Reader reaction to our editorial on those gadgets that silence commercials was prompt—and rather heated. We had pointed out that if enough viewers tuned out commercials, sponsors soon would find their investments in expensive TV shows a waste of money, and programs would deteriorate.

The letters we received argued that viewers, too, have an investment in television—the price they paid for their sets. And that investment, the letters said, gives viewers a perfect right to skip any sales pitch that bores, irks, bothers or otherwise grates on their nerves.

Which commercials are annoying? Our readers complained most about those that are loud, obviously louder than the entertainment portion of the program. They didn't like repetitious commercials, the same ones shown over and over again, drumming the same sponsor's message into viewers' ears and eyes.

They objected to the hard-sell pitchmen, the fellows with the excited voices and the pointing fingers and the tremendous bargains. And some readers indicated that the men in white coats irritated them.

Most commercials, our readers said, are easy to take—even enjoyable. But they insisted that they would continue to reserve the right to tune down anything that bothers them.

While we still deplore use of commercial silencers, we must admit that our readers' arguments make good sense. Perhaps the stations and networks should take steps to see to it that viewers aren't induced, by annoying commercials, to buy commercial silencers.

NEW YORK Bob Stahl reports:

Considerable speculation about why Pontiac decided to check out as sponsor of NBC's "telementary" series, Project 20, with some guessing the auto company felt it unwise to be associated with the first in the series, "Nightmare in Red"--even though the show is anti-Communist . . . NBC already has another sponsor, with "Nightmare" now scheduled for sometime in January.

New TV trend: Except for The \$64,000 Question in the lead position, the shows in the latest (September) Nielsen Top 10 list are all 60 minutes or longer. Line-up includes: the JUDY GARLAND show, ED SULLIVAN, MARTHA RAYE, Disneyland, Variety Hour, Robert Montgomery Presents, Producers' Showcase, Climax! and PERRY COMO:

ERNIE KOVACS may get his own NBC show as a result of his fine work as replacement for STEVE ALLEN recently on Tonight . . . CBS wants comedian JOHNNY CARSON to originate several of his shows from New York this month. Feels it's one way to help him build a bigger rating in the East.

HARRY BELAFONTE will star on G.E. Theater in BUDD SCHULBERG's "Formula Fighter," adapted by BILL ATTAWAY . . . TV's GORE VIDAL signed to adapt "Captain Dreyfus," new bestseller, for an M-G-M movie. . VIDAL's "Visitor from a Small Planet," on TV Playhouse last season, set for Broadway, with CYRIL RITCHARD repeating his lead role.

As one of his first official acts for NBC, LEO DUROCHER will do the color commentary for the Cotton Bowl football game on New Year's Day . . . Both the Cotton Bowl and Rose Bowl games scheduled for colorcasting that day . . . NBC will carry baseball's "Game of the Week" next season, instead of CBS.

THELMA RITTER flew to Hollywood to star in "The Late Christopher Bean" for 20th Century-Fox Hour. HELEN HAYES played the role on live TV about five years ago on the old Pulitzer Prize Playhouse.

New York City Ballet Company's production of "Nutcracker Suite" scheduled as an NBC "spectacular" during Christmas week . . . And "Richard III," the SIR LAURENCE OLIVIER movie, now pushed back to next March . . . VANESSA BROWN, of My Favorite Husband, has launched Vanessa Productions to film theatrical movies. She plans to star in "Moll Flanders" as her first.

VIVIAN BLAINE stars in "Dream Girl" as MAURICE EVANS' "spectacular" on Sunday, Dec. 11 . . . "The Corn Is Green," scheduled for that date, postponed to January . . . EVANS to produce and star in a two-hour version of Shakespeare's "Antony and Cleopatra" in March.

How Quiz And Panel Shows Conduct 'Operation Hush'

Ben Feit is a television personality with only one thing to say on the air. It's a short speech, and Feit, who is also a vice president of New York's Manufacturers Trust Co., has memorized it perfectly. He makes it whenever the \$1000 plateau is reached on The \$64,000 Quest on. It goes like this:

"All questions come from the locked vaults of Manufacturers Trust.... Manufacturers Trust guarantees that only authorized members of the bank have the keys and combinations of the vault... And except for the editors, no one has seen these questions.... Not Mr. (Hal) March.... Not even myself."

Feit's little speech emphasizes the

precautions taken by the producers of America's most talked-about television program to guard against question-snatchers, answer-snatchers, reporters and other pests.

Here's precisely how the show's

"Operation Hush" works:

After leaping Minerva-like from the fertile brain of college professor Dr. Bergen Evans, a typical question is okayed by executive producer Steve Carlin and associate producer Mert Koplin, sealed in a box, rushed to the bank and locked in a vault. There it moulders until the night of the broadcast, when Feit and an associate (plus two stalwart bank guards) unlock the vault, remove the sealed box, skulk through the streets of Manhattan in a taxi and arrive at CBS Studio 52 on West 54th St. just before the show.

When a contestant enters the show's sealed, soundproofed wood-and-glass "isolation booth," all he can hear is the voice of Hal March; all he can see is March's face.

So far, the elaborate secrecy system has worked—despite the public's untiring efforts to help Patrolman Redmond O'Hanlon on Shakespeare, Gino Prato on opera, Gloria Lockerman on spelling and Capt. Richard McCutchen on cooking.

Older quiz and panel shows take precautions, too—and have had security headaches aplenty.

I've Got a Secret, for instance, is constantly faced with the problem of hiding all kinds of things from its panelists. In the past the show's associate producer, Allan Sherman, has been called on to conceal items as sizeable as the 69th Regiment's band.

"On one show," says Sherman, "we hid George Gobel in a broom closet and an elephant in a big cold-storage vault. We thawed out the elephant in plenty of time for the program, but at the last minute we discovered that nobody knew just where

Gobel was. We found him, sitting in there among the mops, just in the nick of time."

Sherman's best-laid schemes gang aft a-gley. One guest on the show was a man whose "secret" was that he had two squirrels in his pocket. Sherman's preliminary security precautions had kept the panel completely in the dark; no one even came close to the lively secret. At the triumphant moment, unfortunately, the two squirrels jumped out of the pocket and scampered into full view.

"Ever since that terrible night," says Sherman, "we figure nothing can bother us!"

Frances Trocaine, program manager and general security agent for What's My Line?, has problems, too. To keep the show's panelists from being tipped off, Miss continued

Trocaine fights a week-long battle to dissuade scheduled guests from blabbing to friends.

In addition, Miss Trocaine goes to great lengths to hide the show's weekly celebrity. On Sunday evening, she locks the celebrity in the control room until the panel is safely on stage, then spirits him out through an alley and backstage.

"I can now cover the distance," she says proudly, "in three minutes flat."

Miss Trocaine reached the Mt. Everest of her career as a concealer the night Francis the Talking Mule was the celebrity guest. To baffle the blindfolded panel, Miss Trocaine wrapped the mule's hooves in burlap.

It was a triumph of deception—but it failed.

"The wind shifted," she recalls somewhat ruefully, "and gave poor Francis away."

Masquerade Party's associate producer, Keith Taylor, is charged with keeping the show's "mystery guests" hidden before—and after—programs. When a guest remains unidentified at the end of a show, he must be kept under wraps until the following week. This means he must be concealed somewhere in the theater until the panel, the theater audience and the fans outside all go away. Sometimes Taylor and the guest sit around in the empty theater playing gin rummy for hours until the coast is clear.

Once when a gang of teen-agers in a hot rod spotted his mystery guest, blonde Mary Hartline, bouncing along in the back seat of a taxi, and gave chase, Taylor desperately clamped his hat over Mary's face and, leaning out the window, shooed away the pursuers.

Taylor lives in secret dread of well-meaning friends of the panelists. "One night some doorman watched me sneak the mystery guest into a cab," he recalls. "So he sat down and wrote a nice little letter to panelist Dagmar: 'Dear Dag, I saw your mystery guest. It's Zsa Zsa Gabor.'"

Fortunately, the letter was addressed to the network. Taylor discovered it and, he claims, soaked it in oil and burned it over a brazier.

"I like to make a little ceremony of things like that," he grins. "Keeps me from blowing my stack completely."—Frank De Blois Art Linkletter, who boasts of his way with children, found himself playing Ring-Around-A-Mommy on House Party recently, when he tried to quiz Mark Harmon, 4—son of film star Elyse Knox and football "great" Tom Harmon—about his California togs.

In recent weeks Jack Paar, who usually traffics in jokes and witty sayings as emcee of CBS' Jack Paar Show, has revived a bit of mysticism that was a favorite on his Morning Show.

With the help of mumbo-jumbo and a swami hat, Jack has been reaping loud "Oh!"s and "Ah!"s—and even an occasional "Wow!"—for a mind-reading routine that goes like this:

A member of the studio audience is invited to choose one of several books, page through it, select any line at random, and concentrate on it. Paar concentrates, too—and comes up with the same line, word for word!

Paar reports that the stunt has inspired more mail from viewers than anything else he has presented on his variety programs. Many would-be mind-readers have tried to persuade him to divulge the secret, but he has steadfastly refused. Until now.

Observes an associate on his weekday show: "It's such an amazingly simple trick, anybody can do it. All you need is your own TV studio."

■ Eureka! He has it! And the comedian writes out on blackboard, word for word, the line chosen by mystified Mrs. Olson.



Miranda's session with Jimmy Durante . . . Leonard Bernstein's articulate treatise on jazz on Omnibus was the finest explanation of this form of music that I've ever heard and it should be in-

corporated in every text book and curriculum . . . All I could think of after watching William Saroyan's "A Midsummer Daydream" on the Screen Directors Playhouse was that William Saroyan simply talks too much. Some of his talk was good but my ears got tired . . . Little Cecil Kellaway was simply adorable as the quaint and cunning forger of "Private History" on Studio One, and the show itself was altogether winning. Although the Jerome Ross script may not have been of Pulitzer Prize calibre, at least it was bright and light, and a pleasant relief from the down-beat dramatic fare TV seems to be concentrating on of late . . . Sid Caesar going through the motions of playing "The Grieg Concerto" (while Pittsburgh boy Earl Wild was actually at the piano) left me limp with laughter.

Jackie Gleason hasn't even come close to hitting the bull's-eye so far this season, and I find myself invariably switching back to Perry Como . . . I'd have preferred if Mary Martin and Noel Coward

hadn't kept reminding me that "Ninety Minutes Is a Long, Long Time." They're both skilled entertainers and their "Together with Music" was a show laden with goodies, but I must confess that an hour and a half was just a little too long.

I'm afraid Maurice Evans' production of "Alice in Wonderland" didn't quite catch the spirit of Lewis Carroll's classic. The charms were scattered and the whole thing never caught fire . . . Any more story-lines for Milton Berle like "State of Confusion" and I'll buy back my introduction to him . . . That second-year jinx may be latching on to George Gobel, too. My enthusiasm for him has been waning the past few Saturday nights, and I can't understand how the sparkle has evaporated almost overnight. Lonesome George may be in for a cold and lonesome winter if the writing doesn't improve quickly . . . Caught a good one on the TV Reader's Digest series called "Child Pioneer," which featured a gang of youngsters, and I've come to the conclusion that there simply isn't any such thing as a bad kid actor these days.





Those Army And Navy Scenes On TV Are By Courtesy Of The Pentagon

When you see a battle on your television screen, or a story set at a military base or aboard a battleship or in a submarine, it's likely they're strictly GI-Government Issue.

The United States Department of Defense has gone all out in offering cooperation to television producers.

The Pentagon believes that when it helps achieve authenticity in a TV show, the public gets a more accurate picture of military life; the morale of members of the Armed Forces is improved, and unfavorable portrayals of the Army, Navy and Air Force are eliminated. All this, in turn, helps the long-range objective of stimulating recruiting.

The cooperation, of course, is saving the producers of filmed TV shows many thousands of dollars and gives them that prestige-adding line, "Produced with the cooperation of the Department of Defense."

The Department of Defense's assistance takes many forms:

Use of official Armed Services films. Permission to film TV stories "on location."

Technical advice from military experts-from checking the decorations on a uniform to setting up a battle formation.

Rarely, even the use of military cameramen to film specialized scenes.

Cooperation is extended equally to programs stressing fact and fiction. whether entirely military in theme or only partly so. In any event, the TV producers follow their own story line,

use their own actors and cameramen.

Medic recently made "World So High." based on the experiences of Air Force Surgeon William R. Lovelace, who parachuted from over 40 .-000 feet to test effects of altitude on the human system. Most of "World So High" was made by Medic cameramen and actors at March Air Force base in California. But some was Air Force film of the actual tests.

Louis F. Edelman, producer of the Danny Thomas show, Make Room for Daddy, is preparing a new series, It's a Great Country, which sometimes will utilize service backgrounds.



Typical of the all-military series made with Department of Defense aid is *Uncommon Valor*, already released on the West Coast and ready for national distribution. Using both professional actors and Marine Corps war films, it uses factual material narrated by retired Gen. Holland M. ("Howlin' Mad") Smith, USMC.

Most ambitious of all the cooperation projects is CBS' Navy Log, which was in preparation over a year and a half before its premiere. Dramatizing real-life exploits of Navy personnel, it is acted by a professional cast, but calls for very extensive Navy cooperation.

Many other series are in preparation. One, Skip Taylor—Air Force Cadet, a fictional adventure series, is being filmed by the producer of Terry and the Pirates.

Aero Jet Corp. is making 26 half-hour films under the title On Guard—an informative, dramatic review of current military developments and activities, from guided missiles to the service academies.

Rear Admiral Thomas Dykers, USN retired, has made a pilot film for *The Silent Service*, a proposed series on submarine warfare in World War II.

More than a dozen additional projects are in the preliminary stage. Among them: a series about Congressional Medal of Honor winners, and one based on a book about Gen. George Patton's 3rd Army, "Lucky Forward."—Herman A. Lowe

Warner Bros. Presents

The Hollywood studios may know how to turn out movies for theaters, but Warner Brothers, for one, still has much to learn about producing movies for TV. ABC's hour-long Warner Bros. Presents is no better than most of the half-hour telefilm dramas turned out regularly in Hollywood. It is well-produced and competently acted, but the producers seem to have forgotten that the play's still the thing.

The program consists of three series, run on an every-third-week schedule. These are based on—and bear the titles of—past Warner hits: "Kings Row," "Cheyenne" and "Casablanca."

The "Kings Row" regulars—Jack Kelly, Nan Leslie, Robert Horton and Victor Jory—are good in soap operaish stories about a young psychiatrist struggling against the superstitions and tradition-bound medical practices of a small town in the early 1900's. Clint Walker, as "Cheyenne," and L. Q. Jones, as his sidekick, get into standard scrapes with bad guys, Indians and cattle rustlers in a rather immature Western. Charles McGraw, as an American adventurer in "Casablanca," seldom has a chance against heavily written scripts.

Each film reflects a lavish budget and technical skill. The same cannot be said for the quality of scripts.

Actor Gig Young, a personable host, serves as guide on the studio tours that wind up each week's show. Some behind-the-scenes techniques are engrossing. But Young's interviews with Warner stars would be more interesting if they weren't such blatant commercials for new movies.

M-G-M Parade

this season, Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer took the easiest way out—and, surprisingly, may have come up with the most entertaining show. Where other movie company programs use films shot especially for TV, ABC's M-G-M Parade relies on clips from hit movies of the past and short subjects culled from the M-G-M files. These are combined with preview scenes from new movies and the result is a nostalgic half-hour.

Most viewers have fond recollections of old movies. So they can get a sentimental kick from seeing once more such bits as a 12-year-old Judy Garland singing "You Made Me Love You," the late Lionel Barrymore in his Academy Award performance, and Fred Astaire and George Murphy

dancing in an early musical. Most of the short subjects are well worth a second viewing, too.

As host, George Murphy does an okay job of introducing the various film clips and interviewing stars, but some of the remarks and chores furnished for him by script writers are deadly dull. The clips plugging M-G-M's new movies are carefully selected and usually entertaining.—R.S.

Why Producers Get Gray

It's the little things that plague TV producers. Some recent examples:

• In Judy Garland's TV "spectacular," the New York skyline abruptly

underwent a spectacular change. Someone eliminated the familiar Chrysler building, because the show was sponsored by Ford.

- Publicity pictures for CBS' Crusader series were hastily scrapped. They showed the hero smoking a cigar. The sponsor is a cigaret company.
- When Eartha Kitt sang "C'Est Si Bon" on Ed Sullivan's show, the lyrics were hastily revised, so that Eartha would yearn for a Lincoln (Ed's sponsor), instead of a "Cadillac car."
- The CBS daydrama, The Secret Storm, was originally titled "The Storm Within." That title seemed too descriptive of the sponsor's product—Bisodol.
- NBC decided not to put a Ronald Colman movie, "Champagne for Caesar," to late, late show uses when someone discovered the film included eight shots of a CBS microphone.
- Two network newscasters ran the same films of a man being lowered to safety from a bridge. CBS' Doug Edwards pointed out that the man was given a cigar. NBC's John Cameron Swayze, whose show is sponsored by a cigaret firm, called it "a smoke."
- After soul-searching, Rochelle Hudson was permitted to appear in a program sponsored by Plymouth. Tennessee Ernie Ford almost had a weekly show sponsored by Chevrolet. Dick Chevillat (pronounced Shev-ilay) writes the Chrysler-sponsored It's a Great Life.
- There was confusion last season over a show's title. Was it Hey, Mulligan! or The Mickey Rooney Show? The first was widely publicized, until one of the sponsors, Green Giant Peas, recalled a competitor's mulligan stew.
- When Perry Como was ill, Eddie Fisher commented, at the end of one of his Coca-Cola telecasts, "Get well, P.C." His sponsors, constantly vying with Pepsi-Cola, hurriedly advised him never to use those initials again.

HOLLYWOOD Dan Jenkins reports:

The sponsors are asking for more new film, less old; more attention to commercials, less to picture plugs in the M-G-M Parade series . . . A filmed-in-Europe series, Miss Gulliver's Travels, is in the works for JOAN DAVIS . . . JUDY HOLLIDAY will do a MILTON BERLE show after the first of the year.

Those new cartoon commercials are costing as much as \$11,000--for one minute . . . AL LEWIS, director of Our Miss Brooks on both radio and TV for eight years, is suddenly out of the show . . . CBS has bought "Public Pigeon No. 1," in which RED SKELTON starred earlier this fall, as a possible permanent format for him.

A Producers' Guild TV show, similar to the Screen Directors' Playhouse, is in the negotiation stage, name producers to donate their services, proceeds to go to the Guild treasury . . . Broadway comedian FRANK FAY will make a TV appearance with PETER LAW-FORD and NANCY GATES in "Tom and Jerry" on Playhouse.

FRANK WISBAR, one-time producer of Fireside Theater, planning his own series, The World of Barbara, starring BONITA GRANVILLE . . . JOHN WAYNE's fee for appearing in I Love Lucy recently was precisely \$280. True value received was tied up in the plugs for his new picture.


Lux Video Theater's first show of 1956 will be an adaptation of the old JOAN CRAWFORD picture, "Possessed." MISS CRAWFORD will be asked--and in all probability politely will decline--to star . . . ABBOTT & COSTELLO will make two consecutive appearances on The Ed Sullivan Show on Dec. 4 and 11--a "first."

PRESTON FOSTER will make a pilot for a possible new series, <u>Test Pilot</u>... And Desilu will start filming the pilot of a new series, <u>The Pinkerton Story</u>, in January. (The detective PINKERTONS. that is.)

TV-trained VERA MILES has signed a five-year deal with ALFRED HITCHCOCK to make three feature pictures a year . . . EDDIE CANTOR, JACK WEBB, BOB CROSBY and DICK POWELL have been named to the Scholarship Committee of the National Audience Board, set up to select worthy students to be aided in TV careers.

NBC and its affiliate stations can now cover 90 percent of the Nation's TV homes with colorcasts, and are doing so with 10 percent of the network's programming schedule. Idea is to boost the sale of color sets.

"Christmas Stopover," on Christmas Night, will be LORETTA YOUNG's first show since her illness . . . The ALBERGHETTI family makes another appearance on <u>Variety Hour's</u> Thanksgiving Show, Nov. 20. . . And speaking of families, <u>GOBEL's</u> TV "mother" is doomed.
