Bill Boyd (Hopalong Cassidy to most of us) is making a world tour. In Australia, recently, he said this:

"I understand that in the near future television will go into operation here in Australia. Believe me—the sooner it comes, the better. It is obvious that television provides a source of tremendous entertainment, and it provides good entertainment as well. More important, however, is the way this entertainment is enjoyed.

"In my own country, the war years and the strain and pressure of our way of life had brought a great change in the average family. Our families had grown apart from each other—each member seeking his own amusements separate from the others. It didn't add up to a very healthy situation for anyone, and it was especially bad for the children. They were growing up away from their parents and missing the warmth, the closeness and the love that can exist only in a happy home. It was a bad condition—and then television came along.

"Within a few years, television sets were in nearly every home in the country and our whole living habit had changed. Instead of running in all directions vainly seeking amusement, Mother, Father, Sister and Brother found it in the last place they'd suspect—right in their own living room.

"They also found that what they were seeking wasn't entertainment at all—it was really just being close together. Now our families have come to realize how much they had been missing, and our homes have come to be 'homes' and not just 'houses.' Our kids have fathers and mothers again, and our fathers and mothers have their kids back with them. That is the real miracle of television . . ."

We think so too, Hoppy.

Bob Stahl reports:

JACKIE GLEASON has built a profitable parlay for himself in his newest deal. Besides a half hour telefilm version of "The Honeymooners" each Saturday night, which will continue to star him, ART CARNEY and AUDREY MEADOWS, he also sold Stage Show for the half hour immediately following. This is the DORSEY BROTHERS' show produced by Gleason Enterprises. In addition to the DORSEYS, Stage Show will feature the JUNE TAYLOR Dancers, and JACKIE himself may do an occasional guest chore.

SAMMY DAVIS, JR., will do his first TV entertaining since his recent auto accident on a special Comedy Hour show originating from Ciro's in Hollywood Jan. 16 . . . MILTON BERLE recently put in his first stint as an NBC production consultant, sitting in with top NBC executives on program planning for 1955.

SID CAESAR is slated to star next summer in a feature-length movie, which will be written by TV Playhouse author PADDY CHAYEFSKY. It's to be a comedy, of course, but with sympathetic overtones, a la CHAYEFSKY's "Marty" script, on which Hollywood filming was recently completed . . . CAESAR, meanwhile, plans to swing more toward musical review for his Caesar's Hour. Seems viewers complained about too many "Commuter" sketches.

That new Adventures of the Kingfish telefilm series, to be telecast Tuesday nights, will include some reruns of the original Amos 'n' Andy films . . . It's said that plans originally announced for PHIL SILVERS to move into that spot fell through because of PHIL's reluctance to work opposite MILTON BERLE.

Look for JACK CARTER to join the <u>Imogene Coca Show</u> as a permanent foil for IMOGENE. She reportedly feels she needs a side-kick to take the place of her erstwhile partner, CAESAR, same as SID added NANETTE FABRAY to his cast to replace IMOGENE . . A new telefilm show to star LEE BOWMAN is in the works, tentatively titled <u>The Bachelor</u>.

Omnibus will devote the entire 90 minutes of its show at the end of this month to an analytical study of TV's first eight years. Columnist JOHN CROSBY will write the script . . . With MAX LIEBMAN extremely enthusiastic about PAT CARROLL, look for PAT to do bigger and better things on LIEBMAN's upcoming "spectaculars."

Arthur Godfrey's last hip operation nearly killed him. "During the first 24 hours," he now admits for the first time, "they almost lost me."

When you see him on television, walking without crutches, he is suffering agonizing pain. Another operation might help—but it's a life-and-death gamble. He dreads making a decision to take the chance.

Add to that mental—and physical—torture the fact that he's been the target of harsh newspaper stories. Because he is in the public eye, his methods and motives have been questioned.

The new Disneyland First of Two Parts show is offering his toughest competition yet. Godfrey is Godfrey

no longer king of the airwaves on Wednesdays. His ratings have dropped noticeably.

He's a millionaire. He could retire

tomorrow, rest his body, live more than comfortably the rest of his life.

So why doesn't he quit?

Godfrey himself supplied the answer to this and other questions in this exclusive interview, one of the few granted since Julius La Rosa was fired in October, 1953.

He talked continuously, for almost two hours, in his New York office, taking time out only to sip tea and, more frequently, to relight a cigar.

Why doesn't he quit? Basically, he said, to keep from becoming depressed because of his hip—and out of loyalty

to the "Friends" of Arthur Godfrey and His Friends.

Godfrey went on to discuss various subjects, pulling no punches, speaking his mind.

He admits that his hip is a constant source of discomfort. During a recent program, he seemed only half-kidding when he talked about two little yellow lights technicians had rigged on his desk "to give him better coloring." Actually, though his crutches lay within easy reach as he spoke, he looked healthy and relaxed.

He discounted reports that he is having a running battle with his doctors over the need for a second operation, but listed some reasons why he's far from enthusiastic.

"My hip joint, mechanically, is no good," he said, "and one day I'll have to have the operation done again. I can do everything now but walk. I ride as well as I ever did, I swim a lot, and I'm trying to learn to ice-skate again. My reflexes are as good as ever when I fly. But if I got up from this chair and tried to walk across the room without my crutches, the pain would be almost unbearable.

"But before having them do the operation again, I want to wait a while. I want to wait until the doctors learn a little more about this thing called shock." (Shock, which often follows injury or prolonged surgery, is a serious depression of all the vital processes of the body.)

"I might go into a state of shock," he said, "and never come out of it. Or I might come out of it with only half a brain, or with my liver shot.

"It only happens when the doctors have to relax you 'way down deep. That's necessary for my operation because they have to re-set the hip joint. If they find when I'm on the operating table that one nerve or muscle is still not relaxed, they have to take me down deeper.

"I haven't told this to many people, but in that first operation, for the first 24 hours, they almost lost me during that shock period.

"This operation is quite a deal, as long as there is that danger of shock.

I'm not afraid of surgery. God knows, I've had as much as anybody. The only fear I have in the whole world is being a helpless invalid. I have to decide whether I should stay on these crutches or gamble again.

"Right now, mentally, I can only look down. I know my hip won't get better by itself, so I can't look up."

Keeping busy keeps his mind off his infirmity, said Godfrey. But why does he work quite so hard? "Because it's my life.

"Actually," he continued, "it's only the Wednesday night show that knocks me out. I do that show very foolishly as far as my personal life is concerned. As for personal income, you can write that off in a hurry. Often the things we do cost more than we get for the show, and I have to make up the rest.

"I continue the Wednesday night show mostly for the kids in the cast. Human nature is a funny thing. When

the kids were doing only the daily morning program, they thought, 'This is the end—it's the high point of any career.' But for some reason, the columnists and newspaper people bypass our morning show.

"In order to give the kids that very questionable feeling of importance they get from seeing their names in the papers, we put on the Wednesday night show. You can call it loyalty if you like. I do it for the kids. They think it's more 'show business.' They work in a big theater with lights, costumes and backdrops."

Although the new Disneyland has taken a sizable bite out of his Wednesday night audience—the two hourlong shows are in direct competition for half an hour—Godfrey denies he's concerned, and says he's contemplating no format changes.

Recent American Research Bureau figures show Disney leading Godfrey by about five rating points—36.1 to

30.5, enough to topple Arthur Godfrey and His Friends from its usual perch among the Top Ten to 18th place.

Nevertheless, Godfrey insisted, "We have no specific changes in mind for the show," adding, "I'm only waiting for this leg to get better so I can do more visual things (swimming, ice-skating, etc.)."

He welcomes rather than fears competition, he said. "Frankly, I think competition is good for all of us. It will tend to make both our shows better.

"The only reason I'm sorry Disney is on at the same time," Godfrey said with a grin, "is because I can't see his show myself."

Next week Godfrey tells why La Rosa will never again be numbered among his "Friends," points to mistakes TV is making, and worries about losing his own "common touch."





Whenever race horse announcer Clem McCarthy is asked the inevitable "How did you happen to call the wrong horse in the Kentucky Derby?" he invariably answers:

"You couldn't have heard me because it wasn't the Derby, and anyhow, you can't 'lateral' race horses."

Clem, who did actually call the finish of the 1947 Preakness incorrectly, is well aware that any human being will err sometime while calling thousands of races under all sorts of conditions. And his "you can't 'lateral' race horses" phrase sends shivers down the spines of many a sportscaster, particularly the network football announcer who gets himself out of ticklish situations by reporting imag-

inary "lateral passes" which end up with the right player having the ball.

Every sportscaster has found himself in an embarrassing situation somewhere along the line. Take New York's Guy Le Bow, for instance.

Le Bow was reading the starting lineups before an Eastern Amateur Hockey League game. Just as he was to announce the last player on one of the teams, an engineer brushed the lineup from his hand and it floated away. Being unfamiliar with the visitors, he looked desperately for assistance, spotted a Schaefer Beer sign and improvised: ". . and playing left wing is Sam Schaefer."

Students of the game still wonder what happened to the sensational Sam

Schaefer who played great hockey for one game and then disappeared.

Then there was the time that Ted Husing was telecasting a St. Valentine's night fight from New York. His post-fight guest, Eddie Eagan, then State Boxing Commission head, came out with this one:

"Thanks for having me, Ted. Isn't this a grand night for valentines?"

Eagan's diction was not up to snuff, and Husing began thinking of unemployment insurance when he heard what sounded like, "Isn't it a grand night for Ballantine's?" (The fight's sponsor: Pabst Blue Ribbon Beer.)

Last vear veteran sportscaster Harry Wismer teamed up with announcer Dick Noel to telecast a Green Bay Packers-Detroit Lions football game. At half time, Noel had to give a pitch for his sponsor, a cigaret company. Wismer was somewhere around greeting friends. Part of the commercial was to compare the sponsor's tobacco with that of another leading brand. The incomparable Wismer was now called upon to be the "impartial" judge. Noel held forth the competitor's cigaret for the television audience and then called Wismer over to inspect the quality of the tobacco. Hairbreadth Harry, smiling broadly, astounded the world with, "Why Dick, that's the finest tobacco I've ever seen. What a golden texture! I never . . ."

Noel, swooning, gathered enough strength to interrupt imploringly, "That's fine, Harry, but what about the tobacco in our cigaret?"

With frantic emotion Harry replied, "Superior, Dick. Vastly superior!"

Then there's Mel Allen. Unfortunately for Allen, his two biggest TV sponsors were cigar and beer accounts. Melvin indulged in neither. The first time the TV audience glimpsed Mel puffing on a stogey, the smoke died down and there was Allen, a little woozy, saying, "How bout that?"

A few weeks later Mel invited a

noted football coach to share the TV screen with him. Coolly Allen lighted up his sponsor's pride and then offered the good coach a puff. The latter casually replied, "Oh, no thanks, Mel. Those things always make me sick."

A sellout crowd at a Cleveland Indian-New York Yankee game at Yankee Stadium witnessed a most famous flub. New York sports announcer Jack Lightcap was reading the opening lineups. It was a very hot night and many fans had draped their jackets and other paraphernalia over the railing of the front-row boxes, which technically put their clothing in fair-playing territory. Noticing this, the umpire quickly sent a message to Lightcap, who opened up his microphone and spoke these words:

"Will the patrons sitting in the front-row boxes kindly remove their

Marlowe To Wed Godfrey Producer

Marion Marlowe is planning to wed TV producer Larry Puck, but her boss, Arthur Godfrey, emphatically denies published reports that the romance led to Puck's being dropped from the Wed-

nesday night Godfrey show.

Marion told a newsman just after Christmas that she had accepted "a six and a half carat emerald-cut diamond engagement ring with lots of baguettes on the sides" from Puck. Puck had not performed his usual Wednesday night duties during the preceding three weeks. Were the two facts related?

"Golly, I don't know," said Marion. "I just can't say. I can't imagine any-

thing like that."

Godfrey told TV GUIDE that Puck had been relieved of his producer status on the Wednesday night show, but insisted that this was done at Puck's request. He said that Puck had been in poor health recently and has been on vacation for the last month. Puck will continue, Godfrey said, as producer of Godfrey's Monday night Talent Scouts.

"When Larry asked to be relieved of one of the shows, I told him I'd take over the Wednesday night program

while he vacationed," Godfrey said. "I told him to go out and have himself a ball and not to worry about anything. I worked as producer on three shows, and then told the kids I would take over permanently and let Larry stick to Talent Scouts."

All the furor-and the suspicion that a member of his own team must have spilled the news about his taking over the Wednesday night producing spotmade him "feel sick," Godfrey said. "I feel like I want to throw the whole thing over." But he accused nobody and he told TV GUIDE he would continue on his shows.

"I don't know whether Larry gave Marion a ring," Arthur said. "If he did, she didn't tell me about it. I know he has been friendly with her since his wife died several years ago. But even if they are engaged, that won't make any difference to me. Larry is one of the most valuable men we have, and I certainly don't intend to fire him."

Miss Marlowe freely admitted her engagement, "Larry Puck is just the nicest man I have ever met in my life,"

she said.






With "Toastmaster General" George Jessel as star emcee, TV GUIDE's 1954 Annual Awards Telecast will unfold Monday night, Jan. 10, before a capacity audience at Chicago's Civic Theater. The hour-long spectacle will be televised from 9 to 10 P.M. over WBKB (Channel) under the sponsorship of TV GUIDE.

Jessel, currently headlining the Chez Paree review, is rated among the Nation's foremost comedians. His witty commentary is expected to be one of the show's sparkling features.

Fifteen of Chicago's leading television stars will appear on the awards telecast to receive coveted gold statuettes. The stars comprise the 15 top favorites of Chicagoland viewers as determined by TV GUIDE's 1954 awards poll.

Between award presentations, entertainment will be offered by show business celebrities. Guest vocalists already signed include Johnny Desmond and June Valli. Desmond, featured on ABC-TV's Breakfast Club, will be making one of his final Chicago TV appearances before his departure for

A special highlight of the program will be the presentation of an honorary citation to one of the most respected figures of Chicago TV, Clifton Utley.

Utley, WNBQ's famed newscaster, has been absent from TV since being stricken by a crippling illness. His appearance, brought about by a flood of reader inquiries as to his health and future, will be his first before the cameras in over a year.

Names of the 1954 award winners are being withheld until the actual telecast. As a result, with the poll having been widely publicized, suspense has been mounting in past weeks. Speculation is rife along TV row as to how many of the 1953 TV GUIDE champions can repeat their triumphs.

For example, Howard Miller, a double-award winner last year (for best interview show and top favorite show) has encountered much stronger opposition this season.

WNBQ's Clint Youle, the award-winning weatherman, has a formidable challenger in WBBM-TV's P. J. Hoff, to name but one.

Austin Kiplinger, the choice last year as newscaster, has been hard pressed by Jack Angell, John Harrington and Spencer Allen among others.

As the poll progressed, races in nearly all 15 categories loomed as toss-ups. Only shows staged and seen exclusively on Chicago outlets were considered in the voting.

Tickets to the telecast have all been mailed in answer to a record number of requests. Admission will be granted to non-ticket holders as well in the event of cancelations.

TV GUIDE's 1953 Awards Telecast was one of the most talked-about events of Chicago television last season. This year's show, the 6th Annual Awards Presentation, promises to be equally exciting. Don't be disappointed. Set your dial Monday night at 9 P.M. to WBKB (Channel 7).

PROGRAM OF THE WEEK

George Gobel demonstrates how the proper care and feeding of a new TV personality pays off. NBC had the new comedy star under contract for more than a year and realized his potential from the start. But the network groomed him carefully via guest appearances. As a result, when Gobel launched his own show this season, he was ready, eager and able.

Gobel rates his zooming popularity and plaudits. His offbeat humor, his wry characterization of a harassed husband and his stock-in-trade sayings add up to one of TV's freshest shows. You can credit this not only to Gobel himself but to a shrewd and adept writing staff.

Obvious dangers lie ahead. Gobel is on three Saturday nights out of four and could fall prey to TV's occupational hazard, over-exposure. So far, though, he's been skillfully sidestepping this hazard. Since the country has loudly latched on to "I'll be a dirty bird," George has held use of this and other popular phrases to a minimum. And the basic situations in his sketches are varied enough each week to keep the show funny.

Gobel also has surrounded himself with talented players. Pretty Peggy King is a fine song stylist with an infectious personality. John Scott Trotter, Bing Crosby's orchestra leader since almost the Year One, dittos for Gobel and adds to the fun in the sketches. Jeff Donnell, who often plays his wife, is pleasant and personable. And such weekly guest stars as Vera Vague and Edward Everett Horton mesh nicely with the Gobel humor.—R.S.

Mayor Of The Town

A visual version of the old Lionel Barrymore radio series, Mayor of the Town is thoroughly routine. Thomas Mitchell plays the meddlesome mayor of a "typical American town"—Springdale, a place to avoid if it is originality and imagination you seek.

The filmed series' plots are trite and unbelievable: 15-year-old girl falls in and out of love with older man in two days, just in time for older man to marry girl's mother; crotchety judge is bitten by dog, jams leash law through town council, softens just in time to save dog for small boy.

It is the mayor, a born fixer if there ever was one, who fixes it for the girl to get fed up with the older man and for the boy to get the dog.

Lacking both scripts and direction, Mitchell merely walks through the proceedings, turning the standard Mitchell reactions on and off as required. Good supporting players are largely wasted. Kathleen Freeman plays a stereotyped housekeeper.

It might be said that no effort has been spared to save money on this one—and every cent saved shows.

Gisele MacKenzie Abandoned Violin For Singing and Dancing Career

Up in Toronto, Canada, there's the rather staid Royal Conservatory of Music. . . .

Down in New York, there's the glittering, fast-moving Hit Parade....

And Gisele MacKenzie has starred both places—but she had to throw her violin to the longhairs to get away with it.

Gisele, one of the Hit Parade's singing stars (and dancers), started her professional career as a concert violinist. And she's still convinced, that her success is due to the violin which she gave up eight years ago.

"People always ask me whether I think my musical education was all in vain," Gisele said. "And I always answer, 'No.' You see, it was only because of my violin that I was able to play a duet with Jack Benny. Jack later asked me to appear on his radio and TV shows. And two years ago, when I was on tour with him, he learned that Lucky Strike was looking for a singer to replace June Valli on *Hit Parade*. He put in a

plug and that's how I got the job. And I owe it all to my violin."

Now firmly ensconced as a regular on one of the Nation's most popular TV shows, as a recording star and a favorite night club and theater performer, Gisele has little time for her violin—or for many other hobbies. And that includes men, to a degree. Even though she's a warm, vibrant personality—much more so than she seems to be on TV— Gisele lives a real bachelor girl's life. She has occasional dates for dinner or the theater but has no plans right now for marriage—"at least not until the right guy comes along."

Gisele lavishes much of her affection on her two pet long-haired dachshunds. One is named Brunhilde and the other Wolfgang, which naturally comes out as Brunie and Wolfie. She has taught them a number of tricks that would do credit to almost any dog act appearing on Toast of the Town. "But then, of course," she says, "they're real hambones—just like me."

It was while she was still studying

at the Royal Conservatory in Toronto that Gisele became a singer. During the war, she entertained soldiers at camps and canteens with her violin and occasionally sang. One night a Navy lieutenant asked her if she were a professional singer. Gisele answered haughtily, "No, I'm a professional violinist." He politely suggested that she could earn more money as a singer.

The following summer she phoned the orchestra leader at a Canadian resort hotel for a job as a violinist. He turned out to be that same Navy lieutenant, who had just been discharged from service. He gave her a job, but as a singer. The Navy officer turned orchestra leader is now Gisele's personal manager, Bob Shuttleworth.

After working that summer with Shuttleworth's band, Gisele had her own radio show on the Canadian network. It was titled "Meet Gisele," and she sang pop and folk tunes while accompanying herself at the piano. Later, she moved into guest spots with Edgar Bergen and Morton Downey and finally joined the cast of "Club 15" with Bob Crosby and the Modernaires. That show pushed her into the big-time which, on occasion, she has found confusing.

For example, there was the time she was the featured girl vocalist on a show starring Mario Lanza. Lanza that season was having a contractual fight with M-G-M and was forced to leave the radio program. So for the last five weeks of the season, it was billed as "The Mario Lanza Show, starring Gisele MacKenzie."

Gisele had never danced professionally before joining Hit Parade. During her first day of rehearsal, Tony Charmoli, the Hit Parade choreographer, told her, "On this number, I want you to dance all around the stage." Gisele answered, "You must have been misinformed—I don't dance." "Don't worry," Tony said. "You will by Saturday." She did.




