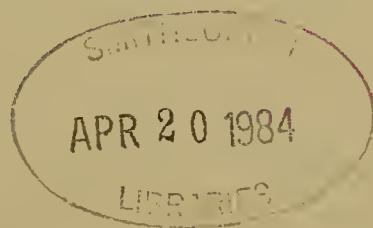

AND

PREFACE.

EVERY family possessed of worldly goods is the owner of some store of Silver or Sheffield Plate, however slender, and this rarely fails to comprise at least a few pieces dating back to two or three or more previous generations. Occasions arise for adding to them through family purchases or sharing bequests; or it may be obligatory to put them on the market for sale. In all such cases a ready means of ascertaining what articles of Old Silver and Sheffield Plate are worth and what reserve prices should be put upon them is essential.

It is believed that a Work of this kind, giving reliable information and ready references as to the values of "Old English Silver and Sheffield Plate," will prove to be of the utmost value, not only to buyer and seller, but to every owner of plate older than Victorian.

It is claimed for it that it is the first and only practical guide written both for the buyer and seller, and compiled by an expert of long experience. The writer has made a study of "The Values of Old English Silver and Sheffield Plate" for more than twenty years, during which time he has attended upwards of three thousand sales by auction, and has become acquainted with most of the principal dealers in this country, thereby enabling him to obtain information at first hand as to the prices paid by the trade. This is evidenced by the many thousand authentic records of sales by auction, and no less than one thousand six hundred separate valuations.

The author may encounter adverse criticism for disclosing what some may possibly consider trade secrets, but he is confident that this will assist the honest dealer's trade, since increased knowledge and interest on the part of the collector must in the end conduce to increased business. At the same time such increased knowledge must, it is believed, operate as a check against those who by unfair methods tend to discredit a reputable and useful calling.

The fair and reliable dealer having genuine specimens to sell, must wish the collector to be put on his guard, and would preferably do business with those who appreciate and have a good knowledge of the articles they desire to purchase, rather than with those who are devoid of any such appreciation and knowledge.

The writer being greatly indebted to a large number of friends for information used in the compilation of this Work, desires to thank them collectively for the assistance so kindly given, and especially to express his obligations to Mr. Arthur Westwood, of the Birmingham Assay Office, and Mr. Allen Edwards, of Birmingham.

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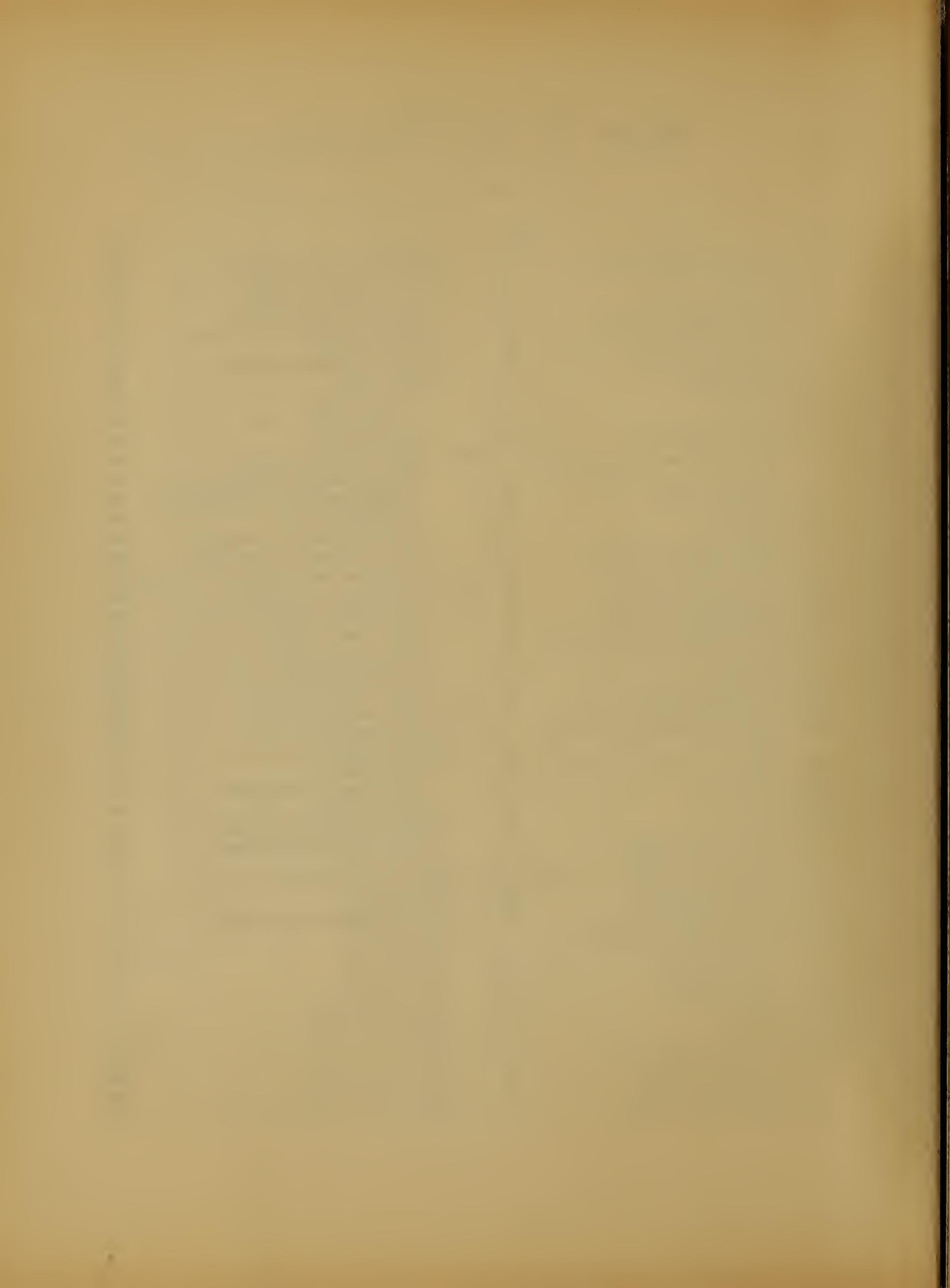
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INTRODUCTION.

FRAUDULENT AND TAMPERED PIECES.

TO possess OLD PLATE is a hall mark of respectability, and whether a collector or not, everyone is open to pick up bargains in so-called "antique" silver. Most lucrative businesses have been carried on in the past, either by tampering with old plate or reproducing it in fac-simile and passing it off on the unwary as the genuine article. During an experience extending over many years, the author has met with every kind of spurious imitation. The particular tests by which to detect such impositions and frauds will be dealt with on the pages facing the illustrations.

The commonest impositions that the collector and the dealer have to guard against are:—

Fraudulent Hall Marks.

Few fraudulent hall marks have come under the notice of the writer during the last twenty years, the laws against making counterfeit punches of Assay Office marks being very stringent. Since the middle of the fourteenth century gold and silversmiths have at times been prosecuted and severely punished, being fined or put in the pillory, and even in extreme cases having their ears cut off. The penalties are still severe when charges are substantiated.

The punches made by forgers are usually of inferior workmanship, and by comparing them with genuine hall marks the expert can readily satisfy himself as to whether they are authentic. Where there is doubt, it is best to submit the marks to an Assay Office. Collusion has, in the first instance, to exist between the die sinker and the silversmith to perpetrate this fraud.

Transposed Hall Marks.

Forgeries of this description are much more prevalent, to produce them entailing a very simple process, but the law is quite as severe towards this class of fraud as in that just mentioned. The writer has seen numbers of articles with transposed hall marks, such as the Queen Anne hall mark transferred from a Queen Anne table spoon, costing about 15/—, to articles which will realise from £5 to £50.

It is usually an easy matter to an expert to detect a transposed mark. A silversmith to effect this fraud has to cut out the piece of silver containing the mark, and to file, fit, dove-tail, and hard solder it into the article he intends to tamper with. The heat required in this process discolours the silver, and therefore the article has to be polished and made as new. This obscures the solder mark and materially assists the fraud. When a newly polished piece of silver with an old mark is being offered a purchaser, it is safest to have the same fully described on the invoice

with a guarantee. It is not advisable in a general way to add newly polished pieces of silver to a collection, as they may impair by contrast the effect of finer specimens in their original state.

When marks have been transposed and the piece is allowed to oxidise, which unless assisted artificially takes about three months, the solder marks around the inserted hall mark will usually show. If it is suspected that the mark has been transposed, heat from a gas and blow pipe should be applied, and in some instances breathing over the hall mark will help the discovery.

Inexperienced men, possessed of little knowledge, most frequently attempt this fraud, and are detected by their misplacing and ante-dating the hall marks. They are found using the marks from small or damaged articles of the sixteenth century and inserting them into coffee pots or other articles not introduced till late in the seventeenth century.

Where an article is made of separate parts, it is sometimes found that two or three different makers' marks or date letters have been inserted, rendering it obvious that a fraud has been perpetrated.

Converted Pieces.

Silver dinner plates, small waiters and trays, with old hall marks, are especially handy and convenient to the forger. A dinner plate (dated 1700) of about 10 ozs. weight can be purchased for say 12/- per oz., and this, by being converted into a Queen Anne porringer and finished the same weight, or even more, with modern silver handles, will easily show a profit of about £15.

Frauds of this nature are very difficult to detect, although plate cannot easily be converted without somewhat damaging the hall marks. When the hall marks are in a straight line and it is suspected that they should be otherwise, the pieces should be submitted to an expert, as in some instances definite rules for placing hall marks obtained.

Additions.

Articles which have had new pieces of silver added, such as feet, spouts, handles, lids, etc., are naturally greatly deteriorated in value.

Engraving, Embossing, Saw Piercing.

Pieces of old silver with undoubtedly original engraving, embossing and piercing, usually command high prices. The same may be said of the plainer articles made during the middle of the seventeenth and the early part of the eighteenth centuries. But articles in which the ornament, whether engraving, embossing, or saw piercing, has been added at a later date, are greatly deteriorated in value.

Damaged Hall Marks or Damaged Articles.

As the hall mark often fixes the value, it is unwise, as a general rule, to add articles to collections when the hall mark is wholly or partly obliterated. The same applies, but with less force, to pieces that have had the original monograms removed, or been re-engraved many times, becoming thin in consequence.

HINTS TO COLLECTORS.

Large collections usually have small beginnings. It would be well for the collector at the outset to make a careful study of Old Silver and Sheffield Plate, not omitting the hall marks and makers' marks impressed upon it. The scope of the collector must necessarily depend greatly on the amount of money at disposal. Some collectors confine themselves at first to one kind of article, such as silver spoons of various periods, but even a collection of these of say two hundred single or odd specimens may easily total up to £5,000. Other collectors would content themselves with two hundred specimens of caddy spoons, which at their present market value might be got together for £75. One hundred tea spoons of different designs could be purchased for about £100, and would form in some respects a very interesting collection, affording as much pleasure to the collector perhaps as if he had spent the larger sum. Most collectors, however, have other ideas, and form more varied collections, either for actual use or the archæological rarity and artistic interest of the specimens, the length of their purses dictating where these should begin and what they should comprise. The steady increase in value of a well-selected collection of antique English plate must have led many to regard their hobby as a very sound and practical investment.

OLD SHEFFIELD PLATE.

Mercurial or Fire Gilding and Plating.

Base metals were coated with gold or silver by a process known as Mercurial or Fire Gilding and Plating. Many centuries before the old Sheffield plating and modern electro-plating were invented, fire gilding and plating were applied extensively to ecclesiastical plate, chalices, candlesticks, watch cases, and all kinds of copper and brass trinkets. The process was also in use for gilding the insides of cream jugs, sugar basins, salt cellars, etc.

Old Sheffield Plate. Inventor.

Thomas Bolsover, in the year 1742, discovered the process of coating with silver a metal of lesser value. It is traditionally reported that the inventor, while repairing a thin layer of silver on the copper handle of a knife, evolved the idea of combining the two metals—copper and silver—in layers ready for manufacture. He immediately put his invention to the test and commenced to make various small wares from the metals rolled together, such as sugar tongs, caddy spoons, snuff boxes, buttons, etc. Others were not slow to perceive the value of the process, and by the end of the eighteenth century there were many large firms of silversmiths in Sheffield, London, Birmingham and Nottingham producing a variety of important and beautiful pieces, many of which may be found at the present time in almost as good a condition as they were when first made.

Process of Manufacture.

The method of producing old Sheffield plate was as follows: An ingot of copper was formed of the required dimensions: namely, about 12 ins. long, 6 ins. wide and 1 in. thick. After the rough ends and edges were trimmed with the file, and a flat and smooth surface produced, a piece of silver corresponding in length and breadth, but only $\frac{1}{8}$ in. in thickness, was similarly prepared. The surfaces of the two ingots were then ready for soldering together, but great care had to be taken that the surfaces were clean and free from all greasy matter.

The surfaces of the ingots were then treated with a solution of borax and solder, and tied closely together with iron wire to keep them in position during the soldering process. The ingots were then placed in a large fire, and as soon as the solder was seen to flux and the silver and copper to amalgamate, they were taken out and set to cool, then placed in strong spirits of salts to clean off all dirt from the surfaces. The now firmly-united ingot was then sent to the rolling mills to be rolled out into the required lengths and thicknesses, and afterwards cut up and apportioned to the workmen who fashioned the various articles required.

Time and thought were required in working up the rolled plates, as a slip with a tool would damage the silver surface. Such a slip would cause the workman a loss of time, as to repair it he would be obliged to insert a thin sheet of silver and burnish it in, by applying a small amount of heat, an hour being occupied, with possibly a blemish in the article when finished.

It is generally supposed that many of the Sheffield plated articles were more costly to produce than those of standard silver. Frequently silver plates were applied to both sides of the copper ingot, as many of the more expensive articles required a silver lining when finished. Tea and coffee pots and various small articles were usually tinned inside, and articles such as waiters and snuffer trays were tinned on the bottom.

Tests. Old Sheffield Plate.

There are two or three ways of testing genuine old Sheffield plate, but these are best learned by practical experience.

The best makers usually provided a silver shield in the centre of the article, to receive an engraved monogram, and the edges were cased with silver, or the silver layer was continued under the mounts, and finished in a blunt knife edge. The mounts, such as feet, handles, and applied ornaments, were made from heavy silver stampings, and the articles thus completed were almost equal to a piece of solid silver plate, and have resisted a century and a half of wear without the copper showing through.

Some manufacturers naturally produced inferior articles. The silver mounts were very thin and loaded with lead, and after ten or twenty years of wear they became practically worn out and little would remain visible but the copper and the lead. Such articles are of little value. They are sometimes re-plated by dealers, but by a close examination reveal minute holes in the lead, resulting from the electro-plating process. It is superfluous to add that in this state they are never worth the collector's attention.

It is always well to purchase from reliable dealers, and to require an invoice with the articles and a guarantee that they are genuine specimens of old Sheffield plate. Marks cannot be taken safely as a guarantee, as they are now being copied.

Modern Sheffield Plate.

There are still firms in Sheffield, London, and Birmingham, producing large quantities of silver-plated articles, and many of them are from the old dies. Most of these are made by the coppersmiths and electro-plated, but after being in use for a few years the copper will show, and in many cases it will be found that there is very little silver on them. The fact that such goods are being placed on the market will probably greatly increase the value of fine original specimens of the genuine old Sheffield plate.





Electro-Plate.








The introduction of electro-plating in the year 1838 and the various patents taken out for methods of gilding and plating by the celebrated firm of Elkington & Co., led to a great change in the Sheffield plating process. The less expensive processes for producing plated articles created a vast amount of competition, and by the year 1850 there were very few firms who had not abandoned the older Sheffield process. It is well known that many firms made large fortunes during the century that the old Sheffield process was carried on (1742-1842).

MAKERS' MARKS

AS USED BY THE SHEFFIELD PLATE MANUFACTURERS FROM THE YEAR 1785.

The short list of makers' marks and names, compiled from old directories and pieces of Sheffield plate, are those of firms who gained a reputation for making only the best quality, and *old pieces* bearing these marks are usually in perfect condition. The same firms produced equally fine specimens previous to 1785, but an Act of Parliament had forbidden manufacturers to stamp their plated articles with a maker's name or mark, and they were under a heavy penalty for each offence. In 1784 this Act was repealed, and from that time makers have been permitted to mark their goods with a trade mark.

DEALERS IN ANTIQUE SILVER.

There are many reputable dealers in old silver in most of the important towns who are fair and honourable men, and from such much valuable information may be gleaned when inspecting their stocks. They are also helpful in attending sales and executing commissions; nevertheless, in purchasing goods it is best always to obtain invoices, with full descriptions, dates, weights, and prices per ounce. Should it become apparent that an article purchased is spurious or inaccurately described, it can then be returned. The best and most experienced dealers may be relied on to offer none but genuine articles, and these are able to and will often render assistance in distinguishing the false from the true, or the old from the modern. Such are usually successful men, and by far the safest to deal with.

RISE AND FALL IN VALUES.

Lengthened experience has shown that scarcely one piece of genuine plate out of every hundred ever decreases in value. On the contrary, almost every well-selected specimen increases in value with each year that passes, and, further, the average increase, taking the bulk of the articles dealt with in this work, is at the rate of about two-and-a-half per cent. per annum. Although during the last twenty-four years the market value of unmanufactured *standard* silver has decreased from 4s. 4 $\frac{1}{4}$ d. per oz. to its average price for 1904 and 1905 of 2s. 3d., pieces of silver older than Victorian have uniformly and considerably increased in value.

The fall in the price of standard silver and the remission of the duty in 1890 of 1s. 6d. per oz. only affected the value of Victorian silver, especially such items as spoons and forks, which can usually be purchased at sales by auction at little over the daily market quotations for *standard* silver.

THE WAY TO DESCRIBE OLD SILVER AND SHEFFIELD PLATE.

If auctioneers, when selling old silver and Sheffield plate, would see that the lots are adequately described, collectors and dealers would often be induced to attend from a distance, creating a competition, too often lacking, certainly to the mutual advantage alike of vendor and auctioneer.

If the total value of the articles is sufficient to justify the employment of an expert to describe them, it is certainly wise to engage one. An expert could generally be retained on about the following terms:—

Collectors and dealers often find, on attending a sale, that the articles catalogued are of little value and of Victorian date. Unless the lots are properly described, intending purchasers seldom care to waste time in travelling long distances, perhaps to no purpose.

The prices indicate what the goods might realise if all were made during the middle or latter part of the nineteenth century.

THE WAY TO PROTECT GOODS WHEN SELLING BY AUCTION.

Those selling plate by auction are liable to suffer by a trade custom known as the "knock-out." It will therefore be found advantageous to agree with one or two of the dealers attending the sale to allow them a percentage on the total realised at the sale, and also on the amount they themselves purchase, so that it may be to their interest to oppose the "knock-out," and to refrain from associating themselves with anyone in the results of the bidding.

In selecting such men, choose only those who are able to buy largely, and in whom you have confidence. By paying, say, £10 to an expert under some such arrangement, a very large difference in the amount realised may often result. Terms generally regarded as satisfactory are set out on page 7.

SALES BY AUCTION.

A collector need never hesitate to attend sales by auction, for this is one of the readiest ways of obtaining experience. It is not, as a rule, worth the dealer's while to force the prices beyond what the articles are worth, unless, indeed, they are the dealer's own property. By attending on a view day the articles will be found displayed for inspection, when catalogues can be marked with the prices intended to be paid, or that they are likely to realise. If dealers exceed the prices marked, the values have probably been under-estimated. By inspecting the articles, and referring to the illustrations, values, and sale reports given in this book, a fair estimate can be arrived at, and under-rating them be avoided. Avoid sales suspected to be "made up" or mock auctions, as time will probably be wasted, since lots catalogued in such sales are very rarely worth buying. Genuine and perfect specimens are not put into such sales by dealers, for there is always a good demand for the right qualities of old silver and Sheffield plate.

Careful study of catalogues enables the amateur to become an expert in reading between the lines and to distinguish genuine from "made up" sales.

It is well to note from whom the auctioneer has received his instructions.

Avoid sales advertised as "by order of a gentleman going abroad," or "removed from country residence for the convenience of sale," unless the owner's name and address appears in the catalogue.

AUCTION SALE RECORDS, AND PRICES REALISED.

Some three thousand sale records are tabulated from the marked catalogues of about six hundred of the most important of the sales that have been held in Great Britain during the last five years. Considerable care has been taken in the selection of the records admitted, thousands having for various reasons been discarded as misleading. It is believed that only those records are tabulated which disclose the true market value of the articles, and they denote the prices actually paid by dealers for genuine pieces in good condition and having good hall marks.

The values set out in the pages following the illustrations are in chronological order, and they present reliable data for forming opinions as to the true value of almost any piece of old English silver or Sheffield plate at the present moment.

VALUES, AUTHOR'S.

The result of twenty years' experience as a collector will be found embodied in the chronological tables of the values of every description of old silver and Sheffield plate. An approximate value has been placed on every specimen separately through each reign, as it is impossible to get complete records of the prices realised at auctions for each type throughout all these periods.

In the case of certain types of great rarity and value, only prices actually realised at auctions are tabulated.

INVENTORY AND ARRANGEMENT OF COLLECTION.

A collection of old silver and Sheffield plate having been purchased, it is best, in the first place, to have a good inventory of it made, and if the specimens are large, to have them set out in show cases. Ebonized cases, with the least amount of the wood visible, glazed with plate glass, are generally preferred. These may stand on turned legs, with shelves of plate glass or of wood covered in dark blue. Examples may be seen at most of the large museums. There are cabinet makers in London and Birmingham who make show cases their speciality.

Collections of spoons and forks or other small articles are generally seen to advantage fastened on pads or in leather rolls. Dealers who make a speciality of this kind of work should be consulted, as they are used to it, and ensure the best results.

ADVICE TO THOSE WISHING TO DISPOSE OF A COLLECTION.

When a collection has to be disposed of, it is best to obtain offers for it from two or three well-known dealers, who trade exclusively in old silver and Sheffield plate. This mode of sale will secure good prices, and cause very little inconvenience and no responsibility as to the ultimate realisation.

When the collection is large and valuable, one or more reliable firms of auctioneers, who habitually dispose of antique silver, should be consulted as to terms of sale. If a sale by auction is decided on, the hints also furnished on pages 8 and 10 will be found valuable. Neglect of precautions may make the results of the sale very disappointing.

PROCEDURE IN VALUATIONS FOR PROBATE.

In the case of death, the marketable value of every article belonging to the estate must be properly ascertained, and sworn to as correct in the affidavit required to be filed by the Inland Revenue Authorities, before Probate will be granted of the will or letters of administration allowed to be taken out. It is therefore of the greatest importance that everything should be properly valued, or otherwise there may be a long and troublesome correspondence with the Inland Revenue Authorities. Again, it frequently happens that the members of a family, or those benefitting under a will, may prefer, especially in the case of old silver and Sheffield plate, that the articles shall be divided, instead of being sold by auction. In such cases, it is generally advisable to obtain the assistance of an expert or dealer to apportion the values of the articles to be divided.

WHEN FAMILY DIVISION TAKES PLACE.

Various modes of realising collections have already been described, but the following will be found advantageous when a collection has been willed to various members of a family, and sale by public auction is objected to. In case those interested cannot agree to divide the collection to their satisfaction, it is often well to engage an expert to place values on every article, and to let each person select and pay for what he requires, just as though they had been publicly sold. Or after the valuation for probate an auctioneer might be retained, to meet those interested, when each lot might be offered to them by private auction. In either case the proceeds are divided equally.

HALL MARKS.

THE subject of Hall marks has been so ably dealt with by recognised authorities, especially by Mr. G. J. Jackson, F.S.A., in his recently published work on "English Goldsmiths and their Marks," that the writer deems it unnecessary to do more than give them in tabulated form convenient for reference. A few pieces of plate are known with Hull marks, Lincoln marks, and those of many other County Towns, mostly of late sixteenth and seventeenth century date. Other marks cannot as yet be ascribed to any particular locality. Examples of these are so rarely met with that they have not come under the writer's personal observation, and to include them in the present work would be of little assistance to the collector.









Very few pieces are known of older date than 1438, and these do not always bear the date or the maker's mark. On the first introduction of the lion passant under Henry VIII. it was crowned, the crown being omitted on the accession of Edward VI. The Britannia standard was introduced by William III. shortly after the death of Queen Mary, and it remained in use until 1718, and during this interval, the leopard's head and lion passant were replaced by the figure of Britannia and the lion's head erased. The drawing of the lion and the shape of the stamp differed considerably in different years.

The first cycle commencing 1681-2 to 1705-6 was black letter within shaped shields, all letters being used except J. Only about a dozen specimens with these date marks are known. In 1706 a cycle with block capitals was commenced and abandoned. From 1728 to 1763 all plate is marked with S on varied stamps. From 1763-1813 the letters E, F, O, S, are known. In all cases the maker's mark is repeated twice with the Glasgow mark—a tree, fish, and bell.

The first cycle recovered, 1638-58, is of capitals, A on shield-shaped stamps ; only seven or eight specimens belonging to this cycle are known. The second cycle, commencing 1658-9, is of minuscules—A on shield-shaped stamps ; specimens are equally rare. The third, commencing 1678-9, is of black letter capitals A and ends in 1716-7 ; most of the letters are known from existing specimens.

Cork and a few other Irish towns had the privilege of Assay during parts of the seventeenth, eighteenth, or nineteenth centuries, but did not use date letter marks.

YORK ASSAY OFFICE HALL MARKS.

The oldest cycle is of Roman capitals, commencing in 1559-1582. With them are a fleur-de-lis, leopard's head crowned dimidiate on a circular punch, and the makers' marks. The second cycle, 1583-1606, is similar, but with black letter dates; and the third, 1607-1630, black letter capitals for dates. Other cycles, 1631-6, have the dates in italics; 1657-81 in current capitals; 1682-1700 in black letter capitals. In 1701 the marks are changed for Britannia, lion's head erased, arms of the city, date letter and Roman capitals, but very little plate was assayed in York during the eighteenth century.

NORWICH ASSAY OFFICE HALL MARKS.

Like most of the provincial towns possessing the privilege of Assay, Norwich held a mint in the tenth century and continued to coin with brief interruptions down to 1696, when the quantity of old plate, etc., minted amounted to nearly £208,000. The Norwich plate marks known extend over a period of a century and a half, terminating with the close of the seventeenth century. Most of them are known from the chalices and patens of East Anglian Churches. The names of many of the goldsmiths have been recovered, prominent among them being those of Petersen and Cobbold, whose descendants are still among our leading bankers. The Corporation plate of Norwich is especially fine, and only rivalled by that of Bristol and Portsmouth. It comprises the famous rock crystal sceptre, a large and richly worked pedestal salt of 1568, a finely embossed flagon of 1618, and the celebrated rosewater ewer and dish of 1617. The treasury of St. Peter Mancroft in Norwich is probably unrivalled, and many other churches have most interesting plate. The Dutch influence is very apparent in plate of Norwich manufacture.

The distinguishing mark for Norwich is the castle over a lion passant, and the standard mark a double seeded rose crowned. The known date marks are plain capital letters on square blocks for the sixteenth century, and similar letters on shaped shields with varied outlines for the seventeenth century, but plain shields with black letters take their place in the last decade. The latest date letter known is that for 1697.

SOME EXAMPLES OF RARE PIECES.

Very rare and exceptional pieces of sixteenth and early seventeenth century plate are beyond the reach of all but the wealthiest collectors, and they realise prices at auctions which depend more or less upon circumstances which are to a certain extent accidental, such as the competition of two or more very wealthy amateurs or dealers. Notwithstanding that these are frequently excessive from an art or archæological point of view, the prices realised ever tend to increase, and it is hard to predict the limit they may attain to. At one of the more recent sales at Christie's, Mr. Louis Huth's embossed rose-water ewer and dish, London, 1607, realised £4,050, and two embossed covered Tankards of 1573 and 1604 each realised £1,700, while a large London tankard of 1692 brought £2,050. It would thus be impossible to tabulate the values that rare pieces of English silver of early date would be likely to realise at auction, and instead of any such futile attempt, a few illustrations, with the prices paid for them, have been introduced. Five examples of Sheffield plate are also illustrated apart from the section to which they would properly belong, on account of their exceptional quality.

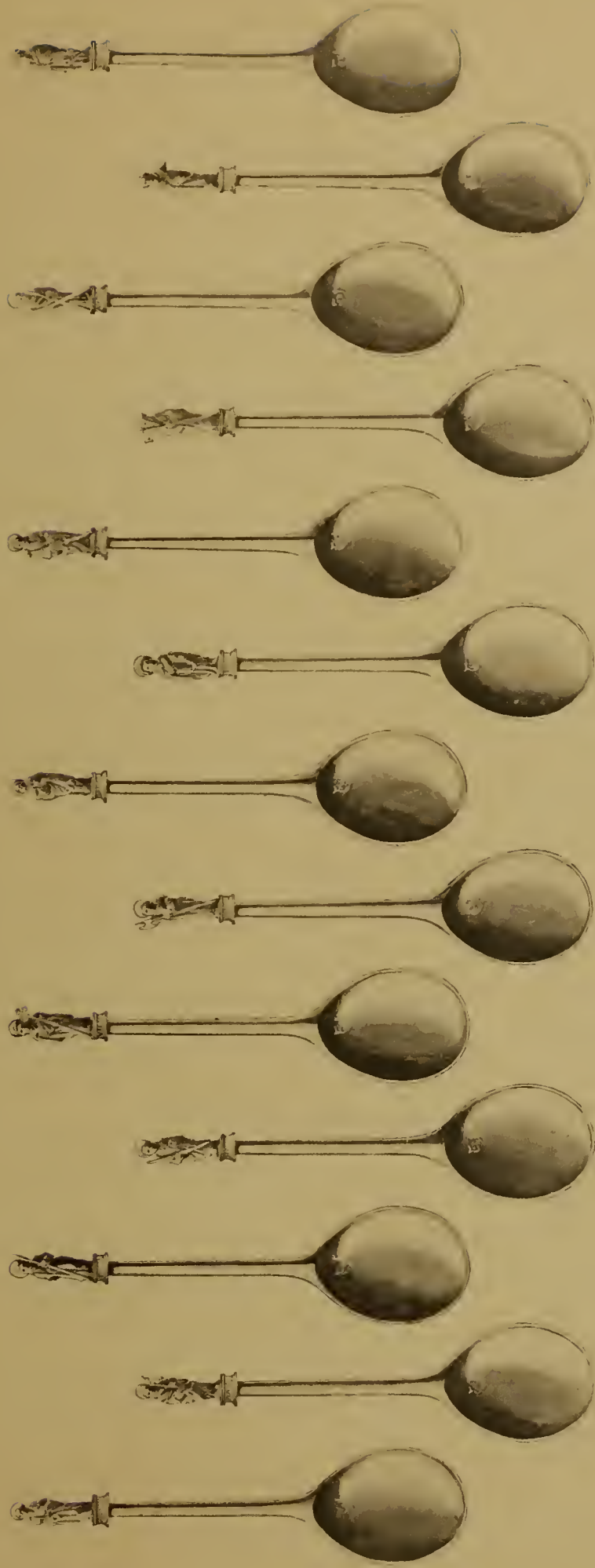
COMPLETE SET OF APOSTLE SPOONS.

PLATE I.

The complete set of thirteen Henry VIII. Silver Apostle Spoons, the figures gilt, finely modelled and chased, the inside of the moulds bearing the sacred monogram, in black letter contemporary engraving on hatched ground, in a circle, was sold by auction on July 16th, 1903, and fetched £4,900. The spoons measure $7\frac{3}{4}$ in. long, and weigh 32 oz. 19 dwt., and each bears the London hall mark, date letter for the year 1536, and maker's mark—a sheaf of arrows.

A complete set, hall marked 1617, was sold by auction in 1901 and fetched £1,060. An incomplete set of twelve of the time of Charles I. realised £816.

TUDOR CUPS.

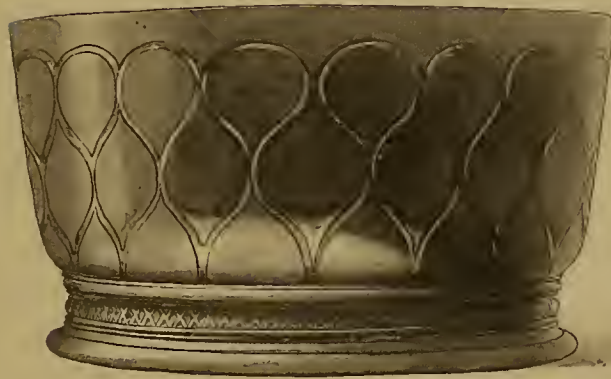
A Tudor Cup, on foot, entirely gilt, $4\frac{1}{4}$ in. high, $4\frac{3}{4}$ in. diameter, weight, 14 oz. 3 dwt., with the London hall mark for the year 1521, a Lombardic D, the leopard's head crowned, and a maker's mark (indistinct), was sold by auction, April 29th, 1902, and fetched £4,100.

The whole cup is depressed in form, having a shallow bowl with cylindrical sides and concave base; the stem is short, swelling very slightly below, where it suddenly splays into seventeen bossettes, which rest upon the simple moulding of the circular foot; the exterior of the cup has engraved around the top edge the inscription + BENE . DICTVS . DEVS . IM . DONA . SVIS . AME . in open Lombardic lettering on a groundwork hatched from left to right; the remaining portion of the edge is engraved with scale ornaments. The exterior of the base of the cup is stamped with concentric rows of circles $\frac{5}{8}$ of an inch in diameter, giving in the interior the appearance of hammer marks of hexagonal form; the stem is embossed with long tongue-shaped flutings, the junction of the bowl and stem concealed by an applied rope-pattern band; the foot is decorated with seventeen petal-shaped bossettes, and a very narrow border of duplicated stamped panels containing branches of thistle-like leafwork. This cup, although richer in decoration, in form recalls the fine communion cups of Wymeswold, Leicestershire, and of Sandwich, Kent.

A Tudor Shallow Cup, parcel-gilt, $2\frac{1}{4}$ in. high, 4 in. diameter, weight, 6 oz. 15 dwt., with the London hall mark for the year 1525, a Lombardic H, the crowned leopard's head, and a maker's mark (? a pair of antlers), was sold by auction, April 29th, 1902, and fetched £880.

In form it resembles a shallow bowl, with a cylindrical side, lessening slightly towards the base, to which is applied a simple moulded foot; the decoration is restrained but effective, consisting of three bands of embossed cone-shaped ornaments, finishing with the foot, which in itself is enriched by a narrow band stamped with an ornamentation resembling the letter X placed side by side, many times repeated.

The rarity of plate dating back to Henry VII. and Henry VIII. accounts sufficiently for the high prices specimens will always fetch. The Bodkin Cup, belonging to the Corporation of Portsmouth, dated 1525, and the covered cup of Corpus Christi College, Oxford, 1515, would probably sell at as much as £290 per oz. if offered for sale.

STANDING CUP AND COVER.

PLATE III.

A James I. Tall Standing Cup and Cover, entirely of silver-gilt, 19 in. high, 7 in. diameter, weight, 66 oz. 16 dwt., London hall mark, 1604, maker's mark, animal's head erased (see Cripps, 6th edition, page 374), was sold by auction, April 30th, 1902, and fetched £4,000.

The bowl, of inverted cone shape, is embossed and chased with two oval panels with sea monsters sporting in the waves; elaborate strapwork borders hung with swags of fruit upon a matted field; large fruit and acanthus foliage around the base; on one side is an oblong-shaped panel bearing the following inscription: "This cup was made of the Greate Seale of Irelande Anno Domini 1604, after the Deathe of the Blessed Queene Elizabeth, the Moste Blessed Prince that ever Raigned. Adam Loftus, Lord Archbisshopp of Dublin was then and is now Lord Chaunceller of Ireland, and was Three Tymes Lorde Justice and Governor of the same Realme." The stem is vase-shaped, with three applied arabesque supports chased in high relief with lions' masks and strapwork; the base, of bell form, embossed and chased with large acanthus leaves and fruit, and with double moulding of egg-and-tongue ornaments; the cover, which also forms a tazza, is chased with similar form of ornament to the body of the cup, and surmounted by three terminal monsters. The steeple top to the cover is missing.

The high price paid for this specimen is probably accounted for by the historic inscription and its early date. A great many steeple cups exist in public and private collections, ranging in date from 1604 to 1640, very similar in decoration, but of widely different capacity. The example illustrated would have measured, when complete, about 2 ft. in height, while one at St. Ives measures no less than 2 ft. 9 in. in height.

STANDING SALT CELLAR AND COVER.

PLATE IV.

The Standing Salt Cellar and Cover, of silver gilt and rock crystal, $7\frac{5}{8}$ in. high, bearing the London hall mark for the year 1577, and the maker's mark, a hooded falcon in an scalloped shield, probably the work of Thomas Bampton, of "The Falcon," was sold by auction, December 11th, 1902, and fetched £3,000.

It is composed of three parts, of silver—the base, capital, and cover. The central portion is of rock crystal, cylindrical in form, and hollow, forming the receptacle for a small group, also of silver gilt, representing Venus holding aloft a laurel wreath, whilst at her feet sport two Amorini. The ends of the crystal case are closed by the silver-gilt capital and base, connected one to the other by delicate bands shaped to the outlines of caryatid figures. The base is rectangular, having two friezes of stamped classic mouldings, and at the corners, claws, in which are fastened small balls of rock crystal, forming feet. The field upon which the cylinders rest is concave in section, embossed and surface-chased with draped masks, strapwork and groups of flowers and fruit, the groundwork being worked to a matted surface; the capital is a like form, reversed, but the embossed masks, etc., changed for a finely designed moulded egg-and-tongue ornament.

The receptacle for the salt is a convex hemispherical cavity, embossed from a square-shaped plaque, the corners being engraved with scroll-work.

The cover is square-shaped, with a circular dome top, repoussé and chased with masks, strapwork and groups of fruit, the ground matted; above is a pilaster form, supporting a small crystal ball, which supports a small statuette of a nude boy, holding bag-pipes under the left arm, the right foot resting upon a tree stump; around the lower edge of the cover is applied a cable-pattern moulding, and at the four corners are rivetted small faceted glass beads.

Many magnificent standing salts of rich design and fine workmanship exist in the plate chests of colleges, corporations, and civic companies, which must be worth even far larger sums.

PLATE V.

A William and Mary Vase and Cover, $22\frac{3}{4}$ in. high, weighing 167 oz. 4 dwt., London hall mark for 1692, made by Antony Nelme, was sold by auction, April 30th, 1902, and fetched £1,086 16s.

It is of inverted pear-shape form, with a dome cover, surmounted by a cone; the entire surface is boldly embossed and chased with the most elaborate scrollwork, introducing oval medallions containing profile portraits of Roman Emperors; the medallions are supported by seated classical figures, whilst between them are three large oval panels, containing the following compositions from Roman history: The Finding of Romulus and Remus, Quintus Curtius leaping into the Pit, and Æneas carrying his father, Anchises, from the burning Troy; above these panels are masks and festoons of laurel foliage, and below, monster heads and swags of fruit and flowers; on the neck and base are duplicated mouldings of acanthus leaves.

These jars were purely decorative and made in sets of three or more, and of various shapes, in imitation of the porcelain sets then imported by the Dutch from Japan and China. The earliest were imported from Holland, but they were soon reproduced in London for royalty and the court, and hence very few are hall marked. Most of them still remain in the custody of their original possessors.

CAUDLE CUPS.

PLATE VI.

A pair of William and Mary Caudle Cups, with plain oviform body and massive handles of annular form, the body engraved with a shield-of-arms and feather mantling, also inscribed COLL . REQ . OXON . ; applied ring foot of simple moulding, $4\frac{1}{8}$ in. high, greatest diameter, $6\frac{1}{2}$ in., weight, 28 oz. 6 dwt., London hall marks, 1690, maker's mark, J.A. monogram in a shaped shield; were sold by auction, April 30th, 1902, and fetched £608 9s. These formerly belonged to Queen's College, Oxford, and were made to imitate an older design. The Arundel Cup, belonging to the Mercers' Company, is identical in form and dated 1618, and the Clothworkers' Company possess one of 1654.

The typical caudle cups are covered, and, when complete, should have a stand. They are boldly embossed with tulip and acanthus patterns, grotesque animals, etc., in high relief and from thin metal. They came in with the Restoration and gave way to the porringer, a straight-sided, more severe form. Average specimens fetch about £15 per oz.

BEAKER AND COVER.

PLATE VI.

An Elizabethan Beaker and Cover, shaped as a truncated cone, with vertical bands, alternately engraved with an interlaced zigzag ornament and sprays of leaves and bands of plain polished surface, on which are three simple maple-like leaves, $6\frac{1}{4}$ in. high, weight, 11 oz. 15 dwt., London hall mark, 1572, maker's mark, H.S. linked in a shaped shield—probably Henry Sutton; was sold by auction, April 30th, 1902, and fetched £423.

The base is an applied moulding, introducing a narrow band of egg-and-tongue ornament, with two delicate wave lines in relief; a narrow band, with a like form of ornamentation, is applied $1\frac{1}{4}$ in. from the lip; the cover repeats the ornamentation; it finishes in a flat seal-like knob. The specimen is very remarkable and possibly unique, tapering as a tankard, or the reverse way to the beaker proper, which at this time was rarely covered.

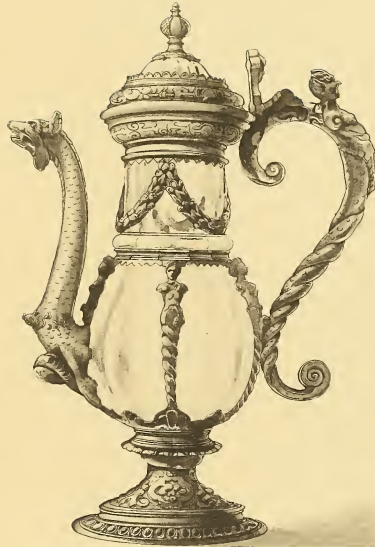

PLATE VII.

A small Ewer and Cover, of rock crystal and silver gilt, $6\frac{1}{2}$ in. high, and English workmanship, *circa* 1550, was sold by auction February 24th, 1905, and fetched £4,200, *i.e.*, £1,200 above the highest valuation by expert dealers.

The ewer is formed as a fluted pear-shaped vase, with cylindrical neck; the silver-gilt mounts comprise a circular foot, rims to the lip and cover, straps round the body, a handle and spout; the foot is chased with formal groups of fruit in strapwork cartouches on a matted ground, and has an outer border of egg-and-tongue ornament, the same decoration of fruit and strapwork being duplicated round the lip and cover; the straps around the neck are composed of festoons of fruit and leafage, while those which connect the handle, spout and foot, are in the form of caryatid figures terminating in snake-like coils; the handle, of bold proportions and scroll shape, is chased as a terminal Satyr, and the spout, which is exactly opposite, is in the form of a complete dragon; the billet is chased as a cherub, while on the top of the cover is a small knob resembling a pomegranate and issuing from the centre of a Tudor Rose; the chasing of the mounts of this fine ewer is of the highest quality, and, with the general design of the piece, typical of the English silversmiths' work of the middle of the sixteenth century. The spout is a very unusual feature in English renaissance ewers.

About a score of fine examples of silver-gilt rose-water ewers and dishes are known, many of which are of superb quality.

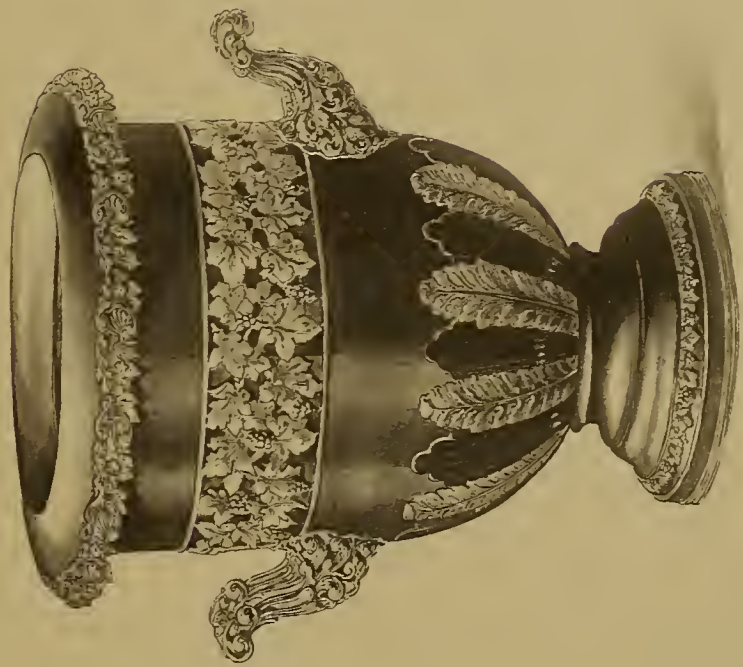

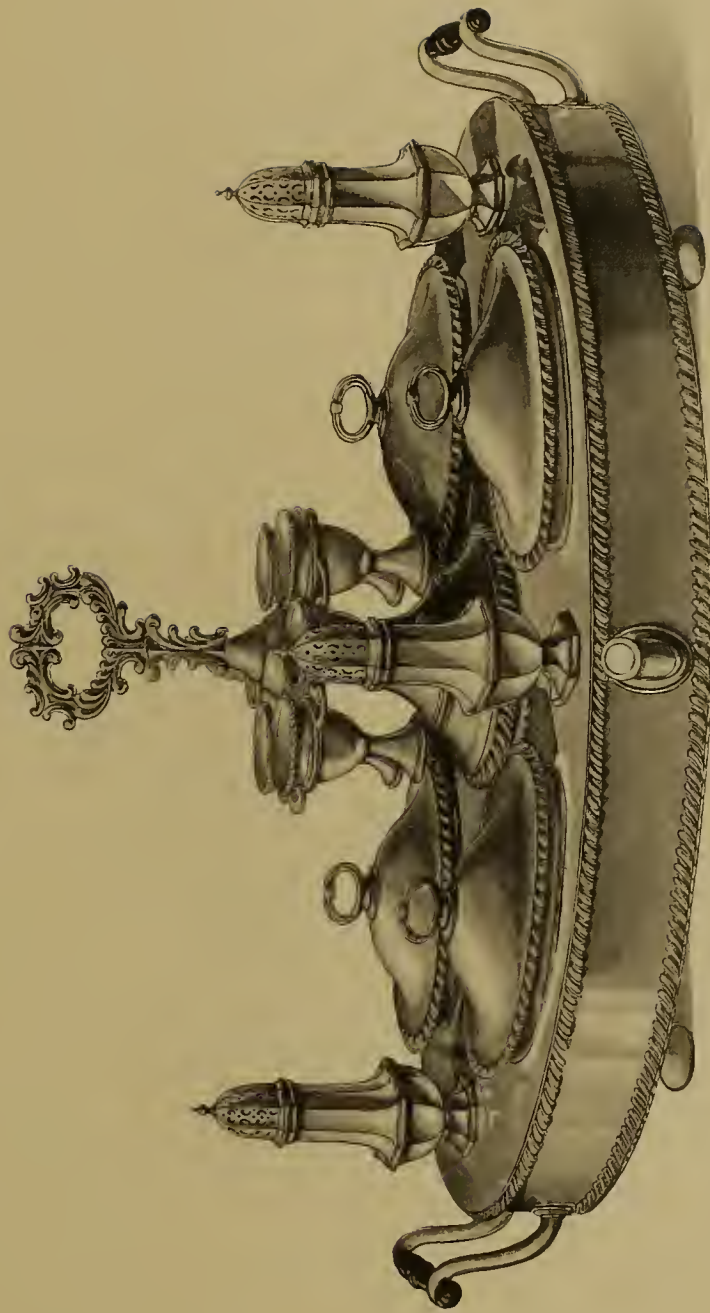

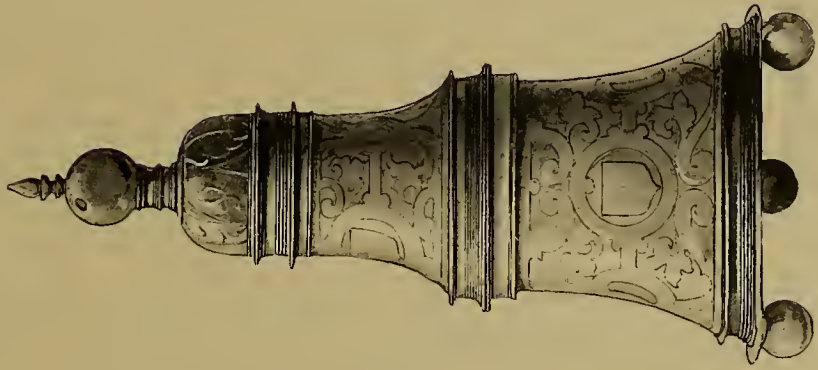
PLATE XI.

Pedestal Salts, with and without covers, were first made and hall marked during the reign of Mary, 1553, and were followed by Bell-shaped Salts about the year 1580 ; later the Steeple Salts were introduced, about the year 1595. These are usually hall marked in two or three places. The hall marks should form a complete set and there should not be two different dates and makers' marks on one specimen. It is best to get an authentic record when rare and expensive pieces are purchased.

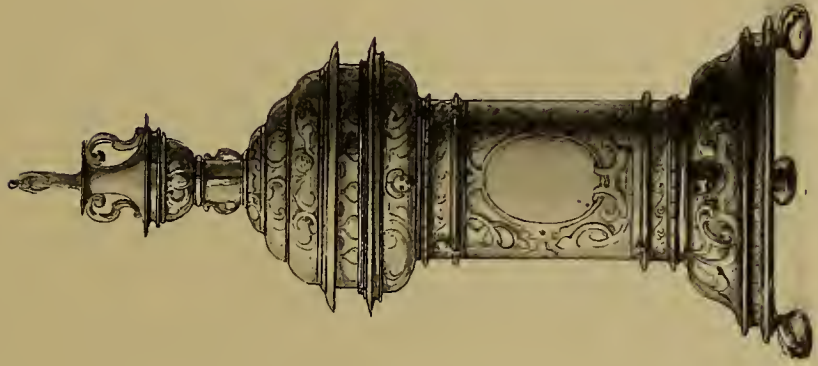
When condiments were scarce and dishes less cunningly seasoned than at present, salt held a far more important place at table, and the salt cellar occupied the position of honour in mediæval times, since accorded to the epergne. It had a protective influence which extended to the guest, as it still has in the East, but was nevertheless dreaded as an apt vehicle for poison, hence the covered salts, and it was unlucky to offer it or to spill it at table. A standing salt sufficed to mark off the upper table from the lower, and hence to be placed below the salt was considered a slight by persons with pretensions.



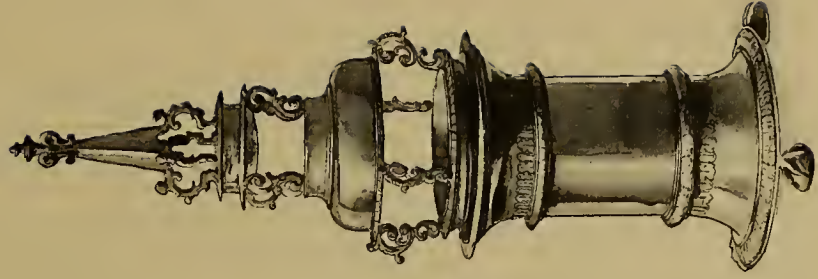

Standing Salts were followed by Trencher Salts without covers. These were circular and hexagonal from the time of Charles II., as in Figs. 3, 4, 5, 6, and until the reign of Queen Anne, when an octagonal shape was introduced. They were hall marked either on the bottom or on the side.

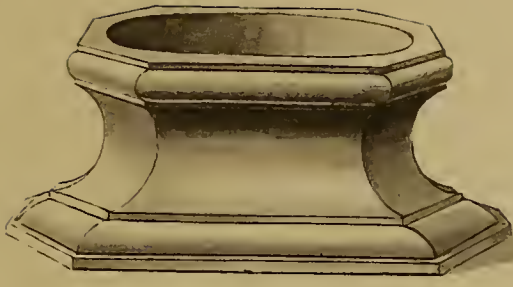
Trencher Salts were in use early in the seventeenth century. The purchase of "a silver trencher salt" occurs in the Haddon Hall accounts for 1626, and a set of twelve for 1639. The Innholders' Company have a pair of plain circular salts hall marked for 1626. It is an easy transition from the high to the low salt, and intermediate stages are not unknown. An elevated salt, from 6 in. to 9 in. high, either circular or octagonal, or partly octagonal, was in use from about 1638 to 1670, and many specimens are preserved by corporations, colleges, etc. They are plain, with a circular depression for the salt, and surmounted by three or four scrolled arms, supposed to support a napkin, but more probably for a small dish.

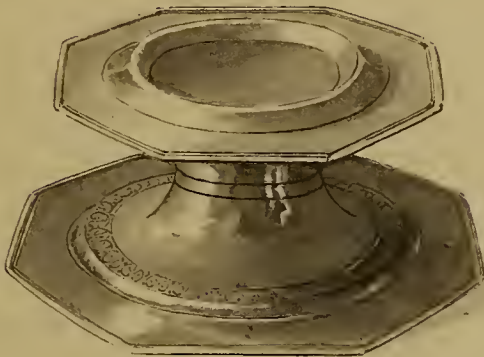

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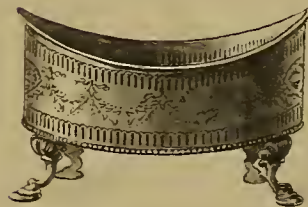

The form in which table mustard is now used dates from George I., 1720, and soon after this date the silversmiths commenced to make vessels to hold this very useful condiment. The Warwick Cruets made during Queen Anne's reign only contained three casters, an oil and a vinegar bottle. The earliest record given for a mustard pot is 1750. The hall marks on the older examples are on the bottom, and in the more modern ones, on the side. The lids were also marked with the maker's initials and the lion passant.



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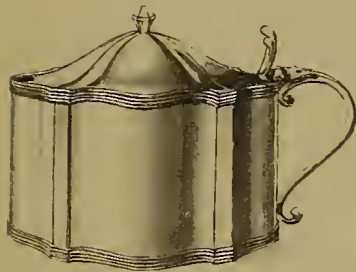

The cylindrical form of caster usually dates from 1675 to about 1705, Nos. 1 and 4.

The vase-shaped caster is met with between 1698 and the end of the eighteenth century, and was used in the Warwick frames, Nos. 2, 5, 6, and 7.

The hall marks on 1, 2, and 4 were either on the bottom or the sides.

Nos. 3 and 8 were marked on the bottom in each corner of the base, or on the side, never on the square base. The designs with square bases are sometimes found with the hall marks inserted.

Casters such as Nos. 5, 6, 7, and 11 were usually marked on the bottom, whilst the types of Nos. 9 and 10 were marked on the sides.

All the tops should bear the makers' initials and lion passant.



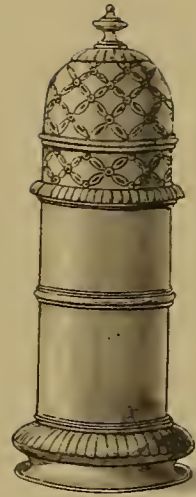

Cruets were introduced during the reign of Queen Anne; the best known design, the "Warwick Frame," generally dates from about 1750 to 1765. This usually contained three silver casters and two glass bottles with silver tops. The frames comprised two rings to put the tops in whilst the oil and vinegar bottles were in use, No. 1.

Another form, described as an Oil and Vinegar Cruet, was similar to the illustration No. 3, but with at first an oblong stand. Boat-shape and other forms of stand were introduced later.

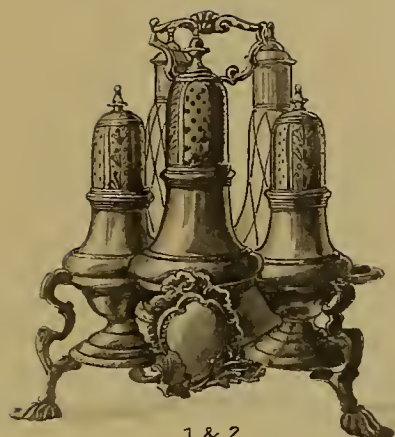
Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 were usually marked on the bottom or sometimes where the bottles stand.

Nos. 3, 4, and 5 were often re-fashioned from old snuffer trays.

Nos. 6 and 7 were marked on the rim or edge holding the wood bottom.

There was no definite rule for marking egg frames of the type of No. 8.

Each article in the cruet should be found with a mark which should also correspond with the marks on the frame.

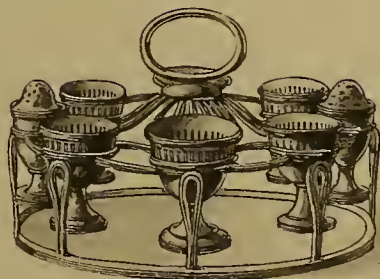
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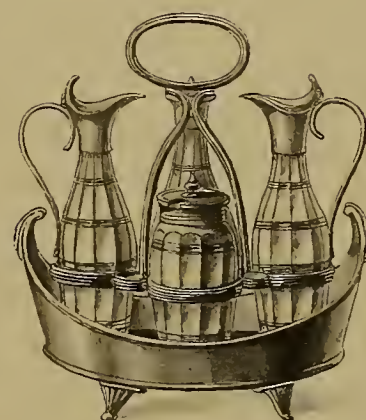

In the last years of George II., or early in the reign of George III., hall marked Decanter Stands were produced. The bottoms were made of wood, and in some cases the wood was entirely covered with silver, but more often only a silver disc was inserted for engraving. The hall marks were on the outer rim securing the wooden bottom. Often the silver centre discs were also hall marked.

In purchasing these articles of old Sheffield plate it is as well to have them invoiced and guaranteed as old, otherwise they will be found disappointing after a year or two's wear, since numerous reproductions of old Sheffield Plate are now put on the market. Never purchase those in a bright and new-looking condition, for in such cases the original rolled silver has probably worn off and the exposed copper has merely been electro-plated with a thin coating of silver which will soon disappear.

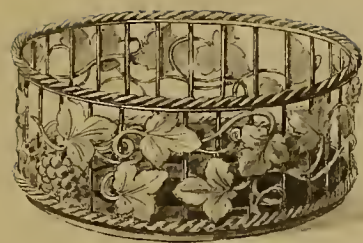
Coasters or Decanter Wagons were simply stands on wheels, which enabled the decanters to circulate freely.

STONEWARE JUGS.

PLATE XVIII.

These Jugs were made as early as, or even before, the first year of Elizabeth's reign, 1558. Those of German origin preserve the old name of Tiger-ware, evidently from the German word Tigel, a kiln or crucible. They were hand-fired and salt-glazed, and are of a dull reddish-brown, the heat having produced a curious vermicelli-like mottling of the surface, by which they are readily recognised. Others made in Fulham were delicately mottled and in various colours. The silver-gilt mounts usually consist of a cover, neck band and rim, keep, and circular foot. Sometimes these are supplemented by a shoulder band connecting with the foot by four straps, often embossed as terminal or caryatid figures, when the object becomes excessively valuable, as in the example, Plate XVIII., No. 1, which fetched upwards of £1,500. About ten per cent. of the known examples bear Exeter hall marks. Three of these jugs were sold at Christie's in 1889 for a total of £374; three similar jugs were sold in the Dunn-Gardner sale for a total of £710, while at the Huth sale three of the same quality fetched £1,340, a striking instance of their rapid rise in price. They were usually hall marked on the rim or mount, also on the cover and circular feet.

Silver Jugs for beer and hot water were made in the reign of George I., 1714-1727, but only came into general use in that of George III., 1760-1820. Some of the hot-water jugs have ebony handles and knobs, while others have the handles covered with wicker and ivory knobs.

The hall marks will be found on the side, close to the handle, or on the bottom, together with marks on the lids.

Caution is required when purchasing hall marked Jugs, as many have been re-fashioned from Coffee Pots by removing the spout and adding a lip. The spouts are rarely marked. In the examples illustrated, Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, and 6, the handles were marked. In the types shown in Nos. 5, 7, 8, and 9, the mounts holding the ebony were seldom marked.

EPERGNES AND CENTRE PIECES.

PLATES XX. & XXI.

The beautiful Epergnes or Centre Pieces which were used to decorate the dinner table often comprised dishes and baskets to hold sweets. The centre formed a fruit or flower bowl, and some examples comprise casters and candle branches.

Such Centre Pieces were first introduced in the latter part of the reign of George I., and were kept low, as in the illustration No. 1. Later they were designed to be higher, as in Nos. 2 and 3. Those in the style of the first three illustrated examples were very effective, and are now greatly sought after. Early in the nineteenth century designs as illustration No. 4 were introduced with round Cut Glass Dishes.

The latter, even when of silver, are not greatly appreciated, and realise low prices. Each separate part of the Epergne should be hall marked.

The earliest Sauce Boats were made during the reign of Queen Anne, 1702-1714, on oval feet, handled on both sides, and with a spout at either end. During the first years of the reign of George II. Sauce Boats with three moulded feet came into fashion, with a scroll handle at one end, and later at both ends, as illustrated in Nos. 3, 4, 5, and 6. Towards the middle of the eighteenth century the oval base was re-introduced.

Sauce Tureens and Covers, designed like Soup Tureens in miniature, were introduced about the year 1750, and are greatly sought after, especially those in Sheffield Plate.

Sauce Tureens such as that illustrated, No. 9, on a stand or tray, were introduced during the reign of George III., 1760-1820.

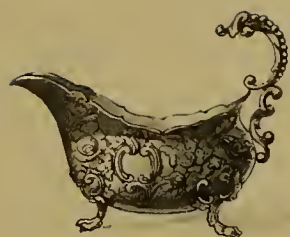
Argyles are Gravy Tureens with spouts and a lining or jacket for hot water. Very few of these were made. Boats and Tureens of the types illustrated, Nos. 1 to 12, are generally marked on the bottom or on the oval foot, and the loose parts should also be marked.

Potato Rings were usually made in Ireland and marked at the Dublin Assay Office, dating from about the year 1750 to 1800. Few were made during the nineteenth century. Throughout this period it was the fashion to serve potatoes in a large wooden bowl, the ring being a stand to raise the bowl from the table and thus prevent damage to the surface by heat as well as to give a decorative effect. Probably when made their cost may have been about £10 each, but those with good and genuine hall marks now realise on an average about £125 each.

Modern Potato Rings are made and retailed for about £7 10s., and sometimes these have hall marks inserted from a spoon or other article of small value.

When entirely fashioned from an old piece, such as the body of a large cup or dish, it is difficult to tell whether they are genuine, and it is therefore always well, when purchasing, to have a guarantee of authenticity.

The earliest and most beautiful pair of escallop shells known are in the possession of Sir S. Montagu. They are massive and beautifully chased beneath, by Paul Lamerie, dated 1732.

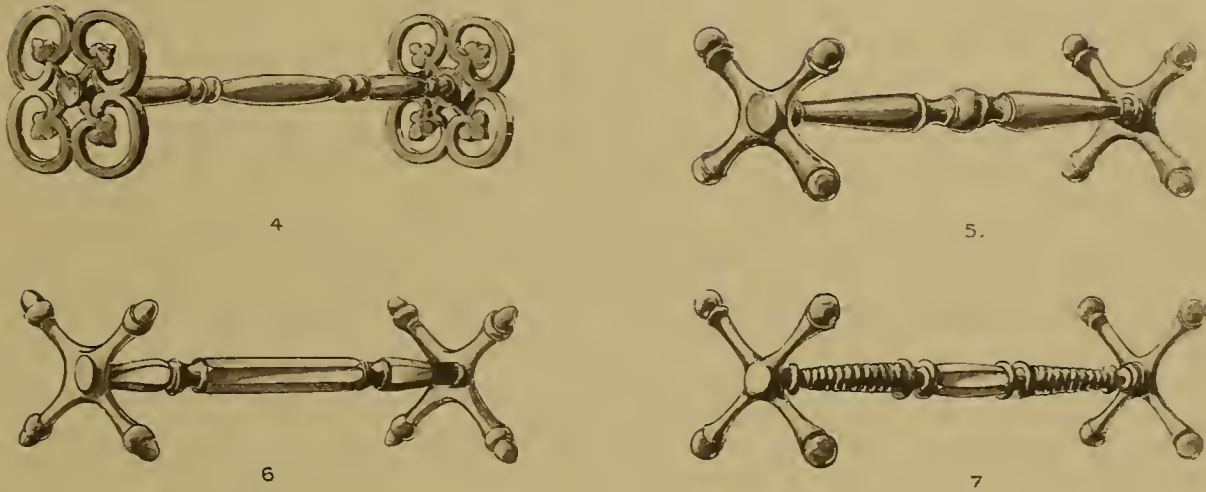

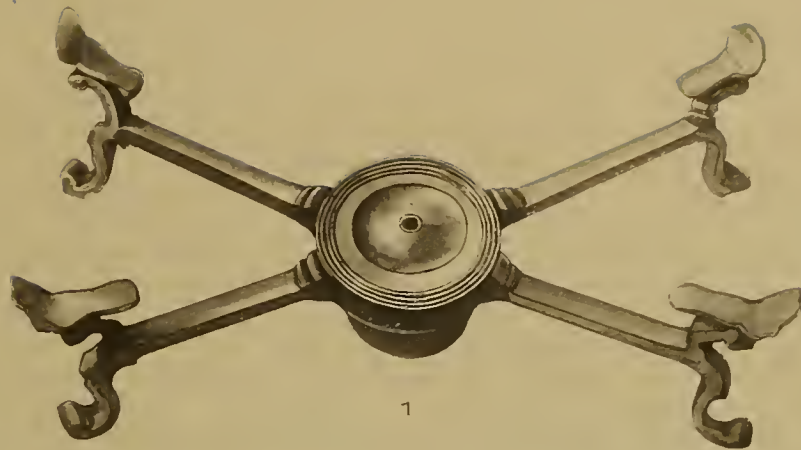

Dish Crosses with small spirit lamp in the centre, as in the illustration, No. 1, were in use from the reign of George II., 1727-1760, and stood on the sideboard to receive dishes. Few are made at the present time, as they were superseded by the Hot Water Dish about 1800. The bars are made movable round the centre portion holding the lamp, and the feet are made to slide up and down to adapt them to dishes of various sizes. They are usually hall marked on two or three parts. Cheese tasters and skewers were hall marked after the style of spoons and forks.

Tureens became larger and heavier during the latter part of the eighteenth century, until in the commencement of the nineteenth century one is recorded of the weight of 649 ozs. Many were made by Paul Storr.

Some were hall marked on the side, and others on the bottom and lids. The handle on the top was sometimes removable.

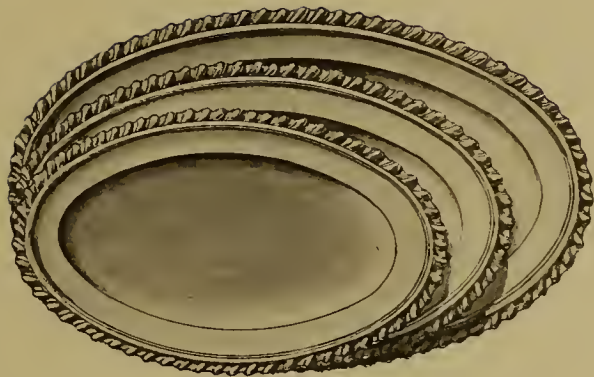

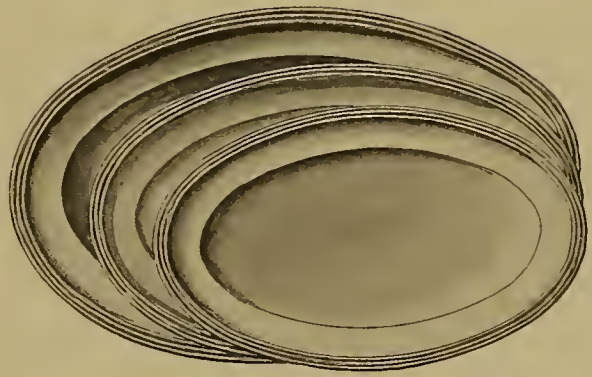

Dish covers, both in silver and Sheffield plate, have not been in demand for some years, and although not very common, silver dealers give but a few pence per ounce above the market value of silver. Probably the first cost of those in plated metal was fully twice the amount dealers are now willing to pay for them. They are thus among the few articles of plate that have consistently fallen in value. No makers are reproducing dish covers in Sheffield Plate.

If dish covers bear the hall mark there need be no doubt as to their being genuine.

These articles are often transformed into a variety of other things, such as potato rings, loving cups, etc.

Entrée Dishes with Heaters, such as those illustrated, Nos. 1 and 2, were introduced during the reign of George II., 1727-1760, but towards the end of the eighteenth century larger numbers were made of the types shown in the illustrations, Nos. 3, 4, 5, and 6, without heaters. They were usually furnished with removable handles, so that the cover and the dish could be used, if necessary, as two dishes. There were no rules for hall marking in any particular position, but each part was marked.

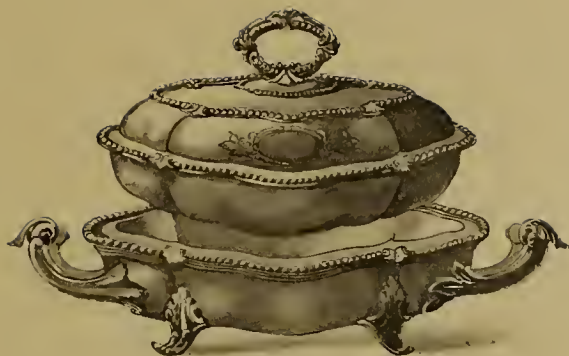
Manufacturers are now producing entrée dishes in Sheffield Plate in large quantities, consequently the old ones in good condition realize a high price.

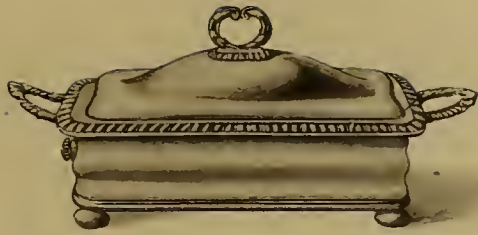
Dishes, with stands and lamps, were made in the early part of the reign of George III., 1760-1820, of many designs and various weights. The removable parts were separately hall marked.

Plates have frequently been converted into other articles, but the Assay authorities have rendered this fraud more difficult to perpetrate. The hall marks were on the rim, either on the front or back.

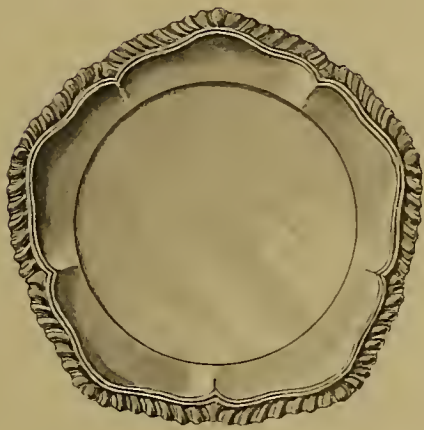

Fish Slices made during the early part of the eighteenth century are for the most part beautifully saw-pierced with either silver, or silver and ivory, handles to match the knives and forks, but afterwards in the Old English and fiddle patterns. Fish Slices were marked, some on the stem and others on the blade.

Marrow Scoops were made during the reign of Queen Anne, 1702-1714, a scoop at either end with a round stem between. They are now usually made with flat stems.

Grape Scissors were usually hall marked inside the blades. Pieces of steel are often let in for cutting, silver being too soft to cut grape stems.



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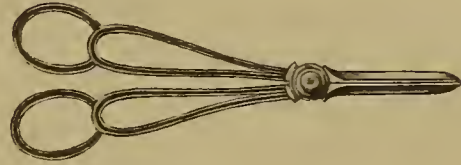
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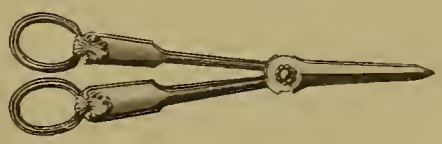

Venison Dishes and Covers were made in the early part of the nineteenth century, most of them by the Sheffield silversmiths, in Sheffield Plate, very few being of silver. They are usually made very heavy, and there is now little demand for them. Sheffield plated Venison Dishes, in good condition, can often be purchased from £5 to £6, silver dishes from 2s. 6d. to 3s. 6d. per oz., according to date.

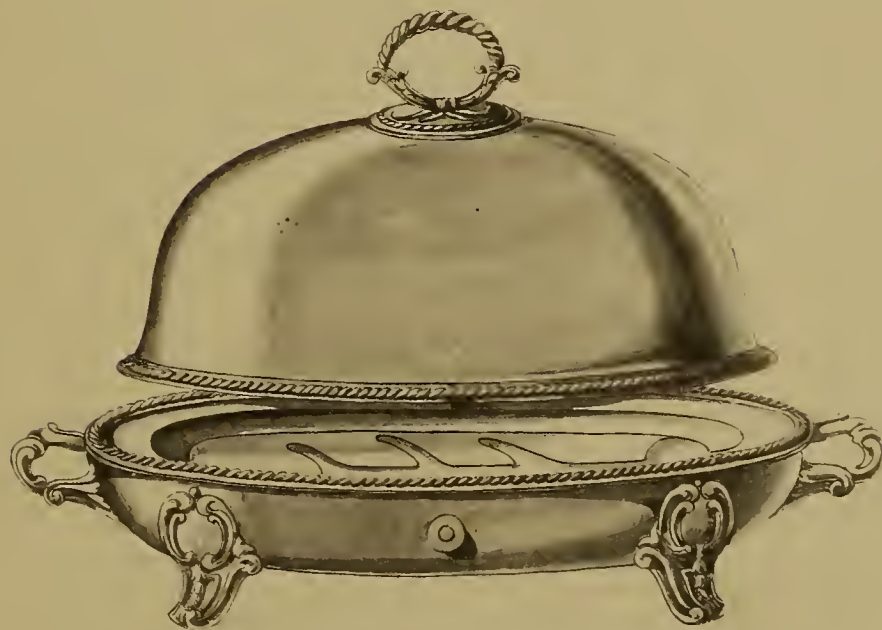
They are hall marked on the bottom or side of dish, also on the side of the cover and underneath the loose handle.

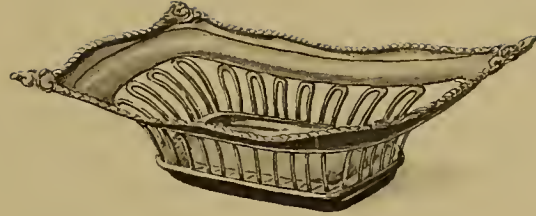

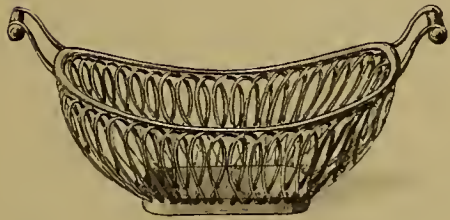

SILVER MONTEITH AND OTHER BOWLS.

PLATE XLII.

Punch Bowls were introduced during the reign of Charles II., 1660-1685. The Monteith pattern, with lion's masks and ring handles, came into fashion about the last year of the reign of William and Mary, 1695. Its distinctive feature is the removable rim, with vandyked or scalloped edge, intended to hold the glasses. They were large and imposing bowls, so-called after a gentleman named Monteith. They were usually hall marked on the outside, close to the handles. Very few of these are found in Sheffield Plate. Similar bowls to those illustrated by No. 1 would realise £10; No. 2, £7 10s.; No. 3, £5.

Large oval Wine Coolers, or cisterns, like that illustrated, Plate XLIII., No. 1, were in vogue in Italy during the Renaissance and reached England in the time of Charles I.; none appear to be of later date than Anne, 1702-1714. Some of unusual size, such as those at Belvoir, Welbeck, and Burleigh weigh nearly 2,000 ozs. They are rarely sold by auction, but would realize fully £2 per oz.

During the reign of George III., 1760-1820, ice pails, with loose linings, became fashionable, and are now greatly sought after, especially those in old Sheffield plate. Silver examples are usually hall marked on the foot or on the side. The linings are often of base metal.

PLATE XLIV.

Plain Silver hall marked Saucepans, with wooden handles, without stands, like the illustration No. 1, were made during the Commonwealth, 1649-1660. Others of a later period were similar to the illustration No. 2, with a stand and spirit lamp. They were either hall marked on the bottom or on the side close to the handle. The stand and lamp, if of silver, should also be hall marked.

Scotch Quaighs or Shallow Bowls, with plain or pierced flat horizontal handles, were made during the early part of the sixteenth century and later, the earlier ones commanding high prices.



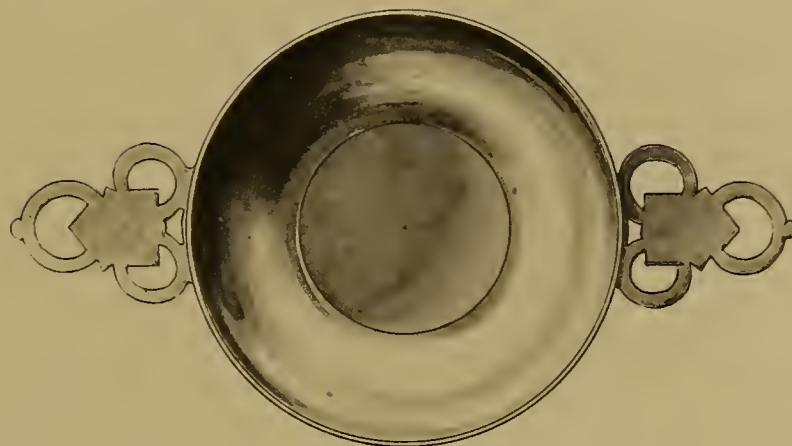

PLATES XLV. AND XLVI.

These came into use about the year 1710. The hall marks were in various positions, some on the sides, others on the bottom, and in the Pierced Baskets the marks are often difficult to find, as they were stamped between the piercings.

Twisted or wire-worked handles were not often hall marked, and those with a plain surface on the inner side were marked with the maker's initials and a lion.

In purchasing preference should be given to baskets with a hall marked handle, many having been fashioned from ordinary goblets, especially in the case of such patterns as those numbered 2, 21, 22, 23, 24 in the illustrations, Plates XLV. and XLVI.

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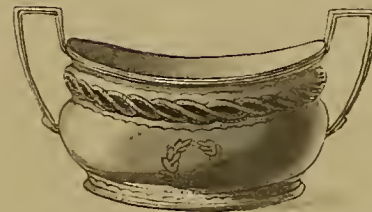

Cream Jugs came into use during the reign of William III., 1695-1702, and were then generally of a low form. About the time of George I., they are found with a round, reeded base, and later, with three-claw, ball, or other feet. The hall marks were on the bottom or the sides, usually close to the handle.

Tea Caddies were made during the reign of Queen Anne, 1702-1714, usually in plain octagonal shapes with sliding panel at the bottom and domed tops. Later, in the reigns of the Georges, 1714-1830, they assumed the shapes seen in the illustrations, Nos. 2 to 7, with loose or hinged covers. They are for the most part in sets of three, and enclosed in various kinds of wood cases, some covered with shagreen. They are also found in pairs, and at a later date singly.

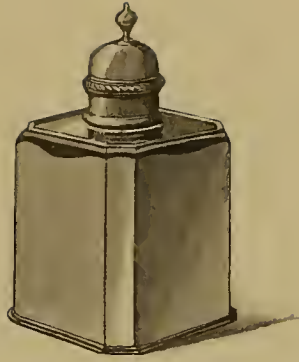
They were usually hall marked on the bottom or sides, also on the lid or cover.

Silver Tea Pots were rarely made previous to the reign of Queen Anne, 1702-1714, but examples are known dating back to the reign of Charles II. Those made during the early part of the 18th century were small and plain, sometimes with domed lids and without base, as in No. 1, Plate XLIX. Those of the reign of George I., 1714-1727, have frequently the round bases seen in the illustration, Nos. 2 and 3; later they are found on four feet, as in Nos. 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, and 10. In the early part of the reign of George III., 1760-1820, a stand for the tea pot became fashionable. The hall marks were on the bottom or the side of the pot, the lid being marked with the maker's initials and a lion passant.

TEA KETTLES AND TEA URNS.

PLATES L. AND LI.

After an interval of about twenty years Silver Tea Pots are accompanied by Silver Tea Kettles on "stands with spirit lamps." These were originally quite plain, octagonal or globular, as in the illustrations, Nos. 1 and 3. During the reigns of George I. and II., 1714-1760, they were richly chased with bunches of flowers, vine leaves, fruit, &c., as shown in the illustration, Plate L., No. 2. The illustrations, Nos. 4 and 5, show the styles in general use at a later date. These were rarely made in Sheffield Plate.

Tea Urns commenced to replace the Tea Kettles towards the end of the reign of George II., 1760, the first designs being in the style of the illustrations, Nos. 6 and 7, rather low in form and heated with a spirit lamp. Afterwards they were made more in the form of a vase, with fixed handles, the later ones having a receptacle to hold an iron heater. Many Urns were made in Old Sheffield Plate. Both Tea Kettles and Tea Urns were usually marked on the bottom, as well as on the removable pieces.

Coffee was first introduced into England during the Commonwealth, 1649-1660, and became a fashionable beverage soon after this date. Silver Coffee Pots were first made about 1685. The illustrations, Nos. 1 to 8, show the earliest and latest forms of design.

When purchasing, see that the hall marks and makers' marks on the pots and lids are to match, and form a complete set of hall marks for the year. Make sure that the pot or lid has not been embossed, chased, or engraved at a later date; also see that the pot or lid has not been *very deeply* engraved or re-engraved with crest, monogram, or initial (causing it to be thin in those parts), and whether a portion of silver has been removed and a thicker piece inserted. The pot is usually marked on the bottom, or on the side, and the lid generally on the rim, but sometimes on the inside, with maker's mark and date letter. The spouts and handles are not usually hall marked.

PLATE LIII.

Although Tea and Coffee were introduced into England about the middle of the seventeenth century, and Silver Tea and Coffee Pots were made a few years later, Tea and Coffee Services were not made to match until about one hundred years later. During the reigns of George III. and IV., 1760-1830. they came into general use, and are still a necessity at the present time. The hall marks will be found on the side, close to the handle, or on the bottom, together with marks on the lids.

Old Sheffield Plated Tea and Coffee Services usually realise at sales by auction from £5 to £7 10s., according to style and condition.

Silver and old Sheffield-plated Toast Racks were made during the later portion of the eighteenth century, the earlier designs being usually made of twisted wire. Others had heavy gadrooned borders and two handles, as illustrated in Nos. 3 and 4. It is not rare to find specimens made from the ordinary snuffer trays.

In purchasing, care should be taken to observe whether each removable part is hall marked, but no rule exists as to the position the hall marks should occupy.

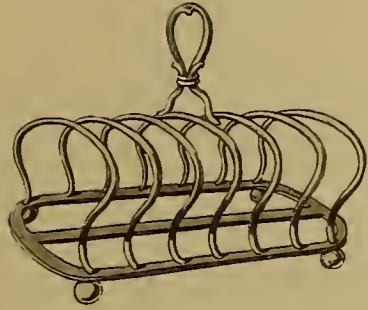
Feeding or Pap Boats were made during the reigns of George III. and IV., 1760-1830, and earlier. Very few are made at the present time. The hall marks are on the sides or sometimes on the bottom.

MAZER BOWLS, AND TAZZE OR STANDING CUPS.

PLATE LV.

The wooden bowls, known as Mazers, were chiefly made from the boles of maple trees, and were prized for the beauty of the markings. They were frequently mounted with silver rims. A few examples are known mounted on stems, as in the illustration, No. 2. Some of those of sixteenth century date are hall marked on the rim, so that during the Tudor period silver Tazze were made and used as drinking cups. They were usually hall marked on the outside of the bowl. Nos. 3 and 5 are of the time of Elizabeth, and No. 4 is a rare example of the goblet with shallow bowl of the time of James I.

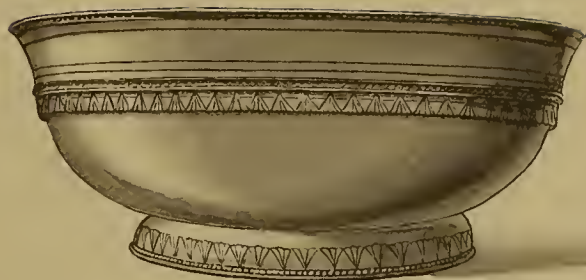
Tazze have been made for decorative purposes and as *vide-poches* in every reign, and to the present day.

Cocoanut Cups of the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries, with silver mounts of fine workmanship, are rare; No. 1 is of the time of Henry VII., and No. 2, mounted in the style of the Elizabethan stoneware jugs, was sold at Messrs. Christie's on April 29th, 1902, for £960.

Large numbers were mounted chiefly in Germany during the latter part of the eighteenth century, but they realise relatively small amounts. The hall marks are usually on the rim above the cocoanut, and the foot is also marked.

Two-handed Caudle or Posset Cups, as illustration No. 1, some with covers and trays, were used, chiefly in the reign of Charles II., for drinking posset, a concoction of milk curdled with wine, and for spiced drinks. They are narrower at the rim, swelling below, as the beverages they contained required skimming.

Porrings had straight sides, with and without covers, as illustrations Nos. 2 and 3, were introduced about the year 1680, and remained in use during the reigns of William and Mary, and Queen Anne, 1688-1714. Many were engraved with Chinese figures, as in No. 2, while others were embossed with acanthus leaf and fluted designs, as illustrated in Nos. 3, 4, and 5.

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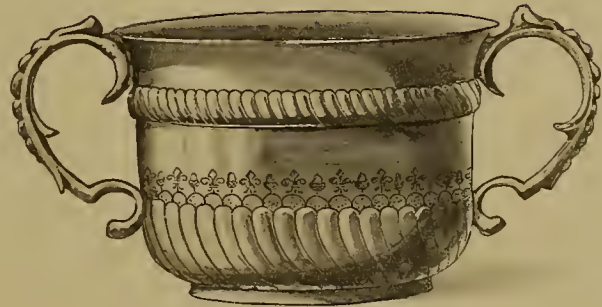

TWO-HANDLED CUPS WITH COVERS.

PLATE LVIII.

During the reign of Charles II., 1660-1685, the two-handled Loving Cups with Covers were squat in form on a broad base, with scroll handles and an ornament on the cover. In subsequent reigns Cups of more varied designs appear, many decorated with flowers, masks, birds, animals, &c. No. 3 illustrates a fine example by W. Shaw and W. Priest, with the London hall mark for 1755. Sold at Christie's, in 1902, it realised over £291. The hall marks are variously placed; those on the covers do not always correspond with those of the Cup, as the covers were frequently supplied at later dates by different makers.

LOVING OR DRINKING CUPS.

PLATE LIX.

From very early times two-handled Loving or Drinking Cups, with or without covers, have been in use at feasts. During the reigns of George I. and II., 1714-1760, the stems were taller than were those of earlier date. From the time of George III., 1760-1820, designs like those illustrated, Nos. 5 and 6, were introduced on lower feet. The hall marks will usually be found on the bottom of the Cup, and sometimes on the side.

Old Sheffield Plated Two-handled Cups were made similar in design to the illustrations Nos. 5 and 6. They realise at auctions an average of about 12s. 6d. each.

BEAKERS AND TUMBLER CUPS.

PLATE LX.

Beaker Cups are cylindrical in form, slightly widening towards the top. In the time of Elizabeth and James I. they were usually embossed in low relief, or engraved with foliage and strap-work. Early examples are greatly sought after, and command high prices; but those of the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries realise only a few shillings per ounce.

Tumbler Cups were chiefly used in Colleges from the middle of the seventeenth century. They were usually made in nests or sets of Cups, one being larger than the other, so that when not in use they could be stowed inside each other, whence the name "Nest." These small cups were drained at a single draught, as at the slightest touch they were liable to tumble over.

Peg Tankards were made in the reign of Charles II., 1660-1685. Two which changed hands, one in 1902 and the other in 1903, bore the York hall mark and both realised the same amount, 195/- per oz. The name is derived from the silver pegs, about eight in number, placed inside the tankards, so that each one should drink no more than his portion. On the other hand, everyone was expected to drink to his peg. The hall marks were usually on the bottoms, with marks on the lids to correspond.

Tankards with flat and slightly domed covers, similar to those illustrated Nos. 1 and 2, were made during the Commonwealth, 1649-1660. One sold in May, 1903, produced £631 13s. 6d. A change in style is observable during the reign of George II., 1727-1760, and the designs illustrated Nos. 3, 5, and 6 were introduced.

GOBLETS AND MUGS.

PLATE LXII.

Goblets date back to antiquity. Examples of those of Elizabeth's reign, 1558-1603, are illustrated, Nos. 1 and 2. Since then Goblets have never ceased to be produced in a variety of forms, most of the later examples being prize cups like those illustrated, Nos. 3 and 4. The hall marks were usually stamped on the upper part of the bowl. Goblets were also made in Sheffield Plate, 1760-1850. Those with embossing realise from 10s. to 20s. each, and the plain from 7s. 6d. to 15s. each.

Silver hall-marked Mugs with handles were made during the reign of Charles II., 1660-1685. The early specimens realise about £5 per ounce, but a James II. Beaker Shaped Mug was sold in April, 1903, for £16 per ounce. The hall marks are either on the bottom or towards the top of the mug near the handle. Mugs were also made in Sheffield Plate, those with embossing realising about 10s. each, and the plain somewhat less.

TAPER STICKS, TAPER HOLDERS AND STICKS.

PLATE LXV.

Silver Taper Holders date back to about the time of Charles II., 1660-1685, and Silver Taper Sticks in combination with Snuffer Trays to William and Mary, 1688-1695. These were produced during the ensuing fifty years in various forms, some of which are illustrated in Nos. 1 to 6. Early in the reign of George II., 1727-1760, the designs shown in Nos. 7 to 10 were in fashion, and towards the year 1770 the winding wire Taper Holders on round or square feet first appear. These were mostly made in Old Sheffield Plate, and are illustrated in Nos. 11 to 17.

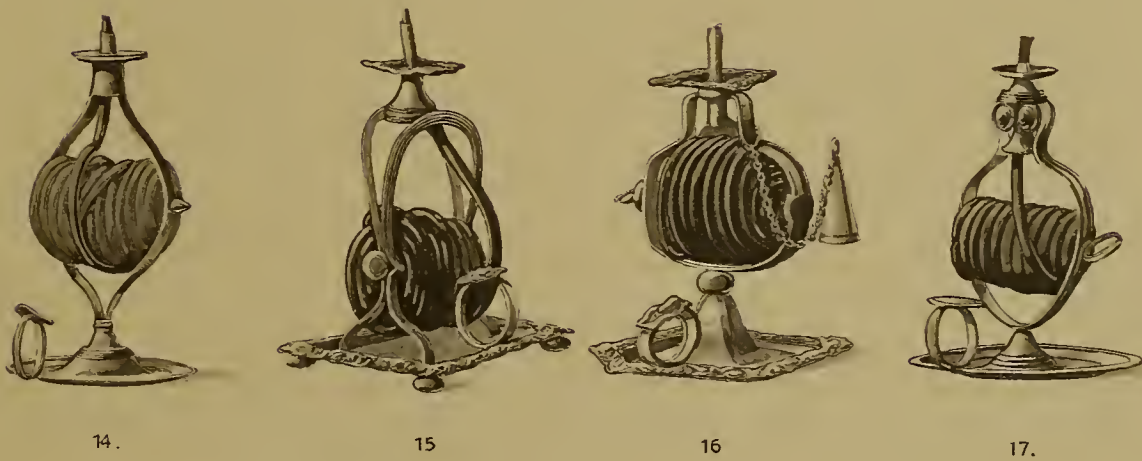
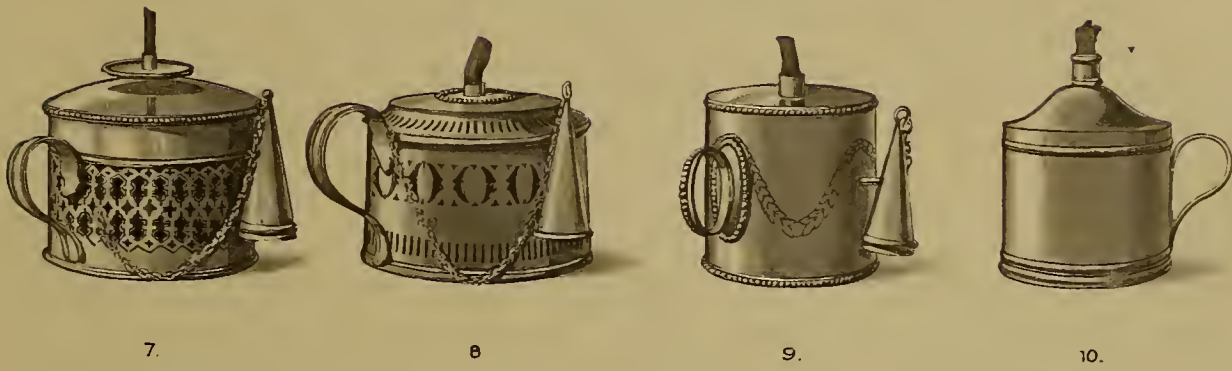
Miniature Candlesticks for tapers, with baluster stems on octagonal moulded feet, are illustrated in Nos. 1 to 6. These were made during the reign of William III., 1695-1702, and others illustrated in Nos. 7 to 17 were introduced under Queen Anne, 1702-1714. The earlier examples in silver realise about 40s. per ounce, and those of the time of George I. 20s. per ounce; in Sheffield Plate they command about 25s. each.

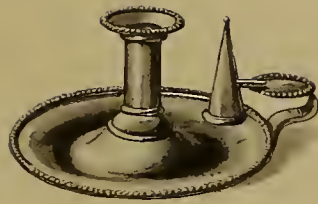

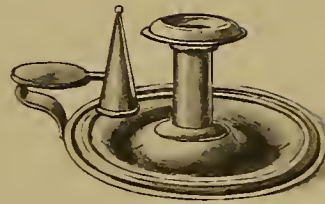

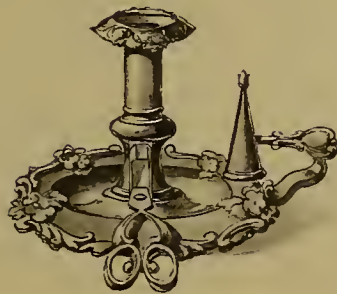

Candlesticks in the precious metals date back to remote antiquity, especially for ecclesiastical and sacred purposes. Those for domestic purposes earlier than the time of Queen Anne, 1702-1714, were tall and decorative, but they subsequently became quite plain and of baluster form; later, richly chased and decorated examples re-appear. From 1760 to 1850 large numbers of candlesticks were made in Sheffield plate. The hall marks were stamped inside the base, near the edge, but, owing to the rough surfaces, they are often indistinguishable.

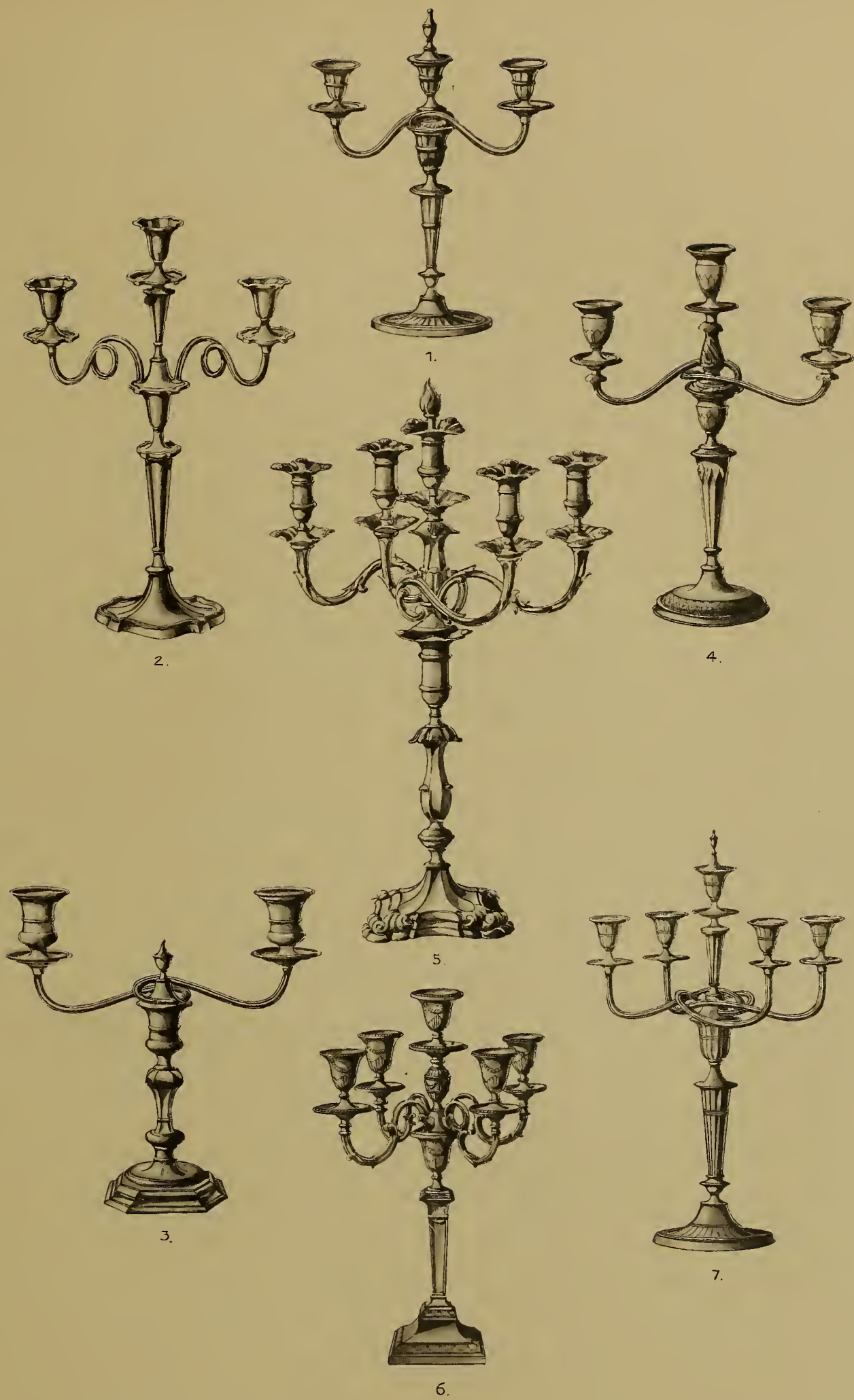

PLATE LXVIII.

Candelabra made prior to the reign of George III., 1760-1820, are rare, and those of most elaborate design are of nineteenth century work. Those of the time of George III. were usually hall marked inside the base, but those made since are generally hall marked on the outside of the base. Large numbers of candelabra were made in Old Sheffield Plate.

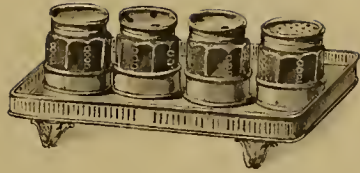

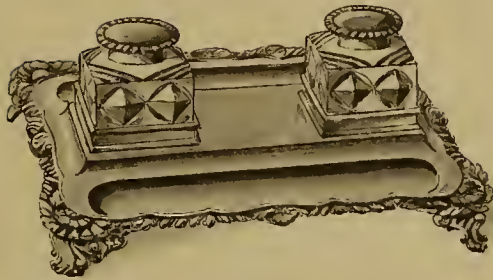
Silver Inkstands, with taper sticks and pounce boxes, were introduced during the reign of Queen Anne, 1702-1714. Large numbers continued to be made during the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries. It became usual, when snuffer trays became obsolete, towards the middle of the last century, to alter them into inkstands. Some examples are illustrated in Nos. 2, 7, 8, 9, and 11, consequently few of this date have marks on the added pieces to match those of the trays. In Sheffield Plate such inkstands as those illustrated in Nos. 3, 4, 5, and 6 realise an average of 80s. each, others illustrated on the same page fetch from 30s. to 40s. each. Those shown in Nos. 1A, 2A, 3A, and 4A realise about 100s. each, and in No. 5A about 70s. each.



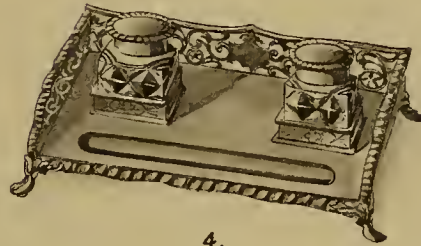
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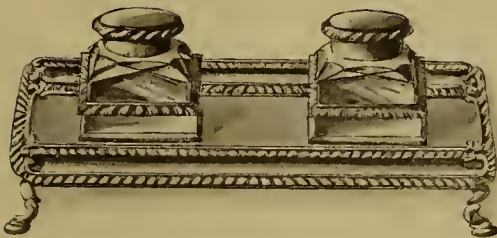
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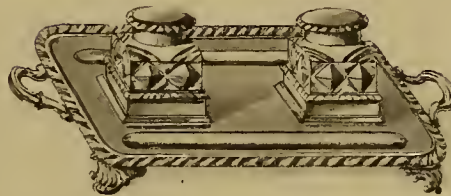
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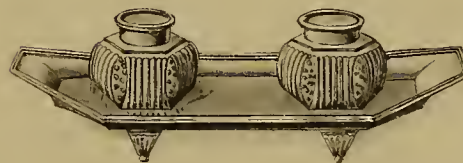
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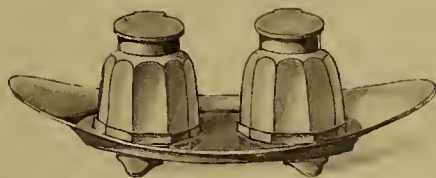
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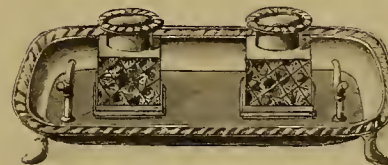
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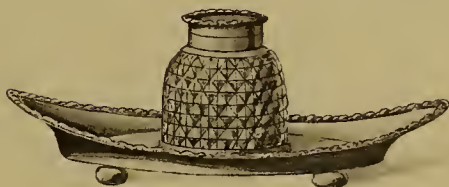
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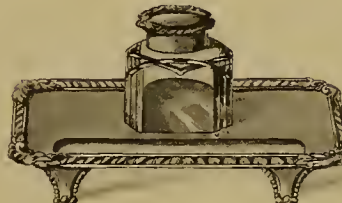

SILVER BOXES.

PLATE LXXI.

Silver hall-marked Boxes exist from as early as James I., 1603-1625. Those with good and early hall marks have been sold for as much as £100 for a box weighing 7 or 8 oz. Those made towards the middle of the eighteenth century realise from 20s. to 60s. per oz., while those of a still later date, such as the early part of the nineteenth century, would realise about 20s. per oz. Boxes were usually hall marked inside, as well as on the lid. Sheffield-plated Boxes realise from 5s. to 25s. each.

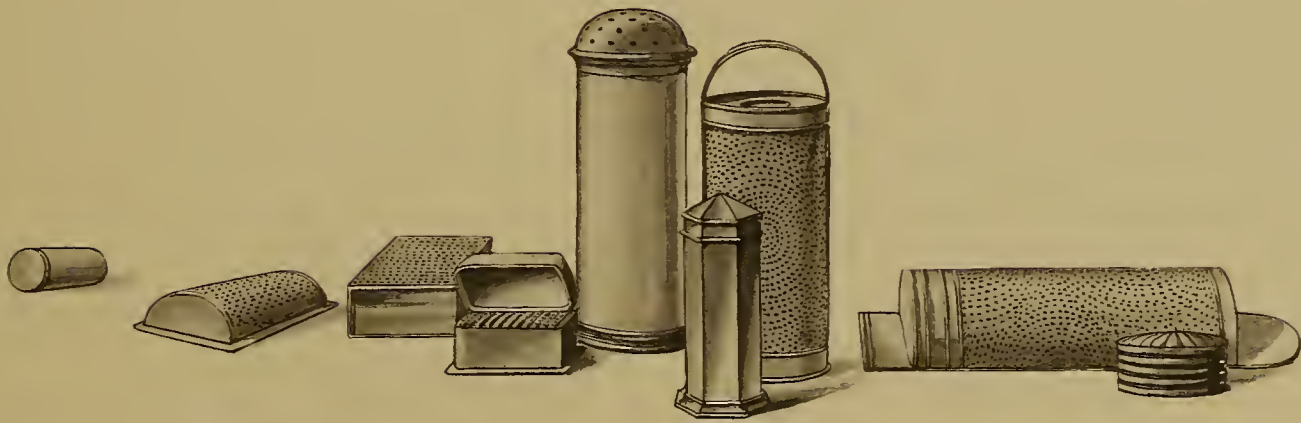

NUTMEG GRATERS AND VINAIGRETTES.

PLATE LXXII.

Nutmeg Graters were made in considerable variety throughout the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries. Most usual are those shaped like boxes—both round, square, and oval. Steel Graters are fitted in the interiors. These realise from 15s. to 40s. per oz.; the large steel graters mounted with silver handle and rim command from 30s. to 100s. each.

Vinaigrettes were in use in the early part of the nineteenth century, and the prices now paid for them average about 10s. to 20s. per oz.

TABLE AND CORAL BELLS.

PLATE LXXIII.

Table Bells such as those illustrated in Nos. 4 and 5 rarely find their way to auction rooms. Those made in the reign of Queen Anne, 1702-1714, readily command about £5 per oz. Coral Bells were also made in the early part of the seventeenth century, and realise from 15s. to 50s. each. These are usually hall marked on the tube which fits the coral.

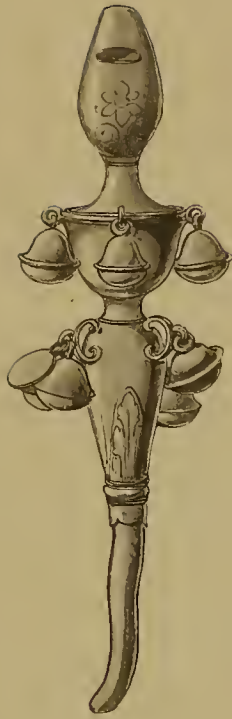

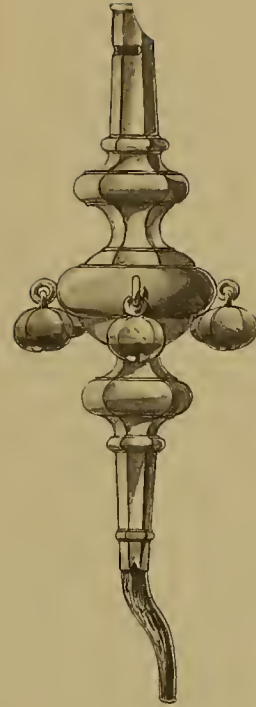

EWERS AND ROSE-WATER DISHES.

PLATE LXXIV.

The Ewer and Rose-water Dish, even now passed round at civic feasts, were indispensable in the not very far off days when fingers did service for forks. They were introduced from Italy, and quickly rendered the mediæval finger-bowl obsolete and out of fashion. The new ewers took the graceful forms of the Italian Renaissance and were richly decorated with bands of ornament of the most elaborate embossing. The dishes were circular, with a raised centre, on which the arms of the family were enamelled, and which served as a platform for the ewer to stand upon when not in actual use. The sunk part and the broad rim were often superbly embossed with scenes such as the triumph of Neptune and Amphitrite. They were invariably gilt, and remained the chief ornament of the buffet until almost the close of the repast, when they were handed round. They are not found later than the time of James I. A fine pair of the sixteenth century will command from eight to ten or even fifteen thousand pounds.

The Church Alms Dish is of later introduction, and rarely comparable to the rose-water dishes either in value or beauty of workmanship. Ewers were subsequently made of all sizes and for a variety of purposes.

CHALICES, PATENS, AND FLAGONS.

PLATE LXXV.

The solitary chalice and paten left with churches after their spoliation by Henry VIII. were forcibly exchanged for a "decent cup for the communion" and a paten under Edward VI. Though no ordinance exists, a particular type was evidently imposed, which was unvaried till the close of the reign of Elizabeth. The form and decoration of the cup changes but little and only within well defined limits, but its capacity depended to some extent on the numbers of the congregations. These cups are chiefly interesting for their hall marks, but occasionally lay drinking cups of great beauty and variety of type crept in, and some are extremely valuable. With these were used the tapering cylindrical flagon, those of Elizabethan date being remarkable for delicacy and elegance, and the type, though heavier and coarser, has remained in use till the present day. The earlier patens were small and thin plates; but later they became larger, and were sometimes mounted on stand.

The finest examples are late Georgian or Victorian, and were designed by the best artists of the day.

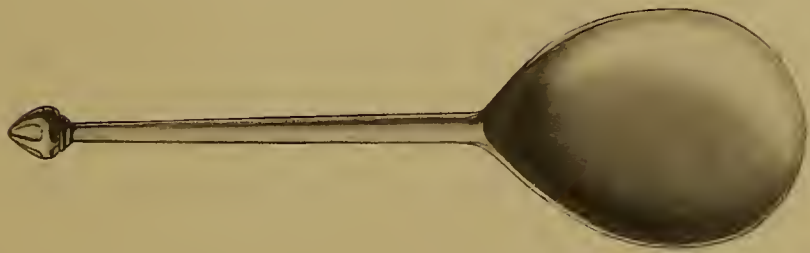

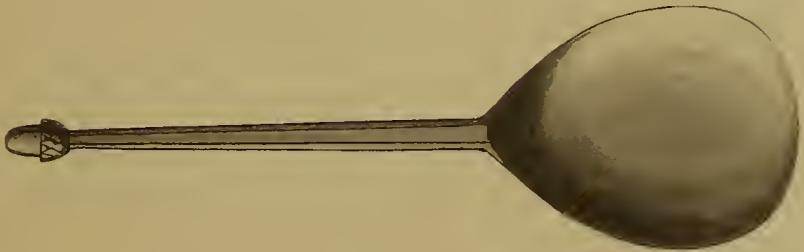

Collections of old Silver Spoons have greatly increased during the last fifty years, and specimens with good and interesting hall marks command high prices. This fact unfortunately led to imitations, chiefly produced by transforming the old Rat-tailed or Bottom Marked Spoons into Seal Top or Apostle Spoons. Since, however, it is not very difficult to recognise genuine examples, few of the spurious articles are on the market. The hall marks on the earlier Maiden-head, Seal Top, and Apostle Spoons are found close together and low down the stem towards the bowl. Spoons dating from the middle of the seventeenth and the eighteenth centuries are marked on no regular plan.

The complete sets of Apostle Spoons comprised thirteen, and are now of great rarity. A set is illustrated, Plate I., and the prices realised by the few sets that have come into the market are quoted on page 36.

KNIVES AND FORKS.

PLATE LXXXVII.

The following account of the introduction of forks to the civilised communities of Europe is of interest :—

EARLIEST USE OF FORKS.

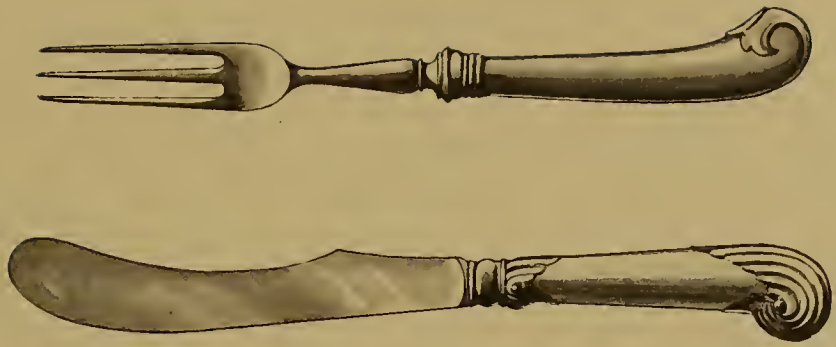
It seems strange that the use of forks began only with our easily remembered forefathers ; that the Greeks and Romans did not know anything of them, and that in the Far Eastern countries their use is still unknown. Up to the fifteenth century says the *Cooking Club* they were known only in Italy. Elizabeth had three “forks” “garnished with gold slightly,” and with “lyttle perles pendant,” but they were considered as curiosities and never used. Indeed, in that era it was considered bad form, and ministers contended that to use them was an insult to God. What were our fingers for ? Thomas Coryates’s *Crudities*, published originally in 1608, contains the following :—“I observed a custom in all those Italian cities and towns through which I passed that is not used in any other country that I saw in my travels ; neither do I think that any other nation in Christendom doth use it, but only in Italy. The Italian, and also most strangers, do always at their meals use a little forke when they cut their meats. For while with their knife, which they do hold in one hand, they cut the meate out of the dish, they fasten the forke, which they hold in the other hand, upon the same dish ; so whatsoever he be that, sitting in the company of others at meals, should inadvisedly touch the dish of meats with his fingers, from which all the table do cut, he will give occasion of offence to all the company, as having transgressed the laws of good manners, in so much that for his error he shall be at the least browbeaten, if not reprehended in wordes. This form of breeding, I understand, is generally used in all places of Italy, their forkes being for the most part made of iron, steele, and some of silver ; but these are used only by gentlemen. The reason for this curiosity is because the Italian cannot by any means indure to have his meat touched with fingers, seeing that all men’s fingers are not alike cleane.” Not until the middle of the seventeenth century did England’s nobility begin the use of forks, but they came into use slowly, and even in the early part of the eighteenth century gentlemen who travelled carried a knife and fork because the inns were not likely to have them. About 1815 forks became quite common in England and in Europe, and soon became to be considered generally as a necessity.

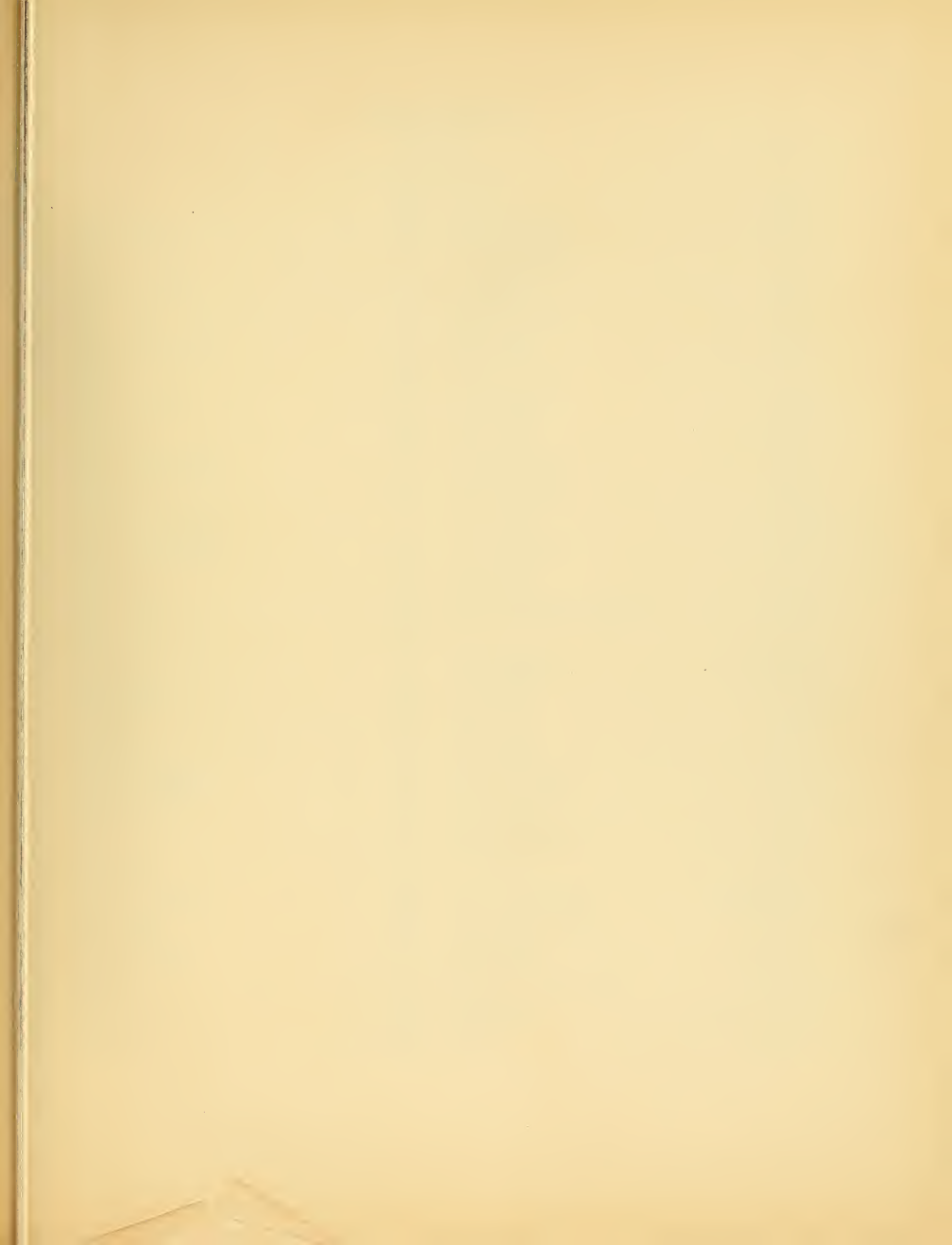

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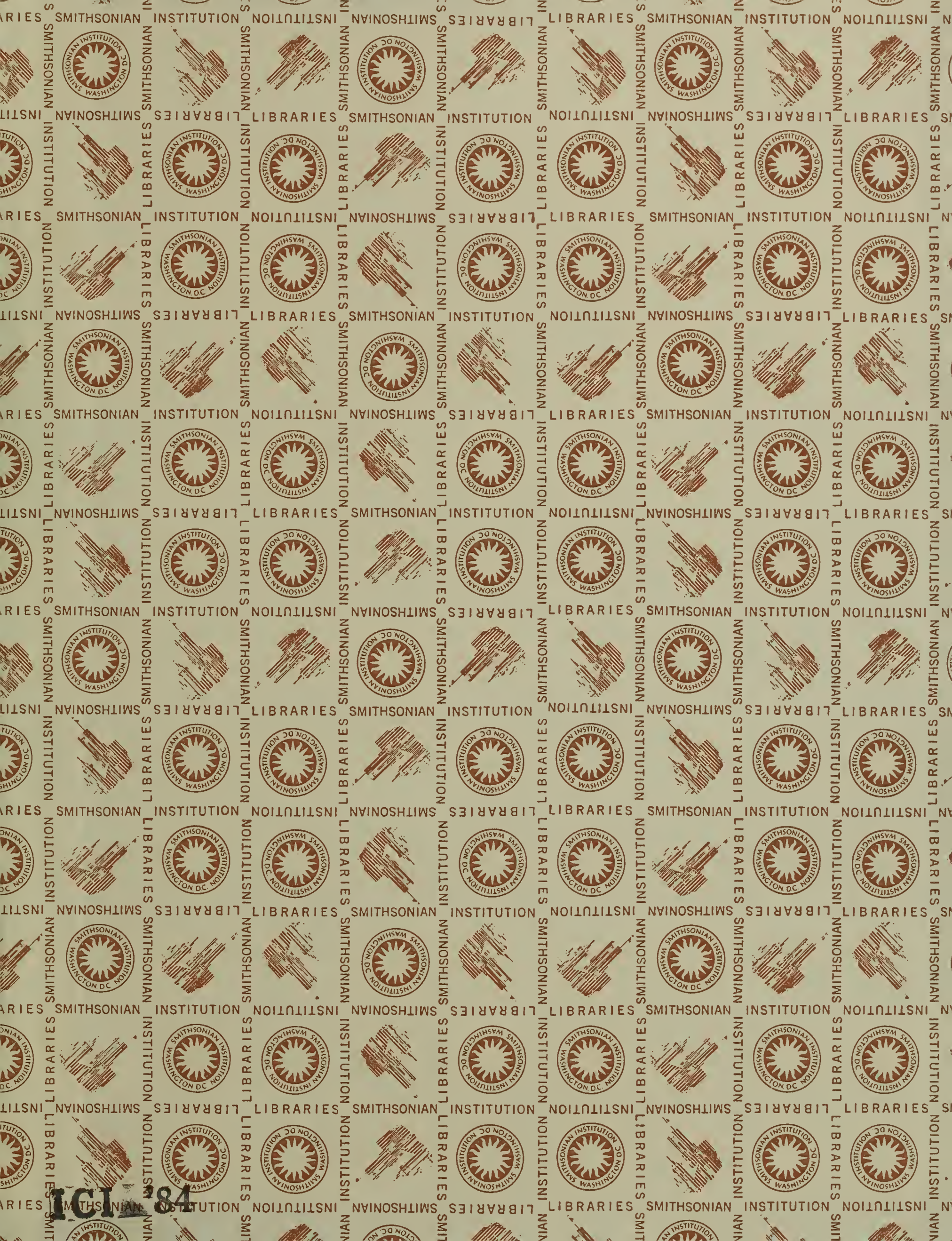


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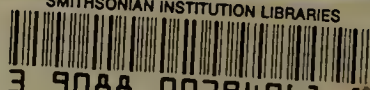
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
