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
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
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
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INTRODUCTION



HIS History of Twin Falls County Service Men and War Workers is published to serve as a perpetual memorial for the brave and unselfish spirit of the many men who gave up their homes and loved ones to answer the call to duty.

A large number of names and photos have been left out of this volume, which in the majority of cases can not be laid to the publishers. Letters were sent out asking for data and pictures, but in

many cases the men or their families put the request aside and did not show any interest in the matter. Some of the men had not yet returned when the history was started.

The war was not won by men in uniform alone, but it required a large army of home workers, Red Cross and Liberty Loan workers, old and young in our factories turning out food, equipment and other necessities to maintain our 4,000,000 men. Children played a great part with their war gardens, aged men with their money, women with their offspring, wives with their husbands.

Twenty or more years from now when the American Legion has taken the place of the G. A. R. on Decoration Day, the women and children lining the streets as the boys of the late war pass by, Mr. Slacker will be standing on the curb with his child or grand child's hand in his, and that child will look up into his face and say, "Daddy (or Grand-daddy), why are you not in the parade? Wasn't you a soldier?" How will he feel? What would he not give to have the right to place that Star and Sun Button in the lapel of his coat? Every year's Memorial Day parade will become an accusation.


I volunteered my services in 1898 for Cuba; then to the Philippines; then to the Boxer War in China; back to the Samare Island uprising; then to the interior of Mexico; and then to the greatest war in the history of mankind. I did not cross the Pond but was assigned to duty as examiner of recruits at the main station, Salt Lake City, May 1, 1917. I took charge of a recruiting campaign in Ogden and Logan, Utah. In June, I took charge of the Twin Falls office, and remained at that office until November, 1917. I was finally given orders to recruit 346 men for the Second Idaho Infantry; Company K sent me Sergeant Henry Orthell; Company D sent Sergeant Prentice Stowell; the Salt Lake recruiting office sent Corporal Chas. Hales. No man had a better recruiting staff than mine; they worked with a will.

Citizens in different towns got behind us and helped us in our great work. I wish to mention a few names of the sincerest workers. Mayor Youman and Chief of Police Burk of Burley worked overtime in behalf of the Government, even to spending their own money in telephoning me regarding recruits, while a great number of other citizens assisted in the work in Burley.

Churches and moving picture houses were always ready to give me their pulpit or stage, to let me talk to the public. Never in the history of my soldier career did I find a better spirit of help than I found in this district. The County won my heart and I will spend the rest of my days close by the people who so kindly made it possible for my station to lead all the others in accepted applicants for enlistment

Regardless of what action our lawmakers in Washington take on any Government provision for the returned men, whether it be a farm, a \$50.00 per month bonus, or nothing, we, as soldiers, will always feel proud of the fact that we did our duty, and the praise of our young people will more than pay us for any hardship we might have passed through. I speak the opinion of the majority when I repeat Harry Lauder's words: "I'm glad l was one of the boys who went."

COMPANY D, SECOND IDAHO INFANTRY

THIS Company was organized in 1910, and served on the Mexican border during the Mexican trouble. On March 26, 1917, they were ordered to mobilize, to get records and men in shape, to start recruiting and await orders.

April 6th, 1917, they were ordered to Boise. April 7th they left Twin Falls at seven a. m., arriving at Boise at four p. m.; April 9th, physical examination: April 13th, mustered into U. S. service and received orders to pack.

April 16th and 17th, arrived at Avery and sent detachments to Roland, East Portal, Mont., and Adair, Idaho. Each detachment had about ten miles of territory to guard, such as bridges, tunnels, etc.

The members of the company did their own cooking, canteens were established at different points and everything possible was done to add to the comfort of the men.

The company was commanded by Captain Peter W. McRoberts, First Lieutenant Chas. H. Krengle, Second Lieutenant Ralph E. Leighton.

In September, 1917, the company was ordered to Camp Greene, N. Y. It left Camp Greene as the 146th Field Artillery, arrived at Camp Mills, R. I., and from there went to Camp Merritt, N. J. It sailed from Hoboken, December 24, 1917, and arrived at Liverpool, England, January 7, 1918, was sent to Winchester, England, and thence to France.

The company left for the front on July 3, 1918, and was active in the heavy fighting which ensued.

They returned to the home soil as Headquarters Company, 146th Field Artillery, in June, 1919.

COMPANY K, SECOND IDAHO INFANTRY

THIS Company was organized October 8, 1915, and was mustered into service under Captain Claude B. Biggs, First Lieutenant Robert B. Slee, Second Lieutenant Edwan A. Landon.

On June 19. 1916, the company was mustered into federal service and sent to the Mexican border. The boys returned to Camp Boise, Idaho, and were mustered out of the federal service January 26, 1917, called back into federal service in March of the same year, with First Lieutenant Glen C. Taylor and Second Lieutenant Roy F. Chamberlain. The company was then transferred to the 146th Machine Gun Battalion and sent to Camp Greene, where it received orders to sail and crossed over the Pond in June, 1918. Once more they were transferred, this time to Company D, 147th Machine Gun Battalion.


The company had many homes while in the service, being stationed at Camp Boise, Camp Mills, Camp Merritt, and at Liverpool and Winchester, England, and in France. A number of the old company were retained to train new men in the School of the Machine Gun, but the majority of them were transferred to other branches and saw heavy fighting overseas.

The company returned to the Home Land in March, 1919, having made a good record as a body of soldiers, fighters and men.

AMERICAN LEGION POST NO. 7

TWIN FALLS, IDAHO

HE HISTORY of the Twin Falls Post, American Legion, is short—but is is one of which its members can be proud.

The Twin Falls Post is the direct outgrowth of a desire for organization manifested on the return of the very first service men to Twin Falls.

These service men were those who felt themselves unfortunate in not having been sent overseas but they sensed the need of co-operation of all service men in furthering the solution of problems affecting the former soldier, sailor, and marine in civil life.

The outgrowth was the Twin Falls Service Men's Association. This association functioned until the first caucus of the American Legion in the United States at St. Louis. E. M. Sweeley, Carl De Long and J. F. Martin comprised the executive committee which handled the affairs of the organization. Its most successful work was in putting over the Victory Loan. With a prospect that the splendid record of Twin Falls County in war relief work might be marred by a failure to raise the county's quota in the final financial call of the war, the returned service men were called into the breach—and saved the day.

John S. Green and Taylor Cummins were the first Twin Falls men to take an active part in the formation of the American Legion. They attended the St. Louis caucus. On their return they reported the enthusiasm evident at St. Louis—the evidence of the splendid, unselfish spirit that made for the success of a great organization. The Twin Falls Service Men's Association and its membership decided then that its mission had been fulfilled and that it should affiliate with the American Legion. During the last week in April, 1919, the association voted to seek a charter in the national organization. Arthur Alworth, who had lost his arm while serving in the ranks during the great Argonne offensive, was selected as temporary president; Harry Benoit was made temporary secretary, and Paul R. Taber, temporary treasurer.

Twin Falls aggressiveness first made its impression among state Legionars when its delegation attended the state convention at Boise on June 25 to June 27, 1919. This delegation worked for constructive declarations of Legion policies; it secured the second state convention for Twin Falls, the metropolis of the greatest irrigation district in the United States, where the magic waters of the Snake have made happy homes for 50,000 people on the one-time sagebrush-covered lands of a broad windswept plain; it was honored by the election of Arthur Alworth as one of the officers of the first state organization; it secured the election of Taylor Cummins as a delegate to the national convention at Minneapolis.

On receiving its charter the Post elected Arthur Alworth as its first Commander, Ted Bowen as Vice Commander, T. H. Irwin, Jr., as Post Historian, and Paul R. Taber as Post Adjutant-Finance Officer. Later Mr. Alworth, on resigning to take advantage of the vocational education act, was succeeded by Tom Berrington, who had been elected a short time previously to fill the place to which Mr. Bowen had been elected, as Mr. Bowen had resigned to attend school. The writer was elected Post Historian on the resignation of Mr. Irwin. All of these officers were named to succeed themselves at the annual election in December.

The Post has placed itself on record on many issues. Its meetings have been featured by thoughtful yet stirring debates on vital questions. Its membership has striven to set an example in constructive declarations to the citizenships of the

splendid community of which it is a part. It has in turn been well received by this community, which has shown a spirit of co-operation toward every endeavor of the Post.

Its greatest stand on a public issue was in its unanimous adoption of a resolution that declared for the development of the entire state of Idaho rather than the development of one community in the state to the detriment of many others, even though the community that should profit by such discrimination should be Twin Falls. It has pleaded for conservatism in the consideration of questions between employes and employers, denouncing destructive, radical elements, but it has not attempted to inject itself into issues in which its own interest is not primary.

The Twin Falls Post entertained the second annual convention of the American Legion on April 7, 8 and 9.

The outlook for the future of the Post is bright. It has a virile membership that is taking more and more interest in its work. Its efforts are to build—to build a greater America, a greater Idaho, a greater Twin Falls, and a greater Legion.




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U. S. S. IDAHO, SUPERDREADNAUGHT, Queen of the Navy

THE Battleship Idaho, constructed during the war at a cost of \$18,000,000, is said to be the most powerful superdreadnaught in our Navy, if not in the world. This ship mounts twelve 14-inch guns, plus a powerful torpedo battery, and has an estimated speed of twenty-one knots. Her guns will sink the average battleship at twelve miles and fire effectively at fifteen miles. This remarkable ship could have out-maneuvered and out-fought the entire United States Navy at the time of the Spanish-American war, by keeping out of their range and sinking them one at a time.

HISTORY



HISTORY of the war as a whole would not only be impossible here, but also quite beyond the original intention of this book. The work would be, indeed, far too voluminous to be handled even within the possibilities of one publication. A comprehension

of it and the circumstances leading up to it will best be secured in the study of books specializing on each particular feature. It is respectfully recommended, that those who would study with an analytical mind, use the many good books on the subject which are now to be found in the various public libraries, or are otherwise within their reach. Their authors are reputable and the matter therein is authentic, and the subject in all its phases will prove both interesting and profitable the more it is dealt with. Beneath is given a compendium of the events as they occurred, and here may be learned the peculiar bearing they had on the events that so rapidly followed.

1914

- June 29—Archduke Francis Ferdinand and his wife assassinated by Gavrilo Princip at Serajevo.
- July 23—Austrian ultimatum to Servia demands satisfaction for murder plot and suppression of Pan-Serb propaganda.
- July 25—Servia returns an answer unsatisfactory to Austria.
- July 28—Austria declares war on Servia. Russia moves troops toward Austrian frontier.
- JULY 30-Germany demands that Russia stop mobilization within twenty-four hours.
- August 1—Germany declares war on Russia after Kaiser orders mobilization. France mobilizes army. Italy announces her neutrality.
- August 2—German troops occupy Luxemburg, move on Longwy and invade France near Nancy.
- August 4—Great Britain declares war on Germany. Germany declares war on Belgium. German Army of the Meuse attacks Liege.
- August 5—Forty thousand Belgians at Liege hold out against 120,000 Germans, who lose 5000 in first three days' fighting. Kitchener becomes War Secretary.
- August 6—Austria declares war on Russia.
- August 7—German losses at Liege total 25.000. Armistice of 24 hours refused to Germans by Belgians.
- August 10—Diplomatic relations between France and Austria broken.
- August 13—Great Britain in state of war with Austria.

August 17—Belgian capital removed from Brussels to Antwerp. August 21-Germany levies tribute of \$40,000,000 on city of Brussels and \$10,000,-000 on Liege. August 23—Japan declares war against Germany. August 25-Austria declares war on Japan. Zeppelin bombs fall in Antwerp. August 27-British cruiser "Highflyer" sinks "Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse" off coast of Africa. August 28—Germans burn and sack city of Louvain, Belgium. September 3—French government moves temporarily from Paris to Bordeaux. September 5—Great Britain, France and Russia sign treaty not to make peace separately. September 6-10—Battle of the Marne. September 22—Three British armored cruisers sunk by submarine. OCTOBER 9—Germans occupy Antwerp. November 5—Great Britain declares war on Turkey. DECEMBER 24—First German air raid on England. 1915 JANUARY I-FEBRUARY 15—Russians attempt to cross the Carpathians. January 20—American neutrality explained and defended by Secretary of State, February 10—United States note holding German government to "strict accountability if any merchant vessel of the United States is destroyed or any American citizens lose their lives.' February 19—Anglo-French squadron bombards Dardanelles. April 22—German embassy sends out warning against embarkation on vessels belonging to Great Britain. -American steamship Gulflight sunk by submarine, two Americans lost. Warning of German embassy published in daily papers. Lusitania sails at 12:20 noon. May 7—Cunard line steamship Lusitania sunk by German submarine. (1154 lives lost, 115 being Americans.) May 10—Message of sympathy from Germany on loss of American lives by sinking the Lusitania. May 13—American note protests against submarine policy culminating in the sinking of the Lusitania. May 23—Italy declares war on Austria-Hungary. June 8—Resignation of William J. Bryan, Secretary of State. JULY 8-Germany sends reply to note of June 9th, and pledges safety to United States vessels in war zones under specified conditions. July 15—Germany sends note acknowledging submarine attack on Nebraskian and expresses regret. July 21—Third American note on Lusitania case declares Germany's communication of July 8th very unsatisfactory. (10)

July 25-American steamship Leelanaw sunk by submarine carrying contraband but no lives are lost. August 4—Capture of Warsaw by Germans. August 19—White Star liner Arabic sunk by submarine. August 20—Italy declares war on Turkey. September 1 Letter from Ambassador Von Bernstorff to Secretary Lansing, giving assurance that German submarines will sink no more liners without warning. SEPTEMBER 4—Allan liner Hesparian sunk by German submarines, 26 lives lost; one SEPTEMBER 8-United States demands recall of Austria-Hungarian Ambassador. Dr. Dumba. October 4—Russian ultimatum to Bulgaria. OCTOBER 5—German government regrets and disavows sinking of Arabic, and is prepared to pay indemnities. OCTOBER 14—Great Britain declares war against Bulgaria. DECEMBER 10 Boy-ed and Von Papen recalled. December 30—British passenger steamer Persia sunk in Mediterranean presumably by submarine. 1916 January 8—Complete evacuation of Gallipoli. January 18—United States government sets forth declaration of principles, regarding submarine attacks and asks whether the government of the allies will subscribe to such an agreement. February 10—Germany sends note to neutral powers that armed merchant ships will be treated as warships and sunk without warning. February 16 - Germany sends acknowledgment of her liability in the Lusitania affair. February 21 to July—Battle of Verdun. Great German losses. March 8—Germany declares war on Portugal. March 24—French steamer Sussex torpedoed. APRIL 18-United States delivers what is considered an ultimatum that unless Germany abandons present methods of submarine warfare diplomatic relations will be severed. May 16 to June 3—Great Austrian attack on the Italians through the Trentino. JULY 1-NOVEMBER—The battle of the Somme. August 27—Italy declares war on Germany. AUGUST 27-JANUARY 15-Roumania enters war on the side of the allies and is crushed. OCTOBER 8—German submarine appears off the American coast and sinks British steamer (passenger) Stephano. DECEMBER-German peace offer. Refused December 30 by allies as empty and insincere. (11)

1917

- January 10—The allied governments state their terms of peace; a separate note, Belgium included.
- January 31—Germany announces unrestricted submarine warfare in specified zones.
- February 3—The United States severs diplomatic relations with Germany. Bernstorff dismissed.
- MARCH 11-15—Revolution in Russia leading to abdication of Czar Nicholas.
- April 2—President Wilson asks Congress to declare existence of a state of war with Germany.
- APRIL 6— United States declares war on Germany.
- June 12—King Constantine of Greece forced to abdicate.
- June 15—Subscriptions closed for the first Liberty Loan; \$2,000,000,000 offered, \$3,035,226,850 subscribed.
- JULY 20—Drawing at Washington for the first names for army under selective draft. August 15—Peace proposals of Pope Benedict revealed (under date of August 1). President Wilson replies August 27.
- October 27—Second Liberty Loan closed; \$3,000,000,000 offered, \$4,617,532,300 subscribed.
- NOVEMBER 3—First clash of American with German soldiers.
- NOVEMBER 22-DECEMBER 13—Battle of Cambrai. Successful surprise attack of British under General Byng on November 22. Employing tanks to break down wire entanglements instead of the usual artillery preparations.
- DECEMBER 7—United States declares war on Austria-Hungary.
- DECEMBER 17—German raid in North Sea destroys a merchant fleet of one British and five neutral ships.

1918

- January 31—It is for the first time announced that United States troops are occupying front line trenches.
- FEBRUARY 4—Trial begins at Paris of Bolo Pasha for treason.
- February 14—Court martial finds Pasha guilty of treason. Sentenced to death.
- March 21—Beginning of big drive on fifty-mile front from Arras to La Fere. German long range guns bombard Paris.
- March 25—The Germans take Bapaume, Nesle, Guicard, Biabats, Barleux and Etalon. The French take over sector of British battle front south of St. Quentin and around Noyon. French are forced back, but inflict heavy losses in retiring; British counter attack fails.
- March 26—Battle continues on whole front south of Somme; Germans are checked west of Roye and Noyon. South of Peronne General Von Hofacker crosses the Somme; takes heights of Maisonette and villages of Biache and Belleaux; Etalon is taken from the French and English. In Toul sector United States troops drive Germans out of Richecourt. British retreat on a wide front; Germans under Von Bulow and Von Der Marwitz take Richecourt, Biefvillers, Iries and Miraumont, crossing the Ancre river. The British defeat Turks in Mesopotamia, capture 5000 prisoners, 14 guns, 50 machine guns, stores of munitions and supplies. United States casualty list to date: Dead, 1383; wounded, 706; captured, 22; missing, 37.

March 27—Major General Pershing offers all United States forces for service wherever needcd. APRIL 1—French estimate German losses during eleven-day offensive at 275,000 to 300,000. APRIL 5—United States Army at end of the first year of the war totals more than 1,500,000 men. April 10—Secretary Daniels says 1275 vessels (1,055,116 tons) were added to the Navy in the first year of the war. APRIL 12—Germans attack near Ploegsteert; force the British from Neuve Eglise Germans capture British garrison at Armentieres. Fifty officers, one British and one Portuguese general, 3000 men, 45 cannon, many machine guns and a quantity of ammunition. April 16—Bolo Pasha, convicted in France of treason, executed. APRIL 22—Baron Von Richthofen, the leader of the German flyers, with 80 victories to his credit, is brought down behind the British lines and buried with mili-April 22-23—German destroyer and submarine base at Zeebrugge blockaded by the sinking of two old cruisers, loaded with cement. April 30-British casualties during April: Killed or died of wounds, officers 1621, men 7723; wounded or missing, officers 7447, men 35,864. May 4-British airmen drop more than 20 tons of bombs on Chaulnes, Tournai and LaBassee railway stations and on Estaires, Marceleave, Memeo, Comines and Middelkerke; bring down 28 German machines; disable 5; anti-aircraft guns shoot down 3; 11 British machines are missing. May 17-A large Russian transport, with 3000 on board (many women and children), sunk by a German submarine; only a few hundred saved. May 21—British airplanes bomb Mannheim and destroy chlorine gas plant. May 23-British airmen drop four tons of bombs on electric power station at Karusewald; 11 tons on airdromes and billets and docks at Bruges. British transport Moldavis, on way to Channel port, torpedoed and sunk off English coast; 56 United States soldiers killed by the explosion. May 25—The German superdreadnaught U boat, attacking United States transport, sunk by United States destroyers. May 25-June 14—German submarines sink 19 ships off coasts of New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland and Virginia. May 27-Big drive begins on western front, Germans drive allies across the Aisne-Marne canal, take Corbeny, Cauroy and Loivre; Germans attack British at Berry-au-Bac and the French by the Chemin-des-Dames; Germans take Chemindes-Dames Ridge; near Dickebusch Lake, Germans penetrate French positions, advance in Aisne Valley, reach Pont-d'Arcy. June 4-French and United States forces compel Germans to recross the Marne, leaving 100 prisoners. June 6-Crown Prince has taken more than 55,000 prisoners; 1500 officers, 656 guns, 2000 machine guns. June 8 - United States Government announces about 5000 Germans interned as enemy aliens; 349 United States prisoners in Germany. JUNE 12-London announces that German advance has practically ceased. Germans claim to have taken since beginning of drive on June 9, 15,000 prisoners, 150 guns; they launch attack from Courcelles to north of Mery, between the Aisne and Forest of Villers Cotterets. (13)

- June 16—London reports abnormal quiet after six days of desperate fighting. In local action French in region of Vedilly take 70 German prisoners and a number of machine guns. United States casualties since entering the war total 8085. Exchange of 160,000 French and German prisoners of war begin through Switzerland.
- June 23—Italians drive Austrians across the Piave, inflicting losses estimated at 180,000. Austrians are in flight from Montello Plateau to Adriatic Sea.
- JULY 10-Lieutenant Quentin Roosevelt brings down opponent in his first aerial flight.
- JULY 11—Germany demands from Holland 60,000 cows, 3000 horses, and 10,000 tons of cheese, other products and monthly credit of \$2,800,000. United States steamship Westover sunk by torpedo in European waters; ten of crew missing.
- JULY 12—German Chancellor, Count Von Hertling, in Reichstag, declares that Germany stood for righteous peace, but that speeches by President Wilson and Mr. Balfour demanding destruction of Germany forced her to continue the war. Russian Czar Nicholas slain by Bolsheviki.
- JULY 13—General March announces 750,000 United States troops in France, organized into three army corps; General Hunter Liggett is commander of the first corps. New York troops form second part of corps.
- JULY 14—First Lieutenant Quentin Roosevelt (son of Colonel Theodore Roosevelt) 95th Aero Squadron, First Allied Pursuit Troop, is killed in aerial flight and buried with military honors by the Germans. Major Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., wounded and taken to Paris hospital.
- July 17—Cunard steamship Carpathia (13,603 tons) sunk by German submarine; 5 of crew killed.
- July 24—Total German casualties since General Foch's drive began estimated at 180,000. Several thousand British munition workers strike. Japan agrees to all United States proposals for joint action in Russia. Franco-British airmen bomb Bazoches, Couriandon, Fismes and Cugnicourt. From beginning of present drive which began July 18, with the Germans stopped at Chateau Thierry, to date Allies have taken 25,000 prisoners, 500 cannon; thousands of machine guns, one-seventh of captives are boys of 19.
- August 8—British and French armies commanded by Field Marshal Haig, launched new offensive in Somme salient; take Germans by surprise; penetrate seven miles; occupy many towns; take 7000 prisoners and 100 guns.
- August 11—Estimated that 36,000 prisoners, including more than 1000 officers, captured so far in allied offensive in Picardy.
- August 13—The Echo de Paris states that since Allied counter offensive began July 18, Allies have taken more than 70,000 prisoners; 1000 guns, 10,000 machine guns.
- August 16—United States cargo ship Montana (6659 gross tons) torpedoed and sunk in foreign waters; 5 men missing.
- August 20—Marshal Foch begins drive on 15-mile front between the Aisne and the Oise; advances nearly three miles; captures a dozen villages and 8000 prisoners.
- August 25—British advance 10 miles on 30-mile front, capture La Boissele, take over 17,000 prisoners; attack Bapaume defenses. Take Warlencourt, Sapignies and St. Leger.

September 3—Germans flee from the Scarpe to the Somme. General Haig captures 16,000 men. British advance between Epehy and Vermand and break through Wotan switch line. United States cargo ship Lake Owens (2308 gross tons) sunk by gun fire in foreign waters. United States Steamer Frank H. Buck sinks a submarine in mid-Atlantic by gunfire.

September 4—Powder factory at Plauen, Saxony, blows up. Out of 6800 women employed, 12 escaped.

SEPEMBER 7—General retreat of Germans on front of 100 miles, Arras-Cambrai sector to Rheims. British advance 9 miles beyond the Somme; take Haucourt, Sorel-le-Grand and Metz-en-Centerre. French cross St. Quentin Canal; take Tugny Bridge and Station at St. Simon, also Tergnier, 3 miles from La Fere. British airmen bomb Mannheim, poison gas center.

September 8—During first week in September British take 19,000 prisoners. United States refugees from Russia reach Stockholm.

SEPTEMBER 13—General Pershing's forces practically wipe out St. Mihiel salient; take 12,000 prisoners, 60 big guns. The railway, Verdun to Toul and Nancy via St. Mihiel, intact and open to the allies. Secretary Baker and Generals Pershing and Petain visit St. Mihiel a few hours after its capture.

SEPTEMBER 19—English troops take Lempier and Gauchy Wood. Australians carry Hindenburg outposts in front of Hargicourt, Villeret, and Le Vergnier. French reach Dallon, beyond Francilly and Salency, two miles from St. Quentin. Germans counter attack on northern part of British front and on French front in Soissons sector.

September 21—General March, United States Chief of Staff, says 1,750,000 soldiers have been sent abroad.

September 22—The Havas Agency, chief French news bureau, says Allies took 185,000 prisoners in last two months, and estimates enemy's losses of men unable to return to the ranks at 600,000.

September 24—Count Von Hertling, in Reichstag, declares public discontent in Germany not justified by military situation on western front; he admits the situation is grave but says: "We have already had to pass through harder times."

September 26—United States troops on 20-mile front advance 7 miles between Argonne Forest and Verdun; take 12 towns, 5000 prisoners. Left of the Americans the French advance four miles, retake strong positions.

September 30—Bulgaria quits. Bulgarian delegates sign armistice. Bulgaria to evacuate Greece and Serbia, demobilize Army and surrender means of transportation, free passage to be given across territory and a right to occupy strategic points; terms purely military; no political conditions.

OCTOBER 1—General Pershing reports United States airmen since September 26 have brought down on western front more than 100 hostile planes and 21 balloons.

OCTOBER 3—Latest summary of war material taken by United States troops in Argonne section shows 120 guns, 2750 trench mortars, 300 machine guns, 100 thousand rounds of small arms ammunition. On western front in week ending today Allies have taken 60,000 prisoners and 1000 guns.

OCTOBER 5—King Boris, new King of Bulgaria, orders demobilization. Bulgaria notifies Austrians and Germans to quit her territory within a month. Imperial German Chancellor Prince Maximillian, in Reichstag, proposes an immediate suspension of hostilities. Entente Allies to be asked to state their peace terms.



- October 8—The President, through Secretary of State Lansing, asks Imperial German government if it accepts terms laid down by him on January 8, 1918, says he could not propose armistice to Allies so long as German or Austrian Armies are on their soil, and asks whether the Imperial Chancellor is speaking merely for the constituted authorities of the Empire, who have thus far conducted the war.
- October 12—President receives from Associated Press unofficial text of Germany's reply to his question of October 8th—accepts terms of Mr. Wilson's address of January 28, 1918; suggests a mixed commission to make arrangements; agrees to evacuation and claims to be supported by great majority of Reichstag and to speak in the name of the German people.
- October 18—More than 60 United States bombing planes attack Bayonville, Buzancy and other towns north of Grand Pre; escorting planes bring down ten German planes. One hundred forty United States planes raid beyond German lines and all return. They raid Remonville, Briquehay, Verpei, Clery-le-Grand, Aincreville and Inrecourt; pursuit planes engage in 35 aero fights, bring down 12 enemy planes. French Premier Clemenceau in Chamber of Deputies says: "Our victory does not spell revenge."
- October 21—British week's casualty list: Killed or died of wounds, officers 517, men 4971; wounded or missing, officers 1464, men 30,198.
- October 23—President Wilson replies to the German note; says he will take up question of armistice with his co-belligerents; refers details to field commanders and says: "If we must deal with the present Imperial Government of Germany we cannot trust it and must demand surrender."
- October 24—British advance on 25-mile front between Sambre Canal and the Scheldt, take 7000 prisoners and more than 100 guns; Forest of Raismes is cleared; Forest of Mormal reached; Allied line is within 15 miles of Maubeuge.
- OCTOBER 25—A German official paper at Berlin announces that the Emperor has accepted a request for retirement made by General of Infantry Ludendorff, the First Quarter Master General and Commander in time of peace of 25th Infantry Brigade. Dispatches from the German capital indicate that the resignation had been forced by the pro-peace majority in the Reichstag.
- October 26—In last four days Allies have taken 15,000 prisoners; German casualties have been 50,000.
- OCTOBER 29—Fierce fighting continues on mile wide strip between the Scheldt and the Rhonelle. United States artillery bombarded extensions of main line into Conflans and between areas near Spincourt and nearby towns for miles.
- November 1—General Pershing's forces advance to northeast of Grand Pre, capture a dozen or more fortified villages and 3000 prisoners; take Andevannc and clear the Bois des Loges.
- November 2—Above Verdun United States troops advance an average of 2½ miles on 14-mile front; in last two days take 3000 prisoners, 60 heavy cannon, hundreds of machine guns; capture Fosse, eight miles southwest from Stenay; railway junctions in regions of Montmedy and Longuyon under fire of United States big guns. Italians advance on 125-mile front, reach Tagliamento River; in present offensive have freed over 1000 square miles of conquered territory, taken 80,000 prisoners, 1600 guns; booty taken exceeds in value \$800,000,000.

NOVEMBER 4—British take Valenciennes about five miles on 30-mile front and are half way through Mormal Forest; take 10,000 prisoners, 200 guns; on northern flank approach Belgian border. First British division take villages of Fesmy, Hautreve and La Groise. Austria accepts truce terms—immediate ending of hostilities by land, on sea and in air; demobilization of Austria Hungarian Army; immediate withdrawal from North Sea to Switzerland, half of equipment to be surrendered; evacuation of all territory invaded since war began, military and railway equipment and coal to be given up; no new destruction, pillage or requisitions; right of free movement over territory and means of communication; evacuation in 15 days of all German troops, any remaining to be interned. People in Vienna reported to be delirious with joy at peace news. Armistice with Austria goes into effect at 3 p. m. Before that Italy had 300,000 prisoners, 5000 guns. Chilian Governernment seizes all German interned trade ships. NOVEMBER 5—Marshal Foch has the Allies Armistice terms ready for the Germans. A premature publication in afternoon papers that peace terms had been agreed to by Germany, made New York City delirious with joy; whistles and sirens blew, bells rang, business was practically abandoned and the streets filled up with merrymakers very similar to an old night before New Year celebration. The excitement continued to a late hour in spite of publication of denials of authenticity of report.

NOVEMBER 7—Twenty thousand deserters from the German Army are marching through the streets of Berlin.

November 8—Germany's Armistice delegates were received by Marshal Foch at 9 a.m. in a railroad car in which the Commander-in-Chief has his head-quarters. Matthias Erzberger, leader of the enemy delegation, speaking in French, announced that the German Government had appointed them plenipotentiaries to take cognizance of the terms and eventually to sign an armistice. Emperor William has refused a demand of the Socialists that he and the Crown Prince abdicate. Chancellor Maximillian, unable to control the Socialists, who are the most powerful bloc in the Reichstag majority, has resigned.

November 9—"The Kaiser and King has decided to renounce the throne" officially announces the retiring Chancellor, Prince Maximillian of Baden. Prince Max acted a few hours as Regent.

November 10—The German Courier from the meeting place of the armistice negotiations arrived at German grand headquarters at 10 a.m. He had been delayed by an explosion of an ammunition depot, which he mistook for firing. The revolution spreads throughout Germany, headed by workmen's and soldiers' councils. Lieutenant Krupp Von Bohien and Halbach, the head of the Krupp works, and his wife have been arrested.

November 10—The Ex-Kaiser and suite flee to Holland, arriving at Eysden on the frontier at 7:30 a.m. Thence he went to the Chateau Middachten, owned by Count William F. C. H. Von Bentinck at De Steeg, a town on the Gulders Yssel, an arm of the Rhine, 12 miles from the German border. Wilhelm H., the reigning king of Wurttemberg, abdicated on Friday night, according to Havas Agency dispatches from Basel.

November 11—German envoys signed the Allied armistice terms at Senilis, at 5 a.m., Paris time, which took effect at 11 a.m., Paris time (6 a.m. New York time). President Wilson reads the terms of the German armistice to Congress in joint session and announces the end of the war. Similar declarations were made to the British Parliament, the French National Assembly, and at other Allied capitals. In New York and other great cities the event was hailed by celebration.

TWIN FALLS COUNTY HOME SERVICE

Realizing that not only on the battlefields of France and in our Training Camps were all the acts of heroism and self-sacrifice shown, the publishers, with the kind co-operation of the heads of war work de-

partments and by sparing neither time nor effort, have gathered together the facts and figures that will lead to a just publicity of the men, women and children who did their duty and their bit. And so it is the purpose of the author to make this book a souvenir for, and a history of the Soldiers, Sailors and Marines; and, as well, of that great army that served at home.

We are apt to forget, with the blare of the bugle and the roll of the drum, the quiet, enduring spirit of patriotism shown in those not used by the Government in actual military service. Their's is a duty often more exacting and tedious to perform, lacking in the excitement and applause which spurs a soldier in his best effort, even to the making of the Supreme Sacrifice. As, however, in all cases of unselfish service and charity, there are those who "Let not the right hand know what the left doeth," so in taking account of the totals reached in the different lines of endeavor, we should bear in mind that, to a limited extent perhaps, many not mentioned in the following records played a vital and necessary part.

In reading the record of a people new in their environment for this county is practically in its infancy—one pauses to wonder at the marvelous demonstration of organization and patriotic love of country and liberty.

During its short existence as a center of business and agricultural pursuits, Twin Falls County has shown a marvelous growth due to the fact of its legion-like development.

But when the supreme test came and their country needed them, the men and women laid aside thoughts of personal advantage and answered that call with scarcely an exception. Boys and young men gave up civil life, and, if physically fit and needed, entered military service, there to train themselves in one of the bloodiest wars which has yet staggered the world and caused people to ask, "Is this the result of civilization and education?" Men and women not used as soldiers or nurses foreswore their whole social life and curbed business ambition for the one great cause of winning the war.

The people of this county have been applying themselves to commercial attainments, the results of which are as unbelievable as were the results of the genii in the mythical Alladin's Lamp. Nevertheless they have shown that these things are not the greatest motives of their lives, and, with memories and traditions they have acquired in the last few years serving as a ballast, the people of Twin Falls County, in the coming decades and generations, will live better lives, because these people have shown them how to live and work nobly.





EARL J. ANGELOW

Entered the service as a private July 1, 1918, being sent to Fort Logan, Colorado, and assigned to Battery D, 46th Artillery, C. A. C. He left the United States October 13, 1918, for France, where he was engaged with the American Expeditionary Forces. He enlisted when only sixteen years of age, and was discharged February 28, 1919.

CORPORAL JAMES H. WARD

Entered the service at Fort Douglas, Utah, December 12, 1917, as a private in Company E, 20th Infantry. He was discharged either the last of May or first of June, 1919, at Nitro, West Virginia, with the rank of Corporal.

WILLIS B. INGLESBY

Entered the service at Boise, Idaho, March 17, 1917, as a private, and was assigned to Company K, Buhl; he was later transferred to 151st M. G. Battalion, 42nd (Rainbow) Division. On January 11, 1918, he left the United States for France, where he spent four months in the Army of Occupation, participating in the following battles: Lorraine Forest, Champagne, Saint-Mihiel, Argonne Forest, Meuse. He was wounded at Baccaratt June 17, 1918, and was discharged May 10, 1919.



CORPORAL PAUL A. HARMON

Entered the service at Boise Barracks, Idaho, March 26, 1917, as a private. On January 10, 1918, he left the United States for service in France. where he served in Company D, 151st M. G. Battalion, and was promoted to Corporal in 42nd Division, at the front. Date of discharge, April 21, 1919.

MARVIN M. MONROE

Entered the service, as a private, October 4, 1917, and was sent to Camp Robinson, Sparta, Wisconsin, his assignment being to Battery B, 17th Field Artillery, 2nd Division. He left the United States, for France, on the 13th of December, 1917, and participated in the following campaigns: Verdun, second battle; Toul; Chateau Thierry; Soissons; Belleau Wood; Verdun again; second battle of Marne; Champagne. He was discharged May 4th, 1919, at the Walter Reed Hospital, Washington, D. C.

GRIFFEY G. GRAHAM

Entered the service June 28, 1918, as a private, and was sent to Camp Lewis, Washington, his assignment being the 357th Infantry, 90th Division. On August 29, 1918, he left the United States for foreign service, and was engaged in the battles of Saint-Mihiel and Meuse-Argonne; discharged June 18, 1919.



LLOYD A. BURKEY

Entered the service August 7, 1918, as a private, and was sent to Camp Fremont, California, where he was assigned to M. G. Company, 62nd Infantry, 8th Division. He was enroute for France when the armistice was signed, and was discharged May 15, 1919.

SERGEANT Robert D. Snodgrass

Entered the service at Boise Barracks, Boise, Idaho, December 1, 1915, and was later assigned to Company A, 150th M. G. Battalion, 42nd Division. On January 10, 1918, he left the United States, and for eighteen months was engaged with the American Expeditionary Forces, France. The battles he was engaged in were: Champagne, Chateau Thierry, Saint-Mihiel, Luneville, Baccaratt, Argonne, Meuse-Argonne, and Sedan; he was wounded at Chateau Thierry. Discharged May 20, 1919.

ALEX MEDUNA

Entered the service April 29, 1918, as a private, and was sent to Camp Dodge, Iowa, and assigned to Company K, 350th Infantry; discharged March 12, 1919.



WM. A. McCampbell



G. R. Bybee



MURL B. TAYLOR



He took active part in the Saint-Mihiel, Soisson and Argonne drives and was severely wounded October 9, 1918, and was discharged from the army because of his wounds July 7, 1919. He spent eleven months overseas.

SGT.-MAJ. KENNETH H. BROWN

Enlisted September 15, 1915, in Company D, Second Idaho Infantry. Saw service on the Mexican border in 1916. Was transferred to the 146th Field Artillery, Headquarters Company. Sailed for France December 24, 1917. He took part in the following engagements: Champagnc-Marne defensive; Marne-Aisne offensive; Saint-Mihiel offensive; Meuse-Argonne offensive; Verdun sector service. In July, 1918, he received orders to pack. Landed at Brest, France, and took part in a number of engagements, serving in England, in France and at Coblenz, Germany. Discharged June 2, 1919.

SGT.-MAJ. CARL L. DELONG

Mr. DeLong's desire was to go with Company D when the boys left, but as he had a wife and seven-year-old child depending upon him for support and no one who could take over his business in his absence, he was compelled to remain at home for a short time. He soon arranged his business affairs, however, and on the 21st day of May, 1918, became a soldier. He served at Camp Humphreys and Lee in the Fifth Replacement Engineers, and was discharged as Battalion Sergeant Major on December 11, 1918. Returning to Twin Falls, he became an active worker in forming the first soldiers' organization, which has now merged into the American Legion, and was a delegate to the first state convention at Boise, where he was selected as delegate to the second state convention, held at Twin Falls April 7, 8 and 9, 1920.

FRANK A. KENDALL

Enlisted in Company D, Second Idaho Infantry, in 1916 and served on the Mexican border. On July 1st he was discharged as physically unfit for service. Frank could not take the M. D.'s word that he was not sound in limb so he tried the different recruiting offices until the navy accepted him on June 10, 1917. He was discharged as sound on April 1, 1919, at Bremington, Washington.

HOMER H. HALL

Enlisted March 15, 1918, and served with the 312th Infantry. Was on a number of the fronts, including Blois, Belleau Woods. Spent some time at La Havre, France. He was in charge of the Red Cross Hospital in Paris, and held rank as Surgery Assistant. He was decorated twice by the French government.

GLEN L. ROSZELL

Entered the service in August and was sent to Logan, Utah, where he took up the study of wireless and was assigned to the Signal Corps. Was discharged December, 1918.

SERGT. HENRY ORTHELL



SERGT. JAMES V. THOMPSON



TWIN FALLS COUNTY LIBERTY LOANS

FTER WAR had been declared on Germany, it was readily seen that the cost of carrying it to a successful conclusion involved the outlay of money in such vast amounts that the raising of it was a big problem in itself. The records of the costs of previous wars

could hardly be of benefit in determining what the cost of this one was to be, as never before in the history of man had such an army been planned as the United States proposed to put into the conflict. Certain it was that the war was to move on at an enormous expense, and the money, therefore, must be raised.

Secretary of the Treasury Wm. G. McAdoo, with the support of the President and administration, proposed the sale of bonds to the American people, and on April 24, 1917, the so-called Bond Law was passed, and on May the second, the First Liberty Bond Drive was launched.

The first two Liberty Loans of Twin Falls County were taken by the banks and the amount of \$898,000 was raised without much effort. Twin Falls County began to meet the responsibility placed upon her people.

At the beginning of the Third Liberty Loan, Mr. C. D. Thomas was appointed chairman of the county, while Mr. J. W. Faris had charge of the Buhl district, and much of the success of the Liberty Loan Drives following must be credited to them, as long hours of work and their enthusiasm made possible the remarkable showing made by the county. Not only the men of Twin Falls County gave their time and means to this cause, but hundreds of the ladies gave up household duties and entered the ranks, as the dark days had now come and every effort must be put forth to meet the many obligations that Twin Falls County must assume.

The Fourth Loan will always be impressed upon the minds of the patriotic people of the county, as the quota of one million dollars was raised in the short time of twelve hours, a record that will stand as a true example of the spirit of these people. Mr. W. R. Priebe, Mr. C. S. McMartin, Mr. E. L. MacVicar and Mr. Stuart Taylor acted as Majors over assigned districts, and the records show that at all times their faithful work and co-operation were the stepping stones to the success achieved.

HISTORY OF TWIN FALLS COUNTY CHAPTER AMERICAN RED CROSS

INTRODUCTION


HE ORGANIZATION of the Twin Falls County Chapter, American Red Cross, was naturally preceded by that of a Red Cross Auxiliary in Twin Falls. On August 4, 1916, a group of five women organized a Red Cross Auxiliary in Twin Falls.

They elected as officers: Chairman, Mrs. Kennedy Packard; vice-chairman, Mrs. E. J. Ostrander; secretary, Mrs. C. H. Krengel; treasurer, Mrs. W. H. Dwight. These officers, together with Mrs. P. W. McRoberts, formed the auxiliary. The immediate work of this organization was that of rendering assistance and comfort to the soldiers of Company D, who had been called from Twin Falls during the summer of 1916 to duty on the Mexican border and were stationed at Nogales, Arizona. At the meetings during August and September the matter of permanently organizing a Red Cross Chapter was discussed, but such organization was not effected until the following spring.

On March 23, 1917, the Red Cross Auxiliary, by motion unanimously carried, merged itself into a chapter of the Red Cross, conditions at that time seeming to warrant such action. Mr. S. D. Morris, director of the Mountain States division at Denver, named it the "Twin Falls Tract Chapter," with its jurisdiction the "Twin Falls Tract." A few days later, on March 27th, at a meeting in the Commercial club rooms, the organization was completed and officers for the new chapter were elected.

In April a rally was held in the High School auditorium, which resulted in increased activities in the Red Cross and a Red Cross membership in May of 858. Chapter headquarters were established at the Commercial Club rooms and the secretary was instructed to be there from 2 to 4 P. M. daily.

Although the jurisdiction of the chapter at the time of its organization included the entire Twin Falls tract, in April, 1917,



it was decided to waive jurisdiction to the "Buhl Highway District" at the latter's request. At this time, our eighteen auxiliaries (located at Twin Falls, Kimberly, Filer, Rogerson, Hollister, Hansen, Murtaugh, Eden, Hazelton, Berger, Curry, Community, Rock Creek, Milner, Pleasant Valley, Pleasant View, Excelsior and Bickel) were working directly under and reporting directly to the chapter. This organization continued until June, 1918, when it was changed in accordance with instructions from Division Headquarters (the Territorial Chapter and Jurisdictional Branch) making auxiliaries directly responsible to branches and branches directly responsible to the chapter, which organization exists at present. Under this chapter, which name was changed to the Twin Falls County Chapter, there were established nine branches. These, together with their auxiliaries, are as follows:





This was dispensed with, however, under the new organization plans of June, 1918, because each branch has a representative on the regular Chapter Executive Board.


Among the important committees, aside from those explained under "Record of Work," are:

MILITARY RELIEF—Mrs. W.F. Edwards has had charge of this department practically from its organization in May, 1917, and has given practically every afternoon to the work since that time. Under her direction, the work has increased remarkably, as shown by the following list of supplies which have been made under her supervision:

Mrs. Edwards has had the support of many faithful women in the community, which made the work in this department so successful.

The Salvage Committee was organized in June, 1917, with Mrs. Kennedy Packard as chairman. A Red Cross Shop was started immediately, and during the six months of its existence \$1,085.79 was paid into the chapter treasury. The Red Cross Shop was a great help, not only to the chapter, but to the community as well.



Entertainment Committee—This committee was organized for the purpose of raising funds for the chapter. On October 3, 1917, a Military Bridge party was given, which netted the chapter \$200.00. This was to be used as a Christmas fund.

In April, 1918, Mr. John Costello donated 500 boxes of apples to be sold, the proceeds going to the Red Cross. Mr. James McMillan was chairman of the committee and \$400.00 was realized from the sale.

THE FOURTH OF JULY COMMITTEE, under the chairmanship of Mr. W. R. Priebe, gave an elaborate Fourth of July celebration, which netted the chapter \$8,002.50.

Several of our branches and auxiliaries have had entertainments and served lunches, all of which increased the Chapter funds.


Although the chapter found it unnecessary to have a regular Canteen Committee, nevertheless we had a Soldiers' Farewell Committee, with Mr. Stuart Taylor as chairman, whose duty it was to give the soldier boys a good sendoff. Besides donations of money, lunch was served on three occasions to the 226 drafted men. The lunches were served under the direction of Mrs. F. F. Bracken, chairman of the city branch.

In October, 1918, arrangements were being made to organize a Motor Corps under the chairmanship of Mrs. Edward Johnson, but the signing of the armistice checked all further plans. Although a number of ladies volunteered their automobiles and services, no regular Chapter Motor Corps was established for any length of time.

The Nursing Activities Committee was organized in April, 1919, with Mrs. Burton E. Morse as chairman. The work of this committee has only begun, and the future of the Red Cross will largely be connected with this committee.

METHODS OF WORK

As seen by the foregoing article, the work of some of the committees, such as Military Relief and Home Service, has increased rapidly. With the signing of the armistice, the work of



most of the other committees stopped—such as all committees for raising funds, including the Red Cross Shop. The educational work, having been discontinued by the influenza epidemic, has not been resumed. The Committee on Organization, under Mrs. J. E. White, became merely formal in June, 1918, when the new organization was completed.

RECORD OF WORK

FIRST WAR FUND—The First War Fund was in charge of Mr. L. L. Breckenridge, chairman; Mr. E. L. MacVicar, campaign manager. About \$85,000 was subscribed and \$77,000 collected.

Second War Fund—The Second War Fund drive was under Mr. Stuart Taylor's direction. About \$46,000 was subscribed and \$44,000 collected.

FIRST CHRISTMAS ROLL CALL—The first Christmas roll call—that of December, 1917—was conducted by Mrs. J. E. White, who had charge of the county outside of Twin Falls, and Mrs. P. W. McRoberts, who conducted the campaign in the city. A house to house canvass was made. That the work was thoroughly organized and carried out is shown by the result. The figures used include Christmas drive, plus membership before the drive.

Second Roll Call—The second roll call—December, 1918—was also successful. Miss Beatrice Ostrander, as chairman, organized the work throughout the chapter jurisdiction. All branches and auxiliaries responded nobly, notwithstanding the fact that the influenza epidemic was raging at that time. The figures include only Christmas roll call.

USED CLOTHING—Mr. A. Guibert, chairman, upon the first collection of used clothing, collected nearly five tons. Mrs. Packard, Mrs. Johnson and Mrs. Guibert assisted him in this work.

Mrs. Kennedy Packard had charge of the second collection of used clothing, when 12,137 pounds were collected.

Miss Stella Hibbard was chairman of the committee for the third collection of used clothing, at which time 6,986 pounds were collected.

The linen for France was entirely collected by the Junior Auxiliaries of the chapter. The quota and the amount collected, follow:

The committee on the collection of fruit pits, Mr. V. H. Decker, chairman, collected about 500 pounds, but before shipment was made, word came to discontinue the collection.

No platinum was obtained, but about 135 pounds of tin and lead foil were collected by the Juniors for which the chapter received \$10.00.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP ENROLLMENT—The Junior Red Cross was under the chairmanship of Supt. Hal G. Blue and Miss Jane Maxwell. Twenty-four auxiliaries were formed with a membership of 3800. The form and amount of assistance rendered to the Senior Red Cross is indicated by the following facts based upon data furnished by Mr. Hal G. Blue, chairman, chapter school committee:

The Juniors have also helped in the drives for used clothing and the collection of linen, tin foil and fruit pits.



Purchase of Liberty Bonds and War Savings Stamps and Thrift Stamps approximated \$60,000.

Thirty-one garden clubs were organized with 1100 pupils enrolled. Information bearing upon the Red Cross was used as supplementary reading and as material for language and story work.

During the influenza epidemic the Red Cross assisted in a number of different ways in alleviating the serious condition which prevailed. In Filer, a diet kitchen was established. In Kimberly, an emergency hospital was equipped at a cost of \$400, which greatly helped the situation there and in the surrounding country. In Twin Falls, an emergency hospital with a capacity of fifteen beds was opened under the supervision of the county. Later, during the second wave of the epidemic, this hospital was taken over by the Red Cross under the supervision of Dr. Emma Crossland, and was operated for a month. Sixteen patients were cared for, the county bearing all expenses. The chapter also met a serious emergency in acting as an agency in locating and placing available nurses.

The Nursing Survey was made in October, 1918, under the direction of Mrs. Andrew Rogerson, who made a house to house canvass, completing this work within two weeks. As a result of her work, 73 nurses filled out questionnaires. By consulting these questionnaires, it was possible for the chapter secretary and Dr. Crossland to place many nurses during the "flu" epidemic.

EDUCATIONAL—The educational work has been under the supervision of Dr. Emma Crossland and Dr. C. R. Scott. The first class in Home Care of the Sick was organized in June, 1917, but owing to delay in authorizing and instruction, work was not begun until September. Mrs. Ida Cracroft Howe was appointed instructor, the classes meeting in her home weekly. Number in Class One, 16; number receiving certificates, 10. Number in Class Two, 10; number receiving certificates, 5.

In January, 1918, a third class was organized, meeting with Mrs. Howe as instructor. Number in class, 10. Number taking examination and receiving certificates, 8.

In August, 1918, a class was organized, meeting with Mrs. Austin D. Thomas, registered graduate nurse, as instructor, the class meeting in her home on Tuesday evenings. Number in class, 16. Number taking examination and receiving certificates, 12.


Afternoon classes in Kimberly and Filer under the instruction of Mrs. Thomas were also opened, but owing to the epidemic of influenza, these classes were forced to discontinue their work. On account of press of other Red Cross duties, examinations were never held.

Only one class in dietetics was organized. This was under the instruction of Miss Margaret Luella Crossland, an enrolled Red Cross dietitian. The meetings were held in the domestic science kitchen of the high school. Number in class, 15. Number taking examination and receiving certificates, 15. Owing to the expense of this course, it was thought impractical to attempt further work.

A class in first aid was organized in June, 1917, with Dr. H. W. Wilson as instructor, but owing to his absence in the East, the work was largely done under the instruction of Dr. Emma Crossland. Dr. C. D. Weaver conducted the examination, fourteen out of a class of twenty-four taking examinations and receiving certificates.

In the Spring of 1918, Dr. C. R. Scott became chairman of the First Aid Committee, instructing the classes personally. Three classes in Twin Falls were organized and conducted, at the close of which work 75 certificates were granted.

Personnel Recruiting—The work of personnel recruiting was in the hands of the chapter secretaries and Mrs. W. F. Edwards, who was appointed by division headquarters to interview all applicants. Mr. L. L. Breckenridge, a prominent Twin Falls business man, volunteered his services in France for a period of six months from April to October, 1918. Rev. H. O. Anderson left the executive board and went into Y. M. C. A. work.




Miss Geneva Stafford and Miss Martha Snyder completed the course in Volunteer Nurses' Aid and were awaiting the call to service. Several others were making application for service abroad when the armistice was signed, and personnel recruiting was stopped.

Canteen—This chapter had no regular canteen committee since being at the end of the branch line of the O. S. L. R. R. no soldiers passed through the city. However, this chapter, at the request of the Lincoln County chapter at Shoshone, Idaho, donated \$20 per month and later \$40 per month to their canteen fund.

Classification of Working Auxiliaries—Under each of the nine branches there are one or more auxiliaries, as named in the "Introduction," this being the total number of auxiliaries so called. Various religious groups, lodges, clubs, and like organizations worked, not as auxiliaries, but merely as units of which no separate and distinct record has been kept.

Home Service—The committee on civilian relief, organized June 12, 1917, consisted of Mr. Breckenridge, Mr. Maxwell, and Mrs. McRoberts. Later, Mr. Maxwell, being more centrally located, was chosen chairman and acted in this capacity until December 14, 1918. In the summer of 1918, Mrs. E. L. MacVicar attended the Home Service Conference in Seattle, and on her return in August became the executive secretary for the Home Service Section. In December, 1918, Judge E. A. Walters became chairman of the section. In February, 1919, Mrs. E. L. MacVicar resigned as secretary and Mrs. Austin D. Thomas was appointed secretary to fill the vacancy. In August, 1918, the branch organization was perfected, with chairmen as follows, the present chairman's name following the original where changes have been made:

Branch conference was conducted by Mrs. E. L. MacVicar September 16th to 18th, inclusive, assisted by members of the Home Service executive. In this way the workers in the various branches were able to receive valuable assistance.

In January, 1919, a Home Service conference for Southern Idaho was held at Pocatello, conducted by Mr. F. P. Foisie, director of civilian relief for the northwest division. Ten delegates were in attendance at this conference from our chapter.

A three weeks' chapter course—February 10 to 28—was conducted in Jewell Hall at Twin Falls by Miss Virginia McMechen, supervisor of Home Service Institutes. This course consisted of lectures, round tables, and field work which was done by those who obtained certificates for the chapter course. Several visitors attended who were not taking the regular work under Miss McMechen.

Besides the conferences mentioned above, occasional branch and chapter conferences have been held with the executive secretary, and the consulting or executive committee of the Home Service section has held various conferences to discuss the problems relating to the welfare of the returned soldiers.

The work of the Home Service section is steadily increasing. Since August, 1918, 1265 families have received some form of help. In our Home Service section we have a committee of business men who take a special interest in advising or assisting our returned soldiers with any employment problems.

Our only activities along the lines of disaster relief have been our family relief work during the epidemic of the influenza. This was very much increased at that time. General—As stated under "Organization," in the description of the Nursing Activities Committee, the future of the Red Cross is largely bound up with that committee. This committee is planning to place a graduate registered nurse in Twin Falls County to provide for skilled nursing, care for the sick in their own homes, and to teach sanitation and hygiene. At present the association is strictly under Red Cross jurisdiction, but the Red Cross hopes that the protection of the public health of the community, through public health nursing, will soon be recognized as a public function for which public funds will be appropriated as they are for public education or police and fire protection.

They are planning to develop future extension work of at least three divisions, that of Junior membership, home service, and public health nursing.

The Twin Falls County chapter, being largely in an agricultural section, has jurisdiction over a comparatively large area, covering a territory of about sixty miles in length. This made it impossible for all the branches to be represented at each branch meeting. However, each branch, no matter how far distant, willingly did its share of Red Cross work, and the spirit of co-operation among all was remarkable.

BUHL CHAPTER HISTORY, AMERICAN RED CROSS

N APRIL 3, 1917, a mass meeting of the citizens of Buhl was held in the Masonic Hall to discuss plans for the formation of a Red Cross Society in Buhl. Mrs. R. W. Allred was elected temporary chairman, Miss L. C. Chamberlin, secretary, and on May 3 a

second mass meeting was held in the high school auditorium, at which time a permanent organization was perfected. Rev. C. O. Heath was elected chairman; Mrs. R. W. Allred, vice-chairman; Miss L. C. Chamberlin, secretary; Mr. Glen Fritcher, treasurer. At this meeting the chairmen of the various committees were appointed and the work in general planned.

Mrs. F. C. Marquardson was appointed chairman of Military Relief, and under her leadership the sewing classes were organized, and met in the Frank H. Buhl school during the first summer. Besides having charge of the sewing, Mrs. Marquardson did all of the purchasing of materials and did most of the cutting. She was ably assisted during those first months of readjustment by Mrs. Anna Faris, Mrs. C. H. McQuown, Miss Helene Almondinger, Mrs. Charles Bower and others. Much credit is due Mrs. Marquardson for her faithful and efficient work.

At the beginning of school, the sewing was moved to rooms over the Boring Drug Co. These rooms were occupied until they were outgrown, when the sewing department was again moved, this time to the ladies' waiting room in the Ford Garage, and later to the rooms over the Buhl Grocery, the entire upstairs being rented for Red Cross work.

As the war developed and the demands for hospital garments and supplies increased, so also did the spirit of loyalty and determination of the patriotic women of Buhl and vicinity rise to meet every demand made of them. Branches were organized in all of the school districts of the Buhl Highway district, as fol-

lows: Lucerne, Deep Creek, Sunset View, Castleford, Poplar Grove, Fairview, Willow Dale, Syringo, North View, District 59, Superior, and Cedar Draw.

All of the branches did splendid work, always co-operating in every way with the Buhl chapter, and to them is due much credit for the success of the Buhl Red Cross. Much of the work of organizing the district branches was done by Mrs. R. W. Allred and Mr. C. G. Manning. Almost all of the auxiliaries were visited by them and their enthusiasm in Red Cross work always met a ready response from their country co-workers.

In October, 1917, Rev. C. O. Heath resigned his position as chairman of the Red Cross, and Mr. C. H. McQuown was elected to fill the vacancy. In accepting the office Mr. McQuown accepted all of the responsibilities that went with it, and during his term of office the Red Cross came before business or pleasure and the success of the Buhl chapter is largely due to his untiring work.

Classes were organized in home nursing under the supervision of Miss Bertha Wilson, a graduate nurse well qualified to take charge of the work. Miss Tilson very ably conducted classes in Home Dietetics. Much good work was done by both Miss Wilson and Miss Tilson.

The surgical dressing work was first begun in the room over the Boring Drug Co., but later moved to the new Red Cross quarters. The large back room was fitted up and made an ideal work room. Mrs. Detrick was in charge of this department and gave a great deal of her time to the personal supervision of the work. Seven classes a week were conducted.

Mrs. Detrick had as her assistants, Mrs. Allred, Mrs. Marquardson, Mrs. Frank Tompkins, Mrs. Hugh J. Sherfey, Mrs. George McPherson, Mrs. J. H. Murphy, Mrs. N. O. Thompson and Mrs. George Marshall, all of whom conducted classes. To Mrs. George Marshall belongs the honor of having contributed the most time to this branch of the work, she often working as much as six days in the week besides doing her share of other war relief work. The surgical department was awarded a certificate of honor.

In the early days of the war, the entertainment committee, with Mrs. W. R. Green as first chairman (and later succeeded by Mrs. George Layne), contributed largely to the success of the Many entertainments, dances and amusements were conducted under the auspices of this committee, thereby adding neat sums of money to the Red Cross funds; but as the demands for money grew, plans were made for a community day sale to be held early in April, 1918, on the Broadway School lots. This was a day never to be forgotten in Buhl. The German drive was at its height, and every message from overseas was eagerly awaited. While the bidding was being conducted by four auctioneers and thousands of people crowding around, Mr. Mc-Quown read the bulletin of the day, saying that twenty thousand English soldiers had been captured; many of our own loved Buhl boys were even then on French soil waiting for the day when they, too, would be called to face the enemy. The news only caused hands to go deeper in pockets, with a vow that, cost what it might, the principles of right and justice should win. At the close of the day over ten thousand dollars had been added to the Red Cross treasury. Messrs. Koppleman, Manning and Laird were the committee who so successfully planned and carried out the first Red Cross community day on the Twin Falls tract.

Mrs. W. S. Hyde was elected chairman of the Belgian relief, and is deserving of especial praise for her devotion to this work. Always sympathetic and kind to those in need, her heart went out to the stricken people of the devastated countries of Europe. Mrs. Hyde thoroughly understands the art of remodeling clothing, and many practical and beautiful garments were made from discarded clothing. She was assisted largely by the members and friends of the Baptist church.

Miss Mary Hinkly was one of the first to enroll as a war relief worker. Being an expert knitter, she was given charge of the knitting department, and conducted several classes a week at the home of Mrs. Allred, besides having night classes for the benefit of the teachers and business girls. She visited most of the rural branches and organized the knitting work, besides turning in a vast amount of work herself. Miss Hinkly was "always on the job," and we feel sure many a grateful soldier will rise up to call her blessed.

Those who deserve especial credit for both the amount and quality of knitting done are: Mrs. Morford, who with her knitting machine turned out hundreds of pairs of socks; Mrs. Koppleman had the splendid record of 37 sweaters and three scarfs; Mrs. George Davis turned in 33 sweaters or an average of one a week; Mrs. Charles Yingst, Mrs. Grieves, Mrs. T. F. Flinn and Mrs. J. Noble and many others did splendid work. The knitting department was awarded a certificate of honor for their good work done. Those who were connected with Red Cross work will long remember Grandma Grieves, one of the first to take up active work. She continued faithfully at her self-appointed task of working buttonholes until almost the last garment was finished. Early and late, through storm or sunshine, heat or cold, Grandma was always at her work. Not only was she famous for her buttonholes, but her knitting record was a matter of pride to her many friends.

In May, 1917, Mrs. McClusky was appointed chairman of the Home Service section. Under her management funds were raised with which to purchase the first Christmas boxes for the Buhl soldiers; 75 boxes were prepared and filled with presents, fruit cake and candy. Later, Mrs. McClusky was compelled to give up the work on account of poor health and J. M. Shank was elected to fill the vacancy. In April, 1919, G. A. Divelbiss succeeded Mr. Shank as chairman; both Mr. Shank and Mr. Divelbiss did good work in assisting soldiers in filling out legal blanks and advising them as to their rights and privileges in various ways. In February, 1919, Mrs. H. P. McCutchen was elected executive secretary of the Home Service section, and opened up an office in the Red Cross rooms, and from the first many soldiers and their friends availed themselves of this branch of the service to secure information and advice.

The supervision of the packing of the Christmas boxes for 1918 was done by Mrs. Sol J. Hammel. The committee could not have chosen more wisely, for Mrs. Hammel was never happier than when performing some service of love for the boys in

khaki; her ready sympathy and cheerfulness was always appreciated by those who met her. No doubt Mrs. Hammel took a more personal interest in the soldiers than any one in Buhl. She was assisted by Mrs. Glen Fritcher, Mrs. Tom Fritcher and others.

In November, 1918, Mrs. W. A. Thompson was elected chairman of Military Relief to relieve Mrs. Marquardson. She gave very faithful service for several months. Later Mrs. Thomas Holmes, assisted by Miss Deemer, took charge of the work and under their management the sewing was completed, the chapter was awarded a certificate of honor, and the following articles were shipped to the Division office at Seattle: 618 bath robes, 1024 suits pajamas, 802 hospital bed shirts, 50 bed jackets, 784 sheets, 516 pillow slips, 608 hand towels, 200 bath towels, 60 feather pillows, 250 fracture pillows.

In July, 1918, Mrs. R. W. Allred resigned as first vice chairman and was succeeded by Mrs. J. C. Nason. Mrs. Allred is deserving of much praise for her consecration to the Red Cross work of Buhl chapter and vicinity. Always ready to assume any responsibility that came to her office, she gave up all social activities, and donated practically her full time to the work, for the sake of the boys in service. In May, 1918, Mrs. Allred was elected delegate to the Northwestern Division Conference to be held at Seattle, which she attended, paying her own expenses. While at conference, her interest was centered in the Home Service section as one of the most important lines of work; her great ambition was to see this branch of the service thoroughly organized in Buhl, as a means of keeping in touch with the soldiers and their families.

In the fall of 1918 the question of providing a place for the care of the influenza patients was brought to the attention of the Red Cross board, and it was unanimously voted to open up an emergency hospital in the Broadway school building. Mrs. Detrick was in charge of the hospital, and about seventy-five patients were treated. The Buhl chapter was the first to operate an emergency hospital on the Twin Falls tract, and many other chapters came to Buhl for information as to their methods.


The first call for Belgian relief came in October, 1918. Mr. Koppleman was chairman of this drive, which terminated in the shipment of thirty-five cases weighing 4264 pounds, which more than doubled the quota asked for. The second call came in April, 1919, and was in charge of Mr. W. S. Hyde; 3400 pounds were shipped at this time besides \$191.00 in cash.

In response to a request for a linen shower for France, Rev. C. O. Heath was appointed chairman, and reported the following items collected: 104 bath towels, 205 hand towels, 146 handkerchiefs, 56 sheets.

Miss L. C. Chamberlin acted as the very efficient secretary from the time of organization until July, 1918, when she resigned. Mrs. Stanley Webber was elected to fill the vacancy, and served until April, 1919.

While Buhl was denied the privilege of conducting active canteen work on account of the geographical location, the people nevertheless did their part in connection with the Red Cross chapter at Shoshone Falls. The canteen work was under the supervision of Mrs. N. O. Thompson, who gave freely of her time; \$25.00 was given each month, with the exception of three months during the demobilization period, when \$75 per month was sent. Three large boxes of magazines were shipped, besides cigarettes and tea towels.

During the first months of the war a class in first aid was conducted by Dr. J. H. Murphy and quite a few of the ladies availed themselves of this instruction. The gratitude of the public is due in no small way to the men and women who have served faithfully and well as members of the Red Cross executive board. The personnel of the first official board is as follows: C. H. McQuown, Mrs. R. W. Allred, Miss L. C. Chamberlin, Glen Fritcher, J. R. Faris, R. W. Allred, Van Patten, C. O. Heath. R. V. Laird, C. G. Manning, S. C. Peck, Koppelman, Mrs. Anna Faris, McClusky, N. O. Thompson, I. F. Constant, W. S. Hyde, W. A. Thompson, Miss Hinckly. Mr. Koppleman has been identified with the Red Cross from the date of organization until the present time. He has attended all of the board meetings, and served on many of the important committees. The Buhl chapter owes a great deal of its success to Mr. Koppleman.



Note—Mayor Bracken succeeded Mr. Breckenridge as chairman upon the departure of the former for Y. M. C. A. work in France; and Mr. Ostrander took the chair on the sudden death of Mr. Bracken. In the same manner Mr. Davies succeeded Mr. Wise as attorney. Prepared in haste and in the absence of Secretary MacVicar, this roster may be incomplete, but it is hoped not.

HE VAUNTED "efficiency" of Germany in governmental control of the popular mind, mood and action, and the consequent success of all administrative measures, especially those of a military character, depended to a great degree upon the network of minor officials through which everybody, everywhere, was kept under surveillance, and authority asserted or propaganda disseminated as need appeared. The same was true to a greater or less degree among all the nations of Europe. But we in the United States called ourselves citizens of a "free country," and

in the spring of 1917, when our belated entrance into the World War was at last made, we were not only "free" from any kind of preparation therefor, but especially were we "free" from any means of effectively reaching individual citizens or of uncovering or thwarting the machinations of the evil-disposed, who

seemed to be everywhere.



It was undoubtedly a painful and growing realization of the gravity and danger of this situation that brought into existence the Council of Defense—first National, then State, then County, and at last Auxiliary Councils in almost every community. Such being the case, it is easy to understand how it grew into an institution of great magnitude, responsibility and importance. Absolutely unique and probably wholly impossible in any other country than ours, the Council of Defense, without the slightest legislative standing or authority, turned a light on all the dark corners of the land.

It felt for and stimulated the patriotic pulse everywhere; it encouraged the faint-hearted and put the fear of God into the souls of ignorance, indifference and greed; it defeated would-be spies, hushed sedition and detected and turned over to the Federal authorities active enemies. In addition to all this, it assumed a more or less active supervision and direction of the drives for the sale of government securities and the raising of funds for the great war charities—in short, was ubiquitous in war propaganda and war work of all kinds at all times.

It was well along in the summer of 1917 when a National Council of Defense was appointed by the administrative authorities at Washington—largely, at first, as an advisory body. This soon led to the organization of subordinate state councils. Then followed the county councils—that for Twin Falls County being one of the first in the State of Idaho.

After some correspondence between the governor and the then sheriff of this county, Mr. Frank M. Kendall, ex-Congressman Robert McCracken came to this city late in November, 1917; cards of membership in the proposed council, signed by the governor and the chairman of the state council, Dr. E. A. Bryan, were issued to fourteen persons, representing varied local circles and interests, especially including the various war work and other county organizations; and, on Tuesday evening, December 4, 1917, at the courthouse, the Twin Falls County Council of Defense was organized by the election of L. L. Breckenridge, chairman; C. L. Longley, vice chairman; E. L. MacVicar, secretary, and James H. Wise, legal advisor.

As the work of the council developed and need seemed to arise, others, largely from outlying parts of the county, were elected by vote and appointed, on request, to the state council until the membership aggregated as indicated by the roster given above. But the fourteen original members, all or nearly all of whom participated in the organization, were as follows:

This council met regularly once each week, with a number of extra special meetings, for a round year, and continued its meetings, on call or otherwise, well into the year 1919, and has never formally disbanded. It will, of course, be impractical to attempt any detail of its activities, but they were along the lines indicated in the opening paragraph above, were many, varied and, upon the whole, effective.

Charges of disloyalty were always fully investigated — as much for the protection of any one who might be wrongfully accused as for the detection of traitors. Refusal to buy bonds or contribute to the Red Cross or Y. M. C. A., especially with apparent hostility or by one amply able, were inquired into; and while no compulsion was attempted, many an one saw the situation differently after an interview with the council. The county sheriff, also a member of the council, had twenty-one deputies (most of them on the q. t.) scattered over the county and at the service of the inquisitorial body, either for information or action. It was with the advice and approval of the council that Sheriff Kendall declared the Milner and Salmon Dams restricted territory and had them carefully guarded—as were also some important bridges. Interest was shown in certain German religious societies and schools, where later the flag flew at the ridgepole and preaching and teaching in the German language was abandoned.

In the food stresses, when neither wheat nor flour could be held in quantity, that matter was looked after and overly thrifty citizens were persuaded to turn in their surplus without delay. The matter of flour supply to local bakers and their prices for bread demanded no small time and attention, while on occasion cars were secured for shipment of spuds and other food products. The council not infrequently was turned into a laundry for dirty linen, either family or neighborhood; but in most cases it was eventually hung out to dry in pretty good shape.

Out of a multitude of cases and hearings before the council, the most notable as well as the most persistent and difficult grew out of complaints and charges impugning the loyalty of the then pastor of one of the largest and most influential churches in the city of Twin Falls—this case gaining more than a state-wide notoriety and almost convulsing the local church and community. The pastor appeared before the council and made a statement that was at first deemed satisfactory; but a renewal and enlargement of the charges resulted in the taking of voluminous testimony together with shorthand reports of sermons and prayers. With a purpose to save the church, in which diverse feeling ran high, this evidence was withheld from the federal officials pending a visit from Bishop R. J. Cook, of Helena, Montana, whose jurisdiction at the time extended over Idaho.

The Bishop came, met with the church authorities and with the council of defense. And it may not be improper to state, at this late date and as a matter of local history, that when the Bishop heard the evidence, partly given in his presence and partly read from the records, he then and there pledged the council that if the matter should be left to him the pulpit should be closed to the defendant until the close of the war. The event proved, however, that instead of inflicting a penalty, the Bishop chose the line of least resistance and persuaded the pastor that he needed a vacation—which his official board voted him and upon which he started at once.

Having said so much about this greatly mooted case, it should in fairness be added that upon resuming his pulpit after his return from vacation, the reverend gentleman preached a sermon as thoroughly patriotic as it was badly belated; and also that the final individual and unrecorded conclusion of most of the members of the council was that the dominie had really intended to be, and believed that he was, a truly loyal American citizen; but that his pulpit ethics, his training and point of view were such as to have made his influence in the community not at all what it should have been.

No "sketch" even of the activities of the Council of Defense for Twin Falls County would be adequate without mention of the auxiliary councils organized in eight or nine different parts of the county. This was done early in 1918, and proved exceedingly helpful. As a matter of fact, the National Council gave Idaho credit for having one of the best and most efficient organizations in the country; and the auxiliary councils contributed largely to this end. The attempt is made, therefore, to append the membership of all these organizations. It may not be perfect, but is the best obtainable. It will be observed that the officers were largely members of the Central, or County Council:


Rest ye in peace, ye Flanders dead.

CHARLES L. DES RUISSEAUX

Sergeant Des Ruisseaux was born in the year 1892, the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Des Ruisseaux of Twin Falls. Before entering the service of his country, he was connected with the First National Bank of Twin Falls. He was one of the first men to enlist in the Marine Corps from Twin Falls County, and through his ability was promoted to assistant paymaster of his regiment. He left for France in October, 1918, and died of pneumonia in Paris, November 19, 1918.

LIEUTENANT CLARK G. FOX

Born November 5, 1883, in Macon County in the state of Missouri, and moved to Idaho in 1908. He lived in Buhl until he entered the service. He was a member of the Idaho State Guards, Company K. In 1916 he was a member of the Second Idaho and was with that unit on the Mexican border. In January, 1918, he sailed to France and served in the Fourth Infantry, where he saw much service, meeting his death in the Argonne-Meuse offensive while leading his men in the attack, September 26, 1918.

ELMER JOHN HAYDEN

He was born in Gooding, Idaho, in the year 1896, and attended the public schools, later finishing his course in Twin Falls High School. While there was very active in different athletics. He entered the service at Fort Douglas. Utah, in December, 1917, in the Quartermaster Department, and sailed for France in March, 1918. He saw active service with the 67th Engineers, of which he was a member when he died of pneumonia, Mareli 20, 1919, in a hospital at Angers, France.



CAPT. HOMER SMITH YOUNGS

He was born near Rockford, Illinois, September 26, 1892, and attended the public schools of Rockford and Belvidere, Illinois. He came to Twin Falls in the fall of 1909, graduated from the University at Moscow, Idaho, and upon leaving school entered the U. S. Forestry Service. In January, 1917, he married his old schoolmate, Geraldine Parker. He enlisted in April, 1917, and after taking a course in the training school received his commission as a First Lieutenant and was assigned to the 16th Infantry, as commander of the first platoon in active service in France. At Chateau Thierry he was gassed, and remained for some time in the hospital. In January, 1918, he was promoted to captain. He was again about to receive promotion when he was wounded on October 4 in the big drive of the Argonne, from which he never recovered.

Samuel J. Kelso

Entered the service December 12, 1917, and became a member of the 75th Aero Squadron, and died on April 12, 1918. At the time of his death he was thirty years of age.

KENNETH ZUCK

Born at Lanark, Illinois, December 24, 1896, and moved to Idaho with his parents in 1911. He graduated from the first class of Kimberly High School with high honors. He entered the service August 14, 1918, and served with the 40th Coast Artillery. He died at Fort Worden October 26, 1918, a victim of pneumonia. He leaves to mourn his death, besides his parents, two sisters and two brothers.

OTIS GRIESHABER

Otis Grieshaber of Buhl was killed in action on October 4, 1918, in the Argonne drive. He was about thirty years of age at the time of his death and his occupation was that of a farmer. He entered the service in June, 1918, and after a short training was sent to England and from there to France. He had been in France but a short time before he met his death in battle. He was the son of Mrs. Kate Grieshaber.

WILLIAM A. KENDRICK

William A. Kendrick was the son of Mrs. S. E. Kendrick of Buhl. He was 27 years of age at the time of his death. He sailed from America in August, 1918, and was killed in action on the western front October 3, 1918. He leaves, besides his mother, three brothers and two sisters.

GEORGE WILLIAM LEE

George William Lee was born May 16, 1887, in Buffalo County, Nebraska, and was the first boy of those taken by the draft from Buhl to make the supreme sacrifice. He was unmarried and leaves to mourn his loss, five brothers and four sisters, besides his mother. Mrs. Eliza Lee of Buhl. He was killed in action on the battlefields of France during the Argonne drive. He was a member of the lodge of Odd Fellows.

WILLIAM GALEN MCMASTER

William McMaster was born twenty-six years ago in Bedford, lowa, in the year of 1893. He spent practically all his life in Twin Falls, and graduated from the public schools. In the fall of 1915 he left for South America and was there until he returned to take a course in the Iowa Agricultural college. In the spring of 1918 he returned to Twin Falls and entered the service of his country. He was killed in action on the battlefields of France, September 27, 1918. He leaves two brothers and four sisters.

KENNETH H. BROWN

Kenneth H. Brown was the first boy from the old company that left Twin Falls to make the supreme sacrifice on the battlefields of France. He was about twenty-two years of age at the time of his death, and was one of the most popular boys in the city of Twin Falls. He was killed on the battlefields of France at about noon on the day of October 30, 1918, while serving with the 146th Field Artillery, as Sergeant Major.

CHARLES EDWIN DUDLEY

Chas. Edwin Dudley, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Dudley of Hollister, Idaho, was born at Lyndon, Illinois, July 13, 1892. In 1913 he moved with his parents to Idaho, and in July, 1918, entered the service of his country, serving with the First Infantry Regiment, Depot Brigade, Company G. He was a member of the Modern Woodmen of America, and was twenty-seven years of age at the time of his death. He died at Camp Lewis, October 9, 1918, the cause of his death being pneumonia. He leaves to mourn his death, besides his parents, a brother and two sisters.

HENRY ARTHUR JOHNS

Henry Arthur Johns, age eighteen years, son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur B. Johns of Twin Falls, died on October 29 at Eureka, California, where he had been stationed as a member of the Marine Corps, and where he was called to the Great Beyond; influenza was the cause of his death. He enlisted in November, 1917.

CHARLES J. GIRDNER

Entered the Canadian army, enlisting under his mother's name as Chas. J. Potter, on November 3, 1915, and was a member of the 62nd Highlanders, 15th Company. He was killed in action on August 2, 1916, at Ypres, Belgium. He was on active service at the front about six months before his death.


It is to be regretted that the records of all the boys who made the supreme sacrifice could not be obtained, though every effort was made to secure them.
