Paris, Feb. 1.--(Associated Press)-Formal application is about to be made to Great Britain, France and the United States to recognize the Russian Constituent Assembly as the present de jure or rightful existing Government of Russia. The Russian Constituent Assembly has just been created at a meeting here of all the Russian elements opposed to Bolshevism, for the purpose of sinking all differences of opinion and presenting a united front against Bol-

President Avskentieff, a member of the former Kerensky Cabinet, and presiding officer of the Conference held here, will call in a few days on Premier Briand of France and present the application for recognition.

Kerensky To London.

Alexander Kerensky, head of the former Russian Government, has gone to London, where he will make a similar request of the British Government. Boris A. Bakhmetieff, Russian Ambassador at Washington, is understood to have been requested to present the application to the United States.





Berlin, Feb. 1.—Germans regard the reparations terms decided upon by the Supreme Allied Council in Paris last week as fantastic and impossible of execution and it is the general opinion that the Government cannot agree to them. The Cabinet, which received the text of the Allied note yesterday, was in executive session until late last night and the note was not released for publication until too late for editorial comment.

'Madness'' is the term leaders of the Reichstag used in discussing the reparations conditions.

tions figures are absurd and the tax levy on exports is absolutely beyond understanding. The latter would kill Germany's export business, and how does the Entente expect Germany to pay if she cannot export her produce?'
