Dorchester's own radio station on its way

DORCHESTER is to get its own FM and online community radio station.

It is expected to be broadcasting in the first half of next year from an office at the Little Keep off Bridport Road – with an internet service likely to be available in February.

The licence regulator OFCOM has given permission to broadcast to Ridgeway Community Radio and congratulated the group on its successful application.

Andy Worth of Ridgeway Community Radio said: "It's really exciting that we will add to the radio scene in Dorchester. Part of our job will be to go into the community to cover concerts and civic events and suchlike, so folk who can't get out can join in. We will cover health, mental care, and other issues that concern all of us at some time. Music of all types will play its part, as will home grown radio drama.

"Anyone who would like to be a part of this wonderful opportunity to grow our community should get in touch soon so we can plan ahead. Our Little Keep office and studios are wheelchair friendly at ground level and you don't have to be a presenter, there are plenty of other things to do. We are looking for financial support in the

form of sponsorship and donations and if anyone can help it will be most welcome."

Mr Worth and the team behind the application are largely drawn from the Ridgeway hospital radio group and between them have decades of experience. He can be contacted on 07787 123927.

The new service is not expected to rival commercial broadcasters, Wessex FM, or the BBCs part-time opt-out of Southampton-based BBC Radio Solent.

Funding for the project, which will be aimed at the over 50s, will come from the community and

fund-raising events will be needed to get the station on the air and to keep its volunteer team running.

The project has the backing of Dorchester Town Council, and the Arts Development Company, which is also based at the Little Keep.

Mike Hoskin, CEO of the The Arts Development Company said: "We are delighted to be part of the launch of this exciting new service for Dorchester. Our role is to bring organisations together for the good of the community, and we're looking forward to launching our own arts programme on the station in the New Year."

In the Ofcom statement awarding the licence it says: "The applicant group has its roots in a local hospital radio station, and members have considerable relevant experience, for example in radio broadcasting and engineering, journalism, fundraising and training volunteers. It has studio equipment in place, as well as some secured pre-launch funding.

Ofcom considered that the applicant had demonstrated its ability to maintain the service. Group members have experience of delivering a radio service to people aged over-50, catering to their tastes and interests, and broadening radio choice in the area. Ofcom considered that the applicant had good experience of community engagement, and has many links and partnerships in place which will help it deliver social gain to its target community.

Ridgeway Community Radio is a not for profit Community Interest Company run by volunteers.

Colin Varndell's talk, in aid of hedgehog conservation, does not shy away from the negative impact of modern life and a few images are distressing, but his talk includes advice on what people can do to help this much-loved garden visitor.

The Hedgehog Predicament' is on Wednesday, November 29th, 7pm at the Dorford Centre, Top o' Town, Dorchester. The audience will also be given an update on the Dorset Mammal Group's countywide initiative to create hedgehog friendly communities. The DMG's hedgehog project leader, Susy Varndell, has created a growing network of towns and villages throughout Dorset committed to offsetting the rapid decline of hedgehogs. By working collaboratively and taking relatively simple measures such as leaving spaces under gates for hedgehogs to circulate, and providing water, local communities can make a real difference as to whether 'their' hogs survive. Dorchester is part of the network and the evening will round off with Linda Poulsen giving a brief update on Hedgehog Friendly Dorchester and some of the issues confronting our local hogs.

In one day, 13 reports were made to Dorset Police from residents, primarily in the north and east of the county.

Detective Inspector Neil Wright, Force Volume Crime Unit, said: "I urge residents to be aware of this trend affecting Dorset. Tell your loved ones, your neighbours and your colleagues.

This is a scam. HMRC will never ask you for iTunes vouchers or anything else similar as payment for unpaid tax.

Archaeological digging begins in Dorchester's Fairfield car park

THE Dorchester retail proposals for the town centre are underway, with the masterplan being drafted. West Dorset District Council says that each element of the masterplan is being carefully considered and appraised.

A council spokesperson said: "We value and respect Dorchester's history and heritage. While looking to the future, we would also seek to protect Dorchester's history.

"Following discussions with archaeology experts, West Dorset District Council has commissioned some excavation work on the Fairfield Car park site. This will further explore any archaeological interest that may exist there. The excavations, carried out by archaeological firm 'Context One' will involve carrying out excavations to sample the site."

The trenches are located at four sites in the car park. These sites have been chosen with the advice of the county archaeologist to complement the previous seven sites dug in 2009. The dig has been arranged in order to minimise the impact on parking and Dorchester market.

A mechanical excavator will dig below the surface, and any layer of archaeology underneath will then be hand dug. Any archaeological interest will then be recorded and potentially taken for review. The results of this will inform future work on the

Barriers were put in place this week at the sites, across Fairfield long stay car park, with the excavation works beginning on Tuesday. The council expects the work, including re-surfacing the trenches, to take up to three working days per site, over the course of about three weeks.

A field of purple for Damers School

ROTARY members have planted purple crocus corms around the grounds at the new Damers First School in Dorchester.

Poundbury Rotary Club decided to play its part in Rotary's international campaign to eradicate polio by obtaining 5,000 crocus corms, and planting them to celebrate the global campaign.

The school has been developing outside areas for the children to enjoy, and the purple crocus fields will add a great deal of colour in 2018.

Poundbury Rotary Club members, supported by members from the Casterbridge Rotary and even one from Basingstoke Rotary were joined by parents, children and teachers from the school.

The school organiser, Edd Moore, who is also a Poundbury Rotarian, organised the morning's efforts, completed in just an hour and a half. Catherine Smith, the head teacher, organised coffee, tea, and biscuits for

the planters.
For more than 30 years, Rotary and its members have been committed to fighting to eradicate polio across the world. In that time the number of polio-

has dropped from 125 to just three, with over 2.5 billion children receiving vaccinations.

With eradication now closer than ever, Rotary International in Great Britain and Ireland's latest campaign, Purple4Polio, is designed to unite communities to engage in activities as part of the final push to eradicate polio for

working with the Government of India will set about the task, usually to be completed in a day. Each child who is vaccinated gets a purple stamp put on their finger similar to the shape of a purple crocus.

500 new homes at Crossway get the green light from councillors

PLANS for up to 500 new homes at Crossways have been unanimously agreed by West Dorset councillors.

Developer C&G Properties has been given initial permission for 99 homes, a doctors' surgery and village hall, along with outline permission for 401 further homes.


There have been fears that the village will not cope with the extra homes and will need to expand the village school and the middle school at Puddletown.

Once completed the development could bring an extra 1,200 people to Crossways, a former RAF wartime airfield, where housing schemes were started in the 1970s to meet growing demand in the Dorchester and Weymouth area.

West Dorset District Council approved the plans for south of Warmwell Road on the condition that developers made an "education contribution of £2,722,212" as well as contributions towards road improvements.

The education contribution will be used by Frome Valley First School in the village and St Mary's at Puddletown.

More than a third of the new homes have been designated as



"affordable housing"

Planning chairman Cllr Ian Gardner said: "We're pleased that we've been able to approve another large development specified in our local plan.

"Once completed, this site will provide much-need open market and affordable housing, as well as community facilities such as a new village hall and doctors' surgery."

Included in the scheme, on farmland, will be two pumping stations and large areas of managed open space and 2.5 hectares for 'employment use'.

The scheme covers a total area of 44 hectares and will see homes built to the east of the Hybris

Business Park and south of Summer Farm.

An expected 131,000 tonnes of sand and gravel will be excavated from the site during building work.

Sport England objected to the plan, claiming there are insufficient sports facilities on the site.

DORSET County Hospital has recruited two doctors who have returned to their home county after studying medicine.

Dr Anna Hope and Dr Jessica Davey have joined the hospital as part of the annual intake of foundation doctors, to complete two years of training following their graduation from medical school. The foundation doctors complete ongoing assessment during their time at the hospital, as well as completing an e-portfolio and an assessment at the end of each year.

At any one time the hospital has 55 foundation doctors; 30 foundation year one and 25 year two, who rotate through a range of specialties. They are supported by Dr Adeel Ghaffar, Consultant Physician and Foundation Programme Director, and Audrey Ryan, who is the Associate Director of Medical Education.

Dr Anna Hope grew up in Osmington, and attended sixth form at Thomas Hardye School in Dorchester. She was the first person in her family to attend university; attending Newcastle University which has been training generations of doctors at its medical school since 1834.

Dr Hope said: "I enjoyed my time at Newcastle, and it was great to work with a different patient demographic, and to understand the challenges of delivering healthcare in areas of social deprivation. From my experiences of hospitals in the North East, it seemed that smaller hospitals tended to be friendlier – in the larger hospitals sometimes the senior staff were less approachable. This was one of the reasons I wanted to come back to DCH; I wanted to work in a smaller, friendly hospital with a real sense of community."

with a real sense of community."

Dr Jessica Davey attended Wey Valley School before moving to Thomas Hardye School for sixth form. Dr Davey said: "Before I went to sixth form I wasn't really aware of medicine as a career, it was only talking to friends whose parents were medics that I understood that becoming a doctor was a realistic career choice for me." Although the competitiveness of applying for a place at medical school was daunting, Jessica was successful and was in the first generation of her immediate family to go to university. She attended the Peninsula Medical School, undertaking training in Exeter, Plymouth and Cornwall. She said: "I had heard very good things about DCH – I was keen to work in a small hospital, and when I heard the feedback from other doctors who had trained at DCH, I knew it was where I wanted to undertake my training"

Flats plan proceeding but will they be 'affordable'?

SO-CALLED 'affordable' homes being planned for the site of tennis courts in Dorchester town centre will still need an income of more than £30,000 - well above the

The one-bed flats are expected to be available for between £90,000 and £100,000 – using the town council owned tennis court plot in the corner of the Trinity Street car park, a site which is surrounded by trees and backs onto the Walks, at the edge of the Borough

At least 20 flats are being considered for the site – according to a public meeting held in the Corn Exchange last week.

The Dorchester Area Community Land Trust (DACLT) , which is behind the development says that good progress is being made – but are still unable to say when work might start on building the new homes

Those attending the meeting heard that a feasibility study is being planned prior to depositing a planning application to West Dorset District Council. The flats will be made available to those

under 35 living or working in the town who have a single, or combined income of £30,000.

Children's home under threat of closure

STAFF at Maumbury House Community Home in Dorchester, have been told that the county council may seek to close and dispose of the

Up to 30 jobs could go at the house which is Dorset's only home for children with emotional and behavioural difficulties.

The matter is to be discussed by the council cabinet next month and all options were being considered. A council spokesman said: "The county coun-

cil has a responsibility to consider whether it can provide sufficiently for looked-after chil-

"This includes fostering and other types of residential arrangements, based on the specific needs of the children.

"In this context, the review of Maumbury House residential children's home forms part

Unison, which represents public sector workers, said some children were already living in guest houses following the closure of another home.

Unison branch secretary Amanda Brown said: "We are already seeing the fallout of this.We have young people staying in bed and breakfast, in hotels, in holiday homes, supported by the staff that were in the West End House that was closed a couple of weeks ago.

'We are seeing out-of-county placements rising and they are a huge cost and it alienates the young people from their communities, their schools, their family and friends. It's an ill conceived idea."

However, safeguarding councillor Steve Butler said: "Dorset County Council is submitting a paper to its meeting of cabinet members on December 6th which will outline the various

"At this point in time all the options are being kept open and will be considered.'

In July, Maumbury House, which provides long-term placements for up to five young people - was rated inadequate by an Ofsted inspec-

THERE were 14 good reasons for local people to celebrate this week following the handover of the final phase of affordable new Stonewater homes in Poundbury's North East Quadrant.

The event marks the social housing provider's completion of a five-year housebuilding programme which has helped to deliver 72 homes in Poundbury for low-cost rent and affordable shared ownership. Financed bv Stonewater, the properties were developed in partnership with West Dorset District Council, The Duchy of Cornwall and regional contractors CG Fry & Son and Morrish Builders.

Poundbury is a 400-acre mixed-use urban extension to the western edge of Dorchester which has been designed, under the direction of HRH The Prince of Wales, as a walkable, sustainable community which gives priority to people rather than cars. It houses around 3,000 local people in a mix of rental and shared-ownership homes on land owned by the Duchy of Cornwall. One in three Poundbury homes is affordable housing. The North East Quadrant is the third phase of the Duchy development which, when completed in 2022, will provide a mix of 505 new homes, commercial premises, a public park and community facilities. By 2025, with the addition of the North West Quadrant, Poundbury will expand to

Stonewater's most recently completed mini-scheme in the North East Quadrant offers eight three-bedroom houses and one two-bedroom coach house for affordable rent, and four three-bedroom houses and one two-bedroom coach house for lowcost shared ownership. Built by local contractors Morrish Builders, the energy-efficient properties, some with private gardens, are within easy reach of Poundbury's public transport, local schools, shops, services and leisure facilities. The community also has its own garden allotments and cycle routes to nearby Dorchester.

"We're delighted to have completed this significant affordable housebuilding programme in with the support of The Duchy of Cornwall, the council and our construction partsaid Jonathan Layzell, Stonewater's Executive Director for Development. "With second-home ownership and wealthy incomers inflating the housing market in the Dorchester area, it's becoming extremely difficult for local people particularly young families – to afford a place to live in the local community. We hope our Poundbury homes are helping to address this problem and that this most recently completed Stonewater development will provide 14 local families with a fantastic home of their own, close to their family and friends this ChristThis latest Stonewater housing scheme has provided six local apprentice placements in a variety of roles, including carpentry and bricklaying, throughout the construction.

Ben Murphy, Estate Director for the Duchy of Cornwall, says: "The Duchy of Cornwall is committed to delivering a vibrant mixed-use community in Poundbury with a wide range of high quality housing to meet local housing need, and we are proud to deliver 35 per cent affordable housing for people and families on the local housing register. I am delighted that Stonewater has managed to provide six local apprentice placements throughout the construction of these magnificent properties, helping meet two of the key principles of Poundbury, to create local jobs and to support traditional building and craftsmanship."

Councillor Tim Yarker, West Dorset District Council's Portfolio Holder for Housing, says: "It is fantastic that Stonewater has managed to build so many high quality, affordable homes on this one site in the last five years. Affordable housing makes an essential contribution to the sustainability of the local community and assists in fulfilling local

housing need.

"I'd like to thank Stonewater for their contribution, and look forward to working with them in future developments."





Fears for the future in areas of outstanding natural beauty

RESEARCHERS fear Dorset's Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty are under threat by the growing housing demand in the county.

Thirty-one areas in Dorset have been named in a report published this week that highlights a sharp rise in housing applications over the past five years.

Guidelines state that major planning permissions should be refused except in 'exceptional circumstances'

Richard Burden, from an AONB partnership in the south west, said there is a contradiction in what the government says Dorset needs to prioritise:

'There's a fundamental conflict that Government has said - since 1949 these Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty should be conserved and enhanced. But at the same time they're saving we've got to build houses, and of course there's a conflict between providing houses and preserving your best landscapes.'

The report was commissioned by the National Association for Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty and the Campaign for the Protection of Rural

Mr Burden added: "Responses to a government consultation document Planning for the Right Homes in the Right Places raises the issue that building homes in areas of great landscape beauty will tend to attract more buyers rather than depress prices. Any reduction in house prices might measure not the benefit of extra supply, but the damage to the attractiveness of the area.

David Dixon and associates Neil Sinden and Tim Crabtree researched and compiled An Independent Review of Housing in England's Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty (2012-2017) and they note "unprecedented growth" in the number of new houses approved in several AONBs as being a response to the country's growing need for housing. Planning for the Right Homes in the Right Places suggested a total annual housing need

across the country of 266,000 homes. But paragraph 116 of the National Planning Policy Framework states that major planning permissions in AONBs should be refused, except in 'exceptional circumstances' and where it can be demonstrated that the particular development is in the pub-

Despite this, the CPRE's report highlights the "increasing concern among LPAs about refusing proposals for housing development on AONB grounds alone".

Additionally, developers are becoming increasingly confident that they can secure permission from LPAs, while AONBs are seen as attractive locations for building that attracts high returns. Appeal successes, however, did decline over the period.

The research also found that there is a significant lag in the provision of housing, with up to 25 per cent of the houses approved in AONBs over the five years not yet built


The CPRE has stated that unless the government and local authorities take action now, more beautiful landscapes will be lost forever. It has recommended that all AONBs are given the statutory right to be consulted for major development proposals in their area.

Emma Marrington, CPRE senior rural policy campaigner, said: "While CPRE advocates the building of the right homes in the right places, AONBs are not the right place. On top of this, current development in AONBs shows little evidence that what's built will actually help solve the housing crisis, which is more to do with affordability than lack of

On a positive note, the researchers found that many AONB teams, working with local communities and landscape specialists, make small scale housing schemes work alongside the delivery of the AONB ethos. The report states: "Achieving the right site selection, layout and design for housing in AONB areas is critical to delivering the high quality, locally distinctive homes that enhance landscape character in AONB areas."

AONB directors say the purposes of AONB designation are to conserve and enhance natural beauty, and that these areas are a limited and dimin-

ishing resource.



Weymouth man wants to raise epilepsy awareness

A WEYMOUTH man living with epilepsy is calling for more awareness of the condi-

Gavin Roberts underwent major surgery in a bid to improve his quality of life.

He's aksing people to donate to charities such as Epilepsy Action.

Gavin says people's lives are often at risk and more funding could make a difference:

"We need more research into finding a cure to reduce the number of deaths and cases who need surgery."

Epilepsy is a common condition that affects the brain and causes frequent seizures caused by bursts of electrical activity in the brain that temporarily affects how it works.

The condition can start at any age, but usually begins either in childhood or in people over 60. It's often lifelong, but can sometimes get slowly better over time (source: NHS).

Seizures can affect people in different ways, depending on which part of the brain is involved.

Symptoms can include:

- uncontrollable jerking and shaking - called a "fit"
- losing awareness and staring blankly into space
- becoming stiff
- strange sensations such as a "rising" feeling in the tummy, unusual smells or

tastes, and a tingling feeling in your arms or legs

collapsing

Gavin says it's vital that people get to know more about the condition.

"If people know what to do during a seizure that can help so many people.

Here's what to do if you see someone having a seizure or

- don't panic
- move them away from anything that could cause injury - such as a busy road or hot cooker
- · cushion their head if they're on the ground loosen any tight clothing

around their neck - such as a collar or tie, to aid breathing when their convulsions

- stop, turn them so that they're lying on their side stay with them and talk to
- them calmly until they have recovered • note the time the seizure
- starts and finishes You don't necessarily have to call an ambulance but you should dial 999 if:
- it's the first time someone has had a seizure
- the seizure lasts for more than five minutes
- the person doesn't regain full consciousness, or has a series of seizures without regaining consciousness

Carers can get extra visiting time in hospital

CARERS can now spend more time alongside loved ones in Dorset's community hospitals, thanks to a new scheme.

Dorset HealthCare is introducing a 'carer's passport' system, giving people hospital access outside of regular visiting hours and providing vital extra support to patients as and when they need it.

The "passport" was piloted at hospitals in Weymouth, Portland and St Leonards, near Ringwood, last year. Initially open to carers of people with dementia, it proved so successful it is now being rolled out to all 11 community hospitals in the county.

These include Bridport Hospital, Portland Hospital, the Westhaven Hospital at Weymouth and the main hospital in the town.

The scheme is now open to anyone who cares for a relative, partner or friend with on-going physical or mental health problems.

Under the system, carers identify themselves on arrival at the hospital and are given a badge, or 'passport', which allows them to stay beyond regular visiting hours – providing reassurance and additional help for the person they are caring for.

Hospital staff welcome carers throughout the day and into the evening, though overnight stays will be at the discretion of ward nurses.



Mary Karchel, who lives near Sherborne, was the main carer for her late husband Peter, who had Parkinson's Disease. Last year, he spent the final months of his life at the Yeatman Hospital, where Mary was able to visit him as often as she wished

"The hospital staff involved me in the care, invited me to give my opinions and at every junction would inform me of any changes in care or things they would like to do," she said.

"I could go in at any time – day or night, it didn't matter – and that was a great support in looking after Peter.

"I used to visit him in the afternoons but he was often asleep and l couldn't chat to him. So a nurse would often call me in the morning and say: 'he is awake now – come and stay as long as you like'.

"We had the most wonderful help and care."

The carer's passport idea was sparked by John's Campaign, a national initiative founded in late 2014 following the death of dementia patient Dr John Gerrard.

His daughter Nicci faced restricted visiting access during his final days, and began campaigning for more access for carers, a move backed by NHS England.

Julia Jones, co-founder of John's Campaign, said: "It's ag to have all of Dorset Health-

thrilling to have all of Dorset Health-Care's hospitals making this offer to carers, and we hope it will encourage more hospitals around the UK to get on board with our campaign."

Pupils become eco champions of the next generation

POUNDBURY'S only school has joined in the Refill scheme which aims to help reduce the number of single use plastic bottles.

Those who sign up to the scheme agree to fill individual's water bottles for free, encouraging people to have a reusable water bottle rather than reaching for a disposable plastic

The project is locally being run by Litter Free Coast and Sea, who have been working with Damers First School Eco Club, and Dorset County Council Sustainable Schools to get Poundbury refilling.

Charlie Wild, Litter Free Coast & Sea Project Officer, explains: "Refill is a great way to get people aware of reducing their single use plastic. It's also great from a health aspect, encouraging people to drink more water. We've found that a lot of businesses already offer this as a service, and many are keen to promote what they are already doing. Refills are free, but we often find people purchasing something else like cake or coffee at the same time. For businesses, it helps reduce their rubbish and recycling, whilst showing customers that they have an invested interest in the local environment.'

Damers First School got involved after being inspired by National Recycling Week in September, during which the school held a special recycling assembly and all children took part in learning about the impact of waste in the environment. Four children had the chance to go to London to meet Mark Janovich, CEO of Delphis Eco who launched the first 100 per cent UK Post-Consumer Recycled Bottle. They also had the chance to meet Prince Charles's Sustainability Officer at Clarence House, who spoke about Prince Charles's Plastic Ocean work. Edd Moore, Eco Club coordinator, said: "From all this the children wanted to do their bit locally to help cut

down on the use of plastic that can cause so much harm to the environment and marine

The Eco Club wrote to local businesses in Poundbury, explaining about the Refill scheme, and why it was important to get involved. After one afternoon, they had signed up 18 businesses, with more wanting to get involved since.

ficer at Dorset County Council, said: "This brilliant scheme will make a real difference locally and to the environment. It just shows what a group of confident and knowledgeable children can achieve. They are just the sort of champions the world needs, and a great example of an Eco-School working in the wider community to make a difference.

There are now over 100 Refill stations in Dorset, ranging from venues such as cafes and coffee shops, to a publishing company and estate agents.

Charlie Wild said: "Single use plastic bottles are still one of the most common items of litter we find on litter picks and beach cleans. It is a simple switch that will make a big differboth here in Dorset, and further afield.

Each business taking part in the scheme displays a 'Refill here' blue sticker in their window to show customers it is possible to ask for

This year's festivities will be held on Saturday, December 2nd. Children are invited to join in a Christmas lanternmaking workshop at the Baptist Church Hall starting at 3pm, or to bring along their pre-made creations for the annual

lantern competition parade.

Judging of lanterns will be held after the workshop at 4.30pm and the parade, including Father Christmas and Lyme Regis Majorettes, will set off down Broad Street at 5.15pm with the street lighting up as it goes. 


Boat Building Academy

IT'S BEEN a busy year at the Boat Building Academy on Monmouth Beach. They've exhibited students boats at Country File Live at Blenheim Palace, the Southampton Boat Show and London Craft Week. They gave a talk and workshop on boat building in the inspirational surroundings of Messums Wiltshire. Television cameras visited for an episode of 'Escape to the Country' and Country Life was among the international magazines that published articles about the school on the beach in Lyme Regis. Students who finish the course in November are going to work at Spirit Yachts, Sunseeker and Peter Freebody & Co in Maidenhead, a group of four are setting up 'The Beautiful Boat Company' who will build not only boats but anything people want in wood. Yvonne says 'We're very proud of all the boats and furniture our students have built this year. But we're even prouder of the boat builders and furniture makers that the Academy has built.'

Property View The key to finding your perfect home

Clean up when selling your home

WITH the long winter evenings drawing out and the warmer weather on its way, now is often the time of year people start to consider moving house. But before you start searching for your next potential dream home you should first turn your attention to your own property.

Its not just inside that needs to look inviting: the first thing your buyer will see is the outside of your house. "Remember the exterior of the house," says Newnes. "Kerbside appeal is vital to get potential buyers through the door. A neat garden, clean windows, and a clean and tidy front door with a bell that works are all simple things that present a well maintained image. "Finally ensure you know specific details about the house, for example mention any relevant guarantees such as damp proof courses or double glazing. And what about the heating and water systems? If you have low fuels bills, have some handy to demonstrate this. It's definitely a selling point."

If all else fails, bake some bread or put a fresh pot of coffee on, advises Newnes. "It is usually the simplest and cheapest jobs that can have the most influence over the final sale. A vase of flowers or the smell of freshly brewed coffee doesn't cost the earth but can make a very positive impression."
