Premier Baldwin Unwilling to Take up British Legion's Suggestion

Birkenhead Declares He Supports Baldwin's Policies

London, Nov. 21 (Canadian Press able) — Premier Baldwin has writ-en declining to countenance a na-lonal work loan of £200,000,000 ad-cocated by the British Legion as a remedy for unemployment, contend-ing this would bring to a standstill loan operations for Empire develop-ment and other purposes and thus stultify the present arrangements to relieve unemployment. OF APPEAL COURT Work of the Appeal Court of Bri-tish Columbia will be speeded up by new legislation which has been in-troduced in the Legislature by Hon. A. M. Manson, Attorney-General. Ex-plaining his-plan to change the work of the Court, Mr. Manson told the House yesterday afternoon that in future an eveny-divided judgment would be impossible. When one judge is absent, he said, the Court can call upon a Judge of the Supreme Court to act with it. In the past, Mr. Manson pointed on a decision, the litigants had to go to the Supreme Court of Canada or the Privy Council to secure a con-clusive judgment. In future this would be unnecessary, he said. By sitting continuously, Mr. Man-mon added, the Appeal Court would be able to get through its business more rapidly than in the past. Mr. Manson declared that British Columbia courts must be kept abso-lutely above criticism and "upon a pedestal."



he Canadian Highway on Vancou-er Island received endorsation at a meeting of the association yesterday ver Island received endorsation at a meeting of the association yesterday atternoon. The motion, as adopted, recom-mended the route by ferry connec-tion from Steveston to Sidney, thence by road to Victoria, and westerly to Jordan River; thence by a West Const road to be built as near the Pacific Ocean as feasible, running from Barkley Sound to the Abernis, and thence by the best route to Strathcona Park. No attempt was made to define the route northerly beyond the Provincial Government reserve, except generally north-west-erly to Cape Scott. This route is to be indicated on the new map to be issued on a pamphlet defining the aims of the Association for which tenders were referred to a committee for action. Secretary F. Giolma nead the re-port of the delegation to Hon. W. H. Sutherland last week, and the result was considered satisfactory. It was decided to ask the secretary of the Victoria branch of the Auto-mobile Club of E. C. to bring the aims of the association, and this Mr. Webb promised to do. In connection with the presentation of framed copies of the photograph of planting of the first post of the Canadian Highway at Port Alberni, on May 4, 1912, to certain leading public men in Canada, W. 
