# **WILSON TALKS ABOUT** LABOR DEPARTMENT

Member of United States Cabinet is Visiting Brit-Ish Columbia

## WAGE EARNERS WELFARE IS GOVERNMENT OBJECT

Commissioners Now Gathering Information Have Three Years' Task

## **OFFICE TOO YOUNG TO** FORECAST ITS RESULTS

Vancouver, Nov. 8 .- On his way Seattle to attend the convention of the American Federation of Labor, W. B. Wilson, head of the United States de partment of labor, created last March te in Vancouver and will remain here until Sunday morning. He made slight detour on his journey to consult with the local United States immigra tion officials, who now come under the control of his department.

In the United States, Mr. Wilson said, there is no law such as the Lemieux Act, and no provision is made for compulsory arbitration, but there is a measure, known as the Newlands Clayton Act, which provides for medi-ation, or, if it falls, voluntary arbitra-This act, however, only applie to the railway services.

"At the last session of congress," added Mr. Wilson, "a committee, known as the committee on industrial relations, was appointed to enquire into and report to congress on the various measures that are in force in other measures that are in force in other countries to provide for the compulsory settlement of labor disputes. It will, in all probability, take three years for the committee to complete the work. Until that time we have no way of compelling the arbitration of labor disputes such as, I understand, Canada has under its act."

The department of labor, he said, was created last March by congress to promote the welfare of wage-earners. He added: "It was felt that there should be some one of cabinet rank and in the councils of the president, and in the councils of the president, who is familiar with the aspirations of labor. That is the prime reason for the creation of the department and the post of secretary of labor. 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

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## PEOPLE'S ELEVATOR IS BUILT AT LAKES

Boats is 75,000 Bushels Per Hour

Cominion government terminal elevaor here is now ready and under operation, and it is taking care of a big proportion of Western Canada's two hundred-million bushel wheat crop. It is the result of a long agitation by Western farmers who wanted the guarantee of the government behind the ntee of the government behind the marketing of their grain at the head f the lakes. The people's elevator, as is known locally, will be the standard or many years to come. It is absoutely the last word in elevator con truction, is the biggest individual elevator in the world, and brings Port Arthur's elevator capacity up to 15,-350,000 bushels. There is also a big capacity at the sister city of Fort Wil-

Description of Elevator. The elevator is of re-inforced con-

rete. construction throughout. lutely no inflammable material is intely no inflammable material is in-cluded in either building or machinery. The elevator is operated by electric power, a separate motor being installed for each machine. Twenty cars can be for each machine. Twenty cars can be unloaded simulfaneously, the unloading capacity of the house being forty cars per hour. An interlocking device connecting the valves of the car hoppers prevents any possibility of the mixing of the contents of one car with another. The normal loading capacity to boats is about 75,000 bushels per hour, but for the first hour this can be increased to 115,000 bushels. The working house to 115,000 bushels. The working house towers to a height of 185 feet above water lever. It contains seventy-five circular bins of about 7,000 bushels apacity each, fifty-six interspace bins f 3,000 bushels, and thirty-six outer space bins of 1,570 bushels each. Its total capacity is about 750,000 bushels. Three and a Quarter Million Bushels.

The storage house has seventy circular bins, each twepty-four feet in dia-meter and ninety feet in height, of 30, 600 bushels capacity, together with fifty-four inter-spaces of about 8,000 bushels each, giving a total capacity of ,500,000 bushels. Thus the total capacity of the elevator is 3,250,000 bushels In designing the elevator especial provision was made for a large number of bins of small capacity for storing small allowance for any court or chamber this of grain that may require separate this place. ## JUDGMENT RESERVED IN CLEMENT CHARGE

Normal Loading Capacity to Evidence Concluded With Supreme Court Judges Testifying in Exchequer Court

Vancouver, B. C., Nov. 8.—Mr. Jus-tice Cassels, of the exchequer court, reserved judgment in the action brought against Mr. Justice Clement to

and the defence.

Mr. Justice Clement was the principal witness examined during the second day's proceedings. He testified that he was not guilty of misrepresentation, and that he honestly believed his place of residence to have been Grand Forks, almost all the time in question. He alleged that the attack made upon him had been made under the shield of legislation allegedly in the public interests, which he did not believe

believe. The defendant was also questioned as to his resignation from the as to his resignation from the office he had held as legal adviser in the Yukon, stating that it was correct that a charge of stealing \$90 had been made against him there, which had been brought about by his own careless book-keeping in that he had transposed figures of \$670 into \$760.

In introducing some natters which in introducing some natters which Mr. Justice Cassels considered did not relate to the question of law, Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper, for the de-fence, stated that in a charge of this character many matters became relevant, and, further, that the crown was absolutely sheltering those who were urging on the prosecution.

Mr. Justice Cassels again held, that
the question was whether Mr. Justice
Clement was entitled to charge Grand
Forks as his place of residence.
Chief Justice Hunter and Mr. Jus-

tice Morrison both gave evidence to-day, being invited to a seat on the day, being invited to a seat on the bench while giving their testimony. Chief Justice Hunter testified to the matter of travelling allowances, and both referred to Mr. Justice Clement's unsettled state in regard to his place of residence. Among other witnesses were D. G. Marshall, G. H. McCrossan, J. H. Senkler, K. C., and H. J. Puncan, F. S. Maclean, K. C., for the crown-contended that the evid.nce showed beyond the shadow of a doubt that the defendant's place of residence was at Vancouver, and that he was therefore in out entitled to receive any travelling. fendant had secured the amount wrongfully, and that the crown was entitled to its return, the certificates as to the place of residence not being true and the money having been obtained by false representations

tained by false representations.

For the defendant, the arguments were presented by E. P. Davis, K. C., who held that the defendant's domicile was clearly at Grand Forks, and that it was not changed, because to make a change of domicile there must be intention, which intention had not existed until after the court of appeals act. He further asked that the judge should deal with the allegation of fraud, as it was highly desirable that a pronouncement on that point should be made, in the public interest.





The point is that as we approach more nearly to a full use of its possibilities, through cars getting cheaper and tires getting cheaper and the price of fuel greater than the whole of the successive rises it has already suffered, but with a dearth of fuel at any price. It needs no prophet to see that were private cars to be run as many hours a day, and as many days a year, as the average commercial vehicle, a fuel famine would follow. The only way to avoid such a conclusion is to assume that the rise in the price of petrol is due solely to the machinations of the trusts. 

## IS STILL UNBEATEN

a century is a decided rarity. Yet it was just twenty-five years ago to-day, Noyember S, 1888, that P. Cannon hung up a professional running record that still holds its place in the dope books. Cannon's memorable feat was performed at Glasgow, Scotland, where he ran four miles in nineteen minutes and twenty-five and two-fifths seconds, making new records for all distances over two miles. Cannon covered the three miles in fourteen minutes and nineteen and a half seconds. At the three and a half mile mark his time was seventeen minutes and two and one-fifth seconds.

It remained for an amateur, A. Shrubb, the English runner, to beat the professional record. In 1904 Shrubb covered four miles in nineteen minutes and twenty-three and two-fifths seconds, beating Cannon's time by two seconds. It is noteworthy that this feat was also performed in Glasgow. Shrubb's time for three and a half miles was sixteen minutes and fifty-seven and two-fifths seconds.

Another professional record that has withstood the assaults of half a century is that for the twelve-mile disfance, covered in one hour, two minutes and two and a half seconds in England in 1863 by L. Bennett, better known as "Deerfoot." S. Thomas, an English amateur, did the dozen miles in one hour, two minutes seconds in 1892.

## BOWSERISM IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

The name "Bowser" is all but an household word in British Columbia. Since the year 1907, in which year the wearer of the name succeeded in foreing his way into the arena of provincial politics, it has been spelled in larger capitals each year until it requires to-day the largest letters of any name in the category of provincial Conservative notables. The name and the man who wears it are striking modern examples of the manner in which "tall oaks from little acounts grow." The word and the-motoriety attaching to it are illustrative of the results that may be achieved by personal ambition, dogged persistency, undaunted, self-centred fearlessness and not too much scruple, when political chaos in a new country furnish the time, the place and the man. Without the accidents of circumstance and the peculiar ability to seize upon them the cembinations resulting from these in the political history of British Columbia would never have resulted in the conditions which obtain nor in the political pre-eminence which the name "Bowser" represents.

It is a far cry back to the year 192, when the little city of Vancouver, then a prosperous and promising town of some 20,000 inhabitants, welcomed to its professional circles a budding Nova Scotian lawyer, graduate of Dalhouste University and potential dictator of the inchoate Conservative party of the province. 



## TO-DAY IN CANADIAN HISTORY

It was on November 8, 1775, tha enedict Arnold with his half-starved roops arrived at Levis to co-opera with General Montgomery in an attack on Quebec. His little army had had a strenuous six weeks' march through the wilderness—up the Kennebec and its tributary, the Dead river, thence down the St. Lawrence, a little above Point Levis. The hardships suffered had been so great that about a third of the invading force had turned back long before their destination was in sight. The rest, except those who fell by the wayside, had pressed forward, though lack of competent guides, floods on the Dead river, and shortage of provisions had rendered the journey terrible. To aght off starvation the men had eaten their dogs, their mocassias, their shot-pouches, and, when at last the few hundreds who had struggled through paraded near Point Levis, they made a pitiable spectacle—so gaint were they with untrimmed hair and beards. with General Montgomery in an atparaded near Point Levis, they made a pitiable spectacle—so gaunt were they with untrimmed hair and beards, clothes hanging in tatters on their emaciated forms; hats lost; shoes gone! Yet as soon as he could obtain means to cross the tey river. Arnold—daring almost to impudence—again paraded this feeble force before the walls of Quebec.

The "Trent affair," which was largely responsible for the abrogation by the United States of its reciprocity freaty with Canada, and which doubless hastened Canadian confederation, and its beginning fifty-two years ago to-day, when Mason and Slidell, Confederate commissioners, were taken from the British steamer Trent, en route from Havana to England, by Capt. Wilkes, of the United States war steamer San Jacinto. This action was slitterly resented by Britain, and for a time a declaration of war seemed imminent. Secretary Seward, however, perceiving that the act was unwarranted, released the prisoners, who sailed for England the first of the following year. The Trent affair resulted sailed for England the first of the following year. The Trent affair resulted in adding fuel to the flames of the intense anti-British sentiment which then prevatited in the United States, based on the supposed sympathy of Canada and England with the Confederate cause. This spirit made the abrogation of the reciprocity treaty inevitable, even though it was a case of "cutting off the nose to spite the face." As premier of the cabinet he has been a leader in the great movements that have made Brazil one of the most prosperous countries on the map and Rio de Janeiro one of the

world's magnificent capitals.

Dr. Mueller is a handsom Dr. Mueller is a handsome man, of the intellectual type, and speaks Ger-man, French and, with lesser facility, English, as well as the Portuguese of his native land. He has a vivid sense of humor, and his witty sallies have often convulsed all Brazil with laugh-ter. He is a man of remarkable en-ergy, and at one time he was not only the Brazilian minister of public works, but also the head of the postal depart-ment, and in addition an active office-ment and in addition an active officement, and in addition an active officer in the army, and in his intervals of leisure practiced his profession of civil engineer.

## **COMOX EXTENSION OPENS NEXT SUMMER**

Esquimalt & Nanaimo Railway Officials Optimistic: Steel Bridges Being Installed

As soon as the bridge work is finished on the Little Qualicum river, carrying the extension of the Esquimait &
Nanaimo railway into the Comox valley, which will be about Tuesday next,
the bridge gang will move to Cowichan
Lake to instal a steel bridge. This
structure is replacing the trestle about
a mile east of the depot, which is the
terminus of the branch line. The steel
has been ready at the site for some terminus of the branch line. The steel has been ready at the site for some time, but as considerable work had to be done in the Cowichan river preparing the abutments, it is only now possible to complete the undertaking.

When the Little Qualicum river

When the Little Qualicum river bridge is finished, the track layers will have another eight miles of grade to the Big Qualicum river available for steel, and this will be laid while the bridge men are at Cowichan Lake, whence they will return to construct the new bridge over the Big Qualicum. Should there be no delay in the arrival of material officials of the railway company look for the opening of the Comox extension by July 1 next. The grade is well advanced and while the bridges across the rivers are considerable undertakings there should be trains running into that fertile district from Victoria by next summer, opening to the southern end of the island one of the richest agricultural areas awaiting for a quarter of a century for rail transportation.

The Arbutus canyon has yet to be crossed by a steel treatle in connection with the policy of changing the bridges to steel structures, but passengers over the Malahat for some time have had an opportunity of observing the preparations which are being made to meet the situation, and this will be one of the earliest works to be undertaken. The steel on the main line to Wellington has been gradually altered to heavier metal. 65-lb. steel now being lafd over the 89-mile stretch.

The funds received from this sale will be largely used for the further development of tised for the further development of Fort Fraser and its immediate vicinity, in which lands are owned by the owners of the original townsite of Fort Fraser.
