

NEW YORK Bob Stahl reports:



As an example of the type of "spectacular" NBC plans for the summer, "One Touch of Venus" will be telecast directly from the Dallas State Fair, Saturday, Aug. 27. EDDIE ALBERT and VIVIAN BLAINE will co-star.

CBS has set three of the five shows moving into the DOUGLAS EDWARDS news time next season. Cochise will take over the Wednesday night period, Sergeant Preston of the Mounties goes in on Thursdays and My Friend Flicka on Fridays. A new ED WYNN program, featuring the comedian's Rube Goldberg-type inventions, will probably go either Mondays or Tuesdays.

CLIFF NORTON now set to play the bus driver in SID CAESAR's summer replacement show, One-Nighter. PHIL FOSTER will play the manager of the touring orchestra. BARBARA NICHOLS also joining the cast . . . Person to Person producers JOHN AARON and JESSE ZOUSMER planning a once-a-month "spectacular" for kid viewers next fall.

With the movie studios moving into the hour-long drama field next fall, TV's playwrights feel their top fees may hike from the present \$2000 - \$3000 up to \$7000. That's one reason why GORE VIDAL is reluctant to sign an exclusive deal with CBS now at present rates . . Author MERLE MILLER expected to be the next big-name writer to move into television.

ABC planning a country-music amateur hour for Tuesday nights this summer, produced live from Springfield, Mo., by the people who do ABC's successful Ozark Jubilee . . . And Jubilee expands to 90 minutes for the summer, starting Saturday night, July 2.

JACK (Morning Show) PAAR may take on a once-weekly musical variety show for CBS this summer . . . It looks now as though Elgin Hour will vacate this summer, after June 14. . . CYRIL RITCHARD tentatively set as host for ABC's upcoming Devil's Theater, a role originally announced for LOUIS JOURDAN.

Sponsor of the canceled Mr. Peepers show may replace it with the new Mr. Tutt telefilm series, based on the famous magazine stories and starring WALTER BRENNAN. .

Another medical show, For Doctors Only, is scheduled for the fall. This one reportedly will let viewers see actual surgical operations.



'This Is Your Life'-And Then?

RALPH EDWARDS' GUESTS FIND EVERYTHING CHANGED

When not swabbing away at their tears, the millions who regularly watch Ralph Edwards' This Is Your Life on NBC readily perceive that many exciting things are happening to the show's somewhat bewildered "guest stars."

But what happens to a man—or woman—during one of the half-hour Wednesday night biographies is nothing compared to what happens to him after the show is over.

The night Dr. Laurence C. Jones appeared on the program, he was a

dedicated but impecunious professor, who for 50 long years had been struggling to establish the Piney Woods College in Mississippi. Today he is the stunned custodian of a \$700,000 endowment fund, simply because Ralph Edwards suggested it might be nice if 1,000,000 viewers were to send in a dollar apiece.

"It was the week before Christmas," Edwards says, "and we really didn't expect much of a response."

Dr. Jones himself is hard to get to these days because he has been liter◆ Joan Caulfield, Ralph Edwards: she owes TV stardom to This Is Your Life.

ally swamped with invitations to speak at breakfasts, luncheons, teas, dinners and lecture halls. An associate says flatly that Edwards has made Dr. Jones "the happiest man in the world" and that the show itself "has become almost a religion with us."

Dr. Jones recently forwarded to Edwards a letter recounting the experience of a Detroit man whose wife, suffering from a "mental relapse," had not spoken a word in six years. On the night of Dr. Jones' appearance, she suddenly said, "I want to send a dollar to that man."

This Is Your Life's most celebrated alumna is probably singer Lillian Roth, the former alcoholic whose biography has been aired on the show three times. Her appearance with Edwards in January, 1953—her first public appearance in 14 years—was chiefly responsible for putting her book, "I'll Cry Tomorrow," on the best-seller list, where it has remained now for almost a year. The book, in turn, has been directly responsible for sending several well-known movie stars to Alcoholics Anonymous.

Understandably, Miss Roth (the first principal subject Edwards ever told in advance that she was to be featured) was reluctant to appear on the show. Edwards convinced her, however, that the story of her life would be an inspiration to others. For herself, it has meant a best-selling book and a long string of lucrative night-club engagements. Moreover, the book has been bought by M-G-M and is scheduled to go into produc-

tion soon, starring Susan Hayward.

Mae Williams, the hard-luck singer who contracted polio and then broke her back, all within four years, is still flabbergasted over the results of her appearance on the show several months ago.

"A day doesn't go by," she says, "without two or three people stopping me on the street to talk about it. I still get goosebumps all over just thinking about it." She was immediately booked into several "prestige" night spots and is now filming her own half-hour musical TV series.

"Ralph Edwards didn't say a single word about money on that show," she reports, "yet I've received \$486 so far from people wanting me to forward it to the Sister Kenny (polio) Foundation."

In Chicago, cab driver Eddie Hamilton, the subject of Edwards' first

"remote" for the show, has received 4000 letters from people all over the country. "My life is completely changed," he marvels. "I can't go anywhere without being recognized. I get all kinds of invitations. But really, I'm making less money than I used to. People stop me just to visit—and after all, it's because of them that I received this honor. And the honor means more to me than all the gifts."

Even the career of former Congressman Douglas Stringfellow, the "war hero" who was exposed as a fraud after his appearance on the show, has taken a turn for the better. He's cleaning up on a lecture tour. His subject: "Be Sure Your Sins Will Find You Out."

Established stars who have appeared on *This Is Your Life* have been affected by it, too. An associate of Roy Rogers says the show did more to reveal the real Roy Rogers than a dozen magazine articles could ever have done. "It convinced people," he says, "that the deeply religious side of Roy and Dale is not just a publicity stunt."

Joan Caulfield says flatly that This Is Your Life is the reason she landed the co-starring role with Barry Nelson in My Favorite Husband, now nearing the end of its second year on CBS. And there was a tremendous demand from TV stations for the old Laurel & Hardy films after the comics appeared—a demand which has since led Hal Roach, Jr., to map out a new hour-long series for them.

Indirect benefits have accrued to the show itself. As the result of the appearance of Kenneth Porter, the 36year-old ex-GI whose fused spine will force him to remain in a standing position for the rest of his life, Edwards found himself on the receiving end of two awards-the Freedom Foundation's George Washington medal for contributing to the American way of life, and the President's Committee citation for promoting nationwide interest in the hiring of handicapped persons. Edwards likes to feel that this particular episode helped a good many others.

Edwards himself, quite possibly the most self-deprecating man in Hollywood, gets almost tongue-tied when asked to comment on these events.

"If we can do a little good along the way," he finally gets out, "that pleases us very much. I think a lot of the people we've had on the show haven't realized what really good people they are. The show, I think, serves to give them a sort of resurgence of spiritual belief in themselves."



Mr. and Mrs. Humphrey Bogart, known to their friends as "Bogey" and "Baby," are scheduled to do their first co-starring live TV stint this Monday, May 30. They've been cast as the bad man and the good girl in the *Producers' Showcase* version of "The Petrified Forest," NBC's first dramatic show from its new Burbank, Cal., color studio.

This "first" may well be a "last." Mr. and Mrs. Bogart are—and intend to remain—strictly motion picture

people.

However, Bogart, a rather small man with deceptively husky shoulders and an interestingly-lined face, denies, more or less patiently, that he has ever made any really nasty remarks about television. Variety, a show business publication, quoted him a year ago as having said, in effect, that only movie has-beens find it necessary to get into television.

Queried by TV GUIDE shortly afterward, he hedged a bit: "No form of dramatic art is a haven just for has-beens, and television—these days, anyway—very definitely shows signs of being a dramatic art. My own personal feeling, however, is that I won't go into TV until I feel myself slipping."

Today Bogart suggests, with a tight smile somewhat reminiscent of a male Mona Lisa, that his opinions on the subject have been misinterpreted. "What I said," he insists, "and what I still say, is that a man can't work in both mediums at the same time, and I am a motion picture man.

"Reporters always get things twisted.

I once said 90 percent continued


of movie actresses are dumb dames. I figured every one of 'em would automatically include herself in the 10 percent escape clause I'd left 'em, but they jumped all over me. So I have since amended the statement. Ninety-five percent of all movie actresses are dumb dames."

That's what the man says. But he smiles, almost warmly, when he says it. Presumably, the woods are full of five percenters.

In a more serious vein, which Bogart can turn on like a spigot and which is his warmest and most likeable side, Hollywood's well-publicized tough guy gets almost soft-headed on the subject of "The Petrified Forest."

"Pure nostalgia," he admits. "That's the only reason I'm doing this show. And I doubt very, very much that I'll do any more television after this.

"But 'Petrified Forest' is the show that made me. It also made me a lot of money. I did it first with Leslie Howard on Broadway back around 1935. I forget just when. We made the

picture at Warners a year later—Leslie and myself and Bette Davis. It's a real easy role. I just sit there all by myself in the corner and look tough. And it's a great role for Betty." ("Betty" is what Mrs. Bogart is called when she isn't being called "Lauren" or "Baby.")

Henry Fonda, it should be added, will do the Howard role.

Bogart's first TV appearance was with Jack Benny two years ago; his second, with Ed Murrow on Person to Person; his third and fourth, as a host-presenter on the Academy Award telecasts in which the nom-

inations were made and the Oscars awarded.

"I might do another show with Benny," he admits, "but that's all. I'm too old to be stage-struck any more. Whatever 'ham' is left in me is pretty well salted down at this point. Besides, as I keep saying, I'm a motion picture man. It's been my living and a pretty good one. I still say you can't do both.

"Look what's happened to Donald O'Connor—just plain beat physically. Maybe a movie guy can do an occasional TV shot, just as Lucille Ball and Desi Arnaz do an occasional movie, but you can't work both sides of the street at once. All you get out of it is ulcers."

Bogart is critical of the over-all TV picture, complaining of the "long, dull hours" of old movies and routine crime shows, but he nevertheless spends a good deal of time in front of his set. He admires the hour-long New York live dramatic shows, particularly Studio One and Kraft Theater, and considers Sid Caesar one of the great comic talents.

With two children in the house (Stephen, 6, and Leslie, 3), the case-hardened Bogart is even more case-hardened on the subject of children's shows. "I'm an expert," he says wryly, "on Captain Video, Captain Jet, Ramar of the Jungle and that guy who is so good at getting the kids to drink milk." He is also an expert on, and avid fan of, Time for Beany.

Bogart dismisses, with the air of a Willie Mays facing a mediocre pitcher, any fears that he might freeze up when faced with a live TV camera for 90 on-stage minutes after all his years in the comfortable "Let's shoot it again" movie business.

"Naw," he shrugs. "Nothin' to it."



Our Guest Tonight . . . The President

If there's anyone who urgently requires more hours in the day and more days in the week, it's the President of the United States. Yet Presidents have been compelled to travel many miles, absenting themselves from Washington for days at a stretch, to deliver a 30- or 40-minute speech.

Closed-circuit television, whereby picture and sound are sent by cable to specified points for selected audiences, may change all that.

Dwight Eisenhower is the first to use what is shaping into a valuable aid for busy Presidents. He has made three closed-circuit appearances so far, and odds are there will be more.

The idea apparently originated with the Ford Motor Co. in 1953, when it invited Mr. Eisenhower to address a banquet for several thousands of its employes in Detroit. The closed-circuit aspect was novel and challenging; moreover, both business and labor were involved in the function. The White House accepted.

The President broadcast from the tiny television studio in the White House; in the Detroit banquet hall, his image appeared on a huge, theater-size screen.

Early this year, to help raise funds for the anti-Communist Radio Free Europe, the President simultaneously addressed meetings of the American Heritage Foundation in 35 cities. Potential large contributors, gathered in groups of 40 to 50 in TV studios and meeting rooms, saw and heard the



Closed~Circuit TV Allows Mr. Eisenhower To Visit -Without Leaving Home

President on regular TV receivers. On Feb. 9, he was viewed on large screens by 23,000 physicians who were meeting in 32 cities under the auspices of the American Medical Association. His remarks opened a closed-circuit conference in which top medical experts discussed various heart ailments.

Mr. Eisenhower was slated for another closed-circuit talk in February, to open the Inter-American Investment Conference in New Orleans, but decided finally to film the speech, instead.

Although the White House isn't saying if or when another invitation will be accepted, it seems certain there will be other such appearances.

Closed-circuit talks are far from inexpensive, but the bill is picked up by the sponsoring organization or a group interested in getting the program telecast.

The circuit for the Radio Free Europe discussion, for instance, cost \$36,000. In each of the 35 cities, a local committee paid part of the bill.

The 90-minute heart clinic cost approximately \$100,000, including use of the large screens. In this case, a pharmaceutical firm paid the tab.

As in the President's regular network telecasts to the Nation, TV producer Robert Montgomery acts as technical adviser on the closed-circuit appearances.

The White House is scrutinizing closed-circuit invitations closely. James Hagerty, the President's press secretary, explains the Administration's policy as follows: when the President goes before TV cameras, generally it should be for the benefit of all who wish to see him, not for specific groups. The President must feel that any departure from policy is a matter of extremely great importance.

Will the use of closed circuits by the President move beyond public service into the realm of politics? Hagerty says the answer, up to now, is no. There are no plans, he says, to employ the medium in the 1956 Presidential campaign.

Practical party politicians, however, are way ahead of him. They see no reason why the President should not use closed-circuit video to address rallies and dinners of party workers and contributors around the Nation. And network executives are convinced that this is an inevitable development.

A live, large-screen telecast by the President, they point out, has much stronger impact than a film run off in a meeting room.—Florence Lowe.

G. E. Theater

PROGRAM OF THE WEEK

The fact that it has persuaded a number of Hollywood's top names to try TV drama is only one of General Electric Theater's claims to attention. It is one of television's better half-hour series, sometimes live, sometimes on film, often commendably imaginative and not at all afraid to indulge in off-beat casting.

It was a fine idea, for example, to star Jack Benny as a mild-mannered clerk involved in a bank robbery, and to have Henry Fonda play the circus' sad-faced Emmett Kelly in "The Clown." Even when stars are cast in familiar roles (Myrna Loy as a glamorous lecturer; James Stewart as a laconic cowboy) the scripts usually compensate for the type-casting.

The show's stories deal with everything from romance to crime to mild digs at the movies, as when Ronald Reagan played a producer of "B" pictures who decided to adapt "War and Peace" to star a wonder horse.

Not every program is a winner, of course, but the show's over-all quality is excellent. Much of the credit probably belongs to host Reagan, who also has a hand in selecting the plays and players.

Rushed in to replace Honestly, Celeste when the Celeste Holm show floundered early in the season, Stage 7 was barely rolling before a new Alfred Hitchcock series was announced as taking over its time next fall. That doesn't mean, however, that Stage 7 is a throwaway program. It's a generally good drama series.

The scripts usually concentrate on love themes, but not necessarily the boy-meets-girl type. One co-starred Ann Harding and Regis Toomey in an older-man-meets-older-woman yarn. Another, with Pat O'Brien, told of a father's love for his son. And occasionally the producers try a complete change of pace, as in a drama about



A Glimpse Of A Martin And Lewis Rehearsal

Storm warning: one Martin and Lewis rehearsal period ended a couple of weeks ago; another—for their June 5 Comedy Hour—is now under way.

There are legends about these rehearsals. They deal with demolished sets, men stripped of their shirts, women sprayed by water rifles, chairs yanked from under, forests of burning matches planted in shoe soles.

Once, it's said, Dean Martin walked away from a wrangle between Jerry Lewis and producer Ernie Glucksman, picked up a prop phone and bellowed, "Hello, somebody. Do me a favor, huh? Fix it so ol' Deano and Jer' can have eight days in this week. We ain't never gonna get this show on the air by Sunday!"

Once Martin arrived an hour and a quarter late, while Lewis was auditioning for skits. Lewis put down his script and applauded. "Here comes that famous actor," he announced. "Have you seen his latest record?"

Martin, looking sleepy and cross, slumped into a chair. "Ah, shut up," he said, "I hate television. I hate tele-

vision," he repeated, glaring at Dick Weinberg, the director.

"Well, don't look at me," Weinberg

said. "I didn't invent it."

Glucksman took a sip of coffee from a paper cup. "The rehearsal is now official," he said.

Jerry constantly expresses his affection for his partner by tapping cigaret ashes into Martin's hair, then smiling in cross-eyed innocence.

Except for rehearsing his songs, when he comes to life with a snap, Martin is relaxed to the point of indifference—kidding the chorus girls, swapping jokes with engineers, phoning his tailor or simply napping.

Lewis buzzes around like a souped-up bee, working out camera angles, orchestra introductions, sight gags, dance routines and script problems. He passes with dizzying rapidity from one personality to another. One moment he is the typical Jerry Lewis, a simple goof Martin is leading around by the jaw; the next moment he thinks of a funnier way of being led around by the jaw, and the roles are reversed.

Deadly serious, keenly analytical, Lewis becomes the final authority on what's funny. "That's no good," he says. "We'll do it like this." Martin listens patiently and obediently.

Shortly before show time one Sunday afternoon Glucksman coached the 80 actors, dancers and technicians on their cues. Then Lewis took over, leaving no doubt in anyone's mind that every detail of the program, from the opening fanfare to a minor bit in a sketch, was of great importance.

He spoke calmly, methodically and cheerfully, dropping in gags to relieve the last-minute tension.

"I guess that's about all," he concluded, looking around, "except for Dean. Oh, well, don't worry about Dean. There's only one thing I want him to do for this show. I just want him to change his entire personality."
