If television dramas keep tossing these psychiatric case histories at us, nobody's going to believe anything anymore. Does George really love Mabel, or is he transferring his affection for his mother to her just because Mabel has dimples just like Mother's? Is Homer a success in business because he has ability, or is he nagged by a success compulsion dating from age six, when no one would buy him the tricycle he wanted.

We got to wondering, for example, why television producers seem to favor basset hounds. Remember Morgan, the basset who appeared on so many shows? That was only the beginning. Lassie now has a full-time basset buddy on his show. And Jackie Cooper's new The People's Choice has a steady basset hound, too.

The basset has draping ears, crooked knees and a voice like a frustrated banshee. His skin is eight sizes too big for his body. Most of all, though, he has sad, sad eyes which, when set below a wrinkled, worried forehead, produce a mournful expression seldom matched by any other animalnot even by an actor having a scene stolen by a basset.

Why do television producers like to have basset hounds on their shows? The dogs are appealing, of course, but our TV psychiatric drama training tells us there must be more to it. Are the producers unhappy in their work and compelled to evidence that unhappiness through a basset hound? Or do they have guilt complexes about all the money they make, and use the bassets to show that despite worldly trappings, producers are really much put-upon creatures?

There's a psychiatric drama here somewhere. There's this TV producer, see? And he's using this sad-eyed basset hound, see? But one day the basset gets a happy look . . .

You take it from there.

NEW YORK Bob Stahl reports:

First live TV pickup from outside the continent occurs Sunday, Nov. 13, when <u>Wide Wide World</u> televises a Cuban music festival from Havana. TV signals will be beamed to an airplane circling midway between Havana and Miami for transmission to the NBC network. It's part of <u>World's</u> "A Sunday with Youth," which includes such features as hot-rod racing at San Fernando, the Boys' Town choir from Nebraska, kids learning to play ice hockey in Toronto.

CBS, incidentally, is planning a similar pickup for Let's Take a Trip and may jump the Havana gun on NBC. . . GARRY MOORE, starting his own talent search, has representatives scouting the country. Those GARRY selects will be on his daytime show for a week and will get New York theater and night club engagements.

Seeking authentic backgrounds, producer WORTHINGTON (TONY) MINER plans to film at least 18 <u>Frontier</u> episodes in Mexico, which he calls "the last unspoiled frontier" . . . And BRODERICK CRAWFORD plans filming his <u>Highway Patrol</u> in at least 20 different states to obtain local color.

BING CROSBY starts rehearsals this week for "High Tor," the <u>Ford Star Jubilee</u> show for next March. It's to be filmed in color -- hence the lengthy shooting schedule . . JEANNIE CARSON will not appear in MAX LIEBMAN'S "Babes in Toyland" Christmas Eve, as scheduled. She'll do the MAURICE CHEVALIER "spectacular" on Sunday, Dec.4. * *

TV's first night parade--Bamberger's, in Newark, N.J. -- set by CBS for Nov. 23, with floats decked in luminous paint and lights . . . Word grapevines back from the Coast that ex-New Yorker JACKIE COOPER is getting the star complex, and that the cast of his TV show, The People's Choice, is unhappy about it.

HOLLYWOOD Dan Jenkins reports:

American Telephone and Telegraph's ambitious series of onehour FRANK CAPRA-produced TV films, in the works for more than three years, is now down to four at the most, possibly only three, to be scheduled as one-shots. Only one film, "Mr. Sun," is complete . . . NBC, happy over <u>The Soldiers'</u> ratings if not its reviews, still looking for someone to replace HAL MARCH.

JOHN WAYNE and VERA MILES will do "Rookie of the Year" for Screen Directors Playhouse, with JOHN FORD directing. WAYNE's son, PAT, will be featured in the title role. . <u>Chain Call</u>, a five-a-week half-hour audience participation show, being prepared for a Jan. 2 start on CBS.

No Sad Sack, He

Television Roie As Master Goidbrick Has Phii Silvers

Jumping With Joy

Phil Silvers has killed them on Broadway and murdered them in burlesque. He has slain them up in the Catskills and strangled them in Hollywood. Now he's out to slaughter us all on TV. He says so himself.

Phil is the star of You'll Never Get Rich, CBS' new situation comedy about a conniving Army sergeant with a heart of goldbrick. You have seen Phil before on TV—in numerous guest spots and in an unlamented variety show a few seasons ago. But, says Phil, let's not talk about that!

"It was one of those things. I—uh like to think of it as a dark chapter in my past which I now consider ended."

Silvers, who is a highly competent, horn-rimmed comedian of 43 with a dome-shaped head and all the brass of a subpoena-server, would much prefer discussing his present show. And he has good reasons. Not since the debut of *The George Gobel Show* last season has a TV comedy program inspired such nip-ups by the critics.

"It's really great," says Silvers modestly. "Now this Sgt. Ernie Bilko (that's me) is a composite picture of all the great goldbrick artists who ever made good in the Army. He's king of the motor pool, lord of the mess hall, scourge of the orderly room. Even the colonel quails before Bilko.

"Bilko is the smoothest operator you've ever seen. He runs poker games, baseball pools and bedmaking contests. He also sells embroidered pillows. He even rents his car at 10 cents a mile—with a group plan available at special rates.

"And not only that," says Phil, warming up, "but this Bilko comes from a distinguished line of Army goldbricks. Why, his great-grandfather, Major Horatio Bilko, sold tickets to fill up the boat when Washington crossed the Delaware. That's why the general had to stand up." The journey from burlesque to Bilko has been a long, but not very agonizing, one for Silvers, who gives the impression that he has enjoyed every step of the way. Born in the tough Brownsville section of Brooklyn in 1912, he grew up in the neighborhood

that spawned the torpedoes of Murder, Inc. "I might have wound up dodging lead," he says, "but I wound up dodging ripe fruit at Minsky's burlesque, instead."

Phil made his "debut" singing with a street gang on the boardwalk at Coney Island at the age of 14. One day a stranger threw him a dime, handed him a business card and said, "Drop around and see me, kid." On the card was the name of Gus Edwards.

Phil didn't know that Edwards' vaudeville act, "The School Days Review," played the famous old Palace Theater. (It produced such stars as Eddie Cantor, George Jessel, Groucho Marx and Ray Bolger.) But he dropped around anyway. Ten continued



days later he was making \$40 a week as one of Edwards' singing newsboys at the Palace—then, the goal of every old trouper.

"I started at the top," says Phil. "And from then on it was down, down, down!"

It wasn't really as bad as all that. No act could play the Palace forever, and after "The School Days Review" completed its run, Phil went on the

road with Edwards. Six months later he was earning \$150 a week as the brat in a vaudeville act. In the depression years he played the borscht circuit in the Catskill Mountains and made his debut in burlesque.

Burlesque comedians in the Thirties were used to fill in the gaps between appearances by the "beauties." But Phil was funny enough to surmount this somewhat discouraging obstacle.

Within a couple of months he had been hit over the head with more rolled-up newspapers than any other comic in burlesque and had dodged a huge crop of ripe fruit. But by this time he had developed a style of comedy that made him unique in his medium. He wore the floppy pants of his contemporaries, but shunned their techniques. To the stock gag-lines of burlesque, he added an odd twist of pseudo-gentility. After loosing a particularly raw joke, he would lean over the footlights and whisper confidentially to his audience: "I learned that one at the Theater Guild."

In burlesque, this was refreshing.

Next stop for Silvers was Broadway. Assigned a small role in the musical "Yokel Boy," he stepped into the lead when the star stepped out. The critics thought he was great. And, from Hollywood, M-G-M beckoned. Phil answered the call.

For months at M-G-M Phil just sat around and cashed his pay check (\$500 a week). Then he was dropped. Called to Republic Pictures, where they were casting the screen version of "Yokel Boy," he was told, "We're looking for a Phil Silvers type—but you're not the type." He wound up playing bellhops, Good Humor men, barkers and "people called Blinky."

In 1945 Silvers toured the Mediterranean war theater with a USO unit. Back home, he got the lead in a Broadway musical, "High Button Shoes." Then came another musical, "Top Banana," in which, prophetically, he played a successful TV alumnus of the burlesque circuits.

And Phil was made.

This brings us practically up to date and back to You'll Never Get Rich. Was it true that Phil kidnaped Nat Hiken from The Martha Raye Show to write and produce the new opus?

"Not guilty," says Phil, his glasses gleaming with righteous indignation. "NBC wasn't quite quick enough to sign up Nat to a new contract. So, somehow, Nat came over to CBS."

How does he feel about competing with Miss Raye, Milton Berle and Bob Hope for the Tuesday night audience?

"I gotta be honest. I'd rather compete with a lecture on polyps. But I think we have a show that will give anyone a battle in the ratings."

Has he any other plans?

"That depends. If all goes well, I may do a couple of spectaculars for CBS. If not—well, maybe you'll come and see me sometimes at Minsky's.

"And if you do, please bring soft fruit. No coconuts."—Frank De Blois

Ralph Edwards Brings An American Program To Britain



Ralph Edwards long ago learned that practically anything can happen on *This Is Your Life*. But he never dreamed what lay ahead when he planned a London telecast to initiate the British version of his show. First the newspapers made a game of discovering the subject (Stanley Matthews, soccer hero), and one told all just 36 hours before the telecast. A new subject (Eamonn Andrews, TV star) was chosen, and, because telephones are scarce, messengers and detectives were dispatched to ferret out the people in his life. Andrews, believing boxer Freddie Mills to be

(from a highbrow magazine critic). At any rate, the British series is successful and the emcee is --Victim No. 1, Eamonn Andrews.

The Girl From Pine Bluff Janette Davis, Loyal To Godfrey, Snaps Back At Arthur's Critics

When she was growing up in Pine Bluff, Ark., Janette Davis was the fattest kid on the block. She weighed 150 pounds and had hips like Bronko Nagurski. And she bit her fingernails.

That's all changed now. Today Janette weighs 110. Her hips are slim and slinky, her nails tapered and **communed**

beautifully groomed. In addition, she is clearly one of the more popular television performers.

This amazing transition began when Janette (aged 12) resolved to take piano lessons in an effort to stop biting her nails. It continued two years later when she moved to Memphis, Tenn., and starred in her own radio show. (Economic conditions forced her to eat somewhat sporadically. Consequently, she lost weight.)

And it was completed in 1946 when, be a quirk of chance, she joined Arthur Godfrey on radio, having moved to New York from other wayside radio stops in Quincy, Ill., Shreveport, La.; Cincinnati, and Chicago.

"How I got on here was a hot one. I had this radio show on CBS every night at 11, and then one day—poofft —they went ahead and sold the time to a sponsor who wanted a news show and there I was back on the network staff just singing to myself with nobody listening. Well, Arthur wanted a singer and they brought him a recording of mine and he liked my voice and put me on the show. Just like that. He never even looked at me before he hired me."

In point of service, Janette is the oldest member of Godfrey's cast. *Friends* may come and *Friends* may go, but Janette remains a fixture.

"And that's the way I want it to be," she avers. "No personal appearance dates for Janette. No flouncin' around the countryside singing in some night club. None of that for me. I'm right happy where I am."

Janette, who has red hair; a friendly, generous-looking smile; a firm and direct manner, and a good loud voice, is intensely loyal to her long-time good friend and employer. And she is bristlingly hostile to his critics.

"What do they gain by knocking Arthur? Why, some of these men, they're big enough to get by on their own instead of picking on Arthur.

"Now, listen here. In all the years I've known Arthur Godfrey, I never once heard him say an unkind thing, or a mean and petty thing to anyone on the air. Now, he might kid a fellow, you know, but well, anybody can kid, can't he, if it's all in fun?"

Janette is likewise almost completely lacking in rapport with the deviationists on Godfrey's own programs, who in the past have dashed off to make outside personal appearances without consulting the summit.

"Listen," she says. "I had plenty of chances to get outside dates. Why, years ago, before Julius La Rosa or any of them ever took an outside date—why, they offered me work in clubs and places like that and I

eyes, Arthur Godfrey can do no wrong.

turned them all down. I said, 'No thank you!' I said, 'I like it here.' I said, 'Listen,' I said, 'I've watched them coming and going and I'll tell you one thing,' I said. 'I'm going to be better off right here singing for Arthur when the rest are in the soup.'"

In Janette's opinion, Godfrey can do no wrong esthetically. She does disapprove, however, of his disregard for his own physical safety. In fact, she worries about him.

"You know what he did the other day—the other week-end, down in Virginia? He fell off a horse, that's what! He fell off a horse and got a black eye! Imagine him on a horse, him with that bad hip he has! And that time we went out to Coney Island on the show—that night he went down those slides. Imagine!

"He's always been that way. And he can do these things better than anyone else on the show. If we have a crack rifle shot on the show, well, nothing to do but Arthur's got to grab a gun and outshoot the rifle expert. And then that time when we all went skating. Well, there was Arthur, him that never had on a pair of skates in his life."

Janette and Godfrey himself are the only *Friends* left from the original cast (*Friends* made its television debut in 1949). It included three other vocalists, Marshall Young, Patti Clayton (who also had her own show, "Waitin' for Clayton") and an Irish tenor named Frank Saunders, whom Godfrey had uncovered tending bar at a restaurant.

"It was a wonderful show. We had nothing, no sponsors, no commercials, no nothing. We had a zero-minus rating. Then, suddenly, we caught fire. People began to realize what a terrific performer Arthur is."

Janette can remember, too, when strife came to Godfreyland. Bill Lawrence, Julius La Rosa, Archie Bleyer, the Chordettes, Marion Marlowe, the Mariners and Haleloke are gone, but Janette remains—steadfast as ever.

How does she explain her ability to survive each crisis on the show?

"Well, it's like this: I grew up with the show. I gradually became part of it. I started making suggestions way back in 1949—and Arthur always has wanted people on the show to make constructive suggestions. Well, when the others got on the show, it already was a big show. There wasn't so much room for suggestions."

Has she any plans for the future? "Future? Look, my future is right here on *Friends*. I like it here. I want to stay. This is what I've worked for all my life. I never thought I'd stay up on top so long. But now I'm gonna stay around just as long as I can sing. They'll have to drag me out of here by the heels."

An Electronic Wonderland

TV Will Be The Fourth Dimension In The World's Largest Building

A television production center right out of the 21st Century is on tap for New York City. And in 1958—they say!

It will include monster cameras suspended from the ceiling, with spiderlike antennae housing microphones and lighting equipment. It will provide 24 huge studios, with carpentry and paint shops, in 24 acres of space.

It's all part of a \$100,000,000 Palace of Progress planned by master showman Billy Rose, to be built atop the Pennsylvania Railroad Station as an international merchandise mart and permanent world's fair. This building—the world's biggest—will actually be an electronic wonderland. And television will be the structure's fourth, or "videal," dimension. TV will handle traffic flow, permit the remote buying and selling of merchandise, exhibit industry's advances, even help locate lost children.

Among television's other uses:

1. A "cinescopic" news hall where wall-size TV screens will carry tele-casts from many points.

2. TV entrance hall, where mammoth TV screens show activities, in various parts of the building. Visitors will push a button and get electronic directions to their destination.

3. A "Remotemobile," a self-contained camera unit, to be driven into any part of the building for spot news coverage.

How To Spend \$1,000,000 A Week



One day last year a TV executive, Frank Cleaver, was telling free-lance producer Don Fedderson about an idea for a giveaway show.

"We call it," he said, "The Million Dollar Question.' All we do is give away the interest on a million dollars each week. What do you think?"

Fedderson, the man who put Liberace on TV, reflected for a moment. "Why just the interest?" he asked. "Why not give away the whole million dollars each week?"

Then and there the idea for *The Millionaire* was born. Since last January the weekly program's mythical millionaire, John Beresford Tipton, has doled out—in fictional dramas more than \$26,000,000. And, says Fedderson, it wasn't easy.

"Finding ways to spend a million dollars a week," he mourns, "is no breeze. We've had to turn down plots by Academy Award writers."

It took some 20 writers to turn out the first 26 scripts, and it will come as no surprise to the show's male fans that the author who proved most adept at spending the green stuff was a woman. Mary C. McCall, Jr., a Hollywood veteran and three-time president of the Screen Writers Guild, wrote seven of the plays, including "The Margaret Browning Story," which has been praised as the best study of Hollywood yet seen on TV.

"The average person, inheriting a million dollars," says Fedderson,

Spender-in-chief Mary C. McCall, Jr., r., confers with actress Joan Vohs. "would blow it or put it in the bank. That's dull. And so we have to dig."

Some of the digging done by Fedderson and his score of writers has unearthed nuggets of nobility:

One young widow spent only \$20 of her million and gave the rest back, when she discovered the prospective stepfather for her young son hated rich women. A Texas cowboy hung diamonds on a New York show girl until he came to his senses, returned to the range and bought a piece of it as a wedding gift for Plain Sue. A burlesque queen who came offstage a millionaire promptly put on her clothes and endowed a college with a \$500.000 scholarship fund. A mental patient who thought Michael Anthony. the man with the check, was just a delusion, repaid the real estate losses over which he had lost his sanity when aspirin didn't dispel his "hallucination."

A miser was induced by his wife to spend \$500,000 in two weeks. A man unjustly condemned to death for murder proved he didn't do it and lived to endow a church for the prison chaplain.

A stenographer went to Europe and fell for a smuggler, but was willing to wait for him to get out of jail. A village ne'er-do-well, suspected of theft, cleared himself by financing the town bank in an emergency.

A few of TV's temporary *nouveaux* riches have proved unworthy of their good luck—but all have managed to see the error of their ways within the 26 minutes allotted them.

There is no indication, as the show resumes on CBS with new stories after a summer season of repeats, that million-dollar gifts won't continue to inspire melodramatic shenanigans. This John Beresford Tipton—his name is a composite of Fedderson's home town, his wife's home town and his lawyer's first name—is loaded.

Frontier

Frontier, one of several new "adult" Western series, eschews the exploits of gun-toting marshals and other popular heroes to concentrate on the more ordinary people who helped settle the West. The result is an absorbing telefilm show, well worth tuning in.

Although Frontier stresses human emotions and psychology, rather than gun duels and "they-went-thataway" chases, it doesn't lack for action. The initial episode, for example, told of a village handyman who was falsely publicized as a vicious gunman by an imaginative newspaper reporter. While the script generated considerable suspense when the psuedo-killer finally challenged a legitimate gunslinger, the writers also tried to delve into the

handyman's mind, to explain why he took his newspaper clippings seriously.

Other scripts have dealt with a bitter woman who hired a gunman to kill her husband's slayer, and with the sons of a cattleman and sheepherder who engineered the settlement of their father's long-time feud. Each script is a complete story, reportedly based on fact, and the characters vary from week to week. The only permanent actor is Walter Cov. who frequently stars but more often is heard only as an off-screen narrator.

Frontier is skilfully produced by Worthington (Tony) Miner, who also supervises Medic. His deft touch is clearly discernible. The actors are good and the scripts tautly written. The sets, costumes and other production trappings have been uniform_ ly excellent.

Navy Log

Like Crusade In Europe and Victory at Sea, Navy Log attempts to tell the story of our Armed Forces. But, unlike the two earlier historical documentaries, Navy Log deals with people. And it does a fine job.

All stories are supposedly based on true-tolife incidents, with embellishments. Though some incidents seem slightly exaggerated, they generally have considerable drama. Programs have ranged from adventures of Navy frogmen to the story of a flier who deliberately crashed his own plane to save a shot-down buddy.

Filmed at sea and at Navy bases throughout the Western Hemisphere, with full cooperation of the Navy Department, the show boasts authentic settings, props and costumes. Its various writers wisely temper the excitement and action with touches of humor. And the actors have been uniformly good, evidencing skill and care on the part of producer and director.—R.S.


He just doesn't understand why

TV is getting to be a snug harbor for a lot of people. Exbandleader RICHARD HIMBER has signed with NBC as a producer; ex-bandleader BERT LOWN now heads up station relations for CBS on the West Coast; ex-movie writer-producer CAREY WILSON has joined CBS to help out with the network's 90-minute color specials; and ex-baseball manager LEO DUROCHER couldn't talk his way past a Burbank studio usher on his first day as an NBC talent relations executive.

Producers of TV film are getting off the color bandwagon for the time being. Too expensive to shoot, and no guaranty as yet as to when film can be aired in color on a regular basis.

WALT DISNEY's new "Corky and White Shadow," with BUDDY EBSEN and Mouseketeer DARLENE GILLESPIE, will be seen in 10 episodes on Mickey Mouse Club, then released as a feature . . . TERRY MOORE, RAYMOND MASSEY and ANN HARDING head the cast of "The Late George Apley," now being filmed for The 20th Century Fox Hour.

WASHINGTON Florence Lowe reports:

One casualty of the President's illness may be his televised news conferences. Network spokesmen say that when MR. EISENHOWER resumes his weekly press conferences, it will be up to his doctors to decide whether the additional equipment, lights and people necessary for the telecasts will be permitted in the meeting.

Possibility that he may bow out as candidate has video networks refiguring convention coverage desperately. With Democratic nomination now a bigger plum, that party's convention, which opens in Chicago Aug. 13, could stretch from anticipated four days to six or seven. Since the Republican convention opens in San Francisco Aug. 20, networks faced tough enough problem moving commentators, engineers and heavy equipment in time. Lengthy Democratic convention would create a nightmare.

Another side effect: San Francisco hasn't enough hotel rooms for the 1500-plus radio and TV newsmen, commentators and technicians now expected--hundreds more than might cover a cut-anddried convention. Some may be billeted 20-30 miles away.

National Association of Radio and Television Broadcasters will fight hard for uniform daylight saving procedure. The annual confusion of different practices wreaks local and national havoc with TV schedules.

Look for another military guest on The \$64,000 Question. An Air Force newsreel photographer stationed at the Pentagon has been approved as a geography expert, but show's producers don't want another uniform so soon after top winner, Captain McCutchen.
