

REVIEW

ABC Scope

Unlike another network's news department, which shall be nameless, the ABC News department does not go in heavily for full-page ads, women's-magazine style, in which they tell themselves how great they are. ABC News is, however, a fast, up-and-coming outfit which has recently up and come with a documentary series called *Scope* which is not only well worth your attention but is also one about which the network is legitimately entitled to congratulate itself.

Only a half hour in length, this show nonetheless purports to cover "the wide world of people and events." Furthermore, although it is broadcast every Wednesday, it does not tie itself to the week's news or even, necessarily, the "news" at all. Instead, it takes almost anything to be its dominion—from the Ecumenical Council to discotheques. It started the week after the election with a show called "Pain Is My Enemy," about an American Albert Schweitzer named "Doc" Cannon in the isolated mountains of Balsam Grove, N.C. Later, it did a

show called "The Gift," about a 48-year-old unsuccessful man named Preston Lewis, who had been a hospital orderly, a dishwasher, a bellhop and a janitor, but who once a year took the only job he really liked—being a Santa Claus. Both of these shows were written by Ernest Pendrell, and to say they were good is an understatement—they were great. Two scenes of "The Gift" still stand out in our mind. In one, Mr. Lewis is worried about being a good Santa Claus because he is so thin; in the other, we have the sound, still ringing in his ears as he walks through the park after his job is over, of the child's voice saying "I love you, Santa Claus."

Two very different shows will show you the scope of *Scope*. One was a show called "It's a Mad, Mad, Mad, Mad Football Town"—the story of Massillon, Ohio. In other towns kids may want to grow up to be President. In Massillon, apparently, they don't. They want to play on the Massillon High first team and they apparently never grow up—a feat which is made considerably easier by the fact that every newborn baby receives at birth, courtesy of the local Booster Club, a football. Our only criticism of this show is that, at the end, ABC's Dave Jayne seemed to catch the disease—we can only hope he boots it.

The other show was "Churchill at 90: An Appreciation by Richard Burton." Here Burton managed, in what seemed a fairly casual conversation with ABC's Bill Sheehan, to convey to us with taste the overwhelming qualities of Churchill's "stupendous personality." By a remarkable analysis of what he called Churchill's "peculiar gift of overwriting and underspeaking," Burton also managed to leave us—as after one of Sir Winston's own speeches—with a feeling of love and of thanks for the privilege of living in the same age with Churchill.

■ Now it's unanimous. All three networks will have feature film programs next season. CBS finally decided to join ABC and NBC and present movies during prime evening time—which adds to our growing suspicion that television may not really be an entirely original art form.

Still, it was time for CBS to face the fact that an assortment of good, fair and awful old movies makes better business sense than mediocre situation comedies and adventure series.

■ And while a case could be made for the profits to be earned by successful comedy series, there is so much planning and risking of capital and pleasing of sponsors involved in original programming that it's much easier to buy old films and peddle spot announcements to pay for them.

There is a danger, of course, that movies may violate the principle: "Never let the show be more interesting than the commercials." But that can be fixed by interrupting the movie often enough so that there's no chance of serious audience involvement.

■ We are, however, concerned about two aspects of the trend toward more feature films during prime time. The first is the serious effect on studios that turn out television programs. Each two-hour movie replaces from two to four television shows, and unemployment may result. Unless, that is, the studios get wise and start turning out full-length movies that they can sell to television in five years.

Then, too, there is the matter of whether the networks will be able to use the movies currently being produced. "A House Is Not a Home" and "Carpetbaggers" and "Kiss Me, Stupid" and the others may not turn out to be tasteful programming for living rooms. Or will we all be so brain-washed that five years from now we'll accept *anything* on our screens?

deeds of derring-do, to prove himself some day in the eyes of his comrades.

Larry Cohen, the 29-year-old TV writer and former NBC page who created *Branded*, says, "My intellectual concept of the show is that it's like a Shakespearean tragedy. You must have a great man to experience true tragedy. That's why I like Chuck Connors so much in this part. He's so big—he's the tallest underdog in the West. I think the new trend in television is the character in a situation week after week, instead of a character like Lawrence Preston in *The Defenders* getting someone else out of a situation every week but not being directly involved himself. *The Fugitive* broke the ice, but this isn't like *The Fugitive*—because Connors isn't chasing a one-armed man."

The presentation for *Branded*, written by Cohen, describes the central character as "a man mistakenly, unfairly hated and persecuted—a man who must fight to destroy the image of dishonor that follows him."

*He was innocent,
Not a charge was true.
But the world would never know—
BRANDED.*

Says Connors, formerly of *The Rifleman*, briefly of *Arrest and Trial*, "I wanted to do everything possible to make this character different from *The Rifleman* character, so I even changed my hair. I decided to keep it short and let my sideburns grow, and have it long in the back. I wanted to look military—I'm a West Point man in this show. That's why I lost weight, too. I'm 12 pounds lighter than when I was doing *The Rifleman*. I do a regular course of exercises and watch my diet—I just eat a little Roquefort cheese and

some yogurt for lunch. I weigh 204 now."

According to Daily Variety, "Mid-season series starters are jinxed, the records show, although there have been exceptions. . . . That's why production companies usually avoid a first-of-the-year starter." But this does not disturb Harris Katleman, executive vice president in charge of West Coast operations for Goodson-Todman, producers of *Branded*. "Being between Disney and *Bonanza* seems an ideal time slot," says Katleman. "I think we can lick the midseason jinx at this particular slot."

"He'll take that half sword with him wherever he goes," says writer-creator Larry Cohen. "A Western hero needs a novel weapon, but this sword fits the character—it's not superimposed like Chuck's rifle in *The Rifleman* or Steve McQueen's sawed-off gun in *Wanted—Dead or Alive*."

Connors, who owned only "a small piece" of *The Rifleman*, says he is "equal partners" with Goodson-Todman in *Branded* and thus stands to share in proceeds from the sale of toy half-swords if the program catches on.

At one time there were 29 Western programs on television. *Branded* is the first half-hour Western since *Have Gun—Will Travel* went off the air two seasons ago. Brooklyn-born Chuck Connors, says, "There'll always be a place for Westerns on television, because they're Americana and you can't throw America out of America. The Western is the American fairy tale."

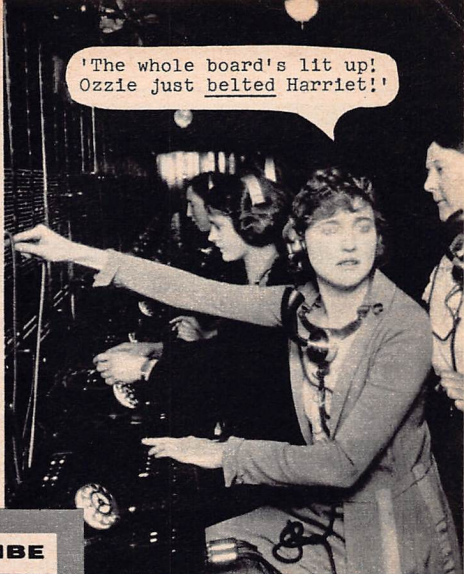

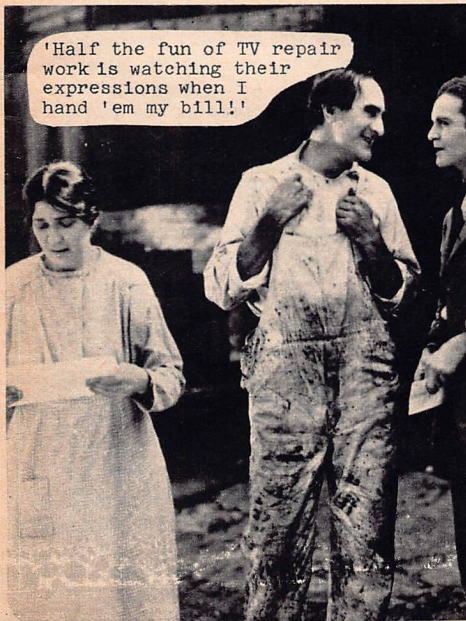

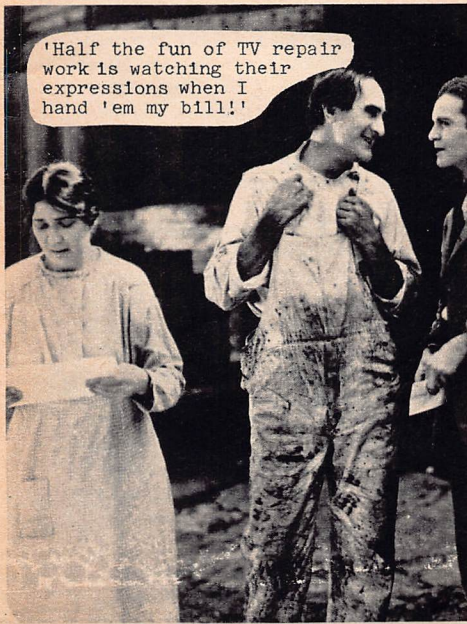

WHAT DOES TELEVISION

By Harold B. Clemenko

People are watching television more than ever before. That is the simple, hardly noted fact.

Sgt. Joe Friday comes and goes. Milton Berle enters and departs. Everything—Congressional investigations, a battalion of clinkers, a few billion words of critical commentary—is thrown at TV, but . . . well, look:

Back in 1953, the average television home kept its set on four hours and 40 minutes a day. Today, long after the forgotten "novelty period"—when folks jokingly wondered what they used to do with their leisure time before they gave it all to TV—the average television home has its set going five hours and 25 minutes a day—17% more time than in 1953, and the largest annual average in the history of TV. (At one point last winter, reports Nielsen, the figure got up to six hours, 20 minutes!)

Drop out eight hours for sleeping, and another eight for work or school, and the five hours, 25 minutes of TV-watching becomes almost 70% of the family's leisure time. In an average day, 7 out of every 10 men will watch television. With women it's almost 8. With teen-agers it's 9 out of 10.

It's 42 years since Vladimir Zworykin turned up with the picture tube that made present-day television possible; but it wasn't until 1946 that six stations got under way with telecasting—to a total audience of 8000 set-owners.

The tempo of set-buying speeded up, and by 1950, TV's first sizable audience was on hand—4,000,000 sets, served by 98 stations. So mass-audience TV can be said to be 15 years old.

Today there are 67,100,000 sets in 53,100,000 homes with a total audience of almost 176,000,000 men, women and children. (This means 93.5% of all U.S. homes contain a TV set—as against bathtubs or showers, which only 82% of our homes can claim.)

What does it cost to advertise to this vast television audience these days? Well, you can buy time for a 10-second message over, say, WSLA-TV (Channel 8), Selma, Ala., for a matter of \$12. On the other hand, if you should wish to sponsor a nice, simple little national half-hour show in prime time (7:30-11 P.M.)—with three commercials for your product—it could cost you from \$35,000 (*Password*) to \$80,500 (*The Jack Benny Program*) merely to produce the show, and \$75,000 to \$85,000 more to send it out over the network.

That's a total cost of \$110,000 to \$165,500—for one show. (Should you decide to spend that money differently, you could buy, say, 27 new Cadillacs.)

But, naturally, on a prime-time show you'd be expected to sign up for at least a 13-week series, perhaps 26, preferably 39, and hopefully 52.

Thus an advertiser who wants to keep running his half-hour, prime-time show all 52 weeks of the year can do it for something under \$6,000,000. And, on the other hand, maybe

it'll cost him more like \$8,500,000.

This sum would buy enough frankfurters to stretch, end to end, 16,769 miles—or a distance roughly equal to five round trips by *Wagon Train*. And that's at retail prices.

If you're wondering how much certain of your favorite nighttime shows cost to produce each week, here's a sampling (and remember, these figures—from *Television*, an industry magazine—do not include network time charges; merely the price of *doing* a single show in the series):

If television costs sound steep to you, they are—but cogitate upon the fact that these high costs have not prevented advertisers from spending at the rate of more than 2 billion dollars a year in television. (*That* sum would buy a Volkswagen for every single family in the city of Chicago.)

This compares with the 1 billion dollars they spend in magazines and 3.8 billion dollars in newspapers.

The 344 network and 2908 spot ad-

vertisers—and the uncounted number of local advertisers—who put out this 2 billion dollars annually, support the operation of 569 commercial TV stations. (There are also 99 noncommercial stations.)

The typical station is on the air 18 hours a day. About 93% of the commercial stations are affiliated with at least one of the three big networks (ABC, CBS, NBC), and take about 45% of their programs from them.

The remainder of station program time is devoted to locally originated shows. Of these, a third are produced by the station itself, and the remaining two-thirds are film shows—movies and “syndicated shows” that are largely reruns of shows that first appeared on the networks. As for those much-maligned reruns, remember that the first time a show goes on the air, it is rarely seen by as much as 40% of the entire audience.

In all the time since the medium of television began, advertisers have spent some 18 billion dollars on it. But you've spent more: The entire public investment in the purchase of sets during the same time was almost 22 billion dollars.

On a daily basis, all the advertisers together are chipping in a grand total of 11 cents a day to bring all those programs to your home.

As for you, it's costing you (for electricity and repairs) 13 cents a day to operate a set in your home.

For that you can buy two nickel cigars and have enough left for three Tootsie Rolls.

days and is now sponsor's representative on *Suspense Theatre*, recalls that the early programs were done from an NBC radio studio, and if a show ran 56 minutes instead of an hour, or if it ran a minute or two over the hour, it really didn't matter: "We just called the network and told them we'd be a little under or a little over."

Today, however, the logistics and split-second timing of *Kraft Suspense Theatre* would do justice to the Normandy invasion. In mid-December four productions were shooting at the same time—"The Last Clear Chance," the story of two OSS operatives captured by the Germans in World War II; "Isn't Everyone of Us Beautiful?" which concerns a New York girl vocalist, her manager and a murder in a small town where they are playing a one-night stand; "The Silent Men," about a lawyer who gives up his

practice to go after the killers of his wife; and "Rapture at Two-Forty," which has to do with the adventures of a young world traveler on the French Riviera.

The variety of these episodes can be both a blessing and a curse. James Duff McAdams, a 27-year-old assistant to the executive producer, says, "Writers like the great amount of freedom in the show. They're not burdened by continuing characters." But production executive Jon Epstein, who has spent half of his 36 years in television, says, "Where other shows have a basic cast, we have to start from scratch. When we did a show about the Strategic Air Command, we had to learn the Air Force for that one show. If you're doing a series like *Steve Canyon*, you have to learn the Air Force, too, but then you can use that knowledge every week."

Executive producer Frank P. Rosenberg says that, although *Kraft Suspense Theatre* has no continuing characters, "It has continuing characteristics—basically human characters that the audience can understand as human beings, put in suspenseful situations."

Rosenberg looks upon *Kraft Suspense Theatre* as movies. He never refers to its episodes as programs but as "pictures," and he says, "We try to make a picture that people would walk up to the box office and pay \$2 to see."

Production executive Jon Epstein sees *Suspense Theatre* as "a class product with mass appeal." Compared with past *Kraft* efforts, this may be an exaggeration: *Suspense Theatre* has neither the class of the old *Kraft Television Theatre* nor the mass appeal of Bing Crosby in his prime. But, looking at *Kraft's* record in more than a quarter of a century on the air, it is obvious that a program doesn't have to be a piece of cheese just because that is what the sponsor is selling.

Battlefield Birth: As the Battle of *Peyton Place* continues to rage (see page 24), a communiqué from the front brings news of an impending birth. *Peyton Place* is about to whelp. Will the offspring be called *Son of Peyton Place*? No-o-o, she's to be *The Girl from Peyton Place* — at least that's the working title for the new series, about which, say ABC's spokesmen, nothing has *definitely* been decided. "The girl" is Betty Anderson, who skipped town after a Peytonic love affair and marriage, and has been in New York City for the past several episodes.

Though ABC refuses to confirm it, she will probably forsake *Peyton Place* for good (good?) and become the heroine of the new series, as a small-town girl in the big city. The program will likely be scheduled once a week, beginning early in the summer, but may go twice-a-week à la *Peyton Place*, next fall. Barbara Parkins will continue as Betty Anderson.

As has been the case with *Peyton Place*, the atmosphere behind the scenes of the new series is filled with tension. One ABC vice president told TV GUIDE, apologetically, "This thing is so touchy, I would prefer not to comment. (Sigh) So many personalities involved." William Self, production chief of 20th Century-Fox, which films *Peyton Place*, said "All of this is still conversation. ABC has not ordered the show. Irna Phillips is developing a projection, but nothing is on paper. In fact, Barbara Parkins

has not even been told." Nor has Paul Monash, executive producer of *Peyton Place*, who has clashed repeatedly with Irna Phillips, a *Peyton Place* consultant. "I'm just beginning to find out about it," he said last week. "Ultimately they will have to approach me." He added, "The network is impressed with Irna Phillips."

And so, as the sun sets slowly over the battlefield, we find Paul Monash sulking in his tent, Irna Phillips taking command of a new division, and ABC's general staff plotting new strategy for capitalizing on the success of *Peyton Place*.

Restless Natives: The Televisionland natives are getting restless earlier than usual this year. Negotiations for next season's programs have begun in earnest, and already two stars have stated — for openers — that they won't be back next fall. For whatever it's worth, Raymond Burr and Jack Paar insist they're not kidding, not holding out for a better deal. They've had it. Burr said he's fed up with Mason and is looking for a new TV-series role. CBS, however, is not convinced. John Reynolds, one of the network's vice presidents, says "Ray's playing psychological games. All actors suddenly become bored at renewal time. When the time comes, he'll report." NBC is less confident of Paar's return. "He has said that he doesn't want to work," commented Mort Werner, the network's programming vice president, "and I assume he means it." Paar says he intends to move to Poland Spring, Maine, where he owns a television station.—Henry Harding

In May 1941, Rudolf Hess climbed into an Me 110 fighter loaned by his friend, aircraft manufacturer Willy Messerschmitt. Having already filed a deliberately confusing flight plan, Hess, a ranking Nazi, took off for Scotland, where he told the British that Hitler was again offering to make peace with them—if they would oust Churchill and allow Germany to have control of the Continent. The plan failed and, today, Hess's motives are still uncertain.

Some historians believe Hess used the scheme in a daring attempt to regain his lost prestige in the party. Others say the plan was official; that Hitler disowned Hess only to save face after it failed. A few feel that Hess really wanted peace.

Psychiatrists who examined Hess during his internment agreed that he suffered from amnesia and dementia. They did not know how often he was faking. Hess, now 70, serves a life sentence as a war criminal in West Berlin's Spandau

prison. He still marches the goose-step in his tiny cell and, at night, sometimes emits haunting, wolf-like howls.

He's the Robinson Crusoe of the Beatnik Set

Bob Denver, the bearded bumbler of 'Dobie Gillis,'
now bumbles beardless on 'Gilligan's Island'

Recently, in the pages of this magazine, writer Melvin Durslag referred to actress Tina Louise of CBS's *Gilligan's Island* as "distinctly an asset to any shipwreck."

He might get an argument about **continued**

that from members of the show's cast, even Gilligan himself—the ordinarily easy-to-get-along-with Bob Denver. Denver will not say why he and the glamorous Tina do not get along, nor will any of the castaways—they just ignore her, and she ignores them. Between scenes, while the other six principals chat and tell jokes together, she sits off by herself. And recently when Denver was asked to pose for pictures with her, he adamantly refused.

Bob Denver did not have to worry about temperamental actresses at all-male Loyola University in Los Angeles, where he began acting less than 10 years ago. The Del Ray Players at Loyola are traditionally handsome, well-muscled types with high hopes of hitting it big in Hollywood. But, ironically, the one who has hit it biggest is this wispy young man who doesn't

look like an actor at all.

In fact, Bob Denver, 'starring in *Gilligan's Island* after four years as the beatnik Maynard in *Dobie Gillis*, almost wasn't an actor. He started out to be a lawyer, and, far from being a beatnik, he was so busy 14 hours a day teaching school and moonlighting at the post office that he at first refused to go when the call came to try out for the part of Maynard.

Almost everything that has occurred in the brief career of Bob Denver has been pure happenstance: the request of a Jesuit priest that he be house manager for the Del Ray Players, his reluctant agreement to try out for a role in a college production, the fact that his sister was secretary to the director of new talent at the studio where *Dobie Gillis* was to be made, and his eventual decision to audition for what was to be only his third professional role.

But, happenstance or no, once embarked upon a course of action, Bob Denver manifests a single-mindedness and dedication which belie his hapless public image and his comic exterior. Someone who knows him gives this comic exterior some of the credit for his inner drives: "He was the baby brother in a family of four. His sister and his two older brothers were all better looking than he was and—to him at least—had more on the ball."

As a pre-law student at Loyola, Denver "kind of backed into the Del Ray Players," according to a classmate, attorney Tom McDonald, "but as time went by, he became totally wrapped up in the theater."

The Rev. Joseph Brusher, S.J., who was moderator of the theater group, had persuaded him to be house manager. Later, he was prevailed upon to try out for a comedy role in "The Caine Mutiny Court-Martial." The role was that of a young nervous seaman. "And that's exactly what I was," says Bob. "All I had to do was act natural."

He was "the hit of the show," according to Father Brusher. "He had a natural, beautiful sense of timing and an empathy that got across the footlights." From then on, law was forgotten, and Bob Denver was committed to an acting career.

After a variety of roles in college productions, he was graduated from Loyola in 1957 and then went back for a semester to star in "Harvey," in which he was seen by Ben Bard, director of new talent at 20th Century-Fox Studios, whose secretary just happened to be Bob's sister, Helen. As a professional actor, however, Bob was able to land only two small roles—another nervous young seaman in *The Silent Service* and a bit part in a movie, "A Private's Affair."

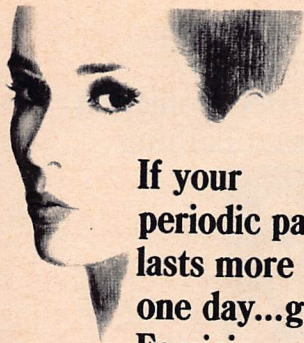
When his father died, Bob gave up acting for the time being to help support the family and send his brother, Dick, through law school. (The other brother, Jerry, was killed in an automobile accident before the family moved West from New Rochelle, N.Y., where Bob was born Jan. 9, 1935.)

As teacher and athletic director at an elementary school in Pacific Palisades, Cal., Bob coached football, basketball and baseball and taught history and arithmetic. He also worked at the post office.

In December 1958, when his sister suggested to Ben Bard that he put Bob's name on the list of possibilities for the role of Maynard, he was working at the post office from 5 to 8:30 A.M., teaching from 9 A.M. to 3 P.M., and then getting back to the post office to work from 3:30 to 7:30 P.M. Thus, when his sister called to tell him about *Dobie Gillis*, he said, "This is just another of your nutty ideas. I won't do it—I need my rest." She persuaded him to change his mind.

Bob Denver isn't getting much more rest these days than he was six years ago, when he was teaching, coaching and working at the post office. What little time he has to

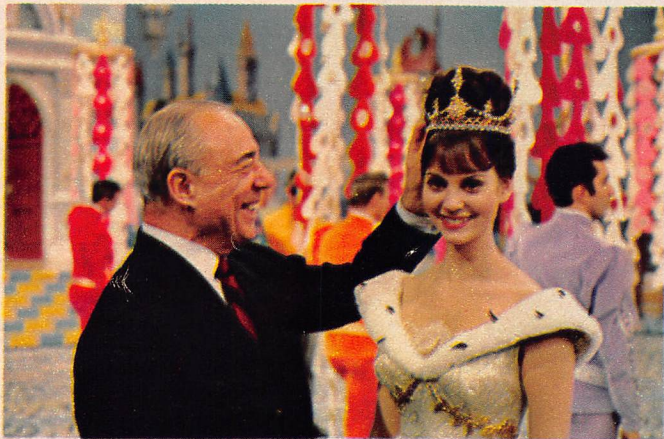
himself he likes to spend with his family in their Pacific Palisades home. He married Maggie Ryan, a Junoesque former model, in 1960. They have three children—Kim, 7, Mrs. Denver's son by a previous marriage; Patrick, 4; and Megan, 1.

Concerning life with Bob, his wife says, "It's very dull—we never do anything." But one Saturday morning last August, when she said, "Wouldn't it be wonderful to have dinner at the Coco Palms tonight?" Bob allowed as how it would, since the Coco Palms is on Kauai, northernmost of the Hawaiian Islands, where he hopes to retire some day. Before the morning was over, the Denvers were on a plane for Honolulu.

After a change of planes in Honolulu, the flight to Kauai and the jeep ride to the hotel, Bob promptly fell asleep and slept all night. You'll be able to inspect the results of our labors Feb. 22, in color, on CBS. And you'll be seeing a bright new singing star named Lesley Ann Warren (that's Lesley Ann in the picture with me above). She's just 18, and I think she makes an ideal Cinderella. When you see her, you'll know why. But now let me tell you more about the show.

Celeste Holm, whom I've known since she played Ado Annie in the original stage version of "Oklahoma!," portrays the Fairy Godmother. In this scene she informs an incredulous Cinderella that a pumpkin can indeed become a fine carriage, and four white mice the horses to draw it.



Our dancers perform to the waltz "Ten Minutes Ago" on the palace-ballroom set. (Confidentially, my own favorite song in the show is "Do I Love You?") Eugene Loring devised the choreography, Charles Dubin directed. All techniques of musical production—color, sound, camera work—have improved since our first experience with "Cinderella." I believe that this version is better done in every way.

Adisconsolate Pat Carroll, as one of the stepsisters, discovers that Cinderella's glass slipper just doesn't fit. The failure is observed by Jo Van Fleet (as her mother, standing at the left), Barbara Ruick (the other stepsister) and Stuart Damon (Prince Charming).



Cinderella climbs into her converted pumpkin and is off to the ball, singing "It's Possible."

In an idle moment I sneaked in behind "Queen" Ginger Rogers and "King" Walter Pidgeon, as we waited for the royal ball to begin and for our young lovers to start falling in love.

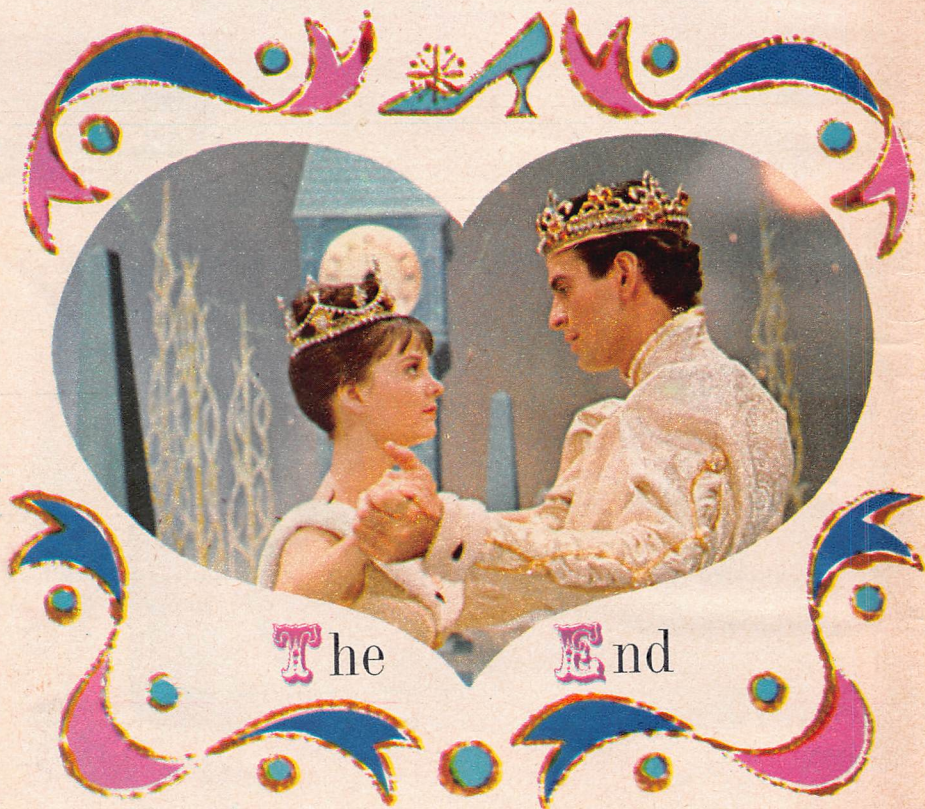
By another happy chance, we found our Prince, Stuart Damon, in an off-Broadway revival of "The Boys from Syracuse." Like Lesley Ann, he is making his first major TV appearance. During rehearsals Jo Van Fleet watched him perform and said to me: "This boy comes equipped with talent." He does indeed.

The weeks of rehearsals and

taping in Hollywood gave me a chance to pursue one of my favorite pastimes—observing actors in their natural habitat. I can report that Celeste Holm diverts herself by crocheting sweaters, Stuart Damon paces and Lesley Ann Warren eats great quantities of peanut brittle.

The Cinderella story has always fascinated me because it dramatizes a hope we all have—that the underdog, the ugly duckling, the misfit can, in fact, come out on top. In "Cinderella" the classic boy meets the classic girl in, I hope, a classic TV show. . .

THE BATTLE OF PEYTON PLACE

Network mounts new offensive for more melodrama to ensure program's high rating

SECOND OF TWO PARTS BY RICHARD WARREN LEWIS

On the surface, the meticulously authentic *Peyton Place* set erected on the 20th Century-Fox lot in Hollywood is a model of New England tranquility. Nestled around a neatly groomed town square are a newspaper office, professional building, ship's chandlery, bookstore, bank, pharmacy, fire department and picturesque little inn. Workmen regularly embellish the setting with sacks of real elm leaves specially air-lifted from the East. Actors loll between takes near a Revolutionary War cannon or an old pillory, reading *Variety* and studying their scripts.

But behind the scenes, several months before *Peyton Place* made its debut, an acrimonious series of disputes was building between the ABC network, led by Vice President Edgar J. Scherick, and bespectacled Paul Monash, the show's executive producer.

ABC had not embraced soap-dictor Irna Phillips's story line, which included a broad hint at incest. Production had been halted while a new concept, involving a bloody automo-

bile accident in which a prospective mother loses her child on the highway, and a melodramatic, life-and-death hospital sequence, was being discussed. Two episodes for the 1964-65 season had already been filmed, and 10 subsequent scripts had been written when the shutdown occurred. One of the *Peyton Place* production staff described the impact of such a hiatus on the cast and crew. "The morale of all these people will now be devastated," he said. "I can only express my fervent hope that the decision to suspend production will be quickly reversed."

Ultimately, the accident-abortion-hospital story line was retained, although its more violent aspects emerged softened. Still, an ABC network representative in Manhattan pleaded: "Something *must* happen in the first four to six weeks of the series." Added Scherick: "Our largest recurring problem with *Peyton Place* has been the need for dynamic, forward thrusting story." Then he asked: "What fireworks will have been set

off at what specific intervals?"

A member of Scherick's staff brainstormed a neat reply—the death of an elderly doctor in one of the initial segments. "Don't you think audiences really love funerals?" he asked. "They find [them] a great sobering influence." Twentieth Century-Fox thought differently. "It might depress the audience," a spokesman declared, while voicing a "predisposition against playing a lingering illness or death in the opening stages."

Next the network championed still another panacea, one of dozens of story projections it proposed. Earlier, in week No. 6, pregnant Betty Anderson had been involved in an automobile accident, losing her child. Monash's adamant stance diluted the gore in this scene. Even after she lost the baby in the accident, however, the network wanted her to become pregnant again. "The mass audience will find a pregnant Betty enormously appealing and it will arouse a whole new wave of sympathy for her," one ABC executive explained. Again, Fox officials demurred.

"Dramatic fireworks without a solid platform of reality would be melodramatic pap, no matter how well it is written and acted," Monash declared. "If the audience does not feel for the people in this series, if it does not have a genuine love toward some of them, if they do not believe in the reality of our people, then the *Peyton Place* series, no matter what its initial rating, will go right down the drain."

As a counter-proposal, ABC stumped for a murder to provide the plot with more "incident," as Scherick called it. Deliberately the network sought a candidate for murder who could trigger, according to Scherick, "a vital and meaningful trial for our first summer's story and a relationship of that trial to the revelation of Allison's illegitimacy." Tom Moore, the president of ABC-TV, had also

warned that the series needed to involve itself more in matters of life and death, or at least the threat of death.

The prime candidate for extinction became Allison's mysterious father. It would be revealed that he had been imprisoned for a murder years before. Following his parole, Constance MacKenzie would kill him, to protect her daughter from the truth of her illegitimacy. "This concept cannot work," Monash said. "It would falsify every value in the series. This would destroy Constance as a continuing character. A murderess protecting her 'secret' would not continue to live in *Peyton Place*." Whom to murder and how it would be accomplished remained unresolved.

The show passes test

By early September half-a-dozen *Peyton Place* episodes had been filmed and executives on both coasts eagerly anticipated the show's premiere on Sept. 15. Despite the differences between network and studio, ABC had been somewhat mollified by the promising results of *Peyton Place*'s audience sampling tests. Months before the season got under way, passers-by were led into theaters in several cities, handed questionnaires and shown the first segments. Up to 150 of these random critics at a time were asked: "If this show was aired at the same time as *Petticoat Junction* and *That Was the Week That Was* [the Tuesday night opposition on the other two networks], would you tune in to it?" *Peyton Place* passed the test in the area of what Madison Avenue calls "Intention to View."

After witnessing the third and fourth episodes, the ITV was almost twice as high as usual. "Most people are habitual television viewers," Monash explained. "This show is like a narcotic. If you tune in often enough, there is a very strong

threat of addiction."

On the eve of the premiere Monash received a telegram from an ABC official which presumably described the network's satisfaction with the show. "When all is said and done," it read, "if *Peyton Place* is the great success I fervently hope and pray it will be, only Paul Monash can take the absolute credit. He [Monash] is one. He is unique. He is talent. He is impossible. He is marvelous. Good luck and Nielsen bless us."

Show is criticized

Overnight ratings indicated that the first *Peyton Place* exposure, slotted against the token opposition of reruns on NBC and CBS, scored heavily with viewers. TV critics, however, greeted the show with a barrage reminiscent of the salvos which accompanied the advent of *The Beverly Hillbillies*. "Instead of calling it soap opera, which is a pejorative term," Monash said, "I would prefer people to say: 'My gosh, Monash has created the first great television novel.' Each half hour should be viewed as a chapter in a novel. But I never expected that to happen. If we had done 'Our Town' we wouldn't have been roasted. We just wouldn't have been viewed."

Then he affixed his signature to a new three-year contract offered by 20th Century-Fox as a vote of confidence. The studio's optimism will allow Monash to produce at least one motion picture a year, as well as endorse *Peyton Place* remuneration checks worth almost \$300,000 annually.

The new contract, the lofty first ratings and the widespread sponsor acceptance of the show were cause for great jubilation until ABC surprisingly resorted to the panic button. Scherick, while pleased with the show's early progress, grew con-

cerned over its prospect of continued success. Less than two weeks after its debut he expressed a "growing discontent" over the future of *Peyton Place*. "We are almost up to our neck in a terrible swamp of indecision and uncertainty," he warned. "Our early audience will be held by novelty production values, but that fascination must be pinned down by a solid story, and quickly. We are the first with a new form. There will never be another serial to have the advantage of publicity and attention going in, that *Peyton Place* had working for it. It will be one of the crimes of our day if we allow those advantages to be dissipated because we can't make up our mind." And he added, "We will shortly find the very structure of this show crumbling about our heads."

Monash rebutted. "I am not Chicken Little and I do not see the sky falling," he said. "The toughest time for a producer of a series is the time between the sale of the pilot and the end of its fourth or fifth week on the air. Network people live in a state of anxiety."

Scherick was anxious over Monash's failure to pinpoint a long-range course for the show through the summer of 1965, just as much as he was by a rating sag following the premiere. Segment No. 2 had suffered a 10-point decrease in its share of audience, according to a 30-city Nielsen sample.

Shooting is halted

To ensure the show's durability, ABC again strongly urged that starker melodrama be written into the scripts. Last November, after 42 episodes had been completed, shooting was halted for a second time while network and studio clashed over the telephone, on telegram blanks and in a new wave of wordy memoranda.

ABC pressed for a murder and

Monash reluctantly gave them one. The father of Allison MacKenzie would be released from prison, where he had been incarcerated 18 years for murder. Shortly after his parole, he, in turn, would be brutally murdered himself. Constance MacKenzie's fingerprints would be found on the murder weapon, a bloody fire poker. As the plot boiled, she would be indicted for a murder she did not commit. Her lengthy trial would carry the show through the dog days of the summer.

He threatens to quit

Months earlier, Monash had rejected the contrivance of Constance's murdering Allison's father and mutely standing trial for the crime. "I am not convinced that the audience will ever believe this story," he now said, "no matter how well it's presented." Scherick insisted that the changes be accomplished. Monash, who had headed the *Peyton Place* project since its inception two years previous, threatened to quit.

But then, strangely, he reconsidered the network's stance, his own lucrative contract, the months of deliberations, and capitulated. "The hell with it," he said resignedly. "If this is what they want, and the studio orders me to do it, I'm not going to breach my contract. In this screwy business you eventually end up as a prostitute anyhow. I suppose you could say I now have the most curious success in television. It's unfortunate that instead of basking in the success, people are grabbing for the spoils. The show is no longer a reflection of what I wanted to do. I feel like a salmon swimming upstream to die."

Scherick shrugged off Monash's comments as "the discontented rumbling of a basically insecure person."

Following a 10-day production break, newly assigned writers began consulting their copies of Gothic hor-

ror tales for inspiration. ABC, in the continuing *Battle of Peyton Place*, seemingly had won the final round. Monash mustered one last protest, again appealing for the elimination of obvious melodrama. This time, to add to all the confusion, the network took an antiviolence position, rescinded the plan to have Allison's father killed by the whiplash of a fire poker and also blue-penciled another violent death by pistol shot at point-blank range.

Recently, his morale sapped by the network's continual vacillation, Monash slumped in his lush Fox offices, near a bookcase that contained a three-volume set of "Masterpieces of World Literature in Digest Form." Philosophically he contemplated *Peyton Place's* bumpy road to success and the fact that his lead had already spawned a burgeoning flock of imitators. Virtually every major studio in Hollywood was readying big-budgeted soap opera, taking heed from the reception of his show.

'...Cut to the first commercial'

Half-seriously he speculated on where the old television game of follow the leader would end. He envisioned how the Bible, as the ultimate soap opera, would fare in serial drama form and what the reaction of network executives would be to such a project.

"Look, Paul," he guessed they would say. "You can't start with that slow beginning. You'll never hook the audience. You've gotta open with Cain killing Abel. As Cain runs away he passes Eve, who is with the Serpent. She tries to stop him, but he's running too fast. She goes on and eats the apple. Then Adam and Eve quarrel. But it isn't only about the apple. It's about Cain's running away and Abel's murder. *That's* how you get it started. *That's* our hook. And then we cut to the first commercial."

Singer VIKKI CARR makes her dramatic television debut as guest star in "The Keepers Come Calling" on The Bing Crosby Show . . .
