





Crimean Veteran and Recluse.

The funeral took place at Hongsong recently of 'Charles' James Bry-sut, a Crimean veteran, who was found dead in his home in the out-of-the-way willage of Tai-koktsul. Through the pectuded life which he lived, removed from all intercourse with his European fellowmen, and owing to the ecentrici-ties which marked the habit of the re-cluse, his presence near Hongkong ties which marked the habit of the re-cluse, his presence near Hongkong Was not generally known. He dwelt in a squalid hovel in a remote corner of the village. Bryant, who was 73 years of age, joined in Coldstreams in 1857. If the age of 18. He was econoted to sergeant and obtained his discharge af-ter five years' service. He fought in the Crimean war and was awarded the Crimean medal with the Information Crimean medal, with the Inkerman Balaclava and two other bars. He wa Balaciava and two other bars. He was also awarded the Crimean-Turkish medal. After serving for a time in they London Metropolitan Police he left, bearing a good character, and made his way to China. In 1864 he gnisted on the Shanghai police force. The new hospital was opened at Van Anda June 4th by the Bishop of Columbia, and has since been well (onducted by a very competent staff, consisting of John H. MacDermott, M. D. C. M. of McGUI Mas Beattle head C, M. of McGill; Miss Beattle, head nurse, and Miss E. Franklin, assistant. A number of very serious cases have been treated there, and I am glad to say, successfully. The Marble Bay mine, owned by the Tacoma Steel Com-pany, who provided the building. Is still working, and its men contribute monthly to its support. Other mines are opening up in spite of the aufil times, and I look forward to a period of great usefulnes for this hospital. urse, and Miss E. 
