



Assistance is also given in purchase of stock, implements and seed for settlers. Able to Finance Themselves.

Between 50 and 60 head of dairy stock were purchased during the Autumn, returns from which have been a substantial help to settlers. During the coming season, with the increase of feed available from lots seeded down in 1919, it is proposed to increase the number of stock and to enable, as far as possible, all set-tlers to become self-supporting.
