

NEW YORK

Bob Stahl reports:

BING CROSBY, after much hesitation on the brink, has finally taken the TV plunge. It's definite now that he'll do several shows in the FRED WARING-<u>General Electric Film Theater</u> time period Sunday nights on CBS. The exact dates have not yet been decided.

Looks definite for ETHEL MERMAN to do at least two starring roles on <u>Comedy Hour</u> this season . . . Because EDDIE CANTOR guested on JACK BENNY's show last year, BENNY will reciprocate by guesting on CANTOR's first appearance on <u>Comedy Hour</u> this year, Oct. 18 . . . PAUL WINCHELL has signed to do recordings for Mercury Records.

BILL (HOPALONG CASSIDY) BOYD tops the list of headliners who will appear in Macy's annual Thanksgiving Day Parade in New York. The parade will be televised by NBC . . . Preceding New York's shindig, NBC will telecast Gimbel's 33rd annual Thanksgiving Day Parade from Philadelphia. ROY ROGERS and KUKLA, FRAN and OLLIE will head the Philadelphia festivities.

TEX McCRARY's all-out backing of PRESIDENT EISENHOWER in last year's campaign has resulted in a new TV program, The President's Week. A Sunday afternoon quarter-hour, it will have film clips of IKE in action, as well as a big-name guest . . . MEL ALLEN, sportscaster, is penning a book of sports anecdotes titled "How About That."

DEAN MARTIN and JERRY LEWIS planning a fun-filled travelog based on their recent trip to Europe for their first show of the season Oct. 4. The comedy team are revising their format this year, featuring more ad libs and wide-open clowning . . . JANE FROMAN shooting golf again for the first time since her clipper crash during the war.

It's still indefinite, but there's a good chance that Garroway at Large may wind up in the Friday night at 8 period on NBC. The Dennis Day Show would be moved to a different evening . . BISHOP FULTON J. SHEEN bringing out a book to include all his talks from last season's Life Is Worth Living show. It's slated for publication Oct. 15 by McGraw-Hill.

The famed Sadlers Wells ballet troupe from England may appear on Your Show of Shows after the completion of their New York run . . . Hall of Fame planning a one-hour version of Shakespeare's "King Lear." It will star LOUIS CALHERN, who played the title role in the recent Broadway production. An adaptation of THOMAS WOLFE's "Of Time and the River" is also slated for that show.

as we see it

Britain is about to take the plunge into commercial television—well, almost. The Government there will set up a new TV service that will accept and telecast advertising, but will not permit sponsorship of programs.

Presumably, then, Government employees will select and produce the programs and every so often there will be spot announcements from advertisers. This will differ from the present setup in which Government employees select and produce the programs and there are no spot announcements from advertisers. Anyway, viewers there will finally have a choice of two channels.

Earl de la Warr, British Postmaster General, whose department is in charge of mail, telephones and telegraph besides radio and television, says, "There is a world of difference between accepting advertising and sponsoring. The press accepts ads, but they remain responsible for their own news columns . . . We are not going to adopt the American system of dependence upon sponsoring."

The good Earl apparently didn't consider that the press is an information medium and TV is primarily an entertainment medium. Nor did he see fit to mention that the press is not Government-controlled as is his British Broadcasting Corporation.

The American system he dislikes is private enterprise. Under that system the viewer, by accepting or rejecting a program, eventually decides what he is to see on television. The choice is not made for him by a network, a sponsor, or a Civil servant. If a sponsor's show does not attract an audience or sell goods, a new show, one that does please the audience and sell goods, must be found.

We don't care too much whether or how the British get advertising on television, but let them stop knocking our system, which is doing pretty doggoned well.—M. P.



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

HOW THEY MAKE

SUPERMAN



T IS a mark of the deepest affection that the production crew which earns its daily bread by shooting the Superman TV film series refers to its star, George Reeves, as "Stuporman." In any other business, this would be insulting. In Hollywood, it is the accolade.

Reeves, a man who looks a good deal younger than he is, is as goodnatured a hero as is extant in TV today. He carries the Superman role on his broad shoulders with a delicate sense of balance, kidding himself when among adults but taking it dead seriously when among the younger fry. To him, Superman is a cross between a job and a dedication. The same sense of dedication, inspired by Reeves' own genuine feeling on the subject, is evident in the attitude of the crew when one of them says, "Well, let's get Stuporman into his rig and get moving."

They're kidding on the square, ashamed to admit baldly that they go for this business of playing hero to the kids, yet at the same time sharing a secret satisfaction in knowing they

have a part in doing exactly that.

It is perhaps a commentary on our souped-up way of life that something dedicated to the kids of our time can be turned out on an assembly-line basis with little or no "heart" deliberately injected into the proceedings. An A. A. Milne could sit down at his leisure, turn his thoughts to the happy-faced little tykes of his era. and then lovingly pen his stories about Christopher Robin and Sir Edward Bear and Roo. Superman, with five-films-in-two-weeks shooting schedule staring it in the face, has no time for such airs. The button is pushed, the script is ground out, the cameras turn and another Superman film is finished.

Youngsters Most Important

The indefinable "heart" of the show springs from Reeves himself and from Whit Ellsworth, the producer. Contrary to some opinion, Hollywood is not entirely populated by pompous oafs and dollar-mad sharpshooters. Reeves and Ellsworth, while not at all averse to turning a profit from the venture, are genuinely concerned with the influence Superman has on a generation of youngsters to whom Tom Swift is an old-fashioned fuddyduddy who couldn't do anything more sensational than make a motorcycle or a flying ship or a submarine-sheer child's play in these hectic times.

Reeves and Ellsworth are chiefly concerned at the moment with the tendency of more than one youngster to take up solo flying as an avocation. If Superman can do it without wings or other visible means of support, so can they — with disastrous results. Thus the Superman crew is now rushing to completion a film short in which Reeves, as Superman, explains that only he has the power to fly and that no one else must ever try it.

Actually, of course, Reeves' flying stunts are simplicty itself to anyone even vaguely familiar with the theater - which automatically must include anyone who ever saw Maude Adams or Betty Bronson fly cumbersomely about the premises in their stage presentations of Peter Pan. Hollywood has improved on the original with the use of trick photography, produced almost entirely in the laboratory - and Reeves' dramatic entrance into a scene more often than not is accomplished by the simple expedient of having him stand on a five-foot ladder just out of camera range and leap easily into the proceedings. The power of suggestion makes the illusion quite complete. particularly to the youngsters.

Reeves Isn't Weapon-proof

Reeves' toughest problem, oddly enough, is that of making personal appearances. Because Superman is supposed to be impervious to such things as bullets, knives and other weapons, he is a natural proving ground for the younger inquiring mind. Also naturally, Reeves wants no part of such field tests and has had

to decree that his personal appearances as Superman be made on-stage in a theater, where he at least has a sporting chance to catch any sharphoned or blunt-edged objects that might be tossed at him in a purely scientific but at the same time highly dangerous manner.

Based on the long-popular comic strip of the same name, Superman deals with the activities of Clark Kent and Lois Lane, star reporters of The Daily Planet, who keep running into crime and other adventure stories

which invariably need the valiant services of Superman. Kent, of course, is Superman in disguise, which explains how Superman always seems to know precisely where he's needed.

Lois Lane, Kent's sidekick in these matters, is currently being played by Noel Neill, who played the same role in the original motion picture serial version of Superman. Phyllis Coates, however, had the part for the first 26 films, which are still making the

rounds in many cities. Jimmy Olsen, the inevitably confused cub reporter, is played by Jack Larson, while a veteran character actor, John Hamilton, roars pleasantly through the series as Perry White, editor of The Daily Planet.

Reeves himself, the two-ply star of the proceedings, is a thoroughly likeable man with a ready grin, a keen sense of humor and no illusions about his importance in the TV hierarchy.

In between his Superman chores, he has appeared recently in such pictures as The Blue Gardenia, Bugles in the Afternoon and From Here to Eternity, as well as in a number of TV dramatic films. Superman he takes genially in stride, albeit with a strong undercurrent of responsibility to the kids. He has given up smoking, believing that Superman should never be seen with a cigaret—and not trusting himself to confine his smoking behind closed doors.

He also makes a point of never being seen with a girl, an even more difficult proposition considering that he is an attractive bachelor.

For this literary effort Mrs. Edythe Guzik, of Jackson Heights, N. Y., received first prize in a *Ladies Date* jingle contest—a \$400 chrome and porcelain gas range.

Her experience is typical of the way in which many viewers are discovering the "Santa Claus" in their TV sets.

Over at Strike It Rich, where as much as \$9000 a week could be picked up (\$400,000 was given away last year), Warren Hull asks moneybacked questions.

The Big Payoff, replacing the Colgate Comedy Hour this summer, upped the afternoon ante of \$7000 in merchandise to \$10,000. In a year and a half on TV, Emcee Randy Merriman and Bess Myerson have handed out \$750,000 worth of clothes, plus 52 mink coats, 104 round trips to Europe and 25 automobiles.

On Break the Bank, where the bank holds any amount from \$500 to \$13,-000, the payoff is for answers to questions.

A typical question involved naming the one-time ambassador to Spain who was married to Lillian Russell. A Pittsburgh man broke the bank with this one. It was Ambassador Alexander T. Moore, also from Pittsburgh.

On Two for the Money, conducted by Herb Shriner, the average combined take for three couples is \$1500, but recently, two Navy men walked off with \$3600.

Although the questions are easy, contestants are haunted by the ticking of a clock and the sounding of a buzzer when they are wrong. One man slowed himself down considerably when, in listing words rhyming with tune, he said, "Moon, spoon, and if you'll pardon the expression, spittoon."

The real fun quiz, You Bet Your Life, the sixth most popular TV show in the country, achieved its status because of Groucho Marx. Money is incidental to Groucho's wit.

In the past year, two sets of contestants, unshaken after a bout with the master, walked off with over \$6000 each from the jackpot alone. Most people. however, "break uo" in the entanglement. Typical quip: Bachelor: "I've been cooking for 56 years." Groucho: "You must be pretty well done by now."

Or: Airline pilot: "I've just imported 56 harem girls to an Arab sheik."

Groucho, "It must have been thrilling to see 56 girls take off."

The pilot: "The proper pronunciation of the word sheik is shake."

Groucho: "With 56 girls, I'd think it would be shock."

This brand of humor is scarcely in the same league with that of a show on which an emcee smeared with whipped cream is considered the funniest sight of the day. But if you plan to supplement the family income through giveaways, the smaller the show, the greater your chance.

Money For Problems

A number of other shows, some of them new, are adding to the flow of money from television. On Your Account, with Win Elliot as master of ceremonies, presses cash on people with problems. Beat the Clock, with Bud Collyer and Roxanne, is one of the game-type giveaways with merchandise and money as prizes.

Fred Allen's new show, Judge For Yourself, introduces talent-judging as a contest and has up to \$2000 in prizes. Name That Tune, with Red Benson and Vicki Mills, uses musical clues. The new Jan Murray show, Dollar A Second, is a quiz in which the contestants race against time.

Bert Parks hands out the cash on Double Or Nothing and Jack Smith does the honors on Place The Face, although apart from the cash they are widely different shows. Bud Collyer also has introduced a new one, On Your Way.


Not Everybody Wins

The theory that giveaways shower loot about at random is debunked by the fact that most of them, like all other TV productions, are carefully budgeted. The big payoff, for instance, occurs once in every two to three weeks, or to one out of every 40 contestants. Bank-breakers fare about the same. Conceivably, any contestant could have the answer to any question. But as one giveaway's press agent said, "When we're over our budget, a contestant's chance of knowing the answer to the big money question is on a par with knowing the serial number on the \$5 bill in my wallet."

Dan Jenkins reports:

MARY SHIPP, the Miss Spalding of the now dormant <u>Life With Luigishow</u> and wife of CBS Vice-President HARRY ACKERMAN, is the final choice for the Jane Stacy role in <u>My Friend Irma</u>, replacing CATHY LEWIS . . . IDA LUPINO, JOAN FONTAINE and EDMUND O'BRIEN will star alternately in a series of 39 new TV films called <u>Port of Call</u>, a glorified guided tour of the cities of the world. Much of the background film has already been shot.

EDGAR BERGEN, one of the original big-name TV film enthusiasts, will do the bulk of his six CBS-TV shows this season on a live basis. He says the canned laughter of filmed comedy shows changed his mind . . . MARTHA RAYE's first monthly NBC-TV show in the CAESAR-COCA Saturday night spot will feature MARGARET TRUMAN and ROCKY GRAZIANO as guests.

PATRICE MUNSEL will make 13 operatic TV films in Italy . . . WANDA HENDRIX and BILL LUNDIGAN are being sought to star in a Kerry Drake feature picture, after which they would take the same roles in a subsequent TV film series . . . BURT LANCASTER has been set-for the October 4 MARTIN & LEWIS Comedy Hour, with FRANK SINATRA inked in for JIMMY DURANTE's Nov. 8 show.

Hollywood Director EDDIE BUZZELL will direct the first three MILTON BERLE shows, then returns here to start a new film series, Third Girl From the Right . . . ALAN YOUNG and NBC-TV are in the serious talking stage . . . Gross-Krasne Productions are now casting for a new Lorelei in the Big Town series, JANE NIGH quitting in favor of motherhood.

Republic Studios clearing the decks for production of TV films on its own lot, first major movie studio to announce such plans. Seven independently-produced film series already are being shot there . . . BING CROSBY ENTERPRISES, producers of Rebound and Crown Theater, have suspended TV film production "indefinitely."

GORDON MAC RAE has set up a corporation to produce a film series of his own now that he's out from under his Warner Bros. contract. Warners, incidentally, now have only five stars under exclusive contract... RCA-NBC will have sunk no less than \$25,000,000 into color TV by the end of this year.

DAVID NIVEN and CHARLES BOYER have wound their season's <u>Four Star Playhouse</u> chores in advance, freeing NIVEN to make a picture in London and BOYER to play the lead opposite MARY MARTIN in "Kind Sir" on Broadway, opening Nov. 4 . . . SEYMOUR BERNS, an old Hollywood hand, is directing the <u>Red Skelton Show</u> on CBS-TV.

THE 3 R's AND MARTY

F YOU'RE very young and even if you're not "as young as you used to be," you're sure to enjoy WKRC-TV's "Play School". Especially designed for children from the ages of 4 to 6 it has been endorsed by both the PTA and the Board of Education. You might think with such an exalted seal of approval that "Play School" is "all work and no play". But that's just where you're wrong. For the past couple of years, the authors of "Play School" have been working very hard to build the kind of a show that not only mothers and teachers but small fry too, will welcome. And here at last is just such a show. . . . because

from all reports the children love their "Play School" and mothers and teachers have echoed the children's sentiments.

The two guiding spirits of the show are well equipped for their jobs as writer and director. Martha Ransohoff is a U.C. lecturer in child development, and acts as educational director adviser at the same time assisting C'amri Cameron, wife of a U.C. Sociology professor who writes and directs the show. And who should know better how to write for children than a mother of two preschool children? Mrs. Cameron was associated

with the theater in California and Indiana before Katie, 5 and David, 3 altered her career.

Painless Education

Both Martha and C'amri long had cherished the belief that there must be a way for television to entertain children and at the same time sneak in a little education. With this in mind they set up the present format of "Play School" and even added some ideas to help children entertain themselves. The result is a most entertaining half hour program.

The cast is a small one; it consists of a pretty television actress, Marty Kay and a picturesque French Poodle by the name of Angie. These two with Shirlee Jester, talented staff pianist, make a very gay and interesting trio. Angie, by the way is a thorobred but she's not a trick poodle. She'll jump over a stick or shake hands with you and generally cooperate but it's evident she's happiest when she's pleasing Marty. She seems only too glad to obey when commanded to relax and watchen the "squiggle" game with the greatest of interest.

The "Squiggle Game" is one of the highlights of the show. To "Squiggle" all you have to do is have paper and pencil handy. Then draw a straight line. You're then asked to mail your "Squiggle" to Marty who will turn it into a lovely bird or duck or maybe a kitten, autograph it and send it back to you. Judging from the number of "Squiggles" received this is a very popular feature of "Play School".

Equally popular is the song which Marty sings, at the same time inviting all the children at home to join her. And since no children's program would be complete without a story, Marty tells about all her lovely feathered friends and illustrates with some of the Natural History Muscum's finest bird specimens. You may even be rewarded for watching the program by being introduced to a real live parakeet and finding out just how to care for it. As in all children's stories, there is a moral to Marty's tales. And the moral of our story is if you want to know just what the small fry are interested in these days don't miss "Play School" on WKRC-TV, Channel 12 daily Mon. thru Fri., from 8 to 8:30 a.m.



V/LW D's "Coffee Club" is one show on which the audience can wave away at the camera to their hearts' content without fear of being branded "TV Idiots" or any of the uncomplimentary monickers commonly attributed to the overzealous video guest. Hostess Betty Ann Horstman operates on the theory that the various women's groups come to the Dayton station to have a good time and that it's her job to see to it that they do. With teammates Arvie Recore and Dick Shafer and vocalist Nancy Rifner, Betty Ann has been showing her guests a good time on the "Coffee Club" for the past two years.

Graduating to video from WONE and WING, Betty Ann started out on channel two on a thrice weekly 15 minute afternoon spot. In short order she was advanced to a daily billing and teamed with Arvie and Dick with a time extension to a half hour. The combine adopted the "Coffee Club" title in January, 1952, a long time ago by video standards, and with an average of six sponsors daily, it's a pretty good bet they'll be with us for some time to come.

Talent Pool

The success of "Coffee Club" is all the more amazing when you consider that the show has inadvertently served as a talent pool for a couple of New York network programs. Practically everyone knows the tale of the McGuire Sisters, who started here. Successor Barbara Rettig followed suit by guesting with Arthur Godfrey and winning a two week engagement on the Garry Moore show during the summer. By this time Betty Ann & Co. were veteran improvisers and promptly pulled 17 year old vocalist Nancy Rifner out of the grab bag. Of course, established protocol practically dictates that she too will follow in the nomadic footsteps of her predecessors.

But there can be no doubt that the afternoon standby will weather the storm as gracefully as it has in the past; for instance when Jim Bolen was sidelined by the same union edict that benched Neal VanElls on Studio Wrestling. Then there was the back injury to Arvie Recore from which he's still recuperating. Troupers that they are, Betty Ann took to more

pantomime and Dick Shafer took to more instruments, and the "Coffee Club" continued on schedule.

Ably directed by Bill Brescka, a colleague of playwright Rod Serling at Antioch College, the "Coffee Club" is a 24 hour a day proposition with the cast. Several evenings each week, the crew gets together, usually at Betty Ann's, and all concerned give the show a going-over while the two Horstman daschunds, Baron and Countess, and Dick's fox terrier, Bozo, follow suit with the furniture.

Critical Critic

The show's most intense critic is Mrs. Shafer, whom Dick met at a USO dance in Charleston, S.C. about a decade ago. Maggie watches the show religiously with

an eagle eye out for flaws, miscues and various faux pas. But there have been a few impromptu mishaps whose detection hardly required an eagle eye.

If there has ever been a time that the cast questioned the wisdom of the cliche about the show going on, it was the afternoon Arvie Recore tore his bathing suitin the most obvious place, naturally. Hamming it up in the very best Godfrey style, the crew decided that bathing suits and swimming pools should be the order of the day. Unfortunately, the pools were of the inflated rubber variety and the bathing suits were resurrected from the gay nineties. But everyone managed to get wet and Arvie was able to secure a little additional ventilation on one of the warmest days of the year; all of which

seemed to be the main idea of an outdoor production.

The show's other 'family' critic is Betty Ann's husband, Jim Venable, who coaches the star's pantomimes. Jim is a veteran of the New York productions of "Oklahoma" and "Bloomer Girl" and has directed his own stock company; which is how the two met, when Jim was in Dayton producing the Junior League Follies.

No Canned Commercial

A past master of the unrehearsed commercial, Betty Ann once pounced on the opportunity of interrogating one of the few male studio guests on the merits of such-and-such a product. Common courtesy and good taste would seem to entail an endorsement of the product in accepting an invitation to a program for which the sponsor foots the bill. But the law of averages still hasn't been repealed and Betty Ann happened on a minister, who was no doubt justified in putting honesty above all else when he replied, "No, I hate the stuff." Thinking the curt reply to be a gag, or perhaps out of sheer desperation, Betty Ann hurriedly inquired about still another product, to which the high-principled cleric replied. "No, I don't like that either." The next day Betty Ann was back on the job as usual and not in the hospital bed that would have claimed a lesser showman after such a disaster.

But the 23 year old lass has been at the game too long to become unnerved very easily. A graduate of U. D. and summer stock, Betty Ann has been on the stage since she was six, campaigning with her politician grandfather. Her workday usually starts about 6:00 a.m. what with personal appearances and radio engagements on WIZE, Springfield, WKNB, Richmond, and WING, Dayton in addition to her TV schedule. She's usually home by about 6:00 in the evening, unless she has a late hour benefit or some such. Besides the "Coffee Club" her favorite chore is a four hour disc jockey session on Saturday afternoon via WING. As Betty Ann puts it, "What woman wouldn't enjoy just gabbing for four hours?"

Durward Kirby: TV's biggest giveaway.

COMIC Garry Moore, forever on the prowl for gimmicks to add to his daytime TV pleaser, decided recently that it was about time he staged a stupendous giveaway. Scanning the premises of CBS's Mansfield Theater for the biggest item to give away, Garry's eyes went no further than his strapping six-foot-four-inch announcer, Durward Kirby. Big Durward, it was decided, would have to go.

As resigned to his fate as a latter-day Patrick Henry, Kirby was immediately made the subject of a contest: "Why I Want Durward Kirby For My Very Own." The housewives' reaction to "owning" Moore's wavy-haired sidekick for 48 hours was amazing. Five hundred entries poured in every day.

Started In Chicago

Actually, Durward's comic abilities were discovered years ago on the Chicago-originated Club Matinee which starred Garry and Ransom Sherman. Although he was billed as the program's announcer, Rance and Garry put Kirby through the same sort of

comedy shenanigans he pulls off on the Moore show.

Durward uttered his first tone into a microphone as a student announcer at Purdue University. After graduating, he landed a job with a radio station in nearby Indianapolis. In Cincinnati and later in Chicago he built up a reputation as a competent commercial spieler and special events man and in 1941 Kirby won the H. P. Davis Announcer's Award.

Durward Is Versatile

When Garry made his TV debut on CBS, he asked Durward to "live it up" with him as on *Club Matinee*. Since then Kirby's announcing chores on the Moore show have really been secondary. As announcers go, he is easily the most versatile in the business.

Those thousands of letter writers who wanted to "own" Durward knew exactly what first prize meant. Not just Kirby, but Winston L. Mittenjuice, the wisecracking hayseed who thinks he's irresistible to women. Lots of others, too. An East Indian swami, an Italian chef, a quack doctor named Beebe. They're all Durward Kirby, one commercial announcer who found the perfect formula for getting strict attention: he went out and got an act.





NE THING can be said about the satirical team of Bob and Ray: they are hardly a household word. Possessed with a sly, tongue-in-cheek impudence and a healthy disregard for some of the more sacred items of our times, the spoofers have about the same general appeal that might be accorded a Bach fugue or a T. S. Eliot couplet. As one network official explained it, "What Arthur Godfrey's got, Bob and Ray ain't."

Even the hoards of star-struck bobby-soxers who can leaf through their smudged autograph books and show you signatures of the entire Aldrich family, every panelist on Juvenile Jury (including its alumni) and a few page boys to boot, will

admit that two fellows named Bob Elliott and Ray Goulding have somehow escaped their attention.

Unless tipped off in advance, an uninitiated viewer watching the Bob and Ray brand of straight-face humor for the first time might just furrow his brow in bewilderment and switch channels. Other folks, who realize Bob and Ray are making exquisite fun of some of their favorite television performers, are apt to turn the dial in protest. Still others, who prefer their humor broader, don't care for Bob and Ray for the same reason they don't care for rutabagas.

The boys themselves realize that rating-wise they'll probably never crash the upper atmosphere populated by the Lucys, the Berles and the other chosen ones. Says Ray, perhaps a little too pessimistically, "I'd guess that only one person out of 80 likes us."

The guess seems to be a bad one. Bob and Ray don't have a tremendous following, but it is a decidedly loyal



one and certainly not as sparse as Ray indicates. Most of the critics praise the boys. The trade itself considers them far more clever than most of the comics working the TV circuit. Their fans can quote them endlessly. At first NBC was thoroughly sold on the pair, des-

pite the fact that prospective spon-

sors stayed away in droves. Relations between the boys and the network "steadily worsened," as they say in the trade, and recently they signed a contract with ABC.

Bob (he's the shorter one) and Ray seem to derive most relish from kidding radio and television, their bread and butter. Cigaret commercials are among their pet targets. One memorable spoof was the "Forbush Frankfurter Test" in which four franks were disrobed of their casings to prove which was rounder, firmer, etc. Not only was "Forbush" a clear winner, but the makers of "Forbush Franks" debunked other frankfurter claims:

Bob (holding up a frankfurter): Frankfurter A claims to relieve gout, embolism, near-sightedness, itchiness and fleebus.

Ray: The makers of Frankfurter B claim it is kinder to the F zone-F for frank, F for furter. Yet 339 out of 340 physicians have testified there is no such zone.

Bob: "Forbush Frankfurters" claim nothing. Positive proof that "Forbush Frankfurters" are the best made.

For over a year Bob and Ray pounded away at cigaret comparison tests. Sample:

Interviewer (Bob): I see, sir, you are knocking a chip off the old block.

Ray (in carpenter's garb): That is correct.

Bob: Tell me, sir, have you ever seen me before or have you received any remuneration for this interview?

Ray: I have never seen you before nor have I received any remunera-

tion for this interview.

Bob: Which chip off the old block would you like to knock off firstours or yours?

Ray: I'll try yours first. (He proceeds to knock a chip off the block.)

Bob: Now, will you try our block, sir. (Ray complies.) Now, sir, you have knocked an old chip off your block and off our block. Which do you prefer?

Ray (enthusiastically): Oh, yours. Your chip flew more gracefully. And

its milder-much milder.

The boys have run the gamut of soap operas, so that practically no soap is safe from their ribbing. Some of the Elliott-Goulding epics have unmistakable counterparts - Mary Backstayge, Noble Wife; Hartford Harry, Linda Lovely, Helen Harkness, Sob Sister, and Mr. Trace, Keener Than Most Persons. Although the sponsors of the show were none too happy, the cast of "Mary Noble, Backstage Wife," never failed to tune in the Bob and Ray parody of their show. The boys saw to it that even the plot lines were strikingly alike.

Bob and Ray's take-offs on overstocked sales, special offers and kits for all purposes, have drawn a shocking number of serious replies. Listeners have written to "I Want to Keep Up With the Jones-

equipped with antenna "to show off to your neighbors." They have taken the boys up on offers of cracked phonograph records ("they were dropped just a few inches off the delivery truck."), sweaters with the letter "O" on them ("if your name doesn't begin with "O" we can have it

legally changed for you; sweaters come in two styles, turtle-neck or V-neck. State what kind of a neck you have."), deep freeze lockers, "deep enough to accommodate a family of four." The Kind Hunter's Kit was offered for "softhearted people who love to hunt but hate to kill." It contained bullets that drop to the ground and are packed with vitamins for the animals.

In an effort to find the right slot for Bob and Ray, NBC shunted the boys around, spotting them here and there. Some of the program switches were unfortunate ones.

The team's initial dip into TV was stormy. When the popular Kukla, Fran and Ollie were cut to 15 minutes, Bob and Ray were given the vacated spot. Which, of course, prompted outraged K.F.O. fans to brand the two radio comics as puppet-haters. They departed this early evening show a few months afterward.

When the boys finally landed a sponsor on a late-evening program, they ran into agency trouble or sponsoritis. It seems the men who sign the paychecks didn't dig their comedy stars and asked them to dish up a more obvious form of humor. "Throw pizza pies at each other," was one of the suggestions. After 13 weeks, when option time rolled around, Bob and Ray left the show by mutual consent.

The team is probably best remem-

bered for its regular guest stints on Dave Garroway's morning show, Today. Garroway, a B. & R. fan, would solemnly introduce the two and the boys conducted interviews, with Bob generally handling the straight lines and Ray providing the answers.

Although their own ratings are modest, Bob and Ray have no qualms about spoofing some of the TV performers who boast tremendous audiences. Their favorite target is Arthur Godfrey—or, as portrayed by Bob—"Arthur Strudley and His No Talent Scouts." Dressed in a sailor suit, a First World War aviator's hat and strumming a ukulele, Bob gives a devastating impersonation—complete with "by gollys" and informal Godfrey-type commercials for "Metchnikoff's Caviar Teabags."

Their take-offs on Ed Sullivan ("We've flown in from the Middle East for their first American performance the only two-man Arabian drill team in the world. Let's give the boys a warm New York welcome."); Ed Murrow ("See It Now and Then"); Dragnet ("Fishnet") and the Stork Club (Ray in a one-sided conversation with two store dummies), rank as unequaled TV satires.

Like caviar and rutabagas, Bob and Ray don't appeal to all tastes. But lots of people consider TV's top satirists as pretty wonderful fare. Now if the Elliott-Goulding fandom can only convince the right people that ratings don't mean a thing . . .

SPORTSCASTERS ANSWER RED SMITH ON THE GREAT CURVEBALL QUESTION

THE EXECUTIVE BOARD of the Sports Broadcasters Association, representing its 40 or more members, takes strong exception to an article authored by Sports Writer Red Smith in TV GUIDE.

Mr. Smith, in our opinion, has lashed out in an unwarranted, crass and, we would prefer to believe, unsolicited attack on the sportscasting profession. Because of his method of half-truths, distortion of fact and unbelievably irresponsible use of quotes, we feel he has questioned the integrity of each individual sportscaster.

The author starts off by uttering disdain for any baseball announcer who claims he can differentiate between an inside pitch, a curve or what not 200 yards away. The batter and pitcher, according to Mr. Smith, seldom agree what has been thrown. Here, Mr. Smith lacks the reporter's researching methods. Were he to dig deeply, he would discover perspective is a great factor in focus. Isn't it easier to estimate a dance pattern from the back of a theater? Why not then the curve of a ball or its relation to the batter from a distance? With his ob-

vious desire to create confusion, Mr. Smith quotes a batter as saying he hit one type pitch and the pitcher saying he threw another type. Therefore, if these two differ, how, Mr. Smith asks, can the announcer presume to be right?

Mr. Smith, at first glance, seems to make his point. But the truth of the matter is that most experienced ball-players, questioned about a ball at which they had swung, preface their answer with: "I think it was . . ." Those few words, you will admit, change the entire complexion. Actually, if the batter could tell accurately what he was receiving, he would get a hit most every time. The baseball announcer sees the pitch after it has completed its mission: curved . . . sunken . . . or sailed.

Usually, the announcer has a "book" on every pitcher in the league he broadcasts. Let's say Pitcher Jones has a fast ball, curve and screwball. He's a left-hander facing a left-handed batter. His first pitch curves into the batter. Result: the announcer concludes logically this is the screwball. He follows this logicalizing in all reports he must make within seconds. But more, Mr. Smith sneers as he berates the broadcaster for daring to call a slider pitch.

It's miraculous, says Mr. Smith, when you discover many ballplayers are not at all sure there is a slider pitch. It's equally miraculous Mr. Smith does not know, or perhaps does not wish to tell, the whole story. And



the whole story is that an overwhelming number of players and experts do admit the existence of a slider.

For example, Frank Yeutter, Philadelphia baseball writer and former president of the Baseball Writers Association of America, in his book about Philadelphia Pitcher Jim Konstanty, calls him the greatest of all slider pitchers. Frankie Frisch and Rogers Hornsby, on a recent TV program, discussed the abilities of certain sliderball pitchers. And, writing for a sport magazine, Casey Stengel said there is a dearth of .300 hitters today compared to 20 years ago because today's young players have not learned to solve-yes, our good friend -the slider. Had enough?

How less ominous the average announcer would have been made to seem if Mr. Smith had admitted the practice of calling pitches originated with the great sports writers many years before the invention of radio, instead of being passed off as a poisoned brew dished up to make you, the listener and viewer, more susceptible to beer or cigarets.

Mr. Smith reaches an incredibly low level of journalism when he uses quotation marks around the phrase attributed to sports announcers: "If they can hear this, they're not watching, and what they can't see won't hurt them." Quotes, as every schoolboy writer knows, are used to narrate exact words—not the implication or approximate meaning, but the precise wording.

Which sports announcer, we ask, ever has made such a remark? To our knowledge, no one in the Sports Broadcasters Association, which includes almost every sportscaster and his writing assistant in New York City. It is damaging to every announcer for Mr. Smith should name the specific announcer in fairness to all, but then it is obvious nothing in his article can be construed as fair.

For this article is unfair to the vast army of ambitious young men all over the country attending college and private classes, learning the business of sportscasting, striving hard to learn the sports, players and broadcasting techniques, training their eyes and minds for quick accurate assessments, dreaming of entering a dignified and respected profession, looking with understandable awe upon the decent men of the sportscasting profession who occupy high positions of acceptance with their public.

They Like Adult Shows
Better Than

THE eight-year-old youngsters in my third grade class prefer adult television programs to the ones produced especially as kiddies' shows. And my class is as representative a cross-section of children as Temple University is able to select in and around Philadelphia.

the country, the television industry should do some program reshuffling.

Situation comedy shows, My Friend Irma, Date with Judy, Stu Erwin, I Married Joan, along with I Love Lucy, are the children's undisputable favorites. There are 19 children in my class and they turned in a total of 140 written reports on the programs they liked best. Of the 140 reports, 46 were on situation comedies. No one turned in a report on I Love Lucy because that program was discussed in class and the children agreed unanimously that they liked it.

These children said during our discussions that they don't like variety shows except Milton Berle's Star Theater, vintage of '52-'53. However their

Boys and girls of Oak Lane Country Day School, which is a laboratory school of the University, come from homes of varying economic levels and are of different races and religious faiths. If the likes and dislikes of this cross-section of children are similar to those of children in other parts of written reports reveal that they do indeed like certain other variety shows: the ones that satisfy the same appetite as comedies, westerns and adventure programs.

In their reporting the boys and girls did not miss many of the comedy programs beamed into the Phila-

delphia area. Included in this list of favorités are Mr. Peepers, The Nelsons, and Date With Judy. This type program apparently has two things that attract the children: from program to program the TV characters are familiar although the things they do are varied, and they do many things that the children themselves would like to do or have happen in their family group or small world.

All the children liked Milton Berle's 1953 series. They look for "the funny parts with Milton and Maxie.'

When the youngsters were asked when they began to like Milton Berle, unhesitatingly they said, "When Maxie came on." This change of format made the show more like their other

favorite comedy programs.

The other variety shows that have the children's interest are Arthur Godfrey, Red Skelton and Red Buttons. They have the same common denominator of appealing humor. The youngsters say, Red Skelton-"Red makes such funny faces," "It's funny."

Red Buttons-"He plays like different people," "Red pretends to be a little boy." Arthur Godfrey—"I like the jokes and some singers," "It's funny," Arthur's funny."

The excitement of You Asked For It makes for the other notable exception in the variety group. (As many children handed in written reports on this show as for the other three combined.) The children say, "There are dare-devils," "They have exciting things," "They show hard things to do," "There are people who do amazing things."

Western, adventure and mystery programs (they see many of the ones shown at a reasonable hour) provide the blood and thunder that children from time immemorial have sought. This is what they say about some of these shows: Roy Rogers-"It has adventure to it like a mystery," "Roy's dog is helping people." Lone Ranger-"It is exciting." "Tonto gets into trouble and the Lone Ranger gets him out," "The mask." Ramar of the Jungle-"It is exciting," "They go different places," "It's right in the jungle," "Ramar is helping people."

By vote and reports puppet shows do not fare badly. They say "Howdy Doody is interesting because it is full of fun. He shows the old-time movies -I would like more movies, and Howdy Doody is always getting in trouble." They like "Clarabelle and Mr. Bluster," and say, "The fancy names are funny," but it is "Babyish," and "It is too silly." Kukla, Fran and Ollie is "always different."

Quiz shows? Beat the Clock is "interesting," "funny," and "they do a lot of stunts." Strike It Rich-"Poor

people win money."

The expressions about TV by this one group of boys and girls seem to substantiate that which psychologists and educators have known for a long time: for passive entertainment eight and nine-year-olds like adventure. mystery and detective stories, dramas of domestic life, slapstick and adult comic programs.

PROGRAM OF THE WEEK

SoundStage

WITH the antics of the Aldrich Family apparently having run their course on TV, sponsors of that show recently replaced it with a new series of live, half-hour dramas. The new program, titled Campbell TV SoundStage, is sometimes good and sometimes bad but generally rates a look-in by fans of TV drama (NBC, Friday nights).

Like all TV shows which feature different casts and a different story each week, SoundStage is subject to the ability of its writers. And since TV has just about exhausted the supply of available one-act plays and short stories which might be adapted, it must depend almost entirely for story material on originals written especially for the show. There's where the difficulty enters.

Either the program's budget will not permit the hiring of better writers

or else the producers think they can gamble with weak scripts. Whatever the reason, several of the stories spotted thus far on SoundStage would hardly have done credit to a Hollywood "B" movie. There is the same stilted emphasis on pseudopsychological themes, pseudo-sophisticated farce and semi-suspense tales.

A recent story, for example, was a murder mystery set in a psycho-analyst's office. The script violated every tenet of good whodunit writing by telegraphing the climax within five minutes after the opening curtain. It was so obvious that it hurt. Another story dealt with a wife's endeavors to remake her husband's character and the ensuing troubles. Where have we heard that one before?

The actors appearing on Sound-Stage are mostly well-known TV performers who have learned the medium the hard way—by working in it week after week. They often are able to inject real quality into the show. Settings, camera work and other technical credits are good.—R. S.

DOWN YOU GO

DOWN YOU GO is one of the few TV "sleepers" of recent years. It cropped up unheralded on the Du Mont network, and almost immediately was hailed as a new departure in TV panel programs, offering erudition as well as entertainment. (Du

Mont, Friday nights.)

Not the least of the program's innovations, but certainly one of the chief reasons for the program's success, is its moderator, Dr. Bergen Evans. Dr. Evans is a professor of English at Northwestern University. But far from being the traditional absent-minded professor, he has considerable wit, charm and humor, all of which he projects to TV viewers.

The game itself is a simple wordguessing contest. Originally, the program tended to emphasize quotes from classical plays, little-known titles, etc.

Recently, in an apparent effort to broaden the show's appeal, the panelists have been given easier quotes, some of the pun variety.

Sitting on the panel are Francis Coughlin, Toni Gilman, Carmelita Pope and Robert Breen. The two distaffers have brains as well as beauty, and the male members often surprise with their seeming wealth of knowledge about remote subjects.
