









HOW TO MAKE A LAWN.

SOME previous cultivation, or at least a thorough turning over should be given. A clayey loam is the best foundation for a good lawn. Let the surface be graded to the level wanted in all parts and well rolled-a light raking following this will prepare for the seed sowing, which should be done as early in the spring as the ground can be

worked, provided the ground has not already been pre-pared in the fall. The very best time, the ground being in order, is about April 1st. Three to four bushels per acre should be sown; the latter amount is best, for the young plants are but small, anyway, and if thick, cover the ground better and make a smoother and more even turf. Never sow oats or other grains-you can't assist a weak plant by crowding it with a strong one. Mowing should be done at least once a week in favorable growing weather, and even in dry weather it should be cut twice a month. Do not allow the clippings to remain on the ground, except they are very short.







WHEN TO PLANT.-The Chrysanthemums may be planted at any time after the ground has become warm in the spring until the middle of June and they will make large, blooming plants in the Fall.

SOIL .- The Chrysanthemums being gross feeders the soil should be heavily manured; dig deep and give plenty of moisture; the plants like sunshine.

How to Treat Them.—When the plants are 6 or 8 inches high pinch them back to a height of 4 inches. Allow four shoots to grow from this main stalk which should also be pinched back when four inches long, save then three or four of the branches that will spring from each of these limbs. Allow these last branches to attain a height of six inches, then pinch out the tops for the last time. This should not be later than Aug. 1st—after this they should be allowed to grow undisturbed.

When to Lift.-Plants should be lifted by Sept. Ist and put into large pois of boxes. Give a thorough watering and place in a shaded, sheltered place for a few lays. If large flowers are wanted allow only one flower to each branch, pinching out all but the terminal buds as fast as they appear. Give manure water once a week.

DWARF ESSEX The main secret in the successful raising of sheep for mutton, for which the English for so famous, lies undoubtedly in the very after the Corn is harvested and before winter sets in there is need of nutritions green folder, especially for sheep. Dwarf Essex Rape is easily frown and perfectly hardy and possesses remark-and fattening properties.
