Nobel Laureate Rosalyn S. Yalow Speaks at Fall Lecture on the Brooklyn Campus

The Third Annual Fall Lecture was held in the Brooklyn campus on November 14, 1988. Rosalyn S. Yalow, who received the Nobel Prize in Physiology or Medicine in 1977, spoke on "Radioactivity in the Service of Humanity."

Dr. Yalow was awarded the Nobel Prize for her work in the development of radioimmunoassay (RIA), the methodology which is used to measure hundreds of substances of biologic interest in blood and other body fluids.

In 1988, Dr. Yalow received the National Medal of Science, which is sponsored by the

National Science Foundation and awarded by the President of the United States. The National Medal of Science is presented to individuals for their outstanding contributions to knowledge in physical, biological, mathematical or engineering sciences.

Dr. Yalow joined the Bronx Veterans Administration Medical Center in 1947 where she has been a VA Senior Medical Investigator since 1972. She is the Solomon A. Berson Distinguished Professor-At-Large of the Mount Sinai School of Medicine, part of the City University of New York, and Emeritus Distinguished Professor-At-Large of the Albert Einstein College of Medicine, Yeshiva University of New York.

In 1986, Dr. Yalow's laboratory was designated as a Nuclear Historic Landmark by the American Nuclear Society. Dr. Yalow has received many awards and prizes, including the Albert Lasker Basic Medical Research Award, the Banting Medal of the American Diabetes Association, and the G. van Hevesy Nuclear Medicine Pioneer Award in recognition of her work.

Dr. Yalow, a resident of the Bronx, is married and the mother of two adult children.


As Alumni Chairperson, Maria is coordinating activities and encouraging former students to take on a greater role in this major fundraising effort.

The Dillon Center Celebrates Its 20th

Twenty years ago, on November 4, 1968, the Dillon Child Study Center moved from the basement of "245" to its own home across the street.

Since that day, 500 children have graduated from the Center's pre-school and kindergarten programs, and an additional 50 children have graduated from special education programs. During the same period, over 1,000 students majoring in various Child Study programs have graduated from SJC.

Beginning this fall, as a part of its regular

programming, the Dillon Center is offering parenting classes. "Parents with Toddlers", a course for parents to take with their children who are between 18 and 30 months of age, was given as a pilot program in the spring of 1988 and was set up in response to requests from parents seeking information and support for their efforts to raise young children.

The course is offered twice yearly, in 10-week sessions. The next session will begin in February.

SJC Enrollment Increases At Both Sites

This fall, the Brooklyn Campus is home to more new students in Arts & Sciences than in any year since 1984, while the Suffolk Campus admitted its largest class ever.

In Brooklyn, the number of incoming students rose 21% over last year. In Patchogue, there was a 12% increase in transfer students and 17% of new students were related to SJC alumni.

Marion Salgado, Director of Admissions for the Suffolk Campus, attributes the growth in class size to word-of-mouth. "I think that our reputation for academics, dedication of the faculty and small class size is taking root in Suffolk County. We are

not only growing in population, but the expansion of our facilities and our joining the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) have been positive factors in attracting students."

And SJC is already looking ahead to next Fall's entering class. The Annual Fall Open Houses, one means of recruiting new students, were held in November on both campuses.

Administrators and faculty were available to provide information about admission policies, financial aid, courses of study, student services & career counseling services.

1988 Graduate Wins Wall Street Journal Achievement Award

Capital campaign *UPDATE*

We are happy to report that the recently launched **New Horizons Capital Campaign** effort has raised over \$500,000 in gifts and pledges to date. We are grateful for the generous support of the many alumni and friends of the College who have responded so warmly to the first "official appeal" made in November.

The new 25,000 sq. ft. library at the Patchogue Campus is 30% complete and is on schedule for a Fall '89 opening. Renovations at the Brooklyn Campus are 80% complete — and ahead of schedule — with students enjoying the modernized cafeteria, newly refurbished lounges and efficient student government offices. Plans for the establishment of more scholarships on both campuses are on the drawing board and will be further developed as the five-year campaign progresses.

A vigorous public relations and advertising campaign is in full swing. Through a variety of means, our friends and neighbors in the local community and in the corporate world are being informed of our activities and encouraged to participate. For example: a fifteen-minute video on the College will be aired on cable systems throughout the area; a series of "open letters" from Sister George and Chairman of the Campaign, Maurice Reissman (an SJC trustee and the Chairman, President and CEO of CrossLand Savings Bank), have appeared in local papers; an eight-week series of faculty community service radio reports in the areas of tax tips, health, nutrition, college admissions and financial aid services, etc., are scheduled; and members of the Campaign Steering Committee are visiting major businesses to request support for SJC.

An Alumni Steering Committee is in formation under the dynamic leadership of Maria Falconetti '70. Many creative ideas have surfaced for alumni participation. The next meeting of the group will be in Patchogue on January 22.

The faculty are enthusiastically involved in the Campaign. Keenly aware of the urgent needs which the Campaign is addressing, the faculty have volunteered for a number of activities, including gatherings in alumni homes with faculty speakers, departmental reunions, and open houses on both campuses.

TAX DEDUCTIBLE AS ALLOWED BY LAW

The complexity of the current tax laws, and the diversity of the many friends and alumni who compose the St. Joseph's community, make it clear that there will be many different approaches to gifts given to the Capital Campaign. In this volume we will outline some suggestions for gift giving opportunities that will be beneficial, both to the College and to the donor.

1. A gift of appreciated securities allows the donor to deduct the stock's full market value and completely avoid tax on the stock's appreciation. Example: Stock purchased in 1985 at \$4,000 has a current value of \$8,000. If it is donated to the College, the donor takes an \$8,000 tax deduction and pays no tax on the \$4,000 appreciated value. The College receives the stock worth \$8,000 which it can retain in hopes of further appreciation or sell at its market rate of \$8,000.

Gifts of stock may be made by transferring the stocks to SJC's account or by delivering certificates and appropriate stock powers to the College's Development Office. For further information, call John Roth, Chief Business Officer, at (718) 636-6800, or (516) 654-3200.

2. Purchase an insured bond (such as A Tiger Series/AAA Bond) in the name of the College. In this way, you could give a gift that would become a major contribution at maturity. For example:

3. Remember the College in your will; this type of gift is an important benefit to the donor's estate, because it is deductible without limit in computing the taxable estate.

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SPORT SHORTS

- The soccer season has ended for the Golden Eagles with a record of 10-5-1. In its first season of competition in the NAIA, the team made it to the playoffs but lost in the first round of play.
- The Second Annual Golf Tournament was held in September at Island Hills Golf and Country Club for the benefit of the Suffolk Athletic Program. Over \$4,000 was raised.

Extensive Renovations On Brooklyn Campus

This past summer, dodging painters on ladders and smelling polyurethane and paint remover became standard for administrators and staff on the Brooklyn campus as SJC pursued an aggressive renovation and refurbishing plan.

"We intend to continue to keep St. Joseph's a place for students, staff and administrators to grow, share and enjoy," said Sister Teresa Avila Burke, Dean of Students, as she described the work done on campus.

A key part of the renovations included upgrading facilities for students, including the relocation of student government offices to a centrally located area near administrative

offices and easily accessible to all students. The Student Activities Center now houses a specially designed publications center with computer facilities, a conference area and office space.

Other renovations added to the comfort and productivity of students, administrators and faculty. Shower and locker room facilities were upgraded, and some classroom and conference spaces were relocated and modernized.

In addition, the parlors in "245", the original College building, built in 1901 as a residence for George DuPont Pratt, were refurbished in a style consistent with the period. Used for official College functions and receptions, the parlors are unusual in that they have always been one large room and not divided by sliding doors as was traditional. In addition to repainting the rooms and refinishing the floors, the parlor furniture was recovered and new draperies installed. Casement windows, painted shut over the years, have been repaired by local craftsmen and reversed to open into the rooms.

Also, a room adjacent to the parlors has been restored for use as a formal Board Room.

Intercession Course Tackles Drug Issue

During the winter intercession, faculty members introduced an innovative approach toward educating students about one of the most crucial problems of our times... the drug issue. It was the first time that an interdisciplinary course of this nature was offered during an intercession.

The course, entitled "The Anatomy of the Drug Issue," combined various areas of study focused on one particular issue. The drug problem was chosen because of its timeliness and predominance in public concern.

Faculty members from the philosophy, history, psychology, social sciences, religious studies and business departments took part in the class. Topics and their presenters included: "Philosophy and Purpose of Education in the Liberal Arts Tradition," Professor C. Edward Emmer; "History of Drug Abuse," Dr. Paul Hawryluk; "Ethics and Human Freedom and the Nature of Law," Fr. John Barrett; "Costs and Effectiveness of Current Drug Policy, Rethinking It," Professor Barbara Morrell, and "Drugs and Alcohol in the Workplace," Dr. Joseph Webb.

The class met six times during the intercession, with each faculty member presenting two lectures. A final forum featuring all the teachers was held on the last day of class.

"This type of teaching is very demanding, much more than anyone appreciates," noted Ms. Morrell. "We set out not to provide answers, but rather to encourage students to critically think about issues."

"You have to understand where each discipline is coming from," Sr. Joan Ryan said. "It was definitely a challenge... there were six different angles and everyone had input. During the last forum, I heard approaches from each area and it was hard to combine them and come up with answers... we really don't even have the answers. If we did, then the problem would be solved, wouldn't it?"

Paul Morris, a recreation major who took the class, appreciated that fact. "One thing I liked about the course was that the teachers did not give us answers. They allowed us to develop our own. Often I left with questions, but that was good. It helped me think and come up with my own solutions."

The course was designed to help people see that there is more than one way to look at an issue, explained Fr. Barrett. "So many people tend to look at things one-dimensionally. This taught people the process of examination; the process of thought. The issue itself was just the vehicle. What's more important is that it helped to discipline students' thinking and hopefully encourage them to go out and learn more."

The professors are planning a detailed evaluation, but preliminary student response indicated that the experimental course was a success. Administrators were also pleased with the results.

College Issues Discussed at Planning Day

Students enjoyed a free day. . . faculty and administrators enjoyed a day of stimulating discussions that focused on the "reality" of today's experiences with a "vision" of tomorrow's goals.

Speakers addressed these issues from the perspectives of their disciplines: Dr. Stan Nevins (Philosophy); Dr. Carol Hayes (Biology); Paul Hawryluk (Psychology); Jane Ashdown (Child Study); John Hazzard (Social Science); Dr. Margaret Jennings (English); Dr. Joseph Webb (Business/-Marketing); and Dr. Thomas Travis, Dean, General Studies.

Dr. Nevins began the program with his views on a liberal education as "holistic excellence". . . educational values that teach a student "not to just survive, but to know why survival is desirable." In addition,

he offered two recommendations: 1) a liberal arts honors program; and 2) a thematic approach to integrate college-wide curriculum.

Dr. Hayes stressed the need to educate students in a technological society. . . amid an information explosion. "There are major decisions to be made concerning the future of our planet. . . which should not be based on emotion or made through ignorance or misinformation."

Other areas which were explored at the daylong meeting in Brooklyn included changing student profiles and goals, the need to teach a "work ethic," further development of internship possibilities, and plans to further develop programs to meet the personal and professional aspirations of adult students.

If the policy is assigned, the donor can declare the "present value" of the policy as a deductible charitable gift. Pledges: deducted in the years gifts are received (partial or full), not when pledges are made.

Gifts by check: date of mailing is considered delivery date.

Real estate gifts: the day the College receives a properly executed deed in generally the date of delivery. (Check your state's laws).

Gifts of Art/Personal property: date the College receives the gift is the delivery date.

Gifts of Securities: "delivery date" of securities is either the date properly endorsed securities are hand delivered or mailed to the College or its agent/broker. Since the charitable deduction is dated by delivery date, stock market fluctuations after that date do not affect the value of the gift.






Where There's A Will... There's a Way



Brooklyn Pre-law Students Go to Court

Contrary to popular belief, the swift arm of justice is not always so swift. Instead, it can be laboriously slow and sometimes painful. These were the lessons learned by a group of Pre-Law students from the Brooklyn Campus when they recently visited the New York State Supreme Court in downtown Brooklyn to hear Dr. Veronica Prego's nightmarish account of her AIDS-related illness. This landmark case, which has been extensively covered by the media, charged a New York City hospital with negligence which resulted in Dr. Prego's contraction of the virus.

As students listened to her tale, the justice system became reality for these aspiring lawyers, serving notice that the field of law is very serious and most intriguing.

Teachers Benefit From New Child Study Course

A new course in the child study curriculum in Patchogue—the first of its kind in this area—is helping teachers meet the needs of all their students.

"The Education of Exceptional Students in Regular Classrooms," developed by Sr. Karen Kenney, Assistant Professor of Child Study, is designed to help students enrolled in the elementary education program (nursery school - grade 6) understand and cope with the needs of handicapped students who have been mainstreamed into the regular classroom setting.

Mainstreaming students with handicapping conditions into the regular classroom, while providing them with the services of specialized teachers, is a popular trend in education. However, both sets of teachers must have special training to deal with the students' needs. In the past, elementary education students not seeking special education certification were exposed to this information only on an overview basis. In the new course, more specific and practical information is being given to these child study majors.

"The course will enable teachers to organize and manage a classroom so that students with diverse needs may be taught effectively in the regular classroom," Sr. Karen said. "It's a great course for future teachers and a perfect refresher course for current teachers."

Alumna Donates \$100,000 to Capital Campaign

"What a wonderful way to start the new year!" Sister George Aquin enthusiastically shared her good news with the campaign staff after opening the first mail delivery of the decade. Doris Oshinski Powers, a graduate of the class of 1953, had responded to the New Horizons pre-Christmas appeal with a \$100,000 endowment to the Renaissance Fund—the newly established scholarship program which is a major part of the multi-faceted capital campaign.

A chemistry major with a math minor, Doris continued her close ties with SJC after graduation, serving on the Executive Board of the Alumni Association for two years and participating in a number of social, cultural and fund-raising events. Her research career at

Pfizer was cut short when Doris married Ed Powers and began the joyous task of raising a family of six children. Much-traveled and heavily involved in a number of local charities, Doris and Ed share time between their retirement home in Easton, Maryland and a beautiful "retreat" in Columbia, Georgia.

"We are grateful to Doris for this generous gift," said Sister George, "which will be established as a permanent endowment to fund scholarships in her name for talented young men and women who want to follow SJC's outstanding tradition of service and accomplishment. Doris made it clear in her conversations with me that she and Ed were dedicated to these principles and saw this as an opportunity to give tangible witness to their appreciation of the values we espouse."

The Doris Oshinski Powers endowment joins the Blanche Knauth Endowment as major funding sources for SJC scholarships. Ms. Knauth, not an SJC alumna, left a significant bequest to the College in recognition of the excellence of SJC graduates with whom she had worked while a public school principal.

Other sources of endowment include the contributed services of the Sisters of St. Joseph who staff administrative offices and who are members of the faculty. However, the amount of their contribution has been reduced significantly as their numbers have dwindled. In 1980, the Sisters' contribution totalled 12% of the College's revenue - today, it is 5.7%. Meanwhile, the cost of education has risen 95% in that time frame.

On May 22, **Miss Mary A. Shea**, Professor Emeritus of Speech, died after an illness of several months. Miss Shea joined the faculty in 1943, later serving as Chairperson of the Speech Department.

She held degrees from Brooklyn College and New York University and had completed doctoral work at the University of Wisconsin. She retired in 1980.

Sister Marie Clotilde Falvey, C.S.J., Professor Emeritus of Chemistry, died on May 23 at Maria Regina Convent, Brentwood. A graduate of St. Joseph's College and Columbia University, Sister joined the College faculty in 1936, later serving as Chairperson of the Chemistry Department. Also active in local civic organizations, she was instrumental in establishing the Jeanne Valois Guild for the Handicapped in 1951.

Dedication at Suffolk Campus

A brilliant spring day greeted over 500 guests in attendance at the midday dedication ceremonies for the new Callahan Library at the Patchogue campus on May 1. The Library, completed in time for the start of the fall semester in 1989, was dedicated to the memory of S. Virginia Therese Callahan, C.S.J., former trustee, academic dean, and vice president of the Patchogue campus.

The festive occasion began with a brief program in the College auditorium emceed by John V.N. Klein and highlighted by remarks by such dignitaries as Patchogue Mayor Franklin "Whitey" Leavandosky and the Most Reverend John R. McGann. Bishop of Rockville Centre. A slide presentation followed, tracing the life and career of S. Virginia, including the establishment and growth of the Patchogue campus under her guidance.

It was this remarkable growth—from an initial student enrollment of 325 to over 2,000 by September 1989—that inspired the establishment of the College's 5-year, \$5 million New Horizons Capital Campaign for improvement and expansion of both the Brooklyn and Patchogue campuses. The construction of the Callahan Library completes the first phase of the Capital Campaign in Suffolk.

With the conclusion of the slide presentation, the guests gathered on the mall to view the formal unveiling of the library name. A luncheon reception concluded the afternoon's events, which all agreed were fitting tribute to the memory of S. Virginia and an auspicious beginning for the impressive facility that now bears her name.

Keith Magliola '86 is a real hero to a Suffolk County man and his son. Keith, a Suffolk County police officer, helped rescue Joseph Leogrande, 68, when he and his son, Kenneth, were sucked through a drain pipe.

Heavy August rains had caused severe flooding in the yard behind the father's welding business in Sayville. The two men decided to drain the yard and, as they attempted to yank off a drain pipe cap, the suction pulled them into the pipe and through it for about one-eighth of a mile.

The water carried them through the pipe beneath an apartment complex and railroad tracks and ejected them to the surface in a gully flooded with three feet of rapidly moving water.

At this point, Keith came to their aid, helping the younger man hold his father above the rising water until other rescuers arrived.

Middle States To Visit SJC

1991 will be one of the most exciting years in the College's history. It will mark our 75th Anniversary and will be the year in which the College conducts a comprehensive self-study in preparation for a Middle States Association re-accreditation visit slated for Spring 1992.

Dr. Lenore Kelly and Dr. Monica Brennan, co-chairpersons of the Steering Committee spearheading the self-study, have formed seven Task Forces on each campus (made up of faculty and administrators and, where appropriate, staff personnel, students, alumni or trustees,) to address specific aspects of college life: Programs and Curricula; Faculty (composition, policies, professional development, etc.); Students and Student Life (composition, student services, admissions, financial aid); Instructional Resources and Plant (library, AV, computers, labs, Dillon Center, Clare Rose Playhouse, plant and equipment); Governance, Organization, and Administration; Institutional Planning (long range); and Institutional Effectiveness (outcomes assessment of academic achievement and general institutional environment).

The Task Forces, chaired by faculty members, have begun their monthly meetings.

S. George Aquin O'Connor, President, views this process as a means of "... ensuring the vitality of the College in the years ahead."

Accreditation Visit For Nursing Program

The National League for Nursing conducted a site visit to evaluate the college's nursing program for initial accreditation during the week of November 6. Dr. McGrann discussed several works of these two contemporary African-American novelists whose themes center around the survival of their people. "Their writing is directed to that end, not to entertainment or to self-expression," noted Dr. McGrann.

Both are Pulitzer Prize winners. Walker's *The Color Purple* won the award in 1983—Morrison in 1988, for her book, *Beloved*.

A noted lecturer in the Metropolitan area, Sister Loretta recently presented a paper, "Eighteenth Century African-American Literature," at the New England 18th Century Society. She has taught at SJC for more than ten years.

Academic V.P. Hosts Confab

Recently, Sister Mary Florence Burns, Academic Vice President, donned her other hat as President of the Board of Trustees of the Brooklyn Public Library to host the Regional Governor's Conference at the Central Library. President for the past two years, Sister was originally named to the Board in 1973 by Mayor Lindsay.

Almost 200 elected and appointed city officials, librarians, and members of the general public gathered to establish policies and plans for N.Y. State libraries. Resolutions adopted will be forwarded to the Governor's Conference in Albany and will be incorporated into programs to be presented at a White House Conference in July.

Peggy Wolfe '41 Establishes Student Endowment

It was like "Old Home Week" - Margaret Mary (Peggy) Wolfe, J.D. (Class of 1941) and Sister George Aquin enjoying a long overdue visit... Peggy touring the new Callahan Library in Patchogue ("I think I would have to spend an entire semester trying to learn how to use all the library facilities," she later wrote.)... meeting old friends... and remembering past mentors over a lively, discussion-filled lunch.

Actually, Peggy's visit had a twofold purpose. The "re-acquaintance" with SJC was one - a major pledge to the New Horizons Capital Campaign was the other. A long-time supporter of the College, Peggy wanted to do something more... something that would reflect her commitment to SJC and that would stand as a living memorial to Sister Mary Clotilde Falvey whom she respected "as a teacher, a religious, and a friend for over 53 years."

After reviewing several gift options, Peggy decided to establish an endowment in Sister Clotilde's name which, each year, would yield funds for students who need financial assistance in order to complete their education.

"I am fulfilling my six-year pledge to the campaign by transferring appreciated securities to the College," she stated. "In this way, St. Joseph's benefits by realizing much-needed revenue and I benefit by taking tax credit for the increased value of the stocks... in some cases, worth three or four times their original value.

So - instead of paying a large capital gains tax, if I were to sell them now, I can take the higher value as a tax credit and give a much more substantial gift."

Why does Peggy Wolfe believe in "pay back?" It could be because her strong academic foundation as a social science major led to a law degree from Washington College of Law at American University and a long and distinguished career in government service - first with the Department of Defense and, later, the Department of the Army. It could be because her sister, Eileen Wolfe Gaffney, a 1943 grad, also flourished and fulfilled her personal and professional goals as a nurse and as a teacher of nursing. Or, it could be that Peggy understands and cherishes that thread of tradition which winds its way through the years, binding us all in the belief that we are there for each other...

"Our generation seemed to appreciate every single aspect of the College," she wrote to Sister George. "I think that is why so many of us try to do what we can in return. And, Father Dillon drilled into us, many years ago, that the College could not have survived without the financial and moral support of its alumni. I believe that is still true today."

Xerox Awards \$20,000 Grant

The Xerox Foundation has pledged \$20,000 over the next four years to help support "Experiences in Scientific Research," a program for high school students coordinated by S. Mary Maier, C.S.J., Ph.D., Chairperson of the Chemistry Department.

Now in its sixth year, the program was created to provide high school sophomores, juniors and seniors with a challenging scientific education in a college environment and to encourage them to pursue a college major in the sciences. Students are trained as researchers in the scientific method and participate in research-oriented field-trips. Of those who completed research projects, five received awards at various Borough Science Fairs.

To date, 304 students from 69 public and private high schools have benefited from this program. Guest speakers have included SJC faculty as well as alumni involved in a variety of scientific and health-related professions.

"Sincere congratulations to Sister Mary for this well-deserved recognition of her initiative, creativity, and hard work," stated Sister George Aquin, as she announced the Xerox award.
