Grasshoppers Wary, But B.C. Stock-Raising Grows

The progress British Columbia has made in stock raising during the last year and the alluring promises the industry holds out for operations from now on, were told of yesterday afternoon by the Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Minister of Lands, in his report for 1920 on the grazing policy of the Provincial Government.

"The grazing policy adopted by the Department of Lands in 1919 is showing splendid results," said the Hon. Mr. Pattullo.

"Last year 487 applications for grazing permits were made, as against 281 in 1919. Permits covered 50,237 cattle, 2,536 horses and 21,377 sheep, as against 43,602 cattle, 2,789 horses and 4,335 sheep the previous year. Grazing fees paid amount to \$13,387.64, against \$9,975.73 in 1919.


B.C. to Allow Settlers Only on Suitable Lands; Surveys Show Resources

A more detailed tabulation of the characteristics of the areas surveyed in regard to suitability for agricultural and other purposes is the feature of the survey work carried out by the Depart-ment of Lands last year, according to the statement on the work of the Department yesterday by the Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Minister of Lands.

"Surveyors were asked to make a more systematic examination and to describe fully the timber, surface, soil, vegetation, water supply, roads, location, elevation and to give all other information likely to be of assistance to the intending settler," said Hon. Mr. Pattullo.

Lumber Trade Still Booms, ably mean that a promoter or direc-tor misappropriating money could be made criminally liable. Marketing of Logs Shows

Despite talk of dullness in the lumber industry on this Coast, logs measured and delivered for mills in British Columbia last month show an increase of 34,000,000 feet board measure over the total for January, 1920, when the lumber boom was said to be at its height, according to scaling reports presented yesterday by the Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Minister of Lands. The total of logs scaled during January, 1921, in the Coast area was 101,446,337 feet, and in the Interior 31,909,558 feet. For the same month last year the Coast total was 84,189,761 and the Interior total 15,337,645. These make the totals for the month: 1921, 133,355,895 feet; 1920, 99,527,406 feet.





Its Immigrants? Instead of shutting our gates against all aliens for a year, as the House proposed, the Senate Committee on Immigration would accelerate the influx from Northwestern Europe while diminishing the flood of other Europeans. This principle of selective immigration is embodied in the Dillingham Bill, a so-called emergency measure which would temporarily limit the admission of aliens of any nationality to five per cent. of the number of foreign-born persons of that nationality resident in the United States in 1910. The Danish Danske Pioneer, of Omaha, says: "From a national economical standpoint Dillingham argues his bill soundly and correctly, maintaining, based on statistics, that the restrictions will allow larger immigration than before from Northwestern Europe. . . . We can see no objections to its becoming law." The Czecho-Slovak Denni Hlasatel does not believe in restrictive legislation on immigration, as "conditions are going to take care of themselves." The Jewish Daily Forward, of Chicago, says that "the Senate bill will hit Jewish immigration no less than would the Johnson bill, had that bill become a law. The real meaning of this bill, then, is that from all these countries (the New Russia) only 86,000 Jews and Gentiles will be allowed to land in the United States during the next year: Jewish immigration will, therefore, be restricted to almost neiking."
