

STATISTICS OF 1910 ISSUED BY THE CHIEF

Work of Force Increases With Growth of City-Recommendations for Year

The annual report for the year ending December 31, 1919, on the police force of the city of Victoria, was issued this morning by Chief of Police John M. Langley, and contains the records of 1919 for police court records: Convictions, 1248; sent for trial, 7; discharged, 1004; making a total number of 'police court cases for the year of 2359 against whites. For indians there were 95 convictions out of 111 cases, the grand total for all cases being 1483 convictions out of 2525 cases, being as compared with the previous year an increase of nearly 709. The total amount of property stolen, however, is less than in the year before. Bogus cheque values amounted to \$765.75 as against \$2,589 the year before. AKING BAD BOYS INTO MODEL REPUBLIC

THE George Junior Movement, Where Lads and Lasses Govern Themselves and Turn Out Good Citizens, Now Flourishes in Six States and Is to Spread Abroad



WILLIAM R. GEORGE

N a little humlet up in New York State a man with big brain, big sympathies and bigger faith in his kind was attracted by an idea some years ago and proposed a novel application of it. The hamlet was

Freeville, the man was William R. George, the idea was democracy and the application was the George Junior Republic, a home and school for boys and girls whom society, in its recklessness, was shaping for bad ends. To-day the outgrowth of his faith and labor is flourishing in six States. It will shortly be started In other States. It is about to be transplanted to Eng land. And a commission from Japan is arranging for Its introduction into that country.

When he began the man was laughed at, railed at or stormed at, according to the degree of cynicism and crabbedness prevailing among those who opposed him. He had no means. He had no backers. He had only the temporary use of one little cottage. He was classed as a fanatic, a dreamer or worse. It was predicted that the only noteworthy result of his experiment would be the catastrophe that closed it. And with that he was set aside.

Working quietly and unobtrusively, without thought of advantage to himself or the establishment of any crackbrain theory, simply seeking a way to help chilaren who needed help, he comes now to public attention as the founder of a scheme that is taking root around the world as an instrument for good citizen-

At the present time the idea, the man's application of it, has proved itself. It is no longer in the stage of trial. It has become not only of national but of international importance as a finished fact. After nearly sixteen years of operation it has become the most vital, helpful and significant development in the juvenile problem because it has done what other remedies have failed to do-it has brought results. It is drawing approval and support of sociologists everywhere. It is being written about in every language. It is alive and spreading.

Meanwhile it is of the utmost interest not only to the specialist but to the general observer, who has probably known hothing of it defould the name.

The word "republic" is too frequently misused to give any adequate notion of what really goes at Freeville, and at the six other places where these miniature commonwealths exist. And yet each is just exactly what the term signifies, "a State in which the sovereignty resides in the people and the administration is lodged in officers elected by and representing

And who are "the people?"

They are the boys and girls who make up the population, those who, in more familiar communities of the disciplinary type, are known as "inmates." But ould be to libel them, as well as to misstate the fact, Here they are "citizens,"

This was Mr. George's application of the ideas-Take youngsters who can't be managed and set them to managing each other, or, perhaps more exactly, to

"I feel guilty when I consider the share that has been put upon me in the worldwide attention paid to the Junior Rapublic," Mr. George told a reporter for It is no invention. It is a universal truth It is democracy, that's all, working itself out among

This comes well from Mr. George. But no visitor to the Republic, where he is known and loved as "Daddy." can fall to recognize the debt it owes him. His was the sympathy, the faith and the enthusiasm that made the application of that old idea possible and practicable and the Junior Republic, finally, a definite aid in the progress of human welfare.

It was tried out in several parts of the country, notably in Chicago. For the most part it was a failure.

Given responsibility, they met it. And in so meeting, though this is the ulti-mate academic view, they wrought their cwn salvation, their own rehabilitation as useful members of

When friends remonstrated he held firm. "They're normal human beings," he said, "just like a colony of men and women gathered at random and marcomed on an island. Give them a chance. Let'em alone and see what comes of it."



There is no one to laugh with him and tell him what a devil of a fellow he is. The sentiment of these boys and girls is firmly against him. They are his own kind and they do not approve of him, and he feels it. He usually decides that it is a good deal better to fail in line, take his part, work, earn money and be respectable. After three months' residence, unless the time is extended for a felony, he becomes a full citizen, and when he begins to sense his responsibility he is apt to be a good citizen. The records of the Republic show that the great majority of offenders are newcomers who have not yet adjusted themselves.

He can seek another cottage.

The Republic extends the same treatment to girls as to boys, with some obvious mitigations. They have their own cottages and their own work, usually in the laundry or about the houses. They have full equal suffrage and are eligible for all offices and duties. There is a girl's jail, which is only a plainly furnished cottage and is frequently without occupants. Girls attend the school and enjoy every privilege. There is no segregation. They must earn their livelihood on the same footing with the boys.

Enacting Their Own Laws

The Republic draws its authority from a legislature of the whole, which meets once a month. Every citizen sixteen years of age or more has a vote, though none of the adults or helpers is admitted to the suffrage. The legislature, an example of pure democracy, enacts all laws for the government of the community. It is decreed that on points not covered by the code of the Republic the laws of the State of New York are to operate.

The Republic has none of the characteristics of the reform school. It does not alm, in Mr. George's phrase, to "make them be good," but to "give them a chance to be good." At present many of its citizens are sant by well to do parents, who pay the association for the privilege, so thoroughly is the value of the republican training recognized. Beyond this "tuition" the Republic has no resources except voluntary contributions.

It is always a pleasure to meet in after years friends with whom one has endured hardships and dangers, and surrounded by comforts and with a sense of well-being and physical enjoyment to recall old times and the trials and tribulations passed through together.

Such a meeting will take place on Friday night, at the home of A. J. Brace, where seventeen of those who were members of the Second Canadian Mounted Rifies, which fought through the Boer war, will assemble. This contingent took part in the battle of Hart's river, where the Boers made their last great stand.

Twenty-five thousand strong, the Boers under Generals Doet, Delarcy, Totgleter, Kemp, and Steyne, attacked the forces of the British, 1800 in number, among them 600 Canadians, under Colonel Cookson. It was here that Lieut, Bruce Carruthers made his famous rear-guard stand with forty men, holding off the Boers undit the main body was able to get into action. Of these 40 men, all were killed, wounded or captured with the exception of four, one of whom was Mr. Brace, who fought their way into Klerksdorp, the base of the British forces.

Of the Canadians who took an important part in this battle, the following have since died: Col. Evans, Winnipeg, Adjutant Church, Regina; Capt. Snyder and Major Bruce Carruthers.


