ADDITIONAL FOR HONORS.

After Matriculation the Course of Study embraces four years, and on the satisfactory completion of the Curriculum, Students are admitted to the degree of Bachelor of Arts.

All candidates for this degree are required to attend the daily instructions of the lecture room, as well as to pass the terminal and annual examinations.

Where the age and standing of the student, or facilities for private reading warrant the belief that the usual examinations may be passed without attendance on the university lectures, a dispensation from such attendance for a period not exceeding two terms during the four years may be granted by the Faculty.

Any student not intending to graduate may pursue a special or elective course, selecting such subjects as may be best adapted to his circumstances.



N.B.—The Curriculum is constructed on the principle of encouraging a well-balanced and varied culture, and not with the view of stimulating extraordinary proficiency in particular departments. It will be seen in another part of the Calendar that there are a few prizes awarded to special excellence, but all candidates for honors are required to pursue the same course, and the estimate of merit will be based on an aggregate of all the subjects of the curriculum, including pass-work as well as honor-work. For pass-men the course is also uniform, with the exception of the two terms in which the option is allowed of French or Mathematics.



The Collegiate year begins on the last Thursday in August, and ends on the first Wednesday in May.

This period is divided into two Terms, between which there is a recess at Christmas of one week.

Convocation is held on the last day of the Collegiate year, and is followed by the Summer Vacation.

Candidates for admission may be examined either on the day after Convocation, or on the day before the opening in August.

EXPENSES.

Board in College Refectory, including furnished room and fuel, \$2 a week; washing and lights extra.

The rooms are provided with stoves, beds, bedsteads, and tables; other necessary articles the students provide for themselves.

Board may be had also in private families at prices varying from \$2 to \$2 50 a week.

Tuition, \$12 a term, or \$24 for the year. The charge is the same whatever studies are pursued.

Payment for tuition is required in advance for each term; for board in advance for each half term.

The charge for *incidentals* is \$4 per annum, payable on admission.

Any student wishing to attend the College on a Scholarship must bring an order from the owner of the Scholarship.


No Scholarship is available unless paid up in full.

The total expense for board, washing, light, instruction, and incidentals will range between \$90 and \$120 a year.

MEDALS AND PRIZES.

Through the bounty of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, on the occasion of his visit to this Province, the authorities of the University have been enabled to establish





The Prince's Gold Medal will be awarded to that student of the graduating class who may have obtained the highest standing in all the prescribed subjects of the curriculum, during the four years of study.

The Prince's Silver Medal will be awarded in the same way to the second-best student of the graduating class.

In addition to the above, three prizes have been established by John George Hodgins, Esq., L.L.B., Deputy Superintendent of Education, who, several years since, donated the handsome sum of \$635 for their permanent endowment.

The first of these is styled the Ryerson prize, the second the Webster prize, and the third the Hodgins prize. The Ryerson prize will be annually awarded to that member of the Freshman class who may evince the best knowledge of Scripture History; the Webster and Hodgins prizes are open for competition to the Junior and Senior classes, and will be awarded to the respective authors of the first and second best English essays on such subjects as may be assigned by the Senate.

DEGREE OF M. A.

This degree is conferred in course on all Bachelors in Arts of three years standing, whose mental improvement and moral character have appeared satisfactory to the authorities of the University. Application must be made by letter to the President, one month prior to Convocation. The fee is five dollars.

No honorary degrees in Arts are now conferred by this University.

DISCIPLINE.

Students connected with the College will be expected to conduct themselves with propriety, and to observe all regulations imposed by the President and Faculty.



A record is kept of each Student's deportment, and will be furnished to parents when it is deemed necessary.

Students whose conduct or progress in study is unsatisfactory, will not be allowed to remain in the Institution.

RELIGIOUS SERVICES.

All students are required to attend Divine Service on the Sabbath, at such Churches as their parents or guardians may prefer.

They are also required to attend daily prayers, with the reading of the Holy Scriptures, in the College Chapel.

On the Lord's day there are several Bible-classes conducted by officers of the College; there are also prayer-meetings and other religious services for such as desire to attend.



faculty of Medicine.

This Faculty will be conducted in Toronto, as heretofore, and those who complete the prescribed curriculum, and pass a satisfactory examination, will receive the degree of Doctor of Medicine from the Senate of the University.

The WINTER Session always begins on the 1st of October in each year, and ends on the 30th of March following.

The SUMMER Session immediately follows and continues till the 30th of September following.


The usual vacations at Christmas and New Year's are allowed.

The fees for two Winter Sessions, \$186; for one Session, \$100; Summer Session, \$35.

Additional information may be obtained from the Hon. John Rolph, M.D., L.L.D., Dean of the Medical Faculty, Toronto, as well as from the following extract from the last announcement of the Faculty:

"It is a matter of congratulation, that this University enjoys such great and increasing favour throughout the country. The Medical Department shares this prosperity, which has been increasing every year, and this guarantee of public confidence is a matter which claims and receives a grateful acknowledgment.

"The graduates, ever so remarkably welcomed wherever they settle, carry with them the fruits of their academic labour, and reflect back, as the reward of their untiring instruction, the grateful tidings of their well-earned reputation and extended usefulness. It is under such encouragement, realized in past years, that the public is assured of unabated zeal in the future fulfillments of its just expectations.



"This is done under the conviction that it will most materially promote the improvement of pupils at that time commencing their studies, as well as the improvement of more advanced students, who desire in a higher degree to mature their knowledge and avail themselves of practical opportunities of seeing disease.

Although students are not required by any statute, yet they are strongly recommended by the Faculty to attend the classes in Arts in Victoria College, Cobourg, by which course they will derive important advantages in the pursuit of their medical studies. Besides matriculating in classics, they would acquire a knowledge of Natural Philosophy, and by the study of Chemistry and Physiology they would pass one year out of the four required by the curriculum.

"The Matriculation Examination (giving satisfactory evidence of the student's classical and general attainments) may be passed at any time before graduation; and the following works in the classics are recommended, out of which the pupil may choose the one in which to be examined, viz:—The London Pharmacopæia, Gregory's Conspectus, Sallust's Catilina, or any other Latin author.

"He will also (before graduation) be required to compose a Thesis upon some medical subject, approved by the Faculty.

"A pupil being 21 years of age, having pursued his medical studies for four years, and having attended two full six months' winter courses can be admitted to an examination for graduation.

"When a pupil seeks to graduate in THREE years (the period required by the GOVERNMENT MEDICAL BOARD), he must give satisfactory evidence of his preliminary fitness, and must

attend THREE full winter courses of Lectures (the third course being free.)

"When the pupil claims to have been two years in the pursuit of medical knowledge, he must satisfy the College by a preliminary examination, that he has the presumed attainments.

"Twelve months' attendance at some General Hospital, or advantages equivalent to it, will be required. The lying-in Hospital is open to pupils.

"Anatomy is not only taught from the recent subject, but is also illustrated by the various preparations, and by a full set of plates of the size of life, as well as by the best European models, which have been purchased for the purpose.


"Besides the principles of Surgery, its practice is taught and illustrated by apparatus of various kinds, connected with its details, so as to familiarize the student with the most approved methods of adjustment and operation. With this are connected various specimens of surgical Pathology.

"Medicine is taught in its principles and practice, as well by ample morbid illustrations of the effects and changes of disease, with the additional aid of the microscope.

"Materia Medica is practically taught and illustrated by specimens; and the nature and effects of medicine and the modes of operation fully explained. Medical Jurisprudence, associated with this branch, puts the student in possession of that elementary information, which will at all times aid his research in the future, on trying occasions, and enable him to deliver his testimony in a court of justice in a satisfactory manner.

"Midwifery is taught with the diseases of women and children in the most practical manner, with the usual aid of a model, and illustrated by plates of the size of life, so as to familiarize the student with the highly important duties





"Physiology will be taught by the aid of the microscope, and of a large collection of microscopic specimens, displaying the interior structure of the tissues and organs, as well as representing the physiological characters of the different fluids of the body.

"The functions of digestion and of the nervous system will also be demonstrated by actual experiments on the lower animals.

"Chemistry includes the principles of the science; and while inorganic testimony is duly taught, the student is fully instructed in organic chemistry as applicable to medicine and toxicology. The Lectures are fully illustrated by experiments, and by an ample laboratory.

"The Museum is under the care and superintendence of the curator, and will contain not only illustrations of natural history, but whatever is deemed most conducive to the study of medical science in its various branches; for this purpose, large additions have been lately made and accommodation provided.

"The demonstrator of Anatomy will give personal attendance in the dissecting room, to superintend and assist the students in their pursuit of practical Anatomy, from 9 o'clock, A.M., till 3 o'clock, P.M.

"There are two Scholarships, of the value of \$100 each, open to competition in the Medical Department. They will be awarded annually to the two matriculants in medicine who may have graduated with the highest honor in the Faculty of Arts. In case, however, no graduates in Arts should matriculate in medicine for any given year, then the scholarships may be awarded to undergraduates.

DEGREE OF LL.B.

To obtain the degree of LL.B., it is necessary to pass the Examination for Matriculation, and the four subsequent annual examinations prescribed below.

A Graduate in the Faculty of Arts in the University of Victoria College may enter the Faculty of Law at the third year's examination.

A Student of two years' standing in Arts may enter the Faculty of Law at the examination of the second year.

A Student of one year's standing in Arts may enter the Faculty of Law at the examination of the first year.

Any person who has been admitted a Barrister by the Law Society of Upper Canada may enter the Faculty of Law at the examination of the first year.

FEES.

For each examination.....Five dollars. For the degree of LL.B.....Ten dollars.

EXAMINATIONS.

The examination for Matriculation will take place on the last Wednesday of September; the other examinations on the last Wednesday of April.

Students intending to present themselves for examination must give one month's notice to the President of the University.

## Preparatory Department.

This Department sustains to the University the relation of a Grammar School, and is designed to qualify pupils for the University Course, or to give them a thorough elementary training in the following subjects, namely:—Arithmetic, Geography, History, English Grammar, Book-keeping, Algebra, Natural Philosophy, and the French, Latin, and Greek Languages.

Those presenting themselves for admission into this department must be 13 years of age, and able to pass an examination in reading, spelling, outlines of Geography, and Arithmetic as far as fractions.

The charges for board and tuition are the same as in the higher classes of the College. The terms and vacations are also the same.
