A fascinating idea has been offered by Television Digest, which is a TV trade news service. The publication suggests that since the television industry wants to stimulate set sales, it should take a few tips from the auto industry's way of encouraging business.

Besides selecting dealers carefully and allowing more liberal trade-in allowances on old sets, Television Digest urges the television industry to emulate the auto industry's practice of adding something new to each year's model.

Actually, we have had many important changes in sets since the first one went on sale. Manufacturers have modified their cabinets, increased picture tube size and placed sets on swivel stands and on wheels. They've moved tuning dials from place to place and developed semi-portable sets. And, of course, there have been remote control units, tuning gimmicks and even, lately, clock timers.

We can think of several more accessories that would add to television enjoyment. For example, we'd like to see a volume control that would automatically—without our having to touch a knob—tune those loud commercials down to normal level. The engineers at the stations are supposed to do that, but they don't. So an accessory that would do the job would be worth buying.

Push-button tuning would be a nice thing to have, too. It has been tried, but rather early in the game—before most of us became bored with counting the clicks in moving from Channel 2 up to Channel 9.

There are lots of other accessories possible, including, perhaps, a governor that would automatically turn the picture off at the kids' bedtime.

Toast of the Town, incidentally, passes into limbo as a title this month. Show henceforth will be The Ed Sullivan Show . . . DICK SHAWN already signed for eight guest shots at \$12,500 each. Under SULLIVAN's new guest policy, SHAWN can't do any other TV work.

Universal doing a movie of "The Clown," with HENRY FONDA slated to repeat the role he created last season on G.E. Theater . . . And Theater Guild, which produced "Seventh Veil" for U.S. Steel Hour, hopes to present it on Broadway, again with DIANA LYNN.

MAX LIEBMAN lined up "The Great Waltz," starring PATRICE MUNSEL, as his second "spectacular," Saturday, Nov. 5. He's signed ANNE JEFFREYS and ROBERT STERLING to star in "Dearest Enemy" later . . . Others on the LIEBMAN roster are ALFRED DRAKE, who will do two shows; GALE SHERWOOD, two; TYRONE POWER, at least one.

The term "situation comedy" has fallen into such disrepute even the networks now shun it. They're calling 'em "comedy dramas." At least, that's what CBS terms JANIS PAIGE's new show, It's Always Jan.

Ex-Notre Dame coach FRANK LEAHY comes out of retirement Sept. 29 to headline a new syndicated telefilm program, Football Forecast. He'll predict winners of each Saturday's top games and explain football intricacies.

HOLLYWOOD Dan Jenkins reports:

BING CROSBY will do MAXWELL ANDERSON'S "High Tor" as a Ford Star Jubilee for November. It will be a musical version, in color . . . JUDY GARLAND refused to take a 15-cent bet that she'll do a second TV show before the season is over . . . <u>Disneyland</u> starts its new batch of films Wednesday, Sept. 14, with an hour-long version of "Dumbo."

Lee Ann Meriwether Ends Reign As 'Miss America' With TV Starring Role

Not too long ago, a bathing beauty was 36-22-36, and nothing else mattered. Nowadays, though, Miss America's mind often has to be superior, too. The present beauty queen—nearing the end of her reign—reads John Millington Synge and thinks a girl's best friend is her Master's degree.

Last December, Lee Ann Meriwether proved herself not only intelligent but also a gifted actress when she appeared in TV Playhouse's "Run, Girl, Run." Even the trade-paper critics, some of whom had awaited her TV acting debut like headhunters contemplating a victim, were charmed.

This Sunday, Sept. 4, six days before she crowns her successor, Lee will grace another TV Playhouse drama — "The Miss America Story." Despite the play's title and its star, it is neither documentary nor biographical. In fact, to keep it safely "make-believe," author Roger Hirson refused to meet Lee until his script was completed.

So, although the drama will recite the experiences of a beauty-contest winner, they won't be Lee's.

Not that she hasn't had a host of dramatic experiences during her year as Miss America. With Mary Korey, her Pageant Committee-appointed companion, she has flown 125,000 miles and visited 31 states, Canada, Peru, Chile and Brazil. Lee has met mayors, governors, movie stars, the Shah of Iran and Vice President Nixon.

She now has acquired a \$5000 cotton wardrobe made by "name" designers, a mink, an ermine stole and "Golly-I don't-know-how-many" wristwatches. She has a \$5000 scholarship for any school of her choice, and she's been

promised a car-a pink one, she hopes.


She has earned \$60,000 doing TV commercials for four sponsors and furnishing commentary for fashion shows. And she learned to water ski.

Lee believes many more girls would enter the Miss America competition if they knew the score. "I mean, it isn't all bathing suits, except for that one time." Even "that one time" didn't bother her. "I'm an actress, so I just made-believe I was some other girl."

She is determined to latch on to a degree in drama now, while the techniques of costuming, scenery design, directing and producing are still fresh in her mind. But Dave Garroway has been dangling a Today job in front of her. "Golly!" she exclaims. "Wouldn't that be great! But golly, how would I get my Master's degree? Golly," she says breathlessly, "look at all that's happened to me!"—Kathy Pedell

Although the Russians, who in recent years have claimed they invented just about everything, say they dreamed up television, too (black and white and color), TV in the Soviet Union lags far behind the U.S. brand.

The Russians have only a small

fraction of the number of U.S. stations; operate them fewer hours weekly, and —so far—have no networks.

Programs are state-planned. There is a wide variety of subject matter, but with a single underlying theme. In contrast to our programs, which aim mainly to amuse and entertain, the Russians say theirs are designed to "satisfy cultural requirements of the Soviet people."

Thus, "Ivan Ivanovich" has been offered play-by-play resumes of international chess matches, poetry, classical music and lectures on such subjects as "Tracer Atoms in Biology."

However, audiences seem pretty much the same everywhere. Russian viewers seem to give top rating to circus and vaudeville programs, as

cover a sporting event at city's stadium.

well as those which combine music and education.

Shows are both filmed and "live," and include direct pick-ups from theaters, concert halls and stadiums.

Popular sports shows have borne titles like "On Morning Jerks," "Calisthenics Evening," "Equestrian Sports Event" and (paging Arthur Godfrey!) "Concert on the Ice."

At present, eight "television centers" are operating in the Soviet Union—in Moscow, Leningrad, Kiev, Kharkov, Riga, Omsk, Gorki and Tomsk. Others are being constructed—or planned—in Kuibyshev, Sverdlovsk, Stalino, Minsk, Baku, Tallinn, Tashkent, Vilnius and elsewhere.

A skilled mechanic must work nearly a month to earn the cost of a small

TV set, and there are just under 1,-000,000 sets in Russian homes. However, many have access to "public" sets.

Daily telecasting time is limited. On week days, the Russian stations operate only from 7 P.M. to 11 P.M.; on Saturdays, 6 P.M. to 11 P.M.; on Sundays, from 2 P.M. to 11 P.M., with a one-hour "breather."

There are no shows on Thursday evenings. Explains a recent report by the United Nations' Educational.

Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO): "It has been necessary to institute a day of rest for the benefit of the producers as well as viewers."

The Gentleman And 'The Bums'

Andre Baruch Is Right At Home Broadcasting For The Dodgers

If you own a TV set, you've heard Andre Baruch (pronounced Ahndray Baroosh) extolling cigarets on Your Hit Parade, Robert Montgomery Presents, Private Secretary and Make Room for Daddy. If you live in Brooklyn, you've also doubtless observed him in another line of work, shooting off his mouth about the Dodgers.

At first glance, Baruch appears to be a little out of place in that Ebbets Field booth. His impeccable dress, urbane manner, pear-shaped vowels and twitching mustache seem to belong elsewhere. But actually Andre is a hearty, two-fisted fellow, as much at home with the pace-setting Dodgers as he ever was in Carnegie Hall.

"I had to fight my way through a jungle of coloratura sopranos to get here," he says, "but I made it."

The battle began when Baruch (real name: Andre Bernard Jean Jacques Rousseau Octavius III Baruch de la Pardo) moved to Brooklyn from his native France at the age of 12. Somehow he wandered into Ebets Field and promptly became a Dodger fan. The rest took longer.

Baruch, now 49, is probably the only admirer of "dose Bums" to reach Ebbetts Field professionally because of an ability to tinkle the keys of a boardwalk piano. He got his pianoplaying start at Radio Station WCGU in Atlantic City; became an announcer

sometime later by standing in the wrong line before the employment office at CBS in New York. (He intended to be a studio pianist.) And he reached the zenith—that job with the Dodgers—by bumping into a friend at a Manhattan Scotch-and-water hole.

For many years Baruch had concerned himself with arts other than baseball. On radio his soothing phrases enchanted followers of "The American Album of Familiar Music," "Just Plain Bill" and other enlightening programs. On TV he has become one of that medium's best known, best-paid announcers. Yet all the time he has yearned to revive fond memories of his youth: the sound of a Dodger fan bleating piteously in the late afternoon air, the pungent smell of the Gowanus Canal in the evening, the sight of a



dead mackerel rampant on a Red Hook dock in the sunset.

So when Red Barber—beloved "Verse" of Brooklyn baseball—left his post in late 1953 to join forces with the hated New York Yankees, Andre made his move.

At Toots Shor's he cornered Vince Scully, one of Barber's former Ebbets Field associates, and arranged to plead his case before Dodgers president Walter O'Malley. A month later Baruch arrived at the Dodgers' training camp in Vero Beach, Fla., with a trunkful of clothes, a jar of mustache wax and a framed portrait of his wife, singer Bea Wain. He was greeted cordially by Scully and Connie Desmond, then the ranking Dodgers announcers, and with somewhat less warmth by the Dodgers themselves. "They looked," he says, "as if they expected me to burst into an aria."

Andre played baseball-player-type piano, instead, and in a few days was taking swings in batting practice.

"The boys gave me the business for a while," he recalls. "They threw soap balls at me, gave me a breakaway bat and soaked my cap in liniment"

On the air, Baruch found he was inclined at first to shriek like a land-lady with the rent overdue whenever anyone hit a loud foul. But he gradually developed an approach as casual as a pair of old socks.

At first some fans seemed to resent his replacing the "Verse" of Brooklyn. A few even sent him poison-pen letters. But about halfway through the season Andre discovered that gradually he was being accepted for what he wanted to be—a loyal chronicler of the exploits of Campanella and Co. Today, as he gazes down from the press coop at Ebbets Field, he realizes that, at last, he is in his element.—Frank De Blois

Young Man With A Grin

JOHNNY CARSON HOPES IT'S HERE TO STAY

With many a rataplan on the publicity drums, CBS has launched 29-year-old Johnny Carson as the first network comedian to do his show from Hollywood since an old man of 35 named George Gobel.

The inevitable comparison of Carson and Gobel doesn't seem to be bothering anybody except TV col-

umnists, who dearly love to make such comparisons.

Carson, a straightforward young man with a pleasant grin which gets a lot of mileage on and off his Thursday night show, fields the Gobel question with the ease of a shortstop throwing out a slow runner at first base. continued

"We expected to be compared to Gobel," he admits. (Carson invariably—and refreshingly—uses the editorial "we" when referring to his show, an apparently unconscious compliment to his staff.) "We're both low-pressure; we both underplay. Gobel is the hottest thing in the field right now, so naturally anyone coming along with even an approximation of his style is going to be compared to him.

"But frankly, we don't think viewers look at it that way at all. If you entertain them, they'll stay with you. If you don't, they'll tune you out. We

think it's as simple as that."

Carson is a tall, lanky lad with a boyish appearance that makes him look even younger than he is, a fact which may drive somewhat more venerable funnymen like Jack Benny to hold their heads in their hands and groan softly.

The same Mr. Benny, however, is on record as having stated publicly not once, but several times—that Johnny Carson is CBS' hottest young

comedy prospect in years.

When Red Skelton bopped his head against a non-breakaway breakaway wall during rehearsal one day last winter, Carson received a hurry call to fill the breach. "All the way into the studio," he says, "I kept trying to remember sure-fire gags. It was all so fast, I really didn't have time to get into a nervous tizzy."

It was Benny who led the raving afterward. "Great," he kept insisting, buttonholing everyone in sight, "just

great. The kid is great."

Support like this never hurts. CBS, which had been toying with Carson, suddenly got serious about finding a format for him. Egged on by Benny ("No wonder they can't sell him—he's too good, too intelligent—they're all

looking for pie throwers"), the network put him on the air June 30, complete with two sponsors, and the fate of young Mr. Carson was thenceforth squarely up to the viewers.

Aside from a natural flair for the quieter kind of comedy, Carson is both a listener and a worker. Besides shouldering the burden of being a young comedian tossed into the network whirlpool, he plays an important part in the writing and casting of the show, chores which are generally full-time jobs in themselves.

Right off, Carson and his writers decided to concoct the show strictly on a week-to-week basis. "We've got to avoid the trap of doing the same sort of sketch or routine on every show," he explains, with the business-like air of a brush salesman outlining the year's product. "We par-

odied Person to Person and What's My Line? on our first two shows, for instance, but then we skipped parodies for a while. If we'd done many more, the audience would start looking for them—and how many shows can you parody? We'll do them as the occasion demands. But not too often."

He also plans to go easy on the husband-and-wife sketches. "That's an even worse trap," he says. "You've got to do that sort of thing brilliantly at this point, to get away with it at all. We'd rather keep trying to make the show as different as possible."

Carson does plan, however, to use his wife, Jody, on the show on what might be called an irregularly regular basis; and, until he signed singer Jill Corey for an eight-week stint, she was the only girl with any reasonable expectation of sticking. Carson already had run through several singers try-

ing to find one who fitted, and even considered using a different one every week.

"Who knows?" Johnny says almost cheerfully, when queried about plans for specific dates. "We may not even be on the air by that time."

Carson was born in Corning, Iowa, moving at the age of 8 to Norfolk, Neb., where he later made himself a small reputation as a mail order-tutored magician and ventriloquist. He had a hitch in the Navy during World War II, went through the University of Nebraska on the GI Bill and got his early TV experience, beginning in 1948, on WOW-TV, Omaha.

An old family friend, CBS-TV producer Bill Brennan, talked him into coming to Hollywood. Carson moved in 1950. He and Jody, whom he met in college and married in 1949, now have three young boys—Kit, five; Ricky, three, and Cory, just pushing two.

Carson spent his first year in Hollywood as a staff announcer with the local CBS station, KNXT, meanwhile working up a format for something of his own. In the fall of 1951 he started a local show, Carson's Cellar, It lasted 26 weeks and was pronounced reasonably successful. Later, CBS gave him a crack at emceeing a summer show, Earn Your Vacation. He did all right. He also continued writing on the side, including monologs for Red Skelton-and that was one thing that didn't get knocked out of Skelton's head when he hit that breakawayproof wall.

He hollered for Carson, and Carson came running.

Which is as good a way as any for a young comedian to be pushed into his own show these days.

"I have sent Red," Carson says gratefully, "a large bottle of aspirin."

Tom D'Andrea and Hal March created The Soldiers several seasons back as an occasional act for the Comedy Hour. Apparently encouraged by an overwhelming lack of critical acclaim, they have expanded the idea into a half-hour series that NBC gambled on this summer as a Saturday night replacement.

The idea in its original shorter form was never much, and spreading it to a half hour has only compounded the felony. That NBC itself isn't too excited about *The Soldiers* is proved by the fact that the show was preempted twice this summer for one-shot programs.

D'Andrea and March play a couple of GI sad-sacks whose abysmal ignorance about all things continually gets them into scrapes with Army brass, their girl friends and practically everyone else. There's nothing wrong about basing a comedy show on the Army—witness "No Time for Sergeants." But D'Andrea and March play such stupid dolts that there's little humor left.

We might assume that both D'Andrea and March have been around long enough to steer clear of such shows. D'Andrea, a veteran TV and radio comic, played Gillis in The Life of Riley. March portrayed Marie Wilson's boy friend on My Friend Irma and Imogene Coca's boy friend last season and is currently doing a fine job as emcee of The \$64,000 Question.

Despite their track record, the boys certainly have flubbed this one.—R.S.

Windows

CBS' Windows is an excellent example of how TV can dress up an otherwise routine series of dramatic shows with a single gimmick. In this case, the gimmick lies in the title. The viewer is let in on dramatic doings via a peek through a window.

What he sees, when he gets past the window, is a somewhat better-than-average dramatic series which utilizes both stars and non-stars, depending—a radically wise idea!—on who fits which script.

The first of the series came rather a cropper, beginning with an excellent premise (all the children of a neighborhood disappear at the same time) and then slowly falling apart at the seams. A later drama, however, told an engrossing story of a girl locked in an apartment from which there was no escape, this being her estranged husband's way of driving her out of her mind. The show also has done a good job of handling a Ray Bradbury excursion into the unknown.—D.J.

Letters From Viewers Bring Back A Show

— At Expense Of Higher-Rated Program

Ratings or no ratings, it's still Mr. and Mrs. Average Viewer who dictate what they're to see on TV. And lest anyone doubt it, just look at Father Knows Best, a situation comedy show that has just returned to TV, strictly by popular demand. Costarring Robert Young and Jane Wyatt, Father won fame as one of TV's few situation comedies that don't cast Pop as a dim-wit.

In the case of Father, the much overworked phrase, "brought back by popular request," is not meaningless. When the show, telecast Sunday nights on CBS last winter, was canceled by its sponsor, thousands of irate viewers bombarded the network and TV columnists with complaints. Result: Father last week became a regular Wednesday night series on NBC.

Ironically, Father takes over the NBC time period occupied by My Little Margie, which also was brought back—honestly—by popular demand. Margie started originally as a summer replacement but proved so popular with viewers that NBC sold it to a sponsor for the regular season. (Reruns of Margie will now be syndicated to local stations.)

It's ironic, too, that Father never

achieved as high a rating as the show it replaces. The average rating for Father during its original 26-week run on CBS was 20.5. Margie's average rating during its last 39-week season on NBC was 27.3.

In dropping a popular program in favor of one with a lower rating, sponsor reportedly had in mind the many viewer requests for *Father*. He knew that *Father*, a show with an all-family audience appeal, was telecast too late to get many children viewers. With its new, earlier spot, *Father* this year may outdraw *Margie*.

The sponsor was influenced by viewers who said they liked the show because it represents American family life as it really is and not as some TV scriptwriter thinks it is—or should be.

A New Jersey housewife wrote: "How we have enjoyed Father Knows Best! We have always regretted that our daughters, 11 and 13, had to miss it because of its time. Is there anything we can do about keeping it on?"

Declared a Chicago patrolman: "In over two decades as a police officer I have been fighting law violators and . . . lecturing on delinquency. Sunday evenings are spent with my family, and the outstanding program fit for people of all ages, Father Knows Best, now is to be eliminated. My anger and that of my family is such that mere words cannot express it."

A Cincinnati housewife: "Believe ne, if the sponsors cannot tell when they have a good show, why should I believe they know what they are talking about when it comes to their products?"

A Chicago woman: "Perhaps you do not realize the pleasure this intriguing show brings to people who remember their own youthful family life with nostalgia. Please keep it."

And this from one of TV's most

merciless critics, John Crosby: "Unless somebody does something about it, Father Knows Best will be dropped off the air . . . This would be a crying scandal because Father Knows Best is one of the most honest and appealing and thoroughly delightful situation comedies on TV."

Perhaps Robert Young himself has the best answer to why "Bring Back Father" became the battle-cry of so many viewers. In discussing situation comedies, he asserts: "There's more to comedy than laughs—to which many now-defunct shows will attest. Comedy must be believable."

When work first started on Father, "We knew mostly what we didn't want," Young said. "We didn't want a father who was always blowing his top, or a mother who dominated her husband, or kids who were so smart that they made their folks look like morons. And we particularly didn't want Pop to fall off a ladder or down a flight of stairs every week. How many fathers do you know—living, I mean—who could stand that, week after week?"





Jack Benny Says He's Nearing 40: Durante Will Use Miranda Program


