To the province he was deeply attached, and he took as much interest in its affairs as he would in his own private concerns. This being known, other canneries naturally increased their preparations, and the result would have been an increase of from 25 per cent. to 26 per cent, in the boats operated on the Skeena, and the same conditions would also have existed on Rivers Inlet.

I am not sure these facts were known by the Dominion authorities, but, anyway,
