UNEMPLOYMENT COMMITTEE NAMED
Plan Adopted in Britain; Demonstrations Occur

London, Sept. 8.—The Government's decision to appoint a committee, comprising Sir Robert S. Horne, Chancellor of the Exchequer, T. J. Macnamara, Minister of Labor, Alfred M. Knox, Minister of Health, and Robert Munro, Secretary for Scotland, to deal with the unemployment question, probably indicates the intention to meet the problem raised by the imprisonment of the councilors of the Borough of Poplar.
The Government's unemployment insurance plan has failed, owing to the remarkable depression in trade. The insurance pay, which was inadequate to meet the present cost of living, has lapsed until November, when the new year will begin. In the meantime all unemployment bureaus are to be thrown upon Boards of Guardians.

W. V. A.

SIXTY-ONE WERE PUT TO DEATH
Bolshevik Executions in Petrograd on Plot Charges

Riga, Sept. 8.—Sixty-one persons have been executed by the Bolsheviks, being charged with participating in the recent Petrograd plot, according to the official list printed in The Pravda of Petrograd. Among those put to death were sixteen women, most of whom were accused of renting rooms to or otherwise sheltering male participants in the plot.

Other executed included Prince Constantine Toumanoff, aged twenty-nine, and Prince Sergius Oukhtomsky, aged thirty-five, the latter being a widely known sculptor. Both were accused of spying or of sending information out of Russia.
