You'll be as happy as we were, no doubt, to hear how one network has helped explode "the theory that the average TV viewer is a 12-year-old 'nincompoop.'"

It had to be done scientifically, of course, because networks wouldn't think of taking anything for granted. They've got to have proof. The proof was found in results of a survey, by the American Broadcasting Company's Western Division, of audience reactions to TV commercials.

Those who answered the network's questionnaires defined a "good" commercial as "short," "comedy," "sincerity" and "cartoon type" in that order. There was majority agreement, the network reported, that "uninteresting and unimpressive commercials are the ones in which false statements are made, high-pressure tactics are used, and presentation is too long, repetitious and exceptionally loud."

When asked to list "good" commercials, women mentioned 47 different commercials; men, 35. This, ABC said, showed a very wide range of opinions and "proof of the fact that people really remember GOOD commercials."

Summing up these and other facts learned, ABC concluded: "This survey, among many other indications, shows that our viewing public is a live, intelligent and selective audience. Therefore, television commercials should similarly be live, intelligent and selective."

Well, hooray. Now we'd like to see a survey made which would either substantiate or explode a little theory we have: that the 12-year-old nincompoops are the people who put on the air uninteresting and unimpressive commercials full of false statements and high-pressuré tactics, and which are too long, repetitious and exceptionally loud.

NEW YORK Bob Stahl reports:

The sponsor has canceled and NBC is dropping its Variety Hour at the end of the year because the program seldom beats CBS' Ed Sullivan Show in the Sunday night ratings competition. Best bet to succeed Variety Hour is a new hour-long comedy show spotlighting new comedians and writers signed under NBC's Comedy Development Plan. Not-so-new comedians DEAN MARTIN and JERRY LEWIS will do several more shows in their old spot.

PADDY CHAYEFSKY's next TV play will be titled "The Man Who Knocked Off Ed Sullivan," dealing, obviously, with the TV industry. It's scheduled for early next year on NBC's Playwrights '56.

DAVID SHAW has sold his "Double Jeopardy," originally telecast on TV Playhouse, to Columbia Pictures as a starring vehicle for JUDY HOLLIDAY and JACK LEMMON. SHAW will write his own screenplay . . . With GEORGE GOBEL's Christmas Eve show pre-empted for a spectacular, NBC hopes to build a special one-shot program around him for Christmas Day.


This Is Show Business may return to CBS as a halfhour daytime entry Monday through Friday, with CLIFTON FADIMAN back as moderator. No panel as yet . . . CBS, reportedly ready to drop Name that Tune to make an early evening spot for Let's Take a Trip, may move it instead, in view of a "phenomenal" jump in latest Trendex rating.

Foreign Intrigue producer SHELDON REYNOLDS will do an hourlong anthology, filmed in Paris, Rome and other European capitals, which he'll personally emcee for ABC . . . NBC building a special ice rink at its Brooklyn color studios on which DICK BUTTON and BARBARA ANN SCOTT, former Olympic skating champions, will perform for the New Year's Sunday Night Spectacular.

CHARLES BOYER, now filming a movie in Italy with Italian star SOPHIA LOREN, has signed her as his costar for a Four Star Playhouse program . . . ARTHUR GODFREY hosts his annual Christmas party for children of his cast and crew Dec. 21 on Godfrey and Friends.

ERROL FLYNN signed for a one-shot guest appearance on The Martha Raye Show Jan. 24. FLYNN guested on MARTHA's show last . BARBARA COOK has been added to the cast of MAX LIEBMAN's "Babes in Toyland," now scheduled for repeat production Christmas Eve.

Super Circus will operate from an authentic circus ring when it moves from Chicago to New York Jan. 1. ABC is building the ring in its New York studios to permit cameras to cover the circus acts from all angles.



Tin Pan Alley's New Juke Box

Composers, Record Companies, Singers Hail TV As Potent Maker Of Song Hits

Tin Pan Alley has discovered a new juke box. It's smaller than the old ones, without chrome or bubbling lights or coin slots; but for turning songs into hits and singers into celebrities, there's nothing like it. Best of all, this juke box—the TV set—is found in millions of American homes.

Today this concept of juke-box TV is basic in the music industry. Few songs are written, much less recorded, unless they first satisfy the question, "What can we do with it on TV?"

TV's influence on American songs began in earnest with "Dragnet," the dum de dum dum theme Walter Schumann wrote for Jack Webb's 1949 radio program. It tailed Sgt. Friday to TV, burst forth two years ago as a popular song. Since then, things haven't been the same.

Control of TV time to exploit songs has turned sideline publishers like Disney into major music houses. TV has furnished a new source of recording artists (Gale Storm). It has turned comics into best-selling conductors (Jackie Gleason), made songwriters of strange bedfellows (Superman, Bishop Sheen). TV script demands have brought to the fore the "story song," on which the entire plot turns. Within five days recently, via Judy Garland on CBS and "Our Town" on NBC, TV may have super-



seded Broadway as the crucible in which hit show albums and hit show tunes are created.

"Our Town" vividly demonstrates TV's power in the field of popular music. The morning after a musical version of Thornton Wilder's play was telecast on Producers' Showcase, Frank Sinatra's album of the show's four tunes began selling so fast that Capitol pulled out two songs for separate release. One of the songs, "Love and Marriage," also was recorded by Dinah Shore, among others, and immediately began shaping up as one of her biggest sellers. Amid all this, lyricist Sammy Cahn got a long-distance call from a stage producer friend in New York. "I saw the show," he reported, "and I'm flying to Europe to talk to Wilder. We're going to put this on Broadway."

"Our Town" was an experiment. Cahn and composer James Van Heusen, both Academy Award songwriters, scored it for half their movie fee "to see whether TV was worth fooling with." "Never," says Cahn, "have I ever had such a response to anything. From now on, everyone in music is going to think of TV first."

Purely as a volume market for new songs, TV this season overtook radio, in which Howard Dietz and Arthur Schwartz set a production record in 1934 by writing 80 new tunes for one season of "The Gibson Family." On Disneyland, Walt Disney is introducing 25 new melodies, and on his Mickey Mouse Club, 100. His music publishing firms, Disney Music and Wonderland, hope to duplicate the success Disney enjoyed last spring with the TV-launched "Ballad of Davy Crockett," a 10,000,000-record seller and biggest hit in 10 years (41 separate versions were recorded, 750,-000 copies of sheet music sold).

Ironically, the Crockett ballad was a Disneyland afterthought. Just before filming, Disney suggested that the Crockett script needed some kind of narrative song to pull its history together. Scenarist Tom Blackburn wrote some words beginning "Davy, Davy Crockett, king of the wild frontier." Musical director George Bruns sat down at home and wrote a tune in about an hour. Neither Disney. Blackburn nor Bruns realized what they had until Your Show of Shows alumnus Bill Hayes kicked off a recording spree that made the entire Nation Crockett-happy.

Disney has learned a lesson since he let one of his biggest songs get away from him. "When You Wish Upon A Star," from the score of Disney's "Pinocchio," now published and controlled by Bourne, Inc., became a hit all over again last fall when sung by Cliff Edwards as the Disneyland theme. This winter, of the 100 tunes to be in-

troduced on the *Mickey Mouse Club*, Disney selected six for exploitation. College bands already are tramping to "The Mickey Mouse March."

Until recently, the publisher seeking "exposure" on the air for a new record would arrange to leave a copy with an all-night disc jockey's librarian. Today, TV has converted air-wave song-plugging into a complex and delicate art. A whole script was written around record piracy on Mr. District Attorney in order to introduce, on 189 syndicated TV stations, "Someone You Love." It is now Nat "King" Cole's big one at the record shops. Rin Tin Tin producers, impressed with "White Buffalo," a tune James Brown (Lt. Rip Masters in the series) recorded for M-G-M, had a plot written around it, "Let Me Go, Lover" turned Joan Weber into a top-selling singer (1,000,000 records) via Studio One. Your Hit Parade's Gisele MacKenzie starred in a Justice drama about song sharks, incidentally singing "Hard To Get" twice as the plot unfolded. Result: Gisele's first hit record, "Hard To Get" was in the top seven tunes for many weeks during the summer.

On TV, however, you don't have to get involved with a dramatic script to sell records. Five months after My Little Margie was dropped as a network entry, Margie, alias Gale Storm, cut her first one—"I Hear You Knockin'." Five weeks later, the record was listed by a trade paper as "This Week's Best Buy." Sales of 20,000 per week doubled to 40,000 after she plugged the tune on The Perry Como Show and What's My Line?

When a contestant on *The* \$64,000 *Question* chose jazz as his category, Columbia Records filled music store shelves with a new album: "\$64,000 Jazz." Capitol stocked dealers with "Miss Show Business" two days before Judy Garland bowed in the first *Ford Star Jubilee*. In three weeks, dealer re-orders exceeded the supply.

Bishop Fulton J. Sheen has written words to the theme that introduces his TV show, and no publisher remembering "I Believe," heavily plugged on TV by Jane Froman, would turn it down. George Reeves, a singer before he became Superman, is the author of a "Superman" ballad. These may be whims, but they reflect TV's insatiable appetite for songs. This demand has resulted in at least one new "standard," the Jay Livingston-Ray Evans "Alley Oop!", written at the request of producers who complained that TV had worn out standard stage and radio opening numbers like "Great Day" and "Hallelujah."

The juke box was never actually the maker and breaker of hits. Since radio consolidated the music industry, that role has belonged to the Nation's 2500 disc jockeys. But nowadays what you watch on TV largely determines what you'll hear wherever records spin, sheet music sells or bands appear.—Robert E. Johnson



'Pop Right Over To Your Greengrocer'

British TV Commercials Sound Different, But Alm's The Same It's difficult to put your finger on the difference between American and British commercials. Perhaps it can be summed up by saying British attempts to sell on television are milder, much milder. And they're funnier.

Take the commercials for Capstan cigarets. A couple of comics interview a famous race driver. "You record a broke," they tell him. They take a picture of a well-known singer. "You birdie the watch," they say. They wind up in each case with more twisted sentences and finally bring in the name of their product with the name of the person they're interviewing. In America it would come out, "Have a Gleason, Jackie Capstan," or "Have a Berle, Milton Capstan." or even, "Have a Lee, Pinky Capstan." Sounds silly, but it's got Capstan on everyone's tongue in England.







Their cartoon commercials tell a story—a story about the product, it is true, but selling subtly rather than blatantly. And, despite the expense, many British TV advertisers are going in heavily for the cartoon commercials, popular here, too.

Advertisers on British TV have absolutely no control over programs. They merely buy time—anything from 20 seconds to a minute—during morning, afternoon or evening hours, at \$1000 for morning time up to \$3000 for top-rated evening hours.

The company that produces programs (there is one company for weekdays and another for weekends) then drops in the "spot" wherever it pleases. There can be only six minutes of advertising per hour, and only at "natural breaks" in the show.

So far, the commercial program companies in London have just about sold out their available time for commercials. The station is on the air 50 hours a week—and that means 300 minutes of commercials.

This, despite the fact that most TV sets sold before this year could bring in only one channel, the one maintained by the strictly noncommercial British Broadcasting Corp. New sets, of course, bring in the new channel.

It won't be long before half the old sets in London are converted to receive the new station (at a cost of \$50 to \$100) and will be enjoying the benefits of the commercials—and such popular shows as I Love Lucy, Ford Theater (under a new name), Roy Rogers, Robin Hood and a number of fine British programs.





"Thunder in Washington" on The Alcog Hour was spellbinding stuff. with two brilliant performances by Melvyn Douglas and Ed Beglev, but the sudden ending left me frustrated and just a little mad to boot. It was like going to the theater and having the stage manager come out at the end of the second act and say: "Well. that's all. folks. Good night" . . . Cutest act I've seen on TV in a long time: that ventriloguist on the Ed Sullivan Show who used an adorable French poodle for his "dummy" . . . I'm not surprised that the Sunday night Variety Hour is giving up the ghost after the first of the year. Aside from the Martin and Lewis sessions, that series has been getting more and more wobbly.

I don't know how Matinee Theater stays as good as it does. An hourlong drama five afternoons a week is a back-breaking job, but the scripts aren't bad at all and the acting for the most part is superb . . . Even though I had read the story years before and knew the ending, I still got a bang out of "Our Cook's a Treasure" on Alfred Hitchcock Presents . . . Not everything David Niven does on Four Star Playhouse rings the bell. "Here Comes the Suit" was duller than dish water. I didn't tune out because I kept thinking that matters would improve but they never did.

I'm afraid it's true that This Is Your Life always seems more interesting and entertaining when it is dealing with show business figures. I kept thinking just that during the tribute to Mrs. Julia George, who spent her early life in and around Masontown and Uniontown, There was no question that Mrs. George deserved the honor, but the halfhour was pretty static . . . Because I wouldn't miss Phil Silvers for the world, I saw only the final 30 minutes of Martha Rave's last show. Pretty bad . . . That hillbilly setting for Gisele MacKenzie's version of "Love and Marriage" on Your Hit Parade misfired with me. I thought it was a rather tasteless way to present such a lovely number.

A cast of genuine troupers like Cyril Ritchard, Cornelia Otis Skinner,

Anne Jeffreys and Robert Sterling deserves better—much better—than "Dearest Enemy"... I can't understand why The Big Surprise hasn't caught on in the same way as The \$64,000 Ques-

tion. Actually I think it's a much more entertaining program and does not go in for all the gingerbread which sometimes makes the other giveaway so exasperating . . . I've seen some glaring cases of miscasting on TV but I think putting Raymond Massey in the title role of "The Late George Apley" topped them all. He was so terribly wrong for the part.

Still In The Driver's Seat

Lucy And Desi Aren't Worried As Other Situation Comedies Slip

Back in the fall of 1951, one of the Nation's top advertising men said, almost apologetically, at a dinner party, "We've just bought a little thing being made out on

the Coast. Situation comedy sort of thing with Lucille Ball and her husband, whatsizname. I don't know if it will amount to anything."

Just what I Love Lucy afterwards amounted to is, of course, a matter of rather staggering show business history; in this age of here-today gone-tomorrow popularity, Lucy was in the No. 1 spot for three straight years.

Last season, Lucy's fourth, several shows rose to challenge its leadership. Yet a composite box score of the three national rating surveys still gave I Love Lucy more first places than any other regular show. And this season Lucy is still going strong against its toughest competition—NBC's Medic. continued

Nevertheless, a hue and cry against the situation comedy format has been raised in the land. It is more than just an outburst of irresponsible talk, for NBC has allowed such filmed series as I Married Joan, My Little Margie, The Mickey Rooney Show, Norby, So This Is Hollywood and Dear Phoebe to give up the network ghost, concentrating its attention on the 60- and 90-minute spectaculars.

ABC has permitted the demise of shows headlining Ray Bolger, Stu Erwin and Paul Hartman, among others.

Even CBS, the industry's situation-comedy mother hen, is clucking now over the spectacular-type show. Last season's Life with Father, Halls of Ivy, The Ray Milland Show, Willy, Honestly, Celeste! and Professional Father have faded away. Harry Ackerman, CBS' West Coast programming genius, has given up his vice-presidency in favor of developing his own series of 90-minute wonder shows—and Ackerman was largely responsible for the birth, care and feeding of I Love Lucy.

Sitting squarely in the middle of the still-hectic hassle over the box office appeal of situation comedy is Desi Arnaz, the "whatsizname" of five years ago, today the president of one of the biggest and most successful TV film production companies in the world. (Two of Desilu's house-owned comedy shows, Lucy and December Bride, were the only two situation comedy shows to appear in the Top 10 of last season's final Nielsen rating.)

Asked about the future of the situation format, Arnaz raises his rather expressive eyebrows. "I don't care," he explodes mildly, "what the format is. If it's good, people will watch it."

"I don't understand all the ruckus," Lucille Ball puts in coldly. "On your way up to the top, you're a hero. After you're up there, sooner or later they start taking pot shots at you. Slip two-tenths of a point and you're a bum. Why? I don't get it."

"Let's look at it objectively," Desi continues. "We were lucky. We got in first with a basically good idea and we had the advantage of having one of the great comediennes of all time, Lucille Ball. Far as I'm concerned, we have the best comedy writers in the business, Jess Oppenheimer and Bob Carroll and Madelyn Pugh. We have the best cameraman in the business, 'Poppa' Freund. We film our shows honestly, in front of an audience. There is no phony laughing. You see exactly what the studio au-

dience saw and you react the way they reacted.

"You add all that up, and you throw in two magnificent troupers like Vivian Vance and Bill Frawley, and you are the luckiest son-of-a-gun in all of the business."

Jess Oppenheimer, who wrote the original Lucille Ball radio show, "My Favorite Husband," is head writer-producer of *I Love Lucy* and probably knows as much about situation comedy as any man alive, has this to say: "Too many shows go all out for the boff laugh, line after line. The straight man sets it up and the comic knocks it down. There's no time given over to character development.

"We'll go a whole 10 minutes on a Lucy episode without a laugh, just to build

situation. Moreover, good characterization is vital. Lucy and Desi are popular because people love them, not just because they're funny.

"The situation comedy situation is leveling off. Everybody jumped on the Lucy bandwagon at first. It was the natural thing to do. Sponsors kept demanding, 'Get us another Lucy.' But you can't do that forever."

Desilu currently has six situation comedies on the networks, all sponsored. Its only non-comedy shows are The Line-up, which it films for CBS, and ABC's Western, Wyatt Earp.

It has been predicted that only dramas can really last on TV. "Ridiculous," Desi explodes, not quite su mildly. "We've got enough troubles in this world without having nothing but serious dramatic stuff on the air all the time. I like them as well us the next man. But I like to laugh, too. So does everybody else.

"Sure, the bad comedy shows are being weeded out. TV is improving. I'll tell you something. Five years ago some of those 'bad' shows would have been called wonderful. Now the audience is getting selective. The medium has to separate the men from the boys. Comedy needs heart and warmth, even a tear or two, not just a lot of slapstick laughs."

Jack Benny once admonished Lucille Ball: "Being No. 1 is the lone-liest spot in the world. There is only one direction in which you can godown!"

Asked for a prediction as to what direction Lucy will take in the months to come, Lucy herself goes back to her knitting and Desi shrugs philosophically. "We'll do our best," he says. "The verdict still belongs to the people out front."—Dan Jenkins

The Milton Berle Show

Milton Berle, who helped get TV rolling seven years ago with the first bigtime variety show, set out on another pioneering kick on NBC this season.

He moved from New York to Holly-wood, shifted from black and white to color, said goodbye to Goodman Ace and other members of his writing corps, and divorced himself from Arnold Stang, Ruthie Gilbert and the rest of last season's repertory group. To top it all, for the first time in his TV career, he scrapped a continuing format in favor of a different kind of program each time out.

Results of the experiment so far: one hit, two misses.

Evidently trying to introduce his new programming idea in easy stages, he opened the season with a musical review. Despite the presence of Esther Williams and John Wayne, the show was bad, with uninspired writing and too much Berle-type slapstick.

Even worse was the second program, in which Berle attempted a complete break from the review rut with an original comedy by Gore Vidal, "State of Confusion." Berle and co-star Ann Sothern played a husband and wife, former Chicago bookmakers, who managed to succeed each other as grafting governors of a southwestern state. The basic idea was in poor taste and segments were inexcusable.

Milton Berle and Ann Sothern played a pair of larceny-minded governors.

For his third show, Berle reverted to the musical review format, this time scoring with one of his best programs ever. Berle and Kay Thompson did a biting take-off of the recent Noel Coward-Mary Martin spectacular, with Berle revealing surprising subtlety. He also teamed with Sammy Davis, Jr., for a wonderfully nostalgic bit of reminiscing about oldtime vaudeville teams.

Berle himself is probably wondering about the wisdom of his experiment. (There's talk, for instance, that he may return permanently to New York.) But wise or not, Berle is usually in there trying something new, and for this, he rates viewers' applause.

As part of the movie industry's mass entry into TV this season, Screen Directors Playhouse presents on NBC each week a half-hour drama selected and filmed by a top Hollywood director. Each supposedly reflects the special style of the director involved: but so far, the film series hasn't been a distinguished one. The initial program, "Meet the Governor," written and directed by Leo McCarey, was no great shakes, and the show has been struggling uphill ever since. Certainly the plays do not represent the same writing or directing quality that have come to be associated with each director's theatrical movies.

Directors like John Brahm, William Seiter, Norman Z. McLeod and George Waggner; stars like Herb Shriner, Kim Hunter, Alan Young, Jack Carson, Lynn Bari and Keenan Wynn represent the makings of a fine show. But the ingredients haven't been blended successfully.—R.S.

Among the committee's findings is that children consider many of their programs too childish, "Howdy Doodu." a seven year-old declared to Dr. Goldenson recently, "is kid stuff."

On the other hand, Dr. Horwich revealed the surprising news that in her home city, Chicago, Medic (on at 8 P.M.) is rated among the top ten favorites of children! Obviously. many parents do not supervise their voungster's viewing, she infers.

"TV is a potent experience," Miss Frances pointed out, "particularly for children under 10. If we draw a cat and tell a child to copy it, we leave nothing to his imagination. And we have no right to rob him of that. But a child's creativeness depends much upon the home atmosphere. If he is starved for ideas, he may absorb everything pouring out of the set. Sadly, this is the child who watches TV the most. I am trying to get parents to watch with the youngsters."

Television, too, must assume responsibility. There are solid blocks of programming, back-to-back, of the same type of shows, some too exciting, some too violent. "Education," Miss Frances said, "takes into account what

A TV producer with an idea for a new children's program was bubbling with plans when someone asked what age group he had in mind.

"Children," the discerning producer

said, "just children."

And that, as parents know, is just one of the things wrong with the present programming for the younger set. But Miss Frances, the motherly lady who presides over TV's Ding Dong School, is hoping to change all that for NBC.

Cautiously, Dr. Frances R. Horwich, who has taught at 11 universities and colleges and is a specialist in child education, pointed out that she does not want "to upset the applecart. The way to get things done is to prove through evidence, not hunches, widespread contention that some television is failing to meet the needs of children, that it is causing parent-child problems, and that by telecasting programs that parents and educators find objectionable, TV could harm itself."

To get the evidence, Miss Frances, appointed by NBC to the post of Supervisor of Children's Programs for the network, has formed The Children's Reviewing Committee. Serving with her are Dr. Robert M. Goldenson, assistant professor of psychology at Hunter College, and Mrs. Mildred Mc-Afee Horton, wartime director of the

is happening in other classes. TV, too, must let the right hand know what the left hand is doing."

Programs that include violence are not necessarily bad. Children use them for escape, just as their parents read mysteries. "You shouldn't deprive a child of Westerns or comics, because if deprived," Dr. Horwich stated, "the child will seek them out and they will influence him more. The important thing is to make sure he has a balanced diet of reading, play and fun."

Some of the fault lies with the educators who have yet to accept the medium on non-competitive basis and resent the time it takes from studies. "Teachers can use TV creatively," Miss Frances maintains. "Children get fun, entertainment, background in the

arts, travel and generally are richer for this experience."

While the committee is interested in creating new, educationally broadening shows, it has set standards for those already existing. "Surprisingly," Dr. Goldenson said, "producers of some shows we categorize as the worst, have asked for the most help."

New shows are in the planning stage. NBC is seeking formats in the imaginative, realistic, how-to-do-it and fairy-tale categories, geared to the under-seven and seven-to-13 age groups. "Tom Sawyer" may become a series, and a new type of Indian tale, Johnny Moccasin, is in the works.

According to Miss Frances, "The better shows will have the desired psychological effect. They will show up the bad ones for what they are."


