Council staff anger at new parking charges

Tsunami of on-street parking in Dorchester as angry county council staff threated that they will park on the streets in protest at plans to

charge them for spaces at work.

In a stroke the move could undo all the work the council has been doing to try and unclog the county town's resi-

dential areas and undermine the plan to ease traffic flows.

Dorset County Hospital will also impose extra charges for staff parking on November 1st – adding to the problems of on-street parking.

The decision will mean a doubling of the staff parking charge at DCH - up from £1.50 to £2.50 a day with a further rise, to £3, due next vear.

Public parking charges at the hospital will not rise, but are already higher than staff rates.

The hospital says it wants to encourage more staff to use alternative modes of transport to get to and from

A county council spokesman said the proposed parking charges will simply bring the authority in line with other councils and other large employers where staff are expected to pay for their parking.

Dorset County Council's director for environment Peter Moore said: "In line with many other local authorities and large emintroducing charges for staff parking at County Hall and Loders car parks in Dorchester later this year, reducing the significant cost to the council taxpayer of providing staff parking in the process."

Charges may also be introduced at other staff car parks including Winterbourne Monkton, almost two miles from County Hall, where social services and some other staff are now based, having been moved out of Dorchester

years ago. Closure of the town's this year has already led, by the council's own admission, to at least 50 extra cars a day on Dorchester residential road.

Unison says that staff

JEFFERY Fraser lives in Beaminster and is an organist who has composed numerous pieces of music for church services.

He was born in Brisbane, Australia, in 1929 and lived there until 1953 before travelling to England to study music further.

Jeffery comes from a musical family. His father had a career in the public service which culminating in being appointed commissioner. He was knighted for his services to the state and, in particular, for the founding of the Queensland Conservatorium of Music. He was a singer and his mother was a pianist.

Jeffery has three daughters; the eldest lives in England and the two younger ones have emigrated to Australia. He also has nine grandchildren and a couple of great grandchildren.

WHAT inspired you be an organist?


Even as a small child, I remember liking music. But the very first time I heard and organ, I was hooked. I remember drawing organ pipes on my slate in the infants school. The sound fascinated me, the way it kept going and not fading away like that made by pianos. My parents knew I was musical and arranged piano lessons for me, and when I started secondary school I had organ lessons. When I was good enough, I was given the privilege of playing in St John's Cathedral for the 9.30am service on the fifth Sunday in each month. And let's be honest - no other instrument gives you such a feeling of power as being able to control with your fingers and toes the tremendous sound of a large organ, all stops out!

WHEN did you start composing music?

I composed music as a young child writing a few short pieces. I don't know what inspired me, tunes and harmonies just came into my mind. One won a prize in an eisteddfod. In my teens I composed a couple of part-songs for children's voices. They were sung but not published. Many organists compose occasional music for their choirs, usually when a special piece is needed urgently. I have composed a few.

TELL us some of the pieces you have com-

In 1960s my first anthem, "Our Blest Redeemer".



Cathedral Millennium Hymn Competition. My hymn tune "Christopher Wren" was sung in the London Millennium Service in the cathedral to the words which won the second prize, "Hidden Christ, alive forever", by Brian Wren.

Later, I composed music for the organ, and more anthems were published by "Animus Music".

"Blessed are you, Lord" (words by late Revd Joan Fry), was sung in Wells Cathedral. My anthem, "They rest from their Labour" was composed for a local victim of the Twin Towers atrocity in New

York, and has since been sung annually in Cartmel Priory (Cumbria) in their Remembrance services. where my publisher is the director of music.

"A West Country Communion Service" for unison voices is sung regularly in Bothenhampton church. "The Harvest Feast", just composed, was sung in three churches: Bothenhampton, Beaminster and United Church in Bridgort.

WHAT is next for the music you have composed?

I have composed a set of Responses for Evensong. These are to be sung by Parnham Voices in Wimborne Minster on Sunday, October 30th.

Finally, I have composed a march for Remembrance Day, entitled "Beaminster Veterans". There are plans for it to be played by the Fairey Band in the parade in Beaminster on Remembrance Sunday. And that our organist, Antony Saunders intends to play it in the church.

WHAT is your biggest achievement?

My biggest achievement? Musically I cannot decide between two: passing the Fellowship of the Royal College of Organists was very difficult indeed, and I am very glad I managed it. Then composing the hymn which was sung in the London Millennium Service in St Paul's Cathedral was a huge thrill. My wife and I were there by invitation.

WHAT do you think is next for you in the future?

At the age of 87, to be around for a bit longer! But I don't think I'll start any long-term projects. I would like to continue composing music. If I am remembered for just one piece (quite a number of composers are) that would be good. I have also started a book - "A Singer's Guide to Reading Music" because those who do not play an instrument find this difficult. I hope to get it finished.

classed as 'essential users' are particularly incensed about the charges because they have no option, under the terms of their employment, about whether or not they bring their cars to work.

Most are told they have to bring their cars incase they have to go out on urgent, or essential calls, which cannot wait.

"If they think they are going to force me to pay another £10 a week, after years of what are effectively pay cuts, they can forget it. This will wipe out any goodwill which might remain," said one of those protesting about the changes at County Hall.

Said GMB branch convenor Sarah Pattison: "This will have a knockon affect to residents in the surrounding area, like Fordington and Poundbury, as staff will have little choice but to park on their streets. This has already caused a lot of upset with residents when similar issues happened at the hospital.

Amanda Brown, from Unison, claimed there had been a 16 per cent real-term decrease in salaries over the past four years and making staff pay for parking would cause more hardship. She claims some, lower paid, employees, are already using foodbanks. The union is also upset about what it claims has been a lack of consultation over the changes

Some staff say they are angry about the way the rules will be interpreted for mileage claims.

At the moment staff who go straight to a job from home usually claim that mileage, less the cost of their normal commute distance, but new rules insist that they will have to come to the office first and then start the work trip from there.

Staff say this will "encourage inefficiency, increase pollution, and put more traffic on the roads, particularly Dorchester.

One officer, who lives on Portland, points out that he sometimes goes straight from home to a work appointment in Weymouth, but with the rules being enforced would have to drive from Portland to County Hall and then back to Weymouth again, before travelling, for the second time, to Dorchester.

£1million expansion for vets

Ambulance service told to improve following inspection

SOUTH West Ambulance has been praised for its responsiveness and caring services - but told it must do better to fill staff vacancies, improve training and tighten up on reporting problems.

An inspection report from the Care Quality Commission (COC) said overall the service needed to improve but was rated "outstanding" for providing a caring service, and "good" for being responsive.

The report highlights problems with stress due to pressure of work, abuse towards staff and some suffering from back and other problems associated with the physical nature of the job.

The CQC report said that staff in emergency operations centres and urgent services were "outstanding in the way they supported people who were distressed or overwhelmed".

In the 19 months until January 2016 the service was better than the national average for responding within eight minutes to life threatening calls.

The CQC report described staff morale and

motivation as "mixed" claiming that a "significant" number of front line ambulance staff were saying they "felt unwell due to work-related stress or had experienced musculoskeletal problems as a result of work activities"

SWAS chief executive Ken Wenman said his staff delivered amazing patient care and deserved the "outstanding" rating for caring ser-

"I'm assured that the CQC inspection team, without exception, received only positive comments from patients, something I'm told is almost unheard of," he said.

Mr Wenman said that actions were already being taken to improve services where the CQC report had highlighted shortfalls and had already agreed what he described as a more proactive approach to training.

Dorset businessman's £3million gift to fellow cancer patients

NEW cancer facilities at Dorset County and Poole Hospitals will be built thanks to the generosity of the late businessman and collector Robert

MP insists he supports Kingfisher campaign following email to mum

WEST Dorset MP Oliver Letwin says he is still fully behind the Kingfisher campaign, despite his response to a mum who emailed him about the plans to downgrade the Special Care Baby Unit at Dorset County Hospital.

Protesters said they were concerned that Mr Letwin would no longer be supporting their campaign after he replied to an email from mum Carolyn Emett. In his reply Mr Letwin said he had been persuaded that the changes taking place, as reported in last week's View From, would lead to better and safer care and that it would "therefore be entirely irresponsible for me to promote or join any politically opportunistic bandwagon against these proposals."

As reported last week, plans for maternity services and the SCBU at Dorset County Hospital are to be downgraded without consultation, with babies born under 32 weeks, and those that are sick, being sent to Poole Hospital. The CCG argues that these plans are not part of the Clinical Services Review and are therefore not needed to go to consultation.

fore not needed to go to consultation.

Speaking to the View From, Mr Letwin clarified his remarks, saying: "This is totally different from the Kingfisher campaign and the clinical services review. I am still determined that we should keep full paediatric services at Dorchester – and I'm delighted to say that, following my support for that campaign and the intervention of the Royal College [of Paediatrics and Child Health], discussions with Yeovil to achieve that ambition are well advanced.

"The current, altogether different issue is whether

very premature babies at high risk should be delivered at Poole, which is better equipped to deliver them safely. As my priority is the safety of the mothers and babies involved, I support the proposal, and I hope that others will, on reflection, join me in doing so." he added.

But, Bridport Councillor Ros Kayes said the CCG still had questions to answer. She said: "It complicates matters that the recommendations from the Royal College's report are the same, in part, as these changes - in that they recommend moving babies born under 32 weeks going elsewhere.

weeks going elsewhere.

"This is what has led to confusion. It would have made sense for the CCG to have spoken about these changes to the Kingfisher mums and local councillors much earlier.

much earlier.

"I would like to know how these changes will impact on the Yeovil proposals. I would also like to know why they have not been brought before the Health Scrutiny Committee before being implemented rather than after the changes have begun.

"This whole process has damaged the general public's trust in the CCG. It has been a PR disaster for them and, worst of all, it will adversely affect young families.

"What it tells me is this - it is imperative that all health bodies commissioning services are completely open and transparent and in a timely fashion about change and that one NHS structure does not hide be-

hind another in order to slip through unpopular changes in order to avoid the NHS duty to consult with the public. "I would like to know, therefore,

"I would like to know, therefore, what consultation NHS England has run on this issue." she added.

Another protest took place this week with members of the Cartoon Action Theatre Company from Bridport putting on a performance outside the Clinical Commissioning Group's offices in Barrack Road, Dorchester (pictured left).

Members of the Kingfisher group will also be joining a Dorset-wide demonstration about NHS funding in the county, in Poole Park on Saturday.

"We had to get it through your small intestine and then through your large intestine and get all the water out. They had mustard and sweetcorn and brown sauce and stuff and it felt a bit slimy," she said with a smile.

Work to start on flooding hotspot

IMPROVEMENT work is set to start to install new drainage at a flooding hotspot near Dorchester.

Work will start on the West Stafford Bypass on Monday (October 17th), for 16 weeks, to refurbish and improve existing drainage, clear existing soakaway chambers and extend the drainage ditch on the north side of the

As well as these highway works, there will also be a bund built and a filter fence installed in adjacent farmland which will stop silt from getting into the drainage system.

Andrew Martin, Dorset County Council Service Director for Highways, said: "These drainage improvements have been designed following investigation work earlier this year, and will get surface water to clear more

'We've also been working with landowners to address issues caused by heavy rain water carrying silt into the

drainage system from adjacent land.' For the safety of drivers, and for workers, temporary two-way lights will

be used to control traffic throughout the

Councillor Andy Canning, elected member for Linden Lea division, said: "Drivers will have to plan their journeys more carefully to allow for any delay these works might cause, but please be patient and try to look forward to having a road that stays open after heavy rainfall.'

Engineers will be monitoring the improvements to see if any further work is needed in the future to ensure the flooding risk is minimised.

The West Stafford Bypass was built in 1992, with the first recorded road closure due to flood water in 2012. Traffic analysts at INRIX have the road being recorded as closed at least 20 times in the last four years; twice in 2012, eight times in 2013, six times in 2014 and four times in 2015.

Clown craze sweeps county

THE "killer" clown craze that has swept across America has arrived in Dorset.

The prank, which involves people dressing up as clowns to scare members of the public, has been reported in the county.

Dorset Police have received a number of reports of people being frightened by those dressed in clown costumes between Friday, October 7th and Sunday, October 9th, with incidents taking place in Bournemouth, Christchurch and Blandford.

In one of the incidents, a man was assaulted by another man who had

his face painted like a clown, however, no arrests have been made. Bournemouth North Neighbour-

hood Inspector Dave Kewley said: "While it is obviously not an offence to wear a costumé in public, we would ask people to think about their behaviour toward others and what impact it may have.

"Ànti-sociaĺ behaviour and any actions that cause fear and distress will not be tolerated and could constitute a public order offence. Incidents such as these may seem harmless but can be frightening to those who experi-



Merchant Navy Memorial to be unveiled

A NEW memorial on Weymouth Esplanade to commemorate members of the Merchant Navy who lost their lives in war and conflict will be unveiled on Wednesday, November 9th.

The Weymouth, Portland and District branch of the Merchant Navy Association (MNA) are to erect the memorial opposite the bandstand on the seafront.

Captain Paul Compton, Chairman of the Weymouth, Portland and District branch of the MNA, explained the significance of this event: "Weymouth and Portland has a very long maritime history and it is only fitting that we honour the brave men and women who lost their lives at sea while serving their country and their communities.

I cannot begin to convey just how grateful the committee is to all of those who have supported this project from the beginning, including everyone who has bought a raffle ticket or made a donation this year. The memorial is so close to the hearts of many in our community and I am proud to see it all coming together."

Work will start to erect the memorial next week, before its grand unveiling on Wednesday, November 9th at 11 am.

At 92, retired Bosun Tony Cash is one of the association's oldest members, who says he can't wait for the unveiling: "It is so important that we remember the sacrifice of all those men and women who lost their lives at sea in the First World War, Second World War and other conflicts around the world. I have waited a long time for this day. It will be very moving to see the memorial on the Esplanade, a permanent reminder of their sacrifice."

The memorial has been carved on Portland, appropriately using Portland Stone, the bronze fittings have been moulded in Bridport and the railings have been made in Weymouth. David Kennett, a former Chief Engineer in the Merchant Navy came up with the idea for the shape of the memorial: "The memorial depicts the raised bow of a sinking ship. It has

such a deep and important meaning."

The memorial will be unveiled by The Lord Lieutenant of Dorset, with the Mayor of Weymouth and Portland Richard Kosier and Mayoress Caroline Churchill in attendance. The Mayor chose the Weymouth, Portland and District branch of the MNA as one of his charities this year and chairman Paul Compton is grateful for the support: "We are indebted

to the Mayor Richard Kosier and Mayoress Caroline Churchill for the support they have given this project. Our mayoress has spent several days of her own time fundraising in local supermarkets so a big thank you to her and to everyone who stopped to put their change in the pot. It all helps!"




Chairman Dave Harris said: "We wanted to reflect the resurgence of small breweries in London, particularly for porters and stouts.



It was found during works for the electricity board at the town's Grove trading estate in 1963.

It was one of hundreds discovered in what was a Romano-Christian graveyard dating from the 4th century

When it was found it contained the remains of a man and was discovered underneath a single chapel or mausoleum. Gold fibres were also discovered.

Archaeologists believe he may have been a high ranking individual, possibly a member of the clergy.

The coffin itself is made of ham stone which is likely to have come from the Ham Hill area, some 25 miles away, near Yeovil.



TULIP TIPS

OF all the bulbs, tulips are probably the most varied in size and colour, ranging from dainty dwarf specimens to frilly, feathery forms and stand-up-straight majestic types.

They don't need planting as early as narcissi or snowdrops. In fact, tulips shouldn't be planted before the end of October, as early planting will result in soft growth which is susceptible to the fungal disease, tulip fire.

If you're growing them in pots, generally they are best grown alone because they don't survive a typical summer without being lifted and dried off after flowering.

If you want a stand-alone colour and type of bulb, consider sowing grass seed on the surface soil once you've planted the bulbs, which will create a swathe of green as the bulbs emerge, avoiding visible empty pockets of soil.

However, you can achieve some gorgeous combinations which could also help hide the unsightly appearance of the bulbs once they have finished flowering and are starting to look straggly.

Variegated dwarf ribbon grass, for example, is an excellent pairing with the deep burgundy Tulipa 'Queen of Night'. The grass makes a terrific foil for the almost-black tulip flowers and will last long after the blooms have gone.

CARDENS making your garden glorious

If you are planting a single layer of bulbs, fill the pot to within four or five times the depth of the bulb from the top of the pot. You can plant the bulbs closer together in a pot than you would in the ground, leaving them around 1cm apart if they are small tulips, but a bit more space for varieties with larger blooms. Then fill the rest of the pot with compost, up to around 3cm from the top of the rim. Also, be aware that tall bulbs in shallow containers don't generally succeed.

When planting, the most important thing is that the soil is well drained. Add a handful of grit to multi-purpose compost at planting time and place crocs, small stones or broken pieces of polystyrene plant trays in the base and ensure you have drainage holes in the container.

Stand the pot on feet to stop autumn and winter moisture seeping in upwards from the ground and rotting the bulbs.

In severe winter weather, move the pots closer to the house so they escape the worst of the excess wet and chilling wind. But once the days become slightly warmer in early spring, move them out into the open and don't let the pots dry out or you'll be left with stunted foliage and poor flowers.

Once the bulbs are in full leaf growth, the pots should be watered periodically, when the compost feels dry.

So, which tulips do best in pots? Well, in deep pots you might go for tall varieties such as triumph whose stems grow up to 40cm, flowering in late spring. These include T. 'Prinses Irene', which has glowing orange blooms flamed with purple, and 'Bing Crosby', a scarlet variety.

Shorter single early tulips such as 'Apricot Beauty' also work well in pots, as do taller single late and Darwin tulips including 'World's Favourite', a hot orange-red type, or the lily-flowered T. 'Ballerina', with its vibrant orange flowers which open fully on sunny days.

In fact, most tulips are perfect for pots just avoid those with weak stems and very heavy flowers which are prone to flopping.

Many bulbs grown in pots can be left in the compost if they are kept completely dry during the dormant period in summer. A frost-free greenhouse or cold frame is ideal and many gardeners lay the pots on their

Tulips must have a dry rest after flowering, so if you plant summer bedding on top of them which you are intending to regularly water all summer, don't leave the bulbs in the container or they will just rot. You'll need to lift and dry them after they die down and store them safely until late autumn.



WHAT TO DO THIS WEEK

- Place dustbins full of water under greenhouse staging. They warm up during the day, releasing their heat at night and act as storage heaters.
- Plant out hardy primulas raised from seed or divisions.
- Harvest cobnuts, hazelnuts and filberts when husks begin to yellow, but before they start dropping.
- Continue to pick fast maturing vegetables, such as French beans, runner beans, courgettes, cucumbers, peppers and tomatoes, to prevent them becoming stringy, tough or bitter.
- Where grass growth is thin and sparse, overseed now with a suitable grass seed mixture.
- Lift onions and shallots once the foliage has started to die back.
- Take cuttings of rosemary, lavender, bay and hyssop.
- Take hardwood cuttings from gooseberry bushes to increase stock.
- Sow sweet peas in a cold frame or the greenhouse for early summer blooms next year.
- Plant new perennials while the soil is still warm, but moisture levels are increasing.
- Wait for the first frosts to hit dahlias and cannas before lifting the tubers or rhizomes.
- Buy spring-flowering bedding plants, such as bellis, primula, wallflowers and violas.
- Prune out any dead, dying or diseased shoots on fruit trees that are affected by diseases such as bacterial canker, cherry leaf scorch, powdery mildew or other problems that can overwinter.

IT'S TIME FOR PARSNIPS

THEY are among my favourite root vegetables, whether in soups and casseroles, or dipped in finely grated Parmesan or even maple syrup and roasted, as a Sunday lunch accompaniment.

Pick a spot in sun or light shade and prepare the soil in autumn, removing stones. A deep, light soil is best for root formation. Rake in a general purpose fertiliser when preparing the seed bed.

Seeds should be sown thinly in spring. Be patient, because they are slow to germinate - it can take up to five weeks. To help you remember where they are when you are weeding, sow a quick-growing crop such as radishes among them.

Parsnips don^Tt need much looking after. Keep weeding and water if there is a prolonged dry spell. The roots should be ready for lifting when the leaves begin to die down in autumn. They can be left in the ground whatever the weather, so just lift them as you need them.

Good varieties include 'Tender and True' and 'Gladiator', said to be resistant to canker, with smooth, tapered roots and ideal for small gardens.

Where reputation matters

ARE your borders looking overgrown and overcrowded? If some of your stalwart shrubs and perennials have outgrown their space or simply aren't thriving in their current position, it may be time to move them. The best time to transplant shrubs is while they are dormant, between late autumn and early spring. Choose a day when the ground isn't frozen or waterloaged.

There's always a risk when you move plants and the larger the plant, the more risk there is that you'll lose it. But there are ways to minimise that risk.

 $Small\ her baceous\ perennials\ and\ compact\ shrubs\ are$ relatively easy to move if you water them thoroughly and then dig them up with as much root as possible, repositioning them somewhere where there's more room or where conditions are more favourable. Water them in well and keep them well watered during the autumn in the absence of rainfall.

Mature shrubs are harder work to move, but it's best to do it after a bout of rain.

Generally those that move most easily are the ones with fibrous roots - masses of thin roots which remain shallow in the soil. More problematic to move are those with tap roots, which are much thicker and there are fewer of them. It's difficult to move these without breaking the roots.

First, decide where you are going to replant any large

shrubs. Dig a hole slightly bigger than the root ball of soil is going to be and add organic matter to the soil as well as slow-release fertiliser.

For trauma-free transplanting of large shrubs, first make a wide circle at least 30cm from the shrub with a spade and dig a deep trench following the circle's curve. Use a garden fork to loosen the earth around the ball of the roots, then gently fork the surplus earth from around the roots.

If the stems or branches of the shrub are unwieldy, tie them loosely with garden string so they don't snap off or get damaged during the excavation.

Once the ball of roots has been loosened, dig your spade under the root ball as far as you can, levering gently as you go around the circle. The aim is to keep as large a root ball attached to the plant as possible.

When you feel the shrub move, tilt it to one side and slide a length of plastic sheeting or sacking underneath the root ball. Tilt the shrub the other way and manoeuvre the sacking so that it comes underneath the whole root ball, then wrap it up and tie it around the trunk securely, to minimise water loss and keep the root ball and soil intact.

Unwrap the sacking and carefully place the shrub in its original depth. Fill the hole with displaced soil, firm in gently with the ball of your foot to get rid of any air pockets and give it a good soaking. Water regularly until the plant becomes established and mulch with organic matter. Large shrubs may need support for a year or two.







AN illustrated history of the Society of Dorset Men has been published – tracing its 112-year history.

The book has been produced by Dorchester-based Reverend, Doctor John Travell, the Society's Chaplain and Historian.

The 98-page book was unveiled at Dorset County Museum by society president, Lord Fellowes.

"I am delighted that this account of the society has been written," said ITV playwright and Oscar winner Lord Fellowes in the foreword.

"There is a good deal of fascinating detail to be explored and what pleases me most, is that there is throughout, the strong sense that this society has always been for all the people of Dorset."

The society was originally formed in London with Thomas Hardy writing a letter of support when the first meeting was on July 7th 1904.

Sir Frederick Treves was the first president. The

Dorchester-born surgeon famously saved the life of King Edward VII by operating on his appendix, postponing his coronation.

Hardy became president in 1907, coining the motto "Who's afear'd," later adopted by Dorset County Council

From the 1960s, a dinner was held in Dorset every year- as well as one in London. The 1983 London Dinner took place at the Mansion House, hosted by Lord Mayor Sir Anthony Jolliffe who was born in Weymouth and elected president in 1984. London dinners ceased in 1991, but the Dorset county dinner is still a great success, the next being held on Saturday, October 20th

Modern events are also covered in the book, such as the planting of a cedar of Lebanon tree in the grounds of Minterne House to mark The Queen's Diamond Jubilee in 2012. This was the last public duty performed by the late Roy Adam MBE, chairman of the society for 21 years, assisted by his son Stuart, the current Chairman, and the 12th Lord Digby.

An illustrated history of The Society of Dorset Men is on sale for £6 from the Tourist Information Centre at Dorchester; Books Afloat at Weymouth, Waterstones at Dorchester & Bridport, Dorchester Post Office and the Keep Military Museum in Dorchester.

Young Bees suffer challenging experience

BRIDPORT Reserves' manager Shaun Annetts was very critical of the referee following his side's 2-2 draw at home to Blandford United on Saturday.

Leading 2-1 at half-time, the young Bees were subjected to some very physical treatment in the second half as Blandford decided to change tactics to get even.

Whilst he did not feel that their opponents approach was necessarily responsible for his side not winning, in fact they had a wonderful opportunity to have scored a third which may well have closed the game out, he was highly critical of the referee for allowing a number of challenges to go unpunished.

In addition he felt the Royals' equaliser in added time should have been ruled out when keeper Billy Fleet was knocked into the net by a number of opponents follow-

The game had started so well for the Bees who boasted nine players under 20years of age, something Annetts was quick to confirm was mainly through ability and not unavailability.

They took the lead when Josh Hull glanced captain Luke King's free kick into the top corner, before they increased their lead on the half hour when Hull played a superb ball into the path of Josh Hunter who ran on to beat the keeper.

It was at this stage that the Royals changed tactics, and they became very physical in their approach which coincided with getting a goal back before the

Their chances had been limited to the odd occasion when they got round the back of the Bees defence, but they were thrown a lifeline when not for the first time this season, Bridport were caught in possession in their last third of the pitch.

This time it was Nathan Storey who lingered instead of clearing, and when he was robbed it gave Paul Ford the opportunity to run on and beat Fleet in the home

Whether it was a deliberate tactic to use strong arm tactics on the young Bees is unclear, but the second half became a war of attrition for the hosts as the referee failed to penalise the Royals for a number of heavy challenges, whilst his assistants failed, or were advised by the ref, to only flag for offsides and throw-ins.

As a result several Bridport players received injuries for which no free kick was

Annetts recalled three of the worst occasions. "Josh Hull was running clear on goal when he was elbowed in the face in a clear act to impede and hurt him which warranted a straight red card.

"The ref may say he was unsighted, but I know the assistant saw it because he was stood next to me.

"Then Ashley Walkey was brought down with a tackle from behind that left six stud marks on the back of his leg. Before Hull was subjected to an aerial challenge from behind with such force it left him con-

"On top of that Billy Fleet was clattered by a number of their players when the last minute corner that resulted in the equaliser was delivered under the cross-

He was keen to point out however that he had not been looking for extra protection because of his young side, or that inhe was blaming the referee necessarily for the result, particularly as Henry Davey had a great chance to make it 3-1 early in the second half, but unfortunately skied it over the top from close

"We didn't play as well after the interval, but if their defender had been sent off for the foul on Josh Hull we might have had an advantage.

"My lads don't need extra protection, I'm iust asking the official to referee the game as it should be. I know as a former referee that they have bad games, and I think they should acknowledge that."

"Despite it being just about the worst refereeing display I have seen at Bridport, I thought my side gave a very disciplined performance in light of the treatment they

But it was the visitors who went ahead when Taundry stepped up to curl a free-kick around the wall and in off the upright.


