If you're anxious to see color television, be patient. Before too much time has passed, the networks are going to televise color during the day, while people are shopping and while dealers' showrooms are open.

CBS and NBC have made elaborate plans to televise extravaganzas and "spectaculars" — those once-a-month super-duper evening programs — in color. This season CBS will colorcast each of its major shows at least once. But as for regularly scheduled color programs at hours when viewers can see sets demonstrated—not yet.

Perhaps there is a good reason for this oversight. Perhaps the networks hope that dealers will stay open until 9 or 10 o'clock at night and that folks are curious enough about color to visit showrooms after dinner.

So far, though, there are no indications that the public is that curious, or that many dealers will keep their doors open at night.

Unless you know a network or electronics manufacturing executive important enough to have a color receiver in his home, or one of the handful of TV critics who have been supplied with color sets, you'll have to bide your time and be content with viewing all the color programs in glorious, compatible black and white.

When they get around to letting the average consumer take a look at color, the networks undoubtedly will schedule colorcasts at some time such as 11 A.M. or 3 P.M. daily. Then, at long last, color television will mean something to the public besides a story in a newspaper or a critic's estimate.

We hope that time comes soon.

ETHEL MERMAN signed to re-create one of her most famous Broadway roles, "Panama Hattie," for a CBS Best of Broadway extravaganza . . . Artful Miss Dodger, JUNE HAVOC's new show originally slated for an ABC airing, is now titled Willy and starts Saturday, Sept. 18, on CBS, replacing Two in Love . . . New mystery adventure show, titled simply Action, slated for ABC Friday nights starting Oct. 1.

JIMMY DURANTE busy filming four or five of his new half-hour shows for NBC Saturday nights. But these will probably be held until the end of the season, so that JIMMY can enjoy a longer vacation next year.

Tired of watching old movies on TV? Well, you may soon be getting new ones. Movie producer EDWARD SMALL is planning a new feature-length version of "Count of Monte Cristo" for TV. SMALL turned out most of the original "Monte Cristo" movies, so this may be just a means of amortizing the cost of all those costumes piled up in his warehouse.

EDWARD R. MURROW may play himself on Studio One Monday, Nov. 8, when the show presents a dramatization of Supreme Court Justice WILLIAM O. DOUGLAS' new book, "Almanac of Liberty" . . . Lined up for MUR-ROW interviews this fall on Person to Person are MARTHA RAYE, MOHAMMED ALI and maybe JACK WEBB. ALI, Prime Minister of Pakistan, will visit the U.S.

Sounds like a strange team but RICARDO MONTALBAN and NANETTE FABRAY are planning to join forces for a telefilm series. This is in addition, of course, to NANETTE's starring appearances on the MAX LIEBMAN "spectaculars."

ROBERT MONTGOMERY planning a two-part version of "Hunchback of Notre Dame" Monday, Oct. 25 and Nov.

1. Who will play the hunchback, Quasimodo, hasn't been determined . . . And it's definite now for MAURICE EVANS to play "Macbeth" on Hall of Fame Sunday, Nov. 28. This show will be staged in color, with JUDITH ANDERSON playing Lady Macbeth.

PAT KENNEDY, PETER LAWFORD's wife, pulling an ALFRED HITCHCOCK by doing a walk-on in each stanza of her husband's new TV show, <u>Dear Phoebe</u>... NBC has auditioned some 400 kids and still hasn't found the right one to play <u>Baby Snooks</u>. Among those applying for the role were PORTLAND MASON, daughter of James, and GROUCHO MARX' daughter, MELINDA.

If all the details can be ironed out, and they are ironing fast, ED SULLIVAN will devote his entire Toast of the Town on Sunday, Oct. 3, to a salute to LUCILLE BALL and DESI ARNAZ as the "Champions of Show Business." In addition to appearing in person, LUCY and DESI will provide film clips of both old and new \underline{I} Love Lucy episodes . . . Their own show returns to the \underline{air} Oct. 4.

Nothing official has been done about it as yet, but both MILTON BERLE and his business manager-producer, IRVING GRAY, have just about decided that BERLE's show for the 1955-56 season will be a series of half-hour situation comedy films. RED BUTTONS

has made the same decision.

JAMES MASON has been signed as permanent host-narrator on <u>Lux Video Theater</u>, replacing BILL HOLDEN. Show does its fourth Paramount picture in a row Thursday, Sept. 16, with "Hold Back the Dawn." The 1941 film originally starred OLIVIA DE HAVILLAND, CHARLES BOYER and PAULETTE GODDARD . . . Latest on BING CROSBY—no TV this coming season. Just the radio show, two pictures and a handful of new records. There is no law, however, against his changing his mind.

GROUCHO MARX wants to do a musical in the LELAND HAYWARD series of NBC "spectaculars" . . . They're planning a TV soap opera for JOAN BENNETT, which would make her the third film star to follow the road to daytime dramatics. Other two are LOUISE ALLBRITTON and NANCY COLEMAN.

ELEANOR POWELL has come out of retirement to do her own TV show, Faith of Our Children, on a local station here. Her husband, GLENN FORD, narrates the show. Station is KNBH, NBC Hollywood outlet, which may presage a network future . . . SPIKE JONES wants to do a new movie version of "Phantom of the Opera"—with LIBERACE co-starred. He's not kidding, either.

The first completed EDDIE CANTOR half-hour film has BRIAN AHERNE as the guest star . . . The 57 Mr. and Mrs. North films are going into syndication . . . Four GEORGE BERNARD SHAW one-act plays are being made available to TV, which means they will probably be snapped up fast by a dramatic show.

CESAR ROMERO will join DICK POWELL and TERESA WRIGHT in "The Long Goodbye" on the first Chrysler dramatic show, Climax, Thursday, Oct. 7. Third show will star BARRY NELSON, LINDA CHRISTIAN, PETER LORRE in "Casino Royale."

Biggest One-Night Stand

NEW STAR, NEW SONGS, NEW STORY FOR 90-MINUTE RUN ON TV

Television enters a new era on this Sunday night—the era of what might be called The 90-Minute Hit, or A Broadway Season In One Night.

For the date marks the TV debut of Betty Hutton. This is not particularly remarkable in itself, Miss Hutton being close to the last available star to take the plunge.

What Miss Hutton is doing, however, threatens to create an entirely new concept of what is known as The Hit Show. The atmosphere surrounding this particular effort has all the earmarks, save one, of the dear old days of the hit Broadway musical—the kind you've seen depicted so often in the movies. The producer is a doll. The star is a big and important name. The songwriters are champions. The star gives a wonderful party for the producer. Photographers are all over the joint. Show songs take every place

on the *Hit Parade*. And the show runs for six years on Broadway. It is what is known as "a hit."

Miss Hutton's TV debut is following approximately this selfsame script, with one important difference: her show will run precisely one night and will, almost certainly, never be seen live again. Everything about it has been squeezed, boiled, compressed and condensed into 90 minutes. The excitement of an entire Broadway season is being concentrated on a single night.

The Hutton show, titled "Satins and Spurs," will be the first of NBC's highly touted color "spectaculars," 90-minute specials. It will be produced by Max Liebman, who for five years was the maestro in charge of the Sid Caesar-Imogene Coca epic, Your Show of Shows. He will do 20 of these shows on alternate Saturdays and Sundays, with Leland Hayward set to do 13 on Monday nights, once a month.

"Satins and Spurs," written for Miss Hutton by Billy Friedberg and Lieb-



man, has to do with a rodeo queen who comes to New York to appear in the annual rodeo at Madison Square Garden. While there, a writer-photographer from a national magazine latches onto her, intent on doing a long article on what makes a rodeo queen tick. Inevitably, they fall in love, have a misunderstanding, fall out of love, get back to an understanding and, at the time of the fadeout, are in love again. There is a song for every phase of the relationship, and Miss Hutton sings the songs.

The excitement of the Hutton spectacular was first generated last spring when Liebman prevailed on the blonde dynamo to take her chances with him. Hutton, an excitable and emotional lass with enough energy to light Dayton, Ohio, for seven months, capitulated. She had long admired Liebman—and to be admired by Hutton is to be hit right smack in the face by a veritable cyclone of demonstrative affection.

Right off the bat she tossed a tremendous party in the producer's honor at Hollywood's fabled Brown Derby. Outside, a marquee was emblazoned with the billing, "Betty Hutton Presents Max Liebman." Inside, Hollywood's biggest names romped through a delectable buffet, heard a four-second speech from Liebman and sat entranced through a Betty Hutton floor show. All this for a TV show.

Miss Hutton, who mixes sentiment, emotion, energy and hard sense in wholesale lots, promptly went out and hired Jay Livingston and Ray Evans, a couple of pretty fair country songwriters. Armed with only a bare story line, the two Oscar-winning ("Buttons and Bows" and "Mona Lisa") songsmiths went to work.

Now it so happened that Miss Hut-

 Convincing: producer Max Liebman and the star he persuaded to try TV. ton was a good friend of one Alan Livingston, an executive of decision-making importance at Capitol Records. Livingston, who hadn't heard the songs Livingston and Evans hadn't yet written, decided Capitol would put out an album from the show and had his art department design a cover.

"It was a rather peculiar feeling," Evans admits. "They were not only planning an album of 10 songs we hadn't even written, they'd even designed the cover with blanks for the song titles. And then they told us not to make the titles too long; otherwise they wouldn't fit on the cover."

"Writing for Betty," Livingston says, "is a real experience. If she likes the song, she cries. She is so pleased that someone has done something nice just for her that she just simply cries. If she doesn't like a song, she gets specific about it. She'll just say she doesn't like the ending. So we fix the ending and then she cries and then we know everything's OK."

With Hutton now in full cry, as it were, Liebman took off for a European vacation. But not Hutton. She arranged to do a personal appearance in Atlantic City during the first two weeks in August for the specific purposes of breaking in some of the new songs. She disregarded the personal difficulties she had been having with her husband, Charles O'Curran, whom she has since divorced, and arranged to have him stage her numbers.

"Betty," one of her closest friends explains, "is very businesslike. On top of that, she is a perfectionist. When she decides to do something, she goes all out. She did that two-week stand in Atlantic City and then rehearsed six weeks in New York—all for one TV appearance. And because she still thinks O'Curran knows more about staging for her particular style than anyone else, she made no bones about wanting him."

Just what effect the combined Liebman-Hutton technique will have on the TV industry is difficult to say. Certainly nothing like it has ever been tried before—a star of the first magnitude making her initial TV ap-

pearance with an original book, an original score and an album produced by a major record company, all for a show which is set to die just 90 minutes after it starts.

"This is not like the movies," Betty says. "With a picture, you have time to get set for the blow, to roll with it, good or bad. With this, we'll have the news on the morning of Sept. 13, complete. Wouldn't you know it would be a Monday?"—Dan Jenkins

Let's throw some light on the intricate subject of television lighting. The fellow to do it is Imero Fiorentino, who has been lighting things up around ABC for five years now.

You can easily recognize Immy; he's the character who's usually carrying a spotlight around, and the one who'll argue at the flick of a switch that "lighting can make or break a television show."

Immy uses lights much as an artist uses oils. With them he creates romantic moods; instills fright, hate or desperation; even ages an actress a score or more years in a matter of seconds.

He cited a recent dramatic program, starring June Havoc, in which the script called for a young, pretty heroine in one scene and in the scene immediately following, an old and haggard one. Rehearsals showed that even with a split-second make-up change, June still resembled a Madonna in that second scene; it was up to Immy to create the change with

his lights. This he did by using highangle lights that threw long, diagonal shadows across Miss Havoc's lovely face and made her look suitably haggard.

The two most difficult problems which a lighting director faces are: the fact that each program must also be recorded on film for delayed telecasts; and—you, the viewer.

"A person in a movie theater can't leave his seat, run up to the screen and change the brightness or contrast in the picture to suit his tastes," Immy pointed out. "But sitting in his own living room a TV viewer has only to touch a knob on his set to make a darkened room look like the Sahara Desert. There's nothing we

can do to compensate for this. I just try to light each scene for the best picture possible."

Immy usually arrives at his first ideas on how to light a show by studying the script and the floor plan. He then confers with the director to learn what moods are wanted. After that, he watches rehearsals to determine just where to place his lights for the desired effects; and, finally, during an actual telecast he sits in the control booth, from which he directs the engineers in their use.

Four Who Came Back

On 'Playhouse Of (Former) Stars'

In a neat bit of delayed-action type casting, Schlitz Playhouse of Stars has come up with a cast which, 40 years ago, would have carried a price tag designed to put the show out of business. A drama titled "The Secret" co-stars Francis X. Bushman, Madge Kennedy, Doris Kenyon and Tom Moore. Tom Drake represents the younger generation, playing a reporter seeking the truth behind a silent film star's suicide—40 years ago.

Powerhouses among the silent movie stars, Bushman, Kennedy, Kenyon and Moore are delighted to be remembered, and excited at being a part of a medium unknown in their heyday.

"At my age," Bushman, now 70, notes wryly, "I'm just happy to be alive. But I'll have you know I was the Liberace of my day." The screen's first great lover, Bushman made 424 pictures, the most famous of which was "Ben Hur."

Madge Kennedy, at one time known as "Queen of the Bedroom Farce," is still pert and vivacious. "I feel like Rip Van Winkle," she says. After a quarter-century, she came back two years ago to play in "The Marrying Kind" with Judy Holliday. She has appeared twice on TV as Joan Caulfield's mother in My Favorite Husband, once on Lux Video Theater.

Tom Moore, who played opposite Miss Kennedy in 1918 and 1919, has

appeared recently on Wild Bill Hickok, Racket Squad and Life With Father, but made his biggest hit as the surprise subject on This Is Your Life. A star in 1910, he appeared in "Cinderella Man" with Mae Marsh, and in dozens of other epics. "In those days,"

Doris Kenyon, widow of silent star Milton Sills and one of Hollywood's first beauties, is enthusiatic about TV and plans a comeback. Oddly, she had never met Bushman. During the first day's shooting of "The Secret," Bushman remarked, while posing for some stills, "I thought Doris Kenyon was going to be in this picture."

"She," replied Miss Kennedy, "is the one who has been sitting on your left."

his prime on a WNBQ telecast last year.

LIFTON UTLEY is on his way back. After an extended visit with the personable Mr. Utley, TV GUIDE can at last answer those persistent and myriad inquiries regarding his health. activities, and status at Channel 5.

The exact time and date of his return depend entirely upon the speed of his recovery.

Contrary to popular belief, Utley has not undergone surgery. He suffered a severe attack of sub-acute bacterial endocarditis (a heart condition) when he collapsed at his desk on June 8, 1953. It left him virtually paralyzed for two months.

His recuperation has been slow, painful, and discouraging. His face and body

were paralyzed, and most doctors diagnosed his case as hopeless. But Utley, courageous and determined, began a winning battle of convalescence. Within three months he progressed from being completely bed-ridden to the limited mobility of a wheel chair. And, last winter, despite excruciating pain, he started walking.

Since last April, Utley has been undergoing daily clinical treatments, and his rate of improvement has astonished most medical men. Last June he had recuperated to the point where NBC employed him to fill in for vacationing news director Bill Ray.

But Utley still walks haltingly. His right arm is immobilized and his right

leg is still partially paralyzed.

Throughout the long ordeal of his illness, Utley has been stoical and realistic about the change this stroke has wrought in his life. He has adopted a strict daily regimen. All parties and social activities have been shunned to the point of monasticism.

His day is thoroughly regulated to the task of convalescence. He's up every morning at 5 A.M. to catch all newscasts. By 9 A.M. he's at his NBC desk for a full day's work. He leaves promptly at 5 P.M. for more clinical treatments.

When Bill Ray returns from vacation, Utley plans to devote his full time to hospitalization and complete rest. His doctor has become so optimistic about his progress that he predicts full recovery for Utley by the first of the year.

In fact, the doctor went out on a limb recently when Utley, bent on nothing less than total recovery, asked: "My favorite sport was mountain climbing. Will I ever be able to climb the mountains of Switzerland again?"

"Not only will you climb mountains," replied the doctor, "but I'll make a tight-rope walker out of you, if that's what you want!"

On the basis of these cheerful reports, NBC has already brushed off the welcome mat for their 50-year-old star. Utley, however, is now aware of the dangers of overwork and won't subject himself to all the strains of former TV activities.

His honest, masterly news analyses

and unfaltering integrity have built a legion of followers eagerly awaiting the day of his return. If Cliff has his way, that will be the first of the year!

If you're not completely and irrevocably fed up to the hairline with quizzes, panel shows and parlor games, you may find a little item called *One* Minute, Please quite diverting.

This one comes to us from Britain, perhaps in exchange for What's My Line? It features that uniquely-visaged British comedienne, Hermione Gingold, and an assortment of Americans: playwright Marc Connelly, writer Cleveland Amory, comedienne Alice Pearce and, as moderator, John K. M. McCaffery. There are also guest stars, plus a lot of people who presumably get prizes from Du Mont for sending in suggestions, or something.

Each panelist is supposed to jabber away for a full minute on some impossible subject. This sounds easy, but actually—as those who have appeared on the program will avow—it's often tough.

To date, the panelists have discoursed at fire-engine speed on such topics as "How I Grew Hair" (by egg-bald Marc Connelly), "How to Blow Glass," "Whale Blubber," "Why I Ride Sidesaddle," "Breeding Guppies," "The Perfect Woman," "Why I Wear Sneakers," "Raccoon Coats," "How to Make Glue" and "Zebras." First prize each week goes to the wordiest windbag.

Although none of this fare will leave you gasping, some of it—particularly when Miss Gingold is activating that wonderful face—is quietly amusing. It rates more than one minute, please, of your time.—F. De B.

Valiant Lady

Skelton's last TV accident came when he was eating corn on the cob and the orchestra started to play the "Typewriter Song."


Red would prefer to wrestle windows, but he can't stand the pane.

If people do arrive, unasked...?

If you're viewing a 'whodunit' and phone rings...?

If a guest is so rude as to chatter . . .?



I am often asked: who makes the rules of etiquette? The answer is—we all do. Writers like myself usually are observers, not dictators, of good manners: We note what admirable people do and do not do in contemporary situations. And in the most

contemporary of situations—entertaining with a television set in the living room—we pass on what common sense and gracious practice have taught us.

Television is writing its own etiquette. No etiquette book, *including* my own, deals completely with the complex manners introduced by this vital new addition to our way of life.

Not so long ago, the hostess with a television set could be almost certain

of limitless guests clustering around it, come nightfall. Now, when most of the neighbors have sets of their own, her dilemma has changed. She no longer fumes over the unbidden ones shutting off the family's view of the set. She wonders whether, when TV-owning guests drop in unannounced, she must automatically give up the viewing to which she and the family had, perhaps, been looking forward. Let me review this question and some of the others people ask about the new TV etiquette.

1. If people do arrive, unasked, when the family is watching a favorite program, must the set be turned off?

Answer: No. The hostess, taking the initiative, may say: "We were just watching a program we enjoy very much. Would you like to join us? Or would you prefer to chat with me in the next room until it's over?"



The well-mannered visitor should watch the program quietly if his time permits. If he has come on a definite errand, he may say so and leave within a reasonable time if he does not want to join the family entertainment. After all, if he barged in on a tennis game, he wouldn't expect the players to break it up, but would stay and watch until an opportunity for conversation presented itself.

2. If a guest, watching television, is so rude as to chatter throughout a

program others are trying to enjoy, what can the hostess do?

Answer: A hostess should never rebuke a guest except in the most extreme circumstances. But a rebuke may be gently implied (although some people are too thick-skinned to realize it). She could say, "I'm afraid this doesn't interest you very much. Shall we go into another room and talk?" Of course, a mannerly guest would reply, "Oh, no, I wouldn't like to interrupt the program for you. We can talk later." And then (with luck) he will watch without conversation.

3. What happens when the children's interests run counter to those of the adults?

Answer: I believe children have their rights—as do adults. The perfect answer, of course, is to have a second set, in a large family. But, barring this luxury, adults should try to respect children's attachment to certain of their own programs and not arbitrarily switch off one of their permitted ones without courteous discussion of the need—if there is one—to do so. The children should be offered some acceptable compromise. At the same time, no child should be permitted to view program after program to the exclusion of adult viewing needs.

4. Suppose you are viewing a terrifically exciting "whodunit" when the phone rings. Must you carry on a conversation right at that moment?

Answer: You may ask permission to call back at the end of the program. If the caller seems disgruntled at this, or won't be available at the time and his call seems urgent, you have little choice but to talk to him—preferably on an extension if you have one, so the family is not inconvenienced.

5. Is it correct to tell guests that you plan an evening of TV and give them a chance to accept or refuse depending upon their feeling for the medium or the programs offered?



Answer: Yes. You should tell them that television viewing is the entertainment you plan. If they suggest something else they'd rather do, the hostess has the right to suggest that guests come on another evening.

The Other Side of the Screen

At a television show where there is a regular, large studio audience. rules are strict concerning arrivals and departures. The audience is often "warmed-up" before the show goes on, helping it to take its part in the laughter and applause that is often necessary to the success of the show and to its performers. They also are told of the rules against unscheduled noise, waving at the cameras and other things. Sometimes, when a show does not have a regular audience, friends or other interested people are permitted in the studio. They should arrive well in advance of program time, sit quietly throughout the performance and pay strict attention to the signal lights.

On panel shows, a woman guest of the panel learns by first viewing the show, or by asking those in charge of program arrangements, what she is expected to wear. She does not turn up in full evening dress if the men on the show are in business suits and the other women guests in street dresses. But, because viewers like to see women panel members in interesting, dressy clothes, there is a little

more leeway in dress than there would be under ordinary social circumstances. A woman who, in her own circle, wouldn't dream of wearing evening clothes on Sunday night, might have to conform if other panel members wore such a costume.

TV directors dislike, usually, to have women guests wear black or navy clothes. Under TV lighting conditions, these cause a "halo" around the figure that is disconcerting to viewers. Glittering ornaments which reflect light are in disfavor, as are too-low necklines or dresses with vertical stripes that carry the subject right out of the picture. Hats, too, are awkward because they shade the face, and no matter how well-designed, often look like lampshades on the screen.

I get many complaints about the manners of emcees and big stars from friends of mine who are asked to be TV guests on national programs. But remember that if a guest tries to top the lines of a comedian, the sponsor is annoyed. After all, it's the comedian who gets paid for the gags. The guest, whether we like it or not, is often the stooge. If an emcee tries to steer a guest into an indirect endorsement of his sponsor's product, the guest may be annoyed but he should be polite. A guest who acts as if he's doing a favor by his very presence is ungracious, to say the least.

SHE DISPLAYS HER ENTHUSIASM WITH GIFTS, PROPOSALS, MAYHEM

To the female American television fan there is apparently nothing quite so beautiful as a 350-pound wrestler swandiving into the ropes.

At least that's the impression 30,-000,000 American husbands, brothers and sons must have after watching their womenfolk ogle the big fellows two or three times a week on TV.

Hundreds of disgruntled males can testify that this year alone wrestlers received thousands of upside-down cakes, shoo-fly pies, bouquets of flowers and marriage proposals from supposedly normal schoolgirls, housewives, maiden aunts and grandmothers.

Women wrestling fans, analysis discloses, fall into two groups. First, there are those who worship wresHat Pin Mary, a wrestling fan who doesn't mind having her picture taken, is restrained by smiling policeman from banging a wrestler with a baby bottle. Believe it or not, it happens.

tlers. Then there are those who hate the referee. Both types are expressive. In Woonsocket, R.I., early this year, an elderly lady so strongly disapproved of a referee that she tried to thrust a rusty hat pin into the screen.

Through painful experience, wrestlers have developed a philosophy about women fans. "It's simple," a current mat favorite remarked the other day. "Women like to look at my muscles the way I like to look at Roxanne's—uh—nice blonde hair."

But in the opinion of The Ape Man, a well-known grappler who is said to live in a cage, women like wrestling because, unlike almost any other form of spectator activity, it enables them to release suppressed emotion.

"Women aren't supposed to yell and scream around the house," says The Ape Man, "but they do feel they can let themselves go when they're watching a wrestling show on TV."

The Ape Man knows whereof he speaks. In Waycross, Ga., last summer a lady became so upset while watching him throttle an opponent via her TV set that she jumped into her car,

drove to the local sporting arena, and stroked him on the head with a soft drink bottle. He finally restrained her with a half nelson.

Some months later in Alabama a wrestler named The Finnish Angel was interrupted in the act of slaughtering another wrestler by a lady who leaped into the ring waving a hammer. In court the next day she explained that, via TV, she became piqued at the Angel's somewhat questionable attempts to gnaw off his foe's arm.

Some of wrestling's most profound thinkers are stumped by the performance of its feminine followers on TV. Announcer Guy Lebow says, "Lady wrestling fans seem to lose contact with reality. An admirer of a heavyweight named Chief Little Wolf shaved her hair off Apache style—just like that of her hero."


"One night in Buffalo," one referee recalls, "a lady objected to a decision I made concerning her favorite wrestler, a large bundle of suet called The Bat. She leaped into the ring, hit me in the eye with her shoe, removed a handful of my hair, and jumped up and down on my feet. It took four cops to get her out of there.

"I like it better," he concluded, "when ladies just stay home and mutter at me."—Frank De Blois

AT SEVEN, RUSTY'S A QUIZ KID WHO BELIEVES IN SANTA CLAUS

On a certain morning in April, 1953, a 6-year-old youngster named Rusty Hamer was told he had been selected to play the part of Danny Thomas' son in a new TV film series, Make Room for Daddy. That same afternoon, Mrs. Arthur W. Hamer, Rusty's mother, was told that her husband, ill of cancer, had only a few months to live.

Late in December, Arthur Hamer died. Rusty spent that day at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Danny Thomas. When his mother tried to break the news to him gently, Rusty said: "Mom, you're trying to tell me that Daddy's dead, aren't you? Well, don't you worry. We'll take care of you."

Rusty Hamer, now 7, is something of a prodigy without ever having meant to be. His parents had always been interested in little theater groups, both back in Tenafly, N.J., where Rusty and his brothers, Walter, 16, and John, 9, were born, and in Santa

Monica, their present home. By the time Rusty was 3, it was obvious that he had an amazing vocabulary and a photographic memory. He soon began to take children's roles in amateur plays and to entertain his mother's club meetings with 40-minute monologues. At age 5, he had played in two or three TV film episodes and a 3-D movie, "Fort Ti," with George Montgomery.

It was Danny Thomas' secretary who first brought Rusty to the comedian's attention. Danny picked up a thirdyear reader (Rusty was then in the first grade), read a line and asked Rusty to read it back from memory. Rusty stumbled over it. He stumbled over a second and a third. Finally he said. "Let me see the book." He scanned several pages, then handed the book back to Thomas. "O.K.," he said, matter-of-factly, "cue me." Thomas threw him a line and Rusty came back with the follow-up without missing a beat. He did it for three pages' worth. And that did it.

Rusty's natural precocity is tem-



pered somewhat by an equally natural tendency to be a 7-year-old in the flesh, rather than the obnoxious mental wizard he might easily have become. He still believes firmly in Santa Claus, despite the fact that last year's Christmas show was devoted to the proposition that Santa Claus exists only in spirit. A threat to "tell Santa Claus" will make him be a good boy if it kills him,

Rusty's relationship with Thomas is all but that of father and son. After signing the boy, Thomas went to see him in an amateur production of "On Borrowed Time." When Danny went backstage after the show, Rusty shouted gleefully to the rest of the cast, "Here's Danny Boy—he's gonna be on my TV show!" Taking his cue from that point on, Thomas has always introduced Rusty to the studio audience as the star of the show.

Danny, who has three children of his own, lavishes affection on Rusty which, though it tends to spoil the youngster somewhat, has effectively filled the gap created by the death of Arthur Hamer, who was extremely close to his three boys. Rusty, who needed the relationship more than his older brothers, is a man's boy, and Danny is his man.

When Rusty came down with a heavy cold one week, Thomas was beside himself with worry. On the night of the filming, he announced to the audience that Rusty wasn't feeling well, that he might blow several lines, that there might have to be retakes and would the audience please bear with the little fellow. Danny, who up to that time had a proud record of never having blown a line on the show, blew six of them in his heartfelt effort to pull Rusty through.

Rusty, of course, was letter-perfect.

Harriett Ripley, who conducts the Kitchen Window show daily on KLZ-TV in Denver, attests that there are dozens of TV snacks that can be whipped-up in a matter of moments. But her specialty is "Caraway Cakes"—a dish that takes a few more minutes to prepare, but one that is well worth the effort.

Harriett discovered the tasty snack about six years ago while on a trip to Biloxi, Miss. It was a hot day, and her hostess served the cakes with icedtea. It proved, Harriett says, to be a most cooling and refreshing repast, with a delightful contrast between the hot cakes and the cold tea.

Caraway Cakes

2 cups flour; 1 cup butter; pinch of sugar; pinch of salt; 4 T. sweet milk;

6 strips bacon; 4 bunches fresh green onions; 2 whole eggs; 1 egg yolk; ¾ cup sour cream; ¼ t. oregano; ¼ t. caraway seeds.

Mix first five ingredients, for pastry shells, gently. Cool until they can be handled without sticking. Roll out dough ¼-inch thick and place in 8-inch pie tin. Preheat oven to 350°, bake crust 10 minutes.

To make filling, dice bacon and fry until crisp, drain. Chop onions into bits and fry in bacon grease until done. Beat eggs and egg yolk together, blend in cooked onions and other ingredients with bacon.

Give custard final quick beating before pouring into baked shells. Sprinkle top with caraway seeds.

Place in preheated oven for 12 to 15 minutes, and serve.
