

People who buy those gadgets advertised as "TV commercial silencers" apparently would rather pay for programs themselves than have advertisers continue to foot the bills.

The little devices are really just switches that make it possible to turn off TV sound without budging from a chair. So when a commercial comes on, say the ads, turn it off. These switching arrangements can be made for about a half-dollar by anyone so inclined. The more elaborate ones being sold cost several dollars.

Advertisers pay anywhere from \$25,-000 to \$300,000 per network show to entertain or inform you. In a one-hour show, they are permitted six minutes of advertising. They are willing to pay all that money because the audience listens to their commercials.

If enough of the audience tunes out the commercials, the sponsors no longer will find television advertising profitable. Without sponsors, television as it is now could not exist. Some way to make the viewers pay for their programs would have to be adopted. Or there would be no more good, expensive shows.

Shortsighted is the politest word we can think of to describe people who buy the commercial silencing devices. Ridiculous is a more accurate description. They are cutting off their noses to spite their faces, killing the goose that lays the golden eggs and biting the hand that feeds them.

A number of commercials are annoying, and some are downright painful. Generally speaking, though, advertisers' sales messages are easy to take—a lot easier to take than a bill for a quarter or a dollar every time you switch on your set.

There may be a place for pay-asyou-see television, but if it comes we'd like to see it as *part* of television—not as the whole darned thing.

He'll produce and star in "Mardi Gras" for a CBS "special," recreating his familiar comedy characterizations. And he's talking with BUDD SCHULBERG and ELIA KAZAN about starring in a movie version of SCHULBERG's "Arkansas Traveler," story of a comedian. All this. of course, in addition to The Honeymooners and Stage Show.

The Spectacular Mr. Disney

His Television Plans Are As Grandiose
As Imagination And \$6,000,000 Can Make Them

Walt Disney, whose gray hairs are beginning to show but whose enthusiasm remains undiminished, slid into a chair in the Disney studio commissary, scratched his chin and considered for a moment what he had learned about TV since he got himself into it just a year ago.

"Well," he said cautiously, "I didn't know what I was doing then and I still don't. All I know is, after about three weeks the thought

suddenly struck me that I was in this thing and couldn't back out."

The remark typifies the surface naivety of a man who is as sharp as a Disney-created fox but who takes pains to appear as a grown-up kid getting a boot out of the circus. It might be added that he hands the circus ticket to himself with his left hand and takes it with his right. And when no one was looking he calmly led off the rush of the formerly aloof movie studios into television.

Disney himself is still far in the lead of the parade. In continued

addition to 26 entirely new hour-long Disneyland shows, each of which will be shown twice during the new October-to-October year, his bustling studio will take to the air this week with the first of a brand new film series—the hour-long, five-a-week Mickey Mouse Club.

"Why, we'll be turning out 126 hours of film for these two shows,"

ing from a "Meet The . . ." series (animal champions, wild horse roundup, shark hunt, elephant hunters, skin divers) to a "What I Want To Be" series (airline pilot, airline stewardess). Then there's the "This Is You" series, explaining the human animal and the five senses. Another series, called "I'm No Fool," headed by Jiminy Cricket, will be devoted to safety lessons involving bicycling, swimming, fire, traffic and vacation hazards. "Spin and

Disney exclaims, with an air of just hearing the figures himself for the first time. "You break that down and it's the equivalent in footage of 84 feature pictures. That's a lot of film!"

The Mickey Mouse Club, Disney's current pet project, will be presided over by the Mouse himself, but each day's show actually will consist of four separate 15-minute segments. Like a deck of cards, the 400 quarter-hour segments will be shuffled and reshuffled so that no two shows will ever be just alike. The 100 hours of film are skilfully woven into 260 hours of actual air time.

Basically, the Mickey Mouse Club will involve 21 separate projects, rangMarty," the story of two boys living on a ranch, will be another segment.

A group of 24 kids, 12 boys and 12 girls, will be presented as "The Mouseketeers" in a daily quarter-hour segment. Ranging in age from 8 to 15, they are perhaps best described as a modern-day "Our Gang." They will do a series of variety acts both with and without guest stars and visiting amateurs.

Two basic features of the Club will be the "Mickey Mouse Newsreel," which will occupy the first 15 minutes three days a week, and a daily "Mickey Mouse" cartoon dating from as far back as 1929 up to 1949. Disney has no fewer than 50 newsreel cameramen covering some 400 assignments all over the world, ranging from junior road tests in Los Angeles to a mobile clinic for animals in Africa.

All these things cost money, of course. Even Disney is amazed that his investment in TV to date is an estimated \$6,000,000. When it was suggested to him that TV itself couldn't begin to repay him this amount, he waggled his eyebrows expressively and remarked, "You know, I've often thought about that myself." The money, of course, will have to be recouped through theatrical release, most of it in the foreign market.

Two years of Disneyland alone have cost almost \$4,500,000, with another \$1,125,000 now being spent on the Mickey Mouse Club. Nearly \$500,000 went into new buildings and equipment, including a soundstage, two scene docks, a service building, an

electric and machine shop, refurbishings for three sound recording stages, new film cutting and storage rooms.

Disney also now has 70 live actors

under contract (he had none before TV), plus 10 additional directors and 11 new cameramen. His payroll has risen in two years from 682 to 1209.

Not included in the estimated \$6,-000,000 Disney has poured into TV are the impossible-to-figure millions he has lost by turning this kind of talent loose on TV rather than devoting it to the far richer mine known as the theatrical box office—a source which Disney is not neglecting altogether, for he has 24 motion pictures scheduled for production over the next five years.

Disney has no immediate plans to use the new Disneyland Park as any extensive base for his TV operation, "although we will do one or two brief Disneyland episodes out there—a trip through 'Adventureland' and part of the 'Story of Trains.'"

"Davy Crockett," however, is about through. Disney is frank to admit that he had no idea Davy would catch on as he did, nor is he at all certain how much longer the craze will last. "We've finished two more hour-long Crockett films for this year's Disneyland," he says, "but I think we'll wait and see what happens before we go ahead with any more. Meanwhile, we're going to put Fess Parker into a feature picture for a change of pace." That will be "The Great Locomotive Race," filmed in CinemaScope.

Disney is cautious about commenting on the sudden stampede of his major studio colleagues into TV, all of them apparently bent on cashing in on Disney's own formula of using TV to trailerize motion pictures.

"Anyone going into this thing," he says carefully, "must give to the TV audience the very best entertainment he can. After all—and it's important to remember this—the TV audience and the movie audience are the same."

Disney should know.

A Jaundiced Look At Television

Henry Morgan is no Pinky Lee, but he is a comic. He has lost more jobs than most people ever get. At this writing (you've got to hedge with Morgan) he's a panelist on TV's I've Got a Secret and a TV reviewer for "Monitor," NBC's radio weekend. Examples of his honeyed words on "Monitor":



Good evening, anybody. Here's Morgan with a jaundiced eye view of the TV scene, or what I seen of it. . .

I saw Rin Tin Tin for the first time. . . . He appears in a lot of the scenes—barks and runs. It's a good, solid performance, though I doubt he'll get an award . . . I won't bother you with the entire thrilling story, but it ends with Rin Tin Tin sort of hanging his tongue out. He did that part quite well.

There was a movie about the native tribe and the white princess. It starred Jon Hall, but I kept watching the white princess. . . The highlight of the picture, I thought, was when the white girl is walking on a bed of hot coals while the natives stand around waving their spears and yelling. Hidden off to one side are the mighty white hunters. One of them, Bob, is in love with the princess, who's been kidnaped and whose name is Anne. One hunter turns to Bob and says, "Let's come back later, after the natives are tired out." "All right," says Bob, "but somehow I don't feel right about leaving Anne like this." I was on his side.

There's a program with all the dance bands in the world. I don't mind listening to dance bands, but I don't get much out of staring at them. I looked in on Life Begins at 80 and I got a sudden chill, like. I realized what's wrong with the show. Everybody on it—that is, all the old folks—are playing old folks. That is, instead of being natural and charming, they say things like "My wife has

been a millstone around my neck for 60 years." And the wife will say, "Wait till I get you home, you old scarecrow." They spend most of their time insulting one another.

Art Linkletter's program, People Are Funny, doesn't prove that they're funny, just that people are people. It's a comforting sort of show, because nobody is made a fool of, nobody yells and screams about what little devils they are, and nobody has a problem that we should all cry about. One man was sent to rob a jewelry store, one lady had to make an elephant remember her, one man had to send a telegram while he was being drowned. Just an ordinary, quiet, Sunday afternoon kind of show.

There was a program called—some kind of club, I think it was. It opened with a girl sitting at a table in a kind of restaurant or something. An invisible hand put a necklace on her, put a flower on her, gave her some spending money, and you heard a voice saying, "A pretty girl, flowers, perfume . . ." And then a man walked into the picture and said, "Hi there." He said it just as though he were in your very own living room. Then he introduced the people in the restaurant—and every one was somebody too important to come to your house.

For example he had wealthy Mr. and Mrs. Ichabod Flang. She is the former Elsie Buttonweiser and he's the former Mr. Flang. The host said that Mr. Flang had a lot of money. Seated next to the Flangs was the former Mrs. Avery Excerpt Middling, who was married to wealthy Tyler Excerpt up to the time he ran out of cabbage . . . Seated next to her was Mr. Clockhead Vingbar, the well-known pumping station executive.

Incidentally, I've watched this show and they always introduced a number of "well-known executives." But they're not well-known to me, and it makes me feel like a peasant.

Anyway, the host, if that's what he is, then introduced his 10-year-old daughter. Her name is Chowmein. Well, he's in the restaurant business,

so it's logical. Well, Chowmein danced with a couple of fellas and then she was interviewed by four models. Girl models. They asked Chowmein what her favorite TV show was, how she liked Davy Crockett, stuff like that. It was pretty exciting.

By the way, on this same program they would tell you what the wealthy people in the restaurant were eating.

I'm not kidding. As the camera moved around, the announcer said things like "There is the wealthy Mr. Parck-chester Finbam. Mr. Finbam is having franks and beans. He likes his beans crisp. And over here is Mrs. Olivette Highstoop, having owls' necks diced into champagne." It made you want to run right over to that restaurant, but after seeing the elegant trade they get, you knew you'd feel like a crumb—"And they wouldn't let a bum like me in anyway," you figured—so you stayed home instead.

Once the models were modeling raincoats. One was mink-lined. And one they called a trenchcoat. It really was a trenchcoat, too—there were two soldiers in it.

SIGNALS

Perhaps you can't tell the players without a program, but one thing's sure—you have even less chance of understanding what's happening during football games, now being widely televised, unless you know the signals used by the officials. Most college and professional signals are the same. But some vary. Here are some you'll see often, with the variations.



Offside or free kick violation: hands are placed on the hips.

Unsportsmanlike conduct: arms out, with palms down.

Personal foul: professional signal, striking wrist above head; college signal (blue cap) is waving one arm up and down.





Holding or illegal use of hands, arms: professional signal, grasping wrist at chest level; college (blue cap), striking wrist.

Illegal forward pass: waving hand up and down behind back.

Penalty refused, incomplete pass or no goal: shifting arms.



Time-out: crisscross movement of hands over head.



Forward pass interference: arms pushed out from chest.



Illegal position or procedure: wrists are twirled around.



Touchdown or field goal: arms raised high over the head.

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Psychiatrists Explain Why
TV Audiences Revei In Gleason's
Battle Of The Sexes On TV

The big, fat, bug-eyed fellow walked purposefully across the dingy room and shook his fist under the nose of the redheaded girl.

"Alice," he said. "Alice, I'm gonna

belt you one!"

Defiantly, the girl stepped up as close to him as she could without bumping into his stomach. This maneuver left them about a yard apart at shoulder level.

"Oh, you are, are you?" she asked, in a voice a fraction of a decibel below a screech. "Well, go ahead and belt me, Ralph."

She extended an inviting chin. The fat fellow began to make low animal cries. But he didn't swing. Instead, he looked at his fist pleadingly, then shrugged and swaggered away.

"One of these days, Alice," he mut-

tered. "One of these days. . ."

Scenes like this one between Jackie Gleason and Audrey continued

Meadows in *The Honeymooners*, which tonight (Saturday) makes its bow on CBS in its new half-hour film version, apparently had a compelling appeal for their 45,000,000 TV followers last season. At least, that's what their fan mail indicated.

Why? Well, for one thing, viewers apparently keep dialing in to find out whether Ralph actually will crank up and let Alice have one "Pow! right in the kisser!" Male viewers in particular seem to get a vicarious satisfaction out of watching a man prepare to clobber his spouse. As for their wives, well, they just love to watch Alice make Ralph Kramden sizzle.

According to Mrs. Ruth Wassell, the chief psychiatric social worker at the University Settlement House, New York Psychiatric Clinic, this is a classic example of an expression of animal impulses to which many of us sometimes regress. These impulses are rarely carried out, but they are present nevertheless.

A prominent psychiatrist holds that imbedded deeply in the consciousness is the idea that wives are all-powerful and that husbands are mere pawns. Men subconsciously resent this state of affairs and, quite naturally, are delighted when Ralph Kramden threatens to release the pent-up hostility of his sex. Wives, on the other hand, are secretly delighted at what they interpret as visual proof of their superiority in the age-old war between men and women.

This is a war that has been going on for some time. Delilah won a skirmish for her side when she gave Samson a haircut. Othello evened the score when he wiped up the bedroom floor with Desdemona. In "The Taming of the Shrew," we observed a woman brought to heel by her husband, and in "The Agamemnon" Queen Clytemnestra won the main

event by entangling the man of the house in the living room drapes.

"The aggressive reaction of the male to female domination," the psychiatrist says, "is, of course, symbolic rather than actual. No decent fellow really wants to hit his wife—he is indeed horrified by the thought—but in the average male heart is the desire to be supreme in the family circle."

The good doctor believes that *The Honeymooners* would never be popular in France, Germany, Italy, Scandinavia, or the Baltic States, where the man already is the undisputed boss of the home.

Apparently it is chiefly in the U.S., where women customarily occupy an equal (and sometimes superior) position, that the revolt of the male is a suitable subject for humor. The psychiatrist thinks that the American male has a feeling he is being submerged by his mate and that he re-

cognizes his own submersion in Ralph Kramden's comic exasperation.

(Somehow, doctor, it doesn't seem so funny when you put it that way!) Now back to Mrs. Wassell, who is a Gleason fan herself. The appeal of *The Honeymooners*, she believes, exemplifies the expression of primitive instincts, as in the case of the very young child who, "to

assert himself in an adult's terrifying world, hits, bites and scratches those he loves most dearly and yet expects continued acceptance and love in spite of this behavior."

Basically, Gleason's own analysis of the popularity of *The Honeymooners* agrees with that of the psychiatrists.

"I wonder if many a husband doesn't feel the same way Ralph does when Alice puts one over on him," says Jackie. "It's an evidence of the simple frustrations and suppressions we all have. And it's funny because, knowing Ralph's character, we realize Ralph really won't hit her at all."

Well, there you have it. Now you know exactly why you're supposed to start laughing the next time Ralph Kramden talks like this to his wife:

"This is the day! Today! This is the day you're gonna get yours, Alice!"

Ralph and Alice Kramden, it appears, are just doing what comes naturally.—Frank De Blois

PROGRAM OF THE WEEK

The understandable attempts of Guild Films to duplicate the success of its top star, Liberace, have thus far fallen somewhat short of the mark.

Whether it's Liberace's wavy hair, shining teeth or flying fingers is hard to say; but the fact remains that neither of Guild's other two musical entries, Florian ZaBach or Frankie Laine, has begun to make anything like the overwhelming impression the unique piano player has created on the viewing public.

Laine, of course, was a personality in his own right long before Liberace came on the scene. As a club singer and recording artist, he was firmly established among the leading suddenswoon boys. It thus seemed logical that he could reach more people and cause more swooning on a TV filmed series.

Fortunately or unfortunately, depending on how one chooses to look at such things, it hasn't worked out that way.

Laine's film shows are bulwarked by the presence of Connie Haines on a permanent basis and a series of guest acts, including, at one time or another, magicians, a troupe of Scottish dancers, the Mitchell Boys Choir and other similar attractions. Laine and Miss Haines take turns being somewhat coy with one another, and the whole thing comes across in a rather heavy-handed manner.

Laine, too, has a way of grimacing strenuously while singing, a feature which does not add particularly to the desirability of his presence in one's living room.—D.J.

Andy's Gang

Andy's Gang, successor to Smilin' Ed's Gang, is a strange mixture of good and bad programming for children. On the good side are a series of adventure stories filmed in India and a trained cat and mouse. Not so good are occasional lapses of judgment in the filmed stories and overly emphatic commercials. But youngsters will like the show.

Andy Devine, like his predecessor, the late Ed McConnell, is a genial but hard-selling host. Devine, who has already established his following among juvenile TV viewers as Jingles, Guy Madison's sidekick on the Wild Bill Hickok show, introduces each week's film story, dealing with a young Indian elephant trainer (Nino Marcel) and his friend (Vito Scotti.) The on-location shots of India un-

doubtedly contain much of educational value; but it's disconcerting at times to think of kids' watching an enraged elephant pick up a man, dash him to the ground and then step on him.

After the story, Devine usually trots out his trained animals, which perform nicely on cue, and an animated puppet in the guise of a frog.—R.S.

Daughter of the 'Bride'

EX-BALLERINA FRANCES RAFFERTY NOW KICKS UP HEELS IN COMEDY



Back around 1940, the program for the summer ballet season at the Hollywood Bowl was loaded, as usual, with the unpronounceable Russian names generally associated with the art. At the tag end of the billing, however, appeared an incongruous credit line: "Featured dancers—Smith & Rafferty."

"It sounded for all the world like songs, dances and funny sayings," the Rafferty half of the team says today, "but it was dead serious business at the time. Even if we were only 15." (The Smith half was Alexis Smith, since turned dramatic actress.)

Frances Rafferty, better-known to viewers as Spring Byington's daughter in *December Bride*, which returns to CBS Monday night, has also turned dramatic actress. The reason: Her second season with the ballet she went into an overly ambitious leap and broke her kneecap. "You," said the doctors, "will never dance again. Or, at least, not for 18 months."

That about marked the end of any serious ambitions on the part of the Iowa-born, Los Angeles-reared Miss Rafferty, who had given up a college education to become a ballerina. Everything since then has been simply a matter of personal "kicks," rather than serious leaps.

It was Alexis Smith, still her oldest and closest friend, who persuaded Frances to study dramatics with the late Madame Ouspenskaya after the broken kneecap had also broken the ballerina bubble; and it was Madame Ouspenskaya who got her an M-G-M screen test in 1942.

"Everybody at M-G-M saw the test and nobody liked it," Frances remembers. "So I went over to Fox and did one there. Nobody liked that one, either, and they sent it around to the other studios, such being the friendly little custom. It finally reached M-G-M, and guess who signed me when they saw it?"

In five years Frances appeared in 34 M-G-M films, most of which she says were "walk-ons, bits, yesses and noes," although she did have three leads opposite Wallace Beery and one with Edward Arnold. Then,

all of a sudden, Frances was fired. "Why," she recently asked former M-G-M casting director Billy Grady now with CBS, "did they throw me out of there after all those pictures?"

"Because," Grady replied, "nobody around there really thought you cared

one way or another."

She didn't, as a matter of fact. "I just thought every part I got was real peachy keen," she says, "and what a lucky break and isn't this fun. Apparently they didn't want any of the fun-loving Rovers over there."

After a few free-lance pictures, the fun-loving Miss Rafferty chucked it all out the window in 1948 to marry Tom Baker, an aircraft executive lately doubling as a TV writer, and stayed home for four years.

"But in 1952," she remembers, "Tom decided I should go back to work. He told me I was getting dull, that all I could talk about was children (Kevin, now 5, and Bridget, 3) and that I was a lousy cook anyway.

"Just like that," she says, "I was up to my neck in 37 different TV film shows." Several got nowhere. But one, December Bride, proved one of last season's few successful new situation comedies. It's doing just fine—and so is Frances.




Look for lots more television in the Presidential campaign. Both parties already are scrambling to pre-empt top-rated time periods, especially for closing weeks . . . GOP National Chairman LEONARD HALL calls video "the No. l political campaign medium," adding, "You've got to have a candidate who's good on TV."

During the current Congressional recess from Washington, members have been deluging constituents with television "Reports to the People." The Congressional radio-TV studio here has turned out more of the filmed "reports" than ever before.

Democrats prepared a master TV film called "Majority Report to the People," on the record of the Democratic-controlled 84th Congress. Party's legislative leaders are featured, with individual members adding remarks for local consumption. Republicans did a similar job on the 83rd Congress, which they controlled.

Youth Wants to Know will travel more this year. General Dynamics, the sponsor, wants the bright youngsters to originate from atomic centers. In the works are appearances at Brookhaven National Laboratory, Long Island; the Reactor Center at Penn State; and Lovelace Institute in Albuquerque, N.M.
