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

"In procuring seed for a lawn too great care cannot be exercised. Pure seed of high germination is of great importance in securing a good stand of grass. "Pure Seed is the keynote to a clean lawn, provided the work of preparing the land has been efficiently done.

"Thorough preparation involves not merely the mechanical treatment of the soil to reduce it to a proper seed bed, but the use of weed-free manure and the adoption of a course of treatment previous to preparing for the lawn, which shall serve to eradicate weeds. Such preparation coupled with pure seed, should give a satisfactory stand of grass which should need only the usual care pecessary to maintain a lawn after it is once established."





## PROFITABLE CORN GROWING

In applying business principles to Farming and especially to Corn Growing, it is well to ask, "where are the profits"? Land is worth so many dollars per acre per year; the time and labor spent in preparing the land, and later in cultivating, is an divisional investment : all items of expense which cannot be avoided additional investment; all items of expense which cannot be avoided and must Le paid for whether the crop is good or a failure. Still it is in seed, the one factor on which crops and profits depend, that some short-sighted farmers seek to economize. Poor seed corn often means low germination and a poor stand, and the farmer handicaps himself at the start with a loss of 10% to 25%. He thus throws away what amounts to a business profit on a maximum stand. Poor seed corn means a poorly bred variety with many non-fertile stalks; or small, poor yielding corn or corn with a large cob which shells out very little of the marketable product; sometimes it means corn which does not ripen and leaves the farmer at the end of the season with a worthless lot of soft, flabby ears. Wherever you get your seed corn, know what you are buying; know that it will grow; know that it is a profitable variety for your conditions and locality; make sure that you have a chance for a profitable crop.



Brief Cultural Directions.—Sow in April indoors or in cold frame in pots or flats. Transplant 1 inch apart when they have made third leaf. Plant out in May or early June. Prepare the beds by thoroughly spading over to a depth of one foot. Enrich the ground by the addition of rotten manure and leaf mold mixed through. Before planting it is advisable to soak the ground with a solution of one part of Vermine to four parts of water; this will rid it of all grubs, etc., that attack and destroy the young plants. A foot apart is about the correct distance to plant, but it varies according to the varieties. Use the hoe or rake often and with care between the plants to keep down weeds and to prevent the surface baking. Water regularly. A later sowing can be made in May, out-doors.

#### Vaughan's Hardy Phlox hlozz Decussata

THIS is one of the most useful flowers for summer decorations, the colors varying from pure white to deep crimson. They are not at all particular as to soil, and are exceedingly hardy. To obtain good results it is wise to manure the soil well and give them a fairly open situation, and an occasional soaking of water during very dry weather. Once planted they require no further attention for several years, but it is advisable to renew them about every fifth year. The flowering period is from the early part of July to the middle of September and they grow to heights varying from 1 to 3 and even 4 feet. If the first flower spikes are cut off as soon as over, and the plants are given a good soaking, a second crop of bloom extending until late in the fall may be expected. The blue, lavender and orange colored ones should be planted in semi-shades, as the sun is apt to bleach out the colors in a short time.

**IMPORTANT.** Unpack and examine all packages on arrival, and if roots are dry, give a good soaking with water. Never let trees lie about with their roots exposed to the air. If several have to be planted, open a trench and "heel in" the roots, and then plant at your leisure.





As a weaving material it is ideal, combining, as it does, softness and flexibility with great strength. The strands average three feet in length; this gives it a decided advantage over splints and grasses.

The Raffia which we import is the finest grade to be obtained on the island, and should not be compared with the cheaper coarse material offered by many and used principally as tying material in gardens and nurseries. Certain Kinds of Flowers are easily grown in the city garden. These never fail; Gladiolus bulbs, Nasturtium, Portulaca, Poppies, Sweet Alyssum and Morning Glory. These can readily be grown in pots and boxes on the block parden roof. Make a start, and you will be gratified with the results. Study garden

Prepare the ground well by spading up eight inches deep and work into it old manure and rotted leaves; also sifted ashes or a little old plaster or lime screen-Rake the soil fine and smooth and plant seeds in rows about 10 or 12 inches t. Suburban Garden conditions are favorable for the beginner, and a larger variety of vegetables and flowers can be grown successfully. If space be limited the selections should be made for quality and food value, and crops rotated keeping ground producing some crop all the time.

The Best Vegetables to start with, in addition to those already given, are cabbage, cauliflower, sweet corn, Chinese cabbage, lima beans, peas, parsnips, turnips, parsley, spinach, summer squash, tomatoes and cucumbers. Potatoes should not be grown unless space is considerable, as they produce only where soil is loose and fertile. Beginners will make fewer mistakes if they get one of our Victory Collections of selected varieties, known to do well under average con-ditions, and containing amounts of seed sufficient for the small home garden.

 For Amateur Gardeners in some varieties of vege-tables or flowers seem to grow bigger or yield better than other sorts, probably because of soil conditions. For example, some gardeners prefer Improved Golden Wax bean to Wardwell's Wax. Some may have had better success via With Stringless Green Pod than with Bountiful or other sorts. **Draw Your Own Plan.** We do not give a planting chart, as each gardener must plant to suit space or location. In general, make long rows and not small beds. Sow radishes with carrots and parsnips. Put onion sets in beet rows and plant tomatoes on space left by early crops. Train tomatoes to stakes or sunny side of a fence. Sweet corn pollenizes and yields better when planted in fairly short sections of adjacent, rows than inlong single rows.

## What Can I Do Each Month in the Garden?

MARCH.—Ask for our leaflet "How to Make a Hot-bed" and sow in it, or indoors in boxes, Snowball Cauliflower, Early Jersey Wakefield Cabbage, All Head and Grand Rapids Lettuce, Acme or Earliana Tomato, Magnum Dulce Pepper.

Have manure or fertilizer ready, look over tools and get what are needed. Watch ground and start work as soon as it is workable. If favorable; sow beets, onions, onion sets, carrots, parsnips, spinach, early round peas.

Work manure or fertilizer around asparagus and rhubarb or set out these plants, fruit trees and shrubs. Plan a strawberry bed and order Dunlap, Klondyke, e.rly; Progressive, the true everbearing.

**APRIL.**—Sow early beets, carrots, peas, Scarlet Turnip White Tip and Icicle radish, Swiss chard, leek, lettuce, White Milan turnip, spinach and parsnip. Set out as soon as favorable early cabbage and cauli-flower plants or harden off in cloth covered cold fr. me. Start cucumbers, melons and lima beans in squares of sod or paper boxes in cold frame. Make first plant-ings of green and wax bush beans or Kentucky Wonder pole bean latter part of month if soil is warm, also plant Early Iowa and Golden Bantam corn. Sow indoors Asters, Phlox Drummondi, Salvia, Pansy, Petunia, Verbena and Zinnia seeds. Plant Glaidous bubs latter part of month and each ten days until June 15. Study our list of these lovely and easily grown flowers. grown flowers

MAY.—Plant bush and pole beans, lima beans, sweet corn, peas; make second sowings of radishes, beets, carrots, lettuce and thin out former sowings. Set out plants of cabbage, egg plant, caulidower, tomato or Brussels sprouts; transplant head lettuce, celery, also cucumbers and melons from cold frame, but protect with glass or cloth-covered box.

Watch for beetles and plant lice and have sprayer


or duster ready, with proper insecticides. Prepare flower beds for early started plants. Set out Gladiolus, Dahlias, Cannas; our canna plants give brilliant lawn effects.

JUNE.—Set out tomato plants, if not done before; also celery, after soaking ground and roots. Keep on planting bush beans, carrots, sweet corn, kohlrabi. Plant summer squash, including Manmoth White bush, Fordhook, Vegetable Marrow or Crookneck. Sow late beets and carrots, also Vaughan's Improved or Purple Top Rutabaga for winter use. Spray tomatoes and potatoes with Bordeaux mixture to prevent blight. Watch melons or cucumbers and all plants for lice and worms, and spray with nicotine soap or lead arsenate promptly. Keep soil in good cultivation to kill weeds and provide a dust mulch to retain moisture.
