Jacksonville, Fla., May 4.-A devastated city, ruins everywhere, greeted the smoke enshrouded sun to-day. The fire. which broke out at noon yesterday, and was aided in the work by a southwest

The aver-age is greater in South China, and this makes one slave to every eight families. The average is greater in South China, where hearly every one owns slave. Nonius, however, refused to sell, and to gain possession of the gem Mark Antony had him proscribed and sentence of banishment pronounced against him. 

. The Man and His Men.

For many cepturies the hour glass was the popular indoor time regulator. Every church possessed one, either fastened to the pulpit, or placed upon it. In the parish accounts of St. Helen's, Abingdon, under date 1539, is a charge of four peuce "for an hour glass for the pulpit", and, in 1564, an entry occurs on the parochial records of St. Katherine's Aldgate. "Paid for an hour glass to hang by the pulpit, when the preacher doth make a sermin, that we may know kew the hour passeth away—one shilling." Similar entries are common in many places. Sometimes the pulpit hour glass was very handsomely set; the old church of St. Dunstan's, Fleet street, boasted an hour glass in a silver frame, the motal of which, when they hour glass was taken down in 1823, 2 as converted into two heads for the parish staves. Another city church had its hour glass set in a frame of heaulfully and elaborately carried oak.

An hour seems to have been formerly considered as the orthodox length of time which a sermin should last, though a famous Puritan preacher of the sevententh century was wont, when the sand hand run out its appointed course, to turn, the instrument, and jorially invite his weary listeners "to take mother glass, with him." A clergyman at Bilbury is said to have invariably preached out a second turn of the pulpit hour glass; the squirs of the parish always retreated after the text had been given cut, smok ed a meditative pipe in the churchyard, and returned in time for the benedic tien.
