## Clash of Serious **Proportions Occurs** In Occupation Area

Fighting Developed Between German Populace and Belgian Patrol at Aix-la-Chappelle When Inhabitants Refused to Obey Regulations.

London, Feb. 10.—Serious fighting between the German population and a Belgian patrol in Aix-la-Chappelle is reported in an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Amsterdam to-day.

The message, quoting a message from Aix-la-Chappelle in the Belgian occupation area, says inhabitants of the town refused to obey police instructions with regard to the carnival celebrations and remained in the streets and cafes until after the hour fixed for closing the festivities. This resulted, it is added, in a Belgian patrol firing on a crowd, wounding several persons.

Press)—Dr. Carl Melchoir, who was the German financial expert at Versailles and Brussels, and who is a partner in the Warburg Bank, told the Associated Press Wednesday that if the spirit of the Paris reparations decision reigns in the London Conference, "havoc must follow which the world will feel."

He said Germany must give to her limit, but that the Allies must not demand beyond that limit. He added that the conference in London could become a blessing to the world if it accomplishes constructive work based on what is possible. Even the danger of havoc must not force the German Government to sign a pledge of neveral dollars for each dollar which with the utmost difficulty it perhaps might be able to pay.

"The re-birth of normal conditions in Europe and a corresponding beginning of economic house cleaning for the world will depend upon a fair and final solution of the reparations problem," he continued. "The decisions of Paris show no progress, but rather retrogression."

## FRENCH CHAMBER **BEHIND BRIAND**

Deputies Vote Confidence by Large Majority

Paris, Feb. 10 .- The Chamber of Deputies last night gave a vote of confidence to the Government denanded by Premier Briand as a conition of his going to the London conference. The vote was 387 to 135.

This, however, was only after four days' streauous debate on the reparations agreement, which was subjected to criticism by a sub-

jected to criticism by almost a score of speakers, particularly M. Klotz and M. Tardieu.

The agreement was ratified by a vote of 395 to 83, although many of the deputies abstained from voting.

The two members of the former Clemenceau administration objected to the Paris agreement on the ground that it was an annex or protocol to the Versailies Treaty, which permitted the reduction of what was due to France, without receiving an equivalent compensation.

M. Klotz quoted figures to support his argument, and considered that his speech was responsible for between 50 and \$60 abstentions, which reduced the Ministry's majority. That majority, however, was never for a moment in doubt, although the temper of the House was often petulant, and interruptions and minor disturbances were frequent.

M. Briand, in the course of his closing remarks, expressed regret that the United States, which had given so many proofs of its cordiality to France, was not present in the Allied Councils, but he recognized that a change of administrations was a long and important operation.

London, Feb. 10.—A railway strike as a protest against the shooting by the police of railwaymen at Mailow, County Cork, Ireland, on January 31, seems a possibility as a result of a meeting of the locomotive engineers and firemen's union executive at Leeds yesterday. A resolution was adopted that unless the Government granted an inquiry into the Mailow affair by February 15 and gave guarantees for the safety of members of the union, a general strike would be called. An intimation to this effect was sent to Premier Lloyd George.

J. Bromley, secretary of the union, in an interview, declared that there was no bluff about the ultimatum; they meant to see the thing through. "We are not going to have our members murdered in cold blood without a proper inquiry," he said, "and will insist that when our men are on duty in the curfew hours they shall have safety and shall not be dragged off and shot like dogs, without charge or trial."



Capt. Ian MacKenzie Tells Legislature How Province Takes Lead to Carry Out Labor Provisions of Versailles Treaty; Commends Other Measures

Legislative Press Gallery, February 9, 1921. The pace set by British Columbia in taking the lead in acting on the labor provisions of the Treaty of Versailles, and bringing in eight-hour legislation was dealt with by Captain Ian Mackenzie, of Vancouver, in the latter part of his address yesterday afternoon opening the debate on the Speech from the Throne,

"The International Labor Conference at Washington in January, 1920, decided that all signatories to the Treaty of Ver-sailles should adopt the eight-hour day," said Captain Mackenzie. Urges University Completion.

Labor Convention Proposals.

"The whole significance of the reference to this in the Speech from the Throne is that this Government believes in the efficacy of the eighthour day, and is prepared to introduce the eight-hour day in this Province when the other Provinces of Canada follow suit or when the Dominion fulfills the implications of the Treaty of Versailles."

"In the first place, this question was considered by the Industrial Conference at Ottawa, and after this conference it was decided by the Federal Authorities to sumbit the question of the eight-hour day, to the Supreme Court of Canada for determination.

"Subsequent to this, the International Labor Conference at Washington met on January 15, 1920, and it provided for an eight-hour day and forty-eight hour week by legislation, by all the countries who were parties to the Peace Treaty and members of the League of Nations.

In order to implement the provisions and satisfy the treaty the Dominion Government was the competent authority. ### A SPLENDID VICTORY.

Although returns are not com plete there is very little doubt about the triumph which General Smuts has achieved. His victory is a personal victory and a reward to the coalition. But its chief significance lies in the monument it erects to the system of government given to the Taal speaking peoples by Great Britain after the Boer war. It is a triumph for home rule and it justifies the principles of the South African Party and its desire to develop a "spirit of national unity and self-reliance through the attainment of the lasting union of the various sec-tions of the people." It means that the Union of South Africa prefers to remain a member of the British Commonwealth. I is the answer to the secessionist Should the result be as decisive as would appear to be the case from the polls already reported it will very probably be the death knell to the secessionist movement as a political issue.

Like other members of the family the Union of South Africa has been left with new opportunities and new re sponsibilities as a result of the war, and if General Smuts finds himself in a position to control more authority in Parliament than has been the case since the elections of more than a year ago the country should be assured of a brighter future. The economic effect of the result may be underestimated. should remove the uncertainty with which investors have been seized during the last few months and restore a full meas ure of confidence. And while the Labor Party as a political entity in the life of the country appears to have suffered by the narrowing down of the issue which the people were called upon to settle, the fact that the workingman stood almost solidly behind the Prime Minister should guarantee to him fair dealings and promise industry a period of peaceful development.

Hospital problems are not pe culiar to British Columbia or to Canada. Conditions identical with those here exist in Great Britain. Operating costs have increased and revenue has de-creased. Deficits are the rule and not the exception. Dozens of schemes have been advanced.
Some appear to be practical and others are of the visionary type

It is generally conceded that suffering humanity should not be allowed to depend upon the private contribution or the proceeds of street collection. The system is wrong. It is at best a recognition on the part of the strong that a duty to the weak devolves upon them. But it is too haphazard and too uncertain.

As far as British Columbia is oncerned the Provincial and Municipal treasuries contribute their share in behalf of those persons who are unable to meet ospital charges. A forty per cent, increase could be effected he said, as that proportion of alfalfa seed was hard shelled and impervious to moisture. He dealt with the experiences of farmers in Alberta and treated the subject in a very interesting manner.

The wreck is in the general fairway of the Forth, and cannot reasonably be held to be in or near an approach to any particular harbor. The duty of removing it therefore falls on the Commissioners, who are the general lighthouse and wreck removing authority for Scotland.

The Commissioners' engineer advised that the vessel could not be raised or removed at a reasonable cost, and fourteen companies were therefore asked to tender for cutting the vessel down to forty-five feet at low water. Only three tenders were received. The Commissioners have been authorized to accept the tender which was sent in by a Sunderland firm.

B. C. Coast Service Steamer Struck On Steep Island At Three a.m. To-day; Takes Anchorage at Tucker Bay; Patricia Takes Off Passengers.

Running north from Vancouver, where she cleared on Wednesday night, the B. C. Coast Service vessel Princess Beatrice ran on rocks at Steep Island, Sabine Channel, at 3 o'clock this morning. In the ordinary course the Beatrice takes a northwesterly course from Vancouver and later bears a little west to bring her near Point Upwood on Texada Island, thence entering the southern end of Malaspina Strait.

Due to circumstances not yet known, the Princess Beatrice turned up the western side of Texada Island and struck her nose on some rocks at Steep Island, near Bull Passage. Seeing that she was making water, Captain W. Boyce, her commander, landed the passengers at once on Jedidiah Island, the nearest island to the north of where she struck.



Mitchell, of the B. C. Stockbreeders' Association, and L. E. Taylor, of the B. C. Seed Growers' Association. Members of both of these organizations, which are in onvention here at present, were resent at the luncheon

We want British Columbia on undred per cent, clean," Mr. Mitchell efforts of stockbreeders to fight tuberculosis in cattle. "This can be done, but the way that our efforts and resolutions have been received by the authorities you would think inat we were trying to put something over on the Government. That tuberculosis can be stamped out is evidenced by the fact that in the Columbia Valley tests carried out during the two last years have failed to reveal one animal which reacted. What is needed is co-operation between the people of the cities and the farming interests to push legislation needed to support the agricultural industry. Propare for Immigration.

Mr. Mitchell urged that preparations should be made for the flood of immigration which shortly would arrive in Canada. "We should make sure that British Columbia gets its share of this immigration," he said. "But we must be prepared to give new settlers a square deal—a proper opportunity to make good. I asked the Minister of Agriculture how long it took him to make money on his farm and he repiled seven years and 'Honest John' told me that if they had sold him up at the end of fifteen years he would have been in the hole. We must give settlers a chance to do better than that. To give settlers 160 acres of raw forest land is the dirtiest trick you can do him. These lands are covered with graves which hold the bodies of settlers and their wives who have died in their struggle to make a living.

Laws All Wrong. Prepare for Immigration.

"Our homesteading laws," he asserted, "are absolutely wrong. Our lands should be settled in communities and ignorant settlers should not be allowed to come in here and settle wherever they please, without regard to the possibility or impossibility of making good.
