# Care workers face losing jobs over new contracts and pay conditions

HUNDREDS of low paid Dorset care workers employed by the council social care company, been Tricuro, have given notice.

The company has issued what is known as 'dismissal and re-engagement" notices to more than 350 staff who are unhappy about new terms and conditions which amount to a pay

The move has left many in tears and feeling helpless about what they should do.

Those who fail to sign the new contracts will lose their jobs.

Unison says many individuals could find themselves £2,600 a year worse off, mainly because of changes to weekend and bank holiday payments. The averreduction expected to be £800 a

Unison says the company, set up last year by Dorset, Bournemouth and Poole councils, said at the time that there would be no reduction in pay or conditions for staff as a result of the change.

The three councils, which own the company, have declined to comment on the current situation

Union officer Pete Challis says the latest move has "gone beyond

"If you received a letter which wants you to voluntarily agree to cut your own terms and conditions, and you've got eight days to agree; and if you don't agree you will lose your job, you would be very frightened - and that's precisely how many staff felt. We had members who were in tears."

He said that Unison is still trying to reach a solution but Tricuro has decided to end the discussions and issue the notices.

"Managers told staff that if they didn't agree to cuts in their pay and conditions they would be sacked...we have no doubt members felt compelled to sign because if they didn't they would lose their jobs.'

He said the company sent the letters out less than four hours after ending talks last week. Tricuro Managing Diconfirmed that the dismissal and re-engagement letters had been sent to around 350 staff who had not already voluntarily accepted the new terms.

She said the company was hoping not to dismiss any staff and was trying to help staff through the process "at this difficult time."

"This is a regrettable position for the company to be in, however, we now need to focus on long term financial sustainability growth."

Unison claims the should be company around £600,000 a year better off on its wages bill because of the changes.

Workers have until March 9th to accept the new contracts.

The company runs nine care homes, day centres in most of the county's bigger towns, offers a help at home service and employs around 1,600 full and part-time staff looking after around 7,000, mainly elderly,

She grew up in Kent where she worked for NPI, a life and pensions company, at The Judd School as a finance officer then for Kent Police in the criminal justice unit.

TELL us a bit about what your job involves...

### WHAT groups and activities does the centre offer?

The regular groups we have at the moment are: Harmony, Bridport Amateur Boxing Club, Bridport Musical Theatre, Bridport Young Performers Scholarship and B-Sharp.

Fisherman's Arms use the hall once a week and Charlie Bicknell runs aerial silks classes every Wednesday

Fizzy Boppers are there on Tuesdays 10am to 11am, which is high energy songs and dancing for nought to five-year-olds and Jelly Beans are there from 9.15am to 11.15am, a really well-attended playgroup for pre-schoolers

We also have a weekly Community Café on Fridays between 10am to 12noon which is an ideal meeting place. We are very family-friendly and affordable



and also offer free wifi and good coffee and cake just 50 pence.

# Jobs boost as Aldi comes to Chickerell Second petition

CHICKERELL will get a jobs boost with the opening of a new Aldi supermarket next year.

Around 50 posts will be required for the store when it opens at Link Road.

West Dorset District Council planners approved the application last week – giving Chickerell its first supermarket.

The application also had the backing of the town council which questioned whether the planned 1,250 square metre store was big enough.

The application includes an area for a café or restaurant, drinking establishment or hot food takeaway for land to the north of the proposed store.

DJ property owns the site where the store will be built.

Mickey Jones, chief executive of the company described the decision as "really good for the people of Chickerell."

He said there has been demand for a food store for years.

"It was great to see such support for Aldi's application to open a new store at Link Park, from so many local residents and business owners, but also from the Councillors at West Dorset District Council.

# Second petition to reverse dog beach ban order

DOG owners are continuing their campaign to increase the time that they can exercise their pets on Weymouth beach.

One online petition has now closed – but another has started.

The protestors say the borough council's decision to reduce the time that dogs can walk on the beach is unfair.

But the Borough says that their decision came after a public consultation which resulted in more people wanting to see the restrictions in place, than those who opposed the changes.

The new rules ban dogs from the main beach between Easter and October 31st.

The new petition is available online with paper copies at a number of businesses – including the Pavilion, Lookout Café, the Boot Inn and the Old Rooms.

It will be presented to the full meeting of the borough council on January 19th.

# New approach at mental health unit

NEW ways of working have eased tensions at a Weymouth mental health unit.

The Linden Unit, run by Dorset HealthCare at Westhaven Hospital, has become the first locally to complete a programme known as "Safewards".

It comprised of a set of 10 interventions designed to make the facility a safer place and boost morale.

Staff say it has helped to create a "feel good" atmosphere and reduce conflict between staff and patients.

The initiative has proved so

successful that a mental health hospital based in the Danish city of Randers sent a team of nurses and psychiatrists to see the benefits first hand.

The Linden Ward is a 15 bed, mixed sex admission and recovery unit for people suffering from various mental health issues.

The Safewards initiative is made up of 10 interventions which include setting mutual expectations, only using "soft" or positive words and mutual help.

The scheme has also seen the introduction of mobile distraction cabinets which contain items such as colouring books, calming putties and beads.

Said Linden Ward Manager Sarah Stuart: "We have been at the forefront of implementing Safewards across Dorset HealthCare since September 2014 and have become the first unit to fulfil all 10 models.

"We were delighted to welcome staff from the Regionspsykiatrien Randers, and they were impressed with how effective Safewards has proved from such a simple concept." Runa Sturlasson, Chief Psychiatrist of Regionspsykiatrien Randers, said: "The visit has been worth every minute. We have been inspired by the staff and the feel-good atmosphere across the unit.

"It was great to discuss the challenges we face and some of the laws which often hamper mental health back in Denmark, and sometimes prevent us achieving our goals. We are looking forward to sharing our new-found ways of working."

Staff at the Linden Unit have been invited to visit the Danish trust in the new year.





# Litter campaigners' anger at new waste disposal charges

THE decision to charge for disposing of some types of waste at household recycling centres in Dorset could be challenged in the courts.

Anti-litter campaigners say there has already been an increase in fly-tipping around the county since the charges were introduced.

The argument comes over the disposal of DIY waste, which the Dorset Waste Partnership has decided to charge for.

Apart from charges, those using local tips say they are angry at being searched by staff before they can dispose of rubbish - with bags being opened to check whether there are items which can be charged for.

A Department for Communities and Local Government spokesman said: "We're determined to boost recycling and that's why we've brought in legislation to stop councils charging residents for

"Guidance is clear that should include any household waste from DIY.'

"Councils can charge for disposal of construction and demolition waste at HWRCs. However, DIY waste generated by householders should be disposed of without a charge."

Dorset Waste Partnership is currently charging for the disposal of bricks, slates, tiles, rubble, paving slabs, concrete, ceramic toilets, sinks, pedestals and baths and glass from windows and

DWP say they believe that their charging policy complied with the law: "Waste from construction and demolition is not household waste, but industrial waste and so a charge can be imposed. Examples are rubble, concrete, bricks and soil from landscaping.

Dorset Waste Partnership say they will take up to two extra sacks of rubbish, left next to bin, on the first collection after Christmas Day with extra recycling being taken if left in residents' own boxes, with glass kept separate.



# Councillor hits out over lack of information on planned changes to local NHS services

WEST Dorset health campaigner Cllr Ros Kayes is calling for an explanation over the failure of the Dorset Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) to present to the public its plans for change in local NHS ser-

She says she has "grave disquiet over the failure of the CCG to present its detailed Sustainability and Transformation Plan (STP) [which sets out how they will address a list of national priorities as well as longer term challenges] to Dorset's Health and Wellbeing Board at its meeting on November 9th."

The board is largely made up of councillors and meets in public and she says this would have been an opportunity for the ideas to be tested in public. Cllr Kayes also claims that the CCG is failing in its

public duty to openly consult on its proposals to reduce the number of GP surgeries in the area. She said: "STPs have caused national controversy in

recent weeks, facing the accusation of being an underhand way of cutting health service budgets

### 'Underhand'

"Once again the CCG is being both underhand and devious in failing in its statutory duty to present the detailed proposals to the relevant local authority scrutiny

process. We all know that the devil is in the detail.

"It failed to present detailed proposals for the Primary Care Commissioning Strategy and Plan [which considers how services could be delivered differently to ensure they are sustainable] to the Health Scrutiny Committee at its September meeting and had its knuckles rapped at the November meeting which insisted that it brought the proposals to a Special Meeting on December 21st.

'The STP went to NHS England for approval at the end of October. It must have been in a complete and detailed form then. Why therefore was the document presented at the November 9th meeting only an out-

"This is another case of the CCG trying to pull the wool over the eyes of the elected representatives responsible for scrutinising them. They have questions to answer. They are clearly afraid of real scrutiny of their proposals and of the public reaction to them

I call upon the Health and Wellbeing Board to fulfil its function and follow the Health Scrutiny Committee by demanding that the STP in full is brought to a special meeting so that it can be scrutinised properly.
"I will be seeking for disciplinary action to be taken

in respect of Dorset CCG's flagrant disrespect for due

The Keep Our NHS Public Dorset campaign group have also blasted the CCG for not clearly and briefly spelling out what their proposals are in any one doc-

Instead their proposals to save £229million are spread across the STP, the Clinical Services Review [which sets out proposed changes to healthcare in Dorset] and the Primary Care Commissioning Strat-

The group is also calling on clarification on whether the STP is an outline summary or an approved docu-

A spokesperson said: "We are in a period of consultation over the Clinical Services Review and we hope that all decisions affecting the NHS in Dorset will be taken after this period.

"Closing hospitals and A&E departments is profoundly serious. Asking people in West Dorset to go to Bournemouth instead of Poole in life threatening situations is a matter of real concern.

'Threats to local services'

"We don't believe that the public are significantly aware of these threats to their local services or know whether their councillors support such closures and downgrades. Whilst consultations proceed, it is disconcerting to be told that plans have already been approved, especially if that is not the case.

In response to Keep Our NHS Public Dorset, a spokesperson for the Dorset CCG said: "The Clinical Dorset's Healthcare – clearly and simply sets out our proposals and recommendations for how services in Dorset could change in the face of a number of chal-

These include increased demand, staff shortages and a significant funding gap of around £158million within the next few years. The document states what is and isn't part of the review.

"The consultation, which launched on December 1st and runs until February 28th, has been quality assured by the Consultation Institute and has been the subject of rigorous national assurance from NHS England.

The Sustainability and Transformation Plan (STP) and the Primary Care Commissioning Strategy and Plan are strategic documents; therefore there is no requirement to consult on them. As we have been clear about, there are no plans to close GP practices and any suggestion that we do is inaccurate.

"We appreciate that the situation is complex and would ask people to visit the consultation website where the proposals and recommendations are explained in a variety of ways to suit the level of detail people require. This includes animations and short films along with more detailed documents. Whatever people's views on our proposals we want to hear

"If Keep Our NHS Public Dorset would like to discuss their concerns about the Clinical Services Review, Sustainability and Transformation Plan or the Primary Care Commissioning Strategy and Plan we would welcome the opportunity to meet with them and answer any questions they may have.

She said: "I had run before but was out of practice. I enjoy running because it makes me feel good. Plus I like to eat cake and after a good run, I can eat cake and not feel guilty!

"I've chosen British Heart Foundation as my charity because heart disease is common in my family. In August, I lost a close family member, who was only 45, to the disease and my dad is currently waiting for heart surgery."

Gail Pearson has run a marathon as well as a number of half marathons, but she is still really keen to support her home run and raise money for charity.

She said: "I have chosen to run for Macmillan Cancer Support as a close family member was supported by them before they passed away and they were a huge help."

Catriona added: "We support the communities we are based in as part of our work, but now we are asking the community to support us! A wave, or a 'hello' or a toot of your horn will let us know you are supporting our fund raising efforts."

The story is told from his hospital bed as he recovers from a brutal attack in a bus depot, and as he revisits incidents from his recent past.


As his memory slowly clears, the police, and the reader, can begin to unravel the mystery of who attacked him and why.





# New routes and marshals to improve next year's Ironman

A NEW cycle route and better marshalling and communication should avoid a repeat of the traffic problems which beset this year's Weymouth Ironman event.

It has been admitted for the first time that two companies, employed to marshal the route, pulled out at the last minute – compounding problems which already existed with missing road closure signs.

Many of those employed to marshall came from outside the area with little local knowledge.

Dorset County Council had failed to make sure the road closures were legal for which it has apologised.

A meeting at County Hall, part of which was held in private, should now result in a plan of action for the 2017 event with a final decision being made by the County Council Cabinet in January.

Race Director Alan Rose has already said that instead of a 100-mile route, the coming event will have a maximum route of 70 miles, which should mean any road closures being lifted by 10.15am.

After the meeting a county council spokesman said: "Moving forward the committee is eager to see strong and effective partnership working, leading to successful events for the benefit and prosperity of Dorset.

# Golden Years

Many of the 53% of grandmas and grandpas who only see their grandchildren once a year, or at special events, enjoy that rare meeting at Christmas and, not surprisingly, research suggests nearly two thirds (61%) of them are unhappy with their current level of input with their grandchildren.

"There are many grandparents who only get to see their grandchildren at Christmas, usually due to living many miles, even continents, apart," says Cari Rosen, editor of the social networking site for grandparents, Gransnet.

"We hear from many grandparents who find it heartbreaking that distance keeps them apart from their families for so much of the year, so when you do get the opportunity to be together, don't let the 'what ifs' and regrets ruin it.

"This can pile on even more pressure for everything to be 'perfect' on Christmas Day, so it's important to remember that enjoying your time together is all that matters.

### **GAME GRANNIES**

Although many grandparents would happily



spend Christmas time with their grandchildren watching festive TV, going for a walk to burn off Christmas dinner, or simply playing cards or other traditional games, today's kids are more than likely to want to play on their computer, tablet or mobile phone, especially if they got it for Christmas.

But that doesn't mean grandparents are necessarily left out of the picture.

"We have grans who have really got into things like Minecraft by playing or learning with their grandchildren, and our users have shared so many recommendations that we've put the best ones on one handy page," says Rosen.

"The idea that older people can't handle smartphones and tablets is a bit of a generalisation, and by no means always accurate.

"That said, they do love a board game too."

### **JUST BE TOGETHER**

Rosen warns those grandparents looking forward to seeing their grandchildren after a long time apart that they don't have to make Christmas a laugh-a-minute for the kids. Just spending time with them and helping them play with their new toys - if they let you - will be enough.

"We know from Gransnet discussions that Christmas can be fraught, especially if large families are confined to small spaces for long periods," she says.

"The intensity can be multiplied when there are grandchildren who you might not see that often. After all, if it's the only time you get to spend together it all has to be perfect, doesn't it? Well, actually, no."

She points out that quality time with grandchildren, especially little ones, can be messy, noisy and chaotic, and will still

be wonderful.

"There are few parents who won't thank you for offering to try out the new toys and games while they get a bit of downtime," she says.

"Then there are new books to read, kits to build - and deciding what to do with a mountain of uneaten turkey can involve everyone - an intergenerational Come Dine With Me turkey fest could be just what you're after."

# ON'T DRINK It's not worth the risk... AND DRIV

The festive season is now upon us and with it comes work nights out and an opportunity to catch up with friends and family. But for all too many, it's tempting to ruin the celebrations by driving home after a couple of drinks.

N THE last 50 years road casualties caused by drink driving have fallen dramatically, but in 2014, there were still 240 deaths due to drink driving – accounting for 14% of all road fatalities. By drinking and driving, you risk your life, those of your passengers and others on the road.

Any amount of alcohol affects your ability to drive.

### THE LAW

There are strict alcohol limits for UK drivers: In England, Wales and Northern Ireland, the legal alcohol limit for drivers is:

- 35 microgrammes of alcohol per 100 millilitres of breath
- 80 milligrammes of alcohol in 100 millilitres of blood
- 107 milligrammes of alcohol per 100 millilitres of urine

In Scotland (from 5 December 2014) the legal alcohol limit for drivers is lower at:

- 22 microgrammes of alcohol per 100 millilitres of breath
- 50 milligrammes of alcohol in 100 millilitres of blood
- 67 milligrammes of alcohol per 100 millilitres of urine.

However it is not possible to say how much alcohol you can drink and stay below the limit. The way alcohol affects you depends

- your weight, age, sex and metabolism (the rate your body uses energy)
- the type and amount of alcohol you're drinking
- what you've eaten recently
- · your stress levels at the time

So if you're driving, it's better to have none for



### **DRINK DRIVING**

- · Don't drink and drive, the only safe limit is none.
- · You can still be over the limit the morning after.
- · Drink and drug driving does cost lives.
- Get caught drink driving and you will be treated like any other criminal.
- A drink driving conviction will stay on your licence for 11 years.
- Program a phone number for a licensed taxi company into your mobile phone before you go out.
- · If you are caught drink driving you will be required to attend court where you could face a fine, be banned from driving or imprisoned.

### THE CONSEQUENCES

There are strict penalties - if you are convicted of drink driving, including:

- A minimum 12 month driving ban
- A criminal record
- · A hefty fine
- An endorsement on your license for 11 years

However, this list does not reflect the everyday consequences of being caught drink driving which can include:

- · Increase in car insurance costs
- Job loss
- Trouble getting in to countries like the USA
- · The shame of having a criminal record
- Loss of independence

The Institute of Advanced Motorists calculate that a drink drive conviction could cost between £20,000 - £50,000 as a result of fines, solicitors fees, increase in car insurance and

### Beware the morning after

You could be over the legal limit many hours after your last drink, even if it's the 'morning after'. Sleep, coffee and cold showers don't help to sober you up - time is the only way to get alcohol out of your system.

Alcohol affects everybody's driving for the worse. It creates a feeling of overconfidence, makes judging distance and speed more difficult and slows your reactions so it takes longer to stop

Options include agreeing on a designated driver, saving a taxi number to your phone, or finding out about public transport routes and times before you go out.

# Spoilt for choice for fast food

ARE you peckish on the pavement or do you fancy a snack on the street?

Well if you do then Weymouth and Portland is officially one of the worst places to be in the entire country for having fast food temptation put in your way.

It ranks fifth in Great Britain for the highest number of fast food outlets per head of the population with an overweight 100 outlets per 100,000 people according to Public Health England. The figures were published to highlight make it difficult for children to avoid slipping in to obesity which is now at crisis levels nationally.

PHE say more than one in five adults and children eat a takeaway meal at home at least once a week with more than one in three children overweight or obese by the time they leave primary school

That's an awful lot of chips, fat or sugar being converted into jelly bellies and fast food meals aren't even particularly cheap.

Decent home-cooked meals are a lot cheaper to produce but, like a proper amount of exercise each day, they require effort to make and people are notoriously lazy. So they opt for the fast meal fast food solution and you can see the heavy-weight results lumbering along every street in Weymouth and Portland. No wonder the NHS is struggling to cope with illnesses and diseases in overweight people. Physician heal thyself and people should give a lot more thought to their eating lifestyle.

### Merry Christmas!

ONE of my favourite Christmas carols is *God Rest Ye Merry Gentlemen*, but some seasonal shoppers have been getting a bit too merry!

Recent sights have included one inebriated gentleman getting his legs tangled in half a dozen rolls of Christmas wrapping paper because he was trying to carry all his shopping in one hand while holding a can of cider in the other!

And men need to watch out for women in tinselled Santa hats grabbing "liquid breaks" during their shopping by popping in to pubs for a quick Irish coffee. By the time they lurch out men are fair game for a few comments about how they stack up against Rudolph — and I'm not talking about his nose!

Of course, there are all the seasonal lures of mulled wine and sherry with a mince pie to top up shoppers' intakes of alcohol with many of the drinks offered during the day at Christmas markets, bazaars and fetes. The result is that some people are almost seeing double while carrying out their shopping round town. Still, I suppose these things are Santa try us!

## The latest in a long line of dangerous incidents

SOMEONE is going to be killed or seriously injured soon unless authorities take another look at Weymouth's Swannery Bridge junction with Abbotsbury Road.

The incident in question was just the latest in a string of near misses, incidents not just on show every day but available for anyone to watch every hour.

It is all about driver frustration, the huge amounts of time wasted by these useless traffic lights and the desperate – and illegal – lengths drivers are prepared to go to in their efforts to squeeze across before those lights turn red.

Unfortunately many drivers are just not making it in time and produce incidents such as the latest one I witnessed where a white 4x4 had only just come on to the junction at speed from Westwey Road when two lanes of traffic rumbled forward towards Swannery Bridge from Abbotsbury Road. Miracu-

lously the 4x4 somehow missed a number of vehicles.

Two points here. Firstly there can be no question the driver broke the law on "red" because he hadn't actually got more than a yard or two on to the junction when the Abbotsbury Road traffic began to move on "green".

But secondly – and much more dangerously – he committed to this manoeuvre at speed. I'd estimate he was doing close to 50mph. The limit here is only 30mph.

It means he knew he was borderline and deliberately speeded up to try and beat the lights to avoid another mind-numbing wait for them to change.

Police have warned that this traffic light system is generating "a Grand Prix mentality" with people roaring away when lights go green yet also speeding up when lights go amber as they approach. Someone may have to die to change things.

# It was just one of those weeks so you have to laugh ...

Victor Hugo once wrote "Laughter is the sun that drives winter from the human face" and the acclaimed author of Les Misérables could easily have been writing about my experiences over the last week.

You know the sort? One of those weeks, in which if you don't laugh you'll go mad (well, even more mad). I started the week off by tripping up the garden steps and onto my face (my chin now resembles a supermarket value pizza!) and things pretty much continued in the same vein throughout.

After fending off a barrage of banter from my colleagues about my gnarly appearance, I ventured down to Exeter's Northcott Theatre to see their Christmas production of Peter Pan. A semi-profes-

sional show, which sadly was more like the West End production of Peter Pan Goes Wrong than the heart warming family fairytale; such was the level of technical inadequacy.

Poor old Peter got

caught up in a window when he first tried to fly and had to be rescued by a burly stagehand. He then had to play the rest of the flying scene by jumping up and down on a bed, which was highly amusing for the audience, but not entirely what the director had in mind for the straight play.

I did feel sorry for the poor actor, but the continuous risk of misadventure is what makes live theatre so exciting. Having been part of numerous amateur productions, I know this only too well. In fact, I've endured some howlers. I once answered a phone onstage to a

fart sound effect and when I was in the Witches of Eastwick last year in Exmouth, I kicked a glass onto the front row of the audience.

The absolute classic has to be however, when a sofa imploded trapping four cast members within it. We were left stuck, in more ways than one.

I've seen lots of hilarious catastrophes in the West End too, including costume malfunctions, mid show cast changes and on one occasion, when I was watching my favourite musical Wicked, the witch failed to fly (I have seen the show twenty times, so I guess statistically it had to happen at some point).

Hardcore fans of the big shows love it when they witness mistakes and wear a 'no-fly' or a 'witch switch' as a badge of honour.

South West Trains seemed to be in on the

joke this week too, as my initial attempt to get ton the capital was thwarted by a signal failure (you've got to laugh!), which meant I managed to fit in another rehearsal for my next stage foray in Axminster and let's face it, on past form, I need as much practice

as I can get!
After yet another family funeral (2016 has been filled with bereavement both within the celebrity and my own world), I eventually made it to London and popped over to Soho to see my friend Richard Hadfield doing his first ever solo gig.

Up until earlier this year he was part of the musical theatre vocal group Collabro, which won Britain's Got Talent 2014

After interviewing Richard while he was in the band, I spent a lovely evening with the singer and his girlfriend at a Strictly Come Dancing party (he is hoping to appear on the TV show in the future) and our friendship blossomed from there.

His lovely girlfriend Roxy is a celebrity stylist and has recently been working with Harry Potter star, Daniel Radcliffe. We spent a fab afternoon chatting and eating pizza, while Richard filled the central London cabaret venue with some glorious swinging refrains.

# The new Audi TT TDI quattro

# The best of both worlds even in the worst of conditions

FUN, frugal and now driving all four wheels for optimal allweather performance - the ever-popular TT 2.0 TDI with its blend of compelling pace and level-headed economy is now also available with the reassurance of quattro drive. Coupe and Roadster versions of the new TT 2.0 TDI quattro will become available for UK ordering early in 2017 and will reach their first customers here next spring.

The new quattro-equipped duo will complement the existing front-wheel-driven TT 2.0 TDI ultra models, which will continue alongside them. Where these are equipped exclusively with six-speed manual transmission, the new 2.0 TDI quattro variants use a six-speed S tronic twin-clutch transmission without exception.

The quattro drive uses an electro-hydraulic multi-plate clutch to distribute the torque to both axles. In many everyday driving situations, it will direct the engine's power predominantly to the front wheels. Should traction decrease there, the clutch continuously redirects the torque to the rear within a few milliseconds.

At the limit, the quattro system operates in tandem with wheel-selective torque control, an intelligent software feature of the Electronic Stabilization Control (ESC). This makes handling even more fluid and stable thanks to targeted, accurately metered brake applications to the wheels on the inside of the bend. On low-friction surfaces, the permanent all-wheel drive system even allows safe, controlled drifts.

### quattro integrated into **Audi drive select**

The clutch management is in-

tegrated into the Audi drive select dynamic handling system which is a standard feature of all UK specification TT models. This allows the driver to select Comfort, Auto, Dynamic, Efficiency and Individual modes which modify the character of their TT. As well as governing the allwheel-drive system, Audi drive select influences throttle response, steering assistance and S tronic transmission shift points. It also integrates several optional modules such as the Audi magnetic ride adaptive damper control and the deluxe automatic air conditioning.

The compelling performance of the Audi TT stems from its combination of quattro drive and the refined flow of power from the four-cylinder diesel engine. Its 184PS output is combined with plentiful torque of 380 Nm (280.3 lb-ft) available between 1,750 and 3,250 rpm.

The common rail system injects the fuel through eight-hole nozzles at up to 2,000 bar. The high pressure paves the way for fine atomisation, making the combustion process efficient and low on emissions. The intercooler is located in the intake manifold module. Along with the compact design, this arrangement achieves short gas paths, effective control processes and therefore instantaneous response coupled with high efficiency.

The TT Coupé 2.0 TDI quattro S tronic accelerates from 0 to 62mph in 6.7 seconds and goes on to clock up a top speed of 145mph.The Roadster accomplishes the standard sprint in 7.0 seconds and continues to a top speed of 142mph. In the Coupé, the 2.0 TDI quattro S tronic achieves fuel consumption of 54.3mpg according to the NEDC measuring method,

which equates to 137 grams of CO2 per kilometre. For the TT Roadster, the figures are 52.3mpg and 142 g CO2 per kilometre.

Even before the introduction of the new 2.0 TDI quattro S tronic models, the world renowned quattro system was already the choice of one in

worldwide. Taking into account the newcomers the Audi TT portfolio now comprises seven engine/transmission variants, of which five are petrol versions. The many advantages of quattro drive can already be enjoyed in TT 2.0 TFSI 252PS and 310PS TTS models.
