The petition filed by the United States Company asking a temporary injunction restraining affiliations of the Bell company from alleged attempts to in-duce the independent companies to violate their existing 99 year contracts for long distance service, was refu Judge Taylor of the United

The Bell companies named in the petition were the American Telephone Company and the Central Union Telephone Company. The defendants were charged in the petition with operating a trust in the restraint of trade. That the decision given by Judge Taylor sounds the death knell of the independent companies is the configuration of a Con-

sounds the death knell of the independent companies is the opinion of a Central Union official, who said:

"The independents have brought about their own destruction. There is not the least doubt in our minds that the end of the telephone competition is in aight. They brought this suit in a last attempt to save themselves. As every telephone man knows, it is the one distance hundress that keeps the long distance business that keeps independents alive."







JAPAN SEEKS TO

IMPROVE FRUIT
STION OF PESTS
RECEIVES ATTENTION QUESTION OF PESTS

Government and All Interested
Actively Engaged in Remedial Measures.

Japan is taking hold of the question of parasites as they affect the fruit industry. According to W. T. R. Prestion, the Canadian Trade Commissioner, the subject is receiving the greatest attention at present. He says in a report to the department:
This office has lately been in communication with the department of agriculture in regard to the serious disadvantages under which Japan is carrying on the export of citrus fruit. Japan is the paradise for all kinds of parasites, and enormous sisms of money as the result of the most enrefin set. as the result of the most careful sci-entific researches, have been expended in destroying the silk pests. This is particularly the case in respect to the parasites that affect the silk and rice culture, but in regard to the cultivation

in the Prefecture of Wakayama 2-200,000 people are dependent upon the annual orange crop. The ravages that have been made in this particular dis-trict by the parasites is most lament-able, entailing an incalculable loss not only directly to the people engaged in orange cultivation, but indirectly upon

His excellency, the governor of this prefecture in a recent communication o Mr. T. Nosse (formerly consul-general at Ottawa), expressed his concern about the future of the orange content about the future of the orange cultivation in that district. The authorities at one time were seriously considering the advisability of destroying the present orchards and replanting with specially selected trees. But careful inquiry led to the conclusion that this course was always to prove the conclusion. that this course was almost impossi-ble, in view of the length of time that must elapse before the new trees would-bear fruit, and the severe straits, in the meantime, to which the large pop-ulation now dependent upon the annual crop of fruit would be exposed.

Attention was directed to this quesattention was affected to this ques-tion by a letter written by Mr. Cun-ningham, of the provincial trult inspec-tors Bureau, Vancouver. In this letter, in discussing the importation of Japan-ese oranges via British Columbia, Mr. Cunningham says:

"It costs no more for freight and healthy, that will sell readily at an advance of twenty-five to fifty percent, on the prices obtained this year and last for the inferior goods that we have been receiving. There is neither

have been receiving. There is neither pleasure nor profit in dealing in infect-ed fruit of any class or variety."

The advantages that have accrued to fruit growers in different parts of Can-

ada from a systematic destruction of and from a systematic destruction of fruit parasites have been pointed out to those who are taking a special in-terest in this question. There can be no doubt but that the increase in value in the Japanese oranges for export alone in two or three years would reimburse the perfectures or central rovernments for all the expenditure that would be necessary to enter upon a determined campaign to rid Japan of these parasites, and thus insure the cultivation of the clean and high-class oranges that can be easily cultivated in this country. The citrus fruit of Japan can be placed in the market of the west at a time when it will have no competitors, the oranges from all other citrus growing countries not being then available for the market.

One of the difficulties, however, of fuminating the orchards here is that they are not laid out with the regularity and care that is such a marked characteristic of citrus culture in western countries. 


