ALLIES ABOUT TO LAUNCH COUNTER-MEASURES IN FRANCE

BRITISH AND FRENCH CONTINUE TO TAKE GREAT TOLL OF ENEMY ON FRONT SOUTH OF THE SOMME

Allied Forces Fighting Stubbornly Against German Thrust on That Part of Battleline; Germans Forced to Weaken Other Sections of Western Front

London, March 26.—Field-Marshal Haig reports: "The fighting died down during the night. Our troops established themselves in new positions east of Roye and Albert. "North of the Somme a continuance of fighting is expected, but it has not yet developed. Attacks are reported to be developing this morning south of the Somme against our troops and those of the French in the neighborhood of Roye and Chaulnes. "The enemy's losses continue to be severe. He has been obliged to reinforce his battlefront from all parts of the Western theatre. Over seventy hostile divisions (in the neighborhood of 840,000 men) are known to have been engaged in the battle."

Paris, March 26.—The War Office here reports:

"The battle continues with violence. During last evening and in the night the enemy multiplied his attacks on the whole front between Noyon and Chaulnes. The French artillery, well established in the region of Noyon and supported effectively by our infantry, is retarding the German thrust. Fierce counter-attacks have been made and heavy losses inflicted on the enemy. "Noyon was evacuated during the night in perfect order. French troops are holding the left bank of the Oise firmly."

Little Change. British Headquarters in France, March 26.—(By the Associated Press.)—During the night there was comparatively little change in the line. No heavy attack this morning had been reported up to 10 o'clock. British troops still were holding the enemy strongly about half-way between Comblis and Albert. Farther north some gains were achieved by the assaulting troops. The British during the night fell back somewhat from the line through Evillers and Sapignies in order to straighten the front, which bulged inward just to the south.

Terrible Toll. London, March 26.—Extracting the heaviest toll for every foot of ground, the British line continues to withdraw slowly before the pressure of the German masses, Reuter's correspondent at British headquarters wires. Over a large part of the battle zone the retirement is being made voluntarily so as to maintain an unbroken front. Prisoners say the advance of the Germans is behind their schedule. Mowed Down. London, March 26.—Reuter's correspondent at British Headquarters in France says that yesterday was the supreme day for the British gunners. Attacking from north of Evillers to the point of British contact with the French, the Germans were held up nearly everywhere by the ceaseless intensity of the British artillery fire. Masses of the enemy, coming in waves which again and again attempted to reach their objectives, met with the same fate as the old Guard at Waterloo. In only one sector, near Sapignies, did they succeed in bending back the British front. It was to conform the front with this indentation that the British fell back during the night, straightening the line.

PRISONERS IN PARIS INDOORS WHEN GERMAN GUNS SHELLING CITY Paris, March 26.—The prison authorities have decided not to permit the prisoners to take exercise during bombardments by the German long-range guns. Prominent persons now in the Santa Prison, however, will be allowed to promenade at their own risk. Former Premier Caillaux and Senator Humbert have availed themselves of this privilege.

MODERATE ACTIVITY ALONG ITALIAN LINE, ROME STATES TO-DAY Rome, March 26.—"Along the whole front there have been the usual artillery actions and moderate activity by our reconnoitring parties," says today's War Office report. "Six hostile aeroplanes were brought down."

GOVERNMENT ALCOHOL MONOPOLY IN FRANCE Paris, March 26.—The Chamber of Deputies to-day adopted a bill giving the Government a monopoly of the purchase and sale of industrial alcohol.

GERMANY'S AERIAL SERVICE SMOTHERED

In Great Battle British Proved Their Mastery of Air

British Army Headquarters in France, March 26.—(By the Associated Press.)—Bapaume has been turned into an inferno by squadrons of British aviators. Their bombs have torn to pieces whatever was left of the place. The work of the British airmen since the beginning of the battle has been one of the brightest spots. Brilliant battles have been fought by scores of aviators and the service has proved fully its ability to smother the German airmen at critical times.

Infantry Fighting. The fighting yesterday continued with more or less intensity along the whole line. The Germans pushed hard in the region of Fonches, Chaulnes, Estrees, Dompierre, Marcourt, Miraumont, Achiel-le-Grand, Sapignies and Evillers. Heavy fighting occurred about Greveliers and a desperate conflict was waged in the vicinity of Nesle, which the Germans now hold. The enemy also advanced strongly in the direction of Noyon, but met with strenuous resistance which appeared to stem the advance. Further massing of German troops was reported at Percines and north of Bapaume, both of which the enemy holds.

BRITISH URGED TO USE UTMOST ENERGY

Newspapers Call on Civilians to Make Sacrifices and Squander Nothing

London, March 26.—The newspapers here call upon the civilians of the nation to accept still more privations and make greater sacrifices in these fateful days. The Daily Telegraph says: "We hope that the history of the last few days has had its due effect on that section of our people at home, which hitherto has seemed unable to realize the perilous exigencies of the situation. This is no time to talk of individual rights or to make much of grievances which affect this or that part of the nation's industries. Our country, in the very crisis of its fate, calls upon every one of us to submit to any and every sacrifice to secure its present safety and its future welfare." The Graphic says thousands of civilians, comfortably sheltered at home, are doing nothing to help win the war. It adds: "Many of those are selfishly squandering the output of war work. Clearly it is the duty of those who can not fight to give all their available energy to any kind of work that helps to win the war and to save every penny they can and put it into war loans."

GERMANS RELEASE SWEDISH VESSEL Stockholm, March 26.—It is reported that the Germans have released the Swedish steamship Princess Ingeborg.

BRITISH CABINET MOVES QUICKLY TO RECRUIT MEN FOR RANKS OF THE ARMY

London, March 26.—To fill the gaps caused by the German attack in France, the authorities have decided to place the recruiting machinery in motion again throughout the country. In order to assist the Government the miners have placed the organization of their unions at the disposal of the recruiting officers. "To provide for all contingencies," says The Daily Mail, "it has been decided to speed up the recruiting machinery, and the men already scheduled for calling up will be summoned to the colors more quickly than was intended. The Government will take firm measures." The Mail says the ex-servicemen in France have proved to be a great stimulus for voluntary recruiting for home service among discharged soldiers and men up to the age of fifty.

GERMANS EXPECTED LESS RESISTANCE LONG-RANGE GUNS CAME FROM AUSTRIA

Vienna Dispatch Says Pieces Shelling Paris Made at Skoda Works

Geneva, March 26.—Via London, March 26.—The long range guns bombarding Paris, according to a Vienna dispatch received here, are of Austrian manufacture, having been built at the Skoda factory. The gun itself is not new, but its novelty comes from a new type of shell and the explosive gasses used in the gun. There are said to be only two or three of the guns. A Surprise. London, March 26.—In the "mystery gun," the name generally given to the weapon with which the Germans are bombarding Paris from a distance estimated at seventy-five miles, it is frankly conceded by experts here that the enemy has sprung one of the greatest surprises of the war. General Sir Desmond O'Callaghan, formerly president of the Army Ordnance Commission, says of the German gun: "The projectiles must have been fired from longer and heavier guns and with a more powerful propellant than we have any knowledge of." Second Charge. From Paris has come the suggestion that the extraordinary range of the guns is due to the projectiles being provided with a second charge which explodes when the first stage of the flight is completed, giving them a fresh impetus. This theory is scouted by General O'Callaghan, as is also the variant of it, that the projectile is fitted with a propeller which enables it to continue its journey when it is no longer driven by the projecting force from the gun. "It would seem," says General O'Callaghan, "that a new departure in ballistics can alone explain the enormous range, which is three times that of anything heretofore accepted."

AMERICAN CASUALTIES

Washington, March 26.—An official statement of the War Department's reasons for announcing only the names of American soldiers killed or wounded in France was submitted to the Senate to-day by Major-General March, Acting Chief of Staff, with a statement that the Department considers it of best advantage from all points of view.

BRITISH AVIATORS SCATTER DEATH AMONG ENEMY TROOPS

British Headquarters in France, March 26.—(By the Associated Press.)—Last night British airmen took heavy toll of the German infantry in Bapaume.

London, March 26.—A dispatch from Reuter's correspondent at British Headquarters in France dated Monday says that British airmen on the night before made veritable pandemonium in every centre of concentration of traffic behind the German front. Tens of thousands of rounds were fired point blank into enemy formations. The airmen have been fulfilling effectively their role as the eyes of the artillery.

POWERFUL MOVE BY THE ALLIED FORCES TO COUNTER BIG EFFORT OF THE ENEMY IS FORESHADOWED

British, French and Americans Fighting Side by Side Now

London, March 26.—The War Office announced to-night that German troops took Roye at 1.30 o'clock this morning. The enemy has been checked west of Roye and Noyon, the announcement adds. In the Roye area British, French and American troops are fighting shoulder to shoulder, the official announcement states. French reinforcements are rapidly coming up.

British Bagged 130 Planes in Five Days Fighting in France

British Headquarters in France, March 26.—(By the Associated Press.)—No official figures are at hand, but from compilations made personally the writer is convinced that at least 130 German aeroplanes have been brought down in the last five days.

Associated Press Correspondent Hints at Important Events Within Next Few Hours; Correspondent With French Says Counter-Measures Prepared

British Headquarters in France, March 26.—(By the Associated Press.)—There is reason to believe important events will be recorded within the next few hours which may lead to a betterment of the position of the armies which are stemming the German onslaught.

London, March 26.—A dispatch from French Headquarters to-day says that the news of the great battle should be read with entire calm and unshaken confidence, and that although the Allied front was compelled to recoil under the hammer blows of von Hindenburg—a move that was fully foreseen by the Allied Staffs—counter-measures prepared in advance will take effect at the right moment.

ABSOLUTE CONFIDENCE IN FRENCH RANKS FORCES OF ALLIES WILL BE VICTORS

On the French Front in France, March 25.—Via London, March 26.—Entire confidence reigns on the French front that the Germans' last trump in the world battle will be over-trumped when the proper moment comes. The Allied military authorities were fully cognizant that the enemy's supreme effort would cause a retreat until measures could be taken to check the irruption into the Allied positions.

BALANCE QUICKLY SWINGING IN WEST

Every Hour Cuts Down Advantage Germans Had in Attacking

London, March 26.—A dispatch from French Headquarters to-day says that these first days of the great battle presumably mark the high water level of the German advance. The enemy still enjoys the advantage of the offensive and is able to select the point where the blow is to be aimed, while the Allies are obliged to disperse their means of defence and to cover all points where a blow might fall. The advantage, as the history of this war has taught, is one that quickly passes with every hour and brings nearer the moment when the Allied armies in reserve will be ready to intervene.

Before that moment comes Hindenburg must have achieved his desired decision or be prepared to see it go against him. Hitherto with thrice the human material and means employed by the French and British armies last year, the enemy has gained proportionately less than the Allies did in a series of brilliant attacks beginning with Vimy Ridge and ending with the Malmesbury fort. All such operations result in a gain of ground exactly proportionate to the accumulation of men, material and means behind the attacking forces. As the Germans have been able to accumulate a greater force behind the front than the Allies have ever been able to achieve, their advance has been proportionately swifter and greater.

The Germans are advancing through the same territory where, through their own criminal folly, they did not find a whole roof except in the towns of Guisard and Ham, nor an inhabitant nor an ounce of food. The German advance seems to lie in two directions.

CREW SAVED WHEN U. S. SCOUT PATROL BOAT FOUNDERED

Plymouth, Mass., March 26.—A Government scout patrol boat struck a rock off the Gurnet, between Plymouth Harbor and Brant Rock, early to-day and went to the bottom three-quarters of an hour later. Life-saving crews from two stations which responded to the signals of distress took off the crew. First reports were that all were saved. Coastguardmen from Gurnet and Brant Rock had not seen the name of the vessel to their stations when they signalled that she had foundered after the crew had been taken off.

SHIP FOR ALLIES

Washington, March 26.—The transfer of the Norwegian steamship Stovring to the Shipping Board of the United States was said by the Board to-day to have been arranged through charter and not seizure as indicated in last night's dispatches from a Pacific port.

**DANISH COMMERCIAL RELATIONS AND U. S.**

London, March 25.—At a meeting of the Association of Danish Manufacturers, says an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Copenhagen, President Alexander reviewed Danish commercial relations and complained of the treatment of neutrals by belligerents. "Great Britain and the United States have made a commercial agreement in order to defend the rights of small neutral states," he said, "but up until now the effect has been to make the position of European neutrals worse. President Wilson surely desires that

neutral, and especially the Scandinavian countries, shall be kept out of the war, but if we are successful in doing so the credit will not be due to the United States."

**CONCILIATION BOARD.**

Ottawa, March 25.—The Minister of Labor has appointed Mr. Justice Eberts, of the British Columbia Court of Appeal, chairman of the board of conciliation to deal with the dispute between the Canadian Collieries (Dunsmuir), Ltd., and its machine shop employees at Union Bay, B. C. The other members of the board are Thos. Stockett and Jos. Naylor.

**COLOGNE AND METZ BOMBED BY BRITISH**

Luxemburg and Bruges Also Attacked; Airmen Fighting on Battlefield

London, March 25.—The following official report on aerial operations on the West front and raids into Germany was issued last night:

"Following a successful daylight raid on Mannheim, Baden, Germany, other objectives in Germany were attacked during the night. Half a ton of bombs was dropped on railway stations at Cologne, where a fire was started. Over a ton of bombs was distributed between the Luxembourg railway station, where a fire broke out, and the Courcelles railway station. Two tons of bombs were dropped on the Metz railway station.

"The fighting was the most severe so far experienced. In all our aeroplanes shot down forty-five enemy machines and drove down twenty-two out of control. Two other hostile machines were shot down by our infantry. Ten of our machines are missing.

"Over 1,700 bombs were dropped during the day on different targets, including the Bruges docks, the Aubrey railway station and large camps southwest of Swabia.

"Direct hits were obtained on a bridge southeast of Metz and on a stationary train, which was set on fire. A large fire also was started on this occasion. Other machines dropped a ton of bombs on the Thionville railway station, where a moving train was derailed and a fire ensued.

"After dark our bombing machines again concentrated efforts in attacks with bombs and machine-gun fire on the enemy troops opposite the battlefield. An aerodrome half way between Mons and Tournai used by hostile night-flying machines also was bombed, over fourteen tons of projectiles being dropped. All our machines returned safely.

"During Sunday many thousands of rounds of machine-gun bullets were fired by our pilots from low altitudes on enemy troops.

"The progress of the battle was reported by our aeroplanes, and our artillery was kept informed of suitable targets. Masses of hostile troops concentrated in the battle area were caught by our low-flying machines, both with bombs and machine-gun fire.

"The Admiralty announced last evening that during the offensive patrols carried out by naval machines from Dunkirk from March 21 to 24, ten enemy machines were destroyed and seven were brought down out of control. A hostile balloon was brought down in flames.

**CURRIE'S MEN NOT SHARING IN FIGHT**

Announcement From Kemp Read in Commons Yesterday by Borden

Ottawa, March 25.—Sir Robert Borden announced in the House yesterday afternoon that he had been in communication with Sir Edward Kemp by cable as to developments in the German offensive in France. Sir Edward had replied that the Canadian forces were not yet involved.

"Sir Robert also read abstracts of the official reports from Paris and London giving the progress of the operations. The Prime Minister continued: "Undoubtedly, as far as one can judge, the Germans are throwing absolutely their full forces into the attack. It seems to have been encountered with a great success as was anticipated in the first instance. There is no question at all that very much depends on the issue, and I know the hearts of the people in the Old Country will be lifted up in intercession that the right may prevail."

**Questions by Hughes.**

Sir Sam Hughes: "Intercession is very proper, but I should like to ask the following questions of the Prime Minister, which possibly he may not be in a position to answer to-day:

"First—Inasmuch as Canadians are engaged in the titanic struggle now going on for the preservation of humanity, is the Government taking the necessary steps to maintain to the highest degree the courage, the resolution, the steadfastness and the confidence of the splendid thousands of gallant soldiers of Canada, as well as of the Empire at large in this struggle?"

"Second—Has the Government taken precautions in the management of the forces, the appointment and the promotion of officers therein and the granting of honors, awards and decorations thereof that favors from female society, creed and other undue influences shall not prevail but that all shall be awarded on the one basis of merit and fitness alone?"

Here the Speaker interrupted by calling Sir Sam to order. The Speaker remarked that the questions were not of such urgency that they could not go on the order paper.

Sir Sam, however, concluded the questions. He asked if the Government had done anything to prevent panicky and sensational dispatches from a "few mentally epileptic newspaper reporters overseas." He also asked if the Government had any explanation why the Allied forces, "splendidly armed and equipped and in chosen positions of their own, made up of the best men in the world and numbering from seven to ten men per yard of front, recently gave way before an enemy not their equal in manhood, not superior in armament even though they numbered thirty men a yard of front in attack." The Government made no reply.

**Self-Inflicted Wounds.**

Mr. Casgrain asked the Minister of Militia if the Government was aware or not that certain young men of military age in the district of Toronto had inflicted wounds on themselves to avoid military service.

Sir Robert Borden in reply said that the Government had no information in regard to the matter, but that if definite statements were made there would be an inquiry.

Replying to Mr. Casgrain, the Minister of Militia stated that no definite announcement had been made by the military authorities that from 15,000 to 25,000 soldiers would be brought from Europe to Canada before June. In reply to further questions by Mr. Casgrain, the Minister said information was not available as to how many soldiers are in France and in England at the present time, the Minister adding that it was now not in the national interest to give this information.

**Pension Commission.**

Mr. Sutherland asked a series of questions in regard to the Pension Commission. He was informed that the clerical and administrative staff in Ottawa numbered 437, in district offices eighty-six, and in London, Eng., fifty-eight. The total cost per annum in salaries was: Ottawa head office \$232,114; district offices, \$59,338; London, \$62,990.

Under a rearrangement which will come into effect April 1, the staff in London will number thirty-eight, requiring a budget of \$38,000 for salaries. In 1917 some 20,000 pensions were awarded. Complaints from disability pensioners or their dependents numbered 328.

The Government informed Mr. Kay that 114 representatives had been appointed by the Minister of Agriculture to various military tribunals. Of those eighty-seven were in Ontario and twenty-nine in Saskatchewan.

Mr. Kay—How many men have been released for military service to work as agriculturalists through the efforts of those representatives?

"As representatives," was the reply, "did not report in detail the Department is unable to give this information."

None of the representatives were attending the tribunals at the present time.

**Copies Asked.**

Two motions by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the first for copies of all memoranda and petitions by Slav subjects of Austria naturalized in Canada seeking redress and the second for copies of all petitions or communications of any kind either asking for or opposing the importation of coolie labor from September 1 last, were carried.

**MORE TROOPS AND GUNS SENT TO HAIG**

Lloyd George Assures Him Britain Solidly Behind Her Heroic Army

London, March 25.—In a message to Field-Marshal Haig yesterday, Mr. Lloyd George said that the men necessary to replace those lost were either then in France or already on their way. All guns will be replaced, and still further reinforcements of men and guns are ready to enter the battle. The Prime Minister's message follows:

"The British Cabinet wishes to express to the army the nation's thanks for its splendid defence. The whole Empire is filled with pride as it watches the heroic resistance offered by its brave troops against overwhelming odds.

"Knowing their steadfastness and courage whenever the honor of their country depends on their valor, the Empire awaits with confidence the result of this struggle to defeat the enemy's last desperate effort to stop the free nations of the world.

"At home we are prepared to do all in our power to help in a true spirit of comradeship. The men necessary to replace all casualties and cannon and machine guns required to make good all those lost are either now in France or already on their way, and still further reinforcements of men and guns are ready to be thrown into the battle."

**Haig Replies to King.**

Field-Marshal Haig has sent the following reply to a message sent him by the King:

"Your Majesty's gracious message has given universal encouragement to the whole army in France. I beg your Majesty to accept our respectful and grateful thanks and the assurance that we will steadfastly continue to do our utmost to deserve the inspiring confidence Your Majesty and the people throughout the Empire have placed in us in this hour of national stress."

**From Canada.**

Ottawa, March 25.—The following dispatch was sent to Sir Douglas Haig last evening by the Governor-General on behalf of the Government of Canada:

"My advisers desire me to convey to you the admiration of the Canadian people of the magnificent valor and endurance of the forces under your command in withstanding the enemy's desperate attacks. We have complete confidence that the German drive will be adequately met and that final victory will crown the Allied arms."

**Borden to Currie.**

Sir Robert Borden last evening sent the following message to Sir Edward Kemp, Minister of Militia Overseas: "Please convey to Sir Arthur Currie the following message:

"The Canadian people are watching with intense interest the supreme struggle in which the Allied armies are now engaged, and they have confidence that the Canadian forces, when called upon to take their full part, will maintain the splendid traditions of the past three years.

"We pray that complete victory may finally crown the efforts of the Allied armies."

London, March 25.—Investitures of the D. S. O. have been made to Major Francis Steel and Lieut. Donald McNaughton, of the Canadian forces, the Victoria Cross has been awarded to Capt. Christopher O'Kelly, and several other decorations have been awarded. The circumstances of O'Kelly's heroism were that he led an advance over 1,000 yards under heavy fire, attacking a strong point and capturing six pill boxes, 100 prisoners and ten machine guns.

**AMERICAN ENGINEERS ARE AIDING BRITISH**

Washington, March 24.—General Pershing called the War Department last night that two regiments of American railroad engineers are attached to the British forces on the front attacked by the Germans.

Three companies of the engineers, he said, were working in the areas in which the German official statement mentioned the presence of American troops, and no report had been received concerning them.

This message, announced last night by Major-General March, Acting Chief of Staff, definitely disposed of reports that American reserves had been sent into the battle. Gen. Pershing said there was nothing unusual to report from the American sectors.

**FURTHER CHARGES AGAINST HUMBERT, FRENCH SENATOR**

Paris, March 25.—General Dubail, the Military Governor of Paris, has asked the French Senate to authorize further prosecution of Senator Charles Humbert, former owner of The Paris Journal, on charges of fraud and speculation in connection with his mission to the United States in 1914 to purchase various articles for the army.

Senator Humbert, who was Vice-President of the Senate Army Commission, was arrested on February 13 and held for trial on charges of treason. He has been accused of aiding Bolo Pasha, the condemned traitor, and on March 20 was ordered by the Paris courts to return to Bolo Pasha \$500,000 francs with which Bolo tried to purchase control of The Journal.

**TWO LOST LIVES WHEN BRITISH DESTROYER SUNK IN COLLISION**

London, March 25.—A British destroyer was sunk on March 23 in a collision. The Admiralty announced last night. One officer and one of the crew were drowned.

GERMAN OBJECTIVES

Stewart Lyon's Opinion is That Blow is Aimed at Britain

Toronto, March 26.—Stewart Lyon, formerly correspondent of the Canadian Press in France, thinks the Germans are aiming not for Paris, but the Channel ports of France.

"The enemy begins to disclose his designs. He is heading toward the sea rather than toward Paris. He is following the line of the La Fere-Amiens railway in his stubborn attack, and by the capture of Neale, to the west of the Somme, midway between Peronne and Noyon, he has covered almost half the distance from La Fere to Amiens.

"The German Kaiser knows that the Islanders are his most dangerous and tenacious foes. Their will to victory is the obstacle to his dream of world power. He is pouring out the blood of his men with reckless profligacy to reach the Channel and prove that the inviolate isle can no longer claim that proud title."

Col. Repington.

Toronto, March 26.—Lieut-Colonel Repington's opinion of the battle in France as expressed in a cable to The Toronto Mail and Empire, is as follows:

"The greatest battle of the war pursued its course in the only manner which could have been expected under the conditions in which the rival combatants conducted their attack and defence. The Germans had the initiative, the selection of the point of attack and the assurance that if they used their great forces with the utmost energy and with a reckless disregard of losses they would penetrate the first lines of the British defence, as we had penetrated the German lines on many occasions.

"We, on the other hand, standing on the defensive and with far inferior military resources at the outset of the attack, could only aim at making the enemy suffer very heavily for every yard of ground he gained and with retaining an unbroken line as we fell back upon positions in our rear where our reserves would be ready to succeed the first line troops. Thus consequences inherent in the conditions under which the respective Governments placed their armies, followed as the respective commanders must have expected them to follow."

U BOAT INTERRED.

El Ferrol, Spain, March 26.—The German submarine which sought refuge in this port and has been interned in the U-45. Her propellers were in the U-45. Her propellers were in the harbor, and her guns, munitions, etc., were taken out.

BRITISH AND FRENCH

FOUGHT FOOT BY FOOT

Official Reports Said They Sold Ground to Enemy Yesterday Dearly

London, March 26.—Field-Marshal Haig reported last night: Fighting of the most severe description has been taking place all day on wide fronts south of Peronne and south and north of Bapaume. In both sectors the enemy had attacked our positions in great strength with fresh forces, and in spite of the gallant resistance of our troops has forced us to give ground.

"German troops are in Neale and Bapaume. Heavy fighting continues."

French Report.

Paris, March 26.—The War Office here reported last night:

"In the region of Noyon the battle continues with stubbornness, the Germans bringing in without cessation new forces. Our troops, in conformity with orders, are giving ground foot by foot, but are carrying out vigorous counter-attacks and inflicting heavy losses on the enemy.

"Desperate fighting has taken place around Neale which has been lost and regained several times. There is artillery fighting at various points along the front.

"Shells to the number of 1,375 were fired into Rheims last night and during the day."

Marvellous Feat.

London, March 26.—Reuter's correspondent at British Headquarters in France wired last evening:

"With scarcely a lull, and no abatement in intensity, the titanic struggle continues. The enemy artillery fire shows a tendency to decrease in volume, doubtless owing to the increasing difficulty of bringing guns forward. The manner in which our guns, tanks and transports have been withdrawn behind the obstinately retreating line amounts to a marvellous feat.

"After falling back across the Somme, we cleared all the bridges except one, which was not commanded by our gunfire that it was more advantageous to leave it standing. The enemy's casualties in his efforts to get across this narrow strip of water have been prodigious."

German Statement.

Berlin, March 26.—(Via London, March 26.)—An official statement issued here this evening said:

"Between the Somme and the Oise our troops are fighting their way forward."

"There was hard fighting between Bapaume and Peronne. We drove the enemy back here to his old positions which were held between the Ancre and the Somme before the beginning of the Somme battle in 1916.

"The losses of the enemy in killed and wounded are unusually heavy. The booty which has fallen into our hands since March 21, the amount of which is tremendous, cannot be yet estimated. It has been ascertained that more than 45,000 prisoners have been taken. The number of guns captured is largely in excess of 600. We have taken thousands of machine guns, tremendous quantities of munitions and implements of war, and great stores of supplies, clothing and equipment."

German Tanks.

Berlin, March 26.—Via London, March 26.—German tanks, reinforced by captured British tanks, says a semi-official statement to-day, in Sunday's fighting in France took a leading part in breaking the brave enemy resistance.

Tanks attached to the German divisions fighting below St. Quentin stood the test brilliantly, the statement says, and their mobility was universally praised. All the tanks which took part in the fighting are said to have returned undamaged. It was mainly due to their intervention, the statement continues, that the tenacious resistance of the British, especially the machine gun nests, was broken quickly. Troops manning a concrete redoubt near Urville are reported to have been overpowered immediately by the tanks.
