"In procuring seed for a lawn too great care cannot be exercised. Pure seed of high germination is of great importance in securing a good stand of grass.
"Pure Seed is the keynote to a clean lawn, provided the work of preparing the land has been efficiently done.
"Thorough preparation involves not merely the mechanical treatment of the soil to reduce it to a proper seed bed, but the use of weed-free manure and the adoption of a course of treatment previous to preparing for the lawn, which shall serve to eradicate weeds. Such preparation coupled with pure seed, should give a satisfactory stand of grass which should need only the usual care necessary to maintain a lawn after it is once established.

## PROFITABLE CORN GROWING

In applying business principles to Farming and especially to Corn Growing, it is well to ask, "where are the profits"? Many people fail to get a good display of flowers by not sowing early enough. Another reason, and one even more prolific of harm, is sowing the seed too thickly; or, 3, too deeply; and

Not thinning out the young plants soon enough; or, 5 , sufficiently.

After planting give a heavy mulching of rotten stable manure, and do not transplant the clumps for at least 5 years, and then only if very necessary. ## PLANTING SUGGESTIONS

To plant a circular Canna bed; spade the ground two feet deep, mixing thoroughly into the soil enough well rotted manure to fill six inches in depth of the whole bed. When ready place a stake in center of the bed and with a radius of eighteen inches mark a line for planting the first row. Set the plants in this row eighteen inches apart. Lengthen the radius eighteen inches for each successive row; plants other than Cannas require different distances. All numbers below represent round beds.

Planting plans will be furnished with each Canna bed ordered.
Culture.-Cannas should be planted in good, rich garden soil, mixed with half of old rotten stable manure, by the end of May, when danger from frost is past. Water sparingly for first two weeks after planting. When growing frecly, water liberally. Set the plants about 18 inches apart each way, and if more than one kind is used, be careful to plant the taller growing kinds in the center and the dwarf ones along the edge. This applies to planting in beds or borders.

Certain Kinds of Flowers are easily grown in the city garden. These never fail; Gladiolus bulbs, Nasturtium, Portulaca, Poppies, Sweet Alyssum and Morning Glory. These can readily be grown in pots and boxes on the back porch or roof. Make a start, and you will be gratified with the results. Study garden articles and books and draw a garden plan.

Prepare the ground well by spading up eight inches deep and work into it old manure and rotted leaves; also sifted ashes or a little old plaster or lime screen ings. Rake the soil fine and smooth and plant seeds in rows about 10 or 12 inches apart. You can put a few tomato plants in a sunny spot along a fence or train to stakes, and also grow a few pole beans at the side.

Suburban Garden conditions are favorable for the beginner, and a larger variety of vegetables and flowers can be grown successfully. If space be limited the selections should be made for quality and food value, and crops rotated keeping ground producing some crop all the time.

The Best Vegetables to start with, in addition to those already given, are cabbage, cauliflower, sweet corn, Chinese cabbage, lima beans, peas, parsnips turnips, parsley, spinach, summer squash, tomatoes and cucumbers. Potatoes should not be grown unless space is considerable, as they produce only where soil is loose and fertile. Beginners will make fewer mistakes if they get one of our Victory Collections of selected varieties, known to do well under average conditions, and containing amounts of seed sufficient for the small home garden.

For Amateur Gardeners in some localities certain named varieties of vegetables or fowers seem to grow bigger or yield better than other sorts, probably because of soil conditions. For example, some gardeners prefer Improved Golden Wax bean to Wardwell's Wax. Some may have had better success with Stringless Green Pod than with Bountiful or other sorts. In some gardens Vaughan's Fire ball beet has done better than Crosby's Egyptian. Among flowers, the Crego type of Aster may be more pleasing than the Giant Branching, and the list could be extended indefinitely. Such preferences result from experience and personal taste

Draw Your Own Plan. We do not give a planting chart, as each gardener must plant to suit space or location. In general, make long rows and not smal beds. Sow radishes with carrots and parsnips. Put onion sets in beet rows and plant tomatoes on space left by early crops. Train tomatoes to stakes or sunny side of a fence. Sweet corn pollenizes and yields better when planted in fairly short sections of adjacent, rows than in long single rows.

## What Can I Do Each Month in the Garden?

MARCH.-Ask for our leaflet "How to Make a Hot-bed" and sow in it, or indoors in boxes, Snowball Cauliflower, Early Jersey Wakefield Cabbage, All Head and Grand Rapids Lettuce, Acme or Earliana Tomats, Magnum Dulce Pepper.
