ROUTED JAPS AND CAPTURED GUNS.

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





In fact he considers it highly im-probable that the authorities will decide upon such a step. Two important places like Halifax and Esquimalt will require regulars to maizatin their efficiency. Of course the militia at both points can render valuable assistance in cases of emergency. But it would be unwise to entrust them with the whole defence. In the course of the 'conversation Lieut.-Col. English mentioned the fact that the many fortifications which guard-ed the shores of the Oid Country were provided with a certain stipulated force, which was a permanent fixture. This policy, he believed, would not be depart-ed from in the Imperial defences of the Dominion.

Dominion. Outside the reduction of the expense, what the authorities were seeking, he explaned, was concentration. At present there were many unimportant stations where small forces were unnecessarily maintained. These, he thought would be recalled. Thus large forces might be located at different central points from where they could be sent at a minute's notice to any part of the world in denotice to any part of the world in de-fence of British interests. Under such an arrangement the men would have the advantage of more thorough instruction advantage of more thorough instruction in modern military factics than was now possible. Therefore, besides concentra-tion, a great improvement in the general organization of the agmies would be ob-tained.

Regarding the intention of the authori-ties with respect to the Esquinalt naval strength. Lieut.-Col. English could say nothing of an official character. How-ever, he thought it not unlikely that a strong flying squadron would be estab-lished on the Pacific. In this case its headquarters would, no doubt, be on the China coast. Under these coulditions, however, the local station would have to be kept in its present state of efficiency. SYNOPSIS OF REGULATIONS FOR DIS-POSAL OF MINERALS ON DOMINION LANDS IN MANITOBA, THE NORTH-WEST TERRITORIES AND THE YUKON TERRITORY. Coal-Coal lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal and \$20 for authra-cite. Nor more than 320 acres can be ac-quired by one individual or company. Royalty at the rate of ten cents per son of 2,000 pounds shall be collected on the gross output.

Output. Quartz.-Persons of eighteen years and over and joint stock companies holding free miners' certificates may obtain entry for a mining location. A free miner's sortificate is granted for

one or more years, not exceeding five, upon payment in advance of \$7.50 per annum for an individual, and from \$50 to \$100 per an-

an individual, and from 550 to 5100 per an-num for a company, according to capital. A free miner, having discovered mineral in place, may locate a claim 1,500x1,500 feet by marking out the same with two legal posts, bearing location notices, one at each end on the line of the lode or vein. The claim shall be recorded within fifteen days if located within ten miles of a min-ing recorder's office, one additional day al-lowed for every additional ten miles or fraction. The fee for recording a claim is \$5.

At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining re-corder in lieu thereof. When \$500 has been expended or paid. the locator may, upon having a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$1.00 an acre. Permission may be granted by the Minis-ter of the interior to locate claims contain-ing iron and mica, also copper, in the Yn-kon Territory, of an area not exceeding 160 acres.
