COINAGE FOR AUSTRALIA,

DETAILS OF MASSACRE Shocking Atrocities Committed on Island Sensational Charge Made Against Mem-

Shocking Afrocities Committed on Island of St. Matthias.

Berlin, June 6.—The Colonial Zeitung, the official organ of the German Colonial Society, fürnishes details of the massacre of the Franco-German expedition in the South Seas. It seems that the vessel which carried the expedition to the Island of St. Matthias left after a few days for Herbertshoh, New Britain, to get supplies. During its absence the savages, who had hitherto appeared friendly, although known to be rabid cannibals, planned to kill and rush the party.

The plot was carried out one morning while the members of the expedition, who had a bodyguard of forty drilled Papauns, were cleaning their rifles, which they had taken apart, Suddenly eighty of the islanders broke from the bushes, raising fierce war cries and brandishing spears, with which they stabbed to death the leader of the party. Dr. Mancker, his secretary, Herr Caro, and a white man, who was asleep under a tent. Dr. Heinroth emptied his revolver into them, while the bodyguard fied to the boats with the wounded, and Dr. Heinroth, leaving 12 dead. The boats put off to the island not far distant, where the expeditionary vessel rescued them. Subsequently the survivors returned to the island of St. Mathias, where they found that the bodies had been devoured and the camp looted. of St. Matthias.

Ferry Between Vancouver and Ladysmith Will Hereafter Be Run Daily.

Record of Five and a Half Hours Established By This Route.

N. Railway Company inaugurate an imand Izadysmith, whereby Victoria merchants will hereafter be able to receive their Eastern freight daily instead of four times a week as heretofore. that since Friday last 52 loaded cars of freight for local merchants have been received via Ladysmith. The freight consists of all kinds of merchandise and comes from nearly all points in the East. The barge Transfer, which is employed as the ferry, has a capacity for only twelve cars, and for several trips she has been transporting just this number. She is towed to and fro between the points mentioned by the tug Czar, her average time made on the voyage being three and a half hours, according to the state of the tide. The transfer of the cars from the barge to land consumes but little time, as aprons are fitted to the latter and the cars hauled ashore without delay. That the whole system is a vast improvement on the old plan of haudling freight by steamer is conceded by all. Cars leaving Vancouver by ferry have reached this city in exactly five hours and a half.
