
Your Program For The Oscar Awards



as we see it

Reviewing a television play for a newspaper is a difficult and thankless task. Many of us on the staff of TV GUIDE used to be newspaper critics ourselves, so we know the strain of meeting daily deadlines, of trying to set down an intelligent, fair opinion and then seeing the mail from readers who disagree vehemently, violently and often venomously with what's been said in print.

So we respect and admire the men who write about television for the newspapers. This respect, however, is somewhat lessened for a few critics who have suddenly found it chic to review TV plays that have appeared on Broadway, by comparing the Broadway and television performances.

Is it fair to say "The Guardsman" on television with Claudette Colbert and Franchot Tone wasn't as good as "The Guardsman" on Broadway with Lynn Fontanne and Alfred Lunt? Or that the television performance of "The Philadelphia Story" wasn't up to the Broadway play?

How many of your readers, gentlemen, saw the plays on Broadway? Are they really interested in a Broadway-TV comparison? Are you reviewing a television play or parading your experience, writing to amuse yourself instead of your readers?

Critics certainly have a right to find fault with the writing, the acting or even with the decision to televise the play. But we don't think it's fair to dig into the past history of an entirely different medium to find a basis for criticism.

In our opinion, television plays should be reviewed on their own merits.

NEW YORK Bob Stahl reports:

After a four-year relationship, the sponsor and the No. 1rated show in the Nation are parting company. Philip Morris, I Love Lucy's sponsor since the show's debut, will no longer do the honors. General Foods will take over the cigaret company's alternate-week sponsorship . . . Incidentally, while Nielsen ratings continue <u>Lucy</u> in first place, the new American Research Bureau lineup has GROUCHO MARX first, JACKIE GLEASON second, Toast of the Town third, Lucy all the way down in fourth.

Marking another "first," a TV play has been optioned by Broadway prior to the TV production. HUME CRONYN has paid \$1000 for Broadway rights to "Dominique," an original comedy by ERNEST KINOY scheduled for Studio One . . . GORDON MacRAE stars in "The Desert Song" Saturday, Apr. 9, for a MAX LIEBMAN color "spectacular."

NBC, pleased that MARY MARTIN's "Peter Pan" drew a bigger audience than either Talent Scouts or I Love Lucy, plans to make the show a yearly holiday treat at Christmas time . . . BETTY FURNESS steps out of her pitchwoman's role for Studio One on Apr. 18, to star in the show's presentation of "Affairs of State."

LOUIS JOURDAN the hottest prospect to be permanent host for Devil's Theater, upcoming late-night show on ABC. He'd be cast as the devil . . . Change-about: the Library of Congress, to which producers often turn in doing their research, has requested a copy of DAVY CROCKETT's address to Congress from a Disneyland show.

Omnibus talking over plans to do a full-scale version of "The Iliad," based on the original Homeric epic . . . Omnibus is the first regular show to vacation, taking off after the Sunday, Apr. 10 telecast . . . Ethel and Albert may return as summer replacement for December Bride. PEG LYNCH and ALAN BUNCE would co-star.

TED MACK, long absent from TV, will be a busy man again soon. A new daytime variety show, Ted Mack's Matinee, starts Monday, Apr. 4 on NBC. TED is also planning Mack's International Show, in which he will spotlight foreign talent. And he still hopes to revive Original Amateur Hour for NBC on Sunday afternoons.

PAUL GREGORY, legitimate stage producer, planning a TV dramatic series to be titled <u>Paul Gregory Theater</u>... JUNE TAYLOR dancers from <u>The Jackie Gleason Show</u> slated for a nationwide tour in the fall. They'll return to New York each Saturday night for their TV stint. . . Appointment with Adventure is the new title of the show that replaces Father Knows Best Sunday, Apr. 3 . . . But Screen Gems, Father's producer, reports the show may be back on the air soon--under a new sponsor.

It is a matter of both fact and sentiment that Gloria Gordon, who for so long played Mrs. O'Reilly on radio's "My Friend Irma," is the mother of Gale Gordon, who still plays Osgood Conklin on both the radio and TV versions of *Our Miss Brooks*. The broadcasting industry can be very clubby.

The point, however, is not so much the clubbiness of broadcasting as the family tree of Gale Gordon. His mother is an actress. His father was a vaudeville performer. His wife

is an actress. The actors in the family stop here, however—only because Gale has no children.

Gordon himself, in addition to being an actor, is a pipe-smoker. He is also a plumber, a carpenter, a fruit grower, an oil painter, a playwright, a gun collector—and one of the few actors in history to appear in a radio dramatic role without saying a word. He once played the footsteps of the "Unknown Soldier."

Gordon, who has been doing the Osgood Conklin role since its radio inception back in 1948, figures it is just about a character actor's dream. "There is nothing subtle about Osgood," he says contentedly. "No nuances. Just a lot of very satisfying acid, bluster and bellowing, with an occasional weak moment of cordiality

thrown in for leavening. It is practically impossible to overplay him. Even when he's being cordial, he's like an elephant trying to waltz."

Just how well Gordon has established the Conklin character came out during a recent trip through New Jersey. At a small country store, presided over by a little old woman, he was introduced as the man who played Osgood Conklin in Our Miss Brooks. The little old woman, who had never before been so close to a celebrity, peered at him intently. "Why," she said in surprise, "he's just like a human being!"

Aside from the fact that he is quite possibly the most accomplished bellower in Hollywood, Gordon is the personification of normality, with no more than a surface continued

resemblance to Eve Arden's nemesis. An actor for 30 years, he is the most solid of solid citizens.

Gordon, whose deep, cultured tones are the envy of his profession, was at one time the highest paid radio actor in Hollywood. That was in 1933 when he was demanding—and getting—\$15 a week for playing in "English Coronets." Two years later every radio actor in town was auditioned for the lead opposite Mary Pickford

in her own show. One of the finalists, Hanley Stafford, went on to become the most hapless father in radio history, opposite (if that's the word) Baby Snooks. The other, who won the role, was Gordon. It paid him \$100 a week and made him practically royalty. Thereafter, he hit just about every big-time show on radio. He was Barbara Whiting's father on "Junior Miss," Lucille Ball's boss on "My Favorite Husband," the mayor for 12 years on "Fibber McGee and Molly" and, for seven years, Irene

Rich's leading man on "Dear John."

Gordon was born 50 years ago in New York City but spent virtually all of his first eight years in England. The following nine years he spent in New York City schools, hating every minute of it because it apparently took him that long to get over the fact that in New York one did not wear short trousers in grade school. The little New Yorkers threw stones at him when he first appeared in his correct English garb, and the impression lasted a good deal longer than the black and blue marks.

"The character of Osgood Conklin,"

he says darkly, "was not only born but pickled in vinegar during those nine years. I hated school, from the principal on down."

Not until he returned to England at 18 did Gordon begin to like school. It was there, too, that he picked up his flawless diction, which John Barrymore once said was the best of anyone on the stage, radio or screen.

Like most accomplished if unsung radio actors, Gordon is an expert dialectician. It may come as a shock to the younger fans of Our Miss Brooks

to learn that Mr. Conklin once played the fabulous Texas millionaire, drawl and all, on the Burns and Allen radio show, and Inspector Lestrade, complete with Cockney overtones, on "Sherlock Holmes" with Basil Rathbone. On one particularly low-budgeted "Gangbusters" episode in the old radio days, he played the weak-kneed killer, the cop who arrested him and "the siren that presaged the advent of the cop."

A man like that just has to be a success.

He's His Own Best Customer

For more than 20 years now-on radio first and then on TV-Ed Herlihy has been bending ears for a living.

As an announcer of commercialshe'd rather you called him a "salesman" -Ed quite possibly is without a peer. And if he does have a peer, the fellow must have a sensational digestive tract. For the fact is that in order to achieve and maintain a high position among-uh-"salesmen," Herlihy has had to take an awful lot of gastric punishment down through the years. At a conservative estimate, he has plugged 700 products on the air and. loval to his sponsors, he has manfully tested every one.

This means that for 20 years Ed has been stuffing himself with process cheeses, peanut butter, packaged prunes, canned soup, ripe olives, fruit salad, deviled ham, spaghetti sauce and frankfurters, washed down with a Niagara of beer, club soda, prune juice, sarsaparilla and root beer. As a result, he now weighs more than 200 pounds.

But Ed's loyalty to the products he plugs by no means stops at his stomach. The kitchen of his Long Island home is a trophy room of refrigerators, dishwashers, dryers, mixers, pop-up toasters, waffle irons, vacuum cleaners and rotisseries. He has a crate of shoe polish (reminder of a bygone sponsor) in a hall closet and an atticful of hats, suits, ties and salted walnuts-arranged on shelves

in neat and dusty tribute to the sponsors of other years.

Ed's present sponsors are Colgate (Comedy Hour); French's Mustard; (The World of Mr. Sweeney): Horn

& Hardart Automats, Hoffman Beverages and Loft Candy Shops (who back his Sunday Children's Hour.) As loyal as ever, he brushes his teeth twice a day with Colgate, applies French's Mustard liberally to everything but his breakfast food and Loft chocolates, eats regularly at the Automat and drinks ginger ale until he rumbles like Grand Coulee.

"I'm a salesman," says Ed with simple modesty, "and I always believe in the products I sell."

Herlihy has failed to sample only two of these products. "In early radio," he says, "two of my sponsors were Venida Hair-Nets and All-Granite Tombstones."

One of Herlihy's most remarkable records was established during the eight years he plugged Kraft cheese on *Kraft Theater*. In those years, he estimates, he personally put away more processed cheddar than any other three men in America.

"As a result, I developed a voice with tremendous cheese appeal," he recounts. "Why, I used to make them so hungry for cheese that they'd often get up and dash for the icebox without looking at the rest of the show."

So substantial was Herlihy's cheese appeal that Kraft recently insisted that Ed drop all his other accounts and sell cheese exclusively. But Ed refused to put all his eggs in one basket, or—should we say?—limit his diet to cheese, and bowed out.

Born in Dorchester, Mass., Herlihy went to work at Radio Station WEEI in Boston and joined NBC in New York in 1935. In radio, he bent ears with Tallullah Bankhead. Glenn Miller, Tommy Dorsey, Fred Allen, Bob Hope and Jack Benny, and plugged banks, tires, hats, bread, hot dogs, milk, coffee, gasoline, diamonds, vacuum cleaners, men's suits, grape juice, motor (and olive) oil, kitchen equipment, tombstones and hairnets. Then came TV—and Herlihy really opened up.

He most definitely does not subscribe to the currently popular theory that the old commercial announcers are on their way out of TV. Nor does he believe that movie actors and masters of ceremony will handle most of the commercials in the future, although on Max Liebman Presents Ed himself was introduced by movie-and-TV-star Lee Bowman.

"On TV," he says, "the old announcers must learn to change their techniques. You just can't make long speeches, larded with stentorious phrases, on TV. In this medium you have got to be friendly and believable. You have to be the fellow next door. You have to be a salesman.

"When I'm selling, I try to address myself to a few people. If I begin to think of the vast TV audiences, I find I'm inclined to make a speech. What I'm actually selling, I've discovered, is myself. If people like me, they're gonna be more inclined to buy the product I'm trying to put across. The way I see it, a salesman can be accepted or rejected before he ever mentions his product.

"And," says Ed, reaching for his tube of Colgate's and glancing affectionately at a large box of Loft's candy, "you can't really sell a product unless you like to use it yourself."

Who Said 'Ugly' Duckling?

Roast Long Island duckling is an appropriate dish for practically any festive occasion, and can be served tastefully as well as economically. By

following these few simple culinary instructions, anyone can transform the peren-

nial "ugly duckling" into a dish fit for a king. And with zestful flavor of tangerine added, it becomes a banquet.

Roast Long Island Duckling

Prepare two ducklings for roasting. Stuff or not, as desired. Pin neck skin back with small skewer and close vent by lacing string around smoll skewers inserted from side to side. Roast on rack in shallow pan in slow oven 325°F, until tender . . . one-and-a-half to two hours for moderately done, another hour for well done. Brush ducklings with ½ cup honey 30 minutes before removing from oven. Serve with baked tangerines and tangerine sauce. Serves eight.

Tangerine Sauce

Melt 2 T. butter in saucepan. Add 3 T.

minced onion, cook two minutes, stirring. Add 6-oz. can frozen tangerine juice, 2 c. water and 1 T. lemon juice. Bring to boil. Droin 3-oz. can sliced mushrooms, then combine broth with 3 T. cornstarch, 1. t. salt, 1 t. ginger, 1/6 t. marjoram and add to boiling juice. Bring to boil again, stirring constantly. Add drained mushrooms and remove from heat.

Baked Tangerines

Make eight vertical cuts in skin of eight tangerines, from the blossom end to about one inch from bottom; pull peel down, turn points in. Remove white membrane. Loosen sections at center and pull apart slightly; place in shallow baking dish. Fill each center with 1 T. orange marmalade and 1 t. butter. Sprinkle with 3 T. sugar. Pour 1 c. orange juice over all. Place a maraschino cherry in centers. Bake in a moderate oven, 350°F, 30 minutes, basting occasionally.

Ex-Chicago crooner Johnny Desmond, the latest singer to use a TV tie-in with a new record, hit the jackpot. Sales of his disc, "Play Me Hearts and Flowers," soared past the 100,000 mark just days after Johnny introduced it on TV Playhouse.



Rin Tin Tin

PROGRAM OF THE WEEK

The Rin Tin Tin telefilm series is crammed with the action, gun-play and chase scenes of pre-musical-cowpoke Westerns. It makes fine viewing for kids and nostalgic viewing for grown-ups.

Rinty, portrayed by several handsome German shepherds, is cast as the pet of Lee Aaker. An appealing youngster, Lee plays an orphan adopted by an Army cavalry unit in Indian-fighting days. Rinty and Lee tangle with Indians, rustlers, dastardly miners and other varieties of villain.

James Brown is fine as Lee's guardian, and Joe Sawyer adds humor as a sergeant.

The Millionaire

A so-called dramatic series describing how the outright gift of \$1,000,000 affects the lives of its recipients, *The Millionaire* might generate a lot of pleasant daydreams. Otherwise, the show is little better than an unimaginative nighttime soap opera.

Aside from a phony basic premise—a rich old recluse doles out a million bucks each week to someone he has never met—the writers fabricate completely unconvincing story lines. One impoverished widow, for example, returns the money intact, fearing her fiance's reaction to her wealth. Another, widow of a famous actor, uses her cash to star her movie ac-

tress daughter—old family tradition, y'know.

The show's fictional benefactor is one John Beresford Tipton. All the audience ever sees of him is the back of his head or his hands manipulating a set of chessmen. (Get the symbol? His money gives him the power to play with lives.)

Marvin Miller, as Tipton's secretary who contacts each lucky recipient, is the only actor seen regularly. He handles his role well, as do most of the others. But ...!—R.S.

Critics liked the libretto and said the opera had a fine score. The score was 4 to 2, to be exact.



TV, Bess was proficient as a classical flutist and high-brow pianist, and there's not much a girl can do with either of these skills.

Her career began as a whim. An eager photographer entered the Bronx-born beauty in the "Miss America" contest. Bess found she had a lot of explaining to do to friends who didn't view such activity as par for college seniors.

On winning the title of "Miss New York City," she was introduced to the late Mayor La Guardia, who sent all reporters out of the room, demanded to know, "What is a girl like you doing in a thing like this?" continued

She's Still A Girl With Acting In Mind

In those days the Atlantic City pageant was not noted primarily as a hotbed of talent. Bess' year (1945) was the first in which the ability to perform was important and the cheesecake aspects of the competition were de-emphasized. At stake was a \$5,000 scholarship.

No virtuoso at the keyboard, the young Myerson, in addition to four years as flutist in her college orchestra, had supported herself at Hunter by teaching piano. While most contestants were prepared to deliver such epics as "The Charge of the Light Brigade," Bess stunned everyone with excerpts from the Grieg Piano Concerto; and with her classical dimensions of 36-26-36. (Still the same.)

While Bess has fondest memories of her reign as queen of all womankind (well, American, anyway), she was half-relieved, half-crestfallen when "the whole exhausting, ego-inflating merry-go-round stopped. One year and then—whamo!"

Back in The Bronx, she began asking herself, "What can happen after this?" Among the better things that did happen were marriage to Allan Wayne; a daughter, Barbara (now 7½); a job on a local television station for \$25 a week doing what she calls, "a cut-rate Breakfast Club," and, finally, big-time TV.

She did study music for a time at Columbia University, using part of her "Miss America" scholarship money. But marriage, TV and education didn't mix. Then she and Lenore Miller, a college friend, put together a chitchat show. The outcome was an introduction to Walt Framer, who, as

usual, had a giveaway in mind, The Big Payoff.

Though Bess has reservations about giveaways, she likes this one because "It's a happy time. People out for mink coats and trips to Europe aren't ever desperate. Maybe a little greedy, but no one needs the prizes."

Since becoming "femcee" (a word manager Martin Goodman first coined for another charm-girl, Arlene Francis), Bess has gone on to even better things than mink coats. She's become a panelist—itinerant and permanent—on almost as many shows as the record-holding Meadows sisters, and a pitch girl on three major networks. Her earnings have increased considerably: last year, \$125,000.

Last summer, nine years after she had won her title, Bess covered the "Miss America" pageant on TV. She won a number of fans, as well as a sponsor, when she counseled the new winner to "Go ahead and cry. After what you've been through, it's the best thing for you."


At the urging of her manager, Bess has gone back to serious study of the piano. She hadn't done much with it since she played in Carnegie Hall, an event goodnaturedly panned by the critics. "They warned me they would pan me," Bess recalled. "They felt that looking good in a bathing suit was no reason for me to suppose I could team up with the New York Philharmonic."

Her manager views her musical ability as an entrance to nighttime TV—not as pitch girl, but as performer. Bess is also studying dramatics, but still hasn't solved the problem of whom she's going to act with. Manager Goodman is out scouting handsome leading men—over six feet tall.

How To Sell A TV Program

RULE NO. 1: DON'T GET DISCOURAGED!

Ever have a brand new idea for a TV show that you're certain is better than most shows now on the air? And have you ever wondered how you could sell such a program to an interested sponsor or network?


The answer is all too simple. It's hard to get anyone in television even to *listen* to you. And selling? Well, you do have more of a chance than you would of becoming President.

It's been done, of course. John Rust, former executive of U.S. Steel, created the Justice show and succeeded in getting it on the air. But such instances are few. To learn just what an outsider must do to sell a program idea, TV GUIDE button-holed the top programming executive of a major network and representatives of two successful independent producing firms. All of them agreed: it's

not impossible, but it sure is tough.

Best bet is to get your program idea produced first on a local station. As a spokesman for one of the top independent package firms says: "A guy living in New Orleans has a far better chance of getting his show on a New Orleans station than he has of selling it to CBS in New York." Once produced, the show is one step closer to a national network or sponsor.

If you'd still like to try selling your idea directly to a network or national sponsor, you must first request a release form to sign and mail in with your idea. The release is a standard document that absolves the producer of all claims of plagiarism or theft in the event a program similar to yours is telecast in the future. Even though it is impossible under the law to copyright an idea that exists only on



paper, networks and producers are constantly irritated by viewers who complain some show was *their* idea.

Or, if you are the sort that doesn't get discouraged easily, and have \$15,-000 or \$20,000 lying around loose, you could hire some actors, get some sets, rent a studio and whip up a pilot film or audition kinescope. It's often easier to sell an idea if you have some film to show. If it doesn't sell—well, you can always run it off on your home movie projector for your friends.

Why is it so difficult for an outsider to break into TV? Chiefly because the medium has become so competitive, and program costs have zoomed so high, that program executives cannot afford to gamble on ideas created by people with no previous experience.

Moreover, production firms have their own ideas to sell. Since the networks earn their profits not only by selling program time to sponsors but also by creating and producing shows for the sponsors, they naturally will pitch their own programs rather than those created by outsiders. And the same holds true for such independent production firms as Goodson-Todman and Talent Associates.

But every once in a while a newcomer does score. Let's go back and see how Rust succeeded with the Justice show.

When he first thought of a show based on the files of the National Legal Aid Society, he obtained the necessary rights from Legal Aid. He then arranged with ABC to co-produce the show as part of the ABC Album series two summers ago. As the show was telecast, ABC kinescoped it. But even armed with the show on film, Rust could not sell it.

Rust eventually got together with Al Levy, head of Talent Associates. Levy thought the idea was great and set out to sell it as a series. He failed. Finally he learned that Borden's was planning to cancel *T-Men in Action* on NBC. He submitted the *Justice* film as a possible replacement. The show was finally accepted. Now Talent Associates is co-producer of the program with Rust, who receives a royalty each week, plus a certain percentage of the profits.

Levy pointed out that Rust was far from an outsider; in his work with U.S. Steel he had met a number of top network executives. This helped him get the show produced originally on *ABC Album*. Moreover, *Album* itself was a TV rarity. There has been no subsequent anthology program that enables an outsider to obtain a kinescope of his idea.

Levy added that if Talent Associates liked a submitted idea, a writer might be assigned to develop it. Then, if the script looked good, his firm would have the show kinescoped.

And, Levy summarized, despite the difficulties involved in selling a program idea, it's all well worth the effort. "If you succeed in getting your show on the air and it becomes a big hit, the rewards are tremendous."

The Greatest Show on Earth will be presented on the world's biggest stage—coast-to-coast TV—Tuesday night, when NBC televises the Ringling Brothers, Barnum & Bailey Circus in an hour-long program from Madison Square Garden, New York.

If elaborate plans prove workable, the TV cameras will transport home audiences inside a wild-animal cage and up among the trapeze artists.

Only about 30 minutes will be devoted to acts performed under the

Garden's simulated Big Top. For the rest, you'll be taken backstage to see how a circus is put together and to learn what to watch for when you attend in person.

Twelve live TV cameras are to be stationed at various vantage points in the Garden. Several will go into "Clown Alley" to demonstrate how the clowns live, how they apply their elaborate make-up and how they prepare for their routines in the ring.

One camera will be continued

hoisted to the top of the Garden for that trapeze-artist's view. The producers aren't foolhardy enough, of course, to station a cameraman inside the wild-animal cage, but the cameras will be right outside the cage, their lenses poking through the bars.

Ringling Brothers president John Ringling North will serve as co-emcee, sharing honors with John Daly. (The show will *not* be titled, *What's*

My Lion.)

In addition to the live portions of the show, there will be a number of film sequences especially prepared for the telecast at the circus' winter headquarters in Sarasota, Florida.

The program will mark the first circus telecast since the late 1940's. In those pioneer TV days, the circus management permitted New York stations to televise the entire performance. Subsequently, however, North banned all telecasts, because TV pickups of fights and other sports events from the Garden seemed to be cutting into gate receipts, and because the 10- and 12-inch screens then in general use failed to do justice to the circus' elaborate costumes and acts.

Later still, when Hollywood's Cecil B. DeMille produced his feature film, "The Greatest Show on Earth," his contract with Ringling Brothers specifically prohibited competitive live

circus telecasts.

DeMille has okayed this week's one-shot performance, and North, too, has given it his full blessing. For one thing, most of today's TV sets have larger screens. And North now feels that TV helps, rather than hurts at the box office.

This week's Garden telecast is an experiment. If it boosts the circus' gate receipts, the Greatest Show on Earth will do an encore on the world's greatest stage next year.

MACDONALD CAREY will star in a Mr. and Mrs. Blandings TV film series on a major network starting in the fall . . . Network lawyers are cracking down: no more TV satires on movies. Too many lawsuits . . Pilot of the new Buckley series, starring REGINALD GARDINER, features DOROTHY LAMOUR in her TV film debut.

JACK CARSON has been getting orchids for his two excellent U.S. Steel Hour dramatic roles, ragweed for his own comedy show.

. . FRED CLARK may get the father role in CBS' Henry Aldrich film series . . . Agent's idea for a new show: a situation tragedy for JUDITH ANDERSON. High class soap opera.
