

This brought Trustee Mrs. Spofford to her feet with the observation, "I think that some degree of courtesy is due the other members of this Board when meetings are arranged and then re-arranged as they sometimes are. When the meeting is going to be adjourned, as it was evidently understood by some members of the Board would be the case tonight, I think it only courteous that all the members should be informed so that they could plan accordingly. I had an engagement which I was most anxious to keep but I cancelled it and now find that the meeting is to be adjourned so that two members, can keep appointments."

Trustee Aitken: "That is the way with me."

with me."

Trustee Perry: "I only asked if it would be convenient to adjourn. As far as I'm concerned if necessary I will stay here all night." Mrs. Andrews then contributed her quota to the discussion, "I know of no previous arrangement to adjourn, but at the same time I should be glad if the meeting could be adjourned as I would like to atend another meeting."

Trustee Mrs. Spotford, however, was not yet satisfied and immediately countered with the question "Was this meeting called at 7,30 with a view of getting through early in order to adjourn or because of a lengthy programme of business?" to which after some hesitation Chairman P. This brought Trustee Aitken to his feet with the retort "You say you would not put it in your own house, yet you expect the Board to pay for it for school use. "Hold on," was the reply from Trustee Perry, "the janitors of the schools have sent in reports declaring the coal to be good, and they should know whether it is good coal or not." In this he received the support of Secretary Pope and Trustee George Jay, who has seen the janitors' report.

After further contributions to the discussion, Trustee Mrs. Andrews that the Board form a committee of the whole to investigate the matter at an early date, the motion to this effect being carried.

Mrs. Spofford's second attempt to bring a resolution of adjournment was successful and the meeting adjourned at 8.30 whereupon Trustees Mrs. Andrews and Perry left to attend, as was later disclosed, the opening of the new Conservative rooms.







Mr. Terry spoke on the "Preparation of Fowls for Winter Laying."
The location and appointments of the houses, the best foods and the way to feed, the fattening of young fewl for the table, and the breeding of birds for laying purposes were points that were more especially considered during the talk.

Mr. Pilmer addressed the ladies on "The Goat," stating that this animal is the most economical producer of

is the most economical producer of pure, wholesome milk for the house-hold. Goat's milk is extremely nourishing and much easier to di-gest than cow's milk. In Italy goat's milk is largely used, and in that country the child death rate is lower than in that of any other na-tion.

Registrations for Municipal Elections So Far Very Slow

Few citizens have bothered themselves so far to get on the civic voters' list and thus qualify to vote at the civic election at the first of the year. Although registration will cease at the end of this month, the number of registrations has been almost negligible. Only two more weeks in, which registrations may take place remain.

weeks in which registrations may take place remain.

Interest in the civic elections has waned to an alarming extent during the last few years. Particularly noticeable was the drop in registration during the years of the war, when, presumably, people's minds were occupied with other things and when a considerable proportion of the voting population was overseas. In 1913, a year before the outbreak of hostilities, 1,696 persons who did not own property but who possessed the other necessary qualifications registered. By 1915 this number had dropped to 484. In 1916 slightly revived interest was reflected in 551 registrations. This number mounted up to 635 in 1917 and to 934 last year.

There were 934 registrations last year out of a possible of approximately 3,000. In other words, about two-thirds of the citizens who did not own property but who were entitled to vote failed to exercise their franchise. Altogether, with the property owners, who, of course, are put on the voters' list without registration, there were 9,495 persons who qualified to vote. This y-ar, it is estimated; close on to 11,000 men and women in the city are entitled to vote if they take the trouble to get on the voters' list.

It is only in the last few years that women who did not own property were entitled to vote after registering. This year, it is estimated, 1,500 women who do not own property will be able to vote if they care to register.

ter.

In past years increases in the size of the voters' list have been due to the early activities of aspirants for municipal honors. So far as is known this year, no would-be mayors or would-be aldermen have systematically urged their friends to get on the voters' list. To some extent as a result of this fact, registrations have been extremely slow.

# EEDERATED WOMEN'S KSUUDISMUMBA

First Annual Meeting at Toronto Next Month; Local Speakers

The first annual meeting of the federation of the Canadian Women's Institutes will take place in Toronto about the middle of November, conducted by the president, Mrs. Arthur Murphy, of Edmonton.

Some of the women who will take a prominent part in the coming convention are: Vice-President Mrs. J. P. Comanche, of Pont Rouge, V. Q.; Miss Eliza Campbell, of Fredericton, N. B., the treasurer; Mrs. Blackwood-Wileman, of Duncan, B. C.; Mrs. Charles Robson, of Winnipeg, and Mrs. Alfred Watt, who will represent the Women's Institutes of Great Britain.

Mrs. J. F. Price, of Calgary, corresponding secretary, who has gone to Toronto in advance, in speaking of the growth in the various Provinces, says that the membership roll in Alberta has increased from 4,000 to 12,000 members.

The wages are to be \$25 a month for an eight-hour days, the girls to be provided with a room to themselves, and they will be given at least two or three afternoons off in a week.
