel in the starched white bosom of television . . . He is beautiful . . . unique. And he loves his mother."

Harvey Taylor, *Detroit Times*: "Liberace talks to his audience with a perpetual smile on his face—the kind of smile a little boy musters to prove to his parents that he's brushed his teeth—and he speaks in the carefully controlled and subdued voice of a kindergarten teacher talking to a nervous child."



Mary Lester, Miami Herald: "Expecting him to beam with a 'national convention' smile, this writer was genuinely surprised at his continual warm and infectious smile."

Mel Heimer, Columbia (Mo.) Tribune: "Is he a pianist? Is he a bird? Or is he a sorcerer? . . . He smiles. He beams. He shows his teeth, like a mastiff at bay."

Nick Kenny, New York Mirror: "His happy, friendly, boyish grin can steal your heart away."

Faye Emerson, New York World-Telegram: "Such dimpling and winking! Such tossing of blond curls, and fluttering of eyelashes and flashing of teeth! Such nausea!"


On his audience: Larry Wolters, Chicago Tribune: "Liberace is TV's first real matinee idol. As such, he appeals to women—millions of women."

John Crosby, New York Herald-Tribune: "Sometimes, a man wonders... The things women go nuts over resist rational interpretation and way up on the head of the list—strenuously resisting any form of explanation—is Liberace."

Jackie Freers, Indianapolis News: "Liberace fills a void in the lives of millions of American housewives whose dull, unromantic husbands can't tell the difference between a rose and a dandelion."

Amid the bravos and the boos, Liberåce's head remains silver-streaked, but unbowed, his gleaming smile dimmed not a watt. He chirps his theme song, "I Don't Care," explains to fans that bad reviews often result in good box office, and gaily observes that, after reading ultra-caustic comment, he and brother George "cry all the way to the bank."

Considerably younger away from the family clan, the short, gentle Eli is at least partly Uncle David. But he also has played successfully Shakespearean drama, a gangster (Studio One), an Italian waiter, a Southern colonel, And for the Yiddish theater, in Scholem Asch's "The Electric Chair," he was a Negro boy.

"I grew up in the Yiddish theater, where they don't have many actors. One season I learned and played 60 parts, 60 songs and 150 duets."

Eli explains his versatility: "It's not difficult to play so many characters. I like to create human beings." Only once did his dignity turn to indignity: he was 36, the part was for a 13 year-old. But Mintz adds, "We were short-handed so I put on my make-up, short pants, and was 13."

His formula for a quick change-over: "I apply my own make-up. I'm the only one who knows how I should

look to feel a part."

Mintz joined the Goldberg clan when the show was first presented on Broadway. Before the tryout he gave the costume designer so many details for Uncle David's clothing she told him to select his own.

Born Edward Satz, Eli changed his name when he came to America from Austria because his brother Ludwig Satz had a big name. "I couldn't capitalize on it, he worked so hard for it. He was one of the greatest actors of all time. Don't take my word. Belasco said so."

Eli, with little formal schooling, speaks five languages well, two others satisfactorily and a dozen dialects he just "picked up."

ROM the very first day Jack Eigen spread his roots in Chicago three years ago, he's been the target of critics and fans alike. \* THAT'S JUNE LOCKHART, COLLECTOR OF ODD INFORMATION

After two and a half years of identifying famous quotes from famous people on the recently departed Who Said That?, panelist June Lockhart claims she feels like a "veritable garbage pail of

useless information . . . I can name every member of almost every cabinet, including the Secretary of the Interior in Wilson's administration. This is the sort of thing most girls can get along without."



While panel shows are generally considered well-cushioned jobs, the petite June, in preparation for hers, read as voraciously as a coed cramming for exams: seven daily newspapers, five weekly news and picture magazines. "I had to—I was competing with Mr. H. V. Kaltenborn." Other regulars on the show were moderator Walter Kiernan and Morey Amsterdam.

"I found writing down quotes helped me to remember them. This show was so legitimate no one tipped us off on anything, not even on the kind of questions to ask (admittedly practiced on other shows). Maybe that's why our show went off the air."

A new mother as of last September, June worked right up to the day before Ann Kathleen Maloney arrived. June took almost a month's vacation afterwards, on the theory that "it's important to get acquainted with your child."

Few women panelists have risked absenting themselves at all. Dorothy Kilgallen (What's My Line) gave up only one show to have her baby. Chatter-girl Jinx Falkenburg Mc-Crary, of radio and TV, boasts of having missed three shows in eight years. She was in session with the stork twice. Arlene Francis, whose work covers three major networks, summed it best last year: "I would have stayed

in Europe longer but someone was bound to discover I was expendable."

To June, this attitude is incomprehensible. "It couldn't be part of the show-must-go-on routine, because a panel show is anything but of the great theater tradition. And who comforts a woman in her old age, her child or panel-producers Goodson-Todman?"

Born into the acting profession (her parents are Gene and Kathleen Lockhart), everything came her way. Whatever she learned about acting, she absorbed from "papa." Living in Hollywood, the Lockharts were "in the theater but not of it." Few of the young June's friends had anything to do with the business. She was under contract to M-G-M for a few years, playing in "The White Cliffs of Dover," "Meet Me in St. Louis" and others. When things slowed down, she took off for Lake Arrowhead for water skiing.

An expert diver and swimmer—another family trait ("Papa was Mile Champion Swimmer of Ontario, Canada")—June has a collection of cups and ribbons from her high school days. She always knew she'd marry an athlete (she didn't) because she "didn't like teaching men to swim."

When she was offered her first Broadway show, "For Love or Money," Papa worried, "The critics will tear you apart." June braved the acid pens ("What did I have to lose?"), won hurrahs and discovered a brand-new thrill through a live audience.

Oddly, the ingenue role in the Broadway hit was offered to her on the basis of her performance in a high school play. Playwright F. Hugh Herbert came to see his daughter, was struck by June and asked her to read his new play. Afterwards, he

said: "The part is yours." She didn't hear from him for two years. "But I knew whenever the play was produced, I'd be in it. I had no reason to worry." Such uncomplicated thinking is basic to June's personality.

This summer, as in the past, she's made the rounds on the straw hat circuit. (That picture on Page 13 was

made at Philadelphia's Playhouse in the Park). She hires a nurse for one week, then comes home for two. "But I miss my family and my husband doesn't like to get his own dinner."

Under contract to NBC-TV, she'll be on many top dramatic shows this fall. She also is scouting around for another panel show.

# JAZZ OUTFITS TRY, TRY AGAIN TO BEAT THAT TV JINX

Most big-name bands don't have string sections, but that hasn't prevented them from playing second fiddle to big-name vocalists for the last 10 years. To remedy that situation, the bands are turning once again to TV, hoping that this time the medium will prove a help instead of a hoodoo.

Tommy and Jimmy Dorsey and their Stage Show have taken over for Jackie Gleason this summer. Ray Anthony and his orchestra are warm weather replacements for Perry Como. The Sauter-Finegan crew is featured with Eddie Albert in the summertime Saturday Night Review. Guy Lombardo has scored with dance-floor pickups on a New York station. ABC is planning a Saturday night band show for the fall. There's even talk that Benny Goodman is rounding up a small combo for a TV series.

In earlier stabs at TV, orchestra

leaders either tried to "fancy up" their shows with trick camera effects or presented unadorned vaude-ville-type programs. Neither formula worked.

Nonetheless, the Dorsey Brothers are trying the same old vaudeville routine and drawing the same old unfavorable reviews. Ray Anthony's efforts, on the other hand, have been much more kindly received.

"On TV we can't just sit and play music," Ray and his manager, Fred Benson, agree. "We must try to give everybody who tunes in a good evening's entertainment." The answer, they think, lies in a varied menucurrent tunes, a top recording act, a little nostalgia.

Ray quotes a maxim made famous years ago by — ironically — Tommy Dorsey: "A name band must have four different books (sets of arrangements)—one for hotel engagements, one for theaters, one for one-night stands, and one for the South." Ray doesn't discount the need for making a band show "visual." Four cameras, instead of the customary three, are assigned to the program, and can single out any instrument on cue.

Whether name bands belong on TV, no matter how they're presented, is still a moot point. One orchestra leader who thinks not is Frank DeVol, ex-Pantomime Quiz participant. DeVol says bluntly, "There is no future for bands on TV.

"Music by itself isn't enough on

TV. If a band leader wants to succeed in video, he must become a performer of one sort or another. Some fine dance bands-Alvino Rev. Victor Young, Harry James and Red Nichols, to name a few-have tried straight music without success."

In complete disagreement is Ed Sauter, of the Sauter-Finegan orchestra. "There can be a great future for jazz bands in TV," Ed believes, "but they must be recognized as show business entities, not just as bands. They must be visual, original and good.

"There must also be a closer marriage of pictures and music. Music is an abstraction and must be photographed as such. Lighting techniques, animated cartoons, super-impositions or what-have-you must be employed to create something visual. TV is one of the best ways I know to stimulate interest in one-night stands, which have been and will continue to be the backbone of the band business."

One upcoming band show is to originate from hotels and dance halls across the country. The program is being mapped by Robert M. Weitman, ABC vice-president and the man generally credited with the nameband boom during the '30s, when he operated Broadway's Paramount Theater. Weitman is convinced TV can revive interest in bands. "Nobody has given them a chance," he says.

"People will always buy good music if it's presented properly. After all, Your Hit Parade is, in essence, a good band show. The secret is to give people what they want—listenable, danceable music, not over-arranged."

# WEEKS OF WORK FLASH BY IN 50 SECONDS ON THE AIR

Don't let it be noised about too loudly, but the fact of the matter is researchers for television program rating firms have discovered that, in some instances, viewers prefer animated commercials to the programs themselves.

This isn't too strange because commercials long have been out of the test-pattern class — what with the almost unbelievable amount of talent, imagination, money and just plain hard work that go into these 40-to-50-second epics.

These cartoon bits achieve a zip and dash that no real actors could hope to attain. In addition, they are usually pepped up with bouncy music and jingles. They are, in short, both eye- and ear-catching.

On these pages are some of the myriad steps in the creation of a cartoon commercial executed for Meadow Gold Dairy Products by John Sutherland Productions.

■ Starting with the cartoon at the top and continuing with those on the opposite page, the reader can follow in sequence some of the steps needed to bring an animated commercial to his television screen.

CBS sent him into Tuesday-night battle with Milton Berle last season, and he never came near Berle's Top 10 rating position. Having failed with a half-hour format, Red is currently breaking in a full-hour program which may or may not be arrayed against the formidable Uncle Miltie. It's a good thing Red has a few more weeks to polish his new show. To date, its entertainment values have been spotty.

Titled The Red Skelton Review, the program has been subbing on Wednesday nights for the vacationing Godfrey and Friends, due back in September. Basically, it's the same kind of show Red has been doing on TV since he broke into the medium.

But the increased time has been accompanied by an increased budget. Red has more famous guest stars and a chorus of dancing beauties specially imported from Las Vegas.

However, Red is the star, and it's his job to carry the program. So far, he's been buckling under the weight. Skelton is undoubtedly one of the best clowns in show business. Routines like his demonstration of doughnut-dunking techniques have become comedy classics. And his poignant touches, as in the Freddie-the-Free-loader sketches, can be almost Chap-

Unfortunately, however, Red's stock of comedy characterizations has grown somewhat shopworn, despite all efforts to freshen up the merchandise. Moreover, Red has become too much of a free-wheeler, ad-libbing in a manner that's often unfunny and sometimes in deplorable taste.

ABC's summertime musical review, Melody Tour, must have been shunted off the track somewhere between the planning board and the cameras. The basic premise of a relaxed musical without benefit of the standard TV emcee is a good one. The show is reminiscent of Dave Garroway's old Garroway at Large in that the cast performs each week without a studio audience. But there the similarity ends. With every opportunity for imaginative camera work, the cameramen merely photograph the show. And the performers try much too determinedly to be clever. The settings' are supposed to

(1) Cambine the fallawing (altering ta suit): 1 c. catsup, 5 t. lemon juice, 4 t. vinegar, 2 t. Worcestershire, 1 t. prepared mustard, 1 T. grated onion, ¼ t. garlic salt, ¼ t.

liquid smake sauce, dash black and/or red pepper, and 1/3 c. water. Mix well, reserve approximately ane-half.

(2) Paur remainder af sauce aver chicken drumsticks (or 1 disjainted fryer, ar up to 2 lbs. raw cleaned shrimp—tails intact). Let stand in refrigerator 1 haur or more ta marinate, turning once.

Ta fry, remove and drap chicken ar shrimp in bag af seasaned flour; shake off excess, then drop in deep fat heated to 350 degrees. Fry 10 ta 12 minutes, or until pieces float ta tap and crust is a deep reddish-brown. Drain. Serve either hat ar cald—the latter on raunds of French bread (lettuce-lined, perhaps), using reserved sauce as tapper ar dunk.

# Celery Stuffed with Shrimp Remoulade

Blend tagether tharaughly—and again "taste yaur way" with the seasonings: Iwa 3-ounce packages cream cheese, 1 small clave garlic (crushed), 1½ t. Creole or dark mustard, 1 t. harseradish, ½ t. Warcestershire, 2 t. leman juice or vinegar, 1 T. mayannaise, 2 t. finely chapped parsley, 1 hard-caaked egg yolk (sieved; optianal)—plus dashes af paprika and Tabasca and, if needed, salt and possibly a pinch of sugar. Let chill several hours before using.

Stuff tender ribs of celery with remoulade mixture, stud with cald, boiled shrimp and garnish with capers.


