In our attempts to become a more responsible, "tuned in" body, we undoubtedly made many mistakes, but this perhaps is to be expected. We hope that this new direction will be followed by future councils, and, more important, will spark interests in the student body towards becoming questioning active participants in their education. For is this not an integral part of university education?

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The editors of our yearbook have asked me to write a report on the purpose and structure of the Students' Administrative Council. SAC is only one means of formulating and implementing students' concepts of education and their role in the implementation of these concepts. Ideally, the SAC is to reflect the concepts of the individual student here on campus. Ideally, the individual student has worked through these concepts for himself and has also made the

SAC representative aware of these concepts. At this stage, it is not the structure and purpose of the SAC that is of prime concern, but rather, it is the individual student's concepts that are of prime concern. Instead of outlining the purpose and structure of the SAC specifically, I propose to outline a concept of the purpose of the university and the students' role in its implementation with the aim of stimulating students to work through their own concept and its implementation.

What is university? University is a "Community of Scholars". A community is a subgroup of society. Scholars are those pursuing and transmitting truth and learning. Therefore, the university is a community in which students, faculty, and administration work together with each other to accomplish this aim of education.

Is the University of Toronto, and more specifically the School of Nursing, a "Community of Scholars"? Do we--the students, faculty, and the administration--really work together with one another? My contention is that we do not! All the way through our primary and secondary education, we accept the decisions of the education heirarchy. University education is virtually no different. Here too, students and faculty, for the most part, have very little role in the decision-making processes.

If we do have a right to participate in university government as this definition asserts, what are we doing to enable us to practice this rights. The Canadian Union of Students, on the national level; the Ontario Union of Students, on the provincial level; and the Students' Administrative Council on the campus level and the Nursing Council right here in our own faculty are four means by which we could come to attain the ability to practice this right. These organizations are supposedly you! Yet how aware are individual students of their existence, let alone their programs?

If we have the right to participate in government, if we decide to work to attain this right, we must also be prepared and willing to accept the responsibilities inherent in this right, spending the necessary time, effort, and thought demanded to fulfill this right. University governmental covers a wide spectrum of topics and issues, to be worked out both on the individual level and the governmental level --- student, faculty, and administration. Examples of such topics are university government, quality of education, universal accessibility, etc.

As a student, I think that it is your role to work through these issues on your own and through the different governmental levels. The type of government is dependent upon your own concepts.

All four provoked much discussion, thought, and probably aspirations.


A delicious turkey dinner and it was over — 60 tired nurses once again boarded the buses and headed home.




