## INFANTRY IS MOWED DOWN IN THOUSANDS

Enemy Suffers Enormous Losses in Crossing Over the River Nethe

#### GERMAN FIELD GUNS PROVED INEFFECTIVE

King Albert Remains in Antwerp; City Expects to Hold Out Against Attack

London, Oct. 8-The Telegraph's correspondent in Belgium under Tuesday's date says: "The fighting be- rendered. tween the allies and the enemy has been furious. Advancing between the forts, the German infantry were mowed down in thousands. They are however, attacking in great strength, having brought up fresh troops from Brussels in the last few days. "From all accounts the German infantry contributed little toward the progress of the enemy. Their marks-manship was poor and it was only by hurling forward successive bodies of men that they succeeded in advancing. Their big guns were admitted to be highly effective and losses among the allies are caused almost exclusively by shrapnel.

"An instance of the tenacity with which the infantry stuck was reported at the Berlaere, where the commanding officer and his aide de campe were in an exposed position. Sandbags pro-tected them for some time, but at last the aide de camp was struck by shrapnel and his face was practically blown

## BEGIN TO ENLIST GERMAN ASSAULT AT TERMONDE REPULSED

Belgian Troops Prevent Crossing of Rivers Scheldt and Schoonaerde

#### DESPERATE ATTEMPT TO CROSS BRIDGE FOILED

Battle on Monday Was Duel Between Armies With Heavy War Weapons

London, Oct. 8 .- A dispatch from Ostend to the Reuter Telegram company dated Wednesday says: "The Belgian troops to-day victoriously repelled the German attempts to cross the river Scheldt at Schoonaerde, near Termonde. The enemy was forced to retire with considerable losses."

Schoonaerde began Sunday afternoon, Schoonagrde began Sunday attention, their line extending from a line east of Termonde to a point beyond Schoonaerde. It centred in a desperate attack to cross a river over a bridge which the over-confident Belgians had left standing at Schoonaerde.

"When the Germana with their heavy artillery the Belgian with their meany arthery the beginning were astonished at the accuracy with which they found the range of the Belgian trenches. Later it was found that German spies had been all through the district on previous days, mapping out the exact location of all Belgium's defences.

The town of Schoonaerde, which is on the south side of the Scheldt, was in possession of Germans. As a re-sult of the German accuracy of their shellfire, the Belgians were compelled to withdraw their advanced positions to trenches five hundred yards back. They suffered considerable losses on ount of the bad ground and marshes which they were compelled to cross under fire. Some of this ground was so swampy that the Belgians waded in water up to their

waists. "The battle lasted throughout Mon-Mainly it was a duel between field artillery and mitrailleuses. There was one position held by the Bel-gians from which they did not move, although the artillery mowed them down mercliessly. The engagement at this point finally ended in complete

## SECOND CANADIAN FORCE NEXT WEEK

Ottawa, Oct. 8.-It is expected that ecruiting for the second Canadian contingent will commence by the beginning of next week in all six military divisions. By that time the gov ernment will have been advised of th character of the troops required by Lord Kitchener.

It is understood that the appropria tion of fifty millions made by parlianent at the special session will be sufficient to raise and equip the sec ond force and that another immediate session of the parliament is not necessary. Should the war continue as it is fully anticipated, a large additional rote will have to be made by parliament at the regular war session.

To equip the second expeditionary force of twenty-two thousand men will cost about four million dollars. Rifles, uniforms and other equipment of the first force cost about six millions.

In raising the second force the min-ister of militia will not deal directly with commanders of the local corps, as he did with the first. Instead each division will be called for a certain number of men, and the officer com-manding the division area will enlist volunteers, appoint provisional officers, and carry out the preliminary training in local centres.

#### TWENTY THOUSAND TO **GET WORK IN WINTER**

Board of Control at Montreal Decides to Spend \$150,000 in Wages.

Montreal, Que., Oct. 8 .- Not only will the city of Montreal give 20,000 men employment for six weeks from No-vember 1 next, but these men will get an increase of 25 cents per day, \$2.50 per day. This will mean an added expense to the city for wages of ove \$150,000.

# **GERMANS FORCED TO** GIVE UP POSITIONS OF SOMME AND OISE

Cavalry Operations Are Developing Almost to Northern Sea Coast But Enemy is unable to Make Progress in France.

Russia Continues Strong Offensive Movement Against Common Enemy of Europe and is Striking Hard on Frontier.

Paris, Oct. 8, 3.15 p.m.—The following official announcement was made in Paris this afternoon:

"First, on our left wing, in the region of the department of Nord, the enemy has made progress at no point. At certain points he has moved back, particularly to the north of Arras, where the fighting is developing under conditions favorable for us. The operations of the opposing forces of cavalry are developing at the present time almost as far as the sea coast on the north.

Strength North of Aisne Diminished.

Between the Somme and the Oise, in the vicinity of Roye, the enemy is still in force, but we have retaken the major part of the positions we were obliged to give up.

"To the north of the Aisne the numerical strength of the German troops seems to have diminished.

"Second, on the centre, between Rheims and the Meuse, there is nothing to report. On the heights of the Meuse, between Verdun and St. Mihiel, the enemy has drawn back to the north of Hatton Chatel. He still holds St. Mihiel and some positions to the north of St. Mihiel, on the right bank of the Meuse.

"In Woevre district, the violent attacks delivered by the enemy the west of Apremont have failed.

Reassuring Accounts Come From Front.

Paris, Oct. 8.—Entirely reassuring was the general opinion to-day of the last news from the front as indicated by the war office statement. This confidence was maintained in awaiting this afternoon of the report of the gigantic battle in the north of France. As time passes the contest becomes increasingly desperate, and daring exploits are daily recorded. A recent order of the army tells of heroic deeds of the thirty-second regiment of reserves which, becoming separated from its division during a recent battle, made a march of 15 days across the lines of the enemy, finally reaching its own troops with the loss of but few men.







## REALISM AND HUMOR IN SOLDIER'S DIARY

Harold Ashton, in The London News and Leader

This is a faithful copy of the diary—written laboriously in a washing-book—of Driver—, of the 4th Ammunition Column, 3rd Section, R. F. A. Food goodrabbit and potatoes and plenty of beer, not our English sort, but the color of cyder. Us four enjoyed ourselves with the family, had a good time, and left ten o'clock next day well filled up. "People Awful Kind."

Our objective was Compeigne. We got through all right, watering our horses on the way from pumps and taps at private houses. The people were awful kind, giving us quantities of pears, and filling our water-bottles with beer. That was all right. Our welcome was splendid everywhere. At Compeigne we got into touch with the Germans. Very hot work. All our guns in action all round, and the people of the villages flocking in a panic towards Paris. It made us feel downhearted what we saw here. We marched from Compeigne about that, and the job he has in stopping it, than the actual fighting.

We marched through Ralentir and Pierreponds. Food on the way—apples and water. Now we make our way through the woods towards the ferry. No dead horses, thank God, to-day. 


