



Accepting the axiom that the best way to preserve peace is to be prepared for war, our two 12-inch guns are the mightiest pacificators ever seen on land or sea. They are the latest result of science, the final product of civilisation. The mechanism that moves them as if they were featherweights is as simple in action as it is intricate in design. The crew that control these monsters are seven in number, the officer in com-mand completing the octave. Four work in the depths below, where walls and roof present to view a mase of levers directing various parts of the machinery. Three stand by the offi-cer on the upper deck, who, with head and shoulders hidden in a sort of fun-nel, his hands on two levers not bigger, than the butt of a horse-pistol, lays the gen.
