as we see it

The Television Code needs teeth—badly. The standards of good practice embodied in the Code, and adopted by the networks and stations, would silence criticism now directed at television—if those standards were being enforced. Unfortunately, they are not.

Taking a tip from the movie industry, which awards a seal of approval to each film passed by its Code authority, the TV Code writers decided to issue seals of “good practice” to stations that adhere to the TV Code.

Most stations have the seals and display them—usually early in the morning or late at night, when few viewers are watching.

The only enforcement power the TV Code authorities have is in the seal. If a station should not live up to the Code adopted by the industry, its seal could be withdrawn.

Who would know, aside from trade paper readers? Who would care?

Says the TV Code: “The education of children involves giving them a sense of the world at large. Crime, violence and sex are a part of the world they will be called upon to meet, and a certain amount of proper presentation of such is helpful in orienting the child to his social surroundings. However, violence and illicit sex shall not be presented in an attractive manner, nor to an extent such as will lead the child to believe that they play a greater part in life than they do.”

Many stations present program after program of violence during the course of an afternoon or evening. Yet not once, since the Code went into effect in 1952, have the Code enforcers withdrawn a “Seal of Good Practice” from a station.

The Code needs enforcement—now.

'Just Saw Your Program...'

THE POSTMAN NEVER STOPS RINGING AT HOMES OF TV STARS

Do you need money? Has your cat had kittens? Are you ever bothered by the vague feeling that Joan Caulfield no longer loves you? If so, you're probably thinking of the easy way out—borrowing from the bank, raising the kittens, finding yourself some other TV actress to worship afar.

But thousands in the same dilemma daily are taking a more direct line of action. They're sitting right down and writing their favorite TV idol all about it.

Letters of varying degrees of intimacy—from "Send me a

picture" to "Send me the train fare"—are pouring into network mailrooms and stars' homes even as you read this. The Hollywood office of CBS alone received 327,630 during the first six months of this year.

With television still in its infancy, its fan mail already has reached proportions that have swamped the movie studios for 35 years. Lucille Ball, Gale Storm, Ann Sothorn, Robert Young and other film stars who have made the switch to TV say there's only one difference in their mail these days: instead of "Saw your picture last night," it reads, "Saw your program."

It arrives at the rate of 1500 to 2500 letters, postcards and packages a week, a reassuring flow which goes up sharply when something goes abnormally right or wrong. Dinah Shore picked up several hundred new fans, judging from her mail, when one of her false eyelashes fell off during a recent program. The monthly 10,000 letters for Lucille Ball and Desi Arnaz tripled when their baby was born.

Dinah, who employs two secretaries to help her count, read and answer her fan mail at home, also cites a pretty good example of how fan mail can affect a program.

"When I first went on the air," she says, "I had no idea how I was going to close the show. To relieve my nervousness, I blew a kiss to the camera as we were going off the air. The next week most of my letters mentioned the kiss, so we've kept it ever since as a trademark."

Danny Thomas and Ray Bolger comb their fan mail for criticism and usable suggestions. *Make Room for Daddy*, Thomas says, often contains comedy passed on to him from the living rooms of his viewers. Fan-mail criticism of Ray Wallace as "too zany" resulted in Bolger's decision to portray Wallace as more human this season on *The Ray Bolger Show*.

The major networks keep a close,

stamp-by-stamp count of mail addressed to their stars, and report that programs like *Art Linkletter's House Party* and *The Betty White Show*, which make a point of letting viewers know they couldn't do without their letters, draw by far the heaviest mail in TV. Some 107,978 of those 327,630 letters logged by CBS were addressed to Linkletter. ABC rates another au-

dience-contact show, *The Name's the Same*, its top mail draw.

Fan clubs organized by press agents are responsible for some of the mail that deluges such programs as *I Love Lucy*, *My Little Margie* and *Dragnet*, but most of the 6000 to 10,000 letters these shows inspire each month appear spontaneous.

Networks pass fan letters along unopened to the stars, thereby creating a problem which every headliner in TV would like to do without—and hopes he never has to. Fan mail in volume is proof of popularity tangible enough to impress any sponsor, but it can be a headache and occasionally a heartache, too. In one mail recently Lucille Ball and Desi Arnaz received letters from: a woman who wanted to sell them her home to finance a major operation, a man who wanted them to adopt his dog's puppies, a mother whose son had invented a clothespin for them to manufacture, a maid with stage experience who wanted to be an actress and several strangers seeking financial assistance. "To get right to the point," wrote one, "could you lend me \$10,000 and write it off your taxes?"

Requests for loans turn up in every sack of mail, and invariably are turned down. Usually a polite letter, referring applicants to one of the many welfare organizations to which stars contribute, is enough to stall a repeat request, but some people are persistent. One star learned how to silence postal panhandlers who won't take no for an answer. He writes them back on a postcard, refusing their request for a loan—one piece of mail from a famous personality which the recipient isn't too happy for the postman to see.

It is too soon to say whether *Medic* is going to raise the Nation's standard of health, but it might if Richard Boone were permitted—which he won't be—to answer all his fan mail.

He's sure to be consulted on ailments from hangnail to hepatitis.

Jack Webb, thanks to *Dragnet*, is queried about unsolved crimes by police officers in all parts of the world. Most of the mail addressed to "Reed Hadley, Public Defender," is delivered where you might expect—to the Los Angeles County Public Defender's Office, which routinely forwards it to Hadley's secretary. Much of it, like the mail addressed to "David Brian, Mr. District Attorney," seeks free legal advice—which Hadley and Brian, of course, aren't allowed to give.

Ann Sothern says a large part of her fan mail is from jealous secretaries who can't understand how she can behave so glamorously on *Private Secretary* and still hold her job. She also receives a dozen or so offers of employment per year, but suspects the "employers" aren't even in business. "None of the letters, I notice, is dictated to a secretary," she says.

Hot TV News: Men Are Getting

(WE KNEW IT ALL THE TIME)

It has been written many times that the American male animal, especially the husband of the species, takes a fearful beating about the head and shoulders when cast in the guise of public entertainment. He is, in fact, an All-American LummoX.

Television, a medium magnificently suited to the cliché in almost every form, lost little time in attaching itself to this one about the male. One of the earliest shows to be committed to film was *The Life of Riley*, an ill-fated, 13-episode series which starred Jackie Gleason as one of the great American idiots. The role has since been taken over by William Bendix, an excellent idiot (on the screen—at least); and Gleason has gone on to other roles which likewise have done little or nothing to glorify the masculine species.

Starting this season, however, a small ray of hope has begun shining from one channel and another. The American husband and father has begun to emerge as something a notch above a grown-up Katzenjammer Kid.

Ray Milland and Phyllis Avery: he has wised up.

Smarter!

Take Stu Erwin, for instance. When he first came on the ABC air, just four years ago, Erwin was perhaps the epitome of all TV stumblebums. Despite the fact that he was supposed to be a high school principal and the breadwinner for a family of four, he stumbled his way into situations which would be avoided by any self-respecting clinical moron.

This fall, however, finds a marked improvement in Erwin's mental stature. While the slapstick format has not been entirely dispensed with on *The Stu Erwin Show*, Erwin, for better or for worse, is being given glimmerings of almost human intelligence—a development which his NBC counterpart, Bill Bendix, would no doubt consider revoltin'. Bendix, in fact, is about to become something of a lone wolf among the reasonably happy halfwits. His *Riley* is the one show in which no changes are contemplated. "Riley's magnificent stupidity," an agency man explains, "has paid off in the ratings, and we see no reason at this particular time for investing him with any more than the few paltry brains he already has."

Biggest switch of the current season has been evident in *The Ray Milland Show*. Known last year as Ray McNutley, our hero is currently being called McNulty and is being handed scripts in which his intelligence, at times, not only equals that of his very attractive wife (Phyllis Avery) but actually surpasses it—a fact virtually unheard of in television prior to late 1954.

There's a newcomer, in fact, with the audacity to make Pop out as a pretty astute gent in almost every department, up to and sometimes even including that of understanding *The Teen-ager*. This paragon among husbands and fathers is, of course, Robert Young, whose *Father Knows Best* is offset just a little by another newcomer, *Corliss Archer*. Mr. Archer, as played by John Eldredge, has an I.Q. somewhere between that of Erwin and Young, a level on which he is joined by Ozzie Nelson. But even Ozzie is allowed to pitch the product, a chore not generally reserved for morons.

What has brought about this trend is difficult to say. But trend it must be, for the most brainless portrayal of all last year's shows, that of Paul Hartman in *Pride of the Family*, has been dropped entirely. Even Ray Bolger, whose characterization last year was more elfin and zany than stupid, has seen fit to step into the character of a more believable human being.

It's hoped the male populace will appreciate the subtle change in its collective stature; for, with the male animal's emancipation from den to kitchen, he has suddenly become a target worthy of the advertiser's attention. He may not buy, but he pays.

From Uncle Tom To Lobster Pots

'OMNIBUS' WILL TRY MORE OFF-BEAT PROGRAMS
AND HOPES REST OF TELEVISION WILL FOLLOW

Omnibus, in all reality TV's first 90-minute "spectacular," has started again to bring viewers a variety of new show ideas, ranging from a repertory company that will try out new plays "on the road" (via local, out-of-town stations) to a series of music lessons by outstanding concert artists. In so doing, the TV-Radio Workshop of the Ford Foundation, which produces the show, hopes to continue "setting the pace for the rest of TV."

According to Robert Saudek, director of the Workshop, *Omnibus* originally was created to "put risk capital into TV programming to show that programs which might leave a deposit of knowledge or appreciation of the arts can appeal to a large enough audience to be self-supporting."

To this end it has telecast, among other things, a series of five films on the life of Abraham Lincoln, produced especially for *Omnibus* by Louis de Rochemont and starring Royal Dano; Shakespeare's "King Lear," starring Orson Welles, and "The Duchess and the Smugs," a play about the emotional growth of an adolescent girl.

Among the outstanding documentary features on *Omnibus* have been "Village Incident," describing how the people of India are overcoming crises in their new independence; and "POW's False Confession," in which an American flier appeared in person

to repudiate a "confession," forced from him by torture, that he participated in germ warfare in Korea.

Omnibus also has showcased music ranging from jazz to "La Boheme," especially produced for the program by the Metropolitan Opera.

Omnibus is still "experimenting . . ." in a program of free-flowing format,

with the hope that the more successful experiments will be adopted as a regular part of TV," Saudek said. "I may be a prejudiced witness, but I feel it's remarkable that so many other shows have come out of ideas presented on *Omnibus*."

Omnibus launched its third season on CBS last month, hopeful that its only carry-overs from last season would be the time period, the network and Alistair Cooke as host. "We are changing our entire approach to the program," said Saudek. "We feel that the change is necessary, not only because the world is constantly changing, but also because, as other TV shows move into the same fields that we have tried, we must move out ahead."

In drama, for example, *Omnibus* producers aspire to "leave with the audience something more than just the satisfaction of having seen a play well done. Maybe we can give people a sense of history."

"Uncle Tom's Cabin," for example, is on the agenda to indicate the effect of an art form—in this case, a novel and play—on history.

Omnibus is building its own repertory company, comprising young professional actors with only an occasional star, which will experiment with new writing, acting and directing techniques. The company is to present six plays during the season, each of which will be tried out on a small, out-of-town station before it's brought into New York for the show.

Omnibus plans also to present plays outside the studio, or on location—for example, plays that would originate directly from a tattoo parlor in New York's Bowery, from the decks of an aircraft carrier docked at the Brooklyn Navy Yard, and other spots. (It should be noted, however, that on-location TV has been tried before.)

On the film side, *Omnibus* is presenting several features dealing

with the one-man-against-the-world theme, or how man faces Nature alone. One will depict lobster fishing in Maine; another will be "Corral," the story of a cowboy, which recently won an award at the Venice Film Festival. In ballet, *Omnibus* has slated a film, produced in Denmark, about an 11-year-old girl enrolled in the Royal Danish Ballet.

Violinist Yehudi Menuhin is slated to conduct music lessons in a specially-filmed series, instructing first a young boy, then a more experienced player and, finally, another concert artist. Members of the percussion section of the New York Philharmonic Symphony have presented a lesson on their instruments, and the great Myra Hess will instruct in piano.

In an effort to stimulate more reading, *Omnibus* also will have a series of book discussions. The idea is to select new books and have an authority in the field talk about them without necessarily reviewing them.

Four Men And A Girl...

AND GUESS WHO'S THE BOSS!

Paula Kelly, a fifth and female wheel in what used to be a male quartet called The Modernaires, a stalwart component of *The Bob Crosby Show*, has been keeping the boys under control since 1941.

She was vocalist at the time with Glenn Miller's band, and The Modernaires had just signed on. She married one of them, Hal Dickinson, and became housemother to all four.

"It's not easy," she admits, "for I've long since found it's physically impossible to shout four men. But somebody has to look after them. They can still turn up for a show with their ties on crooked, or either wearing the wrong suit or a white shirt instead of a TV blue one, or bringing the wrong

music, or sporting a shiny silver tie clasp that will burn holes in a camera, or groaning and moaning about having missed their morning coffee."

The Modernaires—Dickinson, Francis Scott, Allan Copeland, Johnny Drake and Paula—all live out in the San Fernando Valley, Paula and Hal holding down an English farmstead in Tarzana with their three daughters, ranging in age from seven to 13.

After years of riding herd on the four men in her life, Paula recently has found the tables turned somewhat.

A thyroidectomy and chronic laryngitis have at times reduced her to the highly unfemale-like position of being forbidden to talk for as long as three weeks at a time (she is allowed on these occasions to sing on the show, but nothing else), and the boys hover over her with all the awkward solicitude of four husbands.

"But I still have to straighten their ties and pour their coffee and see that their hair gets combed," she says. "I carry a little gold whistle on my charm bracelet, and when I blow it they jump. They're the only men I know who get whistled at regularly by a woman."

TV In The News: TV networks and local stations are still taking bows for generally creditable election coverage. As of November, 1954, however, TV "firsts" are getting rare. NBC claimed one, with its four-way split screen conferences between commentators in New York, Washington, Chicago and Los Angeles. New York's WRCA-TV claimed another, with election reports in color. The Democrats selected green as their "official TV color." The Republicans chose blue.

The Campbell Soup Company is trying a brave new experiment. The canned food company doesn't approve of canned laughter, has ordered it deleted from the *Dear Phoebe* sound track.

Bob Smith returns to *Howdy Doody* within a few weeks.

In an unprecedented intra-trade squabble, Hazel Bishop, one of NBC's "spectacular" sponsors, is insisting that the hour-and-a-half shows be trimmed to one hour after Jan. 1.

Channel Chatter: Chicago may lose another of its TV institutions. *Down You Go* may be the next show to be moved

to New York—for good. Du Mont execs are planning to retain only witty Bergen Evans of the original cast should the trek east be made. It may happen late this month.

She's not telling her age, but Helen Joyce, femcee of *Femme Show*, admits to being a grandmother. She was a star in Chicago radio for years.

Terry Roble, the 19-year-old daughter of jazz pianist Chet Roble, seems to have inherited his show business yen. She's just been hired as a production assistant for papa's Channel 7 program, *The Danny O'Neil Show*.

Sportscaster Norm Barry is flashing signs that he's out for TV GUIDE's Celebrity Golf Title next year. Last month he joined Harry Pezzullo, prexy of the Illinois PGA, to cop the pro-amateur championship at a local golf club. One of Norm's shots was a sensational 60-foot putt for a birdie.

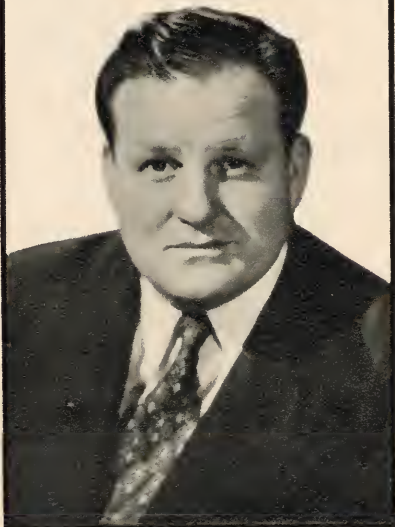

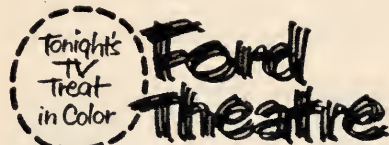

Joanne seems the lone feminine friend acceptable to Liberace's mother, the dominant figure in the pianist's life. She often has dinner in their home, even helps with the dishes.

Miss Rio has come to be the pianist's favorite date, the one girl with whom he can let down his rather considerable hair and talk freely. Before he left on his recent concert tour, he was seeing her once and sometimes twice a week. And because in Hollywood two dates in a row are considered equal to a proposal, if not an actual engagement, the columnists staked out their claims and the headline writers became carefully careless.

DOROTHY KILGALLEN:

Girl Reporter

**A TELEVISION STAR
COVERS CLEVELAND'S
SHEPPARD TRIAL**

Television's Dorothy Kilgallen found herself, as the drama of "The State of Ohio versus Dr. Samuel Sheppard" rocketed along, playing the feminine lead in the cast which surrounded the famous Cleveland trial.

In her role of nationally syndicated newspaper columnist and girl reporter, the sharp-witted *What's My Line?* panelist received almost as much prominence as the handsome society osteopath, accused of killing his wife.

Miss Kilgallen, covering the trial for the Hearst newspapers, learned that being a television personality was a helpful happenstance—and often a headache.

Her fame enabled her to get closer to the principals in the case than any other member of the television, radio or press crews. She also was besieged by autograph collectors and photographers and, believe it or not, was dragged into the long-drawn-out

wrangle over the selection of the jury.

One prospective juror was dismissed after she revealed that she had talked to a sister and a friend about the trial and the newsgatherers, though she denied the presence of Miss Kilgallen would influence her.

The girl pointed out that she had merely replied to the friend who asked if she had seen Dorothy Kilgallen or had gotten her autograph.

After the youthful would-be juror was excused, she expressed a hope to newsmen that she still might be able to get an autograph from the TV panelist.

Miss Kilgallen heard about it and sent her a note, reading: "Dear Betty, the reporters thought you would have made a good juror."

When court recessed, white-haired chief defense counsel William J. Corrigan approached the columnist and said of the excused juror:

"She just wanted to be on *What's My Line*."

Judge Edward Blythin, who presided at the trial, became attracted by Miss Kilgallen's personality and revealed that he and his wife wanted to invite the busy newspaperwoman to their home for dinner sometime during her Cleveland stint.

Judge Blythin described Miss Kilgallen as "a lovely person" and said, "I can understand why she is so popular."

And what does Miss Kilgallen say about all the attention paid to her?

"It complicates life a bit, but I can't

say that it ruins it, or that I don't like what it means.

"I've been working hard since I was 17 years old to get where I am now, and although the attention slows me down, I am grateful to give autographs."

Just how hard Miss Kilgallen works can be understood by a glance at her schedule for one Monday during the trial.

She arrived by plane at 4 A.M. Monday, after appearing on *What's My Line* Sunday night. She was in bed in her hotel by 5, up again at 8, and at the courthouse at 9:45.

At 4:30 P.M., when the trial recessed, she caught a plane back to New York for an evening with her



three children and her husband, Broadway producer Dick Kollmar. Up Tuesday at 5:30, she and her husband recorded two sessions of their twice-daily 15-minute radio program. And before noon Dotty was back in Cleveland. In addition to all this, she found time to do her daily column, "Voice of Broadway," which runs in approximately 100 newspapers.

And—oh, yes—to write those colorful, day-by-day stories of the trial which brought her to Cleveland in the first place.



Just Don't Call Her 'Jerry Lewis'

KAYE BALLARD IS USED
TO OTHER COMPARISONS

After a summer as star of the *Comedy Hour* and a season as star of the Broadway musical, "The Golden Apple," the mobile-faced Kaye Ballard feels she's left an "indelible" mark in the hearts and minds of her public. Her public, let us add, includes a certain quota of people who *don't* think she looks like Martha Raye, and who don't suggest she could stand-in for Nancy Walker, Fanny Brice,

Not even related: TV comedienne, Kaye Ballard, and Jerry Lewis, who is said also to have some pretensions in that field. Kaye fears that many think she and Jerry look much alike.

"I hate comparisons," she groans, registering despair.

"All my life," explains Kaye, who is 27, "I thought I was ugly. I just about got to the point where it didn't matter so much when someone brought up Jerry Lewis. I became a comedienne because I didn't like my face and I found when I distorted it, people laughed. But I didn't know anything about the subtleties of acting. A real actress can say more with a glance than with a whole facial contortion.

"Real comedy," according to the soft-spoken Kaye, "is achieved by setting up a universal truth and then exaggerating it. I used to want to be a great comedienne, but now I know that I really want to be a great actress who is funny. Someday, maybe, even like Shirley Booth."

Kaye is probably the most self-deflating person ever to have wandered into show business. It could, of course, be argued that for the benefit of the press all performers have simulated modesty. But Kaye's self-consciousness, which refers only to

her physical being, not her talent, seems born of hypersensitivity. At lunch one summer afternoon she was called to the phone. As she left the table she wrapped a coat around so that other diners couldn't see her body. "I'm fat," she claims. She isn't, but she diets anyway.

Spike Jones gave the Cleveland girl her start as a comic tuba player and specialty singer. From there, she went off on her own into night clubs, playing New York's chic East Side Blue Angel for 66 weeks. She appeared in nine different shows, including the English company of "Touch and Go," which gave two command performances. But she never got before the Broadway critics until "The Golden Apple," and then, she says, "The show was an artistic hit," which means, "The critics loved it but we closed before the public got to see very much of us."

It was in "Touch and Go" that Nat Karson, then producer of *The Summer Comedy Hour*, first saw Kaye. When her name was later submitted to him he remembered who she was and signed her for two shows with options for others. Meanwhile, NBC officials were so impressed they signed her to a five-year contract last April, without asking her to go through the so-called proving ground of the summer dog days.

"I think I'm being groomed for something big," Kaye says. "Otherwise they wouldn't guarantee my salary whether I work or not." Last year, NBC had 10 nonworking people under contract. But Kaye is destined to work for her low-caloried meals. She's slated for four of the *Comedy Hours* this winter, a few of the "spectaculars," and has completed a pilot film for a new situation comedy. She also has an offer to play Las Vegas at \$5000 a week. Five years ago she worked there for \$850—and, she adds, "I thought it was a lot of money."





Imogene Coca Show

PROGRAM OF THE WEEK

It is no particular pleasure to report that the Imogene Coca of the current season is not the Imogene Coca of seasons gone by.

The fragmentation of that one-time NBC blockbuster, *Your Show of Shows*, into Max Liebman "spectaculars," *Caesar's Hour* and *The Imogene Coca Show*, has been inspiring more than one *tsk-tsk*. And of the three former colleagues, it's Imogene, alas, who seems most consistently to come a cropper.

That the comedienne is one of the

most talented of her breed is undeniable. It is equally undeniable, however, that her talent is not the easiest kind in the world to write for. She is a performer who must be given an idea, rather than a script; a direction, rather than set lines. Thus far this season the ideas and the direction have generated only occasional sparks.

Her difficulty is that, after five years, virtually everyone has seen her several times more than once and, to keep viewers' enthusiasm kindled, her material must be fresh and different. She has long since run out of her original night-club acts, some of which were gems, and now she appears to have run out of writers who know what to do with her gamine-like qualities.

Certainly the answer doesn't lie in casting her as a strictly *non-tongue-in-cheek* singing ingenue, assigning her long and dreary dancing chores in straight-faced production numbers, or watering down her wild-eyed burlesque by linking it to a "real"—and rather humdrum—offstage Imogene.

Occasionally, as noted, Coca's new show has struck a spark. Perhaps her best bit to date was the one which had her trying to get out of paying a 10-cent highway toll. She was excellent, too, in satirizing a singer's swooning female fan, but, as too often happens, this particular sketch ran too long. Brevity is still the soul of wit.
