Pasadena, Cal., April 4.-Frederick W. Weyerhaeuser, the multi-millionaire Minnesota lumberman, died to-day at his winter home at Oak Knoll, aged 79. Mr. Weverhaeuser was stricken ten days ago with a severe cold. Threatening symptoms developed and several times he sank to the verge of death, but railied and yesterday appeared to

Frederick Weyerhaeuser, the head of the big lumber trust and reputed the wealthiest man in the United States, was born at Nieder-Saulheim, a hamlet of Southern Germany, November 21, 1834. His parents were poor and he had to make his living as a farm laborer and help to support his mother and staters while he was still a hov. His educational advantages were ex-tremely limited and did not extend beyond the most rudimentary instruction in reading, writing and arithmetic.

Together, in 1860, they bought the other men out of the business, and soon found them-selves free from debt and with enough capital to enable them to strike

with boldness and confidence.

Weyerhaeuser, who was the traveling partner, had visited Wisconsin and Minnesota and there had found enor mous tracts of land, rich in timber, that could be purchased for a few cents an acre. The firm began to buy, first in a small way, but soon on a larger scale. Additional mills were constructed, and money began to roll in. Gradually the firm extended its opera-





APPLICANTS FOR LAND **CONTINUE REQUESTS**

Recent Court Decisions Make Little Difference to Operations of Syndicates

Notwithstanding a recent decision of a judge of the supreme court of Can-ada declaring that certain tracts of land in British Columbia had been illead in British Columbia had been li-legally acquired; notwithstanding a more recent judgment by Mr. Justice Macdonald to the same effect regard-ing a specific tract of land acquired by the system that has been so long in vogue, and notwishstanding the genvogue, and notwishstanding the general consensus of public opinion that lands staked under powers of attorney given by persons who have no intention of settling on the lands acquired in their alleged behalf, the current and recent issues of the provincial Gazette continue to be filled with notices of application to purchase under the same allegedly fraudulent custom. Part of the land thus applied for is made up of a section of that "strip of land along the coast" beyond which the attorney-general stated some time ago "there is no more land for sale." One of the syndicates whose applications are advertised this month consists of 48 persons in whose behalf one other person, presumably by powers of attorney, has staked the lands and made the applications. The other block represents the staking of 52 sections and covers over 15,000 acres.
